

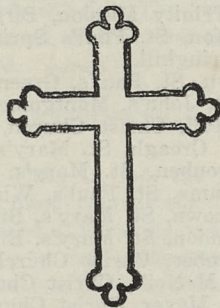

A FEW FACTS

National Auxiliary

The Woman's Auxiliary, Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, Church Mission of Help, St. Barnabas' Guild of Nurses, Girl's Friendly Society and the League for Patriotic Service are the seven National Organizations of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America. Of these the Woman's Auxiliary is the oldest and the largest. It was created by the Board of Missions at the General Convention in Baltimore, in 1871—Miss Mary Emery being made secretary.

In 1876 Miss Julia Emery succeeded her sister, and for forty years this devoted woman gave herself untiringly to the work of the Church as National Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. The Board of Missions assisted the Auxiliary in every way—but one delightful bit of advice given in the early days to the new secretary was "Never forget that the Woman's Auxiliary was formed not to do the work of the Board of Missions, but to supplement it." Miss Emery succeeded in establishing the Auxiliary all over the country, and in 1919, 3,678 parish branches were enrolled, and diocesan branches stretched from Hankow to Texas and from Porto Rico to New York.

At the Detroit Convention of 1919 great changes took place in the organization of the Church. Up to this time the work of the Church had been done through three Boards—those of Missions, Religious Education and Christian Social Service. The General Convention of 1919 created the National Council and Presiding Bishop, and divided the work of the Church into six departments. The question came up as to whether the Woman's Auxiliary should continue to function as Auxiliary to the Department of Missions, or become Auxiliary to the National Council. On account of the importance of its work, the Auxiliary was asked to become Auxiliary to the National Council, and its work now embraces every phase of the Church's work in the Departments of Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education, Christian Social Service, Publicity, Finance and Field. Whenever one is in doubt about any phase of our National work, one may always find help and instruction by writing to Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Ave., New York—where free leaflets are ready for distribution upon re-

quest. Every Branch President should own a copy of "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Life of the Church," and a copy of "A Manual," both of which may be had for a small sum from Church Missions House. They give a concise history of the Woman's Auxiliary, contain information concerning the United Thank Offering, the Supply Department, The Church Periodical Club, etc., and have Meditations and Devotional Offices to be used at Auxiliary meetings.

The Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama

From "Looking Backward," an address given by Mrs. Albert Wilson in October 1933, at our Annual Meeting in Mobile, the following facts, concerning the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama, have been gathered. In 1889 Bishop Wilmer appointed Mrs. F. H. Warren and Mrs. F. C. Randolph, both of Montgomery as President and Co-Adjutor of the newly formed Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. At the Diocesan Council of 1890 Mrs. Warren gave the first report, showing that missionary boxes, with value amounting to \$301.60, had been sent off during the year to the families of missionaries, and that \$486.50 had been divided equally between Diocesan and General Missions.

Mrs. Warren remained Diocesan President for fifteen years, being succeeded in order by Mrs. S. T. McMillan, of Anniston, Mrs. Frank Stollenwerck, of Montgomery, Mrs. Charles Henderson, of Troy, Mrs. D. E. Wilson, of Birmingham, Mrs. Albert Wilson, of Montgomery and Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, of Montgomery.

In order to make it easy for new officers in the Auxiliary to learn about the various phases of our work in the Diocese of Alabama, a few bits of information have been added below. Often it is a little puzzling to a new worker to understand what sort of work is done under some of the committees listed under "Diocesan Officers and Committees."

The Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund

This Fund was begun some years ago in order to honor the memory of Bishop Wilmer, of our Diocese, and to provide a Scholarship for use by the daughters of poorly paid missionaries in the Diocese. The goal set for the undertaking was \$10,000.00. Each year the Fund grows through the offerings made by the Parish Branches, and at present the amount in bank is \$9,316.03. The annual interest from this sum is used to educate a young woman who is training for Church work.

House of Happiness

The House of Happiness, near Scottsboro, was founded about twelve years ago by Miss Augusta B. Martin. While working with the State Child Welfare Department, she discovered the need of social welfare work among the people of our mountain counties, and brought this to the attention of the Church. She was commis-

sioned to undertake this work for the Church, and after using Scottsboro as a base, she selected Long's Hollow as a permanent location; there the Church purchased a small farm, where a home for the workers was built and a three room school and community house. Miss Martin soon became the trusted friend and helper of a wide community, teaching, nursing, advising, bringing help to all who needed, forming public opinion and giving the Gospel currency both by word and example. She was jointly supported by the Diocesan Department of Missions and the Woman's Auxiliary, and her sprightly accounts of her work and adventures were the feature of many a diocesan gathering. Hard work without rest undermined her health, so that at present she is on furlough, the work being carried on most capably by Miss Nettie Barnwell and the Halls who have been Miss Martin's co-workers. The fruits of this work are seen in greatly raised level of life over a wide area, the excellent school, the number of young people who have been inspired by Miss Martin to make the best of their advantages, the practical application of religion to every day life.

Indian Work in Escambia County

Just north of Atmore are two Indian missions, the joint work of Rev. E. V. Edwards and Doctor and Mrs. R. C. Macy. Eight years ago these remnants of Indian tribes were not being noticed by white people except for purposes of exploitation. Their wretched condition was noticed by some Church people who took up with Mr. Edwards the possibility of the Church coming to their help. Dr. and Mrs. Macy who had served as missionary physician and welfare worker were secured to live among them. Eventually two centers were developed, where chapels were built that could be used for worship, school and community purposes. Dr. Macy after heroic work for the Indians' betterment was called to his eternal reward; Mrs. Macy with good helpers still works on, and is regarded by the Indians as their special friend. Two good congregations are now functioning, with services, Sunday schools, and organizations; about 150 persons definitely belonging to them and a large number of others feeling their influence. The whole outlook of these Indians has been changed; their condition improved, their health cared for, their desire for education met, their morals uplifted. The Woman's Auxiliary has taken a deep interest in this work from the first, for Mrs. Macy was for over forty years a United Thank Offering Worker.

