

FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH, DIOCESE OF ALABAMA ALL SAINTS CHURCH, MOBILE, OCTOBER 17-19, 1933

On Tuesday afternoon, October 17, at four o'clock, the Forty-Fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Alabama, met in the Parish House of All Saints Church, Mobile, Ala., Mrs. Albert F. Wilson, President, calling the meeting to order promptly. Dr. Bridges, Rector, invoked the Divine blessing on the deliberations of the Auxiliary. The Auxiliary then sang Christ for the World We Sing, the theme for the annual meeting and for the year being, Christ for the World. Dr. Bridges cordially welcomed the Diocesan Auxiliary in the name of All Saints Church. He was followed by Mrs. Donald Ogden, President of All Saints Auxiliary, and Mrs. Platt Roberts, Chairman of the Mobile Convocation, who spoke in the name of all the branches of the Mobile Convocation, thus making the Auxiliary thrice welcome. Response to these greetings was made by the President, expressing the appreciation of all for the careful and thoughtful preparations made by the hostess parish and branches for a pleasant and valuable annual meeting. At the same time Mrs. Wilson presented a short Presidential Address—Looking Backward, over the forty-four years of the life of the Woman's Auxiliary in Alabama and dwelling especially on the conventions which have been held in Mobile.

Roll call followed showing the presence of delegates from twenty branches and delegates and visitors to the number of eighty.

The President announced the Convention Committees as follows:

Credentials: Mrs. Seawell of Montgomery, Mrs. McCall of Mobile, Mrs. A. R. Smith of Demopolis.

Rules: Miss Freeland, Anniston.

Courtesies: Mrs. E. E. Cobbs of Montgomery, Mrs. Penhallagon of Birmingham.

Resolutions and Findings: Mrs. Hardee Johnston of Birmingham, Miss May Kysar of Carlowville, Mrs. F. R. Hodges of Decatur, Miss Annie Hobdy of Union Springs, Mrs. M. M. Duncan of Huntsville, Mrs. Frank Inge of Eutaw.

The Convention program was then presented to the Assembly by Mrs. J. B. Jones, making the motion that it be accepted as the

order of business for the meeting. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Platt Roberts and was adopted.

Greetings from the Daughters of the King were presented by Mrs. Elsie Barnett of Mobile; from the Girls' Friendly by Mrs. Sextus Smith of Mobile; and from the Young People's Service League by the President of the League, Mr. Marshall Sieffert of Mobile.

The afternoon session closed with an interpretation of the Woman's Auxiliary by the Executive Board and the delegates and visitors. This included a simple pageant in which the President impersonated the Woman's Auxiliary and Board members took the part of Love, Service, and Prayer, and the group took part in the hymns, prayers, and responses. After benediction, pronounced by Bishop McDowell, the Auxiliary adjourned the afternoon session.

Evening service was conducted at seven-thirty in All Saints Church, by the Reverend Dr. Bridges, Rector, with full vested choir. Two speakers were presented, Mrs. Jessie Daniell Ames of Atlanta, Georgia, of the Inter-Racial Commission, and Mrs. William R. Lamb, of New Orleans, member of the Christian Social Service Department of the Province of Sewanee. Mrs. Ames spoke for fifteen minutes on the common problem of every state in the South due to the fact that two races unequal in racial background, education, and economic strength must live side by side. Referring to the missionary enterprise of the Church in countries of other than the white race she said that we could not go to them free to interpret the love of Jesus if in our own land the minority race is treated with injustice and cruelty. She referred to the organized campaign now being made against lynching among the white women of the South where in three years 16,000 white women have expressed themselves in writing as opposed to lynching for any cause. Following Mrs. Ames, Mrs. Lamb gave a thoughtful and inspiring address on the Day of Quiet Prayer. Using as her theme, the parable of the loaves and fishes which miraculously sufficed for the needs of the multitude when placed at the disposal of our Lord, she lead us to see this Day of Prayer as a time when we could bring all we have to lay at the feet of the Master praying Him to use all our resources of mind, body, and soul to satisfy the needs of a suffering world. She left with us a suggestion that our preparation for this Quiet Day on November 11th should begin with the Holy Communion on the first Sunday in November when we should go to the Altar with a definite intention for the spirit of prayer and that we should then keep this motive foremost in our hearts and prayers throughout the week.

At the close of the service, the congregation repaired to the Parish House where the motion picture films of the Reverend Kenneth Morris and his work at the Church of the Resurrection in Kyoto, Japan, were shown. These proved to be of real interest in themselves as well as from the fact that our payments on the quota for his salary is one of the most popular of our missionary endeavours.

Wednesday morning, October 18th, the Woman's Auxiliary day was opened with its annual Corporate Communion, this being celebrated in All Saints Church by the Bishop with the assistance of the Rector, Reverend Dr. Bridges. At this time the Auxiliary was privileged to hear the sermon of our beloved Bishop, his text being taken from the epistle for the Day—St. Luke's—"Make full proof of thy ministry." In speaking of the Auxiliary, the Bishop spoke of the honored and important place it holds in the work of the Church and expressed his personal sense of gratitude to the retiring officers who seemed to have honestly tried to make full proof of their ministry. He thanked the Auxiliary for the support of the Church's program in all five fields of service. He charged the Auxiliary to be faithful in two lines of discipleship—a. the life of personal devotion to the needs of the individual and to the will of the Father, strengthening the prayer life for this purpose of a more successful personal ministry, and b. our life of cooperative service and corporate endeavour in which the Woman's Auxiliary expresses its following of the Master who called into being His Church so that we might be one in Him and share in the corporate effort of the Kingdom. Closing his address the Bishop told of Miss Martin, on furlough because of illness, who seemed in health and in sickness fully to have proved her ministry. At this time, the names of those faithful members of the Woman's Auxiliary who during the year have been taken from their earthly labors was read and laid upon the altar with the Communion Alms.

At ten A.M., the business session of the morning was called to order in the Parish House, after the saying together of the Woman's Auxiliary Prayer and the recitation of the Creed. The President, Mrs. Wilson, being in the chair, the minutes were read of the day previous and approved. The roll was called, showing the arrival of a number of delegates and visitors from various parts of the Diocese. Mrs. Platt Roberts, was recognized by the chair to make announcement of the luncheon hospitality. Mrs. Hiram Austen, one of the most faithful and efficient of Mobile pioneer workers, was introduced who gave a sweet and lovely expression of affection and hospitality for all the visitors in the name of the Mobile Auxiliary branches.

The Committee on Rules, Miss Freeland, Chairman, reported the following rules, which were adopted for the Convention session:

Recommendations by Committee on Rules:

1. Members are asked to remain throughout all meetings.
2. Delegates are asked to notify the Chairman of Credentials of their permanent withdrawal from the Convention.
3. Delegates shall not be entitled to appoint proxies for voting.
4. A delegate shall be limited to ten minutes as a maximum time for presenting a motion which time shall be extensible by unanimous consent of the meeting.
5. A delegate shall be allowed to speak only once to a motion. This shall not include the author of the motion.
6. A delegate speaking to a motion shall announce her name, her branch, and her convocation.
7. Immediately following a report, the resolutions therein suggested shall be voted on. Miscellaneous resolutions shall be first presented to the Committee on Resolutions.
8. Main motions shall be written and filed with the Secretary.

