CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

This society shall be known as the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Church.

ARTICLE II

The object of this organization shall be to unite all Church women of the diocese in work for Domestic and Foreign Missions, to increase missionary activity in the parish auxiliaries, and to encourage the formation of such branches where there are none. In furtherance of this there may be maintained:

- (a) A department in the periodical newspaper of the diocese to be devoted to the interests of the Woman's Auxiliary.
- (b) A branch of the Church Periodical Club for the distribution to missionaries of religious and secular literature.
- (c) Such other work as from time to time may be deemed expedient for the further development of the society.

ARTICLE III

Any woman who is a member of a parish branch becomes thereby a member of the Diocesan Branch.

The officers of each parish branch shall send to the treasurer all pledges and money given for other than parish or local purposes. They shall make to the corresponding secretary, at the close of their year, a report of the number and value of their missionary boxes.

ARTICLE IV

The officers of this society shall be a president, five vice-presidents, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a treasurer, a treasurer for the United Thank Offering. In addition, there shall be one manager for each archdeaconry or division thereof. These officers, together with the chairmen of Standing Committees, shall constitute the Executive Board. (

When a vacancy occurs on the Executive Board, the Board shall select a candidate to fill the vacancy, and submit her name to the Bishop for his approval, and appointment, if approved.

In case of a vacancy occurring in any archdeaconry or division, branches in such archdeaconry or division will meet individually or collectively for the purpose of recommending a manager, whose name will be submitted to the Executive Board and by them given to the archdeacon for his approval, and, if approved, sent by him to the Bishop for appointment.

1. The president or, in her absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall call and preside over all meetings.

2. The recording secretary shall send all notices, keep the minutes of all meetings, and shall send a copy of the minutes of every executive meeting to each member of the Executive Committee not present at such meeting. She shall be responsible for the issuing and distributing of the annual report.

3. The corresponding secretary shall assist in preparing the annual report and conduct the correspondence of the society with parish branches, with missionaries, with managers and with the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

4. The treasurer shall have the custody of all money received by the Diocesan Branch, and shall collect by correspondence, if necessary, all sums payable to the same; shall keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, with date, purpose and amount, and shall make a full report of the same at each regular meeting. She shall pay money only as directed by the Diocesan Branch or Executive Committee, except such sums as may be received for a definite purpose, and which may be disposed of without formal directions. All money received for purposes outside of the diocese shall be forwarded through the general secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

5. The treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall be responsible for the collection and presentation of that fund.

The Bishop shall appoint annually an auditor, who shall examine the accounts of the treasurer before they are presented at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE V

Managers shall endeavor to stimulate the formation of new parish branches, to infuse greater missionary spirit throughout the archdeaconries, and shall seek to increase intelligent interest in the missionary work of the Church.

At least one general meeting shall be held during the year in each archdeaconry.

Each manager shall make a statement of the work done in her archdeaconry, to be published in the annual report.

ARTICLE VI

The annual meeting shall be held in May, in one of the central cities of the diocese, the time and place of meeting to be decided by the Executive Committee.

A semi-annual meeting shall be held in October, the several archdeaconries, in rotation, being responsible for all arrangements in regard to the meetings, the Executive Committee acting as advisory board with them as to time and place.

Special meetings of the Executive Board may be called by the president at the request of five of the Executive Committee.

Notice of annual and semi-annual meetings shall be sent to each diocesan officer and to the secretary of each parish branch.

A quorum of the Executive Committee for the transaction of business shall consist of not less than five members present at any meeting regularly called.

ARTICLE VII

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual or semi-annual meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been given with the call for such meeting.

THE DIOCESAN CORPORATE COMMUNION

January sixth, the Feast of the Epiphany, has been selected by the President and Executive Board as a most fitting time for the Diocesan Corporate Communion, and it is hoped that all the branches in the diocese may unite in this special service.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In opening our thirty-seventh annual meeting, I express the deep sense of gratitude I feel that, with few exceptions, our officers continue as heretofore, and that a most strenuous year of work has been brought to a successful termination.

