

Foreword

A WORD FROM THE BISHOP TO THE WOMEN OF ALABAMA

The Master trained twelve men to be the leaders in the work of spreading the Kingdom of God in the world. Later others were added to this group, and from the earliest days, women have taken an active part in His Service.

He taught the responsibility of the individual in the Kingdom, and the implication of His teaching is that no Christian is a real Christian unless he is doing something to help others become Christians.

MINUTES

THE FIFTIETH MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF ALABAMA

TRINITY CHURCH, FLORENCE, NOVEMBER 8-9, 1938

The annual Corporate Communion service of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Church, Florence at 10 A. M., November 8th, with Bishop Carpenter as celebrant. The sermon was preached by the Rev. J. C. Turner, Rector of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Gadsden. The memorial roll was read by Bishop Carpenter. The morning offering amounted to \$18.22.

The fiftieth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama was called to order by the President, Mrs. J. C. Long in Trinity Parish House at 11 A. M.

The invocation was given by Bishop Carpenter.

At the President's request the Convention stood in silent prayer in tribute to the memory of our beloved leader the Rt. Rev. Wm. George McDowell.

Delegates and visitors were welcomed by the Rev. Wm. A. Thompson, rector of Trinity Parish. Mrs. W. M. Millikan, Convocation Chairman gave the welcome for the Huntsville Convocation, and Mrs. Richard Smith brought a gracious message from the women of Florence. The response was made by Mrs. Douglas Arant.

Members of the Daughters of the King were invited to bring greetings. Deaconess Whitford and Mrs. Clayborn, a visitor from the Diocese of Georgia responded. Greetings from the Y. P. S. L. were given by Miss Elizabeth Norvell, district supervisor, and a letter was read from Miss Mary Collier, Y. P. S. L. President.

Mrs. Long presented Bishop Carpenter and at her request the Convention stood in pledge of devoted loyalty to his leadership.

The following distinguished guests were presented to the Convention: Mrs. Wm. G. McDowell, Mrs. H. J. McMillan, representative of Sewanee Province on the National Board, Mrs. Shelden Leavitt, field chairman of Sewanee Province. Mrs. Long asked the Rev. Mr. Thompson to present the Clergy and field workers, as follows; the Rev. C. J. Alleyn, Rev. J. C. Turner, Rev. Robert Fletcher, Captain Chas. Conder, Captain Krast and Mrs. C. C. J. Carpenter.

Messages were read from Mrs. D. E. Wilson, Mrs. Albert Wilson, Mrs. B. J. Baldwin, and Mrs. J. B. Jones. The secretary was instructed to write these and also to Mrs. Charles Henderson regretting their absence from the Convention.

The Convention was then addressed by Bishop Carpenter. He stressed the need of men for the priesthood. Parents should suggest to sons that the Ministry compares favorably with other professions. He reminded his hearers that every member of the Auxiliary, recognizing the need of collective zeal should each present the work to others that all the women of the Church may be stimulated to make a contribution thru the Auxiliary. The field has been prepared by our most able leader, Bishop McDowell. Every loyal Church woman may claim the privilege of carrying on that the harvest may be worthy.

The Convention next had the pleasure of hearing Mrs. McMillan, who gave an able presentation of the organization and plan of the Woman's Auxiliary in the National Church.

Mrs. Leavitt followed and in an inspirational talk outlined the work of the Field Department. In obedience to the command "go and tell" this department becomes one of "publicity with purpose and prayer".

The Rev. Mr. Thompson offered the noon day prayer.

The meeting then adjourned to the Methodist Parish house where lunch was served by the Methodist Auxiliary. At this time Miss Elizabeth Ann Flynn and Miss June Richardson from the University Branch of the Auxiliary were introduced and gave an enthusiastic and very interesting report of the work being done by their Branch under the direction of Mrs. Jennie Moriss Howard.

After a delightful social hour the convention reopened at 2 P. M. Twenty-four Branches answered to rollcall. The minutes of the morning session were accepted. Mrs. H. W. Neiderhouser, chairman of the rules committee read the rules governing the business sessions. Report accepted.

Captain Conder's report referred to the work at the House of Happiness as having somewhat entered the harvest season since the field had become partly self-sustaining in its contribution to missions.

Miss Thetford, who came from Mrs. Jennie Moriss Howard's Gift of Life Department had contributed largely to the success of the Vacation Bible School. He thanked the Auxiliary for the clothing and gifts received. "Self help by work aid" is the plan thru which these gifts are distributed. One of the immediate needs he mentioned is a new roof on the community house. The financial report showed a deficit of more than \$300.00 in the Maintenance Fund.