The Committee on Credentials, Mrs. Seawell, Chairman, reported as follows:

The Rt. Rev. William G. McDowell was recognized by the chair and was asked to make recommendations to the Auxiliary. The following recommendations were made by Bishop McDowell:

That recognizing the great importance of the presidential office in the Woman's Auxiliary in forwarding the Kingdom of God and the difficulty that the organization may be faced with at some time in finding a consecrated available leader for three years with eligibility for re-election that we safeguard our office and offered the following suggestions for study:

1. Preparation for office of President by serving an apprenticeship in a minor office such as the Corresponding Secretaryship, advancement from this to the Vice-Presidency, then to the Presidency, each for a term of one year, but with Past President serving on the Executive Board, so that the Auxiliary may profit by her mature experience.
2. Extension of the power and functions of the Convocational Chairmen to aid Executive Committee, thus saving the strength and

resources of the President and developing greater leadership in the local and convocational leaders.

3. Some financial provision for meeting the expenses of the President's office in the matter of travel and correspondence to meet the opportunities of service of her office.

4. Method. A Committee to be appointed to make a careful study of the proposal throughout this year and to report at the next annual meeting. The change in the constitution if adopted might be made effective three years from now. In the meantime local experiments in such leadership training might be tried in the parish branches.

At the conclusion of the Bishop's recommendations, Mrs. J. B. Jones moved that a committee as suggested by Bishop McDowell be appointed to study the proposed changes and that they report at our next annual meeting. This motion was seconded by Mrs. A. R. Smith and was unanimously adopted.

The report of the Vice-President, Miss Kimball, both as Vice-President, and Chairman of Memorial Gifts, was the next order of business. Miss Kimball, who has served as Chairman of Memorial Gifts, since the work was initiated in 1930, gave a resume of the three years' work. Miss Kimball recommended that the gifts for this year be devoted to the Church of St. John's, Elyton, which had been restored this summer by the Reverend Mr. Fletcher, Missionary to the Deaf, and which is in use for his congregation, this small gift to be applied on needed altar fittings. The report was accepted and filed.

The Chair announced that the offerings at the Corporate Communion were \$22.18.

The report of the Treasurer, Mrs. A. R. Smith, as presented by Mrs. Smith, was received and filed.

The report of the United Thank Offering Custodian, Miss Annie Hobdy, was read, and ordered filed. Miss Hobdy, who has been Custodian for twelve years, received a rising vote of thanks for her long and consecrated service. In the informal remarks she made about the United Thank Offering, she showed a blotter which she had used in her work with a telling little quartrain on it. When asked where she got the blotter, Miss Hobdy said that she got the cut of the blue box decorating it from Tennessee, but that the quartrain was the product of her sister's brain.

The report of the Educational Secretary, Miss Elizabeth Freeland, was read by Miss Freeland, and was filed.

The report of the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Carl Lay, was the next on the program. Because of illness, Mrs. Lay not being able to attend the meeting, the Secretary read her report. It was filed for

the year-book. On motion of Mrs. Jones, the love and appreciation of the Auxiliary for Mrs. Lay were directed to be conveyed to her in a letter from the Secretary.

The noon hour having arrived, Mid-Day Prayers for the Extension of Christ's Kingdom were offered by the Reverend Mr. Kirkchoffer.

The program was suspended at this point in order that the Auxiliary might hear a message from Mrs. William R. Lamb of New Orleans, member of the Christian Social Service Department of the Province. Mrs. Lamb discussed most interestingly the advantages and disadvantages of having a regularly organized department of Christian Social Service in the Diocesan Auxiliary.

At one o'clock the Auxiliary adjourned for luncheon. This was a most delightful feature of the hospitality of the Mobile Branches, served in the very charming social hall of All Saints Parish House.

At two o'clock, the afternoon session of the meeting was opened with prayer offered by Deaconess Whitford.

The report of the League of the Isolated, Mrs. E. L. James, Chairman, was read and filed.

The report of the Recording Secretary, Mrs. Brevard Jones, followed. This was both a report of her own service, as Recording Secretary, and Editor, and also included a tabulated statement of the activities of all departments of work, copies of which were distributed among the delegates. The report was accepted with a vote of thanks.

Greetings from the Bishop's Chapter of the Daughters of the King, Mrs. Frank Thigpen of Montgomery, Chairman, were read.

At this time, Miss Kimball, Vice-President of the Auxiliary, was called to the chair while the President made her address, Looking Forward. In this address, Mrs. Wilson presented and discussed the annual Program of Service showing how it was her way of Looking Forward to a fruitful year of Service for the Auxiliary. Looking Forward also to her retirement at the end of six years of service as President, she thanked the Auxiliary officers for their unfailing support, the branches and the members for their confidence in her leadership and for the many courtesies shown her as President while all worked together, each individual contributing of time and effort in the glorious privilege of working for the spread of Christ's Kingdom.

At the close of Mrs. Wilson's address, Miss Kimball suggested that a fitting reception of Mrs. Wilson's farewell address would be a silent prayer of thanks to God for her ministry of service. In accordance with this suggestion the Auxiliary rose and stood with bowed heads for a moment.

At this time, the Rev. Mr. Alves was called to the floor to tell of the work of the Girl's Friendly in helping the rural work using St. Luke's, Seven Hills as the center of their efforts.

The time for the Convocational reports having come, Mrs. Platt Roberts of Mobile Convocation, reported her year's work. By unanimous consent, the reports of other chairmen, none of whom were present, were received and filed without being read.

Mrs. B. J. Baldwin of St. John's, Montgomery, extended an invitation to all members of the Auxiliary to attend the Synod and the meeting of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, the meeting to be held at St. John's Church, Montgomery, November 21, 22, and 23, 1933.

Miss Kimball reported on the year's work for the Annalee Fitts Memorial Library. The report was received and ordered filed.

Deaconess Whitford spoke informally on the Church Home, expressing the gratification of all at the Home for the generous gifts to them during the year, including the shower of linen and other household necessities in the Fall and the renovation of the mattresses in the Spring, besides the many boxes for individual children in the Home.

The Wilmer Training School was the next subject to be presented. The Reverend Mr. Schroeter, in charge of the School, said that for various reasons the school had not functioned during the past year, but that plans had been made to reopen it this year. In speaking of the Bishop Wilmer Memorial Scholarship, he expressed an opinion that it would be productive of greater good if the recipient could be freed from the necessity of providing for herself things needed above the board, which is given by the Home in return for service and the tuition which is paid by the Scholarship. For this year, as the tuition would be given without charge, he would suggest that the sum be divided between two very fine young women who were in a position to take advantage of it, and to use their training for the benefit of the Church.

The Reverend Mr. Edwards spoke of our Diocesan Indian work, first conveying a message of love and of interest from Mrs. Macy.

The recommendations of the Executive Board were presented:

That during the year, 1933-34, special emphasis be placed on the United Thank Offering by officers, branches and individuals to the end that our Triennial Offering next October in Atlantic City shall

be in proportion to the great blessings that have come to us through the knowledge of Christ.

2. That future beneficiaries of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship shall pledge themselves to give precedence to calls for service in the Diocese for as many years as the Scholarship is held.

The President called attention to a letter from our beneficiary of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship, Miss Eva Edwards, at the Philadelphia Training School, expressing her thanks.

