## MINUTES

The Twenty-Eighth Annual Meeting of the Alabama Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was held in Birmingham, May 8, 9, 1917.

The opening service was held at St. Mary's-on-the-Highlands, at 10 o'clock, when Communion was administered by Bishop Beckwith, assisted by Rev. Willoughby N. Claybrook. The Bishop then gave a brief address with reference to the work of the Auxiliary, and of thanks to the retiring officers whose term of office expired with this meeting.

As the morning session was to be held in the church, the President called the meeting to order, and opened with the usual brief form of service: a hymn, the creed and prayers. A charming message of welcome was delivered by Mrs. Wittichen of St. Mary's, followed by the address of the President.

### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

My Dear Co-Workers:

Here at the end of our eight year's experiment in this field of labor for the cause of Christ and the spread of His Kingdom, we must take stock of the failures and successes which have retarded or advanced our work.

In the last eight years we have grown considerably stronger numerically, as we had 28 Branches in 1909, and 40 now, and financially our work has almost doubled, as in 1909 our Financial Summary of amount paid out was \$128.35; in 1916 it was \$4070.06.

The Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Endowment has grown from \$533.09 to \$1416.56, though one must remember that in 1909 and perhaps a year or two later the expenses of a beneficiary were paid and only the unappropriated remainder was given to the Endowment Fund.

Miss Noble's request that the custodian of this fund be placed under a bond or that the Woman's Auxiliary be incorporated has been left in *statu quo*. The law requires that three officers of the incorporated society shall reside in the same place and as the present officers were so soon to go out of office it was thought best by the Executive Board to make no change at present.

When you have another President at the helm she and her new Cabinet can take this very necessary step at once, thus relieving Miss Noble's anxiety concerning the safe-guarding of this fund.

The Convocational System, suggested by Mrs. McMillan, was tried but finally abandoned. Under the name of Districts the same plan is being tried out by the Alabama Federation of Woman's Clubs. The Mobile Convocation alone took hold of this plan in a spirit of earnest co-operation; Mrs. C. R. Kimball, of Mobile, making a splendid Convocational Secretary.

Perhaps the new President can revive the plan as its possibilities for strengthening and developing the work are certainly very great.

Another forward-looking plan which had to be abandoned, was that of making the school for mill children at St. Michael's, and All Angels, Anniston, a Diocesan work,

We could only do something as a Diocese into which no taint of Parochialism can creep!

The three Triennials, which happily have come within these eight years have been times of great enlightenment and inspiration.

The total amount presented at three Triennials was \$5,775.55.

One looks back with pride upon the increase of the United Offering, yet it represents the thought of only one woman in ten of the church! When we presented the offering in Cincinnati, in 1910, the offering was \$1,343.01—in 1913, it had advanced almost a thousand dollars, being \$2,305.10. In St. Louis, last October, the offering totalled \$2,127.44. The deficit \$177.66, was more than made up by the offering of a young life which accompanied our gift, the name Dorothy Thornton being enclosed with the check, and presented on the altar at the United Offering Service

In this alone we have taken a great forward step, for who can measure the influences for good of a thoroughly trained and educated woman, fitted for work in any part of the Mission field? Already there have come calls for such a worker in our crowded Birmingham District.

Along the line of Mission Study, upon which increasing emphasis is being laid by those who wish to work intelligently, we have had many splendid text-books in the past eight years. Some interest has been shown, but at this point I am more discouraged than anywhere else in our retrospect; for so few women care to study anything, and even our books prepared by experts and with splendid helps for leaders, fail to attract them. A sure way of becoming up-to-date, is to study the Missionary Text-book for the year, for the text-book has always treated of the country most prominently in the public mind: China, Japan, The Philippines, Social Aspects of Foreign Missions, The New World. The last two being, perhaps, the most interesting of all, and yet most of our classes number not more than six or eight.

Let us pray for greater interest and co-operation along this line.

The Course of Study on Prayer, and the recent Pilgrimage of Prayer, in which we have all joined, have been great privileges, and one cannot measure the abundance, "pressed down, shaken together, and running over" which our Father will grant to those who have asked for His blessing.

During the entire time, through which we have worked together there has been perfect harmony among the officers of every department of the Woman's Auxiliary. Beginning with the head, the Bishop, whose unfailing sympathy, counsel and co-operation have given us courage to go forward at every turn, down through the whole list, we have had perfect unanimity of purpose and unfailing courtesy. It is worth a great deal to have worked side by side with such choice spirits. Their loyalty to all that is best and highest in our common ambition, has led us through many vicissitudes to this point of vantage, whence we look out over the field, which is the world and realize that only by the three-fold aim of prayer, study, and the giving of ourselves, can one worthily represent the purpose of the Woman's Auxiliary.

