PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

As I greet you today, co-workers in the Auxiliary, for the third time as your President and Treasurer, I would that I possessed the power to express to you just what I would have this annual meeting mean to us all.

We have had our Missionary service last night; we commenced this day with our Corporate Communion, and we meet now to review our past year and to plan what seems best to us all for the coming one.

We have been revived and re-created intellectually and spiritually, and now we should ask ourselves, "to what purpose?"

Is it only that we may enjoy for the present these privileges of being together, and, when we part to have the memory only of the meeting?

Far more than this our annual gathering should mean for us. It would scarcely be worth while if this were all.

What I hope we may conserve unto ourselves is an increase of knowledge, and a further confirmation of our Faith through work and prayer, and that returning to our homes we may carry these into our lives and work and pass them on to others--for, after all, this is what our Auxiliary means to us, does it not?

In looking over some addresses which have been made before the different Auxiliaries this past year I was impressed with the note struck in many instances with regard to just this point, and thinking that perhaps we, here in the District of Asheville, need the reminder I have borrowed a quotation for the benefit of us all.

"If I have eaten my morsel alone--
The Patriarch spoke with scorn;
What would he think of the Church, were he shown
Heathendom, huge, forlorn,
Godless, Christless, with soul unfed,
While the Church's ailment is fullness of bread,
Eating her morsel alone?
"I am debtor alike to the Jew and the Greek,"
The mighty Apostle cried,
Traversing continents, souls to seek,
For the love of the Crucified,
Centuries, centuries, since have sped;
Millions are famishing; we have bread;
But we eat our morsel alone!

Even of them that have largest dower
Shall heaven require the more;
Ours is affluence, knowledge, power,
Ocean from shore to shore;

"Give us, give us your Living Bread;"

If we eat our morsel alone?

Now let us each ask ourselves three questions and may the ultimate answers refute any accusations of conscience that may be called forth if we realize that in the past we have eaten only of our own morsel.

Am I doing all I can in the branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of which I am a member? Am I promoting in any way the work of the Junior's and Babies' Branches? Am I reaching forth through the Auxiliary, "into all nations?"

For "To share is the bliss of Heaven, as it is the joy of earth,
And the unshared bread lacks savour, and the wine unshared, lacks zest.
"And the joy of the soul redeemed would be little, little worth,
If, content with its own security, it could forget the rest."

MINUTES OF THE TWELFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF
THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE
JURISDICTION OF ASHEVILLE.

The Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was called to order by Bishop Horner in Morganton, North Carolina on Wednesday, June 17th, at 3 o'clock. After the creed and prayers the Bishop made his annual address to the members present. He congratulated the Auxiliary on having every member of the Advisory Board present, and spoke of the two changes on this board, Mrs. Minor having accepted the position of Secretary of the Juniors, Mrs. Thomas C. Wetmore that of Vice-President. He also thanked the Auxiliary for the \$78.60 given by the different branches for the School at Valle Crucis. He spoke of Mr. Hardin's Work in Gaston County, where there are more mills than in any other county of the State, also of Christ School, Arden.

In sending the contributions for District Missions to Mrs. Bacon, each branch is to designate to which of the two fields it would prefer to have the money sent, but if any amount is undesignated, it is to be equally divided between the work in Gaston County and that at Christ School, Arden. After the Bishop's address, Mrs. Bacon introduced the Rev. W. H. Hardin, who spoke of his work in the Gaston Group of Missions, giving interesting statistics of the "Mill District" and dwelling upon the ignorance of the operatives, the only way to reach whom is through night schools. He asked the Auxiliary to help him in furnishing the Rectory.

Mrs. Wetmore next spoke of Christ School, Arden, calling special attention to the present emergency of the educational problem of the mountain people. Last year there were one hundred and eighteen in the school. Mrs. Wetmore dwelt especially on the Manual training of the children, and said that a water supply was in great demand, while "the greatest need at present is a pump." Mrs. Bacon then made her annual report as President, greeting the Auxiliary and urging the members to share their privileges with others more than ever before during the coming year. Seventeen branches responded to the roll call with thirty delegates present.

