

Minutes

At historic St. Paul's, Selma, at 2:30 o'clock, October 26, 1926, the 37th Annual Convention of the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was called to order by the President. The Parish house is verily a part of the early history of our State, most of the bricks of which it is built having been brought from Cahaba, the early capitol of Alabama.

Bishop McDowell's opening prayer was followed by an address of welcome from Rev. E. E. Gamble, Rector of St. Paul's Parish. Mrs. Katherine Hopkins Chapman, after a happy introduction, voiced in rare style the welcome of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's Parish. Sixty-seven delegates responded to roll call. Mrs. Carroll Long, Chairman of Committee on the Message, led the convention in reporting serially on the causes to which we are dedicated and committed, and in repeating in unison the dedicatory clause of the Message.

The following committees were appointed by the President.

Mrs. Wilson announced that response to questionnaires requested that our yearly conventions be made less routine and more inspirational, therefore, officers were

asked to limit their reports to the outstanding facts of the year's work. Mrs. Wilson did not present the year's work in the usual form of an annual address, but again urged the continuance of the ever deepening bond of love, fellowship and consecration, so that more and more the years will bring an increase in our service to God.

Miss Grace Lindley, General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was presented here to the Convention. It was a privilege and an honor to have Miss Lindley present throughout the meetings. She expressed her pleasure in being present and brought greetings from the Auxiliary women of the Province of the South West, whose meeting she recently attended.

Our former Presidents, Mrs. Susan McMillian and Mrs. Chas. Henderson as they were called, graciously received the tribute of love which this body always holds for them. Mrs. Adkins, President of our hostess branch, was called and in well chosen remarks expressed her welcome.

The new chairman of the Birmingham Convocation, Mrs. H. A. Davies, was introduced by the President, and regret was expressed at the unavoidable absence of several officers.

Miss Maud Kimball, Educational Secretary, gave a fine one minute report, and Mrs. J. D. Kirkpatrick, Supply Secretary, said that in spite of warnings that work of her department must not overshadow all other activities, her books show an increase of \$400.00 over last year.

Miss Bessie Bouchelle, Treasurer for the House of Happiness, has received over \$1300.00 during the year from forty-three branches, which has enabled her to send regularly \$100.00 a month to Miss Martin. Mrs. Brevard Jones, Editor of our Woman's Page in the Alabama Churchman, reported there was no dearth of material.

Hymn 564, "Go Labor On," was followed by the President calling Mrs. Brevard Jones, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, to take the Chair. A motion that resolutions be presented today and action thereon defer-

red until tomorrow carried. It was unanimously decided that the Corporate Communion offering be used as a nucleus for the purchase of a lot on which to put a rectory in Montevallo, and that the offerings at night be used to supplement the small contingent fee of the Auxiliary.

After announcements the meeting adjourned and delegates repaired to the Church, where at 4:30 a Memorial Service was held in honor of beloved Annalee Fitts, Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, and other women of the Auxiliary who have been called during the year to the Great Beyond.

The impressive service was appropriately arranged and led by Mrs. John Furniss of Selma. Heartfelt tribute was paid to Miss Anna Lee Fitts by Mrs. Charles Henderson. Mrs. Joseph Paulovitch and Mrs. Catesby Jones of Selma were honored by fellow workers of their parish. The Memorial roll was read by Mrs. Furniss and prayers offered by Rev. E. E. Gamble.

At 7:30 o'clock in St. Paul's Church, the cantata, "A Woman of Sychar" was beautifully presented by voices of which any city might be proud. After this followed the address of Miss Grace Lindley, the high inspirational point of the day.

Wednesday morning at 9:30 in St. Paul's Church the Corporate Communion was celebrated by Rt. Rev. W. G. McDowell, assisted by Rev. E. E. Gamble. The subject of The Bishop's sermon on "The Crusade" was a strong indictment of our present accomplishments and a call to repentance and self-denial and preparation for the crusade.