It is with great regret that we have been obliged to accept the resignations of Mrs. John K. Paige and of Miss Young. As first vice-president, Mrs. Paige has been associated with us for many years, and we will miss her wise counsel sadly. Mrs. William E. Thorn has taken Mrs. Paige's place as first vice-president, and Mrs. John S. Conover is the new member, thus completing our requisite number of five. Miss Young we also miss as correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, but ill health has made it imperative for her to give up the position. I am glad to tell you that Miss MacNeil of Plattsburg has assumed the office, and I am sure will bring great life and vigor to her department.

I am much impressed by the sense of the deep religious life which sanctifies and ennobles our Auxiliary. Our Days of Devotion have been most helpful to all who have had the comfort of sharing in them, and our frequent Communions and prayers have made our work blessed.

I am sorry that I could not continue in charge of the Emery Fund for the Second Province, but I found I was too busy to give proper attention to the work. In the capable hands of Mrs. F. Herbert Grey, as provincial representative, and Mrs. John S. Conover, as diocesan treasurer, I am sure the undertaking will be brought to a triumphant climax.

I hope that on the 16th of next October we may see such an outpouring of the members of the Auxiliary as will give a worthy and fitting testimony to the wonderful accomplishment of the three splendid women in whose life work the Fund is being raised.

During the year we have had many most encouraging experiences and some discouragements, which latter, however, I am glad to say, though hard to go through with, have nevertheless finally turned to blessings. You have heard, in the report of the secretary, Miss Hall, of how distressing it was, after all the interest aroused in the diocese in the work for Valle Crucis, to find that very little help was needed there. This seemed disheartening, but, after all, was it not fine to

think that we had the chance of helping some other places sorely in need of what we might give?

The new work, as planned at the last General Convention, has been taken up with a vigor and enthusiasm that is gratifying in the extreme.

For my own part, may I say how anxious and glad I am to go to visit any branches that care to have me. Please bear in mind how ready I am to do all I can in this way. During the past winter I have been to a great number of our Auxiliaries, but there are still many branches that I am most anxious to visit, and I venture to hope that an early opportunity will be afforded me to do so.

DIRECTIONS FOR PARISH SECRETARIES

Always mention your parish and your town in **every** communication.

1. The corresponding secretary of the Diocesan Branch has on hand letters sent from the Church Missions House, stating needs of missionaries, hospitals and schools in the mission field. Also letters, approved by our Bishop, which state the needs of the missionaries in our own diocese. When your branch is ready to start work, write to the corresponding secretary for such letters.
2. When your branch has undertaken the work for which your selected letter calls, notify the secretary at once, sending her the name and address in such letter, and your own address and parish.
3. It is of the utmost importance that, immediately after such decision, all rejected letters be returned to the corresponding secretary.
4. Write to the missionary at once, stating when and from whom he may expect a box.
5. Write to the missionary as soon as the box has been dispatched, also the diocesan corresponding secretary, with statement concerning value of box.
6. Blanks will be sent for a report of the year's work. Read them carefully and fill them out fully. Return them to the corresponding secretary at once, correcting any errors which appear in the last report. At this time also write to the manager of your division, giving any details of work and method in your branch.

All boxes of books, single books or magazines should be reported through the Church Periodical Club.

7. Always notify the corresponding secretary of any change of branch officers during the year. Keep in touch with the manager of your division, and for any desired information write to the diocesan officers having such matters in charge.

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Church was held in St. Paul's Church, Troy, on Thursday, April 29, 1920.

The Holy Communion was administered at 7:30 a. m., with the Rector, Dr. Enos, as celebrant.

The business session was held in the parish house at 10:15 o'clock. In the absence of the president, who was traveling in the Orient, the first vice-president, Mrs. Paige of Schenectady, called the meeting to order and read Mrs. Van Rensselaer's message of greeting. Two hundred and four delegates, representing thirty-two parishes, responded to roll call.

Mrs. Paige surrendered the chair at this point to Mrs. H. Nelson Lapham of Plattsburg, fourth vice-president, who conducted the meeting for the remainder of the session.

The secretary read the minutes of the semi-annual meeting, which was held in Christ Church, Hudson, November 5th and 6th. Accepted.

Reports were given by the treasurer, corresponding secretary, educational secretary and correspondent for Church Periodical Club. (These reports will be found on other pages.)

The treasurer's report showed a deficit in the Kuling School pledge. Announcement was made that Mrs. Gillespie would send her check for balance due, and wipe out the deficit.

