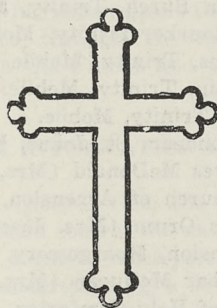

FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH, DIOCESE OF ALABAMA,

Church of the Advent, Birmingham, October 23rd-October 24, 1935

On Wednesday morning, October 23rd, the opening day of the Convention, the annual Corporate Holy Communion was celebrated in the Church of the Advent. Bishop McDowell was celebrant, assisted by the Rector, Rev. Charles Clingman, the Rev. R. Bland Mitchell and the Rev. John L. Jenkins. The sermon was preached by the Bishop. The Memorial Roll was laid on the altar.

The forty-seventh annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama was called to order by the President, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, of Montgomery, at 11:00 A. M., Wednesday, October 23rd, in the Church of the Advent, Birmingham, Alabama. Members of the Birmingham Convocation were hostesses.

The invocation was given by the Bishop and the Auxiliary sang hymn 502. Mrs. Baldwin, Dr. Clingman, Mrs. Memory L. Robinson, President of the Advent Auxiliary, Mrs. Douglas Arant, Chairman of the Birmingham Convocation, welcomed the delegates and visitors to the Convention. The Vice-President, Mrs. D. C. Ogden of Mobile, responded to these greetings.

Mrs. Baldwin announced the formation of a new branch at the University of Alabama to be known as the "University Branch", with Miss Alice Blassingame, President.

Forty branches answered to roll call.

The following committees were appointed by the President:

Committee on Courtesy—Mrs. S. L. Toomer, Chr. Miss Bessie Bouchelle, Mrs. F. A. Cobbs, Mrs. R. E. McWilliams, Mrs. J. A. Snodgrass.

Committee on Findings—Mrs. H. C. DeBardeleben, Chr. Mrs. J. M. Stoney, Mrs. L. H. Baer, Mrs. Memory Robison, Miss Mary Mason.

The following new officers were presented by the President: Treasurer Mrs. E. C. Meredith, Moundville, Ala. Department of Christian Social Service Mrs. Brevard Jones, Montgomery, Ala.

Mrs. Baldwin then presented five University House Mothers from Tuscaloosa, as suggested by Mrs. Thigpen.

Greetings from the Daughters of The King were brought to the Auxiliary by Mrs. W. J. Barnett of Mobile. Miss Mary Collier of Birmingham, brought greetings from the Young People's Service League.

The Committee on Rules, Miss E. V. Freeland, Chairman, gave the following report:

1. Delegates will notify the Chairman of Credentials of their permanent withdrawal from the Convention, and alternates shall then, and only then, take their place.
2. Delegates shall not be entitled to appoint proxies for voting.
3. All important motions shall be written and presented through the Committee on Resolutions.
4. A delegate shall be allowed to speak only once to a motion. This does not include the author of the motion.
5. A delegate speaking to a motion shall announce her name, branch, and convocation.
6. Immediately following a report, the resolutions therein suggested shall be voted on.

The report was adopted.

The President, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, then called Mrs. Ogden to the Chair while the President made announcements and presented recommendations from the Executive Board:

First, That this year's gifts to C. P. C. be given as a memorial to Mrs. Stuart McQueen, and that a short sketch of her life be written and sent with said gifts.

Second, That the Diocesan Program of Service be printed in the Year Book, and that the Year Book be printed in sufficient numbers to give three to each branch, and that arrangement be made to print extra copies of Diocesan Program of Service, to be purchased by branches when needed.

Third, That blank forms for reports be sent in time to reach Presidents of Branches by the First of November.

Fourth, That the Auxiliary provide for trained counsellors for the Young People's Service League.

These recommendations were adopted.

Mrs. Donald Ogden, Vice President, presented the Diocesan Program of Service, which was accepted.

The Noon-Day Prayers were offered by Rev. R. Bland Mitchell.

The report of the Finance Committee, Miss May Kyser, Chairman, was next presented by Miss Kyser, and left to be considered at the afternoon session.

The President, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, again called Mrs. Ogden to take the chair while the President gave her report.

