Minutes

The Forty-fourth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Alabama was duly opened at three-thirty o'clock Tuesday afternoon, October 25, 1932, in St. John's Church, Decatur, Alabama. The Reverend Peter M. Dennis, Rector, offered the opening prayers for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Mrs. Albert Wilson, President of the Diocesan Branch, in taking the chair voiced her delight in being in Decatur for this occasion and introduced the chairman of the Huntsville Convocation, Mrs. W. B. Edmunson, who in extending a welcome from the Convocation also introduced the local women of the Huntsville Convocation. The welcome from St. John's Auxiliary was graciously extended by Mrs. L. A. Hobart of Decatur, and the Reverend Mr. Dennis speaking for the clergy of the Convocation and the parishes throughout the Convocation made us feel that the whole northern part of the Diocese was cordially extending greetings through him. The response to the welcome was made by Mrs. D. E. Wilson, former President of the Diocesan Branch, speaking appreciation of the careful thought and planning that it was evident had preceded the opening of the meeting and expressed the hope that the time spent together in this annual convention would not only strengthen us individually, but would prepare us to carry God's message through the diocese and the world more eagerly than ever before.

Greetings from The Daughters of the King were read by Mrs. McWilliams of St. John's Church, Mobile.

The President presented distinguished guests, the Reverend Mr. Heyes of Greensboro, the Reverend Dr. Malet of Florence, and the Reverend Mr. Harvey of Talladega.

The annual Program of Service was presented and adopted by unanimous vote. In presenting the Program of Service, the Executive Board demonstrated its use by dramatizing a meeting of a typical Branch—St. Anna's—using the January program for this demonstration. In doing this they were assisted by the Reverend Mr. Dennis as visiting speaker who in a very brief address gave some memorable suggestions on work among the Indians.

The hour having come for Memorial Tribute to our former officers who have left our earthly ranks, but who yet by example still lead us on, the Auxiliary joined in singing, Hymn 175, "For All Thy Saints." The first name mentioned was that of our beloved Mrs. S. T. McMillan, of St. Michael and All Angels, Anniston, President of the Alabama Branch, 1904-1910. The repre-

sentative of St. Michaels' Branch not having yet arrived, no formal tribute was offered at this time, but Mrs. McMillan's beautiful picture was displayed and the President recalled the gracious interest that Mrs. McMillian had displayed in the Auxiliary throughout the years. Mrs. C. M. Beckwith, wife of the late Bishop Beckwith and for many years Chairman of the Junior Auxiliary for Alabama was next mentioned. The Auxiliary of the Church of the Ascension of Montgomery presented a tribute to her memory which was read by the Secretary. Mrs. Victor Atkins, beloved member of St. Poul's, Selma, and for a number of years chairman of the Selma Convocation was memorialized in a tribute read by Mrs. Val Taylor of Uniontown. The service of Memory closed with Hymn 396 "Ten Thousand Times Ten Thousand."

MRS. MARY CAMERON BECKWITH

The Church of the Ascension, Montgomery, presents the name of Mrs. Mary Cameron Beckwith, widow of the late Bishop Beckwith.

She entered into the joy of her Lord, Jan. 5th, 1932, after having been for more than thirty years actively identified with the work of the Church in this Diocese.

Living first in Anniston, and later moving to Montgomery, she was always a zealous worker in her Master's vineyard. She was

particularly successful in her work with young people, and many throughout the Diocese remember gratefully her influence in their lives.

To her work in the Church School and in the Auxiliary, she added in later years a most unselfish ministry for the mill people connected with the Neighborhood House in Montgomery.

It was the exposure caused by looking after some of the poor at "West End" which ultimately resulted in her death, and thus she may be said to have given her life in God's service.

She was also active in completing the work of Bishop Beckwith on the Prayer Book and in having it published, giving it a wide distribution throughout the Church.

MEMORIAL TRIBUTE TO MRS. MARY MARTIN ATKINS

Mrs. Mary Martin Atkins, beloved member of St. Paul's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of Selma passed on to the "Great Beyond," March 2nd, 1932. Mrs. Atkins was President of the Auxiliary when her health failed—but she had caught the vision, and wanted to respond to every call. Her love and interest never failed. She was an inspiration to all with whom she came in contact, for she was always pushing forward ready to make every sacrifice for the work. Her heart and soul were in it.

Her enthusiasm and buoyant spirit have been sadly missed.

To prove her love for "the Christ," she left a thousand dollars to be invested for the Auxiliary, so that even after she was gone, each year, she would still carry on St. Paul's Branch, Woman's Auxiliary, Selma, Ala.

Adjournment of the Afternoon session.

At 7:30 P. M. Evening Prayer at St. John's was especially impressive in the flower decked Church, with a full vested choir and a full attendance of Woman's Auxiliary and visitors. The Reverend Mr. Dennis, Rector, assisted by the Reverend Dr. Malet of Florence, conducted the evening service. A delightful feature of the evening service was the solo by Mrs. McGlathery, 'How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings.' The missionary address by Miss Regina Lustgarten, missionary on furlough from Hankow District, China, was on the broad subject of Missions; not only a commentary on the prevailing tendency to criticise missions, but a compelling argument for us who say so often, "I believe in the Holy Catholic Church" to demonstrate that belief by seeing that missions make possible a truly Catholic or universal Church.

After evening service an informal reception was tendered officers, delegates and visitors at the hospitable rectory.

October 26th at nine A. M. the Holy Communion was celebrated, the Right Reverend William G. McDowell being the celebrant assisted by Reverend Mr. Dennis. At this time the Memorial Roll was read and placed on the Altar.

After a brief interval, the business session was called to order, the President, Mrs. Albert Wilson, being in the chair. Minutes were read and approved.

By unanimous vote, the order of business was laid aside for the reading of the Memorial tribute to Mrs. S. T. McMillian by Mrs. R. C. Young of Anniston, who had been unavoidably absent on the previous afternoon. The Auxiliary stood to hear this tribute which was ordered to be filed and spread on the minutes.

