

Foreword

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY:

In this Year Book you will have a record of work of which you may well be proud, and a call to even better work for the ensuing year.

In sending you my thanks and appreciation, I am mindful of the faithful labors of officers diocesan and local to bring this about, and of the interest that many members take in the work and study of the Auxiliary, in the Blue Boxes and missionary boxes, and in the prayers that unite us and make our work really God's work.

MINUTES
THE FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUN-
CIL OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH
IN THE DIOCESE OF ALABAMA

CHRIST CHURCH MOBILE, OCTOBER 27-28, 1937

On Wednesday, October 27th at 10:00 A. M. the annual Corporate Holy Communion of the Woman's Auxiliary was celebrated in Christ Church Mobile with Bishop McDowell as celebrant, assisted by the Rev. R. A. Kirchoffer.

The forty-ninth Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama was opened by the President, Mrs. J. C. Long of Selma at 11:00 A. M. in Christ Church Chapter House.

The invocation was given by Bishop McDowell.

The Rev. R. A. Kirchoffer, Rector of Christ Church welcomed the Convention. Miss Alice Shafer gave the welcome from Christ Church Auxiliary, and Mrs. R. F. Darrah from the Mobile Convocation in the absence of Mrs. Newton Campbell who was prevented from attending by illness. Mrs. Douglass Arant responded for the delegates and visitors.

The secretary called the roll to which thirty-eight branches responded.

The following committees were appointed by the President:

Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, past president of the Woman's Auxiliary was invited to speak at this time and graciously responded.

Other distinguished visitors to the Convention were introduced by the President—among them Mrs. C. S. Orton, Miss Maud Kimball, The Rev. G. C. Tucker, D. D. and Mrs. Tucker. Dr. Tucker, in a brief talk commended highly the work of the women of the Church.

Mrs. Elsie Barnett brought greetings from The Daughters of the King.

Mr. Charles Tate, representing the Young People's Service League,

brought greetings to the Convention, and reported briefly the League's achievements in the past year and outlined their plans for the future. He expressed appreciation of the aid and co-operation the Y.P.S.L. had received from the Woman's Auxiliary and in terms of loyal affection acknowledged a debt of gratitude to Mrs. Albert Wilson, Counselor at large, for her able leadership and unfailing interest.

In presenting Mrs. Jennie Morris Howard the President commended the work Mrs. Howard is doing among the young women students at the University. She has organized an Auxiliary branch among these students.

Mrs. Howard reported the safe arrival, in Japan, of her brother, the Rev. Kenneth Morrise, and his family—welcome news to his many loyal friends and admirers.

Bishop McDowell's annual address to the Auxiliary was the opening feature of the Convention program. In a brief introductory talk he commended the work of Mrs. Long and her loyal co-workers among the Auxiliary officers and members. The work of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Bland Mitchell was mentioned as outstanding. A most comprehensive and highly interesting report of the most significant features of the Triennial Convention at Cincinnati constituted the major part of the address. In closing he paid tribute to the newly elected Presiding Bishop, the Right Rev. H. St. George Tucker as "a great leader, a great statesman, and a great missioner. The cause of the Church is safe in his hands."

In a stirring appeal the Rev. Herbert Schroeter gave a most convincing presentation of the needs of the Church Home and our responsibility toward that institution as a legal ward of the Church in Alabama. He reminded the Auxiliary that "The light that shines farthest shines brightest at home", and quoted St. Paul—"If any provide not for his own he hath denied the faith and is worse than an unbeliever."

The Secretary was asked to send telegrams to Mrs. Albert Wilson, Mrs. D. E. Wilson, and Mrs. Augusta Martin regretting their absence.

Bishop McDowell offered the noonday prayer and the meeting adjourned for luncheon, guests of All Saint's branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in All Saints parish House.

AFTERNOON SESSION

At 2:00 P. M. the meeting re-convened. Minutes of the morning session were approved.

The report of the Amendments to the constitution as submitted to the last Convention was given. Miss Maud Kimball moved that these be considered singly. The motion carried and the Secretary read the proposed changes which were approved as submitted.

In her report for the Church Home, Deaconess Whitford stated that Vocational Guidance had recently been introduced into the training offered the children and that already gratifying results are shown. Report accepted.

Captain Conder, of the House of Happiness gave encouraging reports of the progress of the work in his ever-widening field. Report accepted.

Report of Mrs. Cason of Birmingham, showed the Library of St. Mark's school incomplete. An appeal was made that we raise the \$400.00 needed to supply the required books which would make this an accredited High School this year. A motion was carried pledging the support of the Auxiliary to this plan. Report accepted.

