


MINUTES

FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE
PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF
THE DIOCESE OF ALABAMA

Saint Paul's Episcopal Church, Selma, October 28th-29th, 1936

On Wednesday morning, October 28th, the opening day of the Convention, the annual Corporate Holy Communion was celebrated in Saint Paul's Church, with Bishop McDowell as celebrant. The sermon was preached by the Reverend Charles J. Carpenter of the Church of the Advent, Birmingham, Alabama. Offerings of \$50.09 for the benefit of the new Student Pastor Work at the University of Alabama was taken. The Memorial Roll was laid on the Altar.

The forty-eighth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama was called to order by the President, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin of Montgomery, Alabama at 11:00 a. m., Wednesday, October 28th in Saint Paul's Parish House, Selma, Alabama. Members of the Selma Convocation were hostesses.

The invocation was given by the Bishop and the Auxiliary sang hymn 315. Dr. Gamble, Rector of Saint Paul's Church, welcomed the delegates and visitors to the Convention. Mrs. John N. Furness gave the welcome from the St. Paul's Auxiliary and Mrs. Sarah Jennings for the Selma Convocation. Mrs. D. C. Ogden responded to these greetings.

Mrs. Jennings spoke for Mrs. Lawson who was ill and therefore unable to attend the Convention. Mrs. Bland Mitchell of Birmingham spoke to the delegates and visitors in behalf of Mrs. Baldwin's untiring efforts as President of the State Auxiliary. Mrs. Baldwin responded and requested the Bishop to address the Auxiliary and have the noon day prayer. Mrs. Brevard Jones read greetings from the Daughters of the King for Mrs. Barnett who was absent from the Convention.

Thirty-six branches answered to roll call.

Presentation of distinguished guests and new officers was made by the President, Mrs. Baldwin: Sister Clarke, Mrs. W. L. Spratling, Mrs. Peter Dennis and Mrs. Jennie Morris Howard. The new Convocation Chairmen were as follows: Mrs. M. M. Duncan, Mrs. Henry Seawell and Mrs. Newton Campbell. Greetings were brought from the Young People's Service League by Miss Tate. Mrs. Legare was appointed to send a message of sympathy to Mrs. L. J. Lawson.

An address followed by the Noon-Day Prayers was made by the Bishop. The meeting adjourned for luncheon in the Parish House. After a delightful social hour delegates reassembled at 2:00 o'clock.

The Committee on Rules, Miss E. V. Freeland, Chairman, gave the following report:

1. Delegates will notify the Chairman of Credentials of their permanent withdrawal from the Convention, and alternates shall then, and only then, take their place.
2. Delegates will not be entitled to appoint proxies for voting.
3. All important motions shall be written and presented through the Committee on Resolutions.
4. A delegate shall be allowed to speak only once to a motion. This does not include the author of the motion.
5. A delegate speaking to a motion shall announce her name, branch and convocation.
6. Immediately following a report, the resolutions therein suggested shall be voted on.

The report was adopted.

The report of Deaconess Whitford on the Church Home at Mobile was read and filed. There are 59 children being cared for in the home. A special plea was made for blankets for the children. There are 38 branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, each clothing some child in the Church Home.

Mrs. Bland Mitchell, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee presented the following:

1. Be it resolved that it is the sense of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Alabama that a responsibility rests upon it to bend every effort to bring the Diocese to a more adequate sense of its responsibility to the Church Home, and that to this end, and with the consent of the Bishop, each branch of the Auxiliary shall seek to promote in its parish one Sunday in each year that shall be known as Church Home Sunday, and that such offering shall be known as a discretionary fund to be used by the responsible authorities of the Home for the purposes for which stated funds are not available. Resolution adopted.

2. Be it further resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary appoint in the Social Service Department a chairman for the Church Home, who will receive funds and report on conditions to the Auxiliary. Adopted.

3. Whereas the Fourth Province, of which Alabama is a member, has at Sewanee, Tenn., the University of the South, and whereas, this University is used most successfully each summer as a Training School both for young and old: Resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama heartily endorse the inspirational and educational work of these Conferences, and that we show our appreciation by encouraging young people to attend these meetings and by having personal representatives of our own branches in attendance on this Training Schol. This resolution was adopted.

4. Resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary in assembled convention express to the retiring president, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, deep appreciation for her consecrated service and extend to her love, loyalty and good wishes. Recognized by unanimous standing vote.

