CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This society shall be known as The Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The object of this organization shall be, to unite all church women of the Diocese in work for Domestic and Foreign Missions, to increase missionary activity in the parish auxiliaries, and to encourage the formation of such branches where there are none. In furtherance of this there may be maintained :

- (a) A department in the periodical newspaper of the diocese to be devoted to the interests of the Woman's Auxiliary.
- (b) A branch of the church periodical club for the distribution to missionaries of religious and secular literature.
- (c) Such other work as from time to time may be deemed expedient for the further development of the society.

ARTICLE III.

Any woman who is a member of a parish branch becomes thereby a member of the Diocesan branch.

The officers of each parish branch shall send to the treasurer all pledges and money given for other than parish or local purposes. They shall make to the Corresponding Secretary, at the close of their year, a report of the number and value of their missionary boxes.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this society shall be a president, five vice-presidents, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a secretary for the junior department, a treasurer, and a treasurer for the United Offering. These officers shall be appointed by the Bishop. In addition there shall be one manager for each archdeaconry or division thereof, nominated by the Archdeacon and appointed by the Bishop. These officers together with the chairmen of standing committees, shall constitute the executive board.

1. The president, or in her absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall call and preside over all meetings.

2. The recording secretary shall send all notices, keep the minutes of all meetings and shall send a copy of the minutes of every executive meeting to each member of the executive committee not present at such meeting. She shall be responsible for the issuing and distributing of the annual report.

3. The corresponding secretary shall assist in preparing the annual report and conduct the correspondence of the society with parish branches, with missionaries, with the managers and with the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

4. The secretary of the Junior Auxiliary shall conduct all the business of her department and shall make a report at the annual and semi-annual meetings. She shall make an annual report of missionary boxes to the corresponding secretary and of all money to the treasurer.

5. The treasurer shall have the custody of all money received by the Diocesan Branch, and shall collect by correspondence if necessary all sums payable to the same ; shall keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, with date, purpose and amount, and shall make a full report

of the same at each regular meeting. She shall pay out money only as directed by the Diocesan Branch or Executive Committee, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, and which may be disposed of without formal directions. All money received for purposes outside the diocese, shall be forwarded through the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

6. The treasurer of the United offering shall be responsible for the collection and presentation of that fund.

The Bishop shall appoint annually an auditor, who shall examine the accounts of the treasurer before they are presented at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

Managers shall endeavor to stimulate the formation of new parish branches, to infuse greater missionary spirit throughout their archdeaconries, and shall seek to increase intelligent interest in the missionary work of the Church.

At least one general meeting shall be held during the year in each archdeaconry.

Each manager shall make a statement of the work done in her archdeaconry to be published in the annual report.

ARTICLE VI.

The annual meeting shall be held in October, in one of the central cities of the Diocese, the time and place of meeting to be decided by the executive committee.

A semi-annual meeting shall be held in May, the several archdeaconries, in rotation, being responsible for all arrangements in regard to the meetings, the executive committee acting as advisory board with them as to time and place.

Special meetings of the executive board may be called by the president at the request of five of the executive committee.

Notice of annual and semi-annual meetings shall be sent to each diocesan officer and to the secretary of each parish branch.

A quorum of the executive committee for the transaction of business, shall consist of not less than five members present at any meeting regularly called.

ARTICLE VII.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been given with the call for this meeting.

That the Missionary Conference which was made possible by the kind generosity of one of our most devoted members, has proved its value, is shown by the great increase in the number of, and the interest in the Study Classes. While it is a little hard to report definitely upon the result of such an undertaking, still there is no question but that it has been a very great benefit, by stimulating Missionary zeal, by increasing knowledge of working methods and by bringing members of our Diocesan Branches into closer touch and sympathy.

DIRECTIONS FOR PARISH SECRETARIES

1. The Corresponding Secretary of the Diocesan Branch, has on hand letters, sent from the Church Missions House, stating needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools in the Mission field. Also letters, approved by our Bishops, which state the needs of the missionaries in our own Diocese. When your branch is ready to start work, write to the Corresponding Secretary for such letters.

2. When your branch has undertaken the work for which your selected letter calls, notify the Secretary at once, sending her the name and address in such letter, and your own address and parish.

3. It is of the utmost importance that immediately after such decision, all rejected letters be returned to the Corresponding Secretary.

