## CONSTITUTION

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### ARTICLE I

This society shall be known as the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

### ARTICLE II

The object of this organization shall be, to unite all Church women of the diocese in work for Domestic and Foreign Missions, to increase missionary activity in the parish auxiliaries, and to encourage the formation of such branches where there are none. In furtherance of this there may be maintained:

- (a) A department in the periodical newspaper of the diocese to be devoted to the interests of the Woman's Auxiliary.
- (b) A branch of the church periodical club for the distribution to missionaries of religious and secular literature.
- (c) Such other work as from time to time may be deemed expedient for the further development of the society.

### ARTICLE III

Any woman who is a member of a parish branch becomes thereby a member of the Diocesan Branch.

The officers of each parish branch shall send to the treasurer all pledges and money given for other than parish or local purposes. They shall make to the Corresponding Secretary, at the close of their year, a report of the number and value of their missionary boxes.

### ARTICLE IV

The officers of this society shall be a president, five vice-presidents, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a treasurer, a treasurer for the United Offering and officers for the Junior Department. In addition there shall be one manager for each archdeaconry or division thereof. These officers, together with the chairmen of standing committees, shall constitute the executive board.

When a vacancy occurs on the executive board, the board shall select a candidate to fill the vacancy and submit her name to the Bishop for his approval, and appointment, if approved.

In case of a vacancy occurring in any archdeaconry or division, branches in such archdeaconry or division will meet individually or collectively for the purpose of recommending a manager, whose name will be submitted to the executive board and by them given to the archdeacon for his approval, and, if approved, sent by him to the Bishop for appointment.

1. The president or, in her absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall call and preside over all meetings.

2. The recording secretary shall send all notices, keep the minutes of all meetings and shall send a copy of the minutes of every executive meeting to each member of the executive committee not present at such meeting. She shall be responsible for the issuing and distributing of the annual report.

3. The corresponding secretary shall assist in preparing the annual report and conduct the correspondence of the society with parish branches, with



missionaries, with the managers and with the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

4. The treasurer shall have the custody of all money received by the Diocesan Branch, and shall collect by correspondence if necessary all sums payable to the same; shall keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, with date, purpose and amount, and shall make a full report of the same at each regular meeting. She shall pay money only as directed by the Diocesan Branch or Executive Committee, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, and which may be disposed of without formal directions. All money received for purposes outside of the diocese shall be forwarded through the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

5. The treasurer of the United Offering shall be responsible for the collection and presentation of that fund.

The Bishop shall appoint annually an auditor, who shall examine the accounts of the treasurer before they are presented at the annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE V

Managers shall endeavor to stimulate the formation of new parish branches, to infuse greater missionary spirit throughout their archdeaconries, and shall seek to increase intelligent interest in the missionary work of the Church.

At least one general meeting shall be held during the year in each archdeaconry.

Each manager shall make a statement of the work done in her archdeaconry to be published in the annual report.

#### ARTICLE VI

The annual meeting shall be held in October, in one of the central cities of the Diocese, the time and place of meeting to be decided by the executive committee.

A semi-annual meeting shall be held in May, the several archdeaconries, in rotation, being responsible for all arrangements in regard to the meetings, the executive committee acting as advisory board with them as to time and place.

Special meetings of the executive board may be called by the president at the request of five of the executive committee.

Notice of annual and semi-annual meetings shall be sent to each diocesan officer and to the secretary of each parish branch.

A quorum of the executive committee for the transaction of business, shall consist of not less than five members present at any meeting regularly called.

#### ARTICLE VII

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual or semi-annual meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been given with the call for such meeting.

## THE DIOCESAN CORPORATE COMMUNION

January sixth, the Feast of the Epiphany, has been selected by the President and the Executive Board as a most fitting time for the Diocesan Corporate Communion, and it is hoped that all the Branches in the Diocese may unite in this Special Service.

### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

As year follows year, I find that greater and ever greater is the pleasure I feel in coming before you for my annual welcome to our Auxiliary meetings. For, hard as my work is, it is nevertheless a wonderful privilege, to be so closely associated with such a splendid loyal band of women as that of which this organization is composed. To come into such close touch with such devoted, earnest, and faithful workers for Christ's Kingdom is, as I have said, a privilege indeed.

A year ago it would hardly have seemed possible that the terrible conflict raging abroad, should not only be continuing now with increasing violence, but that our own Country should be deeply involved and that we should be preparing to take our part in the world struggle.