Miss Kimball moved that the offering at the Corporate Communion should be applied to the expenses of Convention speakers. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Stevenson and was adopted by unanimous vote.

At the hour of four, the meeting adjourned to attend a tea at the Church Home, where the staff and the children of the Home welcomed the visitors most graciously and the children entertained delightfully with recitations, songs and instrumental music.

7:30 P.M. The Woman's Auxiliary united in Evening Prayer at All Saints Church, the Reverend Mr. Alves conducting the service, which was made beautiful with music. The speaker of the evening was the Reverend M. F. Williams, for three years a missionary on the Yukon in Alaska, but at the present time serving as Student Pastor at the University of Florida in Gainesville. Throughout his address, he referred to the Woman's Auxiliary as his fellow missionaries who had the less interesting part of the missionary enterprise to accomplish. Sketching a background of Alaskan history, he showed how the problems of sin and sickness had materially increased with the rush of white men to the gold fields in the nineties. Then by telling incident after incident, he showed the gallant missionary endeavour on the Yukon as the Church makes a heroic fight against sin and sickness under the banner of Christ to bring to a worthwhile native people, physical and spiritual health.

On Thursday morning, October 19th, in the Chapter House of All Saints Church, the final session of the 1933 meeting took place. The Reverend Mr. Heyes invoked God's blessing on the deliberations of the day. The minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

An interesting feature of the morning was the Round Table on Adult Religious Education lead by the Chairman of Religious Education, Miss Elizabeth Freeland. Speaking of Adult Education she lead us to see that inasmuch as it is always self-education, leaders must be very careful to make the study what the adult in her parish chooses. She recommended the parish leaders should get a copy of the manual on the "Never Failing Light" which has been selected for this year's Lenten study and examine it and then decide whether

it is wise for their local use. The alternative suggestion made was to study one mission field thoroughly, using the Hand-books available for the fields. An informal discussion followed in which reference was made to the plan successfully worked out in Mobile where a consolidated class of the four parishes created great interest.

Miss Alice Shaffer of Mobile spoke on the value of summer conferences for Church workers. She prefaced her remarks by thanking the Alabama Auxiliary for the Sewanee Scholarship which she had enjoyed in the summer of 1933.

Mrs. H. F. Schroeter spoke of the China Conference Fund—a fund originating in Sewanee in the Summer of 1929 among the Alabama group who became much interested in the mission of our Church in China, and especially in sponsoring a summer conference for mission workers associated with Miss Alice Gregg who was that summer in Sewanee, and who had expressed herself as believing that such a conference in far off China would be of great value. The work projected in 1929 had met with the approval of the Sewanee Summer Training School and had been furthered by gifts from Auxiliaries in the Province of Sewanee, so that this year the first of the Summer Conferences in China had been held. Mrs. Schroeter read parts of a letter from Miss Gregg showing the marked success of this meeting in Wuhu which was attended by workers from all three of our China Dioceses and had resulted in a new endeavour in the China field. Mrs. Schroeter moved: That seeing the value of this China Conference, we continue our interest by giving some part of our Communion Alms at each Convocation Conference—\$2.00 as a minimum—to go to the China Conference Fund. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Hayes and was unanimously adopted.

Miss Kimball moved that the Convention send to our former President, Mrs. D. E. Wilson, who was prevented from attending by the illness of her husband, our greetings and regrets at her enforced absence. It was so voted.

On motion of Miss Freeland the Secretary was instructed to send greetings to Dr. Gardner Tucker, whom we missed from our meeting, expressing our earnest hope of his speedy restoration to health.

On motion of Mrs. Orton, the Secretary was instructed to send to Mrs. Charles Henderson, a former President, a message of regret that she could not be with us.

The next feature of the program was the discussion of Branch Problems:

- a. How to Choose Officers—Mrs. J. B. Jones.

b. How to Interest Young Women—Mrs. Steele Black, Mrs. John O. Gill, Mrs. J. E. Hayes, Mrs. Platt Roberts.

c. How to Get Our Money—Delegates from Tuscaloosa, Anniston, Greensboro, St. John's, Montgomery, and Trinity, Mobile.

The next order of business was the election of officers. The Nominating Committee, Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Chairman, presented the following names to be considered for office:

President—Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, St. John's, Montgomery.

Vice-President—Mrs. Donald Ogden, All Saints, Mobile.

Recording Secretary—Mrs. W. E. Willett, St. Mary's, Birmingham.

United Thank Offering Secretary—Mrs. Carl Lay, Holy Comforter, Gadsden.

Treasurer—Mrs. Andrew R. Smith, Trinity, Demopolis.

Educational Secretary—Miss Elizabeth Freeland, St. Michael's, Anniston.

The President read each nominee in turn and called for nominations from the floor. There being no further nominations, Mrs. Schroeter moved that the Secretary be empowered to cast the vote of the Auxiliary for the persons nominated by the Nominating Committee. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Duncan and was unanimously adopted.

The Secretary cast the ballot and the President announced the election of the officers as listed above.

Election of delegates to the Triennial of the Auxiliary in Atlantic City in October, 1934. The following were nominated—Mrs. Donald Ogden, Mrs. Carl Lay, Miss Kimball, Miss Elizabeth Freeland, Mrs. Albert Wilson, Mrs. Brevard Jones, Mrs. Reid Smith.

While the tellers were busy with the ballots for four delegates from the above list, the Committee on Findings presented its report. Mrs. Kimball moved that the recommendations of the Findings Committee be adopted as a whole. This motion prevailed and the findings as filed were adopted.

The election for the delegates to the Triennial resulted in the choice of the following: Mrs. Donald Ogden, Mrs. Albert Wilson, Mrs. Carl Lay, Mrs. Brevard Jones.

The report of the Committee on Courtesies was presented by Mrs. Penhallagon and was adopted as filed.

The hour of noon having arrived, the President called upon the Rev. Mr. Schroeter to offer Noon-Day Prayers and to conduct a meditation.

The final event of the Forty-Fifth Annual Convention was the installation of officers. The Reverend Mr. Bridges conducted the installation service, praying God's blessing on the work of the com-

ing year and His especial guidance for the new officers who then took up the duties of the position to which they had just been chosen.

After Dr. Bridges pronounced the benediction, the Forty-Fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Alabama was formally adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Looking Backward

(On the first day of the Convention, the President responded to the address of welcome, at that time making a short address on Looking Backward.)

It is my joyous privilege to welcome you today for the sixth time to an annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. As we meet here on the eve of the 18th of October we celebrate the sixty-second anniversary of the National Auxiliary of the Protestant Episcopal Church. The Woman's Auxiliary was created by the General Convention of Baltimore on October 18th, 1871. It was called into being by the pressing needs of the Church to supply clothing for missionaries and their families at home and abroad. The need of organization was made evident by the zealousness of Church women all over the country in unsystematic and sporadic fashion, sewing and sending boxes for missionaries in foreign and domestic fields. The Auxiliary—I emphasize—was called into being at the instigation of Bishop Lloyd, then President of the Board of Foreign and Domestic Missions of the Church and by the needs of the work, which women in established, well-regulated groups were qualified to render and from whom auxiliary assistance could be systematically depended on. These groups met in circles for sewing when prayers were said for the missionaries who were to be the recipients of the gifts. Very soon there developed a demand for knowledge of the lives and surroundings and the work of those they were sewing for—thus study was added to the working plan of these groups. Prayer, study, service, gifts—are now as they were then the incentives of all Auxiliary groups and the field, now as then is the whole world.