Mrs. Bacon read the Treasurer's report; Miss Martin that of United Offering, also that of the Junior Auxiliary. On motion of Miss Patton the reading of the regular reports was suspended until an offering was taken for General Missions and for the Central Fund; which amounted to \$14.22. This leaves no deficit in the Treasury.

Mrs. Chester read a short paper on Mission Study, showing encouraging results in several branches. Mrs. Chapman gave a good report of the Church Periodical Club, speaking of two new branches formed since the last meeting. Miss Patton read the report of St. Mary's Guild, showing what had been done to help St. Mary's School, Raleigh.

On motion of Mrs. Horner, seconded by Mrs. Bland of Tryon, the following resolution was adopted. "That the objects of the united work for Domestic and Foreign Missions shall be sent to each Branch of the Auxiliary by May 1st in time for the regular monthly meetings, that the Branches may have the opportunity of discussing these objects and sending their delegates fully instructed."

On motion of Mrs. N. C. Arthur of Nonah, the following resolution was adopted: "That every branch making no contribution to the quarterly United Work should send a card to the Treasurer, stating its inability to contribute in order that the Treasurer may not be delayed in making payments for that quarter." On motion of Mrs. Wetmore, seconded by Mrs. Hopkins of Lincolnton, this resolution was adopted: "That all Auxiliaries in the District are to consider themselves pledged to make some contribution, however small, to all objects in the Domestic, Foreign, and District Fields which have been decided upon by the delegates at the Annual Meeting." The Secretary read a letter of greeting from Miss Emery. Mrs. Bacon then asked for suggestions for Foreign work. Mrs. Chester suggested Bishop Graves' work in North Kiangsu, and on motion of Mrs. Horner this was decided upon. Mrs. Wetmore moved that each branch should study this special field. Carried. Mrs. Thomas moved that Alaska be the Domestic work. Motion lost. On motion of Mrs. Parke of Waynesville, Salina was chosen as the field for Domestic Work. Miss Patton suggested that further information be asked from the Bishop of Salina, and the Secretary was requested to write to Bishop Griswold.

Miss Dixon of Glen Alpine gave an interesting account of her branch of the Junior Auxiliary.

The Rev. R. W. Patton made a vigorous address on Missions, the great purpose of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ.

The Rev. Dr. R. Meares made an appeal for a church at Black Mountain Station.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the members of the Morganton Auxiliary for their kind hospitality. On motion the meeting adjourned until the next

morning.

On Thursday at 9 a. m. the meeting was called to order, after which the minutes were read and adopted.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF MISSION STUDY.

1908.

The Royal Psalmist says, "Every day will I give thanks unto thee," and this year to one who has studied the progress of Missions at all, it seems a most appropriate thought.

The blessing of a Loving Father is poured upon the efforts of those who are striving to preach His Word, in our own land, or on foreign shores. Were there ever, even in Apostolic days, more true martyrs indeed, than one can find now, in the frozen North or the Southern Tropics? Read what Dr. Griggs writes in the June number of the *Spirit of Missions*. Imagine his watching and waiting for months, for food, for oil, that could not be brought to him. Think of Bishop Rowe making a trail in the snow, leaving the marks of blood, from the feet that had been wounded, by walking so long on snow shoes, and in his account not even telling what he suffered. The pain, and the agony that he endured is told by the Deaconess, who dressed his wounds, and spoke of his heroism. When you are disposed to complain of discomforts, think of the Alaska heroes, of the Chi-

nese sufferers, of the Philippine martyrs, and begin to work harder for Missions. And one way to work for them is to learn all that you can about them, and pray fervently, every day. Men are feeling the necessity of working and, there is a movement to go out into dark and benighted regions, and to evangelize the world, in this generation.

Among the heathen, there is an awakening, and many, who have bowed down to idols, are leaving them to worship the only true God, and Jesus Christ His Son, by the power of the Holy Ghost.

In our own District we can thankfully say, that the subject of Missions is more studied. There are some who think they cannot do it, but all promise to try harder another year. Most encouraging accounts are sent from some Branches, "The Spirit of Missions" is used by most of the Branches, and "The Kingdom growing" has been doing a good work. One Branch had the privilege of being taught by an accomplished leader, who interested it greatly.