Immediately following this service our President called the meeting to order in the Parish House and after the reading of the minutes of the previous day and their acceptance, Miss Augusta Martin, of the House of Happiness spoke. We find as the years go on and Miss Martin does more and more, there is a greater appeal and response; that a truly great piece of work is being accomplished, and our women, particularly our young

branches, are fostering this House of Happiness as their very own. Miss Martin's financial report for the year showed her total receipts were \$1706.08; disbursements \$1658.29; balance in bank \$47.79. Mrs. Carl Lay moved that \$250.00 of the balance reported by Miss Bouchelle, Treasurer of the House of Happiness, should be given Miss Martin for immediate needs, and this motion carried. Mrs. Albert Wilson moved that a Thanksgiving Shower be given Miss Martin to supply her listed household needs. The motion was carried and Miss Bessie Bouchelle asked to see that each parish and mission branch is given opportunity to share in this. Mrs. Charles Henderson moved that a word of appreciation and regret at their absence be sent by the Secretary to Watkins Vaughan of Selma and Miss Annie Hobdy, U. T. O. Cusodian. The motion prevailed.

The President announced that unless otherwise requested, the Spring conference as voted on last year, will be held in Mid-Lent. Mrs. Long announced the various rooms in which the five convocational conferences would be held following the noonday prayer. Rev. Joseph Harvey led the noonday prayer, after which the meeting divided into its various conferences.

After a most delicious luncheon served in the beautiful Parish House, the President called the meeting to order at 1:30 P. M.

The report of Miss Annie L. Hobdy, U. T. O. Cusodian, read by the Secretary, showed a grand total of receipts for the year of \$5452.13. A letter from Miss Hob-

dy was read by Mrs. Wilson and banners for this year awarded to the following branches:

Parish branch, Boligee, per capita gift to U. T. O., \$32.60.

Mission Branch, Tuscumbia, per capita gift to U. T. O., \$16.47.

Unorganized Mission, Blocton, per capita gift to U. T. O. \$13.69.

Mrs. T. O. Melton, who had carefully tabulated all branch reports, showed a decided increase over previous years in branches, membership and gifts to all causes.

Our President then gave a comprehensive comparative statement of our present reports with those of three years ago, at which time resolution was passed encouraging work in all five fields of service. Besides an increase in the spirit of love and unity and consecration which cannot be reduced to figures, the statement shows branches have increased from 63 to 71, and total members from 1237 to 1753. There has been no decrease to causes distinctly Missionary and the per capita gift to all fields this year is \$16.37.

Mrs. Charles Henderson offered the following amendments to the Constitution, proposed in Montgomery, and ready for passage accordingly.

For Article 2: Substitute: "Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely: Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work." This amendment was adopted.

Amend Article 4: To read "Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Honorary Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian United Thank Offering; Educational Secretary; Secretary Supply Department, Custodian Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund; Church Home Correspondent; Correspondent

Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness; Editor Woman's Auxiliary Page of the "Alabama Churchman."

This amendment carried.

Amend Article 5 to read: "The President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Educational Secretary shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be eligible to re-election for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers."

This amendment carried.

Amendment to Article 6: By inserting the words "and appoint chairmen of standing committees" "and have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese." This also received an affirmative vote.

Insert a new article to read: "A nominating committee of three to five persons shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting, to be voted on by the Convention." This motion was adopted.

Mrs. Carey Gamble in the name of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of the Nativity, Huntsville, asked that the Convention be held in their parish in 1927. On the motion of Mrs. Charles Henderson, with consent of Mrs. Carl Lay, Chairman on Place of Meeting, the rules were suspended and this invitation was unanimously accepted.

Mrs. Wilson expressed the sentiment of the meeting when she said she wanted our hostesses to know how wonderfully happy we are and appreciative of their careful preparation for the meeting and many courtesies.

The Rev. Robert A. Goodwin addressed the Convention on "The Wilmer Training School for Women Workers in the Church." His admonition of "Put First Things First,

or I am Afraid You Will Lose the Blessing," and his earnest appeal that we lift up our eyes and look, emphasize the spiritual and give God our best, presented in new light the task before us.