Captain Krast followed with a report of the use made of the House of Happiness Extension fund at Sky Line Farms. On the forty acres given the Church there, Captain Krast has almost completed the workers house. His contribution to the life in this re-settlement project includes serving as Scout-master, Y. M. C. A. leader, Church School teacher, and recreational director. His plans for the future include the building a church from the stone quarried on the land owned by the Church.

Mrs. McIntosh gave the complete report of the credentials committee at this time.

Mrs. Long asked for an expression of the wishes of the Convention in regard to the morning offering. On a motion offered by Mrs. Douglas Arant it was voted that it be given to the House of Happiness, and the Secretary was instructed to send it to Mrs. Kilby.

Deaconess Whitford gave a most gratifying account of the Church Home and its happy boys and girls. Thru funds received by Mrs. Donald Ogden the living rooms have been re-decorated and re-furnished. Thanks are especially due the Mobile Auxiliary Branches for their unflagging interest in this work. A request was made for a linen shower for the home and for a few blankets. Also that some patron Branches might "adopt" five little boys now in need of clothing.

Mrs. Long's report touched upon the outstanding activities of the Auxiliary through-out the year.

Report of the Vice-Pres., Mrs. Douglas Arant accepted and filed.

Report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Herbert Schroeter accepted and filed.

Report of Finance Chairman, Miss Mary Bonner gave in detail the annual pledges and objectives of the Auxiliary that they might be discussed and assumed with a "more definite sense of responsibility for the

doing of the program undertaken". Report accepted.

At this time Mrs. Long called attention to the interesting features shown on the Bulletin board and to the exhibit of the Rev. Mr. Fletcher's work among the deaf.

The report of the recording Secretary followed.

The meeting then adjourned that delegates might visit nearby points of interest in the T. V. A. development.

At eight o'clock that evening in Trinity Church a beautiful service was held in which Bishop Carpenter was assisted by the Rev. Mr. Thompson. A candle lighting pageant symbolized the re-dedication and re-consecration of those who took part, to the work for Christ's Kingdom and their loyal support of our new Bishop.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 9, 1938

The Convention re-assembled at 9:30 the following morning. Rev. Mr. Thompson led the devotional with a meditation upon the life of Dorcas as a consecrated Mission worker of the early Church. He also read Bishop McDowell's charge to the Auxiliary members of Alabama as given in the foreword of the Auxiliary year book.

Minutes of the preceeding session were approved.

In a highly commendatory talk Bishop Carpenter presented the Rev. Robert Fletcher to the Convention.

Mr. Fletcher spoke at length of his work among the deaf. He stated there are 3,500 deaf mutes in Alabama, 24,000 children with imperfect hearing. St. John's Elyton, oldest Episcopal Church in Jefferson County has been re-opened by Mr. Fletcher and a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been organized in that Parish. Equipment to teach deaf is expensive but he has been able to open the door of the Church to adults and children. This work is more advanced in England.

Mrs. Leon Palmer presented briefly the plan of the Parent Teacher Fellowship in Church schools as developed by the Rev. Mr. Palmer and Mrs. Palmer in a model Church School in Woodlawn.

The Report of United Thank Offering was given by Miss Bessie Bouchelle, custodian. Among other things Miss Bouchelle stated that less than 50% of the women of the Church in Alabama contribute to the U. T. O. although Sewanee Province is outstanding in its gifts thru this Department. She urged members of the Auxiliary to stimulate interest by subscribing to "The Spirit of Missions", making scrap-books, presenting informative programs and making use of posters and material to be had from the Church Missions House.

Mrs. A. J. McLemore extended to the Convention an invitation to meet next year in Montgomery. Mrs. Schroeter moved acceptance and it was unanimously voted that the Auxiliary would be delighted to do so.

The following recommendations from the Executive Board were presented:

1. That Mrs. Douglas Arant, Vice-President of the Woman's Auxiliary shall fill the un-expired term of Mrs. Mitchell as Educational Secretary;

2. That C.P. C. dues and contributions to the Indian Mission be sent to the Woman's Auxiliary diocesan treasurer;

3. That a fiftieth anniversary gift—as Mrs. Long suggested—be made by the Woman's Auxiliary and presented to Bishop Carpenter to be used in promoting the work of the Church among the women students in the colleges of Alabama.

These were unanimously approved.

The report of the C. P. C. secretary, Mrs. G. A. Pope was made at this time.

In a brief address Mrs. Long summarized the Auxiliary plans for the coming year, presented the Provincial program, and gave an interesting report from the Sewanee Summer Conference, and the recent meeting of the Synod. She called attention to the statement made by the Press and Publicity chairman that there are only 94 subscriptions to the "Spirit of Missions" among 2,000 Auxiliary members and urged that every branch endeavor to add at least one new subscriber in the coming year.

A rising vote of thanks was offered our President for her able and devoted leadership.