Capt. C. D. Conder, Director of the House of Happiness, gave a most enthusiastic report of his work there and thanked the Auxiliary for their support.

A very interesting and complete report was read by Sister Clarke of the Church Army. It was stated that the sum of \$168.77 had been procured to make her home more comfortable.

Mrs. W. L. Stevens gave a report on the Maintenance Fund.

Reverend Edwards of Escambia County presented a report showing what a large part religious influence has played in helping the Indians of Escambia County.

The Executive Board recommended the following proposed amendments to be considered for voting and, if passed, will be entered into next year's Constitution:

1. Amend Article Eight by substituting for Department, the words, Special activities having separate treasurers.

2. After Article Eight, insert the following Articles with appropriate numbers:

a. The Vice-president shall preside in the absence of the President, shall ex-officio be Chairman of the Program of Work, and shall assist the president in the formation of new branches.

b. The Educational Secretary shall promote study classes and individual reading and study in all lines of church work as

directed by the National Woman's Auxiliary, and as far as possible make her office a resource of information for every department of Auxiliary Work. She shall be a member of the Committee on Program of Work.

c. The United Thank Offering Secretary shall stimulate the offerings of gifts from thankful hearts of all church women for the extension of God's Kingdom on earth, shall receive these twice a year and place the funds in the custody of the General Church as directed by the National Woman's Auxiliary.

3. Amend Article twelve by inserting the words "and chairmen" after the word "officers".

4. Add this article: Past Presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be members of the Executive Board and Honorary Vice-Presidents of the organization.

5. Amend article thirteen by substituting for the word "October" the word "Fall", and adding at the end of article the words, "at their Spring Meeting."

6. Add articles on Departments: Departments of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be organized to co-operate with the Diocesan Departments as appointed by the Bishop and Convention of the Diocese and with the Woman's Auxiliary in its co-ordinated lines of work.

7. Add article on Expense Fund: All branches shall contribute to the expense fund according to their numbers and strength, the standard of giving to be adjusted from time to time to meet the budget of the Auxiliary by correspondence between the Branch Treasurer and the Diocesan Chairman of Finance.

The annual Budget was presented by the Finance Chairman Miss May Kyser and adopted.

The afternoon session was adjourned by singing hymn No. 502.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 9TH

At eight P. M. Wednesday, in St. Paul's Church, Rev. E. R. Neff of Arden, South Carolina addressed the Convention on "Stewardship". The evening service closed with a beautiful musical program.

The convention re-assembled on Thursday morning at nine in the Parish House, with the president Mrs. Baldwin, in the chair. The creed and Auxiliary Prayer were recited in unison. Mrs. Baldwin, in the name of the convention, thanked the choir of St. Paul's Church and other musicians and singers of Selma for the lovely song service of the evening before, and also thanked the hostess branches for the charming hospitality delegates and visitors were enjoying.

The following report of the House of Happiness Extension Fund was made. The chairman, Miss Elizabeth Freeland had received \$168.77 and paid this sum to Capt. Conder who deposited it in a Scottsboro Bank. A tract of land has been promised by people of the Cumberland farms to the Church for our work there. When the deed shall have been received this money will be used for building.

A motion was carried that a telegram be sent Mrs. D. E. Wilson as an expression of regret for her absence and that the following message be sent to Mrs. L. J. Lawson—

Resolved that: The Woman's Auxiliary now in session wishes to place on record this expression of sincere regret for the illness of Mrs. Lawson and for her inability to be present at this convention.

The President brought the Convention a timely message in her report as retiring officer.

After the election the new officers were duly installed in a brief service conducted by Rev. E. W. Gamble.

The Treasurer's report was accepted. The Secretary was instructed to write Mrs. Beale, Corresponding Secretary, a note of appreciation of her services. The United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. Carl Lay, gave a most encouraging report. At Mrs. Lay's request it was voted that the funds now in her hands should not be sent to the Custodian of the General Church until after January 1st. in order that the accruing interest on this fund need not be sacrificed; but in future the funds were to be sent in as soon as collected. The report of the Church Periodical Club was given by Mrs. Henry Izzard, Secretary. The Convention accepted with thanks Mrs. Newton Campbell's invitation to meet in Mobile in the fall of 1937.

A motion was carried that the Auxiliary assume the gathering of a library of required books for St. Mark's School for Negroes in order that the school might become accredited, and that \$25.00 be sent to Anniston for the work there.

