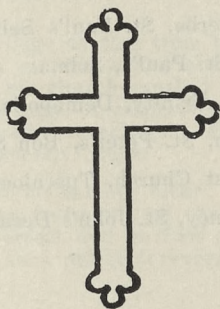

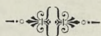

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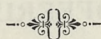

MINUTES OF THE FORTIETH ANNUAL CONVENTION

Birmingham, Wednesday, November 7th, 1928.

St. Mary's Church, Birmingham, being the hostess, delegates and visitors assembled November 7th, 1928, for the Fortieth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama. The Executive Board met at half past two for a conference. Following this a charming afternoon was passed in the Parish House, the guests of honor being those pioneer workers of the Auxiliary who had been connected with the organization for twenty years. A gracious welcome from Mrs. Hardeman Meade introduced the president, Mrs. Albert F. Wilson, who presided during the latter part of the afternoon when reminiscences of the pioneers were informally given. Mrs. Wilson presented to the Auxiliary a Book of Remembrance in which the pioneers signed their names.

At the evening service, Reverend Elwood Linsey Haines of North Carolina, a former missionary to Liberia, was the speaker on Newest Africa. The evening closed with a Quiet Hour led by Rev. Dr. W. G. Ribble in preparation for Holy Communion on the following morning.

Birmingham, November 8th.

At 9:30 A. M. Holy Communion was celebrated, Right Reverend William G. McDowell being the celebrant assisted by Reverend V. G. McMaster. The Bishop's sermon was in the nature of a charge to the women of the church on the responsibilities before them. Business Meeting

Nov. 7, 1928, 11:00 A. M.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Albert F. Wilson at 11 A. M. in St. Mary's Parish House. After the call, the president asked that all should stand a moment to pledge support to our beloved Bishop McDowell. Standing, the Prayer of the Auxiliary was offered. A word of greeting from the Bishop followed, expressing his great interest in the proceedings of the organization and his willingness to be on call during the meeting. The President called on Mrs. Hardee Johnston, who welcomed the Auxiliary in the name of St. Mary's Branch—and was thanked for the many attentions showed the organization.

On roll call it was shown that twenty-six branches had present two delegates apiece, nine branches had present one apiece, totalling 61 delegates, besides fourteen visitors. The President called to the chair the Vice-President, Mrs. T. O. Melton. The President reported on the activities of the year, including work for peace—the visit to the Diocese of two national workers—Mrs. Wade of the Supply Department and Mrs. Taber, U. T. O. worker, investigating church work among college students; attendance at four spring conferences—and attendance and address before the Rural Conference in Selma were among her activities. Reports of the calls of the National for the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund and the Emily Tillotson Memorial Library at Windham Hall and the generous response from the Branches. The request of Miss Richards of the Bishop Tuttle Training School for scholarship aid for a very worthy Alabama student had been referred to officers and auxiliary members and that on their advice the responsibility for student aid for the candidate for this year had been assumed. She offered the following recommendations:

1. That books of branches close annually on June 15th and officers' books close on July 1st.
2. That delegates and alternates to Triennial meetings be appointed by the Bishop; that delegates to Provincial meetings be appointed by the President and approved by the Bishop.
3. That chairman of spring conferences be elected by conference for a term of three years co-incident with term of Auxiliary President at the meeting following the election of the President.
4. The Past-Presidents become automatically the Advisory Board of the Auxiliary, become members of the Executive Board, and at all times be accorded a vote in the annual meetings.
5. That in lieu of larger Diocesan dues, a Discretionary

Fund for small voluntary contributions be established to relieve occasional emergencies of the Executive Board.

6. That a Committee on Finance be appointed to assist branches in establishment of a standard of proportionate or percentage basis of meeting our annual budget.

Mrs. Wilson, the President, also reported from the Triennial of the General Convention (1) the adoption of a formal constitution, (2) the ratification of the plan for enlarged work for the Woman's Auxiliary making it auxiliary to all departments of the National Council in the five fields, (3) the action of the Triennial in regard to the corporate Gift for the new Triennium of a maximum corporate gift of \$100,000 to be completed by Epiphany 1930.

Our Vice-President, Mrs. T. O. Melton, reported organization in a co-ordinated form of All Saints', Mobile and Trinity Church, Demopolis.

The Treasurer, Miss Upton, presented her report for all funds in her hands. Moved by Miss Kimball that report be accepted and filed. Report of the Recording Secretary and Editor, Mrs. J. B. Jones, of the corresponding secretary, Mrs. C. H. Beale, were received and filed. Mrs. D. E. Wilson, the Educational Secretary reported increased interest in study classes, 54 classes being reported, 44 being a Church Awake, with others on Bible, Church History and Evangelism.

Mrs. Carl Lay, Secretary of the Supply Department gave a full report which was accepted and filed.