There has never been a corps of officers or organization in the National Auxiliary,—neither a President or a Treasurer, but only an Executive Secretary and an Executive Board as a connecting link between the National Council and the Diocesan branches. At first the officers in charge of the work in the Dioceses were known as Secretaries, but as the work grew Presidents and Executive Boards were appointed to carry on the work.

Today, I am welcoming the forty-fifth annual meeting; but I have discovered that we are only forty-four years old. Two meetings must have occurred at some time in one year. As our records show that in August, 1889, at the Church of the Holy Comforter, Montgomery, the first Parish Branch was organized. Previously to this a letter dated 1889 had been sent to all the parishes of the Diocese by our beloved Bishop Wilmer in which he said, "Your Bishop is making the most earnest effort to establish a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese. There are few if any of our people who know anything of this benevolent institution of the Church. It embraces branches in nearly every diocese in the United States. Its benefactions have reached the home of nearly every missionary in the United States and have filled them with comfort. Alabama has felt its beneficent influence. It behooves us to fall in line with this movement and not forever be recipients of a bounty which we should share by our cooperation."

Some time during 1889, he appointed Mrs. F. H. Warren and Mrs. F. C. Randolph, both of Montgomery, President and Co-Adjutor. These were our first Diocesan officers. The Diocesan Council of 1890 met in Mobile at Christ Church, at which time official action in approval and commendation of the Auxiliary was taken, and at the Council in Mobile, Mrs. Warren made the first official report of the Woman's Auxiliary. This report showed missionary boxes to the value of \$301.60 had been sent to missionaries and a receipt of \$486.50 in money which had been equally divided between Diocesan and General Missions. Mrs. Warren remained President until 1904—a period of fifteen years in which she and her co-workers laid the permanent foundations of the Auxiliary in this Diocese—which we have inherited—foundations of love, faith, and hope, strengthened by tireless perseverance and endless devotion.

Her equally faithful successors have been Mrs. S. T. McMillan, Anniston, President for five years; Mrs. Frank Stollenwerck, Montgomery, for eight years; Mrs. Charles Henderson, Troy and Montgomery, for four years; Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Woodward, for six years.

The records show that the Woman's Auxiliary has been entertained by the Mobile branches three times since that initial meeting in 1890. These were in May 1910, with Mrs. Ellen Peter Bryce, Vice-President, presiding; in 1916 with Mrs. Frank Stollenwerck presiding; and in 1924 with Mrs. D. E. Wilson presiding.

Perhaps, most of you will recall that until 1927 under Mrs. Charles Henderson, the Woman's Auxiliary met at the same place as the Council, only one day earlier. In the very early days we have no records of Auxiliary meetings for some years, but there was always an annual report to the Council. We cannot but feel through

these forty-four years that God's blessing has been upon this work and He has used us as instruments of service to help make the kingdoms of this earth the Kingdoms of our Lord and His Christ. To Him, our Lord and Redeemer be the praise, the honor, and the glory and thanksgiving forever. Amen.

Looking Forward

(The President, following the Reports of Officers and presenting the annual Program of Service, said in part as follows:)

Bishop Hall of Vermont once called attention to the different lines of work for women as marked out in our earliest volume of Church History. In examining these with him, we shall find that we have seven types of service followed by holy women from the earliest days, types that still exist. The Woman's Auxiliary has striven to abound like Dorcas in sewing for the needy—our Supply Box Work; in alms deeds, like Mary, the mother of Mark; like Lydia, in hospitality; like Phoebe, in journeyings; like Eunice, in mother-care and Christian training of the son in the home; like Priscilla and the daughters of Phillip the Evangelist, in teaching; like Mary, the mother of our Lord, in prayer and submission. May we remember and emulate these types these trying times.

Our special anxiety should be for our future citizenship and the youths of our Church and our homes. It is alarming when we learn that 12,000,000 children in our country are without religious training or affiliation. Are any of these in our Diocese, in your parish, or community? Have we any unfulfilled duty to these? Again we are told that there are at present 15,000,000 people cared for by the Public Relief Administration of whom forty per cent are children under 16 years of age. Above the need of food and shelter an understanding mind must contemplate the heart hunger of expectancy and hope of these developing young people, unrequited and cast down, denied and disappointed. Will bitterness and morbidness be their attitude or will the church establish in them faith to cast their cares upon the Lord, to remember that even the sparrow and the lily are provided for? Can we the women of the Church help in this? Have we a program to meet the needs of the times? Never was there a time when directed Christian social service, Religious Education, and the principles of Evangelism had a more fertile field for cultivation. Are we ready, have we the courage and the vision for applied Christianity? To see this world through the mind of Christ, to practice the social ideals of Christ? What of our Religious Thinking Today, our witness for Christ in Our International Relations, Interracial policies, Economic and Industrial Relations and in our Ideals of our Family Life? Christ in the Modern World

will be the theme for our next Triennial meeting in Atlantic City. In the Quiet Day of Prayer, this theme is the underlying prayer. Do not let that day be fifteen minutes in a church on your knees—take the thoughts and plans home with you and use them in the months to come.

You have heard the reports of these loyal, faithful officers—needless for me to review the work of all the years or of this year, which they have so faithfully performed. What has been done, is done. But before the books are closed over, may I once again express to you, everyone, my dear co-workers, to those here and to those away an inexpressible appreciation, an unbounding gratitude for the privilege of working with you for the cause of Christ and for the Extension of His Kingdom during these six years past? And, now, as we press forward to new things, may the Holy Spirit guide us, keep us, direct us in all our work, and bless us with new vision, courage, and faith for new adventure in Christ's name. Amen.

**REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF MEMORIAL GIFTS,
1932-1933**

Madam President:

In submitting this report at the close of your administration as our most able and beloved President, also the termination of my service as Chairman of Memorial Gifts, I beg leave to report the work of Memorial Gifts during its existence and my incumbency.

The Memorial Roll, and Memorial Gifts were established at the annual meeting held in Montgomery, 1929, the disposition of such gifts to be decided by the Auxiliary Board in executive meeting.

It was decided that the Memorial Gifts for the next year should be presented to the Bishop to go to the Endowment Fund of the Diocese, and that these gifts be presented at the Centennial Meeting of the Council to be held in Christ Church, Mobile, January, 1931.

The amount of Memorial Gifts presented for the Endowment Fund at this Council Meeting was \$282.33 given in memory of 150 beautiful Christian lives.

As before reported, these names were written upon a scroll of hand engrossed parchment tied with a broad ribbon of Auxiliary purple.

This with a check for the sum of the gifts was presented to Bishop McDowell, presiding in Council, for the Endowment Fund of the Diocese.

The Bishop accepted the gift with the statement that it was the first to be received for the fund. He then held a brief prayer

service before the altar holding the Memorial Roll and giving thanks for the example of the lives of those whose names were therein inscribed.

The Memorial Gifts in 1931 were again given for the Endowment Fund of the Diocese and amounted to \$71.30, representing loving and loyal remembrance of 16 beneficent lives and unnamed members passed on. This was presented to the Bishop at the annual meeting of Council in January, 1932.