Church Home for Orphans

Oldest of all our diocesan enterprises is the Church Home for Orphans at Spring Hill near Mobile. It is the result of the Church's responsibility for Confederate orphans and widows, and was established by Bishop Wilmer, who put it under an Order of Deaconesses, who have served it devotedly through the years. The present Home is a modern group of excellent buildings; three hold

groups of twenty children each under housemothers, with a good staff of persons who are trained for child caring. A fourth building houses the Bishop Wilmer Training School, where women are trained for Church work; the income from the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund of the Woman's Auxiliary goes to one of the young women there. The Woman's Auxiliary also "adopts" children in the Church Home; many branches have a god-child whom they clothe and take a personal interest in. The Diocese is quite proud of the excellent record of the Church Home and the children who have received their training there.

The Morris Family

The Rev. J. Kenneth Morris, Mrs. Morris and two children, are Alabama's representatives in Kyoto, Japan. Mr. Morris is from Tuscaloosa and had his first Church experience as layreader in Alabama missions. They have a church, kindergarten and clinic in an industrial district of Kyoto, where they have won great public approval by their fine work. The Woman's Auxiliary undertook the responsibility for Mr. Morris' salary when he went to Japan, so that he has been working there as our missionary. Three years ago when on furlough the Morrises made a round of the Diocese visiting the branches and making a most delightful impression. They keep in touch with Alabama by circular letters describing their work and experiences, the latest of which was a terrible typhoon that devastated their district.

Advance Work

The General Church Program is divided into two parts: (1) The Budget, (2) The Advance Work. The Budget is used to maintain work already in existence, with no provision for new work. Advance Work covers the cost of new equipment in the way of land, buildings, etc., needed in the fields, and is also used to maintain new work. In our Alabama Auxiliary the amount which we contribute to Advance Work goes to the buildings funds of Rev. Kenneth Morris, in Kyoto, Japan.

Memorial Gifts

The offerings which are given by Parish Branches in memory of faithful ones who have entered upon rest, are presented each year to the Bishop of our Diocese. He will use these offerings as an Endowment Fund for the Diocese of Alabama.

Gift of Life

This committee is charged with the duty of presenting to the youth of the Parish and the Diocese the call of the Church in the fields of evangelism, education and medicine. The Communion Service in each month is the time of special intercession for the Gift of Life. Through the channels of this Committee summer volunteers are offered to relieve the regular workers in Church Missions.

Prayer-Partnership Plan

By this plan every Parish Branch is assigned two Prayer Partners in whom they are to maintain constant interest through daily prayer and through personal contact by means of letters, small gifts, etc.

League of the Isolated

As its name implies, the League for The Isolated is formed as a means of keeping in touch with isolated Church women in every community where they are unable to have direct Church connections.

Business Women's Unit

The Business Women's Branches have done good work in our Auxiliary. These branches are formed by young women who are anxious to keep in touch with Auxiliary activities, and yet who are unable to attend afternoon meetings.

As a rule their meetings are held in the evening—with a light supper, followed by a program which is planned to inform them about what the Auxiliary, as a whole, is working to accomplish.

Annalee Fitts Memorial Library

The Annalee Fitts Memorial Library was established by the Woman's Auxiliary at the Bishop Wilmer Training School in Mobile in 1926, in memory of Miss Annalee Fitts of Tuscaloosa, as a perpetual memorial to her life and service as Correspondent of The Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of Alabama. The library contains reference books for use of those future workers in the Church who are in training at the Bishop Wilmer Training School. Miss Nehls, who is now using our Bishop Wilmer Scholarship, is among the latter. At present the library contains approximately 425 books, which have been card-catalogued and are under the care of Deaconess Whitford, of the Church Home. Needs for new books are supplied by the funds which are contributed annually through the diocesan branches of the Woman's Auxiliary.

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH, DIOCESE OF ALABAMA

CHURCH OF THE ASCENSION, MONTGOMERY,
OCTOBER 31ST—NOVEMBER 1ST, 1934

On Wednesday morning, October 31st, the opening day of the Convention, the annual Corporate Holy Communion was celebrated in the Church of the Ascension. Bishop McDowell was celebrant, assisted by the Rector, Rev. P. N. McDonald. The sermon was preached by the Bishop. The Memorial Roll was read and laid on the altar.

The forty-sixth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama was called to order by the President, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin of Montgomery, at 11:00 A. M., Wednesday, October 31st, in the Church of the Ascension, Montgomery, Alabama. Members of the Montgomery Convocation were hostesses.

The invocation was given by the Bishop and the Auxiliary sang hymn 486. Mrs. W. B. Nelson of the Ascension Auxiliary and Mrs. Charles Henderson of Troy, Chairman of the Montgomery Convocation, welcomed the delegates and visitors to the Convention. The Vice-President, Mrs. D. C. Ogden of Mobile, responded to these greetings.

Thirty-two branches answered to roll call.

Mrs. Albert Wilson of Montgomery, who had just finished six years of faithful and efficient service as Diocesan President, was then presented by the President. Mrs. Wilson received hearty and affectionate recognition of her past service. Mrs. Baldwin next presented Mrs. J. E. Dowe of Montgomery, who has recently

accepted the office of Recording Secretary in place of Mrs. W. E. Willett of Birmingham, who had been compelled to resign in April on account of illness in her family.