Distribution of tabulated statements prepared by the Secretary followed. At one o'clock the Auxiliary recessed for luncheon.

At 2:45 P. M. the Auxiliary re-convened. The first report of the afternoon was the splendid account of the work among the Isolated Church Women of Alabama. An especial feature of the report was the joint entertainment of one of the girls from the Church Home and the joint mothering of her by the group of the Isolated Church Women. On motion this report was accepted and filed.

The President called on Rev. Mr. Lowery to speak on the subject of time recommended for closing reports. Mr. Lowery read from the Canons of Protestant Episcopal Church Canon 53—"Fiscal Year to begin January 1, 1928."

The President referred the statement to the Committee on Findings, asking for consideration in their report.

Mrs. James Mustin reported as correspondent of the Church Periodical Club based on the report of the nine branches sending reports to her. Report was accepted and filed.

The Chair regretfully announced resignation of Mrs. Charles Henderson as chairman of Annalee Fitts Memorial Library Committee. The financial report of the Treasurer of the Annalee Fitts Memorial of Mrs. Cochran showing a balance of \$692.77 read by Secretary was accepted and filed.

Miss Bouchelle, Treasurer for the Woman's Auxiliary of the House of Happiness reported that thirty-three branches had contributed, the definite pledges amounting to \$97.40 per month, the last month finding us able to pay only \$71.00 to Miss Martin on the \$100 we had pledged. Miss Bouchelle urged an increased in definite pledges, regularity and promptness in sending amounts to treasurer.

The Chair at this point called on Miss Martin, the worker at the House of Happiness, to make her report. The crisis of the House due to illnesses in the community and among the workers, the building program including a school, a sun-porch, the gift of Mrs. Charles Henderson, in the progress of construction, spiritual progress due to mission held by Mr. Lowrey and visits of the Bishop, with confirmation of two of the children were reported. School term has been lengthened from four to nine months. Family at present consisting of nine, the clothes exchange, the growing influence of the House in the children's lives who have passed through the House were some of the items mentioned. Running expenses for year \$1,526.28. The building fund as reported by Miss Martin showed our debt to her of \$825.11.

Mr. Lowrey asked privilege of the floor to speak of conditions of the House of Happiness unfavorable to the health of our valuable worker and urged that we should reimburse her for the money for building paid out of her personal funds.

On motion of Mrs. J. B. Jones, seconded by Miss Kimball, the treasurer was instructed to pay over to Miss Martin the sum of \$878.64 in the treasury to the credit of the Building Fund of the House of Happiness.

Mrs. D. E. Wilson called attention of the house for the immediate need of \$300.00 for stopping the cracks in the house or "chinking" it and expressed a hope that we should make provision for this need. Mrs. Battle Searcy suggested the method of voluntary pledges from the floor. Pledges came in spontaneously from the following:

Mr. J. M. Stoney, Executive Secretary for the Diocese, was requested by the Chair to speak to us before his departure for Anniston. He made a telling charge to the Woman's Auxiliary to interest its membership in the payment of Parish quotas to the end that backward steps would not be necessary in the essential work of maintaining our beloved Church in Alabama. He stated that such steps were contemplated because of the Twenty per cent shortage due to failure to pay quotas and the many requests pending for a reduction in the quotas for the coming year.

The Report of The United Thank Offering for 1928, Miss Annie Hobdy Chairman, in her unavoidable absence, was read by Mrs. Charles Clingman. The sum total for the year was \$6929; and that for the Triennial just closed was \$18,000.00. The banner branches were Parish, Boligee, St. Marks, \$507.54.

Mission, West Blockton Church of our Savior, \$189.00.

A gracious letter from our Bishop Wilmer Scholarship beneficiary—Ruth Bettner, was read by Miss Emma Twiggs, thanking the Auxiliary for the privileges which were hers.

All reports of the afternoon and morning sessions were accepted and filed.

The meeting then adjourned for the afternoon.

BUSINESS MEETING, FRIDAY, NOV. 9, 1928.

The meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama was called to order by the President, Mrs. Albert F. Wilson at 9:30 o'clock at St. Mary's Church, Birmingham. The Rev. Mr. Hinckle led a short devotional exercise at the opening of the meeting.

The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

The Committee on findings made its report as follows:

Report of Committee on Findings

After careful consideration of the resolutions and suggestions made for furthering the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, your Committee on Resolution submits the following resolutions, and suggests their adoption as a whole:

1. Whereas there is at present great opportunity for the extension of the Church in Alabama as well as throughout the world and gifts are made to meet the immediate need; therefore, be it

a. Resolved, that the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in annual meetings assembled, pledge itself to make the support of the Program of the Church its first duty.

b. Resolved, that the excellent and attractive new book "The Program of the General Church 1929-1930-1931" be used as the basis for program meetings and discussion groups and that all church families be encouraged to own copies of the book.

c. Resolved, that we strive to lead the men, women and children of the Diocese into a fuller knowledge of the joy and power of sacrificial giving.