4. Write to the Missionary at once, stating when and from whom he may expect a box.

5. Write to the Missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, also to the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary, with statement concerning value of box.

6. Blanks will be sent for a report of the year's work. Read them carefully and fill them out fully. Return them to the Corresponding Secretary at once, correcting any errors which appear in the last report. At this time also write to the Manager of your division, giving any details of work and method in your branch.

All boxes of books, single books or magazines should be reported through the Church Periodical Club.

7. Always notify the Corresponding Secretary of any change of branch officers during the year. Keep in touch with the Manager of your division, and for any desired information write to the diocesan officers having such matter in charge.

8. Copies of the Special Auxiliary service, approved by the Bishop, will be sent on application to either Recording or Corresponding Secretary.

REPORT OF ARCHDEACONRY OF ALBANY

1st DIVISION

ALBANY—ALL SAINTS:

The Cathedral branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, has a large and active membership. Monthly meetings have been held regularly from October to May, and during Lent two Mission Study classes have been held weekly, besides much other work accomplished.

ALBANY—ST. PETER'S:

This branch has held regular monthly meetings at which it has been arranged that some worker in the Mission field has given an address, or other Missionary intelligence has been provided for the meeting. During Lent the society has met weekly to sew for a hospital box.

Not as many attended the Conference as expected, but those who were there felt amply repaid for going. The fruit of the Conference has been a most interesting Study Class under able leadership, and the "Conquest of the Continent" has been studied.

ALBANY—ST. PAUL'S:

St. Paul's branch reports seven business meetings at which garments were made for the Morganton, N. C., group of Missions, and a box of household linen was prepared for the Rev. Thomas Beeson of Mohawk, N. Y.

All pledges have been met and a contribution made to the United Offering. Most of the members attended the Missionary Conference, and considered it very instructive and inspiring.

ALBANY—HOLY INNOCENTS:

The members of this branch have held monthly meetings at which papers on Foreign and Domestic Missionary work have been read. The second Sunday in January was again designated as Missionary Sunday in the parish, with a special sermon by the Rector, and a Corporate Communion for all women workers in the parish.

The branch was represented at every session of the Conference. Gifts to the United Offering, and pledges have been made, and a creditable box sent to the Rev. S. E. Prentiss for the benefit of the Morganton, N. C., group of Missions.

ALBANY—ST. ANDREWS:

The Woman's Auxiliary of this parish has held ten meetings. The Missionary Conference was well attended by its members, and quite an impetus was given to their work. The impression given was that they were real helpers to the Board of Missions, and they have found from a brief study of the "Why and Wherefore of Missions" that study is a very vital part of their work for Missions. Intercourse with other branches at the Conference was valuable in that by the united efforts of many much could be accomplished, in exchanging and learning from one another points and

methods, so that the Conference was felt to be a great help, and worth all the thought and labor of those who were instrumental in bringing the various branches together.

ALBANY—TRINITY :

This branch has been dormant during the past year, but as the members are anxious to begin work again, it is hoped that in the Fall they may revive the interest shown in former years. Members of this branch attended the Conference.

COHOES—ST. JOHN'S :

The Auxiliary of St. John's Church, Cohoes, has held eight meetings during Lent with an average attendance of sixteen members, several of whom attended the Missionary Conference. The impression of the work was most beneficial, especially the Study Hour.

GLOVERSVILLE—CHRIST'S CHURCH :

The Auxiliary of this parish has held fifteen meetings, with a total attendance of one hundred and seventy-five, a slight falling off, which may be accounted for by stormy weather when the meetings were held. During Lent they met every week.

FONDA—ZION :

This branch has not been active for more than a year, owing largely to illness in the families of its various members. There are twelve active and two sustaining members in the Auxiliary. Two meetings have been held in the year.

RENSSELAERVILLE—TRINITY :

Through death and removals, this branch is a very small one, but not lacking in interest in Missions, or contributions to general work.

The meetings are held in the Summer because so many members are absent in the Winter. At the Summer meetings they have readings from the Spirit of Missions and other Missionary intelligence. There are ten members, average attendance five or six. Six meetings have been held during the year, pledges have been paid, and contributions towards work among Seminole Indians, and United Offering.

