THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

My Dear Women of the Auxiliary:

Another year has passed and gone since we last met in Troy, and we have assembled for our twenty-seventh Annual Meeting.

A sense of deep gratitude to Almighty God fills my heart, as I think over the many blessings that have been vouchsafed us during the past twelve months: for the renewed health and strength of our dear Bishop, making it possible for him to be present with us at this time; for the improved health of our Beloved Treasurer; for the ready and efficient help so generously rendered by the Executive Board during my absence in Bermuda, and for my own complete recovery.

The past year opened with many changes among our officers. Vacancies occurred, from time to time; but the good Lord raised up faithful women to fill them; who, by their tireless and conscientious efforts, have won both our affection and esteem.

Nothing can help on the work of the Auxiliary more than this kind of spirit: the spirit which I should like to see spread itself over the length and breadth of our Diocese—the spirit of a noble and generous giving of our time, our thought, our substance, our prayers and, most of all, of ourselves to the cause of Missions.

This is the spirit which, I am sure, our dear Lord would have us cultivate and shew forth.

I trust that the Day of Intercessory Prayer was well observed throughout the Diocese. In my opinion such days are a necessity in an organization such as ours. In fact, unless our branches are willing to unite, upon occasion, in such intercessory prayer, I do not see how our spiritual life is to deepen, or how our interests in Missions is to increase.

Once more I make the request that the pledges be paid as early in the year as possible. It always makes a difference, in the Church as well as in the world, whether we pay what we owe promptly or not; and then, too, it will save our Treasurer the necessity of writing the many letters which are so great a tax upon her strength.

In the passing out from among us of dear Mrs. Swan, the late President of the Cathedral Branch, the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, in the Diocese of Albany, has received a crushing blow. By her ever increasing interest in the work last winter, and by her great personal magnetism, she had endeared herself to all with whom she came in contact. It is difficult, indeed, to estimate the value of such an influence; and our grief is deep and sincere.

In closing I ask your loyalty in whatever may be in store for us; and your prayers, that we may press on to larger enterprise, and to an ever increasing intelligence, and interest in the Missions of the Church.

DIRECTIONS FOR PARISH SECRETARIES

1. The Corresponding Secretary of the Diocesan Branch, has on hand letters, sent from the Church Missions House, stating needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools in the Mission field. Also letters, approved by our Bishops, which state the needs of the missionaries in our own Diocese. When your branch is ready to start work, write to the Corresponding Secretary for such letters.
2. When your branch has undertaken the work for which your selected letter calls, notify the Secretary at once, sending her the name and address in such letter, and your own address and parish.
3. It is of the utmost importance that immediately after such decision, all rejected letters be returned to the Corresponding Secretary.
4. Write to the Missionary at once, stating when and from whom he may expect a box.
5. Write to the Missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, also the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary, with statement concerning value of box.
6. Blanks will be sent out early in April, 1911, for a report of the year's work. Read them carefully and fill them out fully. Return them to the Corresponding Secretary at once, correcting any errors which appear in the report of 1910. At this time also write to the Manager of your division, giving any details of work and method in your branch.
- All boxes of books, single books or magazines should be reported through the Church Periodical Club.
7. Always notify the Corresponding Secretary of any change of branch officers during the year. Keep in touch with the Manager of your division, and for any desired information write to the diocesan officer having such matter in charge.
8. Copies of the Special Auxiliary service, approved by the Bishop, will be sent on application to either Recording or Corresponding Secretary.

ALBANY—ALL SAINTS'.

The Cathedral Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has held regular monthly meetings throughout the winter, at which addresses have been made by missionaries and the clergy. The attendance has averaged twenty-seven. Three boxes have been sent. Special meetings for mission sewing and readings have been held through Lent.

ALBANY— HOLY INNOCENTS', 36 Members.

Holy Innocents' Branch reports a membership of thirty-six. Monthly meetings have been held, beginning in October. During Lent a large box was prepared and sent to an Indian missionary working among his own people in the Diocese of Duluth. Payments have also been made to the United Offering and to pledges.

FONDA—ZION, 18 Members.

This Branch has held eight business meetings and seven Lenten sewing meetings, at which the ladies sewed for a box to be sent to Archdeacon Delaney, Raleigh, North Carolina. Two boxes have been sent and all pledges paid.

ALBANY—ST. PETER'S.

St. Peter's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has had a busy winter. One diocesan box, three domestic boxes and two boxes for work in the Adirondacks have been sent, representing a total value of a little over eight hundred dollars. At the weekly sewing meetings, held during Lent, articles were made to be sent to St. John's Institute, Corbin, Kentucky. Japan was the topic of Lenten study.