The Memorial Roll for 1932 held the names of nine loyal workers in the church, a past Diocesan president among them, who had passed on, and remembrance of unnamed members in a plate offering from three Auxiliary branches. These gifts amounted to \$33.15. Again this sum was presented by our President to the Bishop for the Endowment Fund of the Diocese at the time of the annual meeting of Council, January, 1933.

The year 1932-1933 has been one containing stress and strain. There have been so many calls for the support of the living, that though our loved ones gone on have not been less in memory, the call of those with us has come first. With this in mind the Memorial Gifts have not been stressed, and the chairman is thankful to report the following:

In closing her term of office the Chairman wishes to express hope for the hearty continuance of this beautiful sentiment, that not only exerts a leaven in these days of materialism but plants a seed for the future of our beloved church in this Diocese.

**REPORT OF THE MOUNTAIN WORK BY AUGUSTA B.
MARTIN, OCTOBER 1932-OCTOBER, 1933**

The past year has seemed much longer than a period of twelve months, due to my prolonged illness. At the last meeting in Decatur I was really ill and had to leave the meeting early in order to meet an engagement with my doctor. I often think of the words of the old hymn: "As the days may demand, Shall thy strength

ever be." When it was necessary to give up Miss Barnwell I felt that I was unable to face the hardships and duties of the long cold winter alone. However, a young friend of mine volunteered to help teach the school. When, after one month the public school closed for lack of funds, one of our own church girls, Marion Moody of Scottsboro, helped us to conduct a church school which continued to the close of the school year. We prepared and served lunches to between 25 and 30 children every day. It was wonderful to hear them sing the church hymns and say the catechism. Always at study period numbers of them would ask permission to study their catechism.

The Thanksgiving service was conducted with the usual enthusiasm in spite of inclement weather. The check sent by the Primary Department of the Church of the Nativity, Huntsville, enabled us to provide materials for a bountiful dinner. While this was being prepared, by the worker, the 21 little guests in the sun-porch enjoyed repeating the service in which they had just taken part at the Community House, using the little wooden cross that hangs on the chimney as the Processional Cross in their march.

At Christmas the Y. P. S. L. took charge of the tree and program. Gifts and the dinner were provided by our friends in the Diocese, and candy by a friend in New York.

Due to the bitterness of the winter, there was a great deal of sickness and suffering, and the worker was constantly on duty. Because of teaching school, I was unable to do the visiting and social service work during the day, so had to go at night. The House of Happiness furnished medicine and bedding for the sick. Every loan from the bedding diminished our supply, for one or two articles are generally missing when a loan is returned. Either "the cow chewed it" or "somebody took it off the fence." The worker always says, "Well, give me two hens or a bushel of corn," and this is done, but the supply of "kivers" has become very scant. We are looking forward to the Thanksgiving Shower to replenish this supply. We need also some second-hand mattresses to lend, as many of the sick have only most uncomfortable beds.

Our supply of clothing was somewhat limited last winter. I was astonished at the resourcefulness of one of our clients who came to work in a pair of shoes made of the inner tube of a tire. They were bound with black cloth around the top and down the front, where instead of laces, they were tied with strings run through four holes and knotted across the ankles. When asked how she made such a work of art, she replied that she just laid it down and took the sheep shears and cut it out!

Our oldest boy was unable to return to the University of Virginia after Christmas on account of lack of funds, so taught in the

school and helped with the work generally until he was able to get work with the Gulf States Steel Company in Gadsden where he is at present.

After Scott left, his younger brother came to help with the farm work. He is also the Superintendent of the Happy Hollow Sunday School and President of the Y. P. S. L. Although his education is very limited, he has learned to read the service and conduct the meetings unusually well.

Bill, another of our boys, is assisting on the farm of one of our good church women who lost her husband last year. He has been quite a help and comfort to her.

The interest aroused in the older boys and girls of the community in education continues to bear fruit. There are now two Happy Hollow boys at Berry School, a girl at State Teachers College in Florence, and two boys at Auburn. All of these young people are working to make part of their school expenses, and are keeping up with their studies in a remarkable way.

Through the generosity of a Presbyterian friend, Martha Reed, affectionately called Martha-by-the-Day, the oldest daughter of the House of Happiness, now a graduate nurse, came to nurse me during my serious illness last June. It was very gratifying to have her and to learn from experience her great efficiency. Dr. Lynch, my capable physician, spoke very highly of her. I feel too that having her was instrumental in restoring my health.

God has been merciful in sparing my life. I felt the force of the prayers of the church and of my personal friends strengthening me in my struggle for life. Three times the doctor thought that I could not possibly recover. However, not once was I unconscious but was able to direct the work which was efficiently carried on by voluntary workers. The sympathetic spirit of my people was beautiful. They all came to see me, but when told that I could not have anyone in the room except the doctor and nurse, they said, "Well, let me look through the window at her," and many would hold their babies up to see me in the sunporch. When I was able to take chicken broth, they brought me chickens and garden produce. The Huntsville Convocation, several Branches of the Auxiliary and many individual members sent gifts to be used by me personally during my illness, but due to the depleted treasury of the House of Happiness I felt that more would receive benefit if these were placed to the credit of the Maintenance and Faith Funds. One of the most generous gifts was made by our own Mrs. Charles Henderson, and with it came a beautiful tribute to our work with this quotation:

"Higher than the highest Heaven
Deeper than the deepest sea,
Lord, Thy love at last has conquered.
None of self and all of Thee."

The most comforting experience of my illness was the period when, like St. Paul, I was "between heaven and earth." I heard distant music of heavenly strains, and saw as it were, a beautiful mountain gorge with the rays of the setting sun reflecting the loveliest purple glow against its rocky sides. Through this gorge on my right approached a vested choir, an innumerable company, led by an imposing figure who kept his face turned away. On my left, holding my hand, was Lena, one of our clients who had been ill in the Laura Henderson Sunporch all fall and was expecting an addition to her family. She was begging me not to leave her. Behind Lena was all the little children of the Valley singing "There's a Friend for Little Children." I could even distinguish individual voices in the chorus. As the Procession came nearer, the leading figure turned his face to me. It was The Christ! He took my right hand in His and said "Come up higher." I looked at Lena and then back to Him, and said, "You don't want me to leave Lena now, do you? She needs me so much." He smiled and immediately released my hand, and as the Procession receded a short distance, The Master who was the last to go, turned His face to me and smiled again.

Truly this is "The Master's Work."

During my tenure of office as Treasurer for the Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness forty Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, three Convocations, three individuals and the Diocesan Auxiliary have contributed to the Maintenance Fund. The total receipts have amounted to nine hundred and ninety-four dollars and forty-three cents. This amount is less than for several years, but it shows that despite the troublesome times and "Bank Holidays" our women are willing to sacrifice to help this splendid work among the mountain people of our Diocese, and to encourage Miss Martin's noble efforts which have reaped such marked results.

Besides the monetary gifts the Branches of the Auxiliary responded generously to our request for household supplies and clothing for the Fall shower for the House of Happiness.

Numerous letters and postal cards have been written, the expense of these and other postage having been defrayed by your Treasurer as her personal donation to the House of Happiness work. No expense has been charged against the receipts except the Federal tax on checks.