Greetings and pledges of support and help were brought to the Auxiliary by Mrs. W. J. Barnett of Mobile, from the Daughters of The King; Mrs. Sextus Smith, also of Mobile, from the Girls Friendly; and Miss Gertrude Parkman of Montgomery, from the Young People's Service League. These reports were filed.

The Committee on Rules, Miss E. V. Freeland, reported the following rules which were adopted for the Convention session:

Recommendations by Committee on Rules:

1. Delegates will notify the Chairman of Credentials of their permanent withdrawal from the Convention, and alternates shall then, and only then, take their place.
2. Delegates shall not be entitled to appoint proxies for voting.
3. All motions shall be written and presented through the Committee on Miscellaneous Resolutions.
4. A Delegate shall be allowed to speak only once to a motion. This does not include the author of the motion.
5. A delegate speaking to a motion shall announce her name, branch, and convocation.
6. Immediately following a report, the resolutions therein suggested shall be voted on.

Vice-President, Mrs. D. C. Ogden of Mobile, gave her report which was received and filed.

The President, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, then called Mrs. Ogden to to the Chair while the President read the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary from July 1933 to July 1934. This report had been compiled by Mrs. Baldwin, acting as Recording Secretary in Mrs. W. E. Willett's place. Report was accepted and filed. Reading of Treasurer's report was postponed.

Report of Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. C. H. Beale, was given informally by Mrs. Baldwin, who at the same time paid a tribute to Mrs. Beale for faithful service during the year.

The President followed this report with a short inspirational talk.

Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Mrs. Carl Lay of Gadsden, gave her report in which she stated that \$7,830.51 had been sent to Mr. L. B. Franklin, Treasurer. This sum represents the United Thank Offering of Alabama for the 1934 Triennial. The report was filed.

After a motion made by Mrs. Albert Wilson, the Secretary was requested to send a message of love and sympathy to Mrs. P. N. McDonald who was absent because of illness.

Bishop McDowell told of the conferences to be conducted by the General Church throughout Alabama, meetings to be held in Montgomery, Mobile, Birmingham, Decatur, and Anniston, during the first week in November.

The recommendations of the Executive Board were presented:

1. That a Finance Committee be appointed by the President with members from different parts of the state.

2. That we change our fiscal year to conform to that of the National Church which is from January to January.

3. That the name "Gift of Life", be used instead of "Recruiting Committee."

4. That the alms from the Holy Communion Service, October 31st, be given to the Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness; and alms from the night service be used for the salary of Reverend Kenneth Morris.

5. That we continue to have the annual meeting of Woman's Auxiliary in the fall—October.

Moved by Mrs. Gayle that recommendations be accepted, motion carried.

The Noon-Day Prayers were offered by Rev. E. M. Parkman.

The report of the Committee on Leadership Training, consisting of Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Chairman; Mrs. Albert Wilson and Mrs. Charles Henderson, was next read in sections by Mrs. D. E. Wilson and left to be considered at the afternoon session.

The President next told of books for mission study and other subjects which were in the rear of the church under the care of Miss Freeland, Educational Secretary.

The President then spoke of the Quiet Day for Prayer to be observed in all branches of our Auxiliary on Armistice Day. As Armistice Day falls on Sunday, it will be necessary to observe the Day for Prayer on Monday, November 12th. The Armistice Day Prayers had been ordered by the President, and she asked that each Convocational Chairman take her share and distribute them among her branches. The President also urged attendance on the Missionary Conference announced by the Bishop.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon in the Ascension Parish House.

At 2:00 P. M. the meeting reconvened and the report on Leadership Training was again considered. A motion was made to

amend Section 2 by inserting the words "and other Diocesan Officers" after the word "President". Motion was carried. By motion of Mrs. Gayle, the report was adopted as amended.

Miss Nettie Barnwell read a report of the activities at the House of Happiness. The report of Mrs. W. L. Stevens of Tuskegee, Treasurer of Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness, was read by Mrs. E. C. Meredith of Tuskegee. The report was accepted and filed. In discussing this report, Mrs. Meredith called attention to the expense borne by the Chairman in carrying on the work. Mrs. Charles Henderson gave \$15.00 to defray this expense.

Mrs. Hardee Johnston moved that a fund be established for the expense of the Treasurer of the Maintenance Fund. This was referred to the Finance Committee.

A motion that the Auxiliary defray the expenses of Deaconess Whitford to the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, was referred to the Finance Committee.

Announcement was made by the President that the Faith Fund for the House of Happiness has been discontinued.

Deaconess Whitford from the Church Home at Mobile gave her report. It was filed.

Miss Helen Averett of Birmingham rose to move that the Woman's Auxiliary of Alabama inaugurate a movement to buy a new automobile for our Bishop, this new car to be presented to Bishop McDowell as a gift from the Diocese of Alabama, at Thanksgiving Time. Motion was carried.

Hymn 502 was sung, after which, Rev. P. N. McDonald conducted a short meditation.

Rev. Kenneth Morris, our Missionary in Japan, sent a report which was read by Mrs. Hardee Johnston.

A letter from Miss Augusta Martin was read by Mrs. J. B. Jones.

A telegram from Mrs. John Gill of Mobile, who is Director of Young People's Work, was read by Mrs. Johnston.

Mrs. J. T. Darling, Publicity Chairman, reported increasing interest throughout the Diocese in cooperating with her department. The Diocese has 254 subscribers to the "Spirit of Missions". Report filed.