AMSTERDAM—ST. ANN'S.

Nine meetings have been held during the year, at which garments have been made for boxes and articles upon work in the missionary field have been read.

Two missionary teas and food sales have added funds to our treasury. Two boxes have been sent; also money for United Offering and pledges. A corporate communion was observed on Maunday Thursday, at which a large number were present.

ALBANY—ST. ANDREW'S, 21 Members.

This Branch has been doing most earnest work during Lent. The meetings have been held at the homes of the members, tea being served, which promoted a general feeling of interest and sociability. Five barrels have been sent to Bloomingdale, Essex county, for the tuberculosis patients; babies' garments were made and sent to St. Agnes Hospital, Raleigh, and money was sent to apply toward Bishop Sayles' robes; also money to send toques and sweaters to Alaska, and the United Offering.

FONDA—ZION.

This Branch has eighteen members, and has held seven meetings, with an average attendance of seven members. The Spirit of Missions has been read at the meetings, and during Lent sewing has been done for parish needs.

RENSSELAERVILLE.

Severe weather has prevented meetings being held in this Branch, but they have paid towards pledges, and the Secretary writes, "We are only two or three gathered together, but we do not lose interest."

GLOVERSVILLE—CHRIST CHURCH, 30 Members.

This Branch has thirty members, and have held meetings every two weeks, which have been well attended and at which sewing has been done.

JOHNSTOWN—ST. JOHN'S.

This Branch has met every two weeks, their work going to St. John's in the Wilderness.

WATERVLIET—TRINITY.

This Branch has nineteen members, but works only through Lent.

It is with great regret that I am obliged to send in my report with reports from only eleven of my branches, although I have written each of them. It is also to be regretted that some of the Branches have not more to report, owing to the fact that they have worked for some of the Diocesan institutions, which is not, of course, auxiliary work.

GREENVILLE—CHRIST CHURCH.

Change of Rectors and lack of services has prevented any Branch work.

ILION—S. AUGUSTINE'S, 36 Members, 6 new Members.

Meetings once in two weeks. Diocesan box sent to St. John's Missionary Institute, Corbin, Ky. In December they had an address from Rev. Mr. Nilson, seven years a missionary in Soochow, China. This year their study was a course of six lessons on Africa. They make their annual meeting, in January, a social occasion, inviting the men of the parish to supper. More than fifty attended this year.

EXTRACTS FROM REPORT OF "SPECIAL COMMITTEE" APPOINTED BY BISHOP NELSON, MAY 9, 1906

It has been deemed wise to repeat in part this report of the "Special Committee," and your careful consideration of it is asked.

"The Woman's Auxiliary was organized by the Board of Missions to assist in the missionary work of the Church, therefore its sphere of work should correspond with the work and wishes of the Board.

"The Woman's Auxiliary is asked to contribute each year towards the pledges for Missions and the amount divided among the *Diocesan* branches. Our *Parish* branches are asked to provide for meeting this pledge before giving any money to 'Specials,' as we are bound to support the appropriations of the Board of Missions.

"'Specials' are needed, but first we must arrange for the regular pledges.

"Boxes of clothing and supplies for Missionaries, hospitals and schools, when recommended by the Bishops, are a legitimate part of Auxiliary work."

"The aims of the Woman's Auxiliary should never be lost sight of, even in the smallest Branch—*auxiliary to the Board of Missions*."

"It is quite outside of Auxiliary work to give money to any Parochial objects, but in this Diocese, which is so largely missionary in character, the Bishop has authorized the sending of boxes to some of the clergy, and there is also a pledge on our list for the salary of the Diocesan Missionary.

"Boxes for the *Diocesan Institutions* will hereafter be sent through St. Christopher's League, which has been formed for that purpose, and leave the branches free to do regular Auxiliary work."

Celebration of the Holy Communion at 9.30 A. M.

At 10.30 Mrs. Paige called the business meeting to order.

The roll-call was postponed until all the delegates should arrive.

The minutes of the Annual meeting were read and accepted.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Griswold, reported having heard from 21 Branches out of 80, and the need of boxes.

Letters were read from the Bishops of the Diocese.

Miss Stetson, Junior Secretary, reported four large boxes packed with over 1,000 Christmas gifts, and sent to the poor whites of North Carolina and Kentucky, colored work in Georgia and Indians in Minnesota. Twenty Branches had taken part in these joint boxes.

A new Junior Branch was reported at Stamford, N. Y.

The Treasurer's report was read by Mrs. Babcock and accepted.

A letter from the Treasurer to the Auxiliary was read by Miss Knapp. A resolution of sympathy and affection for Mrs. Rochester was offered by Mrs. Swan. Carried by a rising vote.