A letter from Bishop Crowl acknowledging the gift for Bethany Mission, was read by the secretary. The Findings of the Auxiliary week end at Sewanee were also read.

Report of the Resolutions committee was given as follows:

Be it resolved that we the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Alabama in Convention assembled express our feeling of irreparable loss in the death of the Right Reverend William George McDowell, who was not only our great and beloved Bishop but our very dear and faithful friend.

He gave us our vision and directed all our work with clarity of purpose and keenness of judgment. In every perplexity we could turn to him for the true and only answer—always we could rely upon his justice, upon his spiritual help, upon his great and unselfish love for his children in Alabama. In very truth he was "our Father in God." "The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away, Blessed be the name of the Lord!"

2. Be it also resolved that in the years to come, under the loving guidance of our present Bishop, the Right Reverend C. C. J. Carpenter, we let our light so shine that we will deepen the spirituality in the lives of our women and bring about a closer fellowship with Christ in our

work for His Kingdom.

3. Be it further resolved that we go back to our branches taking a message to urge them to fulfill our pledges to the salary of the Rev. Kenneth Moriss and to the Maintenance Fund for the House of Happiness—and also that we urge all Branches to contribute to the fund pledged to St. Mark's library that its immediate need may be met.

Mrs. Long asked that the Convocation chairmen constitute a nominating committee with Mrs. Frank Inge as chairman, to present nominee for Diocesan Auxiliary officers at the next convention.

The Findings Committee's report was accepted and filed.

The secretary was instructed to mail every local Chairman a copy of the Courtesy report in appreciation of the thoughtful consideration which left nothing undone that would contribute to the success of the Convention and to the pleasure and comfort of those in attendance.

Bishop Carpenter closed the meeting with the following charge to the members of the Auxiliary in all branches—

"More time and earnest study should be given to subject matter embraced in materials supplied by the Department of Religious Education,

Study Cannon 41 that an intelligent opinion may be reached upon the Church's marriage and divorce ruling;

Every member of the Woman's Auxiliary accept a personal responsibility in helping with the Diocesan canvass for the Church's quota in Alabama."

The benediction was given by the Bishop and the meeting adjourned.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Women of the Auxiliary and Guests:

It is with much pleasure that I welcome you to-day to the Fiftieth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in this diocese.

For a year we have looked forward to this Meeting in Trinity Church, Florence. Our pleasure to-day is mingled with sorrow as we think of our beloved Bishop McDowell, who gave his devotion to our work. To Bishop Carpenter, we pledge our best efforts as he takes up the great

task remaining.

I wish to express my appreciation to all of you for your constant help, and especially to the Executive Board, the Diocesan Officers and Department Chairmen for their willing service. In considering the year's work, I shall give a resume first of my activities.

At the beginning of the past year, my first official visit outside of this diocese was to the diocese of Florida, when I accepted an invitation to speak at the Fourth District Meeting in Pensacola, on Christian Unity and the Triennial. Talks on the Triennial theme were made to many groups, not only in our own Church, but to Auxiliaries of other Comunions. This was the keynote of all of our Spring Conferences of the five Convocations which I attended and where I made addresses. Pilgrimages were made to our Indian Mission in South Alabama where the Spring Conference of the Mobile Convocation was held when we were guests of the Indians at St. Anna's Mission.

A large and inspiring Meeting was attended when our Provincial President Mrs. Fred Ramsey, was the guest of the Auxiliaries of Birmingham in January. Her second visit was made possible by the Selma Convocation when our visit to the University of Alabama afforded an opportunity to see the work of the Student Branch there. The girls of this branch assisted Mrs. J. M. Howard, Chairman of the Gift of Life Committee in arranging a Corporate Communion at Christ Church, Tuscaloosa, and a Fellowship Breakfast. In May it was my privilege to make a report of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary at the Meeting of the Diocesan council in Carlowville. Visits with our Educational Secretary, Mrs. Bland Mitchell, were made over the diocese, when our mission study books "WHAT IS THIS MOSLEM WORLD?" and "RURAL AMERICA" were discussed.

It was also my pleasure and privilege to attend Auxiliary Week-End at Sewanee, and meetings of the Provincial Executive Board there and at Winston-Salem before the Provincial Meeting convened in October. Our interest in the Sewanee Conference can be appraised by the large number of the Alabama Auxiliary who sought to increase their effectiveness in Our Lord's work by their attendance and by the number of scholarships given to others.

With our Chairman of Christian Social Service I attended the Rural Conference of the Fourth Province. "Rural Cooperatives" and rural problems were studied and discussed. Many interesting discussions were led by the Clergy and members of the Faculty of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute. As your representative a talk on Good-will and Understanding was made at an Inter-racial Meeting in Selma, when representatives from Auxiliaries in other Churches were present. In June the Women's Auxiliary was represented at the Consecration of the Rt. Rev. C. C. J. Carpenter as Bishop of Alabama.

