REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary feels gratified at being able to report the businesslike manner in which reports have been forwarded and obligations met. She has met with an unfailing courtesy and prompt attention which has been very helpful, and it gives her great pleasure to make it a matter of record. All of the branches except the one at Bisbee (and that branch has been without a rector for a time) have contributed the Woman's Auxiliary share of the deficit of the Board, Douglas giving twice as much as was asked. The Branch at Phoenix doubled its share this year. Meetings have been held in all the branches, and in three, Douglas, Prescott and Phoenix, regular study courses have been followed. The district secretary urges strongly the mission study classes, for it is very difficult to be interested in a subject of which one knows nothing. We, in Arizona, are so isolated from the general Church that it is matter of great importance for us to keep up our knowledge and interest by systematic study. This is being slowly aroused. At least, there are now more women than ever before in each of our congregations who know of the Woman's Auxiliary and the objects of its work, and this is a great encouragement.

APPENDIX C.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON

In the annual address of the Bishop made to the Convocation of 1907 he said, "I have created the office of Archdeacon of Arizona and have appointed the Rev. Julius W. Atwood, Phoenix, to this position. The object of this appointment is to give this Missionary District a claim on him for such services as he can render outside of Phoenix, and to make him an accredited representative of this district when he is abroad." Acting upon the instruction of the Bishop as expressed in this extract from his address of last year, I beg to say that during my absence in the east in the summer of 1907, I endeavored to present the work and needs of our Missionary District whenever the opportunity was offered. Through the courtesy and kindness of both clergymen and laymen I was enabled to make addresses in churches before Women's Auxiliaries, Convocations, Guilds, Missionary Societies, and at Parlor Meetings, in the dioceses of Southern Ohio, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Maine and Michigan. While speaking generally of our work in Arizona, it was sought especially to call attention to the great need of establishing a sanitarium or hospital for those who come to Arizona ill with tuberculosis. I found everywhere interest in our work, and especially that part of it which has to do with ministering to consumptives. In the report of St. Luke's Home an account is given of the generous gifts from eastern friends and churchmen, which has made possible the founding of a church sanitarium or home. In regard to the other object for which the office of Archdeacon was erected in this district, I will say that so far as has been consistent with my duties as rector of Trinity Church, Phoenix, I have sought to interest myself in the missionary work at home. The special opportunities have been found in Maricopa County. Unorganized Missions have been started in

Appendix D

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY FOR 1913-1914

That the Woman's Auxiliary is getting a stronger grip in this Missionary District of Arizona is shown in three or four ways in particular.

It is the smaller surface ripples which tell the way the current flows, and the District Officers with a sense of responsibility for the Missionary work of Arizona as a whole, feel that the spirit of world-evangelization is spreading when the branches written to about their work, whether they have much that is encouraging to write of or little, send prompt response. With the advent of Convocation and the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Secretary sent out letters to all the branches, asking that some report of their year's work be sent her; and in every case where a branch actually exists a reply has come.

She has therefore in her hands at present, data which will furnish a pretty accurate idea of the work done along these lines in Arizona.

A second fact which shows the upward drift is Arizona's story as connected with the United Offering. The record of the previous United Offerings had made us tremble by their decrease. In 1907 the sum for Arizona was \$118.35; and again, in 1910, it was but \$59.80. When the time however came and the necessary letters of reminder were written to the branches, the response was far larger than hoped

for, and more money was actually sent to Arizona's Secretary-Treasurer, viz.: \$62.83, than had been given the previous Triennial, with the knowledge that some money, anyway, had been sent direct to New York. When the New York check was handed to our President to be added to what she already had, to be presented at the great Triennial service, she found that the total sum for Arizona exceeded the offering of six years ago. It amounted to \$142.63. One dollar and forty cents from Globe came in too late to be added to this last Triennial offering.

No very great sums these as compared with the gifts of many other dioceses—in fact Arizona's record, though not the least, yet is among the least—still from our Missionary District in its newness we considered it truly expressive of hope and faith in the Auxiliary's future.

The fact of our representation at the bigger conventions also may be taken as a step in advance. A year and a half ago when the Eighth Missionary Department met in Los Angeles, Arizona was well represented, and again this year at the bigger gathering, the Triennial, two from Arizona were present, our President, Miss Jenkins, and Miss Thackara from the North, from the Hospital of the Good Shepherd at Fort Defiance.

Then in the fourth place, some of the District Officers had contact with some of the other branches in the State. Our President has spoken to the Phoenix branch, and to those at Jerome and Wickenburg, I believe—perhaps to others—and plans anyway a visit to Williams later on. The Secretary too has had interesting touch with a couple of the northern branches last summer, as it would seem by chance, only we don't believe in any such term. The story is perhaps worth the telling. When last June we decided to take the northern route to Colorado that we might have a peep at the Grand Canyon as we went, the rush of packing and closing house made me quite forget that our route would take us directly past the homes of some of the branches I had had much correspondence with, so when we had a few evening hours in Williams we gave no thought to the Church there. We simply walked about the town, 'till in conversation we were reminded of it. We then decided to see what the Williams Mission of our Church was like. As we approached this pretty little place, we saw that the hall was lighted; and through the open door we recognized the Rev. Mr. Meade. We joined the service and Mr. Meade, seeing us, announced an informal gathering of the Woman's Auxiliary after it. A meeting, or meetings, were planned for our return journey, and one in Flagstaff occurred early in September, when a company of women was gathered in the vestry of Flagstaff's new church, the Church of the Epiphany, for the purpose

of discussing Woman's Auxiliary matters with the District Secretary. The talk was followed with tea and a social half hour.