The way in which the women of our country have risen to the emergency with which we are now confronted is remarkable. It is splendid to think of the way in which mothers have sped on their sons, bidding them go forth to the struggle. It is heart-rending to remember the aged parents or the lonely, suffering wives or sisters left to bear their anxieties alone when the young and strong and brave have gone to the front. It is a consolation of a truly high order, to throw ourselves with all our might into our Red Cross or our War Relief work and to *know* that we are doing infinite good. But, with all this, let us not for a moment forget the obligation we are under to our soldiers of Christ. What we have already undertaken to do for them we must not let flag. We must keep constantly before us the fact that our missionary work *must* go on. When we hear, as we all too frequently do, criticism of the high cost of living, let us remember the difficulty with which so many of our missionaries have had to eke out their salaries in the past, when all prices were easier and more normal; and let us increase *our* giving now at this time, to make *their* anxiety less. Let us not fall behind the countries of Europe where in spite of the war, missionary work has continued unabated. And here in our Diocese, dear friends, in this coming year, can we not do better than ever before; can we not come before our people as an example of generous and conscientious giving to the Church in this awful emergency?

"The missionary societies in the United States maintained a splendid record during the years of the Civil War. From 1861 to 1865 gifts from living donors recorded by six missionary societies jumped from \$816,000 in 1862 to \$1,575,000 in 1865. The record of those years shows a steady increase which reached a maximum in 1865, the year Lee surrendered.

"We need not be faint-hearted nor fear for our work even with our country engaged in this great conflict. But we should bear in mind that when the war is over the Church must be prepared for the greatest opportunity that has ever faced Christianity. Men are thinking seriously about the deep things of life. The veneer has been struck off and we have come down to the real human being. If we would profit by what history teaches us, we will see that God's work is not neglected, in a time when our most whole-hearted support is needed. We will not let our faith grow dim nor our courage flag."

## DIRECTIONS FOR PARISH SECRETARIES

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Always mention your parish and your town in *every* communication.

1. The Corresponding Secretary of the Diocesan Branch has on hand letters sent from the Church Missions House, stating needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools in the Mission field. Also letters, approved by our Bishop, which state the needs of the missionaries in our own Diocese. When your branch is ready to start work, write to the Corresponding Secretary for such letters.

2. When your branch has undertaken the work for which your selected letter calls, notify the Secretary at once, sending her the name and address in such letter, and your own address and parish.

3. It is of the utmost importance that immediately after such decision all rejected letters be returned to the Corresponding Secretary.

4. Write to the Missionary at once, stating when and from whom he may expect a box.

5. Write to the Missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, also to the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary, with statement concerning value of box.

6. Blanks will be sent for a report of the year's work. Read them carefully and fill them out fully. Return them to the Corresponding Secretary at once, correcting any errors which appear in the last report. At this time also write to the Manager of your division, giving any details of work and method in your branch.

All boxes of books, single books or magazines should be reported through the Church Periodical Club.

7. Always notify the Corresponding Secretary of any change of branch officers during the year. Keep in touch with the Manager of your division, and for any desired information write to the diocesan officers having such matter in charge.

## REPORT OF THE PARISH BRANCHES OF THE ARCHDEACONRY OF ALBANY

### First Division

#### ALBANY — CATHEDRAL OF ALL SAINTS:

Monthly meetings were held until Lent, when the members met every week. They had speakers at nearly every meeting. The attendance was usually thirty members—often more. Pledges were kept. Tea was served at the close of the meetings.

#### ALBANY — ST. ANDREW'S:

The interest in Missions in this Branch has grown during the past year, largely due to the help of the Rector, who held a well-attended Mission Study Class.

They had speakers to address some of their meetings. All pledges were paid.

#### ALBANY — ST. PETER'S:

Held monthly meetings except during Lent, when they met weekly for sewing, at the homes of the members.

Mr. Betticher gave a talk on Alaska, illustrated with lantern slides, and the Rev. F. Lobdell told of his work in the Southern Mountains at a parlor meeting.

#### ALBANY — ST. PAUL'S:

Monthly meetings were held from October to April, at each of which an address was given by a special speaker. Miss L. B. Towner told of her experience in teaching in the Grenfell Mission in Labrador. The Rev. S. H. Nichols spoke of his work in Japan; Rev. G. F. Mosher, of what was being accomplished in China, and the Rev. A. G. Watson gave some of his impressions of India. Miss Pauline Wilson presented a paper on the Southern Mountaineers, and also on the history of the Oneida Indians.

All pledges were paid and several additional appeals answered. At most of the meetings tea was served, which aided in spreading a feeling of friendliness among the members.

#### ALBANY — HOLY INNOCENTS:

Though many of their members live long distances from the church, they are very loyal and keep up their interest in missionary work, always contributing \$25 to the United Offering, as well as keeping all their other pledges.