Greetings were received from the Convention of the Christian Church meeting in Selma at this time, and sent by Rev. A. L. Harrell, pastor of the First Christian Church. Mrs. Baldwin appointed Mrs. John Furniss a committee of one to return a greeting of Christian fellowship and good wishes and to send a like message to members of the Baptist faith, also in convention assembled in Selma.

The report of the Courtesy committee was received.

Mrs. Baldwin presented the gavel to the new president, Mrs. J. C. Long.

Mrs. Metcalf, Mrs. Blalock, and Mrs. John Crump were appointed a committee to approve the minutes of the morning session of the convention.

Rev. E. W. Gamble of St. Paul's, Selma gave the benediction, and the Forty-Eighth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America in the Diocese of Alabama was formally adjourned.

ADDRESS BY MRS. BALDWIN

Women of the Auxiliary and Friends:

I am aware of the seriousness of purpose of our Auxiliary work, and have given my best to the furtherance of its program, hence it is real interest which prompts me to write down a few thoughts which have come to me during my years as Diocesan President.

Why is it that our women all over the diocese are so averse to accepting places on our diocesan roll of officers, or among the chairmen of committees, etc? If I should tell you how many women I asked to be our Diocesan Recording Secretary — that I almost gave up in despair of ever finding a Diocesan Treasurer — and that, in a less degree, this state of affairs has prevailed in regard to most of the vacancies which have occurred in our ranks, do you wonder that it seems worth while to mention this?

Another thought is that ever-recurring one — why do not the younger women of our diocese take the leadership of our Auxiliary work? We all recognize the fact that many young women are engaged in various occupations, but is this any reason why they should feel that the vital matters which come into our lives, as Church women, should receive no thought from them?

As older women a valiant part of our service should be rendered through interesting young women in the Auxiliary. They will not become interested unless the responsibility of office-holding, with its accompanying possibilities, is placed upon them.

In much of our literature there is mention made of the need of the Auxiliary for the trained thought of our business and professional women. Many of the problems in our missionary work demand the wisest and clearest thinking, and if our young women were in places of leadership we might confidently expect to have an Auxiliary outlook which would seriously concern itself with many of the pressing problems of our time.

There are young women in the Auxiliary who are trained to accept such thought challenges as that of making permanent plans for the betterment of the Indians of Escambia Co. I wonder why their talent is not available to us! It might be, that through a consecrated concentration of thought upon some plan which would make the condition of the Indians better known to some of the public-spirited citizens of our state, that we might help them — for the Indian problem is one which covers schools, health, recreation, in fact all of the phases of life.

If this meeting were to carefully consider and appoint a committee to visit the Escambia Co. Indian Work by the middle of November, and then report upon their visit, offering definite suggestions as to what may be done to further the cause of the Indians, I believe that funds for the expense of the committee would be forth coming. The committee might be instructed to make a written report of their visit by the first of December, as this would give time for the report to be published in the Year Book for January, 1937.

Then there is our Negro work. You may recall that at our Provincial Meeting of the Auxiliary, held last year in Lexington, Ky., the following resolution in regard to the American Church Institute for Negroes was passed. "That the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, in every diocese within each state in the Province in which there is an American Church Institute school, organize an annual pilgrimage, with the approval and co-operation of the Bishop, to the Institute school which is within their respective states, etc." We were enabled to carry out this resolution in 1935, for we met in Birmingham where St. Mark's School for Negroes is located. How are we to arrange to carry out this resolution annually? Would the same committee which visited our Indian work at Atmore be enabled to visit, also, St. Mark's School, at Birmingham? In the interest of economy — certainly not. Each committee should, in my judgment, be a separate and distinct committee, and be appointed to consist of three persons who are not far removed from the places to be visited.

There is not enough time for me to talk of our Church Home for Orphans, nor of our House of Happiness. Both of these institutions are among those which are better known in the diocese.

The term "our neighbors" now embraces "The World", and, for our special remembrance, in Alabama, the Japanese people, among whom Kenneth Morris spends days of fruitful service. "The World" brings to us, also, our United Thank Offering. Are we remembering the latter in our prayers — and in our offering? Our "Blue Boxes" are meant to be supplied through sacrificial gifts, and a Prayer of Thanksgiving goes with each offering placed in them. In thinking of them no question ever arises as to whether an ice-cream supper or a bridge party will furnish means to fill them. Just a silent thought of God's goodness to us — an offering to Him, in gratitude — and the Blue Box has fulfilled its mission!