The recommendations of the Executive Board were read as follows,

From the Spring meeting, Birmingham, June 27.

1. The resolution from the Huntsville Convocation—"That the Huntsville Convocation being relatively smaller in number should entertain once to every two times the Birmingham Convocation entertained the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary" was favorably considered with the further suggestion that the Mobile Convocation and the Birmingham Convocation each entertain twice in seven years.

2. That the Memorial Fund this year be given toward the Centennial Endowment Fund of the Diocese.

3. That the Educational Secretary be empowered to open a Church Book Store in the Diocese by getting books on consignment from 281 Fourth Ave.

4. That Religious Education libraries be established in each Convocation for religious education by the Convocation Educational secretaries with the further aim of establishing religious education libraries in each parish.

From the Executive Board Meeting, October 26, Decatur.

1. That former Presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary be made Honorary Vice-Presidents.

2. That the annual meeting should be on or near October 18, the anniversary of the establishment of the National Woman's Auxiliary in 1871.

The Nominations Committee to serve for the year was announced as follows:

The Committee on Credentials reported as a preliminary report the presence of 21 official delegates.

The Committee on Rules, Mrs. Norville Cullom, Chairman, reported the following rules as recommended:

1. The program as printed for the forty-fourth annual meeting shall be the general order of business.

2. All sessions shall open promptly at the hour designated and each member of the Convocation is asked to be present at the opening to remain throughout the session.

3. Delegates who must permanently leave are requested to notify the Chairman of Credentials who shall notify the secretary as withdrawal will affect the transaction of business.

4. Only properly accredited delegates are allowed to vote. No proxies are allowed.

5. Members shall be allowed ten minutes to present business. Time may be extended by unanimous consent.

6. A speaker shall announce her name, Branch and Convocation in addressing the Chair.

7. Immediately following the report of officer or chairman, the resolutions presented by her shall be voted upon. Miscellaneous resolutions shall be given to the Resolutions Committee for consideration before being presented to the general meetings.

On motion of Mrs. D. E. Wilson these rules were adopted.

The President's Report was then given the President, Mrs. Albert Wilson, the former President, Mrs. D. E. Wilson presiding during this report. At the conclusion of the President's report, the chairman expressed her appreciation of the constructive work of the past year and the report was received with a rising vote of thanks.

The report of the Vice-President, Miss Maud Kimball including also the report of Memorial Gifts was read by the Secretary, Miss

Kimball having been detained at home by ill health. The report was received and ordered filed.

The report of the Corresponding Secretary who was unavoidably absent because of business was made by the President who took this occasion to acknowledge the ever faithful and generous service of the Corresponding Secretary in sending out the quarterly letters of the President as well as many other duties that fall to her office.

The Treasurer's report was read, accepted and filed.

The report of the United Thank Offering Secretary, Miss Annie Hobdy, who was unable to be present, was read by Mrs. Steele Black. The report was received and was ordered filed. In presenting her annual report, Miss Hobdy also presented her resignation. Miss May Kyser moved that a message of love be sent to Miss Hobdy with a protest against her resignation and the request that she withdraw it. Mrs. Kirkpatrick seconded this motion and it was unanimously adopted.

The hour of noon having arrived, the Venerable James F. Plummer of Tullahoma, Tenn., offered a prayer that men everywhere should look upon the crucified Christ and recognize Him as their Savior and their King.

Allied to this in thought was the Report of the Gift of Life which followed. The chairman, Miss Helen Averitt, had sent an urgent plea for prayers to be offered that more workers should be sent into the field. The report was accepted and filed.

The Prayer Partnership Plan was reported by the Chairman, Mrs. C. T. Randall. She reported the following as on the official list of Prayer Partners for Alabama Branches:

Her recommendation that the branches be grouped so that there would be a single correspondent for each missionary in the list was generally discussed. Mrs. McWilliams of Mobile, offered the following motion: Resolved, that a prayer Partner in the field be assigned to a group of branches, that each group elect a correspondent from among them who should conduct the official correspondence, that each branch be encouraged to offer

prayers continually for the missionary and that they write to the missionary as frequently as they might wish to do without obligation on the part of the missionary to answer every letter. After considerable discussion this motion was unanimously adopted.

The Auxiliary at this time joined in singing Hymn 502, "Lord, Speak to Me." The President spoke recalling the Triennial resolution advising Auxiliary women to study the art of prayer and introduced Mrs. E. H. West, one of our own members, who had been chosen to speak on the subject. In tenderest and purest words, Mrs. West gave her helpful message on prayer.

Bishop McDowell was asked to close the morning session. He commended the Book of Prayers of the Massachusetts Service League, No. 1 Joy St., Boston, and used several of these prayers in the closing devotions of the morning. On suggestion of the President, the Auxiliary signified by rising, its pledge of love and loyalty to our Bishop.

Mrs. Edmundson, Chairman of the Huntsville Convocation, announced that the luncheon hostesses for the day were the branch at Florence Trinity.

The Auxiliary then adjourned for luncheon in the Parish House. During the luncheon hour the Bishop introduced to the Auxiliary Dr. Cameron McRae, who was to appear on the evening program. We were also privileged to have an informal talk from Miss Lustgarten on the varied experience of a Christian Missionary in the field of China. In recognition of the charming hospitality of the luncheon, the visitors rose in a body to thank our hostesses.

The afternoon session opened with Hymn 582. The President having called the meeting to order, Miss Elizabeth Freeland of Anniston, read the report of Mrs. J. C. Long. Educational Secretary of the past year. Miss Freeland, as Educational Secretary for this year, spoke of the new books for this year, displaying some of them. The report was accepted and filed.

The report of the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Carl Lay, of Gadsden, who was unavoidably absent because of illness, was read, accepted and filed. On motion of Mrs. Perry, the Secretary was instructed to send Mrs. Lay a message of love and of regret for her absence.

