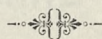

Minutes

At 7:45 P. M., October 18, 1927, in the Church of the Nativity, in Huntsville, Alabama, the 39th annual meeting of the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council departed from the usual order, in opening with evening service, instead of the heretofore formal call-to-order by our President in a business session.

The always impressive and solemn reading of Memorial Roll, followed the wonderful sermon of Bishop McDowell on our responsibility in refusing a Call to Service and the high spiritual keynote in preparation for the work to be accomplished.

At 9:30 o'clock, Wednesday morning, the Holy Communion was administered by Rev. Carey Gamble, assisted by Rev. R. A. Kirchhoffer and Archdeacon V. G. Lowery. The sermon during this service was delivered by Rev. R. A. Kirchhoffer, and again, personal agency and personal responsibility in the furtherance of God's Kingdom was brought forcefully to each one.

At eleven o'clock, our President, Mrs. D. E. Wilson, opened the business session with prayer of thanks to God who has blessed us so bountifully.

Rev. Carey Gamble, Rector of the Church of the Nativity, gave a hearty word of greeting from the parish. Mrs. M. Duncan on behalf of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of the Nativity, our hostesses, gave an exquisite gem of speech which breathed the spirit of cordiality, so that we truly felt the wonderful spiritual welcome extended.

Mrs. Wilson with her usual far-sighted vision, had asked the Business Women's Units of the various parishes to send representatives, and Miss Martha Feltus, of the Business Women's Unit of the Church of the Advent, Birmingham,, graciously responded.

The President in her address, which she said was rather a counseling together, among other things expressed appreciation of the help she had received. She spoke of

some of the work she considered had especially gone forward: The co-operation of Bishop and Clergy; the following of a definite program of service; large increase in the United Thank Offering; the status of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund for the training of workers; systematic maintenance for the House of Happiness; the development of our work for the Isolated; the helpfulness of the Auxiliary page of the Alabama Churchman. She spoke of the three ideals of the Auxiliary, PRAYER, STUDY, GIVING, and urged that emphasis be placed on study during the new year.

Mrs. T. O. Melton read and explained the tabulated report of all the work of the branches, which she had so competently compiled, and a copy of which she gave to each delegate.

Mrs. Wilson then appointed the following committees:

Rev. Mr. Kirchhoffer offered noon-day prayer.

Roll call of branches showed 50 delegates, 14 officers and 60 visitors; total, 124.

Mrs. Chas. Henderson then gave a wonderful address on the Follow-up Work of the Bishop's Crusade. The entire body felt the great sincerity of Mrs. Henderson in the message she brought. Her reading of soul searching questions and fearless facing of the situation, made a deep impress on those who were fortunate enough to hear her.

On a motion made by Mrs. Henderson, and seconded by the entire Convention, the Secretary was instructed to send a word of love from the Convention to Miss Annie Hobdy, who was detained at home.

Miss Hobdy's United Thank Offering report was given by Mrs. Legare at Miss Hobdy's request, and it was received with thanks.

Mrs. Wilson then awarded the banners to the branches bearing the highest per capita offering:

Parish—

Boligee, per capita \$38.39, Offering \$438.46.

Organized Mission—

Toulminville, St. Mark's, per capita \$9.65; Offering \$96.45.

Unorganized Mission—

West Blocton, Church of Our Saviour, almost \$14.00 per capita, Offering \$119.00.

In the recent fire in West Blocton, this church of our Saviour gave refuge to those who needed it and so exemplified the spirit of Service.

Mrs. J. D. Kirkpatrick offered the following Resolution, which on being seconded by Mrs. Henderson, was adopted by the Convention:

"RESOLVED, by the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the National Council, That the Executive Board of this organization be, and it hereby is, authorized to appoint an agent or agents to take over custody of the securities and other property constituting the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, upon such terms and conditions as said Executive Board deems best, and that said Executive Board be, and it hereby is, authorized to transfer and deliver over to such agent or agents the property of said Fund as and when such agency is established, subject to the terms and conditions thereof."