The Forward Movement is calling upon us for organized work in the formation of Schools of Prayer. These are not so much emotional outlets as places where we lose sight of personality in a united and sincere effort to learn the great truths of the Spirit,— where our minds and souls, through concentration and quiet may become channels for the transmission of inspiration from God. "Proving Prayer" is the guide which we are given to work with, published by the Forward Movement Commission, 223 West 7th St. Cincinnati, Ohio. I wish that we might at this meeting resolve to think seriously on the subject of Schools of Prayer.

I also wish that it might become the custom in the five Convocations to have Fall Institutes, as well as Spring Conferences. The idea of each Convocation having two meetings a year was suggested by the Report of The Leadership Training Committee, adopted at our Annual Meeting in Montgomery, in 1934. The Fall Institutes need not be formal in any way — need have no planned social feature — but might consist of whole mornings spent in thoughtful discussion of all of our work, with its accompanying problems. Such meetings would give us a method of acquainting ourselves with the Diocesan, Provincial and National Auxiliary. We would then come to think of ourselves as part of a great national body — ready to be of use in every great movement for bringing in The Kingdom of God.

I well recall what a thrill I once had, in China, on seeing a notice of a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary! We want to be so bound together as Episcopal women that we become prepared to seize every opportunity for service in the Five Fields of Service. It has been a disappointment to me that we have not yet held a Fall Institute. On the other hand, it was a wonderful gain that we made last fall when each Convocation Chairman received and tabulated the reports from her branches. The saving of effort on the part of the Diocesan Secretary was a tremendous one, and I am sure that every Convocation Chairman gained a knowledge of her work in this way which she would not have gained in any other way.

During the past summer I received a communication from Mrs. E. R. Hemphill, of Greenwood, Miss. Mrs. Hemphill stated that some of the Mississippi Auxiliary women felt that it would be a good thing if Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana would hold their Annual Meetings at about the same time in the fall —say within one week. By doing this, these three dioceses might be enabled to get a National Council speaker, with very little expense. A speaker from the New York office could go from one diocese to the other in very quick time. We need to be in closer touch with our National Headquarters. We have many national projects which we should know more about from those who are familiar with them. Just now I am thinking of Kuling School, in China, where the children of our missionaries are educated, and of St. Luke's Hospital, in Japan, the great work of Dr. Bolling Teussler, himself a Virginian. A National Council speaker would bring us into much closer relationship with the great body of our Church. It would seem that we should act upon Mrs. Hemphill's suggestion.

With these observations, I feel that I have covered a few points which may be considered later on. One can only do one's part faithfully during a term of service — remembering afterwards many things which might have been accomplished, but for which vision and strength were not granted at the time.

I leave the office of president with love in my heart for every woman in our organization — with appreciation of your support — and with the sincere desire that during the three year term of my successor our work may be three-fold greater, in every department, than during the past three years. It was a great privilege which you extended to me when you offered me the place of Diocesan President.

Through the service which I have tried to render, I pray that I may be better qualified to serve our great Church in the years to come.

My dear Mrs. Baldwin:

I have just received a letter from my sister saying that you hoped I would be present at the Woman's Auxiliary meeting in October. I do wish it were possible, but we will not leave Japan until Oct. 26th at the earliest. We have engaged passage on the President Pierce sailing on that date, and if all goes well with our new building and the expansion of the work we will sail on that date. Please convey to the members of the Auxiliary my earnest desire to be present and to thank each one for her prayers and interest in our work.

Present plans are for the dedication of the new building to be held on Oct. 1st. But as we hope to have Bishop Tucker with us, it may be necessary to change the date to fit in with his schedule. He is to be in Japan this Fall, but we have no detailed information yet.

How we would like to have the Auxiliary meet with us! We have such a lovely Parish House. It seems like a dream, and we know that we must prove worthy of it by doing a great work for the Lord. And there is so much to do! We moved into the Parish House this last week. The Church and Tower are not completed, but will be in about one month.

It's wonderful the way our clinic is growing. We often have over fifty. And everyone predicts that with the new building we will be swamped with people. But our great need in the clinic is for a mid-wife. How I wish someone would undertake to support one, for a year at least. I think if I had her support for a year I could then get Japanese to support her. We so often have to demonstrate before we can get support here. \$200 a year at the present rate of exchange would do it.