Report of the League of the Isolated by Chairman, Mrs. E. L. James of Lowndesboro, was not read but is printed in the Directory of this issue.

The report of the Chairman of the Memorial Fund, Mrs. Albert Wilson, was given with the following resolutions: "That the enclosed offering, amounting to \$25.10, be donated to the Endowment Fund of the Diocese and be presented to the Bishop by the Diocesan President for that purpose. Further moved that the Memorial Fund be used annually for this purpose." Mrs. Charles

Henderson moved that the report be accepted and resolutions adopted. Motion carried.

The reports of the Convocational Chairmen: Mrs. Earl Pettus, Birmingham; Mrs. D. T. McCall, Mobile; Mrs. Charles Henderson, Montgomery; Mrs. J. L. Lawson, Selma, were next given.

Mrs. John Curry of Huntsville Convocation who was unavoidably absent, sent her report.

The Chair presented Mrs. W. G. McDowell, and the Rev. Roderick Jackson and then announced that the evening service would be held at 7:30 in St. John's Church, the rector, Dr. Richard Wilkerson, in charge of the services with address to be given by Rev. Roderick Jackson of Orangeburg, South Carolina, former missionary to Kyoto, Japan.

The Rev. P. N. McDonald gave the Benediction and the afternoon session adjourned.

The evening service at St. John's Church was well attended, and the address of Rev. Roderick Jackson eagerly listened to. Mr. Jackson is a personal friend of our Alabama Missionary to Kyoto, Rev. Kenneth Morris of Tuscaloosa.

November the first being All Saints Day, Holy Communion services were held at St. John's Church, Church of the Ascension and the Church of The Holy Comforter.

After reciting the Auxiliary Prayer, the morning session of the Auxiliary was called to order at 9 o'clock A. M. by the President in the Church of The Holy Comforter.

The roll was called.

The minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

By motion of Mrs. W. A. Gayle, seconded by Mrs. Albert Wilson, the Secretary was requested to write letters of love and sympathy to Mrs. Stuart McQueen, (who for years had acted as Secretary for the Church Periodical Club), and to Mrs. Robert Macy and Miss Augusta Martin.

The report of the Treasurer, Mrs. A. R. Smith, was read by Mrs. Hardee Johnston. The report was filed.

The Resolutions and Findings Committee was reappointed with Mrs. Douglas Arant, Chairman; Mrs. C. D. Poland, Mrs. J. C. Calhoun, Mrs. R. W. Goldsby, Mrs. L. J. Lawson.

Mrs. Frazer Banks extended an invitation for the 1935 Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to be held in Birmingham, the Church of the Advent to be the hostess church for the Birmingham Convocation. The invitation was accepted with thanks.

Mrs. D. E. Wilson, who had been appointed in the spring to act as Diocesan Chairman of Christian Social Service, next made an informal report of her work.

We are affiliating with the Christian Social Service Chairmen of other denominational bodies, the Presbyterian Church being in charge of the United Christian Social Service Work in Alabama. This work consists largely in forming Bible Classes among colored women. A discussion of the work was held in which Mrs. J. B. Jones, Mrs. Albert Wilson, Mrs. W. A. Gayle, Mrs. W. C. Fitts, and others participated.

The Auxiliary went on record as regretting the absence of delegates from the colored branches of St. Mark's, Birmingham, and Good Shepherd, Mobile. The address of the Christian Social Service Chairman is—Mrs. D. E. Wilson, 215 Poinciana Drive, Birmingham, Ala.

Mrs. Douglas Arant asked that Auxiliary Women who were present take a message back to their parishes concerning the proposed gift of an automobile to Bishop McDowell. All funds to be sent to Mr. R. J. Williams, Salisbury Road, Birmingham.

Mrs. Hardee Johnston was made Chairman of a committee appointed by the President to acquaint the women of the Auxiliary with this plan. Other members of this committee are Miss Helen Averett and Mrs. Douglas Arant.

The Chair reported that three books had been given to our Diocesan Library by Mr. Pfau of The Book Store, New York.

As Chairman of the Committee on Leadership Training and in accordance with the will of the convention as expressed the previous day by amendment to the original recommendation of section 2 of the committee's report, Mrs. D. E. Wilson gave notice that proposal had been made to amend Article 5 of our Constitution. This article now reads: "The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be eligible for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers."

As amended Article 5 will read, "The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be ineligible to serve two successive terms in the same office. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers."

The hour of ten having arrived, the Auxiliary gave its whole attention to three addresses arranged for that hour. Mrs. T. E. Kilby of Anniston spoke on "Missions in This Age", Mrs. W. M. Marks of Montgomery on "Christian Citizenship", Mrs. Albert Wilson, also of Montgomery, on "The Life of The Spirit".

These three women were delegates to the Triennial Meeting at Atlantic City, and their addresses were among the important themes presented to the Triennial.

Mrs. Henry Seawell read Mrs. Macy's report of her work among the Indians.

Mrs. E. E. Cobbs, Chairman of Supply Work gave her report, Both reports were filed.

Miss Elizabeth Freeland, Educational Secretary, presented her report which was filed. She called attention to the display of mission books in the back of the church.

Mrs. Frank Thigpen read the report of the Church Periodical Club for Mrs. Platt Roberts, Chairman, who was unavoidably absent. Report filed.

The report of Mrs. Battle Searcy, Chairman of Advance Work, was read by the President.

Miss Barnwell offered to lend an exhibit from the House of Happiness to any Auxiliary that will pay transportation charges.

The President read a delayed report from the Business Women's Unit, Church of The Advent, Birmingham. She spoke of the fact that Miss Margaret Bennett had sent a report of her year's work as Chairman of Business Women's Unit.

