## TO THE RIGHT REVEREND BISHOP OF THE DISTRICT AND WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Although you have all read of the various interesting and vital happenings of the General Convention of last October, and some of you have had the privilege of being present at the same, it would not, however, be fitting for us to gather here for our annual meeting without some reference to that great occasion.

Yet when one reviews the services, meetings and general activities that went to make up the whole of that large assembly in Cincinnati how can it be condensed to serve our purpose for only a few moments consideration today?

The subjects presented at that time were all too stupendous to receive but a casual remark, the services too inspiring to give them but a fleeting thought, and yet, there must be a message for us all, so perhaps we cannot do better than to take a composite view of the whole and let the dominant spirit express itself in the one word "Forward."

This is no new thought to be sure, but have we learned this old message so thoroughly that we qualify for a new?

Have we gone forward this past year in our own sphere of work, can we honestly say that we have made any real progress as members of the Woman's Auxiliary in our several branches?

We frequently hear it said that our working resources are limited, owing to the comparative isolation of most of our branches here in this District of Asheville, and I have the greatest sympathy for, and full understanding of this condition, but we can hamper ourselves too much with the indulgence of this idea, which if allowed to become fixed the message to go "Forward" will be called to deaf ears.

The Church at large working and praying "Thy Kingdom come" will lose impetus if one of her members allows herself the discouragement of her environment -- and who are we that we should dare to express limitations when "the Mighty Power of the Holy Ghost" is ours to command?



Therefore let us identify ourselves more earnestly with the spirit of progress as evinced in the Church today, and by prayer, study and activity rise to our privileges and opportunities to help in winning the world for Christ.

# MINUTES OF THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Of the District of Asheville

June 28th, 1911

The fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the District of Asheville was opened by Bishop Horner in the Biltmore school house on Wednesday June 28th, 1911, shortly before noon.

The Bishop spoke of the work of the Auxiliary as "most satisfactory in every way." He said the vacancy made in the Advisory Board by the death of Mrs. Chester had been filled by Mrs. Wetmore, who is now Secretary of Mission Study. Mrs. Wetmore having been Vice-President, it was necessary to fill this vacancy, which was done by the appointment of Mrs. Swope. Miss Roper had been offered the position of Organizing Secretary, and it was hoped that she would accept it.

The Bishop read part of an address by the Bishop of London in which he said: "This little span of life is an opportunity for adventurers for God." The evangelization of the world in this generation is the watchword for the young men of London. "The King's business needs haste."

At the close of his address, the Bishop asked Mrs. Bacon to take charge of the business meeting which was opened with roll call showing thirty-one delegates, in all seventy members. In connection with the roll call; Mrs. Bacon asked whether it would not be well to change the name of Micadale to Waynesville and of Nonah to Franklin, thus giving the post office address of each Mission. It was decided to make this change.

Mrs. Bacon spoke in her address of the Cincinnati Convention which has been held since our last Annual Meeting and asked the Auxiliary to take as its motto the word so often used at the Convention: "Forward".

The Treasurer's report, which was accepted as read, gave the gratifying word that the amount for General Missions had gone beyond the apportionment.

Seven hundred and thirty-nine dollars and seventy eight cents (\$739.78) had passed through the Treasurer's hands. The detailed statement will be printed later.



Miss Martin, in giving the report of the United Offering also referred to the Triennial Meeting in Cincinnati at which she said the Asheville Branch had done very well. She made a touching appeal to the treasurers to send their contributions to her on time, and we hope that no one will be delinquent next year. The report was accepted as read.

Mrs. Minor, Secretary of the Juniors, said that she made her report with a distinct sense of encouragement, not so much from the increased amount of money received, but from the better spirit and the greater interest in the work.

Mrs. Wetmore read the report of the Babies' Branch, Mrs. Norris being unavoidably absent.

Mrs. Bacon next read the resolutions in regard to the death of Mrs. Chester which were signed by the Bishop and officers and these were followed by the report of the Secretary of Mission Study, written by Mrs. Chester Lyman and most knidly read by Miss Patton.

The work of the Church Periodical Club was then presented by Mrs. Chapman, who asked for more interest, and read a special offer from the Churchman to the Clergy in the Missionary field.

Miss Lindley, Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, who had come to the meeting as Miss Emery's representative was introduced by Mrs. Bacon. Two letters and one important notice from Miss Emery were read by the Secretary.

The next business before the meeting was the work for the coming year. In the Foreign field Bishop Knight, Canal Zone, and Miss Ridgeley's work for native girls, Cape Mount, Africa were the two objects on which the vote was to be taken. This resulted in the choice of Bishop Knight, Canal Zone.

For Domestic work the choice lay between Bishop Brooke's Hospital, Oklahoma and Bishop Spalding's work in Utah. Bishop Brooke's Hospital was chosen, but there was a lengthy discussion as to whether the money should be given to pay the running expenses of the Hospital, or to reduce the debt of one thousand and eight hundred dollars, or to leave its use to the direction of Bishop Brooke. Mrs. Hemphill moved that the money raised be given for running expenses of the Hospital at McAlister. After much discussion and a very close vote, this motion was lost. Mrs. Chapman then moved that the money be given to Bishop Brooke to be used for the Hospital at McAlister at his discretion. After another close vote this motion was carried and the money is to be sent to Bishop Brooke for the Hospital. The meeting adjourned at half past one for luncheon at the Rectory and an hour later met again in the school house.