Miss Knapp spoke on the pledges and the changes in the Auxiliary report. A letter from Dr. Lloyd was read by Miss Knapp.

A Resolution was offered by Mrs. Griswold that the sympathy of the Auxiliary be sent to Mrs. Van Rensselaer in her affliction. Adopted.

A resolution was offered by Mrs. Babcock that a message be sent to Deaconess Pell-Clarke, who was starting that night for Bermuda, for her health. Adopted.

A resolution was offered by Mrs. Paige that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary present at the Semi-Annual meeting at Little Falls wish to have conveyed to the Rev. Mr. Sterling and Miss Sterling their most heartfelt sympathy in the great sorrow which has come to them. The Woman's Auxiliary has lost a most enthusiastic and efficient member. To her efforts was it largely due that the Semi-Annual meeting held in Morris last year was so successful. Her cordial welcome and gracious hospitality will not soon be forgotten, and they would like to have inscribed upon the minutes this small tribute to her memory. Adopted.

Mrs. Paige spoke of the next Annual meeting to be held the first week in May.

The roll-call showed 48 present, 7 officers and 4 clergymen.

Rev. Mr. Studley spoke of conditions in the Philippines.

Noonday prayers were read by the rector, Rev. Mr. Rasay.

Luncheon was served at 12.30.

A vote of thanks was proposed by Miss Stetson to the rector and Woman's Auxiliary of Little Falls for their generous and gracious hospitality.

Adopted by a rising vote.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this society is "The Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

ARTICLE II.

The object of this society is, by means of mutual and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of the diocese, and to encourage the formation of new branches. In furtherance of this there may be maintained:

- (a) A department in the periodical newspaper of the diocese to be devoted to the interests of the Woman's Auxiliary.
- (b) A branch of the church periodical club for the distribution to missionaries of religious and secular literature.
- (c) Such other work as from time to time may be deemed expedient for the further development of the society.

ARTICLE III.

Any woman who is a member of a Parish branch becomes thereby a member of the Diocesan branch.

The officers of each parish branch shall send to the treasurer all pledges and money given for other than parish or local purposes. They shall make to the corresponding secretary, before May 1st of each year, a report of the number and value of their missionary boxes.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this society shall be a president, five vice-presidents, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a secretary for the junior department and a treasurer, and a treasurer for the United Offering.

These officers shall be appointed by the Bishop at each annual meeting and shall serve one year. In addition there shall be one or more managers for each archdeaconry, chosen by the Archdeacon and approved by the Bishop. These officers, together with the chairmen of standing committees, shall constitute the executive committee.

1. The president, or in her absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall call and preside over all meetings.

2. The recording secretary shall send all notices, keep the minutes of all meetings and shall send a copy of the minutes of every executive meeting to each manager not present at such meeting. She shall be responsible for the issuing and distributing of the annual report.

3. The corresponding secretary shall assist in preparing the annual report and conduct the correspondence of the society with parish branches, with missionaries, with the managers and with the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

4. The secretary of the Junior Auxiliary shall conduct all the business of her department and shall make a report at the annual and semi-annual meetings. She shall make an annual report of missionary boxes to the corresponding secretary and of all money to the treasurer.

5. The treasurer shall have the custody of all money received by the Diocesan Branch, and shall collect by correspondence if necessary, all sums payable to the same; shall keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, with date, purpose and amount, and shall make a full report of the same at each regular meeting. She shall pay out money only as directed by the Diocesan Branch or Executive Committee, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, and which may be disposed of without formal directions. All money received for purposes outside the diocese shall be forwarded through the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

The treasurer of United Offering shall be responsible for the collection and disbursement of that fund.

The Bishop shall appoint annually an auditor, who shall examine the accounts of the treasurer before they are presented at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

Managers shall endeavor to stimulate the formation of new parish branches, to infuse greater missionary spirit throughout their archdeaconries, and shall seek to increase intelligent interest in the missionary work of the church.

At the annual and semi-annual meetings an opportunity will be afforded the managers to meet the members of the branches of their respective archdeaconries.

At least one general meeting should be held during the year in each archdeaconry.

Each manager shall present a written report of her work for the year at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE VI.

The annual meeting shall be held in May, the time and place of meeting to be decided by the Executive Committee.

At this meeting the annual reports shall be presented and the officers appointed. A semi-annual meeting shall be held in the fall of each year, the date and place of meeting to be decided upon by the Executive Committee.

Special meetings may be called by the president at the request of five of the executive committee.

Notice of all meetings shall be sent to each diocesan officer and the secretary of each parish branch.

A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of the members present at any meeting regularly called.

ARTICLE VII.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been given with the call for this meeting.