LETTER FROM MISS NETTIE BARNWELL HOUSE OF HAPPINESS

Dear Friends of the Auxiliary:

While I have met in person only a few of you who are now attending the Annual Meeting, I suppose that I have had the pleasure and privilege of recording all of your names in the list of the generous gifts in money and supplies that have been made to the House of Happiness in the several years that I have assisted Miss Martin in this work. So I feel that I may claim you as friends, not only of the Mountain Work, but of your temporary Worker as well, and that I may count upon your aid, as in the past, in the extension of the Kingdom and ministering to the underprivileged Highlanders.

The true value of your gifts was brought home to me in a very touching way only a few days ago. Just the day after Miss Martin left on her vacation, a neighbor's little grandson was stricken first with an abscessed appendix, and then with a severe hemorrhage from the lungs. The doctor was unable to leave another desperately ill patient that night, but gave me directions over the phone as to the medicine and medical supplies needed. Since there is no drug store nearer than eight miles, Miss Martin has always used a part of the Maintenance Fund in keeping on hand continually an emergency medicine chest of the simple remedies. From this I was able to carry the necessary articles to the child. In the dilapidated two-room shack with lean-to kitchen to which I went, twelve persons live, move, and have their being. There is one small window with wooden shutter,—no glass,—in the room where the patient lay, the flies having to be continually brushed away with a small branch. Most of that night I stayed there, carrying out the doctor's directions, until the child's fever was down and he was reasonably comfortable. When the doctor saw him he said that the boy had T. B. We sent one of the House of Happiness cots, so that he would not have to sleep with the others; and since then no day has past without our carrying or sending nourishment, medicine, or something that would make him more comfortable. He is gradually improving. The grandmother says: "The doctor will have to have the pay for his visit when I sell my crop, but if it had not been that Miss Nettie brought the medicine and things the boy needed when she did, he would not have been alive." But the credit really belongs to you, for your gifts made it possible for us to help him.

This is only one of the many cases of sickness in which you have been the instrument of healing. Sickly babies have orange juice, sweet milk and oatmeal given them for weeks at a time to

build up a resistance to disease. Canned salmon and yeast have to be given to others.

As I write fifteen children are helping with various pieces of work to earn some clothing to wear to school. There is very little to give them. We had hoped the R. F. C. money the men are earning would go for clothes, but some have had to pay doctors, one family had to replace their cow that died from eating butterbean vines, etc. Good school clothing for the children is needed.

School opens Monday. The county is furnishing two teachers for the regular elementary grades, and I am planning to give my services for the older boys and girls who cannot afford the bus fare and tuition required to attend the Junior High School, by conducting a special class for them.

We have been fortunate enough to secure the services of a very capable couple who will assume the responsibility for the house-keeping and gardening together with carpentering. With our Big Boy, Clyde Clemens, and your Substitute Worker, our household consists at present regularly of four. Saturdays and Sundays there are from fifteen to twenty for dinner and we often have visitors overnight.

C. has just sent a gift for Mission Hymnals, and I hope there will be other gifts for the same purpose, for the young people enjoy singing from hymn books with notes and the large Church Hymnals are too expensive in that edition.

The Christmas tree this year will be for pupils of the Church School only, since in these hard times it is asking too much of us to furnish gifts for the whole community. We will plan to have some pageant to which every one will be invited, however.

We are all happy to know that Miss Martin's health is improving and that she is really resting. She writes that she loves to hear from her friends, but cannot write often as it tires her more than almost anything. I am sure she would be glad to have you write her, as often as you can, letters that will not require answers.

For myself, I ask your prayers that I may have the strength and wisdom a person trying to fill even a corner of Miss Martin's place here needs. For the people of this section, I beg your continued interest and gifts that the seed which Miss Martin has planted and tended with so much self-sacrifice may continue its growth and bear its abundant fruit in the Christian citizenship of her beloved people.

We receive two bunches of bananas from the United Fruit Despatch Company every week. Mrs. Ruffin Wright brings or sees to it that the bananas are brought to us when she is unable to deliver them herself.

The Church Home Guild, composed of members from all the Parishes of Mobile, provide a Christmas tree for the children every year.

The Girl's Friendly entertains the children at a Christmas and May Day party.

St. John's Church Home Chapter provides eggs for an egg hunt.

In early spring the Auxiliary gave the Home a fine linen shower. It seemed that everything we had been needing for years

came in that shower. For once in our lives beds can have clean sheets without having to wait for sheets to dry that have been taken from other beds.

Later in the summer came our wonderful mattresses. Words cannot express how glad we were to get them. If any of you could have seen the old ones you would understand when I say that to us our mattresses are really wonderful.

We are still enjoying our Frigidaires. They have helped us to save in so many ways. They are not entirely paid for, but we hope to finish paying for them soon. Please continue to save and send coupons.

The children and everybody at the Home thank you more than we can possibly say for all that you have done for us this year. You have done so much in the past year to make things more comfortable for us.

Personally, I want to express my deep appreciation for your splendid cooperation, and the many encouraging words that have come to me through letters from you. After all it is your work. I am just trying, with God's help, to do the things that will make the Home, a real home for the children that come to it for help.

We have a better group of children to work with now, better material to build on, so I believe the future looks much brighter along this line.

We had two girls to graduate this past June. One has gone to a married sister in New Orleans, the other is at the Hospital of St. Barnabas, in Newark, New Jersey, training for a nurse.

There will be three graduates this year. They are worthwhile girls too. Two of them are hoping to be teachers and one wants to take nurse's training.

On July 7th, at chapel time, Sister Mary went to rest. We, at the Home, miss her gentle presence. She was a real inspiration to all who came in contact with her. To us, who loved her, the Home does not seem the same. We miss her kindly words of encouragement; the many helpful things she did for us.

Our dear little Sister Mary fell asleep peacefully and quietly, just as she had hoped she would do.

EDUCATIONAL REPORT, 1933

Your Secretary has to report her own attendance at the Wellesley Conference for Church Work, where she took three credit courses, and established cordial relations with the Massachusetts Director of Adult Education and others. She is working, with the cooperation of the President, on the development of an active system of educational secretaries in the convocation; because it seems

desirable to have some one near each parish for personal contact; and also because the work can be divided; and because this minor office—not a difficult one—can be a useful training school for Diocesan Secretary, or for other positions. Reports on that program have come in better than any other reports in your Secretary's experience. There is also an educational secretary's exhibit of books and pamphlets at this Convention.

Finally, the President and Secretary spent a profitable—to the Secretary—day in Birmingham over the preparation of the Program of Service.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE LEAGUE

A little over a week ago, the Young People of this Diocese met at their annual Convention, bringing to a close a most successful year of work, and also making plans for the coming year which we hope will be just as much of a success as last year's.

As a project or an objective for last year the Diocesan League undertook to furnish a \$75 scholarship to Auburn for Dwain Bouie from the House of Happiness. Although money was scarce the project was completed. The League thought this project so deserving of their support, that for the coming year the same project was again adopted, another scholarship to Dwain.

At Camp McDowell, the Young People's Camp under the direction of Rev. J. Hodge Alves, the largest attendance in the last five years was recorded. But this large attendance wasn't the outstanding feature of this camp. Besides the usual fellowship, service, and study which are always in abundance at Camp McDowell, there arose here two outstanding plans. The first, a plan for study; the second, a plan for the development of a Diocesan Conference center.