Mrs. Wilson in giving the report of Miss McIntyre, Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, said that \$102.00 had been added to the fund this year, and that a student is now at the Wilmer Training School for Church Workers on a scholarship from this fund.

Mrs. Carey Gamble, President of the branch of the Church of the Nativity, presented in the name of her branch, in memory of Mrs. Madge Dox, the founder of the branch of the Church of the Nativity, \$100.00 for the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick moved that a vote of thanks be given the Noble family who started the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund and nurtured it for so many years. This motion prevailed by a rising vote.

After a prayer, adjournment for lunch was taken.

The afternoon session was begun by the singing of Hymn 535, followed by a prayer.

Mrs. J. D. Kirkpatrick, Secretary for the Supply Department, gave her report. After reading the financial statement, she stressed the importance of returning the blue slip, so that proper credit for box could be given.

Miss Bessie Bouchelle, Treasurer for the House of Hapiness, reported that 39 branches had sent an aggregate of \$98 a month for Miss Martin and that the pledge of \$100.00 a month for maintenance had been met. Total receipts were \$1,477.01; Disbursements, \$1,445.00, leaving \$32.01 on hand.

Miss Kimball, Educational Secretary, gave an outline of her work, and spoke of the wonderful possibilities, if we would only inform and prepare ourselves for what we could accomplish.

Miss Upton, our Treasurer, urged us to follow our program in making remittance as in all else.

Mrs. James Mustin, Chairman of the Church Periodical Club, reported that \$158.00 had been given for the Anna-lee Fitts Memorial Fund; that 18 Auxiliaries had paid dues and 18 subscribed to Boone Library.

A letter from Mrs. Howard, Rev. Kenneth Morris' sister, gave an interesting glimpse of his life in Japan.

Miss Emma Twiggs, Diocesan Secretary of Religious Education, spoke on "The Program of Service in the Church Schools." She gave a practical and instructive discussion of the work of the Young People's Service League, and asked that grown-ups lend aid, rather than discouragement when children want to do a definite service.

Mrs. Carey Gamble announced that Miss Catherine Wells, author of the pageant, 'A Song of Sixpence' to be presented at the Convention, is a granddaughter of Dr. and Mrs. Bronillette, for years members of this parish.

The Secretary was instructed to send to Bishop Beck with a message of greeting from the Convention and thankfulness that he is recovering from his serious operation.

Mrs. John Ebaugh, Chairman of Work for the Foreign Born, gave facts and statistics, and showed that even in Alabama we have 52,000 Foreign Born.

Mrs. Wilson, in the absence of Mrs. Hardeman Meade, Program Chairman, and her committee, Mrs. Albert Wilson and Mrs. B. P. Harris, gave the report and distributed the programs.

Mrs. Carl Lay, of Gadsden, spoke of what the program had meant to their branch. Mrs. Oscar de Wolfe Randolph, of St. Mary's, Birmingham, told how the Business Women's Unit of that parish met once a week, and followed the program.

Mrs. Edmondson, of St. John's, Albany, said that in following the program on rural work, they had started a definite rural work in her section.

Mrs. Gamble announced that the Monte Sano Development Company had invited the Convention to drive to Monte Sano immediately after service.

Mrs. Reuf, Chairman of the Huntsville Convocation, gave a report of the meeting at Scottsboro, and visit to the House of Happiness.

Mrs. C. T. Randall, Prayer Partnership Chairman, said each branch was to keep the same prayer partner, and urged those not taking part in this work to get in touch with her, so that she could give them a prayer partner.

After singing four stanzas of Hymn 502, Rev. V. G. Lowery led the Convention in meditation. Adjournment followed the benediction.