The report of the Treasurer of the House of Happiness was the next order of business. The report was read, accepted and ordered filed.

Mrs. John D. Gill spoke on the work of the Church Periodical Club, showing some of the material available for the branches.

Mrs. Cary Gamble of Huntsville, reported the Faith Fund of the House of Happiness for craft work, showing that \$52.50 had

been collected and sent to Miss Martin, our worker at the House of Happiness, for this work.

The report of Miss McIntyre, Treasurer of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund was read, showing the value of the trust to be \$9,159.35. This report was on motion of Mrs. Pope, received, accepted and ordered filed.

At this point, the President invited Bishop McDowell to speak of the Bishop Wilmer Training School. He complied, telling very simply the contribution of trained leadership that the Training School had already been able to furnish our Church and the hope that its scope might increase with the years.

The report of the Secretary and Editor, Mrs. J. B. Jones, was given and was received and ordered filed.

The address of Miss Martin which followed was listened to with great interest and sympathy. At the conclusion of this address Mrs. Gamble moved that a note of appreciation be sent to Miss Bessie Bouchelle, for so long a time treasurer of the House of Happiness, whose resignation was regretfully accepted by the Executive Board last July. The motion was adopted without dissenting vote.

The report of the League of the Isolated, Mrs. E. L. James, Chairman, was read, accepted and ordered filed.

The address of Deaconess Whitford, head of the Church Home and Auxiliary Correspondent for the Home, presented an interesting picture of the Home, the sixty children, the distribution of work, the daily routine of school, play, work, and Church responsibilities that all at the home shared. She further reported that clothing for the children had been received from 39 Auxiliary Branches who each sponsored a child besides thirty-six miscellaneous boxes and \$261.71 in money gifts. Speaking of the needs of the Home Deaconess Whitford dwelt on the great need of newer equipment and household supplies for the institution. Following the address of the Deaconess, Mrs. Norville Cullom moved that the Auxiliary give a Household shower for the Church Home. This was simultaneously seconded by five members and the motion was unanimously voted.

The report of the Business Woman's branches, Mrs. Gus Pope,

Chairman, presented by the chairman, was received and ordered filed.

The report of the Sewanee Scholarship was presented by Mrs. Dennis, the appointee for 1932, thanking the Auxiliary for the privilege of being at the summer session.

The report of the Rural Conference at Madison was given by Miss Martin, who through the partial scholarship given her during the summer, had completed her third summer at this conference and had received a certificate in Rural Leadership.

A message from Mrs. Macy was read and ordered filed.

A telegram of greeting was read from Mrs. Paul Tate of Mobile. The afternoon session then adjourned.

Evening Prayer was offered at 7:30 P. M., by Bishop McDowell assisted by the Rev. Mr. Harvey. The Bishop presented the Reverend Cameron McRae of Shanghai, China, who preached from the text, "If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." He traced our work in China from the days of Bishop Boon in 1846 to the present time showing how the uplifted Christ in China is more and more drawing to him the multitudes of that great country. Mr. McNeill, soloist, sang most touchingly, "The Lord Is My Light and My Salvation."

October 27th. The Auxiliary met for the concluding session of the Forty-fourth annual meeting at 9 o'clock, in St. John's Church, Decatur. After a brief devotional exercise, the meeting was called to order. Minutes were read and approved.

Mrs. Val Taylor moved that a message of love and sympathy be sent to our former educational secretary, Mrs. J. C. Long, the illness of whose young son had caused her resignation. By unanimous vote, the secretary was instructed to send this message.

Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Chairman of the Nominating Committee to bring in nominations for officers to be elected in 1933 made announcement that the Nominating Committee would be glad to have sent to them the names of women known in their branches for their ability to serve and the consecration that would lead them to dedicate this ability to the service of God through the Woman's Auxiliary.

First business on the program for the morning was the consideration of the affairs of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of Sewanee. Letters were read from Mrs. James R. Cain, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of Sewanee and from Miss Aimee Reed, the Secretary of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary. Both outlined the Provincial project of having members of the National Field Department in the Diocese during January and February and the contemplated instituted to be held at four places in the Province to which twenty representatives from each

Diocese are to be sent. The President reported as delegate to the meeting of the Provincial Auxiliary held in September at Kangua in connection with the Provincial Synod, giving the Findings of the Provincial Auxiliary meeting. A letter from our Provincial representative of the National Board was read, giving viewpoint of the National Board. In closing these reports and messages having to do with the provincial and the national organization, the Presidents stressed the importance of concentrating during the Fall on the Every Member Canvass and during the Spring on the Provincial Project.

The Bishop of the Diocese gave an informal, but instructive address on the present conditions of the Church urging the importance of keeping up the Church's strength so that she may offer the spiritual food as sorely needed as physical necessities at this time.

Mrs. John O. Gill, leader of the Young People of the Diocese brought a message from them and told interestingly of their work and of their ambitions.

Mrs. Ogden of Mobile was at this time recognized by the President to present an invitation for the Auxiliary to meet in Mobile in 1933 as special guests of the Mobile Convocation at All Saints Church. It was moved by Mrs. Jones, seconded by Mrs. Edmundson that this invitation be accepted. This was unanimously voted.

Miss Lustgarten, our guest, was recognized by the Chair. She spoke of the Provincial Project emphasizing its importance as a means to bring the Church to the attention of the people and that in attempting it, the Church is investing in this intensive program in the Province, which should challenge our best efforts to make the opportunity fruitful both to ourselves and others.

The Credential Committee had its final report.

Greetings from the Girl's Friendly Society were read.

A letter from Reverend Kenneth Morris was read and a book which he had sent was shown by the President.

Amendments to the Constitution as proposed by the 1931 Convention were ratified, each provision being read by the Secretary and each being unanimously approved.

The Resolution Committee, through its Chairman, Miss Freedland, reported that no miscellaneous resolutions had been referred to them.

The Recommendations of the Executive Board were then considered.