The last sign of the times which I shall refer to is a broadening out in sympathy which came at our last annual meeting in Nogales. It was our unusual experience, through the mistake and generosity of the Flagstaff and Williams branches, to have a small balance in the treasury; and we were able to send \$10.00 to help a wonderfully interesting work in Kentucky, carried on amongst the poor whites of the mountains by Archdeacon Bowker and his assistants. That a change of garb for night and day is unknown to the little children taken to the schools of the Archdeacon, that clothes are never washed or mended or changed, that whole families crowd in one room used for all purposes, are some of the reasons which give this work its excuse of being.

To come to greater detail—judging by the reports received, Phoenix, Prescott and Tucson have really active branches. In all these, there has been genuine attempt at Mission Study, and some attempt at giving. Flagstaff too, has had its Mission Study class. Prescott branched off from the prescribed subject of China to that of Africa—Nogales too, had previously made a study of China—being enough interested to have summer picnic meetings beneath the pines.

Imagine the Secretary's excitement, when, on looking through the Convocation Journals of the last three years with the idea of noting any United Offering gifts sent from Arizona to New York direct, she found Mesa and Winslow credited with branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Investigation unfortunately proved that Winslow had none as yet, while in Mesa there is good promise of a start. The report from Williams shows it to have done something practical, it having responded to a Los Angeles appeal sent to all churches bearing the name of St. John, to help a church of that name in Tokyo, Japan. The Williams Woman's Auxiliary sent five dollars. Wickenburg has kept some missionary activity alive in that it helped St. Luke's Home to the extent of the proceeds of a food sale, which amounted to more than twenty-five dollars. Globe with its new minister bids fair to have its Auxiliary really alive again. It did contribute to the United Offering. Yuma showed signs of hope in anxiety to form a Woman's Auxiliary Branch, but as yet nothing has actually been accomplished, though we hope a branch may be organized this year. As to Douglas, it reports no branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, but a larger contribution to Missions than ever before.

We have been unfortunate in that our Educational Secretary has again resigned before the year was out. Last year the Rev. Mr. Moody's departure from Globe of course meant Mrs. Moody's resig-

nation from the work; and this year, too, Miss Edith Evans of Phoenix, who was elected Educational Secretary a year ago, felt it also necessary to resign.

Our Vice-President, Mrs. Williams of Williams, reports some work done as regards the distribution of the Spirit of Missions in Arizona.

As regards Junior Auxiliary work, the Secretary reports with thankfulness the fact that two Junior branches have been added to that of Tucson, viz.: a branch in Prescott and one in Jerome.

Before coming to the details of the Secretary-Treasurer's work, there is just one other aspect of the work as a whole to which I should like to refer, viz.: The matter of "specials" or special offerings from the various branches which the different reports I have on hand show. There may have been others I do not know about.

As Secretary-Treasurer I have mailed in all 126 letters and other communications, and have handed over 61, making 187 in all. I have received 122.

Some money has passed through my hands; \$10.00 given by Phoenix to St. Luke's Home, and \$5.00 given by Tucson to Miss Thackara for use in the Hospital of the Good Shepherd at Fort Defiance. In September and October I sent \$3.95 from Arizona to Miss Jenkins towards Miss Emery's gift, to which five cents was added to make the even dollar; and I sent \$62.83 towards the United Offering gift. An additional \$2.00 was sent from Arizona's Junior Auxiliary towards the United Offering. I have \$1.40 on hand towards the Next United Offering.

The annual meeting voted me \$5.00 wherewith to meet my expenses as Secretary:

Appendix E

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

The Committee on the State of the Church begs leave to report as follows:

The Church in Arizona is making healthy progress in every department of its work. In every direction are signs of activity. The foundations of the Church are being laid both broad and deep. New missions are being established; old ones are being built up; parish houses, rectories, and churches are under contemplation or being erected and improvements are being made. The two hospitals are being enlarged, better equipped and endowed. Skilled nurses and physicians are using every effort for the alleviation of suffering humanity. More lay readers are being appointed and the number of

clergy increased. The new men coming into this Missionary District are men of high ideals, wide experience and broad culture, men of consecration and vision, who are willing to sacrifice themselves for the cause of Christ and His Church.

As a wise master-builder, with the outlook of a statesman, the Bishop selects his men from places far and near, and inspires them with something of his own missionary zeal. In directing the work of the church over this vast extent of territory he keeps closely in touch with every aspect of the work, and keeps all things moving harmoniously and efficiently. Never was the District so well organized, never so well equipped for work; never was the outlook so bright, nor the progress of the Church so well assured. The division of the District into three Archdeaconries, and the appointment of an Archdeacon who will give his time to the General Missionary work of the District, will relieve the Bishop of many details of administration, and thus make for better organization and greater efficiency.

Let us now turn from the more general aspects of the question to a consideration of certain details which will throw light upon what has already been said. The following table of statistics, comparing the year just closed with the preceding year, shows that in almost every particular there has been a gain in 1914 over 1913.
