## Minutes

The Twenty-seventh meeting of the Alabama Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Mission was held in Mobile May 9th and 10th, 1916.

The opening service was at St. John's Church, at 10 o'clock, when Bishop Beckwith gave an inspiring and helpful talk to those present, followed by Holy Communion, the Bishop, celebrant, assisted by Rev. Gardner C. Tucker. Upon leaving the Church the women of the Auxiliary assembled at St. John's Parish House, where their sessions were to be held.

This meeting was called to order by the President, and opened with a brief service.

Mrs. Gardner C. Tucker addressed the ladies in gracious words of welcome and showed in a forceful manner the high purpose for which the Woman's Auxiliary stands. The President responded, bringing out in her talk the necessity for continued earnestness of purpose.

### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

My Dear Co-workers:

After another year of grace we are again assembled to take stock of ourselves and our work.

Some things point to this as the year when our work seems to have been at the ebb tide. Surely the onrushing waves of the recurring years will bring us into the flood tide of real accomplishment if we use profitably the lessons which our experiences should have taught us.

Our greatest encouragement comes from this: That our prayers of many years "that God will put it into the hearts of many women to give themselves to the work in the Mission Field," have at last been answered and we have today the precious gift of a young life to offer on God's altar.

Miss Thornton comes to us from far-off Washington because she wishes to become a Missionary from Alabama.

Then we look forward with pleasure and pride to the continuance of the splendid work so auspiciously begun at St. Michael's and All Angels, Anniston, where already a worker, partly maintained by the United Offering, is bringing many children to our Lord that He may bless them. That anyone should "forbid them to come" by a failure to help here is not to be thought of. I believe we can rely upon you for your usual hearty co-operation in these new enterprises as well as elsewhere when occasion requires.

Next October in St. Louis the grand Thanksgiving service will be held at which the United Offering is presented. During these re-

maining five months let each and all bear this in mind and add to this fund as God has blessed us.

Bishop Lloyd aptly says:

"The United Offering represents at once an opportunity and a challenge to every discriminating woman who is a Christian. Opportunity, since through it she may give practical expression to her gratitude for the gift of her womanhood. Challenge, since by it she may definitely declare her faith in the Christ as the Saviour of women."

I have the following recommendations to make:

1st. That, as we have new objects within the Diocese demanding our support and there is still no beneficiary of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship, the usual pledges for this scholarship shall not be made at this meeting. Such action, however, not binding any subsequent meeting of the Auxiliary.

2nd. That the Second Vice-President of the Diocese be and hereby is instructed to act as Box Secretary for the Diocese and that the Vice-President of each Parish Branch having such officers, shall be the Box Secretary for her Branch.

Mrs. Beckwith made an appeal to the women to take a more active interest in the Junior work and asked them to help in organizing new Branches in the Parishes where they were not already established.

Mrs. Legare gave a partial report from the Little Helpers, from various causes this was not as satisfactory to her as usual, but she hoped to fill it out later. She also solicited more interest in this Division of the work. Mrs. Gardner C. Tucker gave a practical suggestive talk on how the Juniors and Little Helpers worked in unison in St. John's Parish, having meetings together occasionally. It was told also how the Trinity Branch of Juniors was the Banner Class over all others in the Interdenominational Missionary Union of the city, they having secured more new members than any other Junior organization, while All Saints ranked second.

The President appointed a Hospitality Committee composed of Mrs. Charles Henderson, Montgomery; Mrs. Cary Gamble, Huntsville; Mrs. L. W. George, Demopolis.

Miss Weller was called upon to tell about her work in the Parish School of St. Michael and All Angels, Anniston, and gave a most interesting account of what has been accomplished during the past three years. The children are mostly from the families connected with the mills and foundries, and many of them are in great need of financial assistance. Their responsiveness to Church influence was quite gratifying. Rev. Mr. C. K. Weller, Rector of St. Michael's, followed his daughter with a talk on similar lines. He told of the kindness shown the Parish School by the other denominations and their assistance in the maintenance of the school, and also of the growth in Church membership from this class of people. He said he had baptized 67 and presented 27 for confirmation in a little less than three years. After hearing this talk it was moved by Mrs. Beckwith, seconded by Mrs. Tucker, that instead of making pledges for the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund this year, the Parish School of St. Michael's in Anniston should be assisted, the money to be sent to Diocesan Treasurer and forwarded by her. Mrs. Cary Gamble offered the following amendment: "If the work at St. Michael's should not be under the direction of Mr. Weller during the ensuing year the sum raised for this purpose should be disposed of at the direction of our Executive Committee." After discussing the question, the motion as amended was carried. The meeting then adjourned and the delegates went to the Cawthon Hotel where a luncheon was served them. At four o'clock the members of the Auxiliary, the Clergy and others interested in the cause, went out to Spring Hill to inspect the new buildings of the Church Home for orphans. Bishop Beckwith conducted a dedicatory service, and brought out very clearly in his remarks his desire that this should be a real Church Home, and not simply an institution for the care of orphans. A social hour followed the service.