1. That in view of the great difference in the size of the Convocations, Birmingham and Mobile Convocations should each entertain twice in seven years, the smaller convocations being reached in rotation only once in the same time. Adopted.

2. That the Memorial Fund this year be given to the Endowment Fund. Adopted.

3. That the Educational Secretary be empowered to open a Church Book store in the Diocese, getting books on consignment from 281 Fourth Ave. This recommendation was amended by adding the words "if found feasible," and was so adopted.

4. That Religious Education Libraries be established in each Convocation by the Convocational Educational Secretary. Adopted.

5. That former presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary be made Honorary Vice-Presidents. Adopted.

Recommendations of the President:

That delegates to Triennial of the National Woman's Auxiliary and to the Provincial Auxiliary be elected. Adopted.

That expenses of delegates and of President to the Triennial should be financed by making an annual provision for this in our budget goal. Adopted.

The Noon-Day hour having arrived, the Reverend Mr. Dennis offered appropriate prayers. His meditation on prayer showing that the resources of prayer and the promises of power are ever present for those who are pledged to put first things first in the service of our Lord and Master was a helpful thought for those turning homeward to face duties of the year after the days of consideration of them.

Mrs. Edmundson moved that each delegate present during the year write to some branch which had no representation in this convention telling them of the privilege they had missed and urging sending a delegation to the meeting of next year. This was unanimously adopted.

The Committee on Findings reported through the Chairman, Miss May Kyser. The findings were adopted and ordered filed.

It was announced that the offerings at the meeting amounted to \$21.00. The President asked what should be done with this offring. It was moved by Mrs. Munds that this sum be used for the expenses of the Convention including an appropriate gift for Dr. McRae. It was so voted.

The report of the Courtesy Committee was called for and was read by Mrs. Steele Black, Chairman. The concurrence of the body in thanks to our hostesses and the local and Convocational

committees was signified by a standing vote and the report was ordered filed.

The minutes were read and approved.

The President then declared the Forty-fourth annual meeting duly adjourned.

One more delightful hospitality was that of the luncheon in the Parish House which followed. This was the offering of the Huntsville Branch and the Scottsboro Branch.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT
Review of the Year's Work

At this time it behooves me as your representative to report those things done by me in your name during this year for this work that we all love so dearly, love because it furnishes the means by which every woman of the Church may serve the Church in all its general work and seeks to help every Church woman realize the privilege of such service. Before I begin this review, I wish to acknowledge here before you the very gracious support rendered by the various officers and chairmen. They have not only discharged the duties of their offices but have responded nobly to every outside call, leaving no doubt in my mind at any time of a loving zealous co-operation. I would include in this the Bishop's never failing help and advice in every doubtful moment and every clergyman's response to our work whenever called upon,—and you as members have spread figurative flowers in my pathway and are ever-ready to answer the calls put upon you. It is indeed a joy to be your presiding officer.

It is with a deep sense of loss that I record officially the resignation of two officers,—Miss Bessie Bouchelle, our dearly loved Treasurer of the House of Happiness Maintenance Fund and also more recently the resignation of Mrs. J. C. Long, our Educational Secretary. We regret the necessity of their resignations; We have been fortunate and congratulate ourselves that Mrs. W. L. Stevens of Tuskegee, has accepted charge of the Maintenance Fund, and Miss Elizabeth Freeland of Anniston, has consented to carry on our educational program.

This year it has been my privilege to be the guest of four of the Spring Conferences. I feel that these one-day meetings are a growing factor in the development of fellowship and inspiration in our Auxiliary work and through my years of experience looking backward, I perceive their broadening and deepening influence.

As your President, I have been asked to serve as the Diocesan Counsellor for the Y. P. S. L. and early in June went with the local leaguers to Camp McDowell and for eight days, I competed with the youngest of them in enjoyment and profit and had the great pleasure of leading Mrs. Schroeter's class of thirty young girls for her on the subject, "My Life Problems." In September, I again went with the Diocesan League to their annual convention at Camp Cosby, Birmingham, and enjoyed the educational advantages of contact with them in their pleasure and in their work. In August, I attended the Sewanee Summer Conference and Training School for Church Workers. Our Scholarship representative will tell you more specifically of that in her report. Our own Bishop was the President this session, there was a large Alabama delegation of which we were very proud. In September, I attended the Provincial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of which I shall be privileged to speak to you later. I have not kept an account of the letters written you individually during the year, but since the three-cents postage stamp came into use, it seems to me that I have found more to write you about than ever before. Four times during the year, assisted by the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Beale, I have sent an Auxiliary letter to each of the seventy-seven parish branches.

And now what shall we say of the results of this year's work? The figures on the reports show a shrinkage. Neither you nor I are willing to subscribe wholeheartedly to such a statement in that our hopes and efforts and aims are included in such a charge, but we cannot deny the evidence of the figures. It is true that our reports show far more than a ten per cent cut; but in analyzing your work, I find that what you have done has been well done and good, the best that circumstance allows. "And Angels could no more." The year is passed. We are facing new issues and are called upon in all seriousness and soberness of purpose to make this the best and happiest year of our forty-four years of existence. So let us each say to our in-most spirit, "Awake, my soul, stretch every nerve and press with vigor on; a heavenly race demands our zeal and an immortal crown." In football parlance, I think it is said "A touchdown is the result of desire." Let us make this a year of brilliant touchdowns, born of a burning desire to help the Church in the Diocese of Alabama to function to the fullest, both in our own borders and even to the uttermost parts of the earth as a loving, loyal witness to the living Christ. A few years ago, a disastrous earthquake shook the Church's possessions in Japan to destruction. The courageous message that came from Bishop McKim was, "All destroyed, but Faith in God." Within the month the Island of Porto Rico has suffered the se-

verest of the many tornadoes by which it is often visited. Our faithful missionary there, Rev. A. H. Beers, had just returned that day from his first leave of absence after many years of service. He was appalled to see his Church of St. Gabriels and his home at Consuela in total destruction, but his message to the Bishop was, "Can we get any help? We will pull out of this by God's help." Does it remind you of St. Paul's much quoted utterance, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." When we asked all officers at our Executive Board meeting this spring if we should reduce our budget for another year the response sounded from every quarter with emphasis, "No increase, but no retreats." When I asked the Bishop for a slogan, he promptly said, "Go Forward." With that slogan, we have adopted the Watchword, "Jesus shall reign." Our budget remains the same and our activities are planned to accomplish the same as heretofore.