The President's address followed.

The reports of the Triennial delegates came next:

Miss Bessie Bouchelle made clear the beauty and impressive ceremonial of the United Thank Offering Service.

Mrs. H. W. Neiderhouser, presented Bishop Azariah's appeal to the Church in America to send workers into the field of India "where the need is so urgent and the laborers so tragically few" "The Macedonian cry for 'Help' was so irresistibly sounded by this Bishop of the Church of India and fearlessly re-iterated by him that our speaker felt we in America could no longer ignore the responsibility of the work there.

As Chairman of Christian Social Service, Mrs. Brevard Jones summarized some outstanding features of that department, stressing the Movement toward Unity—and Christianity in Industrial relations as the factor necessary for adjusting our Social problems.

Mrs. Bland Mitchell used a chart in outlining the mission fields of the American Church and asked that every parish represented at the Convention take one field for concentrated study and whole-hearted support.

Mrs. Jones' report as Chairman of C.S.S. was given at this time as she could not be present the following day. Report accepted.

Mrs. Jennie Morris Howard, Chairman of Gift of Life gave her report also. Report accepted.

Mrs. Howard introduced to the Convention Miss Isabel Cummings student from the University of Alabama and President of the University Auxiliary branch, who gave an enthusiastic account of the work among the students.

Reverend E. V. Edwards offered a closing prayer and the meeting adjourned, that the delegates might visit the Church Home where an informal reception was held at 5:00 P. M.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1937

At 8:00 P. M. following the Wednesday evening service in Christ Church the Convention was addressed by the Rev. Richard Watson of Christ Church, Tuscaloosa and the Rev. Henry Johnson, Episcopal Student Chaplain at the University of Alabama.

The Convention re-assembled on October 28th at 9:30 in the Chapter House with the President, Mrs. Long in the chair. The Creed and the Auxiliary prayer were recited in unison. Mr. Coatsworth Lewis of Jasper led the devotional and made an interesting talk.

The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon session were approved.

A resolution was offered from the floor asking that the secretary write Mrs. Campbell, Chairman of the Mobile Convocation expressing regret for her continued absence, and hope for her speedy recovery.

The President requested that reports be limited to ten minutes or less, and appointed Miss Mary Bonner time keeper for the day. Mrs. Long called attention to exhibit of books and pamphlets arranged by Mrs. Bland Mitchell, and requested delegates to take this opportunity to purchase those necessary for program of study and take back to their branches any other literature available.

The chairman of the Resolutions Committee, Mrs. Douglas Arant presented the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, that this body go on record as supporting Bishop McDowell in his revision and co-ordination of the departments of the Woman's Auxiliary and to assure him of our gratitude in being incorporated as an integral part of the work of the Diocese. Resolution passed.

2. Believing that the completion of the library is essential to the success of St. Mark's School, Birmingham we recommend that the Communion Alms \$29.13 be given to the Library fund. Motion carried.

3. Whereas, the address of the Rev. H. F. Schroeter gave a convincing presentation of the financial status and needs of the Church Home be it resolved that the delegates to this Convention be impelled to take back to their parish branches the fact of the Diocesan responsibility for the maintenance of the Church home at Springhill. Resolution passed.

4. Resolved, that during the coming year the names of pioneers and early workers in our parishes be sent in for record in the Book of Remembrance. And that a plate offering be taken in every branch in memory of those honored pioneers either named or un-named,—this offering not to interfere in any way with gifts memorializing departed members of current year. Resolution passed.

5. Resolved, that the Auxiliary foster the idea of establishing a summer training institute for Negro Auxiliary workers in the Diocese. Resolution passed.

6. Whereas, the branch officers of the Auxiliary are elected at various times throughout the year; and

Whereas, the list of officers printed in the Auxiliary Year Book is soon out of date; and

Whereas, there is much loss of time, money and effort because communications from the Diocesan officers and general chairmen are delayed in reaching the new officers—sometimes failing to reach them at all—Be it resolved that the list of Branch officers be twice revised annually (April 1 and September 1) and that this list be made available to the Diocesan officers and general chairmen. Resolution passed.

7. Resolved, that the officers of Chairman of Department of Religious Education and Educational Secretary of Woman's Auxiliary be combined and that the five Convocations elect each an assistant Educational Secretary to carry out in their respective Convocations the plans and advice of the Diocesan Educational Secretary.

(In view of the changes which Bishop McDowell said would be made in the organization of the Departments of work in the National Church this resolution was filed for later consideration)

Resolutions of thanks were offered to members of the Clergy and others who contributed to the program of the Convention. A vote of thanks was also offered to the Press of Mobile for the publicity given to the Convention.