In the advanced class on Y. P. S. L. work, taught by Mrs. Gill, this yearly plan was developed. Starting with the National Theme, in slightly different words, CRUSADING WITH CHRIST IN OUR MODERN WORLD, an entire year's program of Service, Worship, Fellowship and Study was compiled. This program was the result of seven days' work. It supports the official National Church position on "Church and Industry," it supplies the material for the "earnest, careful, and impartial study of the whole industrial problem" as recommended by the Provincial League, and it is the basis for the Diocesan Y. P. S. L. resolution on Industry. Such a program deserves your consideration.

The development of the second plan necessitates a brief review of the past. A few years ago the Diocese was given forty acres of land upon Weeks Bay by the widow of the late Bishop Beckwith. Several attempts or plans were made to utilize this property, but none of them materialized. The recent committee appointed by the Bishop, consisting of four ministers, Mr. Schroeter, Mr. Alves, Mr. Edwards, and Mr. Thompson, one layman, Mr. Barton, and one young person, myself, recommended that the Diocese send about twenty boys to the property, to camp there for two weeks, to clear the land and really test it out as a conference site. The money which we had planned to use for this purpose couldn't be procured. When the Young People at Camp heard of this, they immediately expressed the desire and determination to raise the necessary money. The money was raised through a committee, of which Turner Cameron was chairman, making an appeal throughout the Diocese in cooperation with the Diocesan clergy. Twenty-two boys from all over the Diocese spent thirteen days upon the site. It is really a beautiful site, located upon the western shore of Weeks Bay, which is about twelve miles below Point Clear. All of the forty acres is thickly covered with timber.

We worked half of each day clearing the land and building a cabin. The rest of the day was spent any way we wished to; either swimming, fishing, or otherwise. At evening we all gathered around the council fire and had interesting conferences upon various subjects.

The land could never have been tried out under worse conditions. Out of the thirteen days, it rained all but two. The water was much higher than ordinary high tide. This bad weather naturally delayed us in the work on the cabin, and it was not quite completed, but at present it is being finished. The camp site was cleared of all undergrowth and dead trees.

The camp was a wonderful success, both in the objective for which it was intended, and also as a wonderful instrument of Religious Education.

We, the Young People of this Diocese, are so much in favor of this site as a Diocesan Conference site, that at the Convention last week, the \$200 Permanent Camp Fund was designated to be spent upon this site. \$150 for another camp similar to last year's, and \$50 for the development of the road to Camp Beckwith.

It is our aim to make this a Conference site for the entire Diocese, for the Woman's Auxiliary, for the Clergy, for the laymen of the Church, and for the Y. P. S. L., and we are appealing to you for your wholehearted support in this project which we think deserves the support of the entire Diocese, CAMP BECKWITH.

REPORT OF THE RECRUITING COMMITTEE FOR 1932-1933

I regret that I have no report to make for the past year as Chairman of the Committee on the Gift of Life. I have written few letters regarding recruits for life service, although I have kept in touch with the Rev. A. B. Parson for any developments relative to definite appeals for volunteers.

Although the Church is not in a position at present to send out new workers into the field, yet I feel that this is nevertheless a splendid time to keep the idea before our young people particularly. That seed may be sown in the minds of our young people regarding service in the Foreign Field and a period of training and preparation entered upon.

From recent communications with Mr. Parson, he makes clear the idea that if each Diocese could select one person fitted for this work that it would be a splendid contribution to the forward work of the Church.

As we know the Christian enterprise exists primarily and chiefly in order to proclaim the Gospel of Christ, and to bring under the full sway of our Lord, all the relationships of life on the part of those who have never known Him. Perhaps the most difficult phase of the missionary enterprise for our modern youth, is the sharing in actual religious work. It is our tendency to be specialists in education, medicine, social service, business work, etc., and be content to leave the actual religious and spiritual nurture to those who are ordained, or to those who are members of Religious Orders, or Deaconesses.

It should be borne in mind that ordained men (because of the customs of non-Christian lands) are not free to carry on direct work with women and children. How then are the women and children to learn the New Testament story unless there is another avenue of approach to them through the vocation of the lay woman work-

er? The Gospel was spread through the untiring work of men and women evangelists who counted it a joy to give to the world their witness to the deathless message of the Master.

The direct point is this: Is it not possible for the Church to find young women who have never dreamed of preparing to be religious workers, who might now consider building upon their college education by taking a course in order to prepare themselves for definite religious work? This may mean a year or two of study in one of the training schools of the Church, if necessary with some scholarship assistance from the Board. One should become a student of the Bible; of the teachings of Christ; of the history of the growth of Christianity; of comparative religions; methods of Church and Church School work; and other such subjects.

We feel that there are probably more teachers whose point of view is in the highest sense, that of the Christian apostle; namely, that of one who wants to devote herself to the extension of the Kingdom of God. Is it not possible that by a shift in vocational emphasis some may be willing to offer, not for school work, but for definite religious work in a career which would most certainly call into play all of the studies, methods and technique of the educational worker?

It is true that these days in which we are forced to move very slowly in sending new workers to the mission fields, is nevertheless a splendid time for training and preparation. In view of financial stringency the National Council is very hesitant about the advisability of confirming any new appointments for the time being. On the other hand the need for new workers is great, and we are anxious to keep in touch with well qualified persons who understand the situation and are willing to go on the waiting lists.

For some reason it seems particularly difficult to secure well educated young women either trained, or willing to train for religious work. If we could find just one from this Diocese, it would be a step forward. It is work which offers abundant opportunity for the finest kind of missionary service.

We have fairly good response from teachers and nurses, but few who volunteer for pure evangelistic work.

These are days in which standards are growing increasingly higher, and we must be careful to choose not only those whose devotion to the missionary cause is unquestioned, but who are in every way representative of the best we have in educational background, and personality as well.

Although a special call has come from China for such workers, there is the same need in Japan and the Philippines. The different phases of work opened to women and especially young women are

fairly varied, there is work with the less educated type of women in the local Church, work in connection with the Student centers, work with the Mother's Club which is composed of some of the better educated young mothers of the cities, and there are great possibilities there of development in Christian service in the HOME BUILDING and CHILD NURTURE. In the Orient, work among women is largely dependent on women workers, and unfortunately in China women's work and women's leadership has not been developed with anything like the success of men's work.

I hope that in the near future we in Alabama may help to increase the enrollment of those willing to go out as teachers of the Gospel of the Great Teacher, and let us remember particularly in our prayers the need in the Orient.

1. Resolved that this Convention go on record as endorsing most heartily the program of the Young People's Service League as outlined in their splendid report, and pledge our loving cooperation in every way to insure the carrying out of their plans of religious education.
2. Resolved, that the members of the Convention take back with them, the "Interpretation of the Woman's Auxiliary," as presented by our Executive Board and in their different branches make use of it to lend inspiration and renewed zeal in carrying on.
3. Resolved, that it is the sense of this Convention that there is a need of better understanding among racial groups as was definitely set forth in the able address of Mrs. Ames, and that there is a grave duty devolving upon Christian people to promote such understanding as may relieve causes that lead to racial conflict whether among large or small groups.
4. Resolved, that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary individually pledge themselves to observe the Day of Prayer, Nov. 11, as reminded by Mrs. Lamb in her splendid address.
5. Resolved, that the Convention endorse the recommendation of Bishop McDowell that the President appoint a committee to present to the next Convention, a plan to reorganize and simplify the Diocesan election in order to insure to the Woman's Auxiliary trained leadership among its officers. And also that each branch include within its budget, a contribution to the sum needed for the expense account of its President.