Early in August, I sent out to every Branch a Program entitled, "Do you know?" It was intended as a basis of preparation and information for the Every Member Canvas to stimulate understanding and investigation by the women of the Church. I asked that the Communion service of the first Sunday in October be used as a preparation for this study. The recent issue of the Alabama Churchman and the recent meeting of the National Council answers in latest form many of the questions of the August questionnaire. I urge you now to keep St. Andrews Day as a day of re-dedication—a quiet day of intercession in all of our branches. Let it be a time to consider and consecrate ourselves anew to the work before us in this whole year and more especially for the spiritual issues of a well conducted canvas. Let courage, confidence, loyalty, courtesy, intermixed with appreciation and understanding transform this from a work of drudgery to a work of love, sustained by faith and prayer. We are pledged as an Auxiliary within the Church, to this, for the General Church and also to our Bishop in the Diocese and to rectors in the parishes. This is the first work we are called on to perform. Let us do our full part.

During my term of office, I have tried to become acquainted and to visit all of our outstanding missions. On our homeward trip from Camp McDowell we visited the Seamon's Institute, the Wilmer Training School, and the Anna Lee Fitts Memorial Library and the Church Home, which I had done before. But we also stopped at Atmore and through the courtesy of Rev. Mr. Edwards and Mrs. Macey, we met several of the Indian families and talked with Dr. Macy's little boy patient, whose infected leg, he saved for him. We saw the new chapel called St. Annas in

honor of Mrs. Macy and the other new mission chapel St. John, both of them completed last year. Connected with them is (to be developed) a recreational woodland park of twelve acres. This work has been established since 1931; 23 have been baptised, 39 confirmed and one licensed to preach. They are loyal friends of Mrs. Macy and Mr. Edwards. The houses were well kept and flowers and children peeped from every window. The men are strong and stalwart and the girls timid and pretty. I recommend a visit to them as an interesting experience. Mrs. Macy is no longer a U. T. O. worker; she has a small pension, but is dependent on us entirely for boxes for her work. She urges that we remit to her as promptly as possible for her work as these people depend on her and Mr. Edwards for justice and kindly treatment.

I recommend to you co-operation and organization of Y. P. S. L. among your young people. I suggest that each branch organize the Pre-school work for little children in each parish. Information on this subject can be secured through the Department of Religious Education and it will make especial appeal to the younger matrons of our Woman's Auxiliary. An outstanding work before us is the further enlisting of young women and the urging them forward to leadership in our glorious work. They have so much to give, the work has so much to help and interest them and also needs so much their energy, initiative and joyousness.

We have much to be thankful for in the steadfast interest and contribution of service given us by the Business Women and by the League of the Isolated. In several dioceses the work of the Isolated has been derived by parish branches by forming units of those isolated in parish, of shut-ins, invalids, and people who admit elderliness—and those unable to attend meetings. There are many ways of retaining their active membership and making them happy and interested in the work of the Auxiliary through prayer and gifts, and study.

You will hear from the House of Happiness in Miss Martin's report. For fear she will not stress the Maintenance Fund which has been one of our chief joys and prides—I call attention to a shrinkage up to June 15th and am sorry to say our new Treasurer, Mrs. Steevns has less than our full amount during the summer months.

You may have been told that the publication of the Prayer leaflet has been discontinued as has also the Church at Work. We hope the Churchman's Daily Calendar of Scripture Readings is to continue; neither news of its publication nor copies have been made public so far, and also the Missionary Calendar could not be published this year.

I hope we will succeed in maintaining stronger departments of publicity and of Social Service; they need more adequate definition and objective—and each parish branch is expected to develop these during this Triennium. The Department of Publicity in our Auxiliary has to do especially with increasing the use of the Spirit of Missions and other Church papers.

In closing I make a recommendation that provision be made for the expense of Diocesan delegates to Triennial meetings, especially the President. There should be **annual provision** in our budget goal for this purpose and also for the Provincial meetings.

I also recommend that five delegates to the Triennial be elected by the Auxiliary in the annual session preceding the Triennial and that the representatives to the Provincial Auxiliary be elected each year in which the meeting is held at the annual meeting preceding the Provincial meeting of that year, the Convocations to be allowed to nominate to the annual meeting their candidates as chosen in the Spring conferences.

There should be more assistance to all officers in postage and means for carrying on the work. There will be a resolution offered for provision for a library or libraries to which I hope you will give thoughtful consideration.

A little later in discussion of Provincial activities, I shall explain what we will hope will be our largest undertaking of this year. I hope no one will leave this convention without thoroughly understanding these plans.

And now I close, as I began, wishing for you a happy useful year of service. May God bless us in this work with a sense of His Presence and Companionship that in the strength of it, we may walk as the children of light.

LETTER OF GREETING FROM MRS. CAIN, PROVINCIAL PRESIDENT

My dear Mrs. Wilson:

As the women of Alabama assemble for the Convention my love and thought are with you and with them. It is a great disappointment to me not to be with you; but I console myself with the remembrance that through the Provincial meeting in Alabama in 1933 I shall have the opportunity to come to your Diocese and, I hope, to meet many of the women of the Alabama Branch.

Through the National Office we have been offered a wonderful opportunity to strengthen and enlarge the work of the women of the Church within this Province and I am sure that the women of the Alabama Branch will be eager to share in it. The project has two distinct features:

1. During the period from January first to June first all of

the Field Secretaries from the National Office of the Auxiliary and possibly some other workers will come into the Province; one worker will be allotted to each Diocese for a period of about two weeks during which she will be available in the Parishes to be used in any way that will help to strengthen the work of the women of the Church.