#### AMSTERDAM — ST. ANN'S:

This always active Branch has a regular program prepared for the



year. At their meetings original papers are given by various members on Missions in different foreign countries.

They have kept their eleven pledges, and have planned to continue their work the coming year.

COHOES — ST. JOHN'S:

All pledges have been paid and the Branch has done the usual amount of good work.

FONDA — ZION:

No report has been received from this Branch.

GLOVERSVILLE — CHRIST CHURCH:

The members of this Branch have had eighteen well-attended meetings during the past year. Dues were paid regularly, and all are trying to do their "bit."

GLOVERSVILLE — ST. PAUL'S:

Reports twenty meetings held — average attendance eighteen. They have lost three members by death.

JOHNSTOWN — ST. JOHN'S:

No report has been received from this Branch by the Manager.

RENSSELAERVILLE — TRINITY:

Owing to the illness of their president, and through loss of members, this Branch has not accomplished the usual amount of work the past year.

WATERVLIET — TRINITY:

This Branch has lost two of its oldest members during the present year. Aside from work on boxes, they have no report to make.

## BOYNTONVILLE—HOLY NAME:

Monthly meetings are held at the homes of members, when papers have been read by our Educational Secretary on missionary work.

## HOOSICK FALLS—ST. MARK'S:

Meetings have been held each month with the exception of July and August. Our study has been the missionary work among the Indians of the West. We held a sale of fancy articles and supper early in the year and realized a good sum of money. We packed a box of second-hand clothing and much new material to work with, value \$50, which we sent to South Dakota for the Indians. Our average attendance is 10 or 12, and we take up a collection at each meeting and serve light refreshments. The meetings are held at the homes of the different members.

## HUDSON FALLS—ZION:

Monthly meetings are held from October to June, and weekly during Advent and Lent, with readings from the *Spirit of Missions*. In Advent \$10 was sent to St. Mary's-in-the-Mountains; in Lent a box went to St. Andrew's in Porto Rico. Later, the Rev. Arthur Whittle visited us and told of his work in Porto Rico, and the Auxiliary gave \$5 for St. Andrew's. Twenty dollars was sent for the United Offering.

## RAYMERTOWN—ST. PAUL'S:

We are a small Branch in one of Dr. Tibbits' missions and we really do try to do good work for so few workers. During the past year our Branch has met the first Thursday of every month. During Lent the members sewed, and sent to Corbin, Ky., a box valued at \$20. We have also given to our Church a new silver chalice, which was used at Easter for the first time. Our money is gotten together from the dues and a few socials, luncheons, and so on.

## TROY—CHURCH OF THE ASCENSION:

Twenty-six regular meetings and two business meetings were held in the Parish House, with an average attendance of sixteen. At the regular Thursday meetings the members served lunch each week, two serving at a time, alphabetically. Our Rector was present at almost every meeting. We closed up our year with a balance of \$59.42.

## TROY—ST. JOHN'S:

Business meetings and sewing meetings were held. Six papers on China were read by members of the Auxiliary at the weekly meetings during Lent. The Pilgrimage of Prayer was observed during the week beginning December 31, closing with a special service, the Corporate Communion, January 6, the Epiphany. We entertained for the Diocesan Annual Meeting.



## TROY — ST. PAUL'S:

Monthly meetings were held from November to St. Mark's day. Interesting articles on Missions were read by the members, in alphabetical order. Three boxes were sent to the mission field. A very successful tea and sale was held in June at the home of one of our members.

## TROY — CHURCH OF THE HOLY CROSS:

Prayer for Missions, Study about Missions, and Work for Missions are carried out by this Branch of Faithful workers. Section B has now been formed. The reports to be found under the box reports and the treasurer's report show something of what has been done.

## WHITEHALL — TRINITY:

The membership of this Branch still numbers 15. Regular business and devotional meetings, with an average attendance of eight, have been held the first Wednesday of each month. Three teas were given, with a silver collection taken at each. During Lent a Study Class, under the leadership of the Rector, was formed, the subject being "The New World." At a meeting in October the Rev. Mr. Gale of Plattsburg, and in March the Rev. Mr. Ryerson of Ticonderoga, each gave a very interesting talk on some phase of the mission work. There was a corporate celebration for the members of the Auxiliary on the morning of the presentation of the United Offering at the General Convention in St. Louis. One copy each of the *Spirit of Missions* and the *Church Record* is taken by the Auxiliary.

## MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING

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The thirty-fourth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held at St. John's Parish, Troy, November 9-10, 1916.

Nov. 9, 8.00 p. m. Service in St. John's Church. Address by Bishop Restarick of Honolulu.