2. Resolved, That delegates and alternates to the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary be appointed by the Bishop of the Diocese in consultation with the Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary.

(3). Resolved, That delegates and alternates to the Woman's Auxiliary meeting of the Province be appointed by the Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary.

(4) Resolved, That Chairman of the Woman's Auxiliary Convocations be elected by members of the convocation in the spring meeting assembled next before the annual meeting electing the Diocesan President, and be it

Resolved that the term of office of convocational chairmen be three years and coincident with the term of the Diocesan President.

(5) Resolved, That Past Diocesan Presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary be made members of the Executive Board; have the power to vote; and shall constitute an advisory Council.

(6) Resolved that a uniform date for a Spring Conference of Convocations is to be preferred when conditions therefor are favorable, but for sufficient reason the Chairman of any Convocation and the Diocesan President in consultation may change the time of meeting of that convocation.

(7) a. Resolved, That a Finance Committee of three members be appointed by the Diocesan President to assist branches in establishing their rightful share in the making of gifts and to aid in shaping financial policies, and be it

b. Resolved, That the Finance Committee be instructed to carefully consider the question of the best date for closing the fiscal year of this organization and that report be made to the President who will refer it to the Executive Board for action.

c. Resolved, That the Diocesan Expense Fund shall be no longer raised by the payment of per capita dues, but instead this expense fund shall be provided by asking parish and mission branches to make contributions according to the following classes:

Details of this plan shall be referred to the Finance Committee.

(8) That earnest thought be given to training for leadership and that plans inaugurated for this purpose be given hearty support throughout the Diocese.

Resolved, that prayer and sacrifice be made for the Gift of Life.

(9) Resolved, that the uniform standard for the valuation of garments for missionary boxes be given publicity by the Diocesan and parish and mission Supply Secretaries and used in estimating the value of all missionary boxes.

(10) Resolved, That gratitude be expressed for the fine young women who are becoming identified with the Woman's Auxiliary and that their powers of leadership be used to further develop our work.

(11) Resolved, That members of the Woman's Auxiliary in annual meeting assembled express their thankfulness for the joyous privilege of contributing to the United Thank Offering and pledge their active influence in trying to share this privilege with every woman in the Diocese.

(12) Resolved, That all members of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese be encouraged to daily pray for peace as well as missions at the noon hour.

(13) Resolved, That the women of this Diocese be led to take a prayerful and intelligent interest in the erection of the great cathedral which is to be a needed expression of religious life in the nation's capital and that when possible aid be given to this great enterprise.

(14) a. Resolved that members of the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary pledge to the Bishop of the Diocese and the Committee on Evangelism their loyal support of the program of Evangelism being framed for the Diocese.

b. Resolved, that we fully subscribe to the Findings of the Committee on Evangelism of the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and request our Diocesan President to see that the major part of those Findings be given wide publicity; and further,

c. Resolved, that through earnest daily prayer, Bible study, and meditation, we endeavor to crown Christ as Lord in our hearts and homes that we may extend His Kingdom in other lands.

On motion of Mrs. D. E. Wilson, seconded by Miss Kimball these findings were adopted.

Mrs. Paul Smith offered the following resolution:

Whereas, the absence of Mrs. Charles Henderson, a former President and loyal co-worker has been noted with regret; and whereas the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama, appreciate her faithful

services and untiring devotion to the causes of the Woman's Auxiliary;

Therefore, be it resolved: That the Woman's Auxiliary in convention assembled, express to Mrs. Henderson, their deep and sincere appreciation of her faithful services, and also their hope of her presence and interest to the end.

Mrs. Fitts moved that messages of love and greeting be sent in the form of a note from the secretary to Mrs. Lanier, who has last year invited us to meet at St. Mary's and who is ill at her home, to Mrs. Jolly of Mobile, to Mrs. J. D. Kirkpatrick of St. Mary's, Chairman of Hospitality, who has suffered bereavement. Mrs. McVoy moved that a message of love to Miss Annie Hobdy, our faithful Chairman for the United Thank Offering. Miss Martin moved that a note of love and sympathy be sent to Mrs. Beckwith, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar De Woolf Randolph, Mrs. Burks of Ensley and Mrs. Seelye of Montgomery. All these resolutions were sympathetically adopted.

The order of the program was then resumed, the body entering into the conference on Rural Work. The Conference was opened by an address by Reverend Joseph R. Walker, who spoke of the largely preponderating rural population of Alabama, and the great need for emphasis in our church work. Opportunities for the rural worker at the regional conferences at Vicksburg and the National Conference at Madison and besought interest of W. A. for living wage for rural clergy, interest in Church—and above all in supporting and raising quota for Alabama.

Miss Augusta Martin reported the rural conference at the Triennial.