WATERVLIET—TRINITY :

This branch has eighteen members, but owing to unavoidable circumstances not much work has been done, however they are looking forward to the near future which promises renewed interest in the work.

ASHLAND :

Reports fifteen members with neither increase or loss since last report.

The long distances and unfavorable weather have caused some absences in the winter. Increased interest is shown by increased offerings this year, (\$18.50).

They are reading the Spirit of Missions and Conquest of the Continent.

Meetings on the first Wednesday in each month except August and September.

ATHENS :

The sudden and tragic death of their Rector, Rev. Mr. Cleland, last July, was a great loss and shock to the parish, and the church was closed until January 1, 1912, when God gave them again a faithful shepherd, and the W. A. branch resumed its work.

They met every Thursday during Lent. Had three new members besides the attendance of two members who have been absent during the last two winters, and they have lost none.

The new Rector and family have made a new interest. They sent a fine barrel of clothing to Oneida, Wisconsin, again.

CAIRO :

Is the youngest of our parish branches, started by the enthusiastic wife of the Rector, almost immediately upon their settling there, in spite of her delicate health. They are more successful with the United Offering Boxes, than with any other form of mission work.

CATSKILL :

During Lent met each week to sew, and after Easter sent a barrel to Hunter's Hall, containing a very nice lot of new clothing and dolls for the school children.

FRANKFORT :

There are twelve members in this little parish, an increase of five this year.

Their faithful and enthusiastic president has been sorely afflicted in the death of her son, Rev. Walter I. Cleland, and in her own failing health.

However they have paid their regular fees, and are looking forward to Missionary Study this coming year.

CHRIST CHURCH, HUDSON :

As usual abundant in good works. They sent a box valued at \$115 to the Diocesan Missionary to be distributed at his discretion. A Christmas box valued at \$70 to Rev. A. Livermore, Fletcher, N. C. A box valued at \$80 to Rev. Aaron Clark, for Indians at Rosebud Agency. Eight Dollars (\$8) worth of books to Red Dragon Inn, Cordova, and St. Matthews Reading Room, Fairbanks, Alaska.

While preparing these boxes they read letters and articles relating to the places to which they were to be sent.

For October and April meetings the President had prepared papers on recent happenings in Missionary fields, both foreign and domestic.

At the last meeting a festival is held, all the parish guilds are invited, all their reports read, and ice-cream and cake served.

KINDERHOOK :

The branch numbers 14 members, 8 new members have been added. Two have been lost, one by death, and one by removal.

Meetings have been held fortnightly from November 1st to April 1st. They sent one barrel of clothing to the Ravenscroft Associate Mission at Ashville, N. C., and one of clothing and groceries to the Indian School at Fay, Oklahoma.

LEBANON SPRINGS :

A small weak parish, they have much to do for their own little church. The Secretary writes me from a sick bed. Their remaining faithful six members meet once a month and hold a service of prayer, scripture and missionary reading. This year they sent three Dollars.

LITTLE FALLS :

Twenty members. Two new members this year. Meetings first Monday in each month. During Lent meet every week for work, readings from missionary letters and various sources of missionary information. One member has passed to the higher work during the past year, and two members have moved out of town.

PALENVILLE :

Meeting each week through Lent, preparing a box to be sent South, and have been reading "Conquest of the Continent."

Sent \$4.50 for United Offering, \$10 for W. A. Offering.

CHRIST CHURCH, SCHENECTADY :

Ten dollars (\$10) to W. A. A number of the ladies attended the meetings in Albany for Mission Study and the meeting at St. George's.

ST. GEORGE'S :

St. Mary's Guild is also our branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and has paid its pledge of \$50. To our own Deaconess Wild, \$40, to Diocesan Missionary \$10, with some smaller gifts, making the amount of \$105.50 altogether.

Our meetings are monthly, except during Lent, where at our weekly meetings two missionary boxes were prepared, valued at \$55.39 and \$70.

A Christmas box was sent to our Diocesan Missionary.

Many of the ladies attended the very interesting meetings held in Albany, February 6, 7, 8, 9, and also the Study Classes and Conferences led by Miss Emery and Miss Lindley, who also gave us most interesting talks on Friday evening, February 9, in our own parish house, at the closing meeting of the Diocesan Conferences.

Many of us had the privilege and pleasure of hearing Bishop Brent of the Philippines preach, and later make an address in Albany.

