MINUTES.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held at the Cathedral of All Saints', Albany, on May 8th, 1890.

The service commenced at 10.30 A. M. with a sermon by Bishop Doane and celebration of the Holy Communion. The congregation then adjourned from the choir of the Cathedral and held their business meeting

The President took the chair and called the meeting to order. The Recording Secretary called the roll—142 delegates, representing twenty-two parishes.

The President then delivered her address, which was listened to with much interest, referring to our great loss in the death of Mrs. Thomas A. Tillinghast, who had been our Manager from Troy for two years, and discharged the duties she accepted so well. She also spoke of the resignation of our Treasurer, Mr. Leonard Kip of Albany, who had held the office for five years, and from whom we part with great regret. The Recording Secretary read the minutes of the two quarterly meetings held during the year. Miss Tweddle, for the Convocation of Albany, read her report, followed by Mrs. Van Nostrand of Schenectady. Mrs. S. D. French read the report of Mrs. Tillinghast, who, while busy in gathering the work done for the year by the different societies, was so suddenly called from her work here to her rest in Paradise.

The report of Mrs. McEwen for the Convocation of Troy, was read by Mrs. Dewey, as were also the reports of the Managers for the Convocations of the Susquehanna and Ogdensburgh. All the reports show a decided increase, not only in the boxes sent and money given, but also in the interest felt in the work. The Corresponding Secretary read her report and made most excellent suggestions in regard to the printing of reports.

Mrs. Leonard Kip read the Treasurer's report. Miss Burt, the Secretary, read the report of the work done by the Church Periodical Club, and also interesting items from letters, showing how much comfort and help the books and newspapers are, not only in hospitals, but among many people who have no way of obtaining such luxuries.

Mrs. Patterson read a letter from Mrs. Mortimer Fargo, asking that some small sum of money be given from each Auxiliary Society towards the salary of an assistant, as the work has grown so much that she is unable to do it alone. Mrs. Doane proposed that \$10.00 be given by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Albany. Motion moved, seconded and carried.

At the last quarterly meeting Mrs. Peck, Mrs. Dewey and Mrs. Patterson were appointed a committee to prepare a letter for the use of the Corresponding Secretary.

Mrs. Peck read a letter composed by the committee for this purpose. Mrs. Byington offered an amendment that the letter end Most cordially yours. Adopted.

A resolution was made and carried that the Corresponding Secretary keep a copy of this letter to be used at her discretion, and modified according to circumstances.

Bishop Doane made a plea for a Diocesan Lending Library, to be established at the Cathedral and under the care of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Clergymen unable to obtain the new theological works, can borrow them of this library. Books can be sent and returned by mail.

Bishop Doane spoke of the devil always being ready and changing his weapons. So we need to have the latest and best works, to be always prepared for his attacks. He proposed a committee be appointed to take charge of this work. Mrs. Patterson appointed a committee of five to help in establishing this library, Mrs. Dewey, Mrs. Doane, Miss Boyd, Mrs. Snively, Mrs. Patterson.

The Rev. Mr. Snively, of St. John's Church, Troy, offered a gift of \$100 from the late Judge Mann's fund. Also a yearly gift of \$25 for the purchase of books.

Bishop Doane paid a touching tribute to the memory of Mrs. Thomas A. Tillinghast, Manager from the Convocation of Troy. He said, ever since I entered this Diocese, twenty-one years ago,

she has been my firm friend, and also the friend of every good work, in her Parish, in the city, and in the Diocese. No worthy object appealed to her in vain. With a frail and delicate body she accomplished an amount of work, to which few strong and well people are equal. She was a true Christian lady, rich in labors of love, gracious, patient, reverent. Her heart had long been on the other side. So when the summons came to "go Home," she was not only ready, but glad to join those loved ones gone before her, to the rest of Paradise.

An adjournment was then made to the Gymnasium of St. Agnes school where a bountiful luncheon was served.