2. During the year four training institutes for the leaders will be held within the Province; at each of the four, courses of instruction will be given by Miss Lindley, Miss Marston, Miss Beardsley and Mrs. Wade. To these institutes each Diocese is permitted to send twenty women, leaders or potential leaders who wish and need special training; they will be entertained by the hostess Parish but must pay their own transportation. It is suggested that groups of four or five organize motor parties and thus cut down the cost of attendance. Each Institute will last for three days. The women who are to be offered the opportunity to attend the Institute will be selected by the Bishop and the president of the Diocesan Auxiliary, in consultation.

Yesterday morning, at the early Celebration of the Holy Communion I made special Intercession for you. I know that these days together will bring you much for the enriching of life through worship, through fellowship and through the sharing of plans and achievements; I wish for you Godspeed in all your endeavors. Because I cannot be with you may I offer a very brief special message for your consideration? It is this:

Every thought and every act of every Churchman every hour of every day—that is the program of the Church; what we think and do today is what the Church of our time believes and does for the world; and we as individuals shall not be fulfilling our part in that program until we recognize the whole of life as an opportunity for the extension of Christ's Kingdom through personality.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOUSE OF HAPPINESS

October, 1931—October, 1932

“Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.”

Nine years ago the House of Happiness was founded on faith. The Bishop has called it, “A venture of faith.” Times like these test one’s faith more than one’s courage, but the past year has tested our faith and courage. We have not known from one month to the other what our allowance would be, yet have not hesitated when duty called. Necessarily there have been cuts, reductions and curtailments, but every phase of the work has been carried on. The Arts and Crafts Department has suffered most as there has been no funds with which to purchase material.

The last of September, we are compelled to give Miss Barnwell up as there was no available funds for her salary. Heretofore, the worker has taught the public school and Miss Barnwell received the money supplemented by The Faith Fund. While our faith has not wavered, the fund has been exhausted since early September.

We suffer a great loss by the resignation of our very capable and faithful treasurer, Miss Bouchelle. Mrs. W. L. Stevens of Tuskegee, has taken over the work and is most interested and enthusiastic.

The County Superintendent told us there would be no summer school as usual, as there was no money available. When the crops were laid by the worker volunteered to teach a volunteer school. The children came—65 strong. This was too many for one teacher, so we changed the name to a Cooperative Work and Play School. We kept one group out playing while the older pupils and the teachers struggled with others. The school was quite a success and both pupils and teacher regretted when it closed.

The daughter of one of our neighbors came home on a visit, and developed a malignant case of typhoid fever. It was impossible for the worker to teach and care for the fever patient properly and deciding that health was more important than school we closed the school. The Advent Hospital bed with necessary bedding and equipment, a hot water bottle, glass tubes, etc., were promptly taken to the house of the client. The worker spent every other night in the home and made two visits every day. It was discovered that the family had no wash pan and no dish pan and other necessary utensils. The House of Happiness furnished these, also brought groceries from the Red Cross to help supply the family. Out of the kindness of their hearts, the neighbors flocked in to "sit up" and always eat one or two meals with the family.

The County Health Officer at the request of the worker held a clinic at the Community House. 300 persons took the shot.

After seven weeks our client recovered. The school reopened and was taught by our volunteer worker. It was suspended again and will open for the winter term November 1.

We have from our family two boys in Berry School, two in Auburn, my own protege in the University of Virginia, 1 girl in Sophia Newcomb, two girls at the Alabama Vocational School and three boys at the Jackson County High School. With the exception of my boy who has the scholarship at the University of Virginia, we have been unable to make any definite arrangements for the first semester and the fees are yet unpaid. The Y. P. S. L. has assumed the responsibility of financing one of our boys at Auburn after the first of January. It has been difficult for us to even obtain the necessary books for our boys in high school. They need clothing, too. Our girls need sweaters.

It was our privilege to have had as a volunteer helper this past summer, Flora Mitchel (Decatur's own daughter) who was awarded the Birmingham News scholarship. She is an excep-

tional girl and I feel that the scholarship could have been awarded to no one more deserving.

Our social service cases are of the usual nature—poverty, distress, and broken homes. We have been unable to give the necessary help in many cases. Our clothes storeroom is practically empty. The House of Happiness gave generously to the cyclone victims. The worker was one of the Relief Committee. The church car was in constant use.

We have from six to ten calls for help almost daily. Our policy is not to pauperize our clients. It is most difficult to provide work.

The attendance at Sunday School has decreased. Many of our little children are crying to come but have not sufficient clothing. There is one man in the valley who will not permit his children to come to Sunday School. The House of Happiness gave them milk when we had it in abundance. We told them to come at 2:30 every afternoon—the hour of Sunday School.—We did not give them the milk until Sunday School closed. By this plan the children could attend.

The House of Happiness has lost a number of its good friends and liberal contributors, among whom are, Mrs. C. M. Beckwith, Mrs. V. B. Atkins, Mrs. C. A. Swift, Mr. John Will Payne, Mr. R. S. Skelton, Mrs. K. C. Rembert, Dr. B. J. Baldwin, and Dr. Boyd. Dr. Hugh Boyd adopted us as his special charge when the work was first established. He gave gladly of his services and always said that it was a privilege to do so. He operated on one of our older boys, for appendicitis, the day before he died, came to take the stitches out. He made us a regular visitation. He walked all over the house and seemed to enjoy it. It was just before lunch hour and he sat down in the kitchen and talked to the worker a long time about death. In the death of each of our friends we have sustained a great loss but we will feel the loss of our dear Doctor more than any of them.

The past summer the worker completed her course in the University at Madison, Wis., and received her R. F. Degree—Doctor of Rural Philosophy. Philosophy spelled with a "F." I wish to thank each member of the Woman's Auxiliary for the wonderful privilege they have given me in assisting me to take the University course. I am justly proud of my certificate in Rural Leadership.