Miss Kimball submitted report of the Emerald Hodgson Fund—two letters having been sent to seventy-two branches fifty-two of whom responded. Net result was that Alabama sent \$516.00 to the Emerald Hodgson Hospital. Motion for adoption of this report with a vote of thanks to Miss Kimball was unanimously voted.

A greeting from the Young People's Service League to the Woman's Auxiliary was brought by charming Sarah

Totten. She spoke of the interest of the Y. P. S. L. in Evangelism.

Mrs. Battle Searcy, Chairman for the Corporate Gift reported Alabama's Corporate Gift as \$52.20 in excess of our goal.

Mrs. Randall, Chairman of the Prayer Partnership Plan made report, showing forty-eight letters sent—forty-five branches enlisted as members of Prayer Partnership Plan.

Convocation Chairmen made their reports, Mrs. L. E. Lide, chairman reported the meeting of the convocation of Selma. Mrs. Calhoun reported from the Birmingham convocation; Miss Kimball read the report of Mrs. Schroeter, Chairman of the Mobile Convocation, and Mrs. Reuf's Report of Huntsville Convocation. These five reports were accepted and filed.

The noon-day prayers were offered by Reverend Mr. Neff. The Auxiliary were then privileged to hear an address on "Evangelism and Personal Religion" from Mrs. J. R. Wheeler of Nashville, Tennessee, member of the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary. Following her truly spiritual charge, on motion of Miss Kimball, the Auxiliary rose to express their sincere vote of thanks and appreciation. The report of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund by Miss Elsie McIntyre, chairman, followed. It was moved by Miss Kimball that the report be accepted and filed.

In view of shortness of time, valuable reports from the Church Home and the Library were accepted and filed without being read.

The Committee on Work among the Foreign-Born was presented by Mrs. Ebaugh, Chairman, and recommended personal work with foreign-born, each churchman to have at least one foreign-born friend.

Report of Committee on Service Program for the year was made by Mrs. Hardeman Meade, and delegates were each given a copy of the Program to carry home.

The Credentials Committee through its chairman reported a total attendance of one-hundred thirty-five of whom two were speakers from outside the diocese, nine

were members of the clergy, seventeen were officers and Committee Chairmen of Auxiliary, sixty-six were delegates from branches, and fifty were non-delegate Auxiliary members.

Mrs. Carl Lay gave an interesting report of the International Hospital in Tokio including the impressive dinner program which she attended as a delegate in Washington at the Triennial and the plans for the new undertaking of the Church to give this hospital adequate facilities and enlargement of service.

The report of the Courtesy Committee was read by Mrs. DeBardeleben and was accepted unanimously, the delegates rising to express their great appreciation of the lovely hostesses of Birmingham.

The Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary thank most heartily our hostess branch of St. Mary's for their courtesy and hospitality; to the other branches of the Auxiliary in Birmingham we are also indebted for comfort and pleasure; and to the Bishop and clergy we are most grateful for spiritual ministrations and co-operation at all our meetings.

An atmosphere of love and fellowship has prevailed during the whole time and we truly feel that we have been ministered to by those who have obeyed the apostles injunction to care for Christ's followers.

ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT

Dear Friends in the Woman's Auxiliary, Delegates and Visitors.

This long-looked for day has at last arrived. We have gathered together this morning around our Father's table and have broken the Bread of Life in communion together. We are ready now to discuss Our Father's business and to go forward together in the Master's Service. While it was never a part of my planned-program of life to find myself before the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama as I am today, I want my first expression as I face you here to be my heartfelt appreciation and joyful thankfulness to you for this privilege of Service in the spread of Christ's kingdom on earth. If there has been any measure of success in the year's work it is due to the careful planning of my predecessor in office and to the genuinely fine co-operation of your Executive Board composed of my fellow workers and committee-chairmen. I make my grateful acknowledgement to each one and also especially to the Bishop and rectors for their co-operation and help.

It is a source of gratification that the first official act expected of me was an effort for Peace and Unity. Many of you joined me in a letter to our Representatives in Washington endorsing the measure which finally became known to the world as the Briand-Kellogg Peace Pact. At the Triennial Meeting in Washington we heard more of this and that 51 nations had endorsed it. We heard Dr. Joseph Newton say, "The world has become a neighborhood, but not yet a brotherhood. Our labors for peace must continue until brotherhood is a reality."

Our Diocese has been honored by visits from two of the national headquarters representatives, Mrs. Wade of the Supply Department and Mrs. Taber, U. T. O. worker and Field Department representative. There were notable occasions which brought both inspiration and encouragement. Mrs. Wade commended the work of our Diocesan supply secretary and Mrs. Taber expressed favorable impressions of our Wilmer Training School and predicted it would eventually supply in the Fourth Province what Windham does in New York and what St. Margaret's under Deaconess Newell does in Berkley.