Nov. 10, 9.30 a. m. Celebration of the Holy Eucharist. United Offering, \$82.78.

10.15 a. m. The President, Mrs. Van Rensselaer, called the meeting to order and gave her annual address, which was full of helpful suggestion and inspiration to progress.

The minutes of the semi-annual meeting were accepted as read.

The Treasurer made her annual report, showing a tremendous amount of detailed work and evidencing the maximum amount of loving and consecrated devotion to the interests of the Women's Auxiliary. A rising vote of acceptance of this report was given.

Reports were read and accepted from the Corresponding Secretary, the Church Periodical Club, the Church Record, and the Extension and Educational Secretary.

The Junior reports were then received with deep interest.

The roll-call was read, giving 231 delegates from 45 Parishes. There were 3 Bishops and 14 Clergy present, and one visitor from Buffalo.

11.30 a. m. The Rev. S. H. Nichols of Tokyo gave a most unusual talk, touching on the history of our Church in Japan and the hope of the ultimate establishment of the Japanese Church.

Bishop Brooke of Oklahoma made an address setting forth the needs in his work and appealing especially for aid for King Hall.

12.00 m. Noonday prayer was said.

12.15 p. m. Bishop Nelson then made an address, encouraging the Albany Diocesan Branch to further good works, and touching upon the triennial at St. Louis, from which he had just lately returned.

The election of Junior officers was held.

1.00 p. m. Luncheon.

2.15 p. m. The business meeting was resumed.

Announcement was made of the election of Junior officers.

Miss Swits then gave a delightfully interesting and vivid account of some of the salient points which had appealed to her at the triennial.

Mrs. Rochester, on behalf of the meeting, pledged \$200 for Bishop Brooke's work in Oklahoma, and asked that Mrs. Brooke be requested to explain about King Hall. Mrs. Brooke made a convincing explanation.

Mrs. Paige of Schenectady then spoke of the desire of our President



to resign, and of this catastrophe having just been happily averted. The President was spontaneously given a rising vote of appreciation.

A rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Rochester for her untiring work and devotion as Treasurer was immediately suggested by the President, and this was followed by another rising vote of thanks to the Rector and members of St. John's Branch for their charming hospitality.

Then followed an open discussion on the ways by which an auxiliary branch may grow. Being an experiment, this was not participated in as fully as was hoped for, but with practice it is expected that our delegates will learn to use this opportunity for the discussion of problems and may learn how to meet them.

The meeting was then declared adjourned.

## MINUTES OF THE SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING, 1917

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The Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions held the semi-annual meeting in Christ Church Parish, Cooperstown, May 23-24, 1917.

May 23, 8.00 p. m. Service in Christ Church. Greeting of welcome by the Rector, Rev. Ralph Birdsall. Address by Rev. Chas. E. Betticher. After the service Mr. Betticher, in the Parish House, gave a most interesting illustrated lecture on the Spirit of Missions.

May 24, 9.30 a. m. Celebration of the Holy Eucharist in Christ Church. Offering for United Offering, \$20.50.

10.15 a. m. Business meeting held in the Chapel.

The President, Mrs. Van Rensselaer, opened the meeting, and her address directed the trend of thought for the entire meeting by pointing out the special need for united zeal in our work for missions.

The minutes of the 1916 annual meeting were approved as read.

The Treasurer's report showed all pledges paid. The Treasurer's report was enthusiastically accepted by a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Rochester. Mrs. Rochester was here asked to speak about the Missionary Bed for which she is raising a thousand dollars, the sum in hand at this time being \$543.

Reports were read as follows, and accepted: The Corresponding Secretary, Church Periodical Club, Church Record, and Extension Committee.

The chairman of the committee on the conference to be held in November then gave the program in outline, stating the purpose and urging that each Parish send a delegate for the woman's work and also one for the Junior leaders.

Rev. Mr. Birdsall asked for a change in the program, making the hour for luncheon 1.30, so that all business for the day might be finished at the morning session.

The Junior reports were read and accepted from the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Educational Secretary and the United Offering Treasurer.

The proposed amendment to the Constitution regarding appointment of officers was read, put to vote, and passed.

The roll-call showed 89 members present. There were 4 Clergy.

12.00 m. Noon-day prayers for missions.

The President then presented Miss Littell, the speaker of the day, who made a stirring appeal for the Church General Hospital at Wuchang, China, making everyone feel the great need for this work.

Mrs. Rochester immediately pledged \$250 on behalf of the Diocese, and this passed up to \$1,200 within five minutes, the different Parishes taking out pledges.



The President had Miss Hobart's letter read regarding her new position on the *Churchman*, asking for the co-operation of the women of the Church so that articles of interest may reach her.