The following resolution was presented by Mrs. Albert Wilson, Chairman of the Montgomery Convocation:

The Montgomery Convocation begs leave to offer the following resolution: That whereas, by reason of our tender love and esteem for the late Annalee Fitts, of Tuscaloosa, whose untimely taking away brought much sorrow to this body: Be it resolved that a Library be established at the Bishop Wilmer Training School in Mobile as a perpetual memorial to her life and to her faithful service as Custodian of the Church Periodical Club of the Diocese of Alabama.

The resolution was adopted.

In carrying out this resolution, a motion that a committee be appointed by the President to consult with Mr. Goodwin and Bishop McDowell as to ways and means was approved by an aye vote.

Mrs. H. C. DeBardeleben, Chairman of League of the Isolated, gave an interesting report of her work. She showed 187 members now enrolled and \$160.74 contributed during the year through the League.

Mrs. Brevard Jones, Chairman of Committee on Resolutions, submitted the following resolution, which had been presented at the meeting Tuesday:

"Whereas the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund was started to honor Bishop Wilmer and to provide a Scholarship at a Church school, particularly for the poorly paid missionary clergy of Alabama; and Whereas, the status of the missionary clergy and of the church schools has changed in part since the establishment of this scholarship fund; and, Whereas, the Diocese has now established a training school for

church women named for Bishop Wilmer, and carrying out one of his cherished ideas; therefore;

RESOLVED, that the income from the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund be assigned as a scholarship at the Wilmer Training School, and that as originally contemplated, the daughters of the mission clergy of Alabama shall have the first call on this scholarship.

RESOLVED, that the income alone shall be used for this scholarship, and the principal shall continue as heretofore, in the custody of the Woman's Auxiliary.

RESOLVED, that the Rector of the school shall nominate the beneficiary to the President of the Woman's Auxiliary, who, with the Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, and the Educational Secretary of the diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, shall pass upon the nomination.

RESOLVED, that the amount of the scholarship shall not exceed that of the annual interest from the fund, and in case the above named committee considers that circumstances do not demand that the full amount of the interest be given for the scholarship, the balance of the income to be added to the principal.

RESOLVED, that this fund be kept before the people that contributions may be made to the principal by those so desiring, and that this reminder be incorporated in the annual program.

The resolution was adopted, and Mrs. Macmillan who more than anyone has held this special fund as a labor of love, made a short talk commending the action of the convention in this most important decision.

Reports of Convocations were called for. Mrs. Lide, Chairman of Selma Convocation, after outlining general features of work, called Mrs. Clobeck, of the Mary E. Avery Branch, Greensboro, to give her banner report of this Convocation.

Miss Kimball, Chairman of Mobile Convocation, after giving a summary, asked Mrs. St. John Wilson of Trinity, Mobile, to give the banner parish report. Mrs. Whitford, of St. Paul's, Spring Hill, gave a splendid resume of the work done in her branch.

Mrs. Albert Wilson, Chairman of the Montgomery Convocation, asked delegates from the two Mission Stations to give the banner report for her district,—Mrs. McCreary of St. Mary's, Evergreen and Mrs. Howard, sister of Rev. Kenneth Morris, from Church of the Advent, Tuskegee.

Mrs. H. A. Davies, Chairman of the Birmingham Convocation, announced that the Spring meeting will be held at St. John's, Ensley. The delegates called to give the reports for this Convocation were: Miss Standifer of the Jenny Goldman Branch Church of the Holy Comforter, Gadsden and Mrs. Allen of the Mission of our Saviour, West Blocton.

Mrs. Carey Gamble, acting in place of Mrs. C. E. Jordan, Chairman of the Huntsville Convocation, announced that the Spring meeting would be held in Scottsboro, a box lunch to be carried by each one attending, and the entire group would go out to the House of Happiness for a picnic following the meeting.

Mrs. Charles Henderson announced that a gift of \$1,000.00 for the Annalee Fitts Memorial Library at the Wilmer Training School, Mobile, had been given by Miss Fitts' aunt, Mrs. S. F. Alston. The President announced that the corporate communion offering for the purchase of a lot at Montevallo was \$77.52.