The afternoon services were opened by prayer, and a short address by Dean Robbins, of the Cathedral. The next address was by Miss Smiley. She said, when asked to address the meeting, she felt we were interested in boxes and she in books. She urged systematic reading upon her hearers, that each person should take some little time each day, and use it for good reading; in this way much good could be accomplished in each year.

Mr. Melvil Dewey, the State Librarian, then addressed the meeting on the new Diocesan Lending Library; he offered to help in the care of cataloguing and arranging the books.

The Rev. Joshua Rimber then addressed the Auxiliary; he referred to the Indians, and the unjust treatment received by them, and the better way in which the Government was now working with them. He spoke of the colored people who need to be built up both mentally and morally; and lastly of the Chinese now with us, who must be cared for.

Bishop Doane appointed Mrs. Charles E. Hanaman, Troy, as Treasurer in place of Mrs. Leonard Kip, and Mrs. George B. Warren as Manager for the Troy Convocation.

The Pledges for the work for the year were then called for and taken. The first pledge was for the Colored work.

THE QUARTERLY MEETING

Of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at the Cathedral, Albany, on November 11th, 1889. Meeting opened with reading of prayers by Dean Robbins, Bishop Doane, Bishop Kendricks and Bishop Leonard being present in the chancel. The assembly was addressed by Bishop Leonard of Utah, giving an account of the educational work needed in his jurisdiction, also telling of the good work of the Bible Reader employed in Salt Lake City among Mormon women. The Bishop of New Mexico followed, stating his need of both men and women to carry on his work chiefly among Navaji Indians, and also among English speaking people of that vast territory. After the addresses a short business meeting followed. The Treasurer's report was given and the minutes of the annual meeting read. Mrs. Dewey read some letters from Missionaries, and a discussion followed as to sending boxes two years in succession to the same Clergymen. A motion for adjournment was made, as the congregation was gathering for evening service.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in the Martha Memorial House, St. Paul's Parish, Troy, on Thursday afternoon, February 13th.

The President, Mrs. C. E. Patterson, called the meeting to order and the Secretary called the roll. Thirty-six delegates were present, representing eleven parishes.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Dewey, reported the number of letters written by her.

The President read the report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Kip. The minutes of the last quarterly meeting were read and approved. The managers, Mrs. T. A. Tillinghast, Mrs. Van Nostrand and Mrs. McEwen reported the progress of the work in their Convocations. The Secretary read a letter from Miss E.

J. Hughes, who reported the work done at Gilbertsville. Miss Burt, Secretary of the Church Periodical Club made a favorable report.

In order to provide the small parishes with work, a resolution was passed permitting the managers to divide the proposed contents of boxes among two or more branches. The motion was made, seconded and carried that a committee be appointed to prepare a form of printed letter for the use of the Corresponding Secretary in offering the assistance of the Auxiliary. Mrs. C. E. Patterson, Mrs. M. Dewey and Mrs. J. H. Peck were appointed on this committee, and requested to report at the annual meeting in May. The meeting was on motion adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

WOMEN OF THE AUXILIARY:

It seems only yesterday that I welcomed you to our last Annual Meeting, yet a year has passed since then—a year with all its attempts, its successes, and its failures.

It is our privilege to-day to hold for the first time an annual meeting in the new Cathedral. As we stand in this House of God and mark its beauty and convenience for carrying on the work of the Church in this Diocese, we may rejoice that women have so largely assisted in the erection of this central head and home of the Church, whose influence goes forth through the Diocese, cementing, strengthening, building up. Now, I never look at this grand Cathedral Church but I am reminded of the power of prayer, persistent effort and courage. What can withstand them? Nothing.

It was my privilege to attend the last Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York last October. When I saw the hall in which they met, full of bright, earnest women, I felt, as I never felt before, the power of united Christian women, and when I tell you what these women have accomplished, who will deny their power? The Woman's Auxiliary in the United States has in the past year contributed \$119,379.98 in money, and sent out boxes valued \$184,593.15, making a grand total of \$303,973.13.