Miss Mary Carter Nelson of Virginia, daughter of the Rev. Robert Nelson, a former missionary in China, spoke most feelingly of Kuling School, dwelling on its necessity and value for the education of children of missionaries in China.

Mrs. Babcock of Holy Cross Branch, Troy, moved "That the Diocesan Branch raise, as soon as possible, the sum of \$400 as a special pledge for the next two years for Kuling School". Seconded. After some discussion, the motion was tabled. The secretary read Bishop Rowe's letter stating stern needs in the missionary district of Alaska, owing to an unusually severe winter, in addition to the increased cost of living. Mrs. Paige moved that a special pledge of two hundred dollars be raised immediately for Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska. Seconded and carried. Responses from twenty-five parishes amounted to \$300.00, \$100.00 over the sum pledged. Mrs. Babcock again offered her motion "that the sum of \$400.00 be made a special pledge for Kuling School, China, sending \$200.00 a year for the next two years, 1920 and 1921". Seconded and carried. St. George's Church, Schenectady, immediately pledged every member for their branch, raising the sum of \$60.00. Others followed in quick succession, making a totality of \$240.00, \$40.00 over the amount pledged for the first year.

Mrs. Paige expressed great regret in not having Mrs. Van Renss-

elaer present, and announced action taken by the Executive Board, at the March meeting, in requesting Mrs. Van Rensselaer to reconsider and to withdraw her resignation as president of the Diocesan Branch. Upon motion made and seconded, this action was unanimously ratified by a rising vote. The secretary was requested to write to Mrs. Van Rensselaer, informing her of the procedure.

A message from Bishop Gailor was received, stating that he hoped to arrive in Troy in time to make his address at four o'clock.

Bishop Nelson spooke at length of the encouraging results of the Nation-Wide Campaign as conducted in the Diocese of Albany.

Noonday prayers for missions led by Bishop Nelson.

A letter from Miss Lindley on the effect of the Nation-Wide Campaign on gifts and pledges of the Woman's Auxiliary was read and discussed.

Luncheon at 1:00 p. m.

The business session was resumed at 2:15. Mrs. Lapham called on the secretary to read circular letters from Bishop Rowe and Archdeacon Stuck, calling attention to the menace of the salmon cannery at the mouth of the Yukon River. A motion was made by Mrs Grey "That the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council endorse the action taken by Hon. George Grigsby, delegate from Alaska, in introducing into Congress 'House Bill 13334, entitled "A bill for the purpose of forbidding canning and export from Alaska, fishing of salmon in the Yukon River, its tributaries and adjacent waters.'" Secounded. The motion was amended so as to include a number of women in the Albany Diocesan Branch. Carried.

The secretary was instructed to write to Hon. James W. Wadsworth, Jr., Hon. William M. Calder, Senators from New York, and to Congressmen Hon. Rollin B. Sanford and Hon. Frederick Rowe, informing them of the action taken, and urging their consideration and favorable support of this bill.

Mrs. Carpenter of St. Ann's Church, Amsterdam, spoke in a forcible and appealing manner of the Summer School at Hobart College, Geneva. Miss Hanaman gave a clear outline of the daily routine and business arrangements for such Conferences.

A lengthy discussion of the cost of printing the Annual Report followed. A motion was made by Miss Keese of Cooperstown "That the matter be left to the judgment of the Executive Board." Carried.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered the Rector and the women of St. Paul's Parish for their generous hospitality.

Announcement was made that Bishop Gailor had arrived and would greet and address the women in the church.

A motion to adjourn was then in order, after one of the most inspiring and progressive meetings held in many years.

Address in the church at four o'clock.

Bishop Gailor explained how the Church now functions through the Council of the Church between General and Triennial Conventions, and called on the women of the Auxiliary for consecrated service during these days of unrest and laxity in religious life.

Immediately after this service the delegates were entertained at "afternoon tea" by the women of St. John's Church in their parish house.

At the evening service, at 8 o'clock, in St. Paul's Church, Bishop Gailor preached an eloquent sermon to a large congregation, dwelling on the disturbed conditions of the times, carelessness and indifference towards religious life, but holding up the Church Victorious as the ultimate solution of the problems and perplexities of the age.