Mrs. Hardeman Meade, Program Chairman, presented the splendid comprehensive program for the coming year and distributed copies to members of the convention.

Miss Lindley explained the Corporate Gift as the forward work of the Woman's Auxiliary, spoke of the stations which would receive benefit from this gift, and said that so sure were the members of the Executive Board that all pledges would be met, that construction of sev-

eral of the promised buildings had already been begun.

Mrs. Albert Wilson, Chairman of Committee on Gift of Life, announced that the prayer that laborers be sent forth into the harvest had been answered in this Diocese, and that Miss Macey, a graduate nurse, had volunteered for life service. Miss Macey was then presented to the convention.

At 7:30 o'clock in the evening a mass meeting was held in St. Paul's Church, at which Rev. Floyd W. Tompkins, Jr., Executive Secretary of the Episcopal Commission on Faith and Order spoke on "The Next Step Toward Christian Unity," and Rev. Charles Clingman, Associate Secretary of the Field Department, ably presented the question "Is the Responsibility Yours?"

Thursday morning the convention was called to order in St. Paul's Church, Carlowville, at ten o'clock. Our President, in opening the meeting, reminded us that we stood on holy ground, in one of the outstanding rural parishes, not only of the diocese, but of the South.

Mrs. Youngblood of Carlowville, in her gracious welcome said that to have the Auxiliary to meet with them was the realization of a dream of years and to the mother branch of St. Paul's, Selma, they were deeply grateful for the privilege.

Mrs. Long, of St. Paul's Selma, responded to the address of welcome and spoke of the interesting history of the parish. The Church was started in 1838 and dedicated in 1844. The organ came from New York via Florida. The exquisite vases, chairs and other heirlooms which have been lovingly placed in God's house for His service show that the church has been a living force.

After the reading of the minutes, their correction and approval, the credentials committee reported present two national officers, ten state officers, sevny delegates and eighty-six visitors, forty-three branches being represented.

The President announced that the amount to be added

to the contingent fund of the Auxiliary from the offering the night before was \$38.01.

Mrs. Brevard Jones, Chairman of the Credential Committee, presented the following resolutions, each of which carried.

RESOLVED: That delegates to the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province be instructed by this body to pledge Alabama's proportionate share of the cost of a simple addition to the Hodgson Memorial Hospital at Sewanee, should the Province decide to sponsor that work.

RESOLVED: That the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary send a delegate each year to the Sewanee Summer Training School and provide means therefor, the President of the Diocesan Branch to make the appointment.

WHEREAS: The Woman's Auxiliary of Alabama pledged itself for \$800.00 a year for the salary of Rev. Kenneth Morris, Alabama Missionary to Japan, and have this year sent \$1,018.00 for that cause;

Be it Resolved: That in the future the Auxiliary assume the responsibility of the entire salary of Mr. Morris, should it not be greatly increased.

On motion of Mrs. W. F. Fitts, greetings and regret at his absence were ordered sent to Bishop Beckwith. Mrs. Beckwith brought greetings from the Bishop with the wish that it would be the best meeting yet held.

A letter from Mrs. Irwin, requesting that a representative for the Spirit of Missions be appointed in each branch, was read and delegates were asked to see to this matter.

Mrs. T. O. Melton spoke on the Summer Conference at Sewanee, the inspiration and practical help to be obtained, and urged each branch to see that at least one member is sent next year.

Mary Pesant spoke on "The Church and the Colored Woman," and the clear cut thought and the definite program as outlined by her and her appeal that more of her

race be sent to summer conferences showed that she had caught the spirit of the fine work at Carlowville.

Mrs. Macey, United Thank Offering worker at Bon Secour, gave an account of her work. Two persons have given themselves for the work of the Church from this mission: Mr. Witt, who is being trained at DuBose School, and Miss Macey, who has offered as a missionary nurse.

Mrs. Jolly, Church Home Correspondent, and Mrs. Whitford, mother of the Home, were introduced, but for lack of time could not speak, which was also true in the cases of Miss Maude Kimball, Educational Secretary, and Mrs. Charles Henderson.