Last of the joyous memorable experiences of the year is the Triennial Meeting in Washington, just over, where the plans of work for the next three years were deliberated upon and carefully decided upon by delegates from 108 diocese and missionary districts. The Diocese of Alabama was represented by five of the Executive Board appointed by the Bishop while four others and Miss Martin as alternate were also present. About one hundred

Alabama women large from the Auxiliary were also present as visitors. Your delegates tried faithfully to represent you. Your President served on the Sub-Committee on Findings in the Domestic Mission Field. Your Secretary and your Educational Secretary both offered resolutions from the floor; your supply Secretary often acted as Teller and attended the Teussler Dinner for St. Luke's Hospital; and your Mountain Missionary was a much sought after speaker for missionary teas—a feature of the Washington meeting—and she received the Cross of the San Grael in the Chapel of Joseph of Arimathea at the National Cathedral one Sunday afternoon along with Bishop Rowe, Bishop Freeman, Bishop Brent, Mr. Cram, the architect, Mrs. Biller and three others. You will hear from these officers and visitors in person during this meeting. I will only say to you that we came home pledged to many causes, among them.

1. To the Program of the Church and our own Diocesan Program.
2. To Personal Religion and Evangelism.
3. To enlistment in B branches, Young Matrons, Business Women, and College Students.
4. Appropriation from United Thank Offering for training workers to serve in our women's colleges.
5. To Corporate Gift of fifty thousand dollars before Epiphany, 1930.
6. Recruiting Committee for Gift of Life.
7. To continued effort to spread influence of the Spirit of Missions.

8. To St. Luke's International Hospital Endowment Fund.

There are many others of which you will hear often during this Triennium.

Inclosing the year's report I am including a few recommendations for your consideration. These have been approved by your Executive Board, and are appended.

I call attention to the fact that the reports of branches are for nine months in order that from now on our year may be from June to June. There are two disappointments in the year's work which I feel compelled to mention. We have fallen short of the year 1927 in reaching our goal for the Reverend Kenneth Morris' salary and we have failed to meet our full appropriation for the maintenance fund at the House of Happiness. However, we have cause to rejoice in our increased contribution to the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund and we did fulfill our dear custodian's hope and anticipation in our Triennial United Thank Offering of \$18,000.00. Our Woman's Auxiliary has for its ideal that New Commandment

which Christ gave for the whole world—Love of God and our neighbor as ourselves—worship and neighborliness—and that is our part in the Church today. Someone has said, "If you want to keep Christ in your heart, you must share Him with someone else." So we come together with a common purpose—it is Christ and His Church. To quote again, "It takes four elements for men (or women) to come together for great action, a common purpose, a common hope, a common friend, and a common peril." A recent secular magazine article has the startling title, "What think ye of Christ?" As we review our year's work I would reverse the question, and reverently ask, "What thinks the Christ of us?" Is there aught else we might have done if we realized Him actually in our midst? Do we answer the calls that come to us as His calls? Are we faithful stewards of the talents entrusted to us? Let us as co-workers survey our field and make sure of our outposts and press forward constrained by the love of Christ to accomplish the mission for which our Auxiliary exists—to know Christ and to make Him known.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

In summarizing the work of the year just passed, it seems we have not been negligent in consecrating the service of our minds to the Master. Throughout the Diocese in answer to my inquiry I find there have been study classes on various forms of Church work. Leading the list in number are the 41 classes that were held with the text book, "The Church Awake". There are also reported many Bible classes, program meetings, and courses in Evangelism. Another encouraging feature of our work this year is the good representation that our Diocese had at the Summer Training School at Sewanee, more than fifty of our Alabama people being in attendance at the conferences and classes there. The work of Religious Education is so manifold that Auxiliary members may find it the chief form of service, co-operation with the Church Schools, inaugurating normal schools for the training of accredited teachers, Training Courses in Woman's Auxiliary Program of Service—all of these plans are being put into effect. Let us stress Adult Education in Church and spiritual fields just as sincerely as our state is stressing it in academic fields; but in doing so let us hold in mind that adult education is true education only when it is self-education. Following is a program for education for this year. It is hoped that each branch may make an earnest effort to follow the whole plan, but branches not having worked up to this may follow such portions of the program as may be faithfully carried out.

1. In November, a program meeting on the Proceedings of the Triennial Meeting of the General Convention and the Woman's Auxiliary.

2. Subsequent monthly programs on the special causes to be aided during that month as listed in the Woman's Auxiliary Program of Service or on current news as culled from Church papers.

3. A Pre-Advent class of at least four sessions. The text for

this may well be selected from the shorter books of the list given by the Department of Religious Education.

4. A Lenten Study Class—topic, preferably the prescribed Missionary Book of the year, "The New Africa" by Donald Fraser or The Ministry of Laymen by Leon C. Palmer.

5. At some time in this year, a systematic study of the Program for the General Church, 1929-30-31, in the attractive new volume put out for the Triennial is highly recommended.