MINUTES OF THE SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING, 1920

The semi-annual meeting of the Albany Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Church was held in Christ Church, Ballston Spa, on Wednesday and Thursday, October 27th and 28th, 1920.

Evening service in Christ Church on Wednesday, at 7:45 o'clock. Archdeacon Brooks preached the sermon.

The Holy Communion was celebrated on Thursday morning, at 9:30, by Father Howell, Rector of Christ Church.

The United Thank Offering amounted to \$61.26.

The Rector greeted the delegates, and announced that the business meeting would be held in the church.

The meeting was called to order by the president at eleven o'clock.

Mrs. Van Rensselaer warmly greeted the women, expressing her pleasure in taking up Auxiliary affairs, after an absence of seven months, and paid tribute to the Rector and the women of Christ Church for their hospitable preparations in welcoming the delegates at large to their parish.

The minutes of the annual meeting, held in St. Paul's Church, Troy, April 27th and 28th, were accepted as read.

The treasurer's report showed a deficit of \$165.00 in Current Expense. The sum of \$90.00 was taken from the Reserve Fund in 1919, and \$75.00 in 1920, to meet expenses. A motion was made by Mrs. Paige "That the parishes represented make pledges there and then to wipe out the deficit." Seconded and carried. The sum of \$148.00 was pledged, reducing the deficit to \$24. Discussion in regard to increasing branch fees followed. Miss Laura S. Townsend of Albany moved "That each and every branch be asked to double its present contribution." Seconded. Miss Tibbitts of Troy objected on the ground that some parishes were now paying liberally towards Current Expense, and that it would be unfair to ask them to double their contribution, St. John's, Troy, for instance, paying \$40.00 a year for Current Expense." Miss Townsend withdrew her motion, and Miss Tibbitts moved "That the matter be left to the Executive Committee to make out a budget and regulate the fees." Seconded and carried.

Mrs. Rochester's report for the United Thank Offering showed funds on hand of \$1,675.07.

Mrs. Van Rensselaer paid high tribute to Mrs. Rochester for her splendid report, and called upon the women to show their appreciation by a rising vote of thanks to the honored and devoted secretary and treasurer of the United Thank offering.

The report of the corresponding secretary was read by Miss Ruth Hall, in the absence of Miss Hall. Accepted.

The report of the Church Periodical Club was read by Miss Young. Accepted.

The report of the Extension Committee and Educational Secretary was presented by Miss Ruth Hall. Accepted.

Mrs. Van Rensselaer opened the subject of the "Emery Fund", and called on Mrs. Conover to explain the purpose of the "Fund" and the plan for raising it.

One hundred and fifty-four delegates, representing twenty-eight parishes, responded to roll call.

Noonday prayers by the Rector, in which the women were asked to join.

12:15. Address by Miss Lindley on the "Church Service League".

A message of greeting from Bishop Nelson, who was unable to be present, was announced by the president.

Attention was called to the Day of Devotion to be held in the Cathedral on December 14th, announcements to be sent out by the committee, Miss Hall and Miss Hanaman.

1:30. Luncheon in the parish house.

2:15. Unfinished business. General discussion concerning organization of "Church Service League" in Diocese of Albany was earnest and spirited.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to the Rector and the women of the parish for their cordiality and bountiful hospitality, making the semi-annual meeting one long to be remembered.

As my last report—that read at the semi-annual meeting in October—was of the usual prophetic character—a spur more than a remorse—I wish to give the result of that radiant faith as a prelude to this record. The preliminary report ended with some such words as these: that the fulfillment of our vast allotment of box work, with our inadequate equipment, would be nothing less than a miracle—that we could only echo, “What are these among so many?” unless we added the unflagging effort of our united brains and hearts and hands to the poor sum of our five barley loaves and two small fishes, looking up to heaven in steadfast faith. The miracle was wrought. “They were all filled,” and we are gathering up the fragments that remain. If this were a sermon, instead of a report, I should use as a text: “Herein is My Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit.”

The detail of this achievement belongs, in large part, to next year's report, as this one ends with the first of January, 1920, and it is in Lent that our work gains greatest impetus. However, I may say, in passing, that five branches of the Girls' Friendly Society, and as many more parish Guilds, have a part in the general thanksgiving.