Wednesday morning the members assembled at St. John's Parish House, and the meeting was opened with the usual form of service.

Miss Emery's annual letter was read by the Educational Secretary. In the letter she urged that greater interest be taken in prayer, that next year each branch should plain to have its period of repentance for its own shortcomings, and intercession in behalf of others—and asked, in what three things the Auxiliary *helps most*, three things which it *needs* most. A letter from Miss Noble was read, in which she suggested that the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund should be incorporated according to the laws of Alabama. This was discussed at some length, and Mrs. Tucker made a motion, seconded and carried, "That the incorporation of the Endowment Fund be left to the Officers, the President to consult with some lawyer, and take action as soon as possible.

Second Vice-President.

Special notice was called to the recommendation of the President, "that the Vice-President shall be instructed to act as Box Secretary, and where Parish Branches have a Vice-President she shall act as Box Secretary for her branch, and apply to Diocesan Vice-President for all names, and other information needed."

Memorial hour was conducted by the Vice-President, who expressed the sympathy of the Auxiliary with our President in the recent death of her aunt and co-worker, Mrs. Flora Buell, and gave a brief testimonial to other members who have joined the celestial ranks. At the close of this service Hymn 672 was sung, and mid-day prayer offered. The Educational Secretary gave her report as follows:

REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

Members of the Woman's Auxiliary and Fellow Workers:

Since our last meeting your secretary in this department has written about sixty letters, distributed numerous leaflets and pamph-

lets and received about thirty-five letters.

Many of the branches had already completed the four courses of study suggested for the Review year, so it was purposed by the department to use this year, through the leadership of the Woman's Auxiliary, for the introduction of Mission study into other parish organizations, such as Church choirs, Boy Scouts, Girls Friendly Societies and Guilds. For this purpose, there were sent out letters signed with my name, from the General Educational Department at the Church Mission House, to every Auxiliary Branch in the Diocese. These letters had instruction attached for answers. There was not a single response to these letters and there have been no reports of this extension work. Possibly the explanation of this lies in the fact that our parishes as a rule are small and the same people belong to every organization of the parish. But if the number of classes reported is small, no manner of complaint can be made of the quality of the work done by these "seekers after knowledge." With great pride the following list of classes is presented for the Women's Auxiliary. Miss Drake will report for the Juniors:

1. Emmanuel Parish, Bay Minette, Mrs. G. W. Gilmer, leader. Subjects of study: Social aspects of Foreign Missions and have begun Emergency in China for a second course. Five members in class.
2. Advent, Birmingham. Study class weekly on Old Testament study and later on New Testament. Illustrated lecture course monthly on the Mission work of the Church. All classes led by the Rector. Large attendance.
3. St. Mary's, Birmingham. Study class. Subject: Japan Advancing and Emergency in China. Mrs. O. H. Bowen leader.
4. All Saints, Mobile, Mrs. Marie Quarles, leader. Monthly meetings on the Church's Mission in foreign and domestic fields. Weekly meetings during Lent from Miss Emery's "Handbook of the Woman's Auxiliary" and "How the Church Came to Our Country." One mission play was presented during the year and Missionary exhibits of Alaska and the Philippines from the Church Missions House were shown at their respective meetings.
5. Christ Church, Mobile, Mrs. C. R. Kimball, leader. Study class weekly during Lent. Subject: Conquest of the Continent. Membership, 17; average attendance, 12. Interest unusual and it is proposed to continue at least a month longer and include other review work.
6. Trinity, Mobile, Mrs. St. John Wilson, leader. Monthly meetings. Subject of study: Missionary Calendar published by Woman's Auxiliary of Diocese of Pennsylvania. The method used was for the leader to give the life of the Bishop who edited the page and the members to give the contents of the page.

7. St. John's, Montgomery, First and Second Divisions. Lecture course during Lent by the Rector. Weekly meetings. Subject: History of the Church of England. Average attendance, 23. Text-book used: Dr. Dearner's *Everyman's History of the Church of England*.

8. Ascension, Montgomery. Lecture course by the Rector. Subject: The Conquest of the Continent.

9. Church of the Holy Comforter, Mrs. J. Brevard Jones, leader. Conquest of the Continent. Weekly meetings during Lent. This course was concluded by a study of the Church in Alabama. Enrollment, 25; attendance, 15. Some of this class had never attended study classes before.

We have often heard that "knowledge is power." We have learned even more, knowledge is the foundation of enthusiasm and leads to efficiency, which means approaching the task to be accomplished in the right spirit, with the right conception and with the right method. The Mission Study Class to develop leadership and the Mission program meeting to give Missionary information are the hope of the Auxiliary in acquiring this necessary knowledge for our inspiration and progress.

To this end, each Branch should have an educational leader to conduct classes and to present Missionary programs at the monthly meetings. The difficulty heretofore has been to secure leaders for our work. We no longer need have this difficulty. Two conferences were held in our Province last year and will be held again this year where normal classes will be held for leaders, and it is our business to take advantage of this opportunity for preparedness.