6. The establishment of reading chains whereby religious and other purposeful books leading to the enrichment of life will be passed successively to each member of the group.

7. The study by young matron's units of "Religious Training of Children in the Home", Palmer, \$.15, Brotherhood of St. Andrews, 202 S. 19th St., Philadelphia.

8. Great emphasis on subscription and reading of Church papers, especially the Spirit of Missions.

9. Individual daily Bible Reading and regular study in Adult Bible classes.

10. Attendance at summer conferences and training schools.

May the year's study bring us all into closer fellowship with the Master!

My dear friends:

Regretting that I cannot be present at your meeting to express

However, I do want you to know that it has meant more to me than anything else in my whole life. The opportunity for Service has been so great here and while preparing for my life work—Our Father has blessed me with eyes to see and strength to undertake and a mind to comprehend—the need for cultivation of the wonderful field here in my midst, that of the Church Home. I cannot begin to tell you how happy I have been working with those dear children during my spare hours. One cannot help but bubble over with joy and gratitude when they feel that God has answered their prayer in using them as a medium of service to His Little Ones.

CHURCH HOME

Mrs. Nettie Whitford, Matron

I take it that the idea behind this report of the Wilmer Training School, is that the members of the Auxiliary shall, through it, be made familiar with this project in which they have a part.

Any discussion of the School must, of necessity, be also a discussion of the Church Home. The two institutions are so closely allied, and act and react so constantly one upon the other, that a picture of either would be inadequate without a picture of the other.

To begin at the beginning. The school was established with the staff of the Church Home as the nucleus of a student body, and the local clergy as the faculty. The original plan was that the sessions of the School should all be held in the Wilmer Training School building on the Church Home grounds. But an invitation was issued to the Churchwomen of the city to participate in the benefits of the school so that they might be better equipped for whatever work they were doing, or contemplated doing in the local Churches. Five women in all responded, and signified a wish to take the courses offered. But it was then discovered that the hours for the classes at the Training School plant, and the problem of transportation back and forth present very serious difficulties. A solution of the problem was reached through what might be termed an extension course. Classes were organized for the local students at a convenient hour, and sessions were held in Christ Church Chapter House. For the first year this arrangement obtained. The resident students at the Home met in the Wilmer Training School; while the students from the local Churches met in an extension course in Christ Church Chapter House.

With the beginning of the second year, the problems presented in the above arrangement had solved themselves. Some of the students in the extension course had dropped out; but the majority had made their plans so that they might attend the sessions of the School to be held in the School building on the Church Home property. The extension course was therefore discontinued.

We are now in our third year. All classes are being conducted at the Training School building. And there is a class preparing for graduation this spring. During the past year, we gained three students, and lost one.

Now I shall try to draw for you a picture of the Training School. But to do so, I must sketch it against the background of the Church Home.

I wonder how many of you realize what a remarkably fine institution you have in the Church Home for Orphans? It is not the buildings that make it a fine institution, although they are pretty buildings to behold. Neither is it the children in the Home, for we take them as they come—even as a Certain Galilean reached out His arms on one occasion and embraced within them a group of nondescript little children because they came to Him to be taken into His arms.

I wish it were possible to have all of you in the Home at the bed-time hour of a certain five year old boy who is one of the most attractive children I have ever seen. It had been intimated to the

Matron that a family might be willing to adopt this boy. The Matron was telling him of the family and the nice home that they could give him, and finally asked him if he did not want to go to these people. A long silence. Then a long sigh. Finally this: "Well, if you all don't want me around here any more, I guess I better go. Yes, I'll go to them if you tell me to go." Another sigh. And another silence.

Or this: A seventeen year old girl who had been expelled from the Home as incorrigible. A year had elapsed since her expulsion. Now she is on a visit to the Home. She is lying across a bed in one of the dormitories sobbing and crying. And the burden of her troubles is that when she compelled her expulsion from the Home she repudiated the best care and training she had ever known. All this in the face of the fact that the girl was at that moment in possession of a room with an organization whose reputation for having desirable quarters is nation wide.

What has all this to do with the Wilmer Training School? Just this. That the Training School has as its larger proportion of students the devoted women who are making the Home what it is. The School represents an opportunity presented to these women to provide themselves with further equipment for the work that they are even now, so nobly doing. Nor is that all. For the new students are required, aside from their studies, to give a certain amount of time to the children of the Home.

We have at the School, what we consider a comprehensive course. Most institutions of this sort give courses that lead to some one specific or definite vocation. The student becomes either a deaconess or a special service worker, according as she enters a training school for deaconesses or a training school for social service workers. But the two courses seem generally to have been kept exclusive the one of the other. We are striving to make the course at the Wilmer Training School inclusive, so that the students may accordingly as they deem best become a deaconess or a social service worker in a lay capacity, or a parish worker. Our chief concern is that they may become more effective workers, however their individual tastes and capacities may lead them.