DELHI :

St. John's reports for the year 1911-12, 9 business meetings, with an average attendance of 36; 10 sewing meetings, with an average of 16 in attendance. The business meetings are held at the homes of the members, always opened with prayers by the Rector or President. After the business is finished, at each meeting there is a reading on missionary work, followed by discussions upon the mission work. At these meetings the social cup of tea is an accompaniment.

The work this year has been for Tryon Mission House, N. C. During Lent, as is the custom, the work is for the Orphan House, at Cooperstown.

On Wednesday evenings in Lent, the Rector gave readings from the "Conquest of the Continent," and on Saturday afternoons, talks upon the early missionaries.

The study for the coming year will be upon Japan.

Two Thank Offering meetings are held during the year, when the United Offering boxes are collected and opened. These meetings are always well attended. In June is held a Jubilee missionary meeting, all the other missionary societies in the town taking part. The meetings are interesting and helpful. It has been the custom for years to give a personal invitation to every woman in the parish to attend the monthly programme meetings. The branch is growing all the time. There are 55 members.

FRANKLIN :

St. Paul's reports for the year 22 members, 12 regular meetings, 5 sewing meetings and 2 other meetings. They have missionary meetings, in which the women are much interested, as well as in their working meetings. They have given to some appeals, outside of their pledges. The secretary, Mrs. Martin, attended the Diocesan Conference held in Albany, bringing

back many helpful suggestions, and awakening new enthusiasm. Boxes have been sent and money given. There has been no increase in membership; that will be looked after next year.

WALTON:

Christ Church branch was late in beginning its work, owing to the resignation of the President, whose position was not filled until October. A box has been sent to the Mountain Missions in North Carolina. The work of the branch is chiefly sewing, either for a missionary box, or, for individuals, members of the Auxiliary, or of the parish, who pay the branch for the work so increasing the fund in the Treasury. Occasionally, a supper or dinner is given for raising money. Regular business meetings are held once a month, when an effort is made to have some kind of a missionary programme. Number of members 46. Increase in membership for year, 15.

Grace Church branch reports for the year, meetings held once a month except in summer. At each meeting there are readings upon missionary topics. This year upon missions among the colored people. A box is placed on a table, and money dropped in as the members are disposed. \$11.75 was sent to the United Offering and other money to Japan. The work is steadily and carefully done, praying for better things.

Emmanuel Church Guild is to be regarded as a branch of the W. A. At their monthly meetings, they have prayers and missionary readings and manifest much interest in the mission work. Their President attended the Conference in Albany.

Will meet each month for reading and study. Will take up Alaska. Sent a barrel of second-hand clothing to Morgantown, N. C. for a rummage sale and are now knitting wristlets to send to Alaska.

CHAMPLAIN :

Since the resignation of Miss Finley, who was President for 20 years. Mrs. J. M. Hackett has taken up the work as President. They have 24 members. The work through Lent each week has been for the Indians, in Oklahoma, St. Luke's Mission, at Fay. A box sent to Whirlwind, Oklahoma, contained 124 articles, of which 74 were new. The children brought

books, picture cards, games, tablets and pencils, making a fine box valued at \$40. The united and individual offerings amounted to \$12.00.

Meetings will be continued each month using "Spirit of Missions" and "Conquest of the Continent," as reading matter.

Mrs. David Finley, the first Auxiliary member in Champlain, remained an interested and active member almost up to the time of her death a year ago.

ELIZABETHTOWN :

Have had 12 meetings to sew on garments for a Mission and Sanitorium. Have a membership of 14. There has been no increase in numbers during the year but have been fortunate in not losing any officers or members.

ESSEX AND WILLSBORO :

United on box but were not able, this year, to do mission work. The numbers are small and the money was needed for home work. Two families were cared for.

PLATTSBURG :

The Branch has 15 members and do their work during Lent, meeting with the Ladies' Aid Society to sew. The work sent away goes to St. Andrew's School, for boys, at Sewanee, Tennessee, of which the Rev. Mr. Hughson has charge. The value of the box sent this year, was \$171.24. Regular meetings are not held through the year. Six meetings were held during Lent to sew.

The Corresponding Secretary read a letter from Miss Emery advising that some boxes sent by parishes, should go to a Mission Centre, there to be distributed; and mentioned Tryon, N. C., as such a station.