As we enter upon another year we shall have the opportunities for fellowship by the Quiet Day for Prayer on Armistice Day, the World Day of Prayer, and the Interdenominational May Day Luncheon on

May 4. I ask that there may be a closer cooperation with our Young People, by the gift of Scholarships to camps and Summer Conferences, and that we strive to attain a greater spiritual growth and development by the daily practice of prayer and Bible reading.

Our pledges should be a matter of greater concern to us. Remember that all of your pledges to our diocesan Projects are serious obligations. When we fulfill these pledges it makes life for others more abundant. It has been said that sacramental money is converted energy transmuted into the golden threads of heaven. I want you to feel that your gifts buy food, clothes and medical supplies for God's children. By increasing the number of those who use the Blue Box, you increase the number of those who may know Christ.

We all want peace, yet what have we done in our diocese for world peace?

Although we face divisions in the world, let us pray daily that "the world may at last find peace and unity in Him to whom be glory forever".

As we prepare to celebrate our Fiftieth Anniversary, let us devoutly consider its purpose—a renewal of our ideals and spiritual life, and a commemoration of those who built for us. Let us commemorate those lives by a memorial in the form of a gift to be known as the "Fiftieth Anniversary Fund" to be presented to our Bishop to be used as he thinks best. "Ye shall hallow the fiftieth year." "In His name bring an offering, and come before Him".

Since writing this address, made at the Annual Meeting, it has been decided to present this Fiftieth Anniversary Fund, as suggested, to be used to pay the salary of a worker among our girls at Alabama College, Montevallo. No more worthy cause could be presented as it is upon our young people that the hope for the next half century rests. In them are the potentialities of the future. What an opportunity to share in lighting their torch for the advance of the Kingdom, by bringing our offering and laying it up on God's altar .

My dear Mrs. Long:

You probably felt that your very helpful letter and the nice Christmas card enclosed fell into a void, never to be heard of again. I appreciated it when it came early this year, and now eight months later I find it inspiring. I also later received the Year Book of the 49th meeting of the W. A. at Christ Church, and enjoyed having it. I later passed it on to Mr. Morris who said he was very glad to read it.

We are just beginning to get into the fall routine, but for another two weeks it will still be fairly easy. The Bishop spent a week here in mid August, and so does not expect to return until the 10th. I am very glad for he never takes a rest of any length of time, and he usually needs one

rather more than any of his staff. It also means that my tasks are light at present. Next week I shall devote to having his office and mine cleaned—no light job because of the number of books in each—as well as the Chapel, polish the brass, and see that everything is ready for his return. Night school will commence on the 9th or 12th, but my typewriting class starts on the 20th, I believe.

I had a very pleasant vacation, part of which was spent with an English missionary in a little house on the slopes of Mt. Fuji. From there we had some beautiful walks, and a few nice trips to the lakes of that section. Like most of the rest of the country, the scenery there was lovely. But we have had a tremendous amount of rain, and since my return a typhoon hit the neighborhood of Tokyo and Yokohama, causing considerable damage, but nothing like the terrible flood in Kobe July 5—which was followed by two lesser floods in the same place in August! I expect foodstuffs will be even higher this winter, if for no other reason than that the crops were destroyed in so many sections.

As you have read, Fuji San is held in great reverence by the Japanese, and it was interesting this summer to see pilgrims, either singly or in groups—one as large as about 200 people, making a pilgrimage up the sacred mountain. We were told in the village that this year the tourists were very few but the pilgrims were coming in greater numbers than ever before. The village shop keepers were very troubled by this for the tourists always buy souvenirs whereas the pilgrim undertakes to make the journey and the ascent as simply as he possibly can. The pilgrims for the most part seemed simple farmer sort of folk, and one wondered which of the many possible anxieties was taking them on that trip. Going through the village street one would often see these people before the village shrine receiving the "blessing" of the priest before undertaking the journey. I never saw the whole ceremony, but the beating of a drum seemed to be part of it, as well as the waving of a wand (very similar in appearance to the duster with which house-wives flip the dust from one place to another), and often after I was abed I would hear the drum and would know that pilgrims were going up that night. It is a favorite custom to start climbing at night, especially if there is moonlight, as of course it is cooler, and one will be on top for the sunrise—if the mist is not too thick to see it.

There were some 8 or 9 foreigners staying in three different houses there, and once when a group of us had gone to one of the lakes, one of the number who was along sketching, fell into conversation with some children who had discovered her. From them she discovered that they had never even heard of Jesus or of Christianity! Some of the more traveled in the mountain villages may have heard of Christianity, but I think in that whole mountain and lake district, there is not a bit of Christian work—and there are many places throughout the country like that. It seems to me hundreds and hundreds of evangelistic missionaries could be used, even in this comparatively small country.

