Minutes

The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Selma, May 5, and 6, 1914. The opening service Holy Communion was held in St. Paul's Church at 9:30 a. m. Bishop Beckwith, celebrant, assisted by Rev. E. W. Gamble.

At the close of the service adjournment was made to the Dallas Club, where the business meetings were to be held.

The President, Mrs. Frank Stollenwerck, called the meeting to order, and opened the session with Hymn 261. Rev. G. W. Gamble offered prayer, and the Bishop followed with a brief talk.

Mrs. Harry Smith, of Selma, gave a cordial address of welcome to the assembled women in behalf of her Branch. In response to roll call, delegates from the following churches responded:

A Committee on Hospitality was formed consisting of Mrs. Charles Henderson, Troy; Mrs. Dearborn, Birmingham; Mrs. Hood, Mobile.

An expression of regret at the absence of the Vice-President Mrs. Ellen Peter-Bryce, was offered, and the Secretary was instructed to send her a telegram embodying this resolution.

The President then deivered her annual message.

Fellow Workers in the Woman's Auxiliary—

Each year as it passes brings its especial lesson to those who work with us for the extension of the Kingdom of Christ. Sometimes that lesson is one of encouragement and we report progress along every line of endeavor. Again we seem to be standing still, perhaps losing little, but marking time, and certainly not advancing as we had hoped and prayed to do.

Our high tide of interest and liberality was shown in the United Offering which was \$2,305.10 last October when that memorable Thank Offering service was held in New York. We had nineteen Alabamians

enrolled as delegates and visitors to the Convention. One would naturally have supposed that the inspiration gained at that Convention would have sent the work forward by leaps and bounds. Such has not been the case. All along the line we have met unlooked for apathy and discouragements, but sure this time of stress has been the real testing time which will prove whether our ship is sea-worthy or not.

On the occasion of her recent visit to Montgomery, Miss Lindley gave utterance to many wise sayings, none so startling as this: "Thank God for our discouragements." No doubt she was sent to bring us that message at this critical time, when the air seemed filled with little else, and one begins to realize that this must be part of God's plan for us.

In the life of each individual nothing tests faith like sorrow and disappointment, so in the corporate life of the Auxiliary we must find in our difficulties a similar trial of our faith, a challenge to hold more closely to the things that are real, even accounting apparent failure as a call to deeper devotion, renewed consecration and more fervent prayers.

Miss Lindley's visit was a source of great pleasure and to Mrs. Beckwith our thanks are due.

We trust that the organization of the Junior Branches among the older girls, ages "sixteen and up," will be general throughout the Diocese. Just here we have been lamentably weak, and just here we must look for a continuance of the work of the Auxiliary.

During the past year the Auxiliary has lost by death two most valued members whose interest and loyalty have been co-extensive with the life of the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama, Mrs. F. S. Parker for many years President of the Auxiliary of Christ Church, Mobile, and Mrs. Amelia F. Wyly, of St. John's, Montgomery, whose faithfulness have written themselves large in the annals of our work.

The Convocational Secretary of Mobile, Mrs. C. R. Kimball, because of ill health has resigned and we have no longer a Convocational Secretary within our borders. Mrs. Kimball's splendid work calls for appreciative mention here.

Your President, in an unguarded moment, while under the spell of appeals from Dr. Tensler and others in New York, made a pledge of \$75 each for the funds asked for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, and St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai.

It is with great pleasure I note that the amount asked for St. Luke's Hospital at Tokyo, Japan, has been raised, and we are sure to complete that pledged for Chinese womanhood at St. Mary's will be given while we are here. Our Alaskan scholarship, too, has not been forgotten.

We have only one new Branch to report, at St. John's, Tuscumbia. It is hoped that this new Branch has a representative here.