Also a letter was read from Miss Delafield recommending a national organization of the Woman's Auxiliary, which it is hoped may help on the unification of Church interests.

Mrs. Rochester spoke of the United Offering and suggested that for the annual meeting each Parish should provide a check covering the amount of its United Offering and place it on the alms basin at the service, following in this way the plan adopted at the triennial.

1.30 p. m. Luncheon, so-called, was served in the Parish House. This proved to be a regular course dinner which had been prepared entirely by the girls from St. Christina's School. These same girls had gone out early in the morning and brought beautiful wild flowers—trillium, cowslips and violets—and had a great basket of them as a centerpiece on the officers' table, while on each of the other tables was a most artistic bunch of flowers,—tulips and others. After the luncheon the chairs were turned a little and Miss Grace Lindley spoke. She made a recruiting speech for soldiers of Christ to be ready to enlist by training in one of the summer conferences. She made clear the path of the Christian,—the patriotic Christian who should understand how to walk so that the duty to God and the duty to our country must not diverge, but must be one and the same,—the purpose and ideal of America entering the war being solely to lift the world up into the light of Christ, making not only universal brotherhood for the nations, but unified Christianity for the world.

Votes of enthusiastic and appreciative thanks were given to the St. Christina girls and to the Rector and Parish of Christ Church for their wonderful and bountiful hospitality and courtesy.

The meeting was then adjourned.

## THE THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING

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The thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held at St. George's Church, Schenectady, October 17-18, 1917.

Bishop Nelson and 12 clergy were present, and there were 230 delegates, representing 44 parishes.

Oct. 17, 8.00 p. m. Service in St. George's Church, with address by Rev. H. Percy Silver, chaplain at West Point.

Oct. 18, 9.30 a. m. Celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

Amount of the United Offering, \$263.54.

10.15 a. m. As the Rev. Mr. Silver had to leave by an early train, the regular order of the program was changed so that he could go. The meeting therefore began with Mr. Silver's address, in which he urged the necessity of seeking out those who are in darkness and lifting them up into the light. He said that we should never let a missionary feel lonely, and that the duty of the women at home is to teach others about missionary work; that prayer must be the light we throw behind Christian leaders. He asked, "What do YOU do? What effect on *your* parish does *your* prayer have?"

At the close of Mr. Silver's address the President asked Dr. Tayler to open the regular business meeting with prayer, after which Mrs. Van Rensselaer gave a splendid annual address, which is printed on another page. This was received enthusiastically.

The minutes of the semi-annual meeting were accepted as read.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Rochester, was in Rochester at the 200th anniversary of her old church, and her report was read by the Secretary and approved.

The report of the Corresponding Secretary was received with acclamation, and accepted by a rising vote. All the reports were interesting and were approved as read—those of the Church Periodical Club, the Educational Secretary and the Albany Church Record.

12 m. Noon-day prayers were read.

The Junior reports were heard with much appreciation.

Bishop Nelson addressed the meeting. He paid a tribute to the meeting, and congratulated the members upon their President, speaking in a delightful way of her leadership. The Bishop then made a plea for patriotic duty and presented the importance and the obligation of the Liberty Loan. He also spoke of the faithfulness of the missionary clergy in our own Diocese, and of the need to help them.

The President explained about the fund for the Missionary Bed, the McKim Memorial, which Mrs. Rochester is raising, and it was suggested that an attempt be made by the meeting to complete the fund. A little



over one hundred dollars was pledged, and a telegram to this effect was sent to Mrs. Rochester, to show the loyalty of the meeting, although this did not meet the full amount needed.

Mrs. Hobart W. Thompson of Troy spoke of the necessity of all organizations co-operating in patriotic work, and she obtained immediately, in small sums, fifty dollars with which to purchase a Liberty Bond for the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

A delicious luncheon was served, after which the business meeting was resumed. Archdeacon Brooks of Albany asked permission to speak on the apportionment.

The President set forth clearly and appealingly the great need for the missionary work of the Diocese.

The subject of the November Conference was presented. A discussion followed with regard to the Annual Report, as to the length and the general matter. It was voted to leave this to the Executive Committee.

An open conference on Right and Wrong Giving was conducted by Miss Ruth Hall.

The meeting adjourned after a rising vote of thanks to the Rector and members of St. George's Parish for their courtesy and hospitality.

This statement covers the time of my holding the position of Correspondent. The Central Office accredits the Diocese of Albany with the amount of \$17.07 received for the year ending April 1, 1917.