The parish branches may say we are poor. We can do little, but every little helps to swell the sum into the thousands, the tens of thousands, even hundreds of thousands. Every year this work grows, because every year the love of Christ grows in our hearts. Each year Christian women realize more deeply what Jesus has done for them, and then they cannot rest until they have done something to help carry this precious knowledge of a Saviour to those who have not yet heard the glad tidings. Love is becoming more and more the key-note of our religion. "We

love him because he first loved us." "Love is the fulfilling of the law."

"It is not the deed we do,
Though the deed be never so fair,
But the love that the good
Lord looketh for,
Hidden with tender care
In the heart of the deed so fair."

This our Service of Love in the Diocese of Albany has gone on quietly the past year; some parish branches have done nobly, others have been indifferent and have accomplished little. I am particularly pleased that twelve junior branches have been formed this year, and I also am glad to announce the organization of the Ministering Children's League as a part of our Auxiliary work. One junior branch is worthy of especial mention, though composed almost entirely of young girls who assist in their own support; they have this year contributed over \$130 to various Missionary objects. There is also a branch of the Ministering Children's League who have raised more than \$200. Now, besides the good done by the money thus made, who can estimate the benefit to the children in the knowledge of Church and Mission work thus received.

The Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese has been deeply afflicted in the death of Mrs. Thomas A. Tillinghast, a manager for the Convocation of Troy. Her highly religious nature, and her enthusiastic love of God's service, rendered her very successful in our mission work, and endeared her to all those associated with her, and she has left a vacant place in the Board of Managers, hard to fill. I announce with regret the resignation of Mrs. Kip, our treasurer, who feels that after five years of devoted work she should be relieved.

The Woman's Auxiliary in this country is still in its infancy, but I foresee for it a great future. "When God would send forth a river on its errand of usefulness, power and beauty, he does not open one of the earth's great arteries and pour a mighty flood down the ocean's side. A few drops trickle beneath a stone, a baby's hand might turn the stream that way or this; it steals away between stones and mosses a silvery thread. Joining hands with other rivulets it grows in power, taking to its arm other streams, until it rolls in might to the ocean, bearing on its

bosom the inland commerce of a nation. Women are destined to largely assist, as they always have done, in the Evangelization of the world. The Roman Empire was Christianized through the influence of Helena, the mother of Constantine the Great. The Christian religion was introduced into Russia in the reign of Catherine II. The Poles were Christianized in the reign of Micilius I. through the influence of Dombronska his wife, and our British ancestors are indebted to good Queen Bertha for the permanent establishment of Christianity. Be assured our weakness is no bar to successful work for God. Though the instruments of our warfare be poor and dull, driven by divine strength they shall prevail to the breaking down of the power of sin and death, "For God has chosen the weak things of the world to confound the strong, that no flesh should glory in his presence."

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

The reports of the past year's work show a substantial and encouraging increase in number of branches reporting, and number and total value of boxes sent out.

The whole number reporting this year is 47, last year 35. The number of boxes sent this year is 110; last year 89. The total value of boxes this year is \$5,293.74; last year \$4,303.34. The total in money and boxes for this year is \$6,897.93.

107 letters have been written by the Corresponding Secretary between 1st Sept., '89-1st May, '90.

Another encouraging feature is the number of Junior Auxiliary branches springing up and doing vigorous work in various churches. The work of the two connected with Emmanuel Church, Little Falls, and those at S. Paul's, Troy, amount to \$526.38. The whole number of Junior Auxiliaries reporting is 21. From the ranks of these young workers, the Woman's Auxiliary of the next generation will be recruited.

As suggested last year, the Convocation of the Susquehanna holds this week, May 6 and 7, a meeting at St. James' Church, Oneonta, hoping to arouse special interest in work in their vicinity.

One of the most puzzling questions of the year has been, "How to supply the small parishes with work?" This was discussed at the last quarterly meeting without solving the difficulties. The poor country parishes say, "If we only had materials, we have willing hands and could do much sewing. But even if we had money, we cannot get suitable materials of the right quality, in our country stores."

Would it not be possible to have a general fund on which the poor parish which could raise only \$5.00 might call for \$5.00

more, and have its buying done by a committee in one of the large cities?