Mrs. Frank Thigpen was not able at the time of appointment to take active charge of the Prayer Partnership work, but will do so in the near future.

Mrs. A. B. Metcalf who edits Woman's Auxiliary Page in "The Alabama Churchman," asked that news items be sent to her at number 6 Morgan Ave., Montgomery.

Rev. P. N. McDonald, Chairman of the Department of Religious Education, asked in a letter that the Auxiliary appoint an official representative of Religious Education to serve with him. It was his wish that Mrs. Albert Wilson be the one appointed. Mrs. Wilson was unanimously chosen. Rev. E. M. Parkman, Chairman of Christian Social Service for our Diocese, offered help as to material for the work.

The report of the Committee on Findings, Mrs. Douglas Arant, Chairman, was filed.

Chairman of Hospitality Committee, Mrs. Frank Inge, made her report, it was filed.

Rev. P. N. McDonald announced the offerings from the corporate communion service at the Ascension amounted to \$37.81, which was given for the Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness. An announcement was made that the offering from the evening service at St. John's Church amounting to \$34.93, was given toward the salary of Rev. Kenneth Morris.

The President announced that Armistice Day Prayers were ready for distribution, and requested the Convocation Chairmen to take them to their branches to be used on November the 12th.

At noon the President called on Rev. E. M. Parkman to offer the Noon-Day Prayers.

Minutes of the session were next read and approved.

The report of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, having been inadvertently omitted, was read by the President. She stated that Miss Nehls is now the recipient of the Wilmer Scholarship Fund and is studying at the Wilmer Training School in Mobile.

Mr. Parkman moved that this report be received and filed and incorporated into the regular minutes.

After the Benediction by the Rev. P. N. McDonald, the Forty-Sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council to the Protestant Episcopal Church in the diocese of Alabama was formally adjourned.

My dear Women of the Auxiliary:

Instead of giving a report at our Annual Meeting, I am writing a few words for this edition of our Year Book.

Several important changes will be brought about in our work for the future through the adoption, in Montgomery, of the report of the Committee on Leadership Training. The report is printed in this book. The Committee was appointed upon recommendation of Bishop McDowell at our Annual Meeting in Mobile in 1933. Please read the report carefully and thoughtfully.

It is not to be supposed that we will immediately become perfect in the new methods suggested in the report, but there is an earnest desire on the part of your president that we make a faithful attempt to put the methods into practice.

About this time last year, upon the request of our retiring president, Mrs. Albert Wilson, I sent to the presidents of the Parish Branches a copy of Mrs. D. E. Wilson's "Alabama Plan," asking that each branch study the plan and organize in accordance with it, if feasible. I do not know how many branches now use the Department System—suggested in the "Alabama Plan"—but, as this system is in use in The National Council, and as we are an Auxiliary to that body, it is entirely reasonable to expect that all branches of our Alabama Woman's Auxiliary will conform to the working plan of The National Council and introduce into our Parish Branches the Departments of (1) Missions and Church Extension, (2) Religious Education, (3) Christian Social Service, (4) Publicity, (5) Finance, (6) Field.

I am sure that all Auxiliary women who have attended Summer Conferences, Synod meetings, etc.—and all who read "The Spirit of Missions" and other church papers, are familiar with these Six Departments.

The Eleventh Year Book of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina contains some helpful suggestions concerning each of the de-

partments. In order that we may have the benefit of these suggestions, and with the consent of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina, I have included the "Department System" as outlined in their Year Book, in this book.

The ideal Parish Branch is one which is organized along lines which meet the needs of the parish which it represents—but, incorporated into each Chapter or Unit of every Parish Branch there should be committees on at least three of the Departments—viz., Missions and Church Extension, Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON LEADERSHIP TRAINING Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, Nov. 1, 1934

At the last Annual Meeting the Bishop of the Diocese recommended that a committee be appointed to consider the subject of leadership training and to present recommendations to this Annual Meeting to assure regular succession in office, greater division of responsibility, financial provision for the expense of the President's office, and a deeper realization of the privilege of service.

Recognizing the fact that the work of the Woman's Auxiliary is spiritual, challenging our women to a greater faith and truer willingness to be used of God your Committee submits the following:

1. We recommend that the faithful and efficient discharge of the duties of any Auxiliary office—mission, parish, convocational or diocesan—shall be recognized, and when possible honored with promotion to higher office.

2. Because of the taxing nature of the duties of the Diocesan President and the desirability of giving the honor and privilege of such service to a greater number of women, we recommend that the constitution of the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary be so changed that the President shall not be eligible to serve two successive terms in the same office.

3. Rotation in office is approved by the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary but no definite rule is suggested by that body. We recommend that the Diocesan Vice-President and Chairmen of Convocations be given a greater share of the responsibility now borne by the President and that they shall then be considered as especially eligible to succeed to the office of President.

4. We recommend that as soon as can be arranged without the loss of conscientious and intelligent oversight of various activities, that Chairmen of Convocations shall be considered responsible for all work done in their respective convocations, that such work shall be reported to the Chairman of the Convocation, tabu-

lated by her and reported to the President. Such a plan should relieve the Diocesan President and Secretary of much labor, insure to each Convocational Chairman a more intimate knowledge of her field, and a closer relationship with her branches.

5. We recommend that a Vice-Chairman be appointed by the Chairman of each Convocation to serve a term of three years, co-extensively with that of the Chairman; that the duties of the Vice-Chairman shall be to assist the Chairman in visiting and organizing branches, tabulating reports and exercising general oversight of the work; and that the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Educational Secretary of the Convocation shall work in close co-operation for the development of all phases of Auxiliary work within the Convocation.