Our goal will only have been reached when every woman within the Diocese has answered the call to service in the three-fold work of the Auxiliary—to *study* about the field and its needs, to *pray* for the spread of the Kingdom of Christ and to *give* to the cause our time, our talents, our loving service in every way we can. This year makes our Silver Anniversary and it seems eminently fitting that this milestone in the Auxiliary's life should be marked by greater achievement than ever before.

God grant that it may be so!

Already I see the light breaking over the shadows which have encompassed us in this splendid meeting I recognize a near fulfillment of our prayers and desires for progress and growth.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the meeting in Tuscaloosa, 1913, which was followed by the Treasurer's report.

The Work of the Church Periodical Club has begun in the Parishes of St. John's and All Saints, Mobile; and in consequence there are two additional libraries in the field. Two Librarians failed to report any work, in the Parishes of St. Andrews, Birmingham, and Christ Church, Tuscaloosa. Church of the Advent, Birmingham; St. Paul's, Selma; and St. Paul's, Greensboro, have no librarians. Efficient work was accomplished in these parishes a few years ago. These facts demonstrate that the work of the C. P. C. in the Diocese makes little progress, and that

beyond the "faithful few," little interest is taken by the majority of Parishes. Each recurring year the correspondent and Librarians come with renewed thanks to the Diocesan officers, and to the Parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary for their hearty co-operation and substantial help, encouraging them to renewed effort.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE DIOCESE
OF ALABAMA, FOR 1913-1914.

On account of the delay in the Publication Department of the Board of Missions, orders for material were late in reaching the leaders throughout the Diocese. The delay was largely caused by the general convention in New York in October, and this is offered in introduction of my report to try to account for fewer classes in our branches this year than last. It was hoped that at the eleventh hour many reports would be sent in.

In sending out requests for reports the question was asked whether the branch had undertaken any courses in Bible study, because it seems such a natural consequence of Mission Study to desire to know more of our Master's mission and of the Mission of the Apostles, particularly of St. Paul. Classes in Mission Study invariably request a course in Bible Study following the classes. Also in attending the general convention, the thought was thoroughly impressed that while auxiliary branches are expected to give their apportionments to Foreign and to Domestic Missions, they also are expected to give missionary service in their parishes, and to be leaders in Girl Friendly Societies,

aids in Junior Auxiliary Work, and to assist in boy's organizations, but particularly to assure missionary study and instruction for our children in the Sunday Schools, for this reason each educational leader has been asked to report whether her parish Sunday School has had Mission Sundays or missionary instruction. With these explanations I submit the report.

Anniston—Grace Church, Mrs. C. Tulane Kidd, Leader. Study Class, "Japan Advancing—Whither?"

Birmingham—Advent. Mrs. Buell, Leader.

The Secretary writes from this branch that after enjoying the Japan course last year, they expected to greatly appreciate the story of Missions in China, but they began first with the study of The Message to be carried to the heathen. This course proved so full of inspiration that it was continued during the year. To quote from this letter. "The interest was increased from the start by about 300 per cent. Souls seemed thirsty for the Gospel, and our dear leader, so full of the Holy Spirit has poured out her life for us. All denominations are included in our roll call, even one Roman Catholic." No report of missionary instruction is given for the Sunday School as a whole, but one class of ten young girls is making a personal inspection of the charitable institutions of Birmingham that they may see for themselves the suffering about them, and those in need of various kinds of help. These young girls spend liberally of their time and money for these sufferers. The object of their teacher is to train them in true missionary spirit and to help them carry out the Scriptural injunction "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ."

Birmingham, St. Andrews, Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Leader.