This letter is growing rather long. I do hope you do not mind type-written ones!

Please forgive my long delay in writing, and extend my thanks to the

Woman's Auxiliary of Alabama for their thought of me, particularly for their prayers on my behalf, for which I am very grateful.

My dear Mrs. Long:

This year we are striving more than ever before to be worthy of our name of "Service League". We are trying to realize this ideal in the five fields of service, and are thus enlarging our own scope and appreciation of the Church and its work as a whole. One of the best ways that you can help us is by letting us help you; in other words, call on us whenever there is any bit of service around our parishes that we can do.

The project that the Bishop has entrusted to us this year is that of "individual responsibility", and we are trying to live up to it mainly through the slogan "Every Leaguer a Pledger". We feel that when a young person has taken a definite part in the financial work of the church, he has taken the first step toward assuming the greater responsibilities that will come later. Several of the leagues are combining this project with their service, and are helping with the Every Member Canvass in their own parishes.

Each year the Diocesan YPSL sends one representative to the Provincial Conference and Convention at Sewanee and also we send the winners of Bishop's Challenge (a test that the Bishop gives us each Lent) to Camp McDowell. Also each parish and interparochial league tries to send one or more representatives to these conferences where they can get the most help to them in their league work and as Christians and Churchmen later on. Of course those who have these opportunities come back very inspired and we hope every year to have an increasing number at camp and Sewanee.

As you probably already know we have divided the Diocese into four Districts. Each District has a Supervisor (a leaguer and a Counsellor (an interested adult). It is through these District Counsellors, Mrs. Trapiere, Mrs. John Ebaugh, Mrs. Millikan and Miss Grace Carter, that we have our main contact with the Auxiliary, and I wish to thank them now for the help they have already been to us, and also to ask that you make your suggestions to us through them.

You probably realize better than we do, the scarcity of Church people who read Church magazines. This year every Diocese in the Province is putting on a drive to sell subscriptions to "THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS". There is a prize for the Diocese that sells the most, besides the commission on each individual subscription that is sold.

Let me thank you again for what you have all done in the past for us, especially as serving as counsellors. But also let me say that there is a very great need in almost every parish for one or more counsellors—not to run the leagues, but to come and show the young people that the adults

in the Church are behind them and appreciate the league as an interesting working organization of the Church. I hope that some of you feel that this is a service that you can do. There is also a need for transportation to District Meetings, etc. The thirty leagues are so scattered that it is hard to get a unified feeling without some personal contact.

Please consider this a cordial invitation to each of you as individuals to attend our league meetings whenever you can.

REPORT OF THE FINDINGS COMMITTEE

August 11-14, 1938
Sewanee, Tennessee

The Woman's Auxiliary Institute of the Province of Sewanee opened Thursday afternoon, August 11, with vespers at 6 P. M. in All Saint's Chapel. The Rev. Moultrie Guerry began for us a series of meditations on "Prayer", making us realize as never before God's thoughts for us. He said that Our Lord taught us to pray by suggestion, by memory, by composing prayers, and by doing. "Do this in remembrance of Me"—is a prayer which involves the whole body.

At 8 o'clock a joint meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, together with the Laymen's Institute and the Provincial Educational Conference, was held in the Union Building. The impelling challenge of the University of the South, as presented by Dr. Alexander Guerry in his welcoming address, brought us to realize that adequate preparation of students for college was a task belonging to all Christians.

Auxiliary Day opened in the old historic All Saint's Chapel with a service of Holy Communion. This day of inspiration had as its first speaker, Dr. John W. Wood, Executive Secretary of the Department of Foreign Missions of the National Council. He gave us a very vivid picture of why we should study India. India is at such a strategic point that, by changing India's life, we can change the life of the East. A century ago, India did not like the Christ that came with the trader, or soldier, or diplomat; but now that they see Christ ministering through hospitals, portrayed in love and compassion, they have opened their hearts to Him; Bishop Azariah desires to divide his over-large diocese of Dornakal, giving one of the three divisions to the Church in the United States, if she will accept.

Sister Jolly, an attractive Church Army worker, brought us a very appealing picture of her work among the children and the lepers in Liberia. She made us feel the dire need of health education, the need of love and understanding, and the need of money, as the appropriation from the National Council has been drastically cut.

Our next speaker, the Rev. Arthur M. Sherman, urged us to make our greatest enthusiasm our enthusiasm for Christ, remembering that, as we lift Christ up, we release Christ and He will draw all men unto Him. He pointed out that the Oriental is more easily won over to Christ-

ianity by his contacts with the Christian home, than by the sermons he hears. Later, Dr. Sherman recapitulated the achievements of the first Commission of the Forward Movement and stated that the objective of the second commission is evangelism. He stressed the need for Church Unity, stating that our witness for Christ is weakened by our divisions, as the world is too strong for a divided Church.