Selma Convocation—Mrs. A. R. Smith.

Finance—Miss Mary V. Bonner.

The Rev. Edward Van. Edwards gave a brief report of the Indian Mission field in Baldwin County and then asked to present the Church Army worker, Sister Clara Pickerell in charge of the Christian Social Service at this Mission. Sister Pickerell gave a vivid portrayal of conditions among the Indians. Some of the needs she listed were clothing, books, Victrola records, patterns, a sewing machine and a car or truck to enable the worker to reach all parts of the field. She explained that clothing is sorely needed, but is no longer given away except in emergency cases. A plan is followed by which supplies are exchanged for home produce or labor.

In the report of the Educational Secretary Mrs. Mitchell recommended buying books on missions as courses of study. She outlined for 1938 a study of the Moslem World and one on Rural America.

A resolution from the Executive Board was presented by Mrs. A. R. Smith recommending that a uniform time for electing branch officers of Woman's Auxiliary be decided upon. After discussion at length no official action was taken.

A motion from the floor offered a vote of thanks to Mrs. Ogden for so ably filling the place of Convocational Chairman in the absence of Mrs. Campbell.

The Delegate from the Church of the Good Shepherd made a report of the Negro work in the Mobile Convocation. The progress shown by this report is marked and has won special commendation from the Bishop.

Mrs. Long announced a fifteen minute intermission at this time that delegates might avail themselves of opportunity to examine or purchase the literature in the Educational exhibit.

Another exhibit which had proven interesting was that from the House of Happiness showing the progress made in handicrafts by the people in that Mountain Mission.

The report of the Courtesy Committee was given by Mrs. Byrd Lee, Chairman. Report accepted.

The report of the Time and Place Committee, Mrs. Meritt, Chairman extended an invitation to the Convention to meet in Florence in the fall. Mrs. Mosely of Florence, also extended this invitation from the floor, and the Convention unanimously accepted.

Mrs. P. E. Youngblood and Miss Theus Cassell were appointed by the President a committee to approve the minutes of the morning session.

A beautiful prayer and benediction were given by Dr. G. C. Tucker and the President declared the forty-ninth Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama adjourned.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Dear Women of the Auxiliary and Friends:

It is with much joy that I bid you welcome to our Forty-ninth Convention, as we meet today in historic Christ Church.

Before I give an account of my stewardship, I wish to express to you my gratitude for your confidence, and for your united effort in the accomplishment of the work for Christ's Kingdom. The Executive Board has been loyal and ready to cooperate in all plans presented during the past year. The Diocesan Officers and Department Chairmen have carried out all of the objectives of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the Branches have given encouragement, by their reports. Bishop McDowell, by his wise counsel, has assisted in solving many problems.

I am grateful to you for placing in our Budget, the President's Expense Fund, thereby making it possible for me, as your representative, to attend Conferences and meetings, which have given a better understand-

ing of our work, beginning with the Provincial Meeting in November.

The Spring Conferences at which I was a guest in April and May, revealed the ability for leadership, of the Convocation Chairmen, and an understanding of the words, "Thy God hath commanded thy strength." On May 13, the Diocesan Council was attended in Mobile by your President.

Pilgrimages have been made to Diocesan Missions. If we would open the door for Christ to enter the House of Happiness, the Church Home, the Indian Mission, St. Mark's School for Negroes, and the Missions in far off lands, we must provide sufficient tools for our workers. A study of their needs will awaken interest in our gifts.

During the summer I attended two meetings of the Religious Education Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary. These were held in Birmingham, and the Program of Service for 1938, was planned.

In August an invitation was accepted to make a report in Birmingham of our work, at the Interdominational Inter-racial Conference on United Social Service Work in Alabama. This meeting which was called by the Presbyterian Synod of Tuscaloosa, brought together Auxiliary Presidents and social workers of other communions to discuss many problems of social aspects.

Later in August The Woman's Auxiliary Institute was an interesting feature of Auxiliary Week-end at the Sewanee Summer Training School, which afforded an opportunity to come together in fellowship, to study plans for the work of the Church. Contributions to the Program were made by Missionaries, National and Diocesan Leaders. Although the attendance from Alabama was good, it is hoped that next year each Convocation will give a Scholarship to Sewanee, so that a larger number may train for leadership.

The suggestion of our President last year, that we cooperate with some of our neighboring dioceses, in securing a National speaker, and in this way share the expenses of a visit to this diocese met with a hearty response when discussed in Sewanee, with the Diocesan President of Mississippi.

During the year we had the privilege of a visit from the Rev. Kenneth and Mrs. Morris and family to our diocese and Province, while on furlough. This visit shed for us the light of much knowledge on Missions.