Twenty-eight letters have been written, eighteen were answered. Of the six Branches who had no study, we can only hope that another year will find them among the most enthusiastic. It was my privilege while in Philadelphia last winter to attend a study class taught by the Assistant Educational Secretary. Fourteen women sat around a table each with papers and a Bible. Work had been assigned to each one. The subject was China, and the class was greatly interested and enthusiastic. The teacher was well prepared for her duty, and aroused in those she taught, the desire to know all that they could learn on the subject. Another privilege that I enjoyed, which I wish all could have shared was a lecture by Archdeacon Stuck, on his work in Alaska. He came to Richmond in October to attend the General Convention and prolonged his visit so as to tell in different parts of the country, what experiences he had in Alaska. This lecture was made more interesting by the beautiful pictures which he showed, and his own love for the work and desire to teach perishing souls, were made manifest in all that he said.

Of the study in our own District, one correspondent says: "Our Mission study has been regular, and this year we have had the Philippines, and the Hawaiian Islands." Another says, "During the past winter it has been our custom to appoint a member to make a selection or write an original article on Missions, and read the same at the following meeting. We have found this very pleasant and instructive. The plan was suggested by our Rector. We have had readings on Japan, China, Africa, and the South Sea Islands." One branch has used

"The Kingdom Growing" for the second year and "after studying the lesson, would read from the Spirit of Missions, or other source, articles bearing on the Mission field for the day. Each member was provided with paper and pencil, to take notes of the part of the lesson to be memorized. The last month's lesson was reviewed before beginning a new lesson. Each family has a Church Calendar published by the Board, and given to all who subscribe for the Spirit of Missions.

We must all feel very glad that our good Secretary is to have a splendid trip this year. She is to go first to London for the Pan-Anglican Congress, and is sent by the Woman's Auxiliary to visit all the foreign Missions

I know she will rejoice to hear that we are remembering her in all our meetings, and are asking that she may be blessed, protected and guided in her journeys, and come back refreshed and strengthened for the duties that await her return. So let us advance, looking onward and upward, feeling sure that the promise will surely be fulfilled that "the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth, as the waters cover the sea," praying more and more fervently, "Thy Kingdom Come."

Before stating how far we have helped in the good work during the past year, let me recall to your minds the aim of the Church Periodical Club.

It is a society formed for the purpose of supplying periodicals and books to those clergy and laity who are unable to procure good literature any other way. It sends out books, Easter and Christmas cards, Prayer and Hymnals, Bibles, games etc, to schools, reading-rooms, mining camps and ships. Hence it needs books and magazines to supply the constant demand and money for the room where books etc. are received, salaries of clerks, postage and freight or expressage. And it needs the interests and the prayers of every person in the church. We have now in this District seven librarians. I am glad to say two new ones for Biltmore and Waynesville were appointed since last report. I suppose the four periodicals are still sent regularly by ladies in Asheville but no report has been sent me.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, in the Mission field.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

The progress of the Junior Auxiliary this year is very good, if one is to judge from their yearly reports, and letters received from their leaders. Five new branches have been formed, at Tryon, High Shoals, Morganton, Lincolnton and Glen Alpine. Though three - Bat Cave, Edneyville and Rutherfordton discontinued this year, there is hope that they will be re-organized in the fall. One branch of eight members - Ronda - is advanced to the Woman's Auxiliary and though a loss to the Juniors, it is a forward movement for them, and a desirable addition to the Auxiliary itself.

The Thompson Orphanage has been made warmer by several quilts, the work of the children, as well as by gifts of clothing. One branch takes care of one of the children there; two others assist in clothes and money at St. Paul's School, Beaufort, N. C., while yet another pays for the schooling of two children somewhere else.

All assessments and pledges having been met, a small but perfect, white stone Font was bought by the Juniors and presented to the new chapel at Balsam; and, at the Bishop's request, those of the Juniors who were able, gave and made up, with some outside assistance, six sets of Altar Linen for the Mission Stations at Granite Falls; Hickory; St. Andrews, Bessemer City; St. Luke's, Boone county; St. John's, Watauga county; St. Cyprian's, Lincolnton, and St. Mary's Mission, Morganton. The sisters of St. John the Baptist, New York, also, through the Juniors, gave a set to St. George's Mission, Morganton. The girls of the Junior did all the hemstitching beautifully and some of the embroidery. For what was

done by older fingers and for the pecuniary aid given, they return many and sincere thanks.