The most satisfactory study work of the year has been Bible Study, in an enthusiastic class of about ten members with an average weekly attendance of fifteen all of whom study their lessons, and go prepared to answer numerous questions. The text-book used is Blackslee's Apostolic Leaders, published by Charles Scribner of New York; and the Rector of the Parish conducted the lessons. So interesting have they proved that instead of adjourning at the close of Lent as was first intended, the study will continue until the book is finished in June. This branch has also had program meetings from "The Emergency in China" at the monthly meetings, but because of the delay in getting the books for the whole course at one time the study did not prove so interesting. The leader suggests that the greatest difficulty in arousing interest in missions is the appeal of the concrete to the human mind, and Mission Study carries no visual appeal to those whom we would interest. If the rules of the Auxiliary permitted, as organization work, flower brigades to supply hospitals, relieve physical suffering at our doors, work in suburban Sunday Schools, and through this lead to the broad-

er mission fields, this leader believes results would be doubled, as well as numbers augmented. While the Sunday School at the Advent has no systematic missionary instruction, one class of girls is deeply interested in the course "Missionary Heroes."

Birmingham, St. Mary's on the Highland, Mrs. W. L. Welton, Leader.

Program meeting, "Emergency in China," supplemented by selections from "Spirit of Missions." This branch is fortunate in having eight members who are always ready to serve on the programs.

Demopolis, Eugenia Lyon's Memorial Branch. Miss Harrison, Leader.

Program meeting, "Emergency in China," and Spirit of Missions.

One Sunday in Trinity Sunday School was given up to Missions during the year and in one class the third Sunday of each month is devoted to missionary instruction.

Mobile, Christ Church, Miss Carrie I. Kimball, Leader.

Study Class on China. The course has proved so interesting that the weekly meetings with an average attendance of ten and a membership of fifteen will continue through May and possibly longer.

Montgomery, Christ Church. Mrs. Carey Taylor, Leader.

This parish has had no rector this year, and in the face of many drawbacks, the Auxiliary has been a force in the parish work. No regular study classes have been undertaken, but program meetings have been held from the "Spirit of Missions" and leaflets on China sent out by the Educational Department.

Montgomery, The Church of the Holy Comforter. Mrs. J. B. Jones, Leader.

Lenten Mission Study Class, with greater interest than any held in previous years. Parenthetically, I would say, this branch has been holding program discussion meetings since 1901, and it would be interesting to know if any other branch has a longer record. Twenty-three members were enrolled this year, fifteen of whom attended every meeting. The plans of program meeting and study classes were combined, the leader giving certain topics to be reported on by individual members, and at the same time, questions to be discussed by the whole class. Reports to precede discussions. The leader says this gave variety to the meeting, and spared the class from continuously hearing one voice. No one failed to do her part, and every discussion brought forth opinions. A secretary was appointed for each meeting, then making a synopsis of the meeting and refreshing the memory on that work and securing unity, also showing the leader how vague an impression her remarks sometimes made, and an opportunity to correct these errors. The course was extended through seven weekly meetings, and concluded with a projectoroscope lecture on Our Mission Field in China, for the benefit of the Junior Auxiliary. This leader suggests that the work would be more successfully accomplished in each branch if two

leaders were appointed to do the work instead of one. The success of the year is attributed by her to the excellent material supplied by the Educational Department and to the earnest, devoted spirit of the class. In the Sunday School of the Church of the Holy Comforter, missionary lessons from the "Flowering of the Flowery Kingdom" has been used in one class.

Montgomery, St. Johns, First Division, program meeting during Lent. Emergency in China.

Montgomery, St. Johns, Second Division. Advent Study Class. Emergency in China. Program meeting, Lenten Class. In the Sunday School, missionary Sundays have been observed several times during the year, and three China mission meetings were held on Friday afternoons during Lent for the Sunday School children.

Prattville, St. Paul's. Miss Booth, Leader. Program meeting, Japan Advancing.

Selma, St. Paul's. Mrs. Watkins Vaughn, Leader. Reading from Spirit of Missions on China, and from Intimate China, and also personal letters from friends in China, also a lecture course on the Lives of the Apostles by the rector during Lent. An entertaining as well as profitable year, was reported by the secretary.

Troy, St. Marks. Mrs. Charles Henderson, Leader. Study Class, Japan Advancing, Whither?"