By September we hope to have our Day Nursery operating. We have fine rooms for it up-stairs and we hope to have it supported en-

tirely by Japanese gifts. As our work proves its worth we find it easier to raise money here. But of course there are some who are less inclined to give because it is Christian. But I think you know that of over fifty Japanese Patrons only 12 are Christians. We now received aid from the City and Prefecture, which counts a lot in giving us prestige so that we can get money easier from non-Christians.

We will get out an illustrated booklet for the dedication telling all about the work. This will be in English and Japanese. We will either mail one to each Auxiliary or bring them with us. We want you to share with us in the success of the work, and each member of the Auxiliary to realize that this is her work. We are only your representatives.

The Fresh-Air Camp was great. I think it was our best. Again we took 50 poor children to the coast for 10 days. They did have a glorious time. The water was just right, and despite a few bad days the time went very quickly and all hated to come home. How they did eat! Of course all children eat at a camp, but I think some of these children just had never had enough to eat at home. This was our third Camp — 150 children — and we have never had to discipline a child. Japanese children behave perfectly. I think our Camp is one of the best missionary pieces of work we do. For 10 days we have full opportunity to teach them Christianity. Not that we try to force it on them. It is done with the full consent of the parents and teachers, and also the children like it. Outside of Christianity they get no ethical teaching based on religion, and ethical teaching apart from loyalty to an ethical God does not go very far. Japanese teachers recognize this, and that is why they welcome religious teaching at the camp and why they welcome our Church Schools. We are giving to ethical teaching something they cannot give, because they do not have it outside of Christianity.

Please continue to remember our work in your prayers. May God bless the Auxiliary and all the wonderful work you are doing.

REPORT OF WORK AT CUMBERLAND FARMS

September 1941

Scottsboro, Alabama

In 1935 a survey was made of the Resettlement Project at Cumberland Farms near Scottsboro where 200 farm families are locating. Regular weekly services were begun and have since been maintained by Capt. C. L. Conder, Director of the House of Happiness. Prior to the establishment of a more definite permanent program, Mission Sister Ada Clarke of the Church Army, was appointed as full-time worker at the colony. She has paid particular attention so far to influencing girls and has founded a Girl Scouts troop, is community librarian, Sunday School teacher and assists in whatever good works are being undertaken by the Community Council of which she is a member. A 40 acre tract near the heart of the colony is being secured for the Church, and a fund of \$168.77 is being held in readiness for the building of suitable premises when the time is ripe. This Fund was raised at the 1935 Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held in Birmingham and is now on deposit at a Scottsboro bank. The transitional condition of the colony is such that it is not possible to forecast exactly what the Church's program must be—it must be adapted to the community needs as they arise. A fine opportunity presents itself to the Church in this rapidly developing new community.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE OF W. A.

Our activities in these fields, however, your chairman included in her report to National this summer as necessary to give a picture of Social Service as conducted by our Diocesan Auxiliary. In addition, Alabama was able to report a great variety of parish social service, ranging from the magnificently conceived service of Christ Church, Mobile with its annual budget of twelve hundred dollars and every member participation to the single handed effort of a Lowndes County woman to spray hundreds of negroes during the polyomelitis epidemic. From the letters that have come to your chairman, it is evident that Christian loving kindness abounds in the hearts of our Auxiliary members. Less encouraging is the report on the two recommendations of last year's which were, Observance of a Christian Social Service Sunday with corporate communion and in which social workers of the community and all service chairmen would participate and an intensive study at some period of the year to create a background of information and principle for social work. May we not take these two projects which seek the spiritual and intellectual foundations for the service we would render in

Madam President and Members of the Auxiliary:

Among the greatest needs of the Church is consecrated women workers, and it is the task of the members of the Women's Auxiliary to keep before the young women of the Church the opportunity for life service in the mission field both at home and abroad.

In a recent letter Mr. Parson writes: "These are difficult days in which to push the question of recruiting young people for the missionary cause, with financial conditions as they are; but we must not allow a break to come in the process of securing qualified missionaries for the future. We are receiving urgent appeals for help from our bishops overseas, and must be prepared for action whenever the way may be clear to move forward."

College students are particularly interested in serving as volunteer workers for summer work, and the Diocese of Alabama offers three fields: the House of Happiness, the Church Home, and Indian work. The committee is very happy to report that last summer two girls from the Holy Comforter, Montgomery, volunteered for work at the Church Home. Unfortunately, the Church Home had an epidemic of mumps, and Rosa Mary Parkman was unable to go, but Alva Stevens spent a great part of the summer there and did a beautiful piece of work, for which she was highly praised by Deaconess Whitford and other members of the staff. These girls received only expenses.