Mrs. Griswold suggested a method of sending reports to the Corresponding Secretary: no Diocesan boxes can be reported in list to Miss Emery and no Institutional boxes sent within our own Diocese, can be reported by the Auxiliary Secretary; that must go to the St. Christopher's League President.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary Diocesan Secretary read and accepted.

Report of Correspondent of Church Periodical Club read and accepted.

Miss Stetson urged attendance at the Conference at Silver Bay, in July, 1912, reporting an attendance of 404 at the last Conference.

Mrs. Griswold read a general letter from Miss Emery to all Diocesan and Parochial Officers.

Mrs. Van Rensselaer read the resignation of Deaconess Pell-Clarke, as President of the Auxiliary.

The Annual Meeting to be held in May, at St. George's, Schenectady. Invitations have been received from St. Paul's, Albany, and Christ Church, Hudson.

The President suggested that the Semi-Annual Meetings be held hereafter, in the several Archdeaconries in rotation, with a very simple lunch, thus lessening the work of entertainment.

MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

A Missionary Conference for the whole Diocese, was held from the 6th to the 10th of February, under the auspices of the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. All day-time meetings were held in Albany, each day in a different parish, beginning with the Cathedral on Tuesday, followed by St. Peter's on Wednesday, St. Paul's on Thursday and St. Andrew's on Friday.

There was a Celebration of the Holy Communion each day at 9:30. At 10:15 a study class was conducted by Miss Lindley. At noon Prayers for Missions. 12:30 luncheon, and at 1:15 p. m., a conference conducted by Miss Emery. At 2:30, Miss Lindley led a study class for Junior Leaders. At 4:30 p. m. each day, a reception was given to all delegates by some lady in the parish where the meetings were held.

Each evening a missionary service was held. Tuesday evening, Feb. 6, at Christ Church, Hudson. Wednesday evening, Feb. 7, at Christ Church, Troy. Friday evening, Feb. 9, at St. George's Church, Schenectady. The speakers at these meetings were Miss Emery and Miss Lindley.

On Thursday evening, Feb. 8, a missionary service was held at Grace Church, Albany, with Rev. H. L. Burleson, Secretary of the Board of Missions, as speaker.

The subject of the Study Class each morning was "The Why and How of Foreign Missions." The Study Class on all days took up for discussion, "The Junior Book."

The Conferences, led each day by Miss Emery, were upon the following topics—Tuesday, Growth: The Enlargement of the Auxiliary. Wednesday, Giving: The Apportionment and the United Offering. Thursday, Gaining: The Young Women and the Older Girls. Friday: What Shall be the Outcome of this Endeavor?

At 11 a. m., on Thursday the 8th, there was held a Conference of Diocesan and Parochial Officers. The President, Mrs. Van Rensselaer, in the chair. Fifteen, out of nineteen Diocesan Officers were present. This meeting took the place of the regular monthly meeting of the Executive Board, and was open to all delegates.

The three Secretaries, the Treasurer and the Junior Auxiliary Secretary gave reports of their work. Each of the six managers present gave a summary of the work in her department. Miss Emery made many helpful suggestions in regard to the extension of the work. An "Extension Committee" had already been formed, consisting of Mrs. Rochester, Mrs. Griswold, Miss Stetson and Miss Knapp, (Treas.)

Announcement was made of the great loss to the Auxiliary, by the death of its 2nd Vice-President, Miss E. W. Brown, of Saratoga.

On Friday afternoon, Feb. 9th, Bishop Doane received all the delegates at Bishop's House. As nearly as could be ascertained, there were about four hundred present. Each day the attendance ran from 200 to 300, and as many parishes sent different delegates for the different days and meetings, the very lowest number coming into touch with the Conference, was 600.

The expenses were not heavy when we consider the number entertained, and the fares paid for a number from a distance. In no other way could those from remote places be present. Although in mid-winter delegates were present from Potsdam, Champlain and Essex ; from the remote Catskill region, Stamford, Palenville and Griffin Corners ; from the Susquehanna, Delhi, Walton and Franklin, and from many other places.

This partial account of the Conference is published, that the branches may realize that the whole Diocese can be touched by the work of individuals. Another article upon the Conference, will be published in the next Annual Report.