Systematic and conscientious giving is specially urged for these small parishes. Miss Emery, the General Secretary, suggests the use of little envelopes with "Auxiliary Fund" and each month of the year printed on them, which she will supply, and mentions the trial of the plan in one farming region where there was little ready money. The local Secretary seemed much discouraged because only \$14.00 had been raised, but when asked what they had done the year before, answered "Oh! nothing." \$14.00 from each parish which is now "doing nothing," would make a creditable aggregate, and put into materials for "willing hands," the value would be much more than doubled.

Much confusion seems to exist as to the respective duties of managers, secretaries and treasurer. Many diocesan branches print their constitution and by-laws with their annual report, thus defining the duties of the various officers more clearly. It is very desirable that our report should also include lists, with full addresses, of diocesan officers, of managers, and of parish secretaries. An alphabetical list of all the parishes in the diocese, with a star to indicate those in which branches are already organized, would require little space, and would be found useful in stimulating the formation of new branches.

As our annual report is our only publication it would seem wise to appoint a special committee to introduce such improvements as would add to its interest and practical value.

An earnest appeal is made for more exact and business-like methods in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is almost incredible that so much carelessness and thoughtlessness can exist in a body of women organized as helpers, in the Spirit of Christ. Not one of us but would resent the imputation of cruelty, and yet Miss Emery could tell sad tales of letters lost, or retained for months unacknowledged, while the missionary and his family are waiting, perhaps in urgent need of the help they have been led to expect.

When printed blanks are sent out, every word should be carefully read first, and every heading filled in. Letters descriptive of the work, may be written, as full as desired, but because a good letter has been written, the blank should not be thrown

aside as needless, necessitating the slow picking out of facts from letters which may fail to mention the most important item. In spite of carefully prepared blanks with printed headings, it has more than once happened that reports have been sent in without the slightest clue to the name of parish, city or town, diocese or secretary. Others come in such form that it is impossible for one unacquainted with the facts to tell whether certain figures refer to the value of a box or to money given.

As most women have had little experience or training in business methods, it is doubly important that great care be taken in filling out business blanks, otherwise heavy burdens are thrown on those who have to digest the returns. A minute's more time in making an entry intelligible may possibly save an hour to some over-worked general officer, who, ignorant of the facts, must open a correspondence and suffer annoying delays before understanding what could easily have been made plain.

CONSTITUTION.

[The Constitution is reprinted with a view to revision at the next General Meeting.]

I.

This Association shall be called THE BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS IN THE DIOCESE OF ALBANY.

II.

The objects of this Association are, by means of union and systematic efforts, to diffuse missionary intelligence and increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to unite previously existing parochial societies in a common interest, and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

III.

All baptized women of the Diocese who desire to be members of this Association will be so regarded.

IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and a Board of Managers. The latter shall consist of two members from each Convocation, to be chosen by the Archdeacon and approved by the Bishop.

V.

The President shall call meetings together and preside over them.

VI.

The Vice-President shall preside over meetings in the absence of the President.

VII.

The duty of the Recording Secretary is to give notice of meetings and keep a record of such meetings.

VIII.

The duty of the Corresponding Secretary is to prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese, and to conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and with the Managers.

IX.

The duty of the Treasurer is to receive and forward all money offerings, to keep an account of all money and articles contributed for missionary purposes by the Women's Societies, or by individual members of this Auxiliary.

X.

The duty of the Managers is to try to increase in their own Convocation a missionary spirit, by rousing the societies to greater efforts in working for missionaries, in raising money for the cause, and by diffusing intelligence concerning the past and present missionary work of the Church. The Managers are authorized to hold meetings at such times and places as they please in their own Convocation.

XI.

All parochial societies who desire it will be considered members of this Auxiliary, and will send their report of money collected and work done, through their Managers, to the Secretary and Treasurer. Also delegates from all such societies will be expected at the General Meetings.

XII.

There should be one or more meetings of the Society in each year, at such time and place as shall be designated by the President and Board of Managers.

XIII.

Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of two-thirds of the Managers.

XIV.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any General Meeting.