Let us remember them daily in our prayers for peace, during the crisis of war.

In October it was my privilege to serve as delegate, with four others from Alabama, to the Triennial Meeting in Cincinnati. Many enriching experiences were received from this Meeting and the General Convention.

The theme of the Triennial Meeting, "Fellowship in Faith and Work", was the keynote of the Oxford Conference on FAITH AND ORDER, and the Edinburgh Conference on "LIFE AND WORK." These Con-

ferences called Ecumenical, meaning "the inhabited world", had as their goal, Universal Christian Unity—the reports stating that the object was to renew our faith and vows and hold up a better social order by the Church.

After study of this report, we learned that "God does not speak through one race, but that we are all the children of one Father, that the Church is the body of Christ, and that we must be crusaders for the cause of unity."

The resolutions on Peace ask that we pray fervently for peace, calling on clergy and laymen to unite with us in our prayers.

During this Triennium efforts will be made to carry the message of the Triennial to all parts of the world. This can be done by increasing our gifts.

I wish to stress the importance of the Budget. Are we awakening interest in parish and diocese in the Budget? Are we doing our share?

Our gifts to the United Thank Offering will, among other things give security to our workers, in later years, by the Pension Fund.

Last summer, in response to requests from our Provincial Officers, surveys on Negro Work, Rural Work and Indian Work were made in this diocese. These fields should command the interest of our young women, as the need for workers is great. We have a responsibility to all of the women of the Church, in preparing a program which will utilize their talents, and gifts and unite them in one purpose for the extension of the Kingdom.

I recommend that we interest our young women by giving them challenging jobs and develop young leadership by responsibility.

The year 1939 will mark the 50th Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary in this diocese. I recommend that we begin in 1938 to make plans to celebrate this Anniversary and in so doing, honor those whose lives are a beacon light in the Annals of the Woman's Auxiliary. It seems fitting that this recommendation should be made at this time, during our Convention in Mobile, the home of Bishop Wilmer.

I also recommend that we continue the use of the Forward Movement Manuals, which have deepened our spiritual life by daily Bible reading, and prayer.

As we move into another year for Christ and His Cause, let us remember "According to your faith be it unto you."

As members of the Woman's Auxiliary we are wishing for a more consecrated life to win souls for our Lord. I ask you to exalt Him and His work. As we observe the Quiet Day of Prayer on November 11, ask Him to use us, and to give us more strength for His Service.

CHURCH OF THE RESURRECTION

Dear Friends:

After a most enjoyable furlough in America, we returned to Japan October 14th on the Pres. Hoover. This ship, which was bombed by Chinese planes near Shanghai on her previous voyage, gave us our first direct acquaintance with the war in the Far East, for we heard many terrifying stories from the ship's personnel. This naturally made us somewhat apprehensive as to what we might find on landing at Kobe. But as soon as we went ashore our fears were allayed by a warm welcome from our Japanese friends, and, also, we find that in general things are going on as though no war existed. Of course we see many troops leaving for the front, but otherwise the only excitement we have comes from air-raid drills. If at night all houses and streets are darkened. A city of one million completely dark presents a weird sight, and makes one wonder how civilized people could ever have come to such a state! Fortunately there have been no real air raids in Japan. The war is very distressing to us, and we are saddened by the thought of thousands of fine young men dead and wounded.

In the midst of it all our beautiful Peace Tower is fulfilling a real mission for the people of the church and community have bought three chimes, which have been hung in the tower. A meeting of the community was held at the church and it was explained that the Tower, in itself a witness for Peace, would hence forth carry its message into every home through the daily ringing of the chimes. By common agreement it was decided that they be rung daily at 6:00 A. M. and everyone asked to pray for peace at that time.

On our return we found the work at the Church of the Resurrection in excellent condition. The Clinic continues to extend its health program throughout the community; our two nurses carry health, cheer and Christian love into over 100 homes a month. The Day Nursery is fulfilling a much needed service for children and mothers. The kindergarten has reached an enrollment of 80. The Fresh Air Camp last Summer was as usual a big success. The English Night School had its second student to win first prize in an inter-school contest recently. And we are delighted to report the largest church attendance in many years, a large Church School, a good number of inquirers and several preparing for Baptism Christmas. We thank God for the steady progress being made and the unusually bright outlook for the future.

But progress always brings its problems, and one of our chief problems at this time is to provide a permanent site for the Fresh Air Camp. We can no longer rent the place we have always used and must arrange for some other place by Summer. We wish to build a house that can be

used in Winter for a rest home for working mothers and convalescents and in Summer for the camp. It is very urgently needed at once and we hope you will remember this in your prayers and giving.