Two new Branches have been established since the last annual meeting and one Branch revived. The plan to reorganize the Church Periodical Club which was agitated in the early spring has been indefinitely adjourned to a more auspicious time. There is great need of larger contributions of magazines, also need of money. There is a tendency to rest satisfied with very small offerings and a failure to realize that the growth of the work demands increased expenditures, and that enlarged opportunities for service call for new as well as second-hand material. Promptness and system should characterize all correspondence of the Church Periodical Club. The establishment of a personal relationship is often of more importance than the reading matter sent. Bishop Beecher of Western Nebraska has said: "The Church Periodical Club is the most beautiful spiritual work being done by any organization in the Church to-day,—a medium for the touch of spirit upon spirit,—the wonderful communication of Personality."

At the annual meeting of the Church Periodical Club a committee was formed to organize special work for Chaplains in the Army and Navy. This is not a new work, merely an extension of what has been done for some Chaplains for many years. A number of boxes containing reading matter, games, victrola records, writing pads and pencils were dispatched to various camps. These gifts were necessarily limited, as each company was restricted to a certain amount of paraphernalia. It is to be expected that many organizations will arise in these times for supplying reading matter to the soldiers. The call comes from hospital ship and army post,



from training camp and trench and Y. M. C. A. tent, from base hospital and prison camp. The demand for "something to read" is unending and ever increasing. But it is inconceivable that Church people should give all their assistance to any new or secular organization, when they have the accredited Church officers of the Army and Navy to make closer the relation between the Chaplain and the men.

Friends of the Church Periodical Club, Librarians! Let us not weary in well-doing; let us increase our zeal, increase our prayers, increase our gifts. May we be ever faithful to the organizations of the Church, faithful to ourselves, and faithful to those who are looking to us for comfort and cheer in their hours of loneliness.

When an Auxiliary Branch, in filling a Missionary box, finds some very important and urgent need, too expensive for the Parish treasury, particularly clerical suits and overcoats, it may apply for assistance to the Treasurer of the Comfort Club, which aims to be an aid to the Parish Branch and a comfort to its beneficiaries.

The sum asked from members of the Club is 25 cents a year.

# REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE EXTENSION COMMITTEE AND EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY,

Made in St. George's Parish, Schenectady, October 18, 1917

In making my annual statement it may interest you to learn of the reception given these records at the Church Missions House. Last year Dr. Gray wrote me that he wished Albany's report could be sent—for its inspiration—into every Parish in the country, and asked permission to publish portions of it. This spring Dr. Sturges assured me that Albany was doing especially well in that our study work was general, extending the length and breadth of its boundaries, whereas in many other Dioceses it is concentrated in a few strong Parishes of the large towns.

Since the first of September I have written 102 letters altogether, questioning 107 Parishes regarding Mission Study. I have received 48 replies. Of these many begin, "I regret to say"—oh, that disappointing formula! Where a Parish is not too discouraged to write at all, this is oftenest what it has to tell, again and again and again, the statement voiced by one Rector: "The war has put such a check to Church activities that we have all we can do to hold the Auxiliary together."

It is but fair to add that in a few instances I have heard nothing from such staunch and long-established classes that I cannot believe they have dropped irrevocably from sight. And yet, as long as they refuse to answer my queries, they must perforce be reported "Missing." In several other Churches I am told that plans are not yet formulated and must be announced later on. So far as known, Mission Study will be undertaken, God willing, in the following named Parishes this winter: Trinity, Ashland; Trinity, Athens; the Holy Name, Boyntonville (brave little Boyntonville, where one woman has shown what one woman can do); St. Luke's, Catskill; Christ Church, Coxsackie; St. John's, Delhi; Christ Church, Gilbertsville; Trinity, Gouverneur; All Saints', Hudson; St. Peter's, Hobart; St. Mark's, Hoosick Falls; St. Augustine's, Ilion; Zion, Morris; St. John's, Ogdensburg; Trinity, Plattsburg; Trinity, Potsdam; the Epiphany, Rensselaer; St. Paul's, Raymertown; Bethesda, Saratoga Springs; St. George's, Schenectady (two); the Ascension, Troy; the Holy Cross, Troy; Christ Church, Walton—24, as against 64 a year ago! Next to the meagre numbers, the most striking feature of this list is of course the amazing discrepancy between the interest shown in the large and the small Churches, the balance dipping heavily in favor of the country towns.

But after this showing you will not wonder that I beseech every Parish represented before me to send a delegate to the Institute in



Albany next month, that she may come back to it fired with zeal and rich in wisdom to urge on the Study Class already established, or to form one successfully.

No other department of Church work is as sensitive to counter influences as that of study and reflection. It is much easier to find workers for the body than for the soul. Any Rector will tell us that he can persuade 50 women to sew for a missionary box to one who will teach in the Sunday School. And yet is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment?