6. We recommend that each Chairman of a Convocation shall annually hold two or more conferences for the training of officers of parish and mission branches.

7. We earnestly urge a sacrificial attendance on Auxiliary meetings, conferences, and summer training schools, that the breadth of vision, knowledge of the Church, Christian fellowship, and inspiration which they give may better equip officers and members of the Woman's Auxiliary for their work.

We recommend that where possible parish and mission branches help defray the expense of their incoming president for attendance on the Sewanee Summer Training School.

8. Because the Vice-President should be familiar with all phases of Auxiliary work, should be in close touch with the President and share her responsibilities, we recommend that the Vice-President be made Chairman of the committee preparing the Diocesan Program of Service. We further recommend that the Educational Secretary and one other person appointed by the President shall serve on the Program of Service Committee and that all its work be done in close co-operation with the President.

9. We urge an earnest and frequent evaluation of all work done through the Woman's Auxiliary,—an honest questioning to learn whether in our zeal to supplement the Church's inadequate income we multiply our difficulties and defeat our true purpose. Through failure to think through our efforts do we not sometimes discourage voluntary and systematic giving by commercializing the Church, and with time and energies far spent, neglect both individual and united search to know God and to really make His Son Jesus Christ known to the world?

10. We are deeply conscious of the loyal, efficient and consecrated service of the women of the Auxiliary and are justly proud of their record. The call of the world is for such leadership as each Auxiliary woman can give if the new world order is to be built on spiritual foundations which alone can make sure abundant life. For the development of this leadership we commend for pray-

erful consideration the following thought from Bishop Creighton's recent United Thank Offering sermon:

"Missions is not merely the Church's activity on the frontiers of Christianity, although it may be that. It is preaching, teaching, living the Christ in any environment, under any condition favorable or unfavorable. It is relating our Lord to His humanity that He may save and direct."

THE DEPARTMENT SYSTEM

(As outlined in the Eleventh Year Book of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina).

This system provides departmental channels through which we may be truly "Auxiliary to the National Council" in all the departments and phases of its work. The Departments are: (1) Missions and Church Extension, (2) Religious Education, (3) Christian Social Service, (4) Publicity, (5) Finance, (6) Field. Each of these Departments has a special well-defined field to cover and in order to help the Parish Branches to develop, we hereby make some detailed suggestions in each field.

Department of Missions and Church Extension

This department carried forward the "Spirit of the Old Auxiliary." To it is entrusted the responsibility for the deepening of the devotion and life of members; of making Christ and His Church and His Gospel known at home and abroad. To these ends we would call to your attention the following divisions of work, the Devotional Life, Rural, Mill Work, Work among the Foreign Born, Work among the Negroes, the Blind and Isolated.

Under the Department of the Devotional Life the Parish Branches are urged to study the meaning and power of Prayer as found in God's Holy Word through the use of the Daily Bible Readings; and that they engage in classes on Prayer and in practice of Prayer through Prayer groups, Services of Intercession and Corporate Communion.

Under the Rural and Mill Work there is often an opportunity to start a Church Sunday School, Mother's Meetings and Classes of various sorts. It is possible that work thus started may become the foundation for a Mission station of the future.

Work among the Foreign Born presents a wonderful opportunity of service. We are members of the Catholic Branch of the Church to which so many of our Foreign Neighbors belong and there are many ways in which we can help them to feel at home

and happy in this land which they have adopted, and in many instances our Church will afford them a spiritual home where they have none of their own. We should especially seek the children and ask them to attend our Church Schools. Members of the Greek Orthodox Church will promptly take advantage of this opportunity.

Work among the Blind—Literature is available for the blind who read Braille, and it is for this reason Parish Chairmen are urged to send the Diocesan Chairmen the names and addresses of those who read Braille.

Work among Negroes may be effectively done through the local committees on interracial relations and through co-operation with Colored Missions of the Church. There is much we can do in our daily contact with them.

The United Thank Offering, a gift from grateful hearts, for the support of women workers in the home and foreign fields, is presented in the parishes twice a year: on the Feast of Annunciation, and on the feast of St. Michael and All Angel's Day. The little Blue Box should be in the hands of not only members of the Auxiliary but of every woman in the Church.

Department of Religious Education

The urgent concern of this Department is how we may best prepare ourselves for our part in THE TASK OF THE CHURCH; therefore we offer the following program for the year:

1. Definite periods of prayerful study, individually and co-operatively, of the six addresses and the Findings of the Discussion Groups on the same, as they were presented to the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.
2. The forming of Bible Classes, Prayer Groups, and Reading Circles.
3. Attendance at Institutes, Normal Classes and Summer Conferences for training in Leadership.
4. Circulating Library in every Parish.
5. Cooperation with Young People in their work. Assistance in Church School.
6. Membership in Mother's Club and Parent-Teacher's Association.
7. Co-operation with the National, Provincial, and Diocesan Field Department in their plans for the furthering of the Church's Program.
8. Constant use of "The Spirit of Missions," "The Church at Work," and "The Piedmont Churchman." These publications are indispensable to the work of this department.

The making of our Nation Christian depends as never before upon this Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary. Shall we equip ourselves so as to be able to help others apply Christian principles to their lives?

Department of Christian Social Service

The attention of all parishes and district chairmen is called to the following important announcements:

I. In a recent address, Mr. Barnes, Executive Secretary of the National Department of Christian Social Service, took for his theme "The Opportunity of the Church in the Present Emergency" and listed the impacts of the situation as follows:

(a) The attack on physical health—The Child Welfare Committees report a malnutrition increase in one health center from 18 per cent to 60 per cent.