Let us go back a little way. I made the statement that the Home does not consist in the buildings or the children. That is true. The Home is the spirit of personal service to individual children with whom fate has played unkindly. This we believe is an approach to a very great problem in the spirit of the Christ. We have a sufficient number of workers to establish and keep personal contacts with each child. The bleakness of most institutions for the care of homeless children lies in the lack of a sufficiency of

workers to maintain personal contacts. The child becomes only a cog in a great machine. And yet the thing that makes a real home—is love. Do you see my point? The students of the Wilmer Training School represent a greater number of people contacting with, and loving the children from day to day. * * * *

Little children came to Jesus, because they wanted Him to love them and touch them. He did. His associates said the loving and touching was a waste of time. Jesus said that it was an investment in the kingdom of Heaven. Was he right? When their mouths have been fed, and their bodies clothed, is there still in little children a hunger for affection which represents a possible investment in the kingdom of heaven?

REPORT OF THE PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN

On September last, forty-eight letters were sent to those branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, that were not listed as members of the Prayer Partnership Plan.

There were only eight replies, which was quite a disappointment being of an optimistic turn of mind. I hoped to report 100 per cent.

There are about eighty-five branches of the Auxiliary in the Alabama Diocese, forty-four of which have enlisted as members of the plan.

From letters received there are stimulating expressions such as these: "Personally prayer has always been a 'supporting strength'" to me. Partnership Prayer seems to draw us more closely to our missionaries and their work." Miss Martin assures one of her Prayer Partners (she has been adopted by fifteen branches) "that I know some one was praying for me, for I felt the strength of those prayers."

If there are any delegates present, whose branches have not adopted a Prayer Partner, I shall be glad to enroll their names, as members. The plan is so simple and the influence beyond bounds.

Mrs. Albert Wilson asked me to speak of our Alabama Missionary, Miss Caroline Duffield, Citronelle, who has gone to the Philippines. I only know what you may already have seen in the Spirit of Missions. She is to serve as a trained nurse at St. Luke's, Manila. I am sure some Branch will want to adopt her as a Prayer Partner.

Realizing the sacredness of our responsibility, individually, I am repeating a quotation from the "Devotional Life" that has been used before—trusting that it may now, and always find a place in our hearts.

"God is glorified in human hearts.

Let us think what it would mean if every heart, every soul, were filled with the glory of God, as the waters cover the sea. Let us pray that we may so dwell in Him and He in us, that the light of His glory may perpetually shine in and through us and all mankind, until the earth shall be filled with the glory of God, as the waters cover the sea."

Let us try to visualize what would come to pass if every branch of the Woman's Auxiliary would enlist in this adventure of prayer.

REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL GIFT

Madam President:

I hereby submit the following report of the Emerald Hodgson Fund, the Provincial Gift to the Hospital at Sewanee.

This work was undertaken as the forward work for 1928 and Alabama's quota was \$500. This was estimated a gift of 50 cents per capita for the members of the Auxiliary of the diocese.

The appeal for this work was made by two letters to the branches, an article in the Alabama Churchman, and addresses at the Spring Conferences. The number of branches approached was 72. The number responding was 52. There were gifts from 13 members of the League of the Isolated thru the chairman of this work, Mrs. H. C. DeBardeleben, who cordially responded and spread the appeal to the members of her League.

The net result was that in August, Alabama sent to the provincial treasurer, a check for \$511.50 to which was added \$4.50 sent direct to Sewanee making the Auxiliary's gift \$516.00 to the Emerald Hodgson Memorial Hospital. "A fine check!" said Mrs. Loring Clark in acknowledgment. "A grand check!" said Mrs. Proctor Bonham treasurer.

In reviewing the work, the chairman wishes to express her appreciation to the SMALL branches of Alabama, for their generous and prompt response. Over 90 per cent of the small branches sent gifts representing 100 per cent of their membership. Without such response on their part, Alabama could never have gone over the top in this fund. More than once the head of the fund had cause to say, "God Bless the Small Branches of Alabama." May they always prosper and may their loyalty to this work done in the name of Christianity, be an inspiration to themselves and to all of us of the Auxiliary.