Mrs. Tayloe, Chairman of Committee on Courtesy, thanked our hostesses both at Selma and Carlowville for the sweet spirit of hospitality which had been manifest throughout the meeting.

The guest of honor, Miss Grace Lindley, Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, conducted meditations on the Message, and gave wonderfully spiritual and practical suggestions as to organization of the Bishop's Crusade. So at the close, as well as at the beginning, was sounded the clarion call of sacrificial service to our Lord.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Year Ending October, 1926.

In loyal effort to serve the Master with head as well as heart and hand, comes the report of the work done in the study classes of the Auxiliary.

Reports have been received from about 50% of the branches, which by the way of usual averages is considered good.

The classes averaged from 27 to 6. As far as numbers count, it still seems that the little leaven must leaven the whole.

The texts used this year show a wider scope than last year, including "That Freedom," "The New World," "New Days in Latin America," "Looking Ahead With Latin America," "Evangelism in the Church," "Christian Stewardship," "The Prayer Book, Reason Why," "World and I," "Search For Peace," "The Church's Program," and pamphlets on Liberia, Cuba, Hayti, Panama, "The Spirit of Missions," and a course on the Bible.

As usual most branches studied in Lent, 22 reporting Lenten work, 9 Advent Work, and 7 all year work but these numbers for Lent dovetail in many cases with one or both of the other seasons. For example, West Blocton reports using "World and I," "Stewardship," and "That Freedom." Boligee, "That Freedom," "Evangelism in the Church," and other books during the month of work on the Church's Program, and Gadsden used "The Church's Program," part of "The Search for Peace, and "That Freedom."

A well rounded course is shown by these, and 9 branches report using two books indicating that the work is forging ahead.

The leadership was about equally divided between one leader for the course and several leaders and one branch reports having special speakers from outside as a means of stimulating interest.

A word as to Method. Several Branches found that Program meetings interspersed with Discussions groups increased the interest and developed courage in class members so building toward leadership. Bon Secour branch says, "Those called upon to write or speak met the new experience in a most inspiring fashion."

Boligee branch says: "We find more interest since each member has been assigned a definite part for her paper or for which she is responsible." Perhaps our leaders may obtain some help on method from these reports as two or three other branches voice similar statements.

News from the field under "Special Interest Developed." "We learned a great deal about the Church that we did not know or understand."

"Our people seem to have a growing zeal for the work, especially with the youth. The young people are showing 50% more interest." (St. Mark's Mission, Birmingham.)

"Never read so much Bible in so short a time."

"Brought us into closer touch than ever with the Church's work."

"Interest has increased. Every member pledged herself to bring a new member into the work." (Church of the Good Shepherd, Montgomery.)

On looking back over the year's results as taken from the reports they are discouraging in that fewer cared to report this year than last year. Does that mean a backward trend, or the need of new leadership? On the brighter side and encouraging is the knowledge that this year more branches were doing study throughout the months covered by the program. Better still, and meaning much more are the indications of greater desire for, and belief in the use of Prayer as an aid to all knowledge.

Twenty-eight are now provided for in this way. We are still corresponding with a few branches and Mrs. Dalton Whitford, Box 180, Route 1, Crichton, Ala., or Mrs. Ida H. Jolly, 1212 Government Street, Mobile, will be glad to hear from others. This plan was tried some years ago and was given up because the difference in clothing was so great as to cause dissatisfaction. We now are guarding against this difficulty.

Our work this year more than doubled last year's. The total gifts were: Diocese \$50.00; Nation \$20.00; World (U. T. O. \$47.38) \$90.24; Total \$160.74.

THE HOUSE OF HAPPINESS

Extract from Report to the Annual Meeting

The year from Nov. 1, 1925 to Oct. 1, 1926, was an educational one. The workers taught the public school of the district a one teacher school, for six months. The public school money paid the salary of Miss Nettie C. Barnwell, the efficient assistant, while the extra teacher's services were given. There was an unusually large enrollment of eighty-one pupils. Although the two teachers conducted their classes in the one room simultaneously, necessarily creating confusion, the children made remarkable progress.