At 7:45 Miss Theodore Young, Missionary to China, addressed the meeting. Her picture of a war-torn China, with all the personal touches of individual Chinese friends affected by this unhappy state of affairs, but complete confidence that all would be well, gave a vivid picture of that field.

The pageant, 'A Song of Sixpence,' was well given by the Young People's Service League, and again brought to our consciousness their grasp of work, as shown by

the author of the pageant, the capabilities demonstrated by our young people and their willingness to serve.

The meeting on October 20th, 1927, was opened with prayer and singing Hymn 580. Miss Augusta Martin then gave her report for the House of Happiness. As the Conventon was to make a pilgrimage to visit this splendid undertaking in the afternoon, Miss Martin almost entirely confided herself to the report of finances. She said that Bishop McDowell had requested that at this time the Auxiliary reimburse Miss Martin who had spent her own money in putting up the necessary building and for which the Auxiliary had a special fund in bank.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous day, which, after corrections, were approved.

Miss Anna Meade, Chairman of the Credential Committee, reported that twelve officers, fifty-six delegates and thirty visitors had been in attendance. Many visitors failed to register.

Mrs. Wilson announced that the delegates appointed for the meeting of the Province of Sewanee to be held in Columbus, Ga., are Mrs. Charles Clingman, Mrs. T. O. Melton, Mrs. Algernon Blair and Mrs. D. E. Wilson.

Mrs. Carl Lay introduced a resolution, which carried, that the following members who could not be with us at this meeting, be written letters expressing regret at their absence. Mrs. Atkins of Selma, who is ill; Mrs. Ellen Peter-Bryce of Tuscaloosa, and Mrs. McMillan of Aniston.

Mrs. Charles Henderson introduced the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That this body of women, the thirty-eighth gathering of the Women's Auxiliary in Convention assembled, on October 20, 1927, do hereby wish to offer a tribute of love and appreciation to Mrs. D. E. Wilson, our outgoing President, for all that she has done for us during her six years of office. Mrs. Wilson has served so willingly, so loyally at all times. She has, by her beautiful consecrated life, her untiring interest of all that pertains to this work, by her fairness and gentleness, left an example to those who shall follow, difficult to emulate. The great growth in every depart-

ment of the Woman's Auxiliary attests more plainly than words, the real value she has been during her splendid administration. The Woman's Auxiliary has ever felt its interests safe under the leadership of one so capable, so efficient, so just, and we wish to offer her here, at this time, our very deep appreciation of all that she has done for us, of all that she is.

The Committee on Place of Meeting in making a report said that Mrs. Sterling Lanier would issue the invitation on behalf of her branch. Mrs. Lanier, whose father, Dr. Munro Banister, was for more than forty years rector of the Church of Nativity at Huntsville, our hostess church, invited the Woman's Auxiliary of Alabama to hold the next convention at St. Mary's, Birmingham.

Mrs. James Mustin reported on the Annalee Fitts Memorial Fund. She said that \$163.00 had been received and \$125.00 spent for reference books. Mrs. Charles Henderson was made chairman of the Annalee Fitts Memorial, and Mrs. John Cochran of Mobile and Mrs. James Mustin of Tuscaloosa members of the committee.

Mrs. W. F. Fitts, Chairman of the Hospitality Committee, thanked all who had so graciously entertained us, and those who had in various ways made the meeting a success. She ended by saying, "To the Huntsville people and to the Church of the Nativity, we express our heartfelt thanks."

Mrs. J. D. Kirkpatrick, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the names of officers selected by the committee: Mrs. Albert Wilson, President; Mrs. T. O. Melton, Vice-President; Miss Marie Upton, Treasurer; Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Educational Secretary. These officers were unanimously elected, in the order named.

The Convention was then adjourned.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY DIOCESE
OF ALABAMA

Year Ending October, 1927

An endeavor to spread enthusiasm for the special subject of study this past year was made by three methods. The appeal was made to the branches through the columns of the "Alabama Churchman" by a personal letter to every branch, and by follow up cards. One hundred per cent was hoped for but that goal is still to be obtained.