I call upon you—busy, helpful women—to remember the tender words of warning spoken by our dear Lord to his beloved friend, Martha; she was not commended for her zeal, but rebuked because it was a *one-sided* zeal. I plead the cause of Mary.

The Extension Committee is always ready to visit any parish if the traveling expenses are met by such parish.

There are two new Auxiliary Branches to report to-day, with a possible third, where a valuable box sent may prove, I hope, the leaven to raise a Guild into an Auxiliary. Another Branch has reported through its happy President that it was forwarding its first box — which eventually evolved into two boxes with a joint value of \$125.

Happy local officers have, however, been an exception during this year. Throughout the Diocese, from every direction, have come the wailing notes of a dirge especially composed by war conditions and dedicated to the Corresponding Secretary. Parochial secretaries have written, "Our president heads the Red Cross work here and has lost all interest in Church matters," while presidents, so many times that the words seemed stereotyped, retaliated. "Our members are more and more submerged in Red Cross activities. I dare promise little for missions." I could only meet this defection with beseeching words of my own and our most gripping letters of appeal. Reports of boxes sent have been coming in week by week until my memoranda have taken on a rather hopeful inflation; and still so persistent has been the despair of Branches, weak and strong alike, that I could only believe that our usual helpfulness must be cut in half. But the White Comrade has not been a vision of the battlefield alone. Almost as miraculous as the increase of the five barley loaves and the few small fishes is the fact that our bounty in this direction has not fallen off one-half. It has not fallen off at all. But rather the value of our boxes has outstripped those of last year by \$465.77. We have recorded 93 boxes, valued at \$4,622.33, forwarded to domestic missions and missionaries, and 10 to diocesan missions, valued at \$855.24, a total of \$5,477.57. As an appendix to this, I must add that generous boxes have also been prepared for the Susan Cooper Foundation.

A minor symptom of the Diocese's health has been the willingness of Branches to prove real Auxiliaries to the Board of Missions. Last year Miss Emery was obliged to strike a long list of boxes from our Diocesan report as not authorized by the Missions House. In this year's — sent last month — there were only two such. But I am asked to call your attention to the fact that, while the five independent boxes sent to Paradise Home will count to our credit this year, any such benefaction will no longer do so, as that mission has been withdrawn from the Mission House's lists.

Again, and still more earnestly, I must beg you not to respond to the insidious pictorial folder that comes to you from any source but Miss Emery or your Corresponding Secretary. It is not difficult to gain from either the information that will keep you from playing a part in the tragedy that makes possible but one box for some needy mission and one hundred for another no more worthy.

A second minor symptom of our well-being is the continued helpfulness of Branches in the burdensome work of the Corresponding Secretary. By this gracious means the letters passing between local secretaries and myself have dropped from the 700 letters of last year to some 500.

The future of our annual report is almost as necessary to accent as its



past. This season's work is already hopefully begun, but we cannot ignore the fact that conditions are even graver than last year. In the greater part of that—the working year begins in September—we were only upon the brink of war, while now we start as having made the fateful plunge. Those who are dear to us are enveloped in the mystery of “somewhere in France.” Our every sense is keyed to the pitch of vague waiting—waiting for something, we know not what nor whence. Whether the blow will fall in the heavens above, or the earth beneath, or the waters under the earth, no one of us can say. And while we wait—and wait—and wait, it is not strange that hands should work with insane fury to mitigate the pain that must come one day in concrete form. That is human—and it is more. But because it is mingled with the divine it should not drug us into forgetfulness of still higher duties. From mission stations are coming such cries for help as this: “When we take girls into the school, relying on donations which have been given in the past, and find them suddenly cut down half, or withdrawn, because of war conditions, we find ourselves in an alarming situation.” This is not the moment, nor the place, in which to join the familiar chorus of futility: “I wish there was something I could do.” We *must* do something. The dutiful fishers of men cannot be left in alarming situations to pay for our patriotism.

From this year's report we gather the seed for next year's. What shall that register, of still richer treasure wrung from self-denial? Fear of famine has driven us to extremities of economy in one direction. Is it not possible to strip all expenditure so bare that the unnecessary spool of cotton haunts us like the wasted slice of bread?

One thing is certain. If we are to walk through the new year of helpfulness, each of us in step with the radiant Apparition, we shall indeed be loyal to this Republic that we love—too loyal to suffer her needs to become enemies of the Kingdom of God.