We beg you to pray constantly for a just and lasting peace between Japan and China and that these two great nations may soon become the kingdoms of our Lord Jesus Christ.

May the joy of Christmas fill your hearts and the New Year be full of happiness, in which wish Mrs. Morris, Betty, Ken and Bobby join me.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

October 27th, 1936 to October 27th, 1937

After taking office the educational secretary, being conscious of her ignorance, studied the map of Alabama, the boundaries of the five Convocations and the parishes and branches within them.

The next step was to take counsel with the Bishop, Mrs. Long and Mrs. Albert Wilson, all of whom were most helpful in forming a policy for the educational work, and in defining its character and scope.

The greatest need was seen to be for trained and devoted leadership.

Our first objective, therefore, was to become acquainted with the women of the Diocese and the leaders in the various Convocations:

Our second, to try to build up a sense of the worthwhileness and vital character of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Our third, to present the necessity for discovering and training potential leaders, urging attendance on the Sewanee Summer Training School as a means to this end:

Our fourth, to promote interest in and study of the Church's Mission in Alabama and in the "Fields of the Year" because with knowledge comes the sense of responsibility for supporting that Mission and for sharing the Gospel with God's children everywhere.

These *objectives* are but parts of the *aim* we all seek; the coming of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

During the year, in pursuance of this policy, the secretary:

Sent out an Epiphany letter in regard to the Lenten Mission Study on Africa and the American Negro and later received reports from the study, on the whole, encouraging:

Attended three Spring Convocational meetings with enjoyment and benefit; also spoke at each on the educational work, the Sewanee Summer Training School and the Library Project for St. Mark's School:

Sent out, through Convocation Chairmen or Representative, questionnaires to all branch presidents or educational secretaries asking for suggestions for the 1938 Program of Service; and received about 35 answers with many helpful suggestions which will be incorporated into the Program of Service:

Held a meeting of the Program Committee in May at which the Bishop spoke to us of the next steps ahead:

Assisted the chairman of St. Mark's School Library Project:

Compiled an Auxiliary Source Book on the projects of the Auxiliary:

Attended the Sewanee Summer Training School, taking courses on the Moslem World, the Church and Rural America, and the Parish Program:

Helped to build the program for the Auxiliary Week-end in Sewanee:

Held an all day conference with the Program Committee, presenting the rough draft of the Program of Service:

Sent out supplementary program material for October on preparation for General Convention and on "the Parish":

Attended the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Cincinnati as delegate from Alabama, an inspiring experience:

Prepared material, charts and posters for Book Store and Exhibit at the Annual meeting in Mobile, October 27-28.

In closing this report the secretary would like to express her sense of the privilege of this office and her appreciation of the cooperation received.

The field opens before us unlimited opportunities. This is our day and hour. Let us offer our weakness to God to receive His Strength and guidance to meet the need of today.

THE HOUSE OF HAPPINESS ANNUAL REPORT

Last year's report stated "As yet the number won for Christ and the Church is small." It is a joy to report this year the Baptism of 5 adults, 15 children and 5 infants and the Confirmation of 19 adults and children. Since 1935 the number of baptized members has increased from 28 to 76, whilst communicant strength has risen from 15 to 48.

Among the children, with Miss Mae Bowie as Principal, definite progress has been made educationally. Nine girls and two boys completed the sixth grade, the largest group in the school's history. Graduation exercises were held for the first time, and the Superintendent of Education expressed gratitude for the commendable work the children carried out the exercises. A good proportion of the class is now attending High

School in Scottsboro. A Girl's Club, under Church Army workers, met regularly after school hours, and among other activities a special course in First-Aid and home nursing was given.

Play nights have been popular and well attended, averaging a hundred young people and evidencing the great need for organized recreation in rural centers. We have been unfortunately troubled by bootleggers tempting the young people as they came and went. The large amount of government money flowing now in the Tennessee Valley has accentuated the liquor problem, and the evangelistic ministry and preventive work of the Church is needed more than ever. The Gospel has been carried into many homes through cottage meetings, every part of the community thus being reached, resulting in conversions, baptisms and confirmations. Our Church members have shown increasing faithfulness in steady attendance at Sunday worship and each family has for the first time its box of weekly envelopes for Church support, the sense of responsibility being thus encouraged.

The Clothing Bureau has had a busy year under Mrs. Conder's direction. A new method introduced last Fall has proved acceptable. Clothing is now distributed only on "First Saturdays". The articles are priced and set out for sale in the Community Room. Bureau users buy the clothes they themselves select, with work-aid tickets earned during the previous month by chopping firewood, cleaning the buildings, roadmending, etc., or received in exchange for produce or handicrafts. The monthly sale averages \$97.80 in clothing thus exchanged for labor or produce.