The Bishop has already told you, of the advisable change in the Secretary of the Juniors, and I, as the retiring officer, can only say, that it is impossible for me not to regret the necessity of severing my relations with the Junior work of Woman's Auxiliary, for it has been most agreeable work: but, it goes into hands so much more capable than mine, that it almost gives me pleasure to resign it, feeling how much the work will be increased and strengthened by new interests and new methods.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DISTRICT OF ASHEVILLE.

CONSTITUTION.

I.

The name of this Society is the Asheville Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the Missionary work of the whole church among the women of the District; to increase their interest and activity in the work; to encourage the formation of parish branches of this Society; and by means of united and systematic effort to prosecute the work of Church Extension.

III.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, who shall perform the duties of Treasurer; a Vice-President; a Recording Secretary; a Secretary for the Junior Branch; a Treasurer for the United Offering; a Secretary for Mission Study; a Secretary for the Church Periodical Club; and a Secretary for the Babies' Branch.

These officers shall constitute the Advisory Board of the Auxiliary of the District. Vacancies in the Advisory Board shall be filled by appointment of the Bishop from nominations to him by the Advisory Board of two names for each vacancy. The Bishop may call together the Advisory Board at any time to make nominations for vacancies.

IV.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, preside at them, and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Society, and as Treasurer to receive all money sent her and disburse the same in accordance with the determination of the Society at its annual meeting, making a detailed report of the same to the Society.

V.

The duties of the Vice-President are to act as a member of the Advisory Board and in the absence of the President to preside at all meetings of the Society.

VI.

The duties of the Recording Secretary are to keep the minutes of all meet-

ings of the Society, and with the President to have charge of the printing of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

VII.

The duties of the Secretary for the Junior Branch are to call all meetings of the Juniors, to preside at them, and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Juniors, and as Treasurer to receive all money contributed by the Juniors and disburse the same in accordance with the determination of the Junior Society at its annual meeting.

VIII.

The duties of the Secretary for the Babes' Branch are to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Babes, and to receive and disburse the money contributed by the same.

IX.

The duties of the Treasurer of the United Offering are to correspond with Parish Branches and with individuals in regard to this offering; to receive all money contributed therefor, and to present the same at the Triennial meeting of the Woman Auxiliary.

X.

The duties of the Secretary for Mission Study are to keep on hand a supply of literature on the Foreign, Domestic and District Missions of the Church, and to advise with Parish branches in regard to the study of the Missions of the Church.

XI.

The duties of the Secretary for the Church Phriodical Club are to correspond with the Parish branches of this Club and to have the general oversight of the work of the Club in this District.

XII.

The duties of the Advisory Board are to meet at the call of the President, to advise with her in regard to the general work of the Auxiliary in the District and to nominate to the Bishop names to fill vacancies in the Board. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

XIII.

Each Parish Branch shall send to the President, acting as Treasurer all money contributed for Missionary work, except such special contributions as the Branch may prefer to send direct to the beneficiary, and shall make to the President an annual

report of all work done by the Branch.

XIV.

There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society at such time and place as may be determined upon by the Society itself, and in the absence of such determination by the Society, the President, upon consultation with the Bishop, shall appoint the time and place of the Annual Meeting.

XV.

At the Annual Meetings each Parish Branch shall be entitled to one delegate and an additional delegate for each additional ten members of the Branch after the first ten.

XVI.

All officers of the Society shall make a report of all work done under their direction, to the Annual Meeting of the Society, and the same shall be printed in the Annual Report of the Auxiliary.

XVII.

At the Annual Meeting of the Society, any member of a Parish Branch shall be entitled to vote on all questions, unless there is a call by at least two delegates for a vote by Parish Branches, in which case only delegates shall be entitled to vote.

XVIII.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Society, voting by Parish Branches at any Annual Meeting, provided the Bishop approves of such amendment.