Dr. Rheinold Schairer, a German by birth, now of London University, England, was introduced to our joint meeting by Dr. Spencer Miller, as a devoted Christian and a distinguished advisor to youth, being even now on his way to attend the World Youth Conference at Vassar. Dr. Schairer brought to us the growing belief of the youth in Europe of peace. He later defined peace not as a absence of war, but an inner readiness of the soul to create a better world.

The Rev. Almon R. Pepper, Executive Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, then stated that the duty of that department is to show us how to carry out our duty towards our neighbor. To do best the Church's work, we must know the fundamental process of the Church in its relation to the city. Our Lord's life taught us our responsibility towards not only the individual but to socialized action.

Next came a panel discussion, lead by Miss Annie Morton Stout and summarized by the Rev. E. E. Piper, revealing a challenge to Auxiliary women to be active in the field of religious education, concretely, not only to take the child to the Church's School, but be intelligent about the progressive and developing program of the school, by creating a Parent-Teachers Fellowship in the Church. This discussion brought out the fact that with definite objectives, the layman's organizations would not be so short-lived. Mr. Piper's ideal of the Parish growing through these and other activities would show love towards God, understanding service, communion and fellowship with a goal to become a big family so closely knit together that what affects one affects all.

Mrs. Ramsey explained the Provincial Program, urging each diocese and parish to make a three-year program.

The subject of Dr. Spencer Miller's address was "The Problems of Youth in the United States Today". The adjustment of youth to this world is a perennial problem. The factors which enter into this youth problem may be stated as being the changing relationship between youth and old people, the wide use of birth control, and the extension of life expectancy. Our attention was called to the fact that the gap between leaving school and job-getting is steadily increasing, the waiting period averaging three and one half years. We must recognize that there is a problem and that this is a difficult world that these young people are confronting. We must try to create new fields for young people, to decide what kind of civilization we want to build, and then to think in terms of a re-creation of the new values for old. Christ was the founder and is still the leader of the youth movements of the world.

We, the Findings Committee, considered the Provincial Auxiliary Institute a profitabe undertaking which should inspire each of us to more creative thinking in our work for the Master, and heartily endorse the

continuation of such a Week-end Institute.

THE HOUSE OF HAPPINESS ANNUAL REPORT—1938

The Election of a provisional Vestry and the vote of the Congregation to accept an annual quota for 1939 of \$25.00 for the missionary budget of the Diocese marked a very encouraging step in the development of Church life at the House of Happiness this fall. This took place at the Annual Homecoming on the last Sunday of October when a large congregation assembled for an all day meeting and picnic. This year has been very heartening in the acceptance of responsibility by our people, especially the young folk. First should be mentioned the raising of over \$50.00 by three social efforts for the purpose of sending delegates to the Diocesan Camps. With the help of a similar amount from friends in the Diocese, it was possible to send a group of seven to camps. Then the willingness of 3 of our young people to act as Sunday School teachers is a good sign of developing leadership. The Lenten offering amounted to \$11.30, and the Sunday offerings brought the total amount raised within the community this year to a record amount of \$109.64. One of the things that caught the imagination of our young folks this year was the visit of the Church Army Sister Jolly from Liberia, and as a consequence they wanted to provide a years education in a village school in Liberia for two children. The Girl's Club produced a Missionary play depicting Liberian Missions and raised the \$4.00 for one scholarship, and the Sunday School by special class contributions raised the other \$4.00.

The workers were enabled to attend a Recreation Leaders' Short Course at the John C. Campbell Folk School this summer, and there learned English and Danish and American Folk Games which are now be

ing played with real enjoyment by our young people. Our High School students are passing this on by demonstration to the physical Education Class at the Scottsboro High School. In passing it may be pointed out that of the 13. High School students in our community twelve are members of the Sunday School, and ten of these are baptised in our Church, nine being confirmed.

The Recreational side of the work continues to be a most important feature of our program, and the low amount of juvenile delinquency in the community seems to indicate that this phase of our work is effective. In over three years there has been only one illegitimate birth, and that right on the outskirts of the district, and it has been necessary to have only one boy committed to the Industrial School and he was from a family that moved here from town.

The Girls' Club helped make an outfit for a baby basket donated by a Birmingham lady, and this is loaned out when new babies arrive, to encourage the use of separate beds for mother and baby. We really need two or three more Baby Baskets.

Co-operating with the Committee of the Gift of Life, we received a volunteer worker for six weeks this summer, Miss Corajeann Thetford of Boligee. She was of great help and much beloved in the community. Co-operating with the Church Army Headquarters we have afforded training and experience in rural work to eighteen Church Army Candidates, the cost of this being borne entirely by the Church Army Headquarters and the candidates. Their assistance has also been an aid to the work.