In this report mention was made and emphasis laid on the fact that the auxiliary books now close November 15th. Two report blanks will be sent to each branch by November 1st. Both blanks should be filled out immediately. One should be kept for reference. The other should be sent, as soon as possible, to the Convocation Chairman of the branch making the report. Rev. Charles Clingman, one of the Trustees of St. Mark's School for Negroes, in Birmingham, then made a talk on the American Church Institute for Negroes. St. Mark's School is under the direction of the American Church Institute for Negroes.

Vice-President, Mrs. D. C. Ogden of Mobile, gave her report which was received and filed.

Mrs. J. E. Dowe, Recording Secretary, then gave her report. The latter consisted of the tabulated report of all of the Diocesan Branches from July, 1934 through December, 1934. This half year report will be added to the annual report for 1935. The President next told of books for mission study and other subjects which were in the rear of the church under the care of Miss Freeland, Educational Secretary.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon in the Advent Parish House. After a delightful social hour the meeting reconvened at 2:00 o'clock. The report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Meredith, was read, received and filed. Mrs. D. E. Wilson then read the proposed amendment to Section 5 of the Constitution as follows:

Proposed amendment to Article 5 shall be as follows:

Article 5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be ineligible to serve two successive terms in the same office. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

The amendment was adopted unanimously.

The reports of the Convocational Chairmen, Mrs. Douglas Arant, Birmingham; Mrs. L. J. Lawson, Selma; Mrs. John Curry, Huntsville; Mrs. Ogden for Mrs. H. F. Schroeter of Mobile, were next given. On account of Mrs. Charles Henderson's absence there was no report from Montgomery Convocation. Report by the Cus-

todian of the United Thank Offering, Mrs. Carl Lay, was read and filed.

Report of Supply Work read by Mrs. E. E. Cobbs was filed.

A short talk was made on the work of Rev. Kenneth Morris by his sister, Mrs. Jennie Morris Howard.

Bishop McDowell was then called upon and spoke to the Auxiliary. Next a report of the Committee on Resolutions was made by Mrs. Brevard Jones, Chairman, as follows:

(1) That the budget of expenses for 1936 as read by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Miss Kyser, be adopted.

(2) That an offering of a minimum of \$2.00 be given annually by each Convocation at their spring meeting for the Alice Gregg Fund.

These resolutions were adopted.

A very interesting and complete report of the House of Happiness was given by Miss Nettie Barnwell. Captain C. D. Conder, of the Church Army, gave an enthusiastic report of his work at "The House of Happiness" during the summer months.

Due to lack of time the Maintenance Fund report of the House of Happiness was not read.

Mrs. Baldwin announced that the United Thank Offering Pageant would be held at St. Mary's Church at 8 P. M.

The afternoon session was adjourned fifteen minutes earlier than usual, in order that the delegates might visit St. Mark's School for Negroes.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 24TH

The beautiful United Thank Offering Pageant was given at St. Mary's Church at eight o'clock last night. It was called "The Gift of Thanksgiving," and was written by Mrs. Douglas Arant, Chairman of the Birmingham Convocation.

Scenes depicting the far reaching influence of the funds from our little Blue Boxes were portrayed in the most inspiring way, and all went away from St. Mary's feeling that it was good to have been there.

The morning session of the Auxiliary was called to order at 9 A. M. by the President, in the Church of the Advent. The Creed and Auxiliary Prayer followed.

The minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

The President asked for volunteers to read reports which had been sent in and made announcements.

The report of Deaconess Whitford on the Church Home at Mobile was read and filed. Mrs. Baldwin added a few words to the pleas made. There is a great need for house-hold linen at the Church Home. Sheets and spreads, of three quarter size, together with pillow-cases, towels, napkins, and table-cloths will be most gratefully received. Octagon Soap and other Octagon products are

offering splendid premiums now for their coupons. These coupons have helped to bring comforts to the Home. Mrs. Macy's report of work among the Indians in Escambia County, was read by the President. It was learned in listening to this report of Mrs. Macy's that many of our branches are behind in sending much-needed funds to help in the Indian work.

Rev. R. C. Fletcher, Missionary to the Deaf, gave a most interesting and enlightening report of his work.

The following reports were read:

Mrs. Searcy's "Advance Work" by Miss Elizabeth Freeland.

Mrs. C. H. Beale's efficient work as Corresponding Secretary was mentioned by the President.

Miss Margaret Bennett read the report of the Business Women's Units of the Diocese.

Mrs. Henry Izard's report for the "Church Periodical Club" was read by Mrs. Douglas Arant.