A Health Crusade was conducted in a limited way. Each child was supplied with a tooth brush through the kindness of the Business Girls' Guild of the Church of the Advent.

As a result of a talk made before the girls at the Woman's College at Montevallo, on invitation given through Mr. Algernon Blair, four of the graduating class offered their services for a month each, defraying all of their own expenses, beginning with the month of June, during the absence of Miss Barnwell, who had to find other employment during the summer.

Miss Helen Townsend of Russellville, a member of the Baptist Church, was the first to enter upon her duties. Miss Lillian Prout of Demopolis came in July, and Misses Hattie Lyman of Montevallo and Florence Smith of Demopolis during the latter part of the summer. They were all most helpful.

Through the State Department of Exceptional Education, Jackson County was given a six weeks' term of Opportunity Schools. Due to the effort of your humble servant in securing these schools she was appointed organizer and supervisor. Eight schools enrolling two hundred sixteen pupils above the age of sixteen were organized. One was secured for Happy Hollow and was taught by Miss Alice Fogelman of Montgomery. She also directed a Community Sing once a week. Primary and grammar grades were taught by our Montevallo girls, thus giving all of the community an opportunity to attend school during the six weeks' term.

A Service League was organized to help supply the needs of one of our tubercular clients. Membership dues were one egg each, payable at the meetings.

A payment on a new Ford car was made with the salary paid for organizing the Opportunity Schools, leaving a balance of \$122.00.

Bishop McDowell made his official visit to the House of Happiness on June 30th; an open air service was held. The congregation of about one hundred men, women and children was seated in

front of the shack in the folding chairs presented by St. John's Church, Montgomery and the kindergarten chairs sent by the Church of the Advent.

During the year approximately one thousand one hundred forty-seven garments were given in exchange for farm products and service rendered, eight hundred donated in emergency relief cases and three hundred eighty-four in layettes.

The total receipts for the year were one thousand seven hundred six dollars and eight cents, and total expenditures, including the purchase of a double-team farm wagon, kitchen cabinet, about two dozen tools such as saws, rock hammers, wedges, etc., lumber for chicken yard and fencing for same, besides the maintenance of the family averaging nine throughout the year, and many extra meals for transients and laborers, was one thousand six hundred fifty-eight dollars and twenty-nine cents,—leaving a balance in the Scottsboro bank of forty-seven dollars and seventy-nine cents. The average expenditure per capita for living expenses, not including laundry, was eighty dollars and twenty-five cents per year or six dollars and sixty-eight cents per month.

Three of the children who have passed through the House of Happiness this year were sent to the Baptist Orphanage, two were placed with the State Child Welfare Department, one boy has been returned to his home. Three young children are living with a married sister, their expenses for clothes and tuition are being paid by the House of Happiness and they are under our supervision. Our boy at the Alabama School of Trades and Industries is doing well. Our oldest daughter has been placed in St. Katherine's School, Bolivar, Tenn., for the year. Her expenses are being defrayed with money sent by the Young People's Service League of Alabama, some of their gifts having been devoted to that purpose from year to year. Another girl has been placed in a private home in Carlowville for the winter. This now leaves us a family of five, three boys and the two workers.

The total amount received each month by regular subscription is \$93.94.

Monthly pledges amounting to One Hundred Dollars has been our goal. While this amount has not been reached, we have been able to send Miss Martin a check for One Hundred Dollars each month due to the fact that donations and special gifts have made up the deficit. The increase in the number of regular subscribers to this fund, and the real interest that each branch takes in the work proves what a large place the House of Happiness has won in the hearts of our women.

Of the receipts this year, \$230.00 was contributed by individuals and organizations not connected with the Auxiliary. The funds received and disbursed since October 31st, 1925, are as follows:

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF MONTGOMERY CONVOCATION
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, OCT. 1925-OCT. 1926

The Montgomery Convocation of the Woman's Auxiliary comprises twenty-three counties in Middle and Southeastern Alabama. It is a rural and agricultural district, in some parts of which twenty years ago the railroads had just penetrated, and to all of which the good roads have not yet been extended. In eight of these counties, our church has not yet begun to work. We have four Parishes, twelve organized and ten unorganized Missions—

twenty-six stations in all. There is one Bishop and five resident Clergymen.