(b) The attack on mental health—the result of financial anxiety and the inability to secure adequate provisions for physical needs.

(c) A loss of the sense of security—that sense which the family secures through its relation to a stable community.

(d) A definite increase in delinquency and crime shown through state prison reports.

(e) A heightened strain in family life. Operation on a minimum income involves petty economies which are a source of continual irritation and bring about moral lapses.

(f) Religious discontent—perhaps the least important impact, but a large factor in social unrest.

II. Turning to the thought of the Church's responsibility in relieving the results of these impacts, Mr. Barnes suggested:

(a) Improvement in the degree and type of pastoral cases. "A better technique in the care of souls." Closer contact between the Priest and his people.

(b) The right use of the Parish house as a means of building character and sustaining morale. As the ability of the family decreases, the need of the social ministration of the Church increases—the need to provide for both adults and children means for the right use of their leisure.

(c) Learning community service. See the leaflet "The Parish Finds Its Community," copies of which may be obtained free from our Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Ave., New York.

III. It has been recommended by the Program Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of Sewanee that every parish and mission branch during this coming Triennium study the following five topics: Family Life, Property and Economic Conditions, Inter-Racial Contacts; International Relations and Religious Thinking Today.

And it was further recommended that the Department of Christian Social Service should stress, as a result of the study of the five topics mentioned:

(a) Constructive Education for Christian parenthood.

(b) Definite enrichment of life for those upon whom more and more leisure is being thrust.

(c) Creation of public opinion which will eliminate fear psychology.

(d) Eradication of race prejudice.

(e) Thinking through our own religious problems and attempting to discover ways of helping others in their religious thinking.

As appointed leaders in your parishes and districts the responsibility rests on you to work out some plan of co-operation with National and Provincial Departments. What will you do?

Department of Publicity

Your Publicity Chairman offers the following recommendations:

(a) That there be a Chairman of Publicity who shall have a committee, the number depending upon the size of the branch, each member of which shall have her proportionate list of the entire membership; each sub-chairman shall then be responsible for keeping in touch with the members of her group. She shall notify the Rector of changes of addresses, cases of illness, removals from the parish; she shall also notify her group of any information the branch president wishes sent out.

(b) That each branch have a Representative of the Spirit of Missions, whose duty it shall be to secure subscriptions to this, the Official Missionary Organ of the Church. All subscriptions should be sent direct to the Spirit of Missions, 281 Fourth Ave., New York. The names of the subscribers should be sent to the Diocesan Representative.

Branches are urged to give publicity to their local work in secular press and to send items of general interest to the Diocesan Chairman.

(c) Branches are urged to make use of simple dramatic plays or sketches teaching various phases of our work and to use posters or bulletin board setting forth the Church's work in Church vestibules and parish houses.

Field Department

This Department, Diocesanly, consists of the President as Chairman and of the other Department Chairmen. It is the coordinating Department of the Council. It, with the officers of the Branch, compose the membership of the Executive Committee. It has no set functions, but, as in the National Department, it seeks to place before the Auxiliary of the Diocese the whole needs of the Field. It is, as it were, the Spoken Voice of the Council. Its scope is within all fields of the Church service. This Department urges you to take courage from the successes of the past and to go forward to still greater service for the Kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ.

Suggestions For Those Interested In Inter-Racial Co-operation.

1. Form a group of white women who are willing to do inter-Racial thinking. Begin with a few, possibly only three. and invite others as they are found to be interested, not curious.

2. Get a book to read, either when the group meets, chapter by chapter, or by passing from member to member. T. J. Woof-ter's "Basis of Racial Adjustment," Gin & Co., Atlanta, Ga., is a good, practical work, planned for use in colleges and schools.

3. When the group is sufficiently interested invite the State Chairman to organize a group of colored women, after which the two groups may meet and work together for betterment of conditions in the community, along lines of schools, or housing, or recreation, justice in the courts, etc., etc.,

4. From the very beginning interest can be shown in personal ways; in helping the sick, etc. A Bible class was organized in Spartanburg by Mrs. W. P. Carr, and has grown amazingly and accomplished much good.

5. Chairman of the State Inter-Racial Committee, Mrs. C. P. McGowan, 5 St. Michael's Place, Charleston, S. C., will be glad to co-operate with any interested group, either by correspondence or by going to the community.

General Convention

The General Convention is the legislative body of the whole Church. It is composed of two Houses:

- (1) The House of Bishops.
- (2) The House of Deputies.

It meets once in every three years. The three years between Conventions are spoken of as a Triennium.

National Council

The National Council is the Executive Body of the Church which acts for the Church between the General Convention. Its members are elected, sixteen by the General Convention and one elected by each of the eight Provinces of the Church.

The Rt. Rev. James DeWolf Perry, Presiding Bishop, is the executive head of the Church, and is also the President of the National Council.

The work of the National Council is conducted through two major divisions as follows:

I	II
Missions	Finance
Religious Education	Publicity
Social Service	Field

Division one is under the direction of the Rt. Rev. Phillip Cook, D. D., assistant to the President.

Division two is under the direction of Lewis B. Franklin, D. C. L., Treasurer of the Church and Vice-President of the National Council.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the National Council has no treasurer at headquarters (281 Fourth Avenue, New York.) The United Thank Offering and any special gifts which the Auxiliary may raise to go to the National Council and are disbursed through his office. National Council becomes therefore the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

GENERAL CHURCH PROGRAM

The General Church Program is the program of work which is carried on under the direction of the National Council.