In covering Auxiliary results for the year 1920, we must swing back to a year ago, when the cost of materials had reached the apex of extortion, and “drive”-smitten incomes seemed to have touched the bottom of possibility. I was altogether sure, from a tense watching of my memoranda, that in domestic missions we had fallen behind the returns of the previous year by more than a thousand dollars; and, indeed, so the figures stood when I sent my report to the Missions House in March—\$3,603.47, as against \$4,538.21 in 1919—a backward step of \$1,177.00! It was only to be expected; but an **honorable** wound is as painful as any other.

Then the searchlight process, always necessary to gain data for this report, began. Two boxes, where my memoranda had only chronicled one, were discovered; barrels definitely sent that I had supposed abandoned; unexpected fifty dollar gifts here and one hundred and

fifty somewhere else. It was an outrage upon system, for all of this should have been duly reported; but it was exhilarating. The surprises ran on and on, until the \$1,100.00 deficit was passed, and we were registering gain. The figures now stand nearly \$300.00 **more** for 1920 than the year before. Our values now are, for domestic missions and missionaries, \$5,598.62; for missions and missionaries in the diocese of Albany, \$685.00, a total of \$6,283.62.

"And hereby we know that He abideth in us by the Spirit which He hath given us." This work, which might so easily be sordid, is raised by consecration, always, into worship—a Te Deum of the hands—but never before has it seemed so impressive as this season, when five branches, that crushing circumstances benumbed through several years, are stirred to keenest interest. Guilds in places too small for Auxiliary branches have asked to serve. A new city branch has been enthusiastically organized, and everywhere one finds the feeling not so much that the work—"the great work", as they phrase it—needs our women, as that our women need the great work. When two tiny branches, without Rectors, prepare boxes, meeting week by week to do good and to distribute, we know of a truth that here indeed is sacrifice with which God is well pleased.

In the stronger towns there has been a general report of large and enthusiastic meetings. The secretary of one such branch wrote: "We all feel that ours is a wonderful box. In many instances the number of garments asked for was doubled. I wish the city branches could see some of our work!" From the principal of a Colored mission comes such stirring appreciation as this: "If you could but guess what you have done for my people!"

"And hereby we know that He abideth in us by the Spirit which He hath given us." This diocese, which, since pre-war prices, has felt equal to only one or two of the difficult domestic personal boxes, has this year forwarded **ten**, with seven diocesan ones sent and another preparing—eighteen in all! As this is mostly the work of Advent, it comes properly into this report, and, while the work of the later winter does not, I must tell you that we not only found ourselves perfectly adequate to the Valle Crucis appeal, but when the Missions House learned that the needs there were not so great as was at first supposed, we have been able to arouse deepest gratitude at a number of domestic mission stations by diverting to them our overflow, as well as to send several installments of useful clothing to Liberia. We are now carefully gathering up the fragments that remain.

This report is a record of every Christian grace but common sense. The mere idea of a new box plan has created rather widespread bewilderment. Some of the most intelligent women in the diocese have inquired if, when an appeal asks for four dozens of aprons for girls from 3 to 18 years old, it means four dozens for each age, instead of considering that that would mean fifty-six dozens! Others, equally intelligent, have interpreted the little table of

values that we may put upon our **work** in preparing a box—although it plainly emphasizes its meaning—into the value we may give to the finished article. The tearful refrain is: “Why, our materials cost more than that!” Now, any woman—or group of women—should realize that no one could possibly set a price upon potential garments that **might** be made of fabrics costing 15 cents, 30 cents, 50 cents—or whatever—a yard. The Missions House does not pretend to occult information upon that subject; but hemming is hemming, and **there** is where the value is fixed—upon work of every sort.

It requires more than a new box-work plan to change my Christian name to Charlotte, or Odette, or any other of the alien cognomens by which I have been addressed, in the general daze. Also, the corresponding secretary is not the person to whom to send United Thank Offering checks, nor thirsty demands for pledge information, nor yet—exacting as the Auxiliary work has been—can I consider myself a whole industrial school, and I must beg branches **not** to send me boxes intended for Valle Crucis or the Bunn Mission.