My heart-felt thanks go out to the Bishop, for having given me the privilege of adding my "bit," however, small it may be to the general work.

I cannot mention by name, all who have helped me, where all have been most kind and considerate, but I must make an exception in behalf of your beloved Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Seelye, whose fidelity and accuracy have made possible any measure of success that may have been ours.

A report of the Junior work was given by Mrs. Beckwith, who expressed great satisfaction with what had been accomplished during the year. #### JUNIOR EDUCATIONAL REPORT.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary of Alabama, for year ending May, 1917:

##### Mission Study.

The Juniors studied "The New World."

Trinity Church, Demopolis; Mrs. Warren George.

Juniors met in Parish-house during Lent and studied Nanana. Mrs. George told the stories, and had cut out pictures illustrating some of them.

Loxley; Miss Bertha Henry.

Eighteen Juniors met every Sunday before Sunday School, and made the Ten Commandment Booklets. On each leaf they wrote a commandment, and on the reverse side they wrote the name and emblem of each society that kept that commandment; they also illustrated the last six lessons of "Twelve Men Who weren't Afraid," by Adelaide Case. In Sunday School, the older Juniors studied "Missionary Heroes of the Early Church."

They are now making the Church Year Booklets, using the Trinity Course, with questions prepared by Mrs. Beckwith. They write the teachings of the Church Year between the radii of a circle. They also read the Gospel and Epistle, and try to learn the Collect each week.

Branches of the Auxiliary who have reported Mission Study Classes are as follows:

1. St. Mary's, Birmingham; Mrs. W. L. Welton, leader. At monthly meeting Study of Missionary Calendar and Spirit of Missions. Review of "The New World," by Dr. A. R. Gray, given by chapters by members. Lenten Class weekly. Subject: Prayer. "The Meaning of Prayer," by Fosdick, used as text-book. All members took part in these meetings. Increase in interest was noticeable in discussions and study.

2. Eugenia Lyons Memorial Branch, Trinity, Demopolis; Miss Kate M. Harrison, leader. Reading Circle with the text-book: "The New World." Lenten study class on: "How the Church came to this Country." Small but interested class.

3. St. Mary's, Evergreen; Mrs. J. H. Dey, leader. Subject: "Why and How of Foreign Missions."

4. Trinity, Florence; Mrs. R. M. Martin, leader. Subject: "The New World."

5. St. Thomas, Greenville; Mrs. G. H. Tatum, leader. The text-book: "The New World," was found interesting.

6. The Nativity, Huntsville. A small but earnest study class on: "The New World," and the Spirit of Missions. Mrs. D. I. White, leader.

7. All Saints, Mobile; Mrs. Marie Quarles, educational leader. At the monthly business meetings the Book of Acts was studied with interesting papers on the lives of the Apostles, followed by readings from the Spirit of Missions. A study class met weekly from January to June. "The New World," was used as text-book. These meetings were opened with prayer and the recitation of the Beatitudes.

The little play, "The Feast of Lights," was given at Epiphany by the Auxiliary for the Sunday School and the congregation. This stimulated interest in the Auxiliary.

8. Christ Church, Mobile; Mrs. Carrie I. Kimball, leader. Class numbers fifteen. Subject during Lent: "The New World," com-

bined with the stud yof "Prayer," and its uses and purposes. Attendance increased to those outside the class and left an aftermath of spiritual uplift.

9. Emma Jones Branch, Christ Church, Mobile; Miss Mabel E. Dawson, leader. Subject: Latin America.

10. Trinity, Mobile; Mrs. C. J. Orton, leader. Lenten class of ten. Weekly meetings. The Latin America text-book of the prescribed course was enjoyed. The Spirit of Missions was used for programs at the monthly meetings.

11. Church of the Ascension, Montgomery. Lectures on "The New World" and our Mission Work in Latin American Countries were given by the Rector each week for the Auxiliary.

12. St. John's, Montgomery. Advent class, Mrs. E. E. Cobbs, leader. Subject: Prayer. "The Meaning of Prayer," by Fosdick was used as text-book. This course was found very helpful by the class of eight members. Lenten class, Mrs. Frank Stollenwerck, leader. "The New World" was studied and discussed and interest sustained throughout the course of eight meetings. During Lent the Rector gave weekly lectures at the Monday afternoon church service with the subject matter of "The New World as basis.