Eight trainees of the Church Army assisted in the work during different periods, receiving practical training and experience in rural work. The cost of this was borne by the Church Army. One Diocesan worker from Tennessee, at Bishop Maxon's request, also was given training in evangelism and pastoral work.

We rejoice that this year has brought so many blessings. The increase in Church membership now challenges us further. CONSECRATION must follow CONVERSION and both must lead to true CHURCHMANSHIP. The next phase of the work in Sauta Bottom must be the strengthening of the new-born, that their witness may be an effective challenge to the many yet to be reached.

ANNUAL REPORT OF
THE CHURCH'S WORK AT SKYLINE FARMS
SCOTTSBORO, ALA.

(formerly Cumberland Mountain Farms)

The work begun at the Resettlement project in 1935 has been carried forward by Church Army workers. Mission Sister Ada Clarke is the resident worker and Capt. Conder furnished monthly services at the Community Church in co-operation with visiting preachers of other Churches. Mission Sister Clarke is the only full-time Christian worker of any Church giving her entire services to the Colony. She assists in the Community Sunday School, conducts an extension Sunday School in an outlying part, is a valued advisor in the Community Council, acts as Girl's Club leader, co-operates closely with the Colony Nurse in sick cases, and is a welcome friendly visitor. A gift of 40 acres of land near the colony center has now been received, including an unfinished dwelling. There is \$199.52 on hand, given by the Woman's Auxiliary branches throughout Alabama and other friends, in readiness for the building of suitable premises for worker's residence, community room and church, when the time is ripe. As the construction of the Colony buildings near completion and the colonists take up farming and a more normal rural life is reached, the Church likewise must complete her buildings and be ready for the Harvest of Souls.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

Madam President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Since our last Convention, your Chairman of Christian Social Service has had the privilege of attending the Provincial Auxiliary meeting in New Orleans last November; a one day Conference of Social Service Secretaries of all denominations in the state in August; and the Triennial Convention of the Church in Cincinnati. While I have been ready

to serve when called upon, there has been little for me to do, as our Diocesan Social Service Projects are already in committees well organized and well manned. The educational project of the past year "The Study of our Christian responsibility to the Negro" was sponsored by our Educational Department but the Social Service Secretary is deeply appreciative of the fine contributions this study has made to interracial understanding.

In the spring your chairman sent a letter to every branch asking for the observance of Church Home Week. The response in checks sent to Mrs. Ogden made a brave beginning at what we hope in future years may be a joyous and fruitful service to our Church Home.

As a result of our one day Interdenominational Conference I asked all Branches to Co-operate in an Inter-denominational and Inter-racial gathering. I am still receiving reports from these. After hearing at the Triennial Convention, that the way to get Christian Unity is to practice co-operation and sympathetic understanding locally, your Chairman is more than ever deeply grateful to those branches which at some inconvenience to themselves accepted this challenge to work co-operatively with all denominations in a Fellowship of Faith, and with Christians of all races in our midst.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GIFT OF LIFE

Madam President and Members of the Auxiliary:

In making this report, I want to bring before you something of the purposes and the responsibilities of the Committee on the Gift of Life.

This Committee is "charged with the duty of presenting to the youth of the Parish and the Diocese the call of the Church in the fields of evangelism, education, and medicine."

Today from every department of the Church's work comes information that there is an increasing need for consecrated, trained workers. One of the most pressing demands is in the field of evangelism where young women who are already prepared, or are willing to be trained, are needed.

These workers carry on personal evangelistic work among women and children, which is not possible for men to do in non-Christian lands.

There are also demands for young women who are trained in other vocations. Nurses are needed in all our fields of work and requests for teachers are constantly being made.

In seeking to enlist young women for definite work in the various fields the most strategic place is found on the college campus. It is there we come in contact with increasing numbers of eager, alert, young students, whose imaginations may be caught and inspired by the challenge to offer themselves for service in the great adventurous work the Church is carrying on throughout the world.

One indication of the extent of this opportunity is seen in Summer Volunteer work in which college students engage and which relieves the regular workers in the Church's Missions.

This past summer the Student Branch of the Auxiliary at the University sent one of its members, Mary Lanier Munds, as a Volunteer Worker to St. Mary's on the Mountain at Sewanee. She worked among the mountain people, caring especially for the children who came each day to the Mission, and has remained this winter as a member of the regular teaching staff.