Union Springs, Trinity. Misses Hobdy, Leaders.

This branch is noted for its splendid Bible class, which was first a product of the Church Guild, but is now combined with the Auxiliary, and meets every Monday afternoon during the year, and has existed for several years. It is conducted by Miss Hobdy, a young woman, almost too modest to tell what she has done. The members were unwilling to give up the Bible Class, so one Monday afternoon each month twenty minutes is given to the study of Missions.

The leader modestly writes, "Though we have not devoted much time to the study of what others are doing in the missionfield, I hope from our Bible lessons, we are learning our duty, and how to perform it faithfully."

Since the meeting in Selma these reports have been sent in:

Greenville—St. Thomas. No regular mission study, but selected articles read at monthly meetings.

Huntsville—Church of the Nativity, Miss Campbell, Leader. Study Class, Emergency in China.

Florence—Trinity, Mrs. C. L. Price, Leader. Program meetings. Much interest aroused with increased knowledge of work in mission-fields.

Mobile—All Saints, Mrs. H. M. Hood, Leader. Study Class, with Emergency in China as text book. At roll call members respond with some item of news about China from the newspapers.

Supplementary reading was taken from the \$2.00 library, and Spirit of Missions. The Life of Bishop Ingles was enjoyed by all. The Intercessory page of the Spirit of Missions was used at the opening of the meeting.

Tuscaloosa—Christ Church, Mrs. Ellen Peter-Bryce, Leader. Program meeting with Emergency in China as text-book. A leader was appointed for each meeting, who prepared a paper, and gave out topics for discussion to two or three members to be used as a talk or a paper. This method proved quite satisfactory.

In conclusion, I want to tell you how much the work of Diocesan Educational Secretary has meant to me as a spiritual help. Through the year since last May a few more than a hundred letters have been written by me for our work, and many more have come to me. But, dear friends, this is not the way to accomplish big results, and the paltry dollar is standing in the way of our advancement. We would have as Educational Secretary in our Diocese a salaried young woman of ability who would have few outside responsibilities, and could go at your call to organize Mission Study Classes and teach methods for obtaining results. No active mother or housekeeper should attempt this work. It will help her but that cannot be our only object. So let us look to the day when we can do business in a businesslike way, and begin now to subscribe for the maintenance of this vital work of our organization.

This report may seem discouraging to you, but the earnestness and enthusiasm expressed by every correspondent fills me with hope and thankfulness, therefore, let us be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord" forasmuch as we know our labor is not in vain in the Lord.

Mrs. Atkins was appointed to find out if the Juniors would unite in supporting three beds in a hospital in Japan at a cost of \$50 per annum.

Wilson, Diocesan Educational Secretary, who would then send them to Mrs. McQueen, Chairman of the C. P. C. for the traveling libraries—or they might be used for Summer Study Classes.

**Constitution**

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.
2. Its object is to unite all the parishes and mission stations in the Diocese in all branches of mission work and by systematic and united effort to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.
3. All parishes and mission stations that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intenton to work in unison with the Auxliary.

4. The officers shall be a President, appointed by the Bishop for a term of four years, and a Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, Secretary of the Junior Branch and Secretary of the Baby Branch appointed by the President.

5. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting and to have a general knowledge of the work in progress. The Vice President shall preside in her absence.

6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, keep an account of the work done as reported by the Parish Secretaries and report this annually to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Secretary shall also send notices of all meetings and keep a record of the same.

7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys sent to her by any Branch for missionary work and for the expenses of the Auxiliary and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

8. The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Council, or such other time as the Bishop shall suggest, for the purpose of hearing the reports of the Diocesan and Parish Secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and transacting all other business that may come before it.

9. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge according to its ability for the current expenses and work of the Diocesan Branch.

10. At the annual meeting each Branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote in business of general import.

11. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

12. Any article in this Constitution can be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of any to be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