At the annual M. E. M. Conference last June, at Blue Ridge, N. C., members of the Woman's Auxiliary present were so impressed with what this Conference might mean for the Church, that a Committee was formed and letters sent to Educational Secretaries throughout the Province recommending that each Branch send delegates to this Conference. The special features this year will be the Junior work. Miss Lindley and several Bishops will be in attendance. We ought to endorse these undertakings by a large attendance.

Another help in our mission study to which attention is again directed is the Circulating Library at the Church Missions House, from which any member or Branch may obtain books for collateral reading for Mission study. The membership fee is \$2 per year. These books can be kept two weeks and reasonably renewed. All Saints, Mobile, has reported membership in this library and derives great benefit therefrom. This Circulating Library should have our patronage. It will fill a long-felt want.

And still another help, introduced this year at the Provincial meeting in Sewanee is the Provincial Treasury of Ideas. This is

suggestive and helpful in all branches of Auxiliary work. Let me beg of you to send me all helpful methods and original programs to be sent to the Treasurer of these Ideas for distribution in exchange for the good ideas already sent us from other Dioceses. May this co-operation prove a stepping stone to newer fields and broader action.

The Educational Department has prepared for Mission Study in 1916-17 a course on Pan-American conditions. This is a history of the southern half of the new world, together with its present needs and what the Church is doing to meet them. There is to be only one book instead of the usual \$2 library. The title of the book is "The New World," by Rev. Arthur R. Gray, Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions. The book will be ready for use in the Sewanee Conferences. It is said to be very interesting and an eye-opener to many people. Those who wish to read up may obtain a list of recommended books bearing on the subject by applying to your Educational Secretary.

The Educational Department recommends that at the monthly meetings of the Auxiliary Branches, leaders use measures to insure Missionary information. The tendency is to make these purely business meetings. In addition to the use of Miss Emery's handbook, the series of articles, "How the Church Came to This Country," and the series of 1914-15, entitled "Lives That Have Helped," are suggested as fine for this purpose.

Missionary information should be dispensed in all possible ways by the Woman's Auxiliary. Can we not as a body encourage more Mission plays and exhibits, more earnest study and especially try to have our Sunday Schools celebrate Missionary Sundays during the year? "The Making of Modern Crusaders" is issued from the Church Missions House as a guide and method of accomplishing the increase of interest in Missions, in Sunday Schools and is full of instruction for teachers and pupils.

And now may I conclude with this allegory which I hope will bring you a message:

The woman set out on her long journey with a heavy burden on her shoulder.

Before the midmorning had come she was stooping, half fainting. She could not carry the burden farther, and, weeping and repining, she prayed.

Then appeared an angel, so that all the place was glorified.

"Your prayer is heard," said the angel. "God gives no burdens too heavy to be borne. Now what will you? Shall I remove the burden or give you strength to bear it?

The woman was wise.

She reflected that if added strength were given it would help her in all things. Besides, now that she might part with it if she chose she half suspected that the burden might be of use to her. So she said, "Give me strength that I need not sink or despair under it."

"So be it," said the angel, and went away.

And the woman, with a great new strength, arose and stepped out on the road. The burden was no longer heavy, but so light that at times she was not conscious of it.

Oh, the blessing of the new strength! More than once she found a fainting fellow traveler by the way and with her strong arms she was able to support her to a place of safety. When she found a lost child, weary unto death, she was able to carry it to its home. She could help remove obstacles from the path. She sometimes took another's burden, and carried it till the tired one grew rested and strong.

And no day passed but she rejoiced that she had chosen strength.

When she came to the journey's end the angel met her, and unbound the burden from her shoulders. And lo! the bundle held robes and crowns to make her fit for the King's palace, and also gifts that she could offer to the King.

The following Branches have sent in reports of Mission Study during and since the annual meeting: St. John's, Mobile; Emma Jones Branch, Mobile; Section B, St. Michael's and All Angels, Anniston; Eugenia Lyons Memorial Branch, Demopolis; Christ Church, Tuscaloosa. This brings our total number of classes in Woman's Auxiliary to 14 and with the Juniors to 20.

### Constitution

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.
2. Its object is to unite all the parishes and mission stations in the Diocese in all branches of mission work and by systematic and united effort to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.
3. All parishes and mission stations that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.
4. The officers shall be a President, appointed by the Bishop for a

term of four years; a Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Junior Branch and Secretary of the Little Helpers appointed by the President.

5. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting and to have a general knowledge of the work in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, keep an account of the work done as reported by the Parish Secretaries, and report this annually to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Secretary shall also send notices of all meetings and keep a record of the same.

7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys sent to her by any branch for missionary work and for the expenses of the Auxiliary, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

8. The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Council, or such other time as the Bishop shall suggest, for the purpose of hearing the reports of the Diocesan and Parish Secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and transacting all other business that may come before it.

9. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge according to its ability for the current expenses and work of the Diocesan Branch.

10. At the annual meeting each Branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote in business of general import.

11. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

12. Any article in this Constitution can be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of any to be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