The Woman's Auxiliary has twenty branches or some form of Auxiliary work in twenty places in the Convocation. Five of these compose the Lowndes County Unit, of which we are justly proud as their good report will show a great increase in results. Among other things their interest has so increased that from now on they will conduct all day monthly meetings in the place of the usual afternoon assembly. Your chairman and other church women from Montgomery were the guests of this branch in Lowndesboro at the May meeting and can attest to their enthusiastic and loving work in all departments of the Women's Auxiliary.

One new branch has been organized this year. St. Simon's and St. Jude's, Mountain Creek, Mrs. W. R. Taber, Secretary and Treasurer. This is a god-child of the Church of the Ascension, Montgomery. While still in a struggling infancy, they purpose to do community and mission work in their part of Chilton County.

The chief activity of the Convocation for the year was the Spring Conference on April 20th. St. Mark's Troy, was the gracious hostess. Fifty-one members representing ten branches and six visitors, some from outside the Diocese, attended this meeting. At the corporate communion the Rev. Mr. E. M. Parkman was celebrant and the offering of \$14.25 was given to the United Thank Offering. The Rev. Mr. Parkman who has so kindly officiated at former conferences was elected by the delegates to be permanent chaplain for this Convocation.

The key-note of the morning's program was Intercessory Prayer with inspirational talks on Prayer and Missions. Time was given for full reports of all branch work and a discussion of all Auxiliary objects and purposes. In the afternoon, under the leadership of Mrs. Charles Henderson, an impressive program on Church Unity was given with talks on love, co-operation and fellowship in which women from all denominations in Troy took part on the program. It was a very satisfactory meeting.

Your chairman has not visited each of these branches as is her assigned duty, but has written to each one twice during the year — a total of 50 letters.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF THE SELMA CONVOCATION
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

As Chairman of the Selma Convocation, my work for the year has consisted chiefly of letter writing. Since it was impossible to visit all eighteen of the branches, I tried to keep in touch through the mail. Each branch was written to a number of times throughout the year in an effort to heighten interest in the study classes, in following the program and in the Spring Convocational meeting. After the Boligee meeting, all branches not represented were sent a full account of the meeting and of the business transacted there, so that these could contribute to the work also.

The problems handled at our convocational meeting were as follows: "The Study Class: How to Get Discussions in the Discussion Group;" "Making Use of the Church Literature Furnished Us;" "Work Among the Negroes;" Combining Guilds and Auxiliaries." It was recommended that all our branches study the book, "Prayer and Missions," by Helen Barrett Montgomery. At the meeting, money was pledged to Mr. Witt, to Mrs. Macy's work and to the Advance Work. Also it was pledged to remember our missionaries in our prayers.

During this month and last month, I have been steadily writing letters to all branches and to a number of isolated women, urging full representation at the annual meeting, so that its inspiration may be carried all over the state.

I have found that the Woman's Auxiliary work in our Unorganized Missions is as follows:

Burnsville—All Episcopalian have moved away except one man.

Orrville—This branch which consisted of three members has combined with the Selma branch.

Newbern—This branch, which was small, has combined with the Greensboro branch.

Berlin—This small group contributes to Auxiliary causes through the Carlowville Branch.

Last year a combination Guild-Auxiliary was organized at Marion. In spite of small numbers this branch is continuing to function and sent a nice report to the Boligee Conference.

CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.
2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely: Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.
3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.
4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Honorary Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary Supply Department, Custodian Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Church Home Correspondent, Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.
5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Educational Secretary shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years, and shall be eligible to re-election for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.
6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees. She shall appoint a Chairman for each Convocation of the Diocese whose duty it shall be to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board.
7. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, write the Minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the Annual Reports for the printer.
8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys sent to her by Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meetings.
9. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

10. A Nominating Committee of three to five persons shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting, to be voted on by the Convention.

11. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

12. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

13. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

14. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

15. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