Miss Elsie McIntyre's report of the "Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund" was read by Mrs. Baldwin.

Telegram of greetings and good wishes from Mrs. Paul Tate was read by Mrs. Dowe.

Report of Miss Lida Holt's "Gift of Life" Committee was read by Mrs. M. M. Baldwin.

Mrs. Brevard Jones, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented the following:

(1) Be it Resolved, That the finance committee place in the 1935-36 budget of the Woman's Auxiliary, diocese of Alabama, not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for defraying the traveling expenses of at least three volunteer workers to one or more of the missions of the diocese. Said fund to be known as the "Gift of Life Fund." Adopted.

(2) The Woman's Auxiliary expresses its appreciation of the self-forgetful spirit and constructive service of Miss Nettie Barnwell in carrying on the work of the House of Happiness during Miss Martin's absence and our continued interest in the progress of her future work. Recognized by standing vote.

(3) That this body go on record as deeply regretting the necessity of Miss Augusta Martin's resignation; and that the President be empowered to appoint a committee to select a gift from the Auxiliary which Miss Martin may keep in memory of them. Recognized by standing vote.

(4) Whereas the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was given the privilege of making the initial gift for the House of Happiness, and the service radiating from that center has been a potent influence in the extension of the Kingdom of God, and the opportunity has now presented itself for the extension of that work to the Cumberland Plateau, and Bishop McDowell and Captain Conder have presented the Call of the Church to work in the new

development of the Cumberland Plateau—I move that the Alabama Branch in Convention assembled heartily endorse this effort and make a self denial gift from the Woman's Auxiliary for the extension of the Church's influence to the Cumberland Plateau. Adopted.

After the passage of the last Resolution a free-will-offering was taken, and pledges made to Miss Elizabeth Freeland, the newly appointed treasurer of this work, "The House of Happiness Extension Fund." The total of this offering and pledges amounted to \$183.11. The President announced that a Committee on "The House of Happiness Extension Fund" would be appointed at the close of the session. Suggestion was made that Miss Martin's name be included in the title to be considered by the committee.

Mrs. Ogden moved the title be changed to "Augusta B. Martin House of Happiness Extension Fund." Discussion. Mrs. Ogden withdrew her motion. Motion was made that the choosing of the name be left in the hands of the committee. Motion carried.

Mrs. L. J. Lawson, Chairman of the Selma Convocation, invited the Convention to meet in Selma in the fall of 1936. This invitation was accepted with thanks.

Mrs. Albert Wilson, Chairman, made a report of the Memorial Fund.

The President paid tribute to Mrs. Frank Thigpen's work as Chairman of the Prayer Partnership, and called attention to the addition of Mrs. Angela Oglesby's name to the list.

Miss Elizabeth Freeland made report as Educational Secretary.

Mrs. James' report of the League of the Isolated was read by Miss Kyser.

Report of the Girls' Friendly Society, Mobile Branch, was read by Mrs. Ogden.

Moved and seconded that the offering from the Corporate Communion of Wednesday at the Church of the Advent, amounting to \$36.90, go to the United Thank Offering. Motion carried.

The report of Mrs. Toomer, Chairman of the Courtesy Committee, was read and filed.

The report of the Committee on Findings, Mrs. Earle Pettus, Chairman, was read and filed.

The 11:30 Devotional Service was postponed for one half hour.

Mrs. Brevard Jones gave a report from Christian Social Service Department.

President paid tribute to splendid work of Department heads.

Mrs. Albert Wilson reported work of Religious Education Department.

Mrs. J. L. Lawson reported on Provincial Synod at Lexington, and announced that it will be held next year at New Orleans.

Mrs. Robinson, of the Advent Auxiliary, extended an invitation to remain for luncheon at the Church of the Advent.

President announced Nominating Committee would be appointed at an early date.

Due to lack of time the Minutes of the morning meeting were not read but a committee composed of Mrs. Albert Wilson, Miss Elizabeth Freeland and Mrs. L. J. Lawson was appointed to approve minutes. After the Devotional Service by the Rev. Capers Satterlee of St. Andrew's Church, Birmingham, the Forty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Alabama, was formally adjourned.

(Since our Annual Meeting, a letter has been received by your President from the Reverend Kenneth Morris, Kyoto, Japan. Knowing the great interest which each Auxiliary Branch feels in the work of Rev. Kenneth Morris, it is a very real pleasure to be able to add this letter to the Year Book.)