Our two Sunday Schools have an enrollment of about 90, and they meet every Sunday of the year. Our Y.P.S.L with a membership of nearly thirty, meets on Sunday evenings and presents its own programs. Cottage Meetings have been carried on throughout the year and continual pastoral visiting.

There have been 8 persons baptised this year and 6 confirmed, and 6 celebrations of the Holy Communion have been held with an average of 26 communicants at each service.

The house is almost completed now except for some interior work.

Besides holding services and visiting the people, Captain Kast has organized a Y. M. C. A., is serving on the Community Council and holds Wednesday night play-nights. He has also been holding chapel services in the school and has furnished the school with magazines and Christmas cards.

The money given by the Woman's Auxiliary has been used in building the house and more is needed to pay the accounts and to complete the work.

A church is needed very soon and the church's cooperation is asked to get a building started.

Skyline Farm is a growing community and a splendid opportunity for the Episcopal Church to further the Kingdom of God there and provide spiritual and religious leadership.

While we are confident that our local branches have failed not in works of mercy and in ministry to the sick, destitute and forsaken in the local communities, no complete Diocesan Program for Social Service in the Auxiliary has been worked out and submitted to the Branches through this Department though the excellent work of our Program of Service as put out by the Education Department seemed to leave little need for it. As Chairman of the Department, I have the honor of transmitting the excellent report of Mrs. Ogden as Treasurer of the Church Home Fund. Behind the figures which she sends in such business-like accuracy, may we not see the active love both of the branches who sent to her three hundred dollars in 1937 and one hundred twenty-three dollars in 1938 and of the local committee who so carefully planned and executed the spending of that money so that the Home that Mother Church gives these children may be bright and cheerful as the expression of our love?

As Chairman of Christian Social Service, it was my privilege to attend the Rural Conference at Auburn for two weeks. It was also my privilege to attend the Executive Board Meeting in Selma in June. Illness in my family has prevented my functioning as I would have loved to do in the service of God and my Church and prevents my attending this Convention. I would suggest that if a delegate to the Provincial Auxiliary would present the Christian Social Service Objectives as given in Winston-Salem, that they should be adopted as the program for the coming year.

REPORT OF WORK IN INDIAN FIELD, ATMORE

I should like very much to present this report to the Convention but due to the distance I am unable to attend.

Christmas will soon be here. Last year, in addition to our regular tree, the children put on a program of short plays and recitations. This year we hope to encourage trees in every home by helping the children make decorations with painted pine cones, pop-corn, etc.

An event of interest was our Daily Vacation Bible Schools in July, held for a week at each chapel. Stories, handi-craft, etc. during the mornings, then lunch and games or a swim in the afternoon.

Halloween night we are having our annual bonfire and marshmallow toast.

We have girls Club for the younger girls, at present making Christmas gifts. With the help of the sewing machine—given last year by an Auxiliary member—all these girls will soon be making their own clothes. If you have any flour or sugar sacks please remember us, also knitting needles or crochet hooks suitable for rug making, thimbles, needles and a pair of scissors. There are about fifteen girls.

Something has been learned in infant care and feeding. With the Pickerell papoose as a model, mothers and girls have learned how a baby should be bathed and fed, and the value of a sun-bath. We can hardly supply the calls for cod-liver oil since they have learned what it will do for their children. One of our Indian men had pneumonia for the third time and was unable to get a doctor. We have absolutely no fund of any kind for emergencies—would some Auxiliary like to take care of this bill of five dollars?

We are asking for second hand clothing—have had very little response from Alabama this year. Please send articles directly to me, Route C, Atmore.

REPORT OF MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Alabama.

Last year your chairman of Missions and Church Extension recommended that a careful survey be made to ascertain if an Auxiliary could be organized in the Parishes(Missions and Mission stations not showing an Auxiliary listed in the year book.

After careful study of the Diocese it was found that twenty-eight places showed no Auxiliary. A letter was sent to the rector or minister in charge and return post cards enclosed. Twenty two cards were returned giving the following information; thirteen reported membership too small or not ready to organize. St. Mary's Jasper doing work of Auxiliary, Epiphany, Guntersville and Christ Church, Piedmont, prospects for organization. St. Andrew's, Hayneville and St. Elizabeth's, Letohatchie in Lowndes County Unit. St. Mark's, Oakman on isolated list. St. John's-in-the-Wilderness, Porch Switch, St. Anna's, Porch and St. Mary's, Pinedale are Indian Missions, not ready to organize, but hope to do so when leadership is developed among them.