"It represents in terms of action the acceptance of the Church of its obligation to carry the Gospel to all mankind."

The program is divided into two parts:

- (1) The Budget.
- (2) The Advance Work.

The Budget is the amount needed by the Presiding Bishop and Council to maintain the work already in existence, but does not provide for any new work.

The Advance Work covers the cost of new equipment in the way of land, buildings, etc., needed in the fields. Advance work also covers the maintenance of new work.

Before the Program is accepted it is submitted by the National Council to General Convention, at its Triennial Meeting for adoption or rejection.

Upon adoption of the Program by General Convention the National Council gives to the Diocese and missionary districts a Quota.

QUOTA

The Quota given to the dioceses and missionary districts represents their share of the Program.

These Quotas are distributed by the dioceses and missionary district to the parishes and missions within the diocese or missionary district.

To carry out the General Church Program the interest and strength of the whole Church is needed.

It is your Church. Is it really yours in Spirit? Do you really support it by giving of yourself in willing service, and of your means as though it meant something very real to you? "Look at Christ's Cross and remember the words, "This have I done for thee, what hast thou done for Me?"

Without cooperation of the individual in a parish the Parish Quota cannot be met. If Parish Quotas are not met the Diocesan Quota cannot be met.

The responsibility, therefore, for payment in full of the General Church Program rests on the individual members of the individual parish.

Report from July 1, 1933, to July 1, 1934

During this fiscal year forty-one Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, two Convocations and the Church Periodical Club have contributed to the Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness. The total receipts have amounted to nine hundred and seventy-one dollars and seven cents. It is most regrettable that this amount is even less than last year, which grieves your Treasurer and handicaps the work, so we doubly deplore our failure to meet the full Auxiliary Pledge to the House of Happiness.

As your Treasurer for the Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness it has been my privilege to observe closely the workings of the Auxiliaries in our Diocese, and I deem it a privilege to have taken part in this loyal co-operation. If, so far, we have not lived up to our highest expectations, it is more probably because of these troublous financial times rather than lack of interest in our work among the Mountain people. The splendid response which we received to our requests for donations of clothing and household supplies has materially assisted the work. Many Auxiliaries which were unable to make monetary gifts have at the time set apart for the Fall Shower, and later in response to other requests, sent one or more boxes of clothing and supplies to the House of Happiness. To be especially commended is the way in which the Auxiliaries of Christ Church, Mobile, and "B" Branch of Christ Church, Tuscaloosa, responded to our S. O. S. for fruit and toys for the House of Happiness Christmas Tree.

The fact that the House of Happiness has been enabled to carry on through the vicissitudes of these crucial times is an achievement of which we feel justly proud, and our appreciation goes to our beloved Miss Augusta Martin and her efficient co-worker, Miss Barnwell, for the splendid work so nobly carried on at the House of Happiness.

Last year's report showed a balance of fifty-one dollars, representing the amount on deposit in the Bank of Tuskegee when it was closed by the Banking Department on January 2, 1933. No dividends have as yet been paid on this deposit by the Liquidating Agent.

No expense has been charged against the receipts except the Federal Tax on checks. The funds received and disbursed by me are as follows:

REPORT OF
THE MOBILE CONVOCATION OF THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY, DIOCESE OF ALABAMA, 1933-1934

Madam President: As Chairman of the Mobile Convocation, I beg leave to submit the following annual report:

The Mobile Convocation was hostess for the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Alabama, at All Saints Church in October 1933. The Episcopal Churches of Mobile were open all day Saturday, November the eleventh, to observe the "Quiet Day of Prayer", arranged by the National Executive Board.

of the Woman's Auxiliary. Also the Episcopal women united with the women of other denominations in February in the observance of a program for the inter-denominational "World Day of Prayer" at the First Christian Church.

Platt Roberts, correspondent, discussed the Church Periodical Club, Miss Maude Kimball the United Trunk Offering, and Mrs. John O. Gill the House of Happiness. These reports were full of interest and inspiration. Miss Elizabeth Brininstool, Secretary of the Y. W. C. A., who has recently returned from South America, and who has traveled extensively in Europe, gave an interesting account of her work among the women of foreign countries and displayed some of their artistic work. The Very Reverend Gardiner C. Tucker offered a beautiful noon-day prayer which was followed by the inspirational address of the Conference, the speaker being Mrs. Robert F. Darrah. Her subject was the "Church Wide Endeavor" and she stressed what the women may contribute to a new spiritual awakening. Luncheon was served by the Trinity Branch at one o'clock. At two o'clock the afternoon session was called to order and two minute reports were heard from the various Auxiliaries and church organizations. Deaconess Whitford explained the activities and needs of the Church Home and Mr. Edgar Van W. Edwards spoke of the Indian work in Escambia County. An interesting question box was in charge of Miss Charlie Buck of Toulminville. These reports and discussions provided information and inspiration for another year. CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation, and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.

3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Supply Department, Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor of Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.

*5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled to serve a term of three years and shall be eligible for a second term of three years. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive Meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees.

7. The Recording Secretary shall write the minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the annual report for the printer.

8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by the Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meeting.

9. "A Chairman for each Convocation, who shall have been nominated at the preceding meeting shall be elected by the Convention at the spring conference preceding the election of Diocesan officers, to serve three years, her term of office to be co-existent with that of the incoming President. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Chairman to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board."

10. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

11. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

12. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

13. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

14. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

15. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

16. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.

NOTICE TO AMEND CONSTITUTION (Given at annual meeting, 1934)

Proposed amendment to Article 5 shall be as follows:

*Article 5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be ineligible to serve two successive terms in the same office. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.