Kyoto, Japan, 102 Murasakino Goshoden Cho,
October 7, 1935.

My dear Mrs. Baldwin:

I am so sorry your letter did not reach me in time for me to get an answer to you for the Auxiliary meeting; but when I looked up the boat there was none leaving that would put a letter in your hands by then. It is best to allow two months for a reply, because if the letter out should miss a boat in San Francisco and then the return letter should miss one at Yokohama it really does take about two months.

The best news I can write you is that this morning work has begun on the new parish house and tower. It will be finished by April of next year we hope, and the dedication will be on Easter Sunday. This does not include the Church as we still lack a great deal of money for that. We have sent out many appeals and still hope that the contract may be let by the end of November, but it can be done only if a few individuals to whom we have appealed respond with large contributions. We do need the church so much. We have raised some funds for it out here, of course, but there are so few Christians to give that it is impossible to get it all in Japan. The money for the Parish House is different, because of the social nature of the work in it, we can appeal to non-Christian and to various foundations. We expect to raise a total of Y10,000 in Japan for that, and we may even get Y12,000. If the Auxiliary is still working on the project for the Church of the Resurrection and have any funds for it, I hope it will be sent out as soon as possible. Would it be possible to get a few generous souls to make up \$1,000 for the church? The exchange rate is very favorable now and a \$1,000 will come to more than Y3,500.

The various church activities are going forward with great success. We have over 70 children in the kindergarten. I think we are the largest of the private kindergartens in the city. The clinic work is fine. We have such a fine visiting nurse. As our clinic is almost entirely preventive we can rejoice in the number of patients, for it does not mean that they are sick, but are coming to keep from getting sick.

Our Fresh Air Camp was also a great success again. As you know this year was our second one. You may have seen the pic-

ture in the Spirit of Missions, September issue. I believe, there were three pictures of the work at the Church of the Resurrection! Those 50 children were the happiest group you can imagine. They did have a glorious time.

For two years now we have had no trouble at all with them. We have never had to discipline anyone. And no one has been injured or seriously sick. I think that is a good record.

The great need now in our clinic work is a mid-wife. We have tried to get a good Christian woman for that position, and now I think we have found one. But of course there is the expense connected with it. Her salary will be only ¥40.00 per month and room rent ¥6.00—\$15.00 a month will cover her salary and room rent. It seems to me that would be a fine project for some Auxiliary to undertake. What do you think of it? Or perhaps three Auxiliaries could go in together and send \$5.00 each monthly. It would give them a very direct contact with the work and in such a concrete way. It is a real challenge. And a most appropriate work for the Auxiliary.

We are having glorious October days. The sky is so blue and the sun shines so brightly. It is a real treat because we have so much rain and from November the clear days will be very few. Kyoto climate is terrible in winter.

I was so shocked to hear of Mrs. McDonald's death. How lonely he must be without her. I cannot imagine their home without her. She was a lovely woman and a fine Christian wife.

Mrs. Morris is busy teaching Betty. She will begin on the second grade work as soon as the material comes. We use the Calvert Course, from the Calvert School, Baltimore. It is expensive, but the best for home teaching. Ken is also busy—but with cutting teeth and getting into things! He is a great joy to us all.

We are always glad to hear from you and from any of the Auxiliaries that will write. It is so hard to keep in touch with things at this distance. Please remember us to all our friends. And may God bless you in your work for Him and others.

Mrs. Morris joins me in all good wishes.

Christian Social Service Department

Convention Report, October 24th, 1935

Madam Chairman and Members of the Convention:

In March when your chairman of Christian Social Service accepted the responsibility of a newly created department, she was indeed glad to accept as co-workers the following women suggested by the Convocational Chairman: from Mobile, Miss Mary V. Bo-

mar; from the Montgomery Convocation, Mrs. Oscar Lewis of Dothan; from the Selma Convocation, Mrs. L. H. Baer of Marion; from the Birmingham Convocation, Mrs. W. H. McDonald of Birmingham. No one as yet serving from the Huntsville Convocation. While reports have come in showing that in parishes all over the diocese churchwomen are alive as never before to the vital needs of service among all classes, we present no list of accomplishments, nor have we compiled such a list. It seemed well to take this year to study our functions as a Department and to define our service, instead of asking each branch to report to the convocational chairman and them in return to report to the Diocesan Chairman the list of all the things which Christian Social Service Committees are doing. Another year we may ask for some such report.