REPORT OF HOUSE OF HAPPINESS Worker in Charge, Miss Augusta Martin

It is almost as difficult to tell you of the work of the House of Happiness in one brief quarter of an hour as it would be for the Reverend Mr. Haines to tell you all of Africa in one evening. While my territory is not as great sometimes the variety of the problems presented seems as remarkable. Problems of health, of clothing for school children, of nursing supplies, of family difficulties which we are called on to adjust, of general Child Welfare service, must be added to the routine business of teaching day and Church school and managing for our household which varies in number, but averages nine. An important part of our work is the clothes exchange which is run almost as a store, finds its support in the boxes the Auxiliary Branches send. It is our aim to enable our friends of the neighborhood to have the things they really need and to get them in exchange for the things they can give which may be money, or produce, or service. The year has been a hard one in the matter of prevailing illness, epidemics of measles, and influenza were followed by much pneumonia and then when we thought we had clear sailing before us, lo, the mumps were upon

us. It has been a year of much building. A school has been built and we are rejoicing in the lovely sun porch—the gift of our beloved Mrs. Henderson. I wish you could all be with us for a short while to see how much of service we are accomplishing. Especially I wish you could join us in our evening song service. In August Bishop McDowell visited us and confirmed two. We have also had the benefit of Mr. Lowery's visits when we could have for the workers and the children the House the inspiration of his presence. That the House of Happiness is doing a real service for God is being shown now by the successful young people who through it have been launched in useful careers. I append the report of the Building Fund including the cabin account for your attention.

ANNALEE FITTS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The idea behind the Annalee Fitts Memorial Library of perpetuating the memory and continuing the influence of the life of her to whom it is dedicated, is seeing fulfillment in at least two ways. The library room is being used as an instruction center for the Training School, whereby other devoted Church women may receive help and guidance in preparing themselves for an effective and efficient life of service in the name of our Saviour. The books which constitute the library furnish to the student body the tools with which they may continue work upon that spiritual structure within the state of Alabama, or whither so ever they

may go—in which Miss Fitts was so deeply interested, and to which she in her day contributed her quota of work.

This is extraneous—but what I have just said about the books is a practical demonstration of what we assert as a matter of belief when in the creed we say that we believe in “the Communion of Saints.” The credal formula is rather vague when we restate it to the effect that we believe there is a very definite relationship between the efforts of our generation, and the efforts of those who have lived in the past or shall live in the future. But when the inspiration of the life of Miss Fitts causes a group of women to place books in the hands of those who desire to give their lives in Christlike service; and when the contents of those books represent the accumulated experiences of those, who like Miss Fitts and those to whom the books are made available, are facing Christward—then the Communion of Saints becomes apparent. Each generation makes its contribution, and the cumulative effect of it all moves us towards the realization of that great ideal recognized in that petition “Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.”

There are about 200 books in the library at the present time. The selection of these books was very carefully made under the direction of Mr. Goodwin, and I think it can be said without fear of contradiction that no inadequate or useless volumes are to be found upon the shelves. The selection at the present time covers a variety of headings. But no group of books is as complete as we would like to have them. History, theology, sociology, ethics, missions, Sunday school work, meaning and interpretation of the Bible, and books on many kindred subjects are found in the library at this time. But under each of the above groups there must of necessity be many books that would be of value to the students, that we have not as yet been able to procure. There are likewise many standard reference works that would be of inestimable help which we have not been able to secure because the cost has been too great.

There is need of a permanent fund to be expended at the request of the faculty for the purchase of books from time to time as the experience of the faculty with particular classes from time to time may indicate. For example, I may be teaching Old Testament, and pre-supposing a knowledge on the part of students of the history of Babylon and Assyria. But suppose I find in the midst of the course that my students know nothing of those two kingdoms. Then unless I can put into their hands some information along those lines, my course is unintelligible to them. But I have not procured the books in advance of the need, because I was not aware

of the need. Such conditions as the above will constantly arise in the experience of any young educational institution, and must be met as they arise. Then again there are new books coming from the publishers from time to time, out of which it is often desirable to add a few to the library. So if there were a permanent library fund, out of which books could be purchased from time to time, it would add inestimably to the effectiveness of the library.

There is also this to be said about the type of books such as we would require. They are not popular books in the same sense that fiction is popular. As a result they must be sold at a much higher price than would be the case of fiction. A small output must bear the expense of the publication from the pen of the writer to the reader.

For, "The light that shines brightest at home, shines furthest." Especially did she stress the need of religious education for adults so they can be better prepared to help young people. She also asked that a more earnest effort be made so the Auxiliary might pay in full Rev. Kenneth Morris' salary, that gifts be continued to the Annalee Fitts Library, that suitable gifts be given our orphans, that the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund be increased so the goal of \$10,000 be reached. A very pleasing fact was noted in that Greensboro has formed a Junior Branch. Mrs. Fuller of Selma read the pledges of the last Trien-

nium and an open discussion followed in which branches were asked how near they had come to fulfilling the same.

CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.
2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.
3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.
4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Honorary Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian, United Thank Offering Secretary, Educational Secretary, Secretary Supply Department, Custodian Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Church Home Correspondent, Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.
5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Educational Secretary, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years, and shall be eligible to re-election for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.
6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees. She shall appoint a chairman for each Convocation of the Diocese whose duty it shall be to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board.
7. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, write the Minutes of Annual and called meetings and make ready the Annual Reports for the printer.
8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meetings.
9. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

10. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

11. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

12. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

13. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

14. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

15. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