## CONSTITUTION

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### ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be "The Junior Department of the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

### ARTICLE II

The object of this organization shall be to train young people, that they may realize their responsibility as members by Baptism of the Missionary Society—the Church—that by prayer, study and gifts they may take part in all its work, and at the proper age, become active members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE III

The President of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be the President *ex-officio* of the Junior Department, and shall preside at all meetings at which she is present.

### ARTICLE IV

The officers of the Junior Department shall be a President, four Vice-Presidents, (one representing each Archdeaconry) a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Treasurer for the United Offering and an Educational Secretary.

### ARTICLE V

SECTION 1. The *President* of the Junior Department shall call all meetings of her Department; shall exercise a general supervision over the work, and further it in every way by her interest and advice. She shall see that a report of the work is made at every meeting of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SEC. 2. Each *Vice-President* shall be responsible for the development of the work of the Junior Department in the Archdeaconry which she represents.

SEC. 3. The *Secretary* of the Junior Department shall conduct the necessary correspondence; send notices and keep minutes of all meetings; have a general supervision of the box work, and make reports at the Annual and Semi-annual meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Annual meeting of the Junior Department.

SEC. 4. The *Treasurer* shall receive and disburse all moneys (except the United Offering) and make reports at the Annual and Semi-annual meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Annual meeting of the Junior Department.



SEC. 5. The *Treasurer of the United Offering* shall by correspondence and the distribution of leaflets and boxes, maintain throughout the Diocese an interest in the United Offering and its object. She shall make a Semi-annual collection of the money intended for the same.

SEC. 6. The *Educational Secretary* shall arrange courses of study and impart needful information concerning mission classes. She shall keep the Department supplied with such printed matter as is necessary for the progress of the work, and by visiting branches, and by correspondence, advance the educational interests of the Department, reporting in full at the Annual and Semi-annual meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, and at the Annual meeting of the Junior Department.

#### ARTICLE VI

SECTION 1. The election of officers for the Junior Department shall be held at the time of the Annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and officers so elected shall serve for a term of two years.

SEC. 2. A nominating committee of three members shall be appointed by the President of the Woman's Auxiliary and the President of the Junior Department.

Nominations made by this committee shall be submitted to and approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Bishop of the Diocese. The nominations shall be sent by the Secretary of the Junior Department, before the election, to each Parish Branch in the Diocese, in order that delegates may be instructed as to choice of nominees.

Voting shall be by ballot and any Parish Branch not represented by a delegate may send a written vote.

#### ARTICLE VII

The Junior Department shall hold an Annual meeting; at this meeting each Branch shall send a report.

#### ARTICLE VIII

With the approval of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary this constitution may be altered and amended by a two-thirds vote of the Junior leaders of the Diocese, at any Annual or Semi-annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, provided that notice of such proposed change be sent to all Parishes with the call for the meeting.

## REPORT OF JUNIOR EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY FOR THE YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 18, 1917

This year twenty-eight Branches of the Junior Auxiliary report some study—two more than last year. The books used were "Manana," "How the Cross Goes Around the World," the *Spirit of Missions*, the *Young Churchman*, "The Light That Lighteth the World," and the "Missionary Catechism." Eight Branches gave missionary plays.

One Sunday School has been organized as a "missionary unit," another had missionary stories and worked for the joint diocesan Christmas boxes during Lent, and two others report regular missionary instruction.

I have written 207 letters, visited 5 Parishes, sent out 384 catechisms and 70 text-books, besides miteboxes, prayer cards, leaflets, etc.

In connection with the regular monthly meetings of Junior leaders, study classes and informal discussions on topics given out at a previous meeting have been held. These have proved so helpful to us all that we have decided



to have a regular study class each month, using as text-book Fosdicke's "The Meaning of Prayer."

The course of study prepared this year by the Missions House for both the Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Department is taken from the greatest missionary book in the world—the Bible. The book for younger Juniors is "The Call of the King," that for older girls is "Simon Peter—Preacher." A normal class on this last for leaders will be held during the Diocesan Institute, November 6th and 7th.

The experiment known as the New Junior Plan—briefly, the reorganization of the Junior Department on Sunday School lines—is being worked out in various ways in the different Dioceses.

With the approval and recommendation of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, the Junior Board is urging that all Parishes having no Junior Branch should, if possible, organize the Sunday School as such. As a minimum, that during Lent missionary instruction be given and the School meet one afternoon each week, together or in classes, to work for missions through the Junior organization.

This will be a trying year for the Junior Auxiliary, so many calls come to us all for other splendid work needing to be done, but let us never forget that our Lord's own work *must* come first. As faithful soldiers and servants we have our marching orders—the "Great Commission."

If we really want to, we can make this the very best year the Auxiliary has ever had, and help make our own noonday prayer come true and "His Kingdom Come" in all the world.