Your chairman would call to your attention the need for much greater interest in the stranger in our midst and to invite, you to urge and compel them to come to Church and take an active part in Church work "The wedding feast is ready". Let each member invite at least one new person to Church every month. To search out and bring or encourage parents and guardians to bring children to Holy Baptism; also adults, especially women.

It is felt that we have waited too long already for the people to come, now we must go and get them. "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to all people" is the command.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. This organization shall be called the Alabama Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE 2. Its object is to stimulate all women of the Church to work in all Departments of the National Council and in the Five Fields of Service, namely, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World, according to a program rightly balancing the work.

ARTICLE 3. All Parishes and Mission Stations that so desire may become Branches of this Auxiliary, by first obtaining the consent of the Rector in charge, appointing a Secretary and notifying the President of the Diocesan Branch of their intention to work in unison with the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE 4. Diocesan Officers shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, Educational Secretary, Secretary of the Supply Department, Custodian of the Bishop Wilmer Scholarship Fund, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer for House of Happiness, Editor of Woman's Auxiliary Page of the Alabama Churchman.

ARTICLE 5. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Educational Secretary, and the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, shall be elected by the Diocesan Auxiliary in Convention Assembled, to serve a term of three years and shall be ineligible to serve two successive terms in the same office. The newly elected President shall appoint the other officers.

ARTICLE 6. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive Meetings, have general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese and appoint Chairmen of Standing Committees.

ARTICLE 7. The Recording Secretary shall write the minutes of annual and called meetings and make ready the annual report for the printer.

ARTICLE 8. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her by the Branches for missionary work except that intended for special activities having separate Treasurers.

ARTICLE 9. The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President, shall ex-officio be Chairman of the Program of Work, and shall assist the President in the formation of new branches.

ARTICLE 10. The Educational Secretary shall promote study classes and individual reading and study in all lines of church work as directed by the National Woman's Auxiliary, and as far as possible make her office a resource of information for every department of Auxiliary Work. She shall be a member of the Committee on Program of Service.

ARTICLE 11. The United Thank Offering Secretary shall stimulate the offerings of gifts from thankful hearts of all church women for the extension of God's Kingdom on earth, shall receive these twice a year and place the funds in the custody of the General Church as directed by the National Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE 12. "A Chairman for each Convocation, who shall have been nominated at the preceding meeting shall be elected by the Convention at the Spring Conference preceding the election of Diocesan officers, to serve three years, her term of office to be co-existent with that of the incoming President. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Chairman to stimulate the interest of the Convocation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary; to call and preside over a Conference of the Convocation in the Spring of each year; and by virtue of her office to be a member of the Executive Board."

ARTICLE 13. Should a vacancy occur in the President's office, the Bishop shall appoint her successor, all other vacancies to be filled by the President.

ARTICLE 14. A Nominating Committee of three to five shall be appointed by the President one year before the expiration of her term of office, to present a ticket of new officers at the annual meeting to be voted on by the Convention.

ARTICLE 15. The Officers and Chairmen of the Auxiliary shall constitute an Executive Board, which shall meet twice a year, subject to the call of the President.

ARTICLE 16. Past Presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be members of the Executive Board and Honorary Vice-Presidents of the organization.

ARTICLE 17. Departments of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be organized to cooperate with the Diocesan Departments as appointed by the Bishop and Convention of the Diocese and with the Womans Auxiliary in its co-ordinated lines of work.

ARTICLE 18. The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held in the Fall, this date to be decided by the Executive Board at their Spring meeting.

ARTICLE 19. At annual meetings each Branch shall be entitled to two representatives.

ARTICLE 20. Seven Branches shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE 21. All branches shall contribute to the expense fund according to their numbers and strength, the standard of giving to be adjusted from time to time to meet the budget of the Auxiliary by correspondence between the Branch Treasurer and Diocesan Chairmen of

Finance.

ARTICLE 22 Any article of this Constitution may be changed by a two-thirds vote of the Branches present at any Diocesan meeting. Due notice of the desired change shall be given at one meeting and acted upon the following year.

(b) That the contestants be women in this province.
(c) That a former winner not be permitted to enter the contest again. Carried.

Whereas we recognize the great need for trained Negro leadership among that race, and realize the contribution of the Bishop Tuttle School in Raleigh, to this end be it resolved

1. That the women of the province seek out college graduates of the proper ability and spirit as students for this school.
2. That they urge the employment of these graduates in Diocesan and Parish work. Carried.

Realizing the tremendous possibility of the Every Member Canvas, the Field department urges the individual Auxiliary member to make a vital contribution to the life of the Church—

1. By thinking of it not as an event but as a continuing educational program.
2. By emphasizing giving as a requisite for spiritual growth.
3. By emphasizing the individual's responsibility to the Church.

4. By emphasizing the training of the individual from childhood to give regularly.