Another student who has offered herself for definite work is the President of the Student Auxiliary, Isabel Cumming. After her graduation in May she expects to take special training that will fit her to work among college students.

The Committee on the Gift of Life "is seeking for young women of unquestioned devotion; winning in personality, and with the very best of educational preparation, who are willing to enlist for service in the Church, in the Mission field, and as consecrated, enlightened members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

REPORT OF CHURCH HOME

The year 1936-37 has been outstanding at the Church Home because two of the Staff were set apart as Deaconesses September 15th.

Deaconess Redd is house mother for the little girls cottages and Deaconess Nehls is housekeeper and dietitian for the Home.

Miss Kitty Ulmer who was assistant to the Matron, in the older girls cottage has gone to St. Faiths in New York. Up to date no one has been found to take her place.

Two of our girls, juniors in high school, are taking vocational guidance. One works three hours in the morning in a department store in Mobile, the other in a dress shop.

We have two girls in Alabama College, Montevallo. One of our girls finished a two year course at State Teachers College, Jacksonville and is teaching at Satsuma. Near enough for her to come home weekends.

During the summer months we discontinued our Chapel Services and substituted morning prayer in each cottage. We are having Chapel again now. The Deaconesses take turns conducting it, a week about.

The children had their usual activities beginning with Thanksgiving when Mr. Edwards arrived with good things from his Indians in Escambia County. The Auxiliaries and Guilds over the diocese have been generous and kind, sending lovely gifts, quilts, blankets, bed linen, boxes and barrels of canned goods, preserves, jellies, pickles, etc. Lots of pecans and satsumas. Checks to the amount of \$134.95 have been received from individuals, Guilds and Auxiliaries. This money has been used for recreation, special holiday dinners and various other pleasures for the children—as designated by the donors.

The Church Home Guild provided lovely gifts for our Christmas tree. We had our usual Christmas pageant in the Chapel.

The Girls Friendly entertained the children in groups. The younger children had a Christmas party, the older ones a dance. They went to Elks Christmas and their usual summer picnic at Grand View Park. Mardi Gras day was spent with the Knights of Columbus at their Club Rooms. The Junior League invited the younger children to their play, Snow White. They thoroughly enjoyed it.

Mrs. Ruffin Wright is still bringing us bananas from the Fruit Dispatch Co.

The Church Home Chapter of St. Johns Church Mobile, gave our Chapel a beautiful pair of candlesticks for the Altar as a memorial to all the Sisters of the Home. Also they gave the children eggs for an Easter egg hunt.

Up to October 1st there were 35 Auxiliaries clothing children in the Home. Since that time several other Branches have adopted children. Fifteen boxes of used clothes have been sent to us—these have been very useful indeed. So many of our girls like to make over clothes that few things are wasted.

The suite of furniture in the boys building has almost been paid for.

This will make three suites of living room furniture and three Frigidaires we have bought with coupons, besides some other small things. Please continue to send coupons.

May I ask you please to make all checks to me, Deaconess Whitford, and not to the children. I have to endorse them anyway before they can be cashed.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Madam President and Members of Woman's Auxiliary:

As Chairman of Department of Religious Education for 1936-37, I desire to report that I find the work of the Departments constantly overlap and much effort is lost.

During the past year I have distributed multigraphed copies of report of Provincial Ch. of Religious Education adopted at Synod in New Orleans;

Sent out on request the 3-year plan adopted by the Provincial Department of Religious Education, planned by Dr. Gardner Tucker:

Distributed to the Auxiliary and the Y.P.S.L. of the diocese the instructions for writing the paper on "The Meaning of Baptism";

Have ready now, copies of the prize winning paper for any Auxiliary branch desiring it and have distributed it for program use to the presidents of the thirty-four Leagues of the diocese. I request that every branch president interest herself in having this paper used for instruction in her Church School by either the Rector or the Superintendent.

As your representative I attended Camp McDowell as Camp Mother, attended Provincial meeting of Dept. Relig. Ed, in Sewanee the last of July. As counselor at large for the Leagues of Alabama I attended the Convention at Sewanee in August. It was an inspiring meeting with young people from the fifteen dioceses of the Province earnestly at work for the Church's Mission. At Sewanee I took Counsellors classes at both Adult and Young People's Conferences.

I attended annual Y.P.S.L. Convention at Grandview in September and was re-elected Counsellor-at-large. I pause here to urge you to assist your existing leagues and to help organize new groups as they come to league age. One existing problem before the Church is the absorption of the League Members who are now ready to take their places among the adult workers of the Church.