6. Resolved, that the Memorial Fund of 1932-33 be used for equipment in St. John's at Elyton, as suggested by Miss Kimball.

7. Resolved, that grateful acknowledgment is herewith made to Miss Annie Hobdy for her years of devoted service as Custodian of the United Thank Offering and all branches and officers are urged to place special emphasis on this branch of giving so that our Triennial Offering may not fall short.

8. Resolved, that the beneficiaries of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship be asked to pledge as many years of service in the Diocese, or to give precedence to calls for such service for as many years as the scholarship is held.

9. Resolved, that the Woman's Auxiliary take with them Mrs. Wilson's splendid message, "Looking Forward," and face the future with strength and courage and fervent prayer to make Christ in the modern world a reality among men.

10. Resolved, that every branch of the Woman's Auxiliary pledge to our Educational Secretary, Miss Elizabeth Freeland, our loyal support and cooperation in her untiring efforts to organize a program of adult religious education in this Diocese and avail themselves of her efficient aid in individual problems.

11. Resolved, that the Woman's Auxiliary in grateful acknowledgement of the improved health of our beloved Field Worker, Miss Augusta Martin, offer a prayer of thanks to our Heavenly Father for the blessing of her continued service, and pledge to support with renewed zeal and faith the splendid work she has so nobly carried on.

REPORT OF ANNALEE FITTS MEMORIAL LIBRARY,
October, 1933

Madam President:

Since there has been but one formal report of this work in three years, you will perhaps permit a recapitulation of this splendid piece of social service work done by the Auxiliary.

It was established at the Bishop Wilmer Training School in 1926, in memory of Miss Annalee Fitts of Tuscaloosa, as a perpetual memorial to her life and service as custodian of the Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of Alabama.

This library contains reference books for the use of those in training at the Bishop Wilmer Training School, and as such of course, the books are not allowed to be taken out, but used only in the library.

At the time of its founding an aunt of Annalee Fitts made a handsome gift for its equipment. The books have been given by the Branches of the Auxiliary through a yearly donation for that purpose.

At present the library contains 425 books, approximately, each containing the book plate of the library.

They have been card catalogued and are under the care of Deaconess Whitford of the Church Home who kindly consented to act in that capacity at the request of the library committee.

With one exception, the books have been purchased by the library committee from lists submitted by the clergy, who act as teachers in the school. Such expenditures are reported to the President who authorizes the funds from the state treasury, gifts for the library.

As the Wilmer Training School was closed this past year no new books have been placed in the library, and the gifts for books from the Branches amounting to about \$40 for two years are in the hands of the treasurer to be called for when it reopens, and new books for the students are required.

There has been some work done this year in the decoration of the library, new draperies, shades, a table scarf, have been placed. Two handsome oil paintings, the work and gift of Mrs. Festus Fitts, mother of Annalee Fitts, have been placed upon the walls, and we have the promise of a portrait of Annalee Fitts.

This very constructive piece of work by the Auxiliary makes possible a library needed by the Training School that could hardly be supplied otherwise.

Knowing that gifts to the Annalee Fitts Memorial Library go for the help of training future workers in the Church, and that our Bishop Wilmer Scholarship girl is among them, I feel sure we will pledge our continued loyal support to this work.

REPORT OF WORK OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, CONVENTION OF MOBILE, 1932-1933

The St. Andrews Day program, to have been held in St. John's with the subject, "Creative Prayer," was called off on account of an epidemic of influenza and the illness of the chairman.

Our interparochial Lenten study class, which each year grows to be more a part of us and so much beloved by all was held in Christ Church with an average attendance of 80 women. The leaders for the six lessons are chosen from the various parishes and the

work laid down by the National Council is usually followed.

This year we had the honor of a visit from one of the National Board, Mrs. Augusta Tabor. An informal luncheon at the Woman's Club with thirty-eight of the various parishes in attendance, was most enjoyable. Later in the afternoon, Mrs. Tabor led a discussion held in Christ Church Chapter House. A large and enthusiastic group of Auxiliary women were present. It was a most responsive audience and Mrs. Tabor led them out to discuss problems and difficulties in the several branches.

The Spring Convocation, to have been held at Robertsdale and unavoidably prevented, was held in St. John's, Mobile, with an attendance of 75.

Plans for the Annual Meeting, Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Alabama, to be held in Mobile, in Fall of 1933, have been made as follows:

Arrangements, Hostess Branch, All Saints; Housing, Christ's; Transportation and Autos, St. John's; Luncheons, Trinity; Social, St. Paul's, Toulminville and Spring Hill.

At a meeting of the presidents and the representatives of all the Auxiliaries early in the Spring of 1933, it was decided to divide the responsibility for the Fall Conference in the above manner. Every one will work together in whatever manner possible and in as many ways to make the meeting a success. The several responsibilities listed are not to be carried by that parish alone, simply the direction and arrangements are handled through the parish named.

MONTGOMERY CONVOCATION

The Spring Conference of the Montgomery Convocation of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Troy at St. Mark's Church, April 6, 1933.

The session opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion, Rev. T. G. Mundy, assisted by Rev. E. M. Parkman, officiating. The program during the morning session indicated the progress of our missionary work, domestic and foreign. Mrs. Lee of Auburn gave her impression of the importance of Mrs. Taber's work; Mrs. Brevard Jones told us of the work of Miss Esther Brown, who has devoted her life to work among the colored Church women, and Mrs. Samuel Wilson of New York gave us an interesting account of her observations during travel in China—including aspects of our mission work. Our President, Mrs. Wilson gave us an inspiring talk on the great work being accomplished in Church affairs—followed by a semi-pageant portraying the different phases of this work. After Noon-Day Prayers by Mrs. Lee of Auburn, the Con-

ference adjourned for luncheon which was most attractively served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Henderson.

The business was resumed at two o'clock, opening with prayers by Mr. Parkman. After reading the minutes of previous meeting, the reports of the Branches were read. Miss Annie Hobdy gave a good report from the Blue Boxes and Mrs. Leon Stevens a most interesting talk on the House of Happiness. It was to this institution that the offering was sent. A motion was made to recommend to the annual meeting that the time of the annual meeting be changed to the week following the Council of the Diocese. The Committee on Nominations selected Mrs. Charles Henderson as the next Chairman of the Convocation, and she was unanimously and enthusiastically elected. After an interesting question box, the meeting was adjourned until next Spring at St. John's, Montgomery.

CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.

3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Supply Department, Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor of the Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.

5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be eligible for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive Meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees.

7. The Recording Secretary shall write the minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the annual report for the printer.

8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by the Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meeting.

9. "A Chairman for each Convocation, who shall have been nominated by a committee nominated at the preceding meeting shall be elected by the Convention at the spring conference preceding the election of Diocesan officers, to serve three years, her term of office to be co-existent with that of the incoming President. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Chairman to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board."

10. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

11. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

12. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

13. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

14. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

15. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

16. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