The number of branches reporting was 36. We know that there are some of the old tried and true not among these. The average number in classes reported was 15 ranging from 6 to 30. Average number of sessions for the diocese 8 ranging all the way from Lent only to work done all through the year. As usual most classes were held in Lent.

The texts studied show a wide range and indicate two things. First the covering of several text books by many, second the fitting of the textbook to local conditions. This last is to be commended as it means a study class doing something against no educational work because "the books are not interesting."

Books used and number of users:

Beyond City Limits 20, The Rural Parish 3, Empty Churches 6, Bible Study 8, Search For Peace 3, Christian Stewardship 1, Evan-

gelism in the Church 8, Prayer Partnership countries 1, Four Minute Sermons 1, World's Call to The Church 6, Prince of Peace 1, What's Worth While 1, The Prayerbook Reason Why 2, Church General Program 6.

The leadership still leans toward several for the course instead of one. Number of new leaders was not obtained.

Most interesting to all as earmarks of development, are the general comments and the re-action to the Lenten Study.

General comments:

Greater interest in Study work. Passed our book to a smaller church.

We have gone out to get new people to attend our services. We are enthusiastic in all our work.

Re-action of various branches to the study of Beyond Limits.

1. We are giving aid in the purchasing of a bus for rural missions.

2. Aid is being given a county welfare worker, a member of our church.

3. When the minister we have called arrives, we are planning to establish a Sunday School in a rural district.

4. Our rector has two rural missions under his charge. We attend some of these missions services. Sometimes we have picnic lunches with the mission whose service we attend. We invite the other missions to join us on our special Auxiliary days. We plan to take our choir to the missions at a near date. The ladies of the choir are all Auxiliary members.

5. Sent a Sunshine box to a rural district.

6. The members of the study class are taking more interest in the Sunday School, are making the class rooms attractive for the younger people, and trying to bring the older people into the Sunday School.

7. A decided interest aroused in rural conditions. Many visits have been paid in the country and much cordiality and interest shown in missions near us.

A review of Beyond City Limits was given by members of the class to the whole Auxiliary and to some Units of the Guide. As a result of this many asked to have the loan of the book and promised to read it.

8. We are taking interest in the Health Unit we hope and expect to establish next year.

With such good seed planted this year as indicated by the above I feel and prayerfully hope, that there will be added interest and steady spiritual growth under a new and enthusiastic leader in this Educational work.

The Marion branch, just organized in 1925, and with a mere half-dozen active members, is forging ahead. It sent its full quota

Mr. Justice Jones of St. Paul's Carlowville, on the Rural Church; also addresses by the Rev. Mr. Heyes of Eufaula and Dr. Richard Wilkinson, St. John's Montgomery. With a meditation on the words of Mary Magdalene "Rabbi Master" at the tomb, the meeting was fittingly closed by Rev. P. N. McDonald of the Church of the Ascension, Mont-

gomery, and also rector in charge of St. Paul's, Lowndesboro.

A delicious barbecue luncheon was served under the trees in the church grounds and at the afternoon session full reports with discussions of branch work were given.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Convocation at the request of the Dean, sent visitors and delegates to the Laymen's and Clergy Convocation in their delightful Spring and Fall meetings in Auburn and Eufaula. The women took assigned parts on these programs and helped in hospitality of these meetings.

CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely: Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.

3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Honorary Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary Supply Department, Custodian Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Church Home Correspondent, Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.

5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Educational Secretary, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years, and shall be eligible to re-election for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees. She shall appoint a chairman for each Convocation of the Diocese whose duty it shall be to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Con-

ference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board.

7. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, write the Minutes of Annual and called meetings and make ready the Annual Reports for the printer.

8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meetings.

9. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

10. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

11. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

12. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

13. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

14. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

15. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