13. Church of the Holy Comforter, Montgomery. Mrs. J. B. Jones, leader. A study class was held weekly during Lent, with good attendance. The New World, by Dr. A. R. Gray, was the subject for informal lectures and discussion by the whole class. Emphasis was placed at every meeting on the advisability of class members carrying the message to others who were unable to attend. At every meeting during the year, the Auxiliary has some topic discussed from the Spirit of Missions or other Missionary publication.

15. Woodward. No auxiliary. Study class of three church women. Mrs. D. E. Wilson, leader. Subject: Prayer. "The Meaning of Prayer," by Fosdick, and "Why Men Pray," by Slattey were used as text-books. Mission study has been held in fourteen Branches. More than one class has been held in several Branches. More letters have been received and more written in this Department than heretofore. In a number of Branches Mission study is taking its place with gifts and prayers as the regular work of the Auxiliary—May the number increase and the aim of all classes be to kindle and strengthen the Christian faith and to know the living Christ.

Attention is called to the "Manual for Librarians," published during the last year. Every librarian would find a copy instructive and helpful in getting the best results from her work.

I wish to tell you of a feature in the work of the C. P. C. in which we may all have a part. In the current number of "The Spirit of Missions," an article headed: "Isolated County Women," speaks of the large number of women and girls belonging to the church—just one alone in a community. Miss Thomas, our Educational Secretary, says that there are seven thousand such persons to whom the C. P. C. might make some contribution. She writes: "This has been a part of our work for many years; to come in touch with such women. We have a number of names on our files and I shall very gladly place such names at the disposal of any diocesan president and shall be glad to receive additional names obtained by the Auxiliary." The correspondent trusts that this opportunity may seem practical for co-operation, and she will be glad to furnish addresses of such women to whom you may write a friendly letter or send a Christmas or Easter Card and cheer and encourage these lone women. The story is told of a woman, who, though living in a little cabin off in the hills, with none of the comforts of life, on being asked how she bore the loneliness said: "I am not alone, and do not feel lonely," adding as she pointed at a picture of our Lord: "He is ever with me." This picture has been sent her through the Church Periodical Club. Another woman, to whom a magazine was sent regularly, could not, on account of her many cares read it very often, yet, the "knowledge that someone cared for her and was thinking of her kept her from giving up in despair." I am sure we shall all wish to send our "words of cheer" and do our part in this work.

Montgomery, Ala., May 1st, 1917.

Mrs. Bryce nominated the incoming President and Miss Anna Lee Fitts, of Tuscaloosa, as delegates to the next meeting of the Fourth Province—this was voted upon and carried. Reports from

several Branches were read, all showing good work accomplished this past year.

The Nominating Committee presented the name of Mrs. Charles Henderson, which was accepted unanimously. Mrs. Henderson expressed her appreciation of the unanimity of feeling, and the responsibility attached to the office of President, and pledged her best efforts to the advancement of the Auxiliary interests.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the retiring President, for her untiring efforts during her administration, which have been crowned with such encouraging results.

The meeting then adjourned.

Wednesday morning the session was opened in the Sunday School room of St. Mary's, at 10 o'clock, with a brief service. Mrs. McMillan told about the Parish School at St. Michael and all Angels, Anniston, the fine results that have been accomplished by Sister Amelia, a United Offering worker—she visits the sick, attends the clinics, has four doctors who give an hour each week for this work, and has been enabled to improve health conditions considerably. **CONSTITUTION**

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.
2. Its object is to unite all the parishes and mission stations in the Diocese in all branches of mission work and by systematic and united effort to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.
3. All parishes and mission stations that so desire may become branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.
4. The officers shall be a President, appointed by the Bishop for a term of four years; a First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Junior Branch and Secretary of the Little Helpers appointed by the President.
5. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting and to have a general knowledge of the work in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.
6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, keep an account of the work done as reported by the Parish Secretaries, and report this annually to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.  
The Secretary shall also send notices of all meetings and keep a record of the same.
7. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys sent to her by any Branch for missionary work and for the expenses of the Auxiliary, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.
8. The annual meeting shall be held at the time of the Diocesan Council, or such other time as the Bishop shall suggest, for the purpose of hearing the reports of the Diocesan and Parish Secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and transacting all other business that may come before it.
9. Each Parish Branch shall make an annual pledge according to its ability for the current expenses and work of the Diocesan Branch.
10. At the annual meeting each Branch represented shall be entitled to but one vote in business of general import.
11. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.
12. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of same to be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