The following definition was agreed on by the Committee as covering the field of Social Service:

Christian Social Service is an effort to meet the needs of society by ministering to the poor, the afflicted, the mal-adjusted in the spirit and in the name of Christ, and to remove the handicaps that make it difficult for the individual to develop to his fullest capacity, having as its goal, the creation of a new social order which will give each individual freedom to develop his best ideals and activities and to realize his place as a citizen and as a Child of God.

From the definition, you will see that there are two different ways of approaching the problems of those needing us, first the Ministry of Service. We all know that the first immediate task of rendering loving service to the unfortunate appeals to women everywhere. From the many reports from parishes that have come in with varied types of service and from your sustained interest in the Social Institutions of the Diocese, it is manifestly true that during the year you have not failed to extend the proverbial Cup of Cold Water in His Name.

But the second part of the Definition holds greater difficulty and offers greater challenge to us—the Creation of a New Social Order in accord with the Mind of Christ. In consciousness of our inadequacy and ignorance, our weakness and selfishness, we shrink from this part of the task. What is the new social order that we should work for in International Relations, in Industry, in Race Relations? In order that the Christian Social Service Work shall not consist of trying to relieve a present situation without constructive planning for the future, the National Executive Board during the year passed the following resolution: "That the Christian Social Service chairman in each Diocese parish and mission be urged to promote among groups of women in their branches intensive study of race relations, economic conditions, politics, and international relations, and to stress the necessity of acting on this basis alone." Your Program of Service will carry numerous suggestions along this line and we plan to supplement this with fur-

ther suggestions from those desiring them. We look on such study as a consecration of the intellect to the task of seeking and knowing the truth that leads to perfect freedom of service, just as our hands are consecrated to the serving of the sick or making garments for the needy.

In accord with the Mind of Christ. That we may know his mind and purpose for us in his service, your department asks that the most important of all things should not be neglected—the spiritual following in our service of the Master. We can think of no more important thing for each Branch to do than to arrange in each Parish and Mission for a Corporate Communion for Christian Social Service where all those of the Parish working along that line—men and women and all Christian workers in the community may join in seeking together to know the Mind of Christ for the Community, the Parish and the world. If you can do only one thing in the field of Social Service this year let it include this Corporate Communion—testimony to all the world that our work for the brotherhood of man is Christ's work. And as we humbly bow before his throne, perhaps our ignorance, our selfishness, and our weakness may be submerged in his strength, his light and his love. The Third Sunday in Epiphany has been set aside in our program for this service, but we realize that the program of different parishes and missions may make it necessary to choose some other day. But may we not say that our objectives this year will be:

- A. A Christian Social Service Committee in every parish and Mission.
- B. In His Name unflinching response to the needs of others.
- C. To relieve present unfortunate conditions.
- D. Intensive study to create a background for constructive planning.
- E. Seeking to know the Mind of Christ through prayer and Corporate Communion.

Memorial Resolution

Virginia Dunbar McQueen passed into life immortal, February 24, 1935. From the time that she came into the Diocese in 1897 as the wife of the Reverend Stewart McQueen, she was unusually constant in prayers, gifts, and labor, for the spread of Christ's Kingdom through the agency of the Woman's Auxiliary. As Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club from 1902 to 1917 her efficiency, graciousness, and consecration, set a standard for the work in this Diocese whose influence has lasted long beyond the years of her administration. The Woman's Auxiliary in Convention assembled October 24, 1935, directed that in her memory a gift be sent to the Church Periodical Club.

REPORT OF THE GIFT OF LIFE COMMITTEE

Annual Meeting, October 23-24, 1935, Birmingham

LIDA HOLT—CHAIRMAN

"Our Lord came to establish His Kingdom, the Church. This new and divine fellowship is not of man but of God. Every other human association will be overthrown by time and evil, but the Church of Christ will stand forever. Therefore, when we commit our lives to Christ and His Church we are secure. Neither we ourselves or our ideals can fail."

And so it is that we should strive to carry out our Lord's command and spread the Good News to the uttermost parts of the world.

As members of the Auxiliary, we "pray fervently, labor diligently, and give liberally to make Him known to all nations as their Saviour and their King." When we give liberally "we pray Thee to send forth more laborers into Thy Harvest—Guard and guide the workers in the field."