If we feel (as we must) that the work accomplished in the diocese has far outstripped our natural strength, what must we think of this incident, recently reported to me: The home of a certain Auxiliary treasurer was destroyed by fire, the poor officer escaping in her nightclothes, on a cold winter’s night. Later, among black ruins, the Auxiliary funds were found, the cover of the box that held them burned, but God’s treasury unharmed!

I must add, in closing this record of beneficent attainment, the statement that many boxes have, too, been forwarded to the Susan Fennimore Cooper Foundation, and several to St. Christina’s Home. Even the reports sent me of Serbian and Armenian relief, while they have nothing to do with our Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, ring with love of one’s fellow-man.

Now that we are merging this year of wonderful accomplishment into one of new opportunity, we can but take heart for the future, in the certain knowledge that the benediction that is our heritage from the ages has been verified for us throughout the months that are passed. With the counsel of such companionship, the months to come may be equally rich in the fruits of the Spirit. It has been, and will be, as if the Great Missionary Himself said to each one of us: “The fellowship of the Holy Ghost be with us all.”

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, APRIL 28, 1921

In addition to the study classes already reported for Lent of last year, there were fourteen classes held in Advent, as follows: Trinity, Athens; St. John's, Cohoes; St. John's, Delhi; Christ Church, Gilbertsville; Trinity, Gouverneur; All Saints, Hudson; St. Mark's, Hoosick Falls; Zion, Hudson Falls; Zion, Morris; St. John's, Massena; Grace, Mohawk; Trinity, Plattsburg; Grace, Waterford, and Trinity, Whitehall. Of these, several used the Survey.

There are various other matters of which I would speak to you, one being, as usual at this spring meeting, the Summer Conference at Geneva. It has never held out a more alluring program for instruction and discussion on those explorations into the five-fold field of service toward which our eyes are turned; and never have we all so needed such teaching, nor realized so fully its value, as in this new day of new methods. For, as we press forward to those achievements which the past called impossible, but that are now promised by the future, we leave behind us much wasteful expense of time and labor for small results. I have been called upon of late to fill out various questionnaires relating to my office among you, and I shall read you now some of the queries which you, in your turn, will be asked by your educational secretary later in the year, so that in 1922 I may make a better showing for the diocese. But first I wish to go back to what I said just now, and point out to you that the aim of our leaders at the Missions House is to rouse in us all a spirit of intelligent inquiry; to make us know that which we have believed; to show us—for example—a better way of learning than the indolent reading circle, most of whose members bend over their knitting, or their sewing, while one or two read aloud to them, giving the selected article from The Spirit of Missions, or some of the Church papers, such abstracted attention as remains after counting of stitches and matching embroidery silks, with an alert ear for the approaching clatter of teacups in the parish kitchen. Such a reading circle is but an inoculation for knowledge, and it seldom "takes." Rather, we are asked to note the difference between it and that other, where the readings are thoughtfully chosen and discussed—the one way in which they are marked, learned and inwardly digested.

But here are the questions: How many discussion classes have been conducted in your diocese? State, in each case, the text book used, the number of class sessions and name and address of leader. In how many parishes have program meetings been conducted? Give subject of meeting and form. In how many parishes have reading circles been conducted? State, in each case, the subject read, and their method. Has it been reading aloud at sewing meetings, or has it been thoughtful reading, followed by discussion? How many educational leaders have you in your diocese? How many able to lead

discussion classes? How many able to lead normal classes? How many able to speak at meetings? How many delegates to Summer Conferences? How many women use the prayer leaflet?

This last interrogation refers to the Church Service Prayer Leaflet, of which but a score or so are distributed throughout my jurisdiction. It costs only twenty-five cents annually, or, if five or more are sent to one address, but ten cents, so that every Auxiliary could obtain it at a nominal sum for the use of all its members. I am asked, moreover, to speak of the prayer in use by The Order of the Thousandfold, sent out by Archdeacon Neve of Ivy Depot, Va. Its one obligation is that each member should pray daily for an increase a thousand times in devotion and knowledge. The Church Service Prayer Leaflet gives instruction, and presents a petition, concerning the various parts of the mission field. Since, to us busy folk, there arises a temptation sometimes to feel that "to work is to pray," surely it is well for us all to draw apart from the world and be with God. "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" That question should close all such communing—that and the silence in which we await the answer.