Alice Blasingame of Tuscaloosa, who was President of the Student Branch of the Auxiliary last year, is spending the winter at the Children's Home in New Orleans. She is taking her master's degree in Social Service.

We are most anxious to bring the roll of volunteer workers up to date and will appreciate the cooperation of every parish branch of the Auxiliary. Diocesan Convention, Woman's Auxiliary

Selma, Alabama, October 28th and 29th, 1936

After a careful consideration of the resolutions and suggestions to forward the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese your Committee on Findings begs leave to submit the following recommendations and resolutions:

Resolved: That we take back to our women at home the splendid and inspiring message of the Rev. C. C. J. Carpenter. To endeavor to make our homes, homes with a Christian atmosphere, to build definite standards, high standards, standards of value, in morals, in ethics, in religion, in honor. To create in the home the atmosphere of peace.

Resolved: That we strive to follow the recommendation of Bishop McDowell, to put on a basis of definite responsibility our present pledges and to see them through. To accept future responsibility with a hopeful spirit; to have faith and courage, that with prayer and consecration we can fulfill the same. To rally to the call of the Lord and to accept definite responsibility, that when He calls we can say, "Use even me."

Resolved: That we assist in every way possible the work of the House of Happiness and the Cumberland Farms project. That we take our Church with its dignity into simple places, that, with the help of the Church Army workers we may make Christians of these mountain folk.

Resolved: That we heartily endorse the recommendations for the proposed amendments to the Constitution and will endeavor to interest our Church women in study classes, in individual lines of reading and study in all lines of church work. To stimulate interest in the Sewanee Summer Training School and to encourage our women to go there for study and leadership training.

Resolved: That we continue to interest ourselves in the Indian work in Baldwin County and to endeavor to fulfill our pledge to that work.

Resolved: That we look forward to assisting in the project of the student pastor work at the University of Alabama. To bend our efforts to assist the Bishop in his plan for caring for student work in colleges.

Resolved: That we cooperate with those who carry on the work of the Church Home. That we plan for the educating of our women in what is being done for our Church Home children and to bend our efforts to increase the revenue of the Home in the proposed "Church Home Sunday". "To give, live, and let live". and to feel that we have a part, a vital part to play in bettering the lives of these children.

Resolved: That we encourage the young women of our Church in doing their part in the work of the Church through the Auxiliary, for it is to the young women of the Church that we look for our future leaders. We need that spirit of romance and adventure in youth to bring about the forward work of the Church.

Resolved: That we endorse the message of our President to remember our pledges to those who carry on the missionary activity of our Auxiliary among the Indians, the mountain folk in the Tennessee Valley, the negro, our work in Japan, and to faithfully carry them through. To have fall institutes, schools for prayer and in this way to do a more effective work for Him.

Resolved: That we endorse the recommendations of the Diocesan Church Periodical Club in their work with the Church Army, and, in particular, their work in St. Mark's School, Birmingham, and to do our best to gather these books to make St. Mark's School an accredited High School.

Resolved: That we express our appreciation for the faithfulness, loyalty and efficiency of our President, Mrs. Baldwin, and for the faithful work and fruitful service that she and her official family have rendered to us in the past three years. That we pledge our sympathetic and loyal support to the incoming officers in the service for Him in bringing about of the Kingdom of Heaven on earth.

Resolved: That we seek to follow the suggestions of the Rev. E. R. Neff in his inspiring message. To render an account of our stewardship. CONSTITUTION

1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.
2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation, and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.
3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.
4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Supply Department, Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor of Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.
5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention Assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be ineligible to serve two successive terms in the same office. The newly elected President shall appoint all other officers.

6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive Meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees.

7. The Recording Secretary shall write the minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the annual report for the printer.

8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by the Branches for Missionary work, except that intended for other departments of the Auxiliary, and shall report same at annual meeting.

9. "A Chairman for each Convocation, who shall have been nominated at the preceding meeting shall be elected by the convention at the spring conference preceding the election of Diocesan officers, to serve three years, her term of office to be co-existent with that of the incoming President. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Chairman to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board."

10. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

11. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

12. The officers of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

13. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in October, the date to be decided by the Executive Board.

14. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

15. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

16. Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.