"The Gift of Life Committee is charged with the duty of presenting to the youth of the parish and the diocese the call of the Church in the fields of evangelism, education, and medicine. The Communion Service in each month is the time of special intercession for the Gift of Life. Through the channels of this committee summer volunteers are offered to relieve regular workers in Church Missions."

In our diocese there are wonderful opportunities for service. We have the welfare work at the House of Happiness, and the work among the Indians in Escambia County. We have the Church Home. All excellent fields for the youth of our diocese who want to render a life of service to his or her Church.

There are young people in all our parishes who are just beginning to make their plans for life work. Let us give them the opportunity to consider some of the Church's work.

It is going to be the aim of the Gift of Life Committee for 1935-36 to present to the youth in our diocese, the work of the Church. It is going to give an opportunity to some to actually serve in one or more of the mission fields during the coming summer.

There has been appointed by Mrs. Baldwin, three capable women, Mrs. Jennie Morris Howard, of Tuscaloosa, Mrs. Alice Nabors, Montevallo, and Miss Mary Marshall Fletcher, Auburn, to serve with me, who are going to keep in contact with as many of the youth of the Church as possible, and present to them the work in Alabama. From the groups contacted, young people who are conscientious, consecrated, and really want to serve will be selected by the committee and approved by the Bishop and our president, to spend a part of the summer working for and at the same time rendering a valuable service to the Church.

It is hoped that a sum of money for traveling expenses to the missions is going to be available to enable these volunteers to serve.

As chairman of the Gift of Life Committee, I gave a report at the annual Spring Convocation Meeting of the Mobile Convocation, held at St. Paul's Church, Spring Hill. I attended the Seawanee Summer Training School last August, and had a conference with Mrs. D. D. Tabor, in regard to the work of the Gift of Life Committee. I also met with Mrs. Baldwin, and have corresponded with the members of my committee.

In connection with the work of this committee is the Roll of Volunteers. Attached is as complete list as I have been able to obtain to date. I have appointed Mrs. Howard in charge of the Birmingham and Huntsville Convocation to secure the names of those gone into Life Service from parishes within these convocations, Mrs. Nabors for the Selma, Miss Fletcher for the Montgomery, and myself for the Mobile. It is sincerely hoped that this list can be completed soon.

CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation, and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.

3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Supply Department, Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor of Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.

5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be ineligible to serve two successive terms in the same office. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive Meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees.

7. The Recording Secretary shall write the minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the annual report for the printer.

8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by the Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meeting.

9. "A Chairman for each Convocation, who shall have been nominated at the preceding meeting shall be elected by the convention at the spring conference preceding the election of Diocesan officers, to serve three years, her term of office to be co-existent with that of the incoming President. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Chairman to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board."

10. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

11. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

12. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

13. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

14. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

15. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

16. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.

11. A Commission of Inquiry is hereby appointed to inquire into the affairs of the Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, and to report thereon to the next meeting of the General Convention. The Commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the General Convention at its next meeting. The Commission shall be organized and shall begin its work as soon as possible after the adjournment of the General Convention.

Foreword

Here is presented the Diocesan Program of Service for the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama. It has been so arranged that it will suggest the aims of this year in study, gifts and prayer in the three fields—diocese, nation and world. We suggest that parish programs shall be based on this and be made to include parish and community objectives and needs, thus completing our work in the five fields of service, through missionary and religious education and Christian Social Service.

Of course we must recognize the fact that all programs are mere suggestions. You can work out a program to develop the subject for your own group. You will note that the programs are arranged for one meeting a month. You will find when you study the programs that there is enough suggestions to develop into several meetings.

Our hope of growth depends upon the increase of leadership and interest of the younger women of the Church. Our prayer is that this Program of Service will commend itself to all the women of the Church in the aim to know Christ and to make Him known in all the world.

We again recommend that you inspire and deepen your Church Life in the Auxiliary by quiet hours, days of intercessions and

Corporate Communion. We recommend the formation of prayer groups for the practice and study of the art of Prayer. Endeavor to create a deeper interest in the United Thank Offering emphasizing prayer, joyful service and gifts of Thanksgiving. We can not close this FOREWORD without asking you to remember as we go through the year that power is in unity of EFFORT. The whole Diocese working as one to carry out each program.