In all of our undertakings we have felt the force of the prayers of the church, especially those of the Woman's Auxiliaries who have taken us as their prayer-partners. We will strive to go forward with renewed hope and faith.

Faith is needed all the way,

Faith to toil and faith to pray,
 Faith to learn and faith to teach,
 Faith to practice, faith to preach,
 Faith to start each day anew,
 Faith to do our duty, too;
 Faith to help the weak along,
 Faith to bear, in patience, wrong;
 Faith to smile though sad within,
 Faith to conquer every sin;
 Faith to ask Him for His care,
 While we earthly trials bear;
 Faith to smother every sign,
 Faith to live and faith to die.

CHURCH HOME IN MOBILE
Report of Deaconess Whitford

This year, instead of sending my report, I am having the privilege of bringing it and the pleasure of telling you how deeply we at the Home appreciate all that you Women of the Auxiliary have done and are doing for us at the Home.

We had to cut our budget last year, which meant letting some of our workers go and reducing the salaries of others. Everybody went to work with a cheerful heart and a will to do the best. All of us had to "double up" in our work. God did not forget us, however, but put it into the hearts of three splendid women to offer their services to help in the care of His little ones.

Mrs. Redd came to us from Trinity Church, Mobile, to supervise the laundry and so relieve Sister Belle, who is no longer able to bear the entire burden of the work.

Miss Lida Holt, from the Church of the Ascension, Montgomery, is doing a splendid piece of work as my assistant, in fact if it were not that she is carrying on my work at the Home, I would not be able to be here today.

Miss Mary Alves is the latest addition to our volunteer workers. She is assistant to the house-mother, Miss Mary Redd, in the boy's cottage. The work is new to her but she is making fine progress in it.

Besides our three volunteers, we have five other workers. Deaconess Whitford, matron; Miss Mary Redd, housemother for the boys; Mr. Walter Alves, who has charge of the out-door life and general discipline of the boys. Miss Keller, housemother for the small girls and Miss Mildred Sewell, her assistant. This gives us a total of eight members on our staff of workers.

We have fifty-eight children in the Home now. Their ages ranging from six to nineteen years. Thirty-nine of these are girls and nineteen boys. Eleven girls and three boys go to High School. Three girls, through the kindness of friends, are taking music lessons.

Our equipment is in a very bad condition. We are needing

mattresses, bed linen, table linen, towels, dishes and silverware, badly.

May I express my personal thanks for the cooperation that the Woman's Auxiliary has given me in the work that I am trying to do for these underprivileged children of our Heavenly Father. Without your help and encouragement I could have done very little and so I am grateful for this help.

EDUCATIONAL REPORT

The year 1931-32! What a privilege it was to reap the harvest of the inspiration gained by our leaders who attended the General Convention in Denver.

As a result, the field of religious Education was broadened.

The Program of Service for 1931-32 which was prepared by our Diocesan President, with the assistance of the Woman's Auxiliary Educational Secretary had for its theme, that of the National Program, "Building a Christian Nation." In addition to this theme, branches were requested to include "The Teaching Mission," and to prepare, by prayer and study, for the Conferences to be held with specially trained leaders. These were held at various places in the Diocese.

When the Woman's Auxiliary meetings were resumed last October a report card was sent to all branch Educational Secretaries, with a request for the past year's work in religious education, to be reported. Although spiritual growth cannot be dealt with by statistics the progress of the branches can be estimated by these replies.

Among the definite pieces of work accomplished in the field of religious education in the Diocese of Alabama, were the sale of Churchman's Calendars of daily Bible readings, and the Woman's Auxiliary text books, "Building a Christian Nation," arrangement for the sale of the Church Missionary Calendars, and distribution of religious educational literature at the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Anniston. This was made possible by the co-operation of Mr. Frank Pfau of the Book Store, of the National Council, 10 Church Mission's House. The books and Daily Bible Reading Calendars having been sent by him on consignment.

The late Miss M. E. Avery of Philadelphia, gave her enthusi-

astic support by sending the Church Missionary Calendars on consignment. The Anniston Chairman, who accepted the responsibility of this work, reported that all books were purchased and all calendars were sold before Christmas.

A Missionary Pageant was sponsored and directed at the annual meeting by the Educational Secretary of St. Michael's and All Angel's branch.

The work of the Woman's Auxiliary branches among the negroes has been promptly reported with requests for additional suggestions for religious educational work.

For my successor, I crave your prayerful interest in this service of the Master, thus carrying forward the aims and ideals of the Woman's Auxiliary in the field of religious education.

REPORT ON ALABAMA INDIAN WORK

From a Letter From Mrs. Macey

Since May, 1931, there have been 24 adults baptized and one infant and 36 confirmations. Financially, from October, 1931, to October, 1932, Woman's Auxiliary gifts from parish branches and individuals has approximated \$22.25. The two Church Schools for our Indians have given enough to purchase their literature and to take care of the expenses of these schools. St. John's has about sixty members and St. Anna's about forty. Together they gave enough for sixty-two five-cent dinners for children in Porto Rico. We do a great deal of house-to-house visitation, considering the long distances and bad roads and trails.

We face every kind of case increasing in number as the depression continues. Sickness, much of it from undernourishment and worry, is rife. In some cases our Indians are losing their houses because the owners are having to put their sons and daughters into the wretched shacks.

Pray for us, that we may be able to carry on and give to us what you can, for our people need it terribly, as you know. We need layettes and clothing and bedding and as always, funds.

REPORT OF GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

All Saints' Church, Mobile

The Girl's Friendly Society of All Saints' Church, Mobile, was organized in 1919, and since that year has had an unbroken record of fellowship and service.

It is a member of the National organization of the Girls' Friend-

ly Society, there being 1,200 branches throughout the United States, Japan and Porto Rico, with a total membership of approximately 46,000 girls.