I acknowledge the receipt of \$2.00 for the Sewanee China Alice Gregg Fund for which I am Trustee. This came from the Mobile Convocation and has been deposited with Treas. of National Council. Miss Gregg reports three successful China summer conferences patterned after the Sewane summer schools.

One other activity in which it was my privilege to take part as Education Chairman, was to escort five Episcopal students from Birmingham Colleges to the first Episcopal College Student Conference of this Diocese. Eighty-five young people representing seven Alabama colleges assembled in conference and at a closing banquet Dr. Wedell from National Headquarters was speaker. It was an earnest thoughtful gathering featuring organization and panel discussion in preparation for future conferences. Mrs. Jennie Morris Howard, assistant Dean of women was the happy instigator of this gathering. Now that we have as Student Pastor at the University the Rev. Henry Johnston, we may expect a more unified development among our Church students.

I have co-operated with one Education Secretary in program planning for Auxiliary, attended two conferences of Program committee, distributed the circulars for the Bishop Lloyd memorial for endowment of Kuling School in China—for the care and nurture of children of American missionaries.

In closing I offer the following resolution—

Resolved that the officers of Chairman of Religious Education and Educational Secretary be combined and that an Educational Secretary be elected in the five Convocations to carry out the plans and program of the Diocesan Educational Secretary. These would function as a diocesan board of Relig. Education to carry out the national, provincial, and diocesan program of religious education.

This cannot be done hastily—I offer it for your consideration.

ST. MARK'S SCHOOL LIBRARY PROJECT

We wish to thank all of the individuals, churches, and branches for their gifts of money and of books.

Volumes in library on accredited High School List, October 1936. Three Volumes in library on accredited High School List, October 1937. Sixty-five Books given to Library for reference work year of 1936-37.

Desel, Houston, Texas; St. Thomas; The Rev. R. Bland Mitchell, Birmingham; Miss Helen Verplanck, Birmingham; Miss Elizabeth Freeland, Anniston; Mrs. Orville Lay, Birmingham; Mrs. H. L. Bruce, Tuscumbia; Mr. M. A. Grover, Bessemer.

Each book placed in the Library bears a book-plate given the name and location of the donor.

In order to be an accredited Library, a minimum of 750 books stipulated by the State Board of Education is needed. As above stated, the Library's number of such books has grown from 3 to 65 in the past year. This leaves a minimum of 685 books still to be secured.

In addition, there is \$36.48 on hand, given by various branches, with

which approved books will be purchased. We are in touch with the country's leading second-hand book-stores from which we expect to purchase books at a minimum cost. Also the National Office of the Church Periodical Club has promised to give a goodly number of reference books which are not likely to come to us through gifts from individual libraries.

After a year's experience, we believe that it will simplify our efforts if the branches will concentrate on contributing the price of a certain book or books; and any unaccredited books collected should be sold locally, if possible, and the proceeds sent in. Of course, if any books can be delivered in Birmingham without involving transportation costs, they can be sold here.

We figure the cost of completting the Library project will be \$600; and we urge that the branches put as large a share as possible of this amount in their budgets in the hope that, by a year hence, the project may be successfully and gloriously completed.

As Chairman I beg leave to submit the following report from the Mobile Convocation for 1936-37.

In our trips through the Convocation three fundamentals have been stressed in programs, inspirational talks, etc.

The deepening of the devotional life of our woman-hood,

Religious Education,

Better interracial understanding.

With groups of women from Mobile I have been able to make personal contact with fourteen smaller branches in our Missions, where we held inspirational meetings. As a result it gave me keen joy to report two new Auxiliary branches—one at Daphne and one at Fairhope. Having been invited by Mrs. Byrne to take part in a South Baldwin Co. Conference at Magnolia Springs on Nov. 29, we gave a "model Auxiliary program."

In the interest of Religious Education we inaugurated free book reviews-monthly-at which the average attendance has been fifty-five including nine men. They were inter-denominational. May I recommend this as a profitable way in which to stimulate interest. Five reviews were sent to other branches and were well attended. Lenten study classes here were interparochial well prepared and well presented but the attendance was not good. Study material was sent to all interested groups.

St. Andrew's Day and Armistice Day programs were held in Mobile and suggestions and material sent to other Branches.

At the spring Convocational meeting at All-Saints, Mobile we had 157 present including eight clergy. Our speaker, Miss Rebecca Miller of All Saints College, Vicksburg was well worth coming miles to hear. The

offering was given to Rev. Mr. Fulford to aid in the very successful work he is doing among our Negroes. Two dollars was sent to Alice Gregg Memorial fund.

Feeling that it would expedite the work in the Convocation I formed an Executive Board and with the co-operation of the members the work was easier to handle in every way.