The Society is a non-sectarian organization, sponsored by the Episcopal Church, its object being to unite women and girls in a fellowship of prayer and service for the upholding of the highest standards of Christian womanhood. It endeavors to reach every girl at as early an age as possible, that she may be led to pledge herself to strive for the best things in life, spiritual, intellectual, physical and social, and to help her attain them.

The unit at All Saints' Church is the only branch in Mobile. Meetings are held in the Girl's Friendly room of the Parish House every Thursday afternoon during the Winter months, from 5:30 until 7:30 o'clock, one hour being set aside for the serving of supper, and "social," a short business session and program following.

We are very proud of the work we accomplished last year before discontinuing our meetings on June 1st. One of the outstanding events each year is our Christmas tree and party to the children of the Church Home a few days before Christmas, and last year we also included the children of the Protestant Orphanage, making a total of about 120 guests. The program consists of games, Christmas stories and carols, and of course, the distribution of gifts from the tree. (During the year we maintain a Christmas Savings Club especially to finance this party.)

Another annual event is a Mothers' Party at Thanksgiving time, and a Thanksgiving remembrance of fruit and other good things to the old ladies of the Benevolent Home.

Other work for last year included:

Assistance in serving the Annual Parish Supper; generous donations to both civic "Food Conservation Campaigns"; four juvenile memberships to the Library; financial assistance to a needy family through the Family Welfare Bureau.

Unusual good work and co-operation of members in reaching the hundred dollar goal set for our Easter offering to the Church, and, last but not least, our milk fund for several undernourished school children. We have been carrying on this work for the past two years.

Annual May Day party for the Church Home children. (This consists of games, a musical program, and "refreshments"—at the "Home.")

Needless to say, most of these activities cost **money**, and our funds are raised through bridge parties, food sales, Christmas cards, and various other ways, each girl doing her share of the work.

We have Bible study classes and are trying to learn the promises contained therein. Never before has the opportunity been so great for His followers. to make Him known. Weary, disheartened men and women who have battled with unemployment, hunger and illness, look to us to point the way.

The Daughters are commissioned to re-dedicate themselves, and claim the promise, "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come unto you, and ye shall be witnesses unto Me, both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

It is the power of love, the power of compassion that we seek.

Let us join with you and be co-workers in the Master's vineyard.

May God's richest blessing descend upon your meeting and may

the power of His Holy Spirit guide you in all of your deliberations.

After lunch, Mrs. Battle Searcy, of Tuscaloosa, made a talk on the Advance Work, and asked the Auxiliary to give 35c per capita towards this, which would make up the \$500 for Alabama, this to go towards Kenneth Morris' building fund.

Miss Peter, of Montevallo, said the work among the college girls was growing, and that now there were eighteen girls organized.

Mrs. Gus Pope, of the Advent, Birmingham, gave a report of the splendid work being done among the business girls, and reported eleven branches in the state.

Mrs. Burgess spoke on the terrible need of the Church Mission of Help at the present time, and asked the Auxiliary to try to get it on a membership basis for financing.

Mr. Bland Mitchell, of St. Mary's, Birmingham, gave an interesting talk on the Emergency Fund of \$5,000 which the state is trying to raise by Whit Sunday.

Mrs. Albert Wilson spoke of the maintenance fund of the House of Happiness, and reported at the end of six months, the fund was \$121 short. The offering of the day was voted to go towards this deficit.

An interesting letter was read by Mrs. Wilson from Mr. Morris on the advance work being done in Kyoto.

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF "THE GIFT OF LIFE COMMITTEE" TO THE ANNUAL DIOCESAN MEET- ING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

October, 1932.

Jesus said to the Apostles, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." Is this not also a command to you and me? This command for a great majority of us, may mean to help to send someone whom God elects to go into the uttermost parts of the earth, but for us personally to preach the Gospel, by our lives, where we are. This is no lesser service; BUT,

In all of our parishes there are young people just beginning to make plans for their life-work. Are we giving them the oppor-

tunity to consider some phase of Church work as a field of service? Or, are we leaving this to someone else?

From our National Department of Missions comes the following statement and plea: "Though it is still a time of financial uncertainty, so that we do not know how many missionaries we can appoint, we desire to keep before you the probable needs of the foreign field." In China and Japan there is a great need for evangelistic workers; also, in Osaka, Japan a nurse is needed with wide experience in Public Health work for St. Barnabas' Hospital; in Liberia a primary teacher is wanted for the House of Bethany, the school for girls at Cape Mount; and, in the Philippines there is a need for two nurses, young women who have had thorough experience in the nursing field following graduation.

Let us remember that we can help in finding these workers and let us determine that every young person with whom we come in contact shall at least know of the Church's needs and the opportunities for service.

Christ said, "men ought always to pray, and not to faint" and "all things whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive." If we believe this, then let us "pray without ceasing" for workers needed in our Mission Fields. Let us remember this in our Auxiliary meetings and in our private devotions.

Can we not in our parish branches consider the plan of a scholarship fund for girls who have heard the call to service in the Church and yet are unable financially to complete their education. The Church should and does seek to maintain the highest possible standards as to education, professional training and experience and we must do our part to uphold these standards too.

Recruits must come from our young people or our younger adults, so our greatest source of supply will come from our Young People's organizations. Let us acquaint ourselves with the young people of our parish.

CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.
2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely Parish, Community, Diocese, National and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.
3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.
4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian, United Thank Offering Secretary, Educational Secretary,

Secretary Supply Department, Custodian Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.

5. The President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled to serve a term of three years and shall be eligible for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees.

7. The Recording Secretary shall write the minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the annual report for the printer.

8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by the Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meetings.

9. "A chairman for each Convocation, who shall have been nominated by a committee nominated at the preceding meeting shall be elected by the Convocation at the spring conference preceding the election of Diocesan officers, to serve three years, her term of office to be co-existent with that of the incoming President. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Chairman to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board."

10. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

11. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

12. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

13. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

14. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

15. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

16. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