Mrs. Bacon introduced the Rev. H. C. Parke, who spoke of the Waynesville Missions, refering briefly to the six which have been under his charge. Canton has the largest pulp mill in the South, and needs a Church Industrial School, a bell, and a resident Clergyman. At Balsam there is a Church and a school, and "here the growth has been slow but healthful." A Church and a school are also at Micadale, where the great need is a drain for the Mission house. This will cost one hundred and four dollars, of which twenty-five dollars has been raised, leaving seventy-nine dollars, which Mr. Parke hopes the Auxiliary will give before the end of the year. The Mission at Sylva has almost died out; but at Cullowhee there is a large school and a Church, more than thirty years old. St. Michael's is the colored Church at Waynesville in connection with which there is a good school. A water supply is needed at Balsam.

Mrs. Wetmore spoke in her usual interesting way of Christ school of whose progress the Auxiliary is always glad to hear. There are now one hundred and sixty pupils in the school, sixty boarders, one hundred day pupils. If fifty dollars is given, a pupil is accepted, and allowed to work out his tuition. Mrs. Wetmore asked for a scholarship to be known as an Auxiliary scholarship, but later in the meeting it was moved and carried that, if the Auxiliary gives the fifty dollars; the scholarship shall be known as the "Thomas C. Wetmore Scholarship."

Miss Lindley was introduced as one who would speak "on a variety of subjects." Her first subject was Mission Study, and she urged the branches to take an intelligent interest in all the work. The order should be "study, pray, give." Several methods of work were presented, "the paper method, the lecture method and the discussion method." Miss Lindley strongly advocated the last method. Let each member have a copy of a book on the subject chosen, and after reading a chapter discuss it at the next meeting. She gave a vivid and inspiring account of some study classes she has known. The United Offering was another subject, and we were told how greatly this is needed to send out more Missionaries.

Mrs. Wetmore said; she hoped to have a simple institute of study class for the leaders of the different Parish Branches, which she would like to have meet at Christ School during the summer.

Rev. Walter J. Smith spoke briefly of the work done at the Thompson Orphanage, and showed pictures of the children in their games and drills.

Mrs. Minor gave a cordial invitation to the Auxiliary to meet at her home on Thursday morning to hear Miss Lindley address the Junior Auxiliary.



After a rising vote of thanks for "the recovery of our beloved President" and a rising vote of thanks to the members of the Auxiliary of All Souls' Church, the meeting adjourned until Thursday morning at ten o'clock.

The adjourned meeting was opened by the Rev. J. N. Atkins, the Minutes were read and after one amendment had been made, were accepted,

Miss Roper said that during the coming summer she would be able to do the work of Organizing Secretary.

Deaconess Adams spoke of St. Mary's Mission, Morganton, and told of the school work done at that place.

An interesting discussion as to the giving of clothing in the mission stations followed. Miss Adams' talk, and Mrs. Wilson of Micadale, Mrs. Joyner of Glen Alpine, Mrs. Chappell of the Good Shepherd, Morganton, and Mrs. Andrews gave their views on this important subject, and also spoke of the work in these interesting Missions.

As there was no further business the meeting stood adjourned.

## UNITED OFFERING REPORT

---

As we are to have the pleasure of hearing Miss Lindley, from the Church Mission House, New York, talk on the Auxiliary and the Junior work, and also on the United Offering, there are now, only a few facts about the United Offering in the district, to be given. They will not I think be without interest.

You hardly need to be reminded that since we were together in Waynesville last June, the Triennial meeting has come and gone. During those past three years we have done well, all of the 31 Auxiliaries in the District, the Junior Auxiliary the Babies' Branch, as well as individuals in Shelby, Mt. Island, and Asheville, (not members of the Auxiliary) have contributed towards the \$1,106.18, which was our part in the grand total of \$243,360.95 offered in Cincinnati, last October. Since then one hundred and forty letters and postals have been sent out, as well as many United Offering leaflets, and offerings have been received to the amount of \$275.78, more than we have had at any previous meeting held immediately after the Triennial meeting.

It is to be regretted that many Auxiliaries can not come up to time in sending in their contributions. There are still eight Branches from whom no communication has been received at all, next year we will try to be more prompt, will we not?

There is one feature of this United Offering which I often wonder if we fully realize and are trying to bring to fruition, and that is the giving of our lives to the work in the Mission field. Are we doing our part towards encouraging those who can go? Some of us can only help by the giving of our prayers, some by both prayers and money, but are there not others, who, if sustained, helped and encouraged can do the Master's will in the Field "white to the Harvest." Are there not some among us here, who are ready and willing to give themselves?

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF MISSION STUDY

### For the Year ending June 1st, 1911

As the Secretary of Mission Study was actively engaged in the work until the third quarter of the year, when the Master called her to higher service in the Paradise of God, it is fitting that a report should be given as usual.

During the first and second quarters a number of letters were written in reply to inquiries as to the work for the coming year, in each instance urging the Branches to make a special study of the field chosen for the quarter. I am sure the Secretary of Mission Study was encouraged by many of the letters received, for they showed that, as the result of much patient effort on her part, the Branch Secretaries were at last beginning to feel the need of systematic work and to understand her helpful office.

How much easier this work would have been, had the objects chosen been those about which there were some printed leaflets, no one will realize, until she herself has undertaken the task. As there was no available literature on the subject of the Embroidery School at Nara, a letter was written to Mr. Chapman of Japan, whose long and interesting answer was received the morning after Mrs. Chester was called to lay down all cares and responsibilities of this world and to join the "Choir invisible whose music is the gladness, of the world." Copies of this letter were printed and sent to the different branches, for this was the wish and intention of your Secretary, and in many cases great appreciation of this effort was shown in the letters of thanks and sympathy, received by the writer of this report.

The Grace Auxiliary had chosen for the object of work for the last quarter of the year, the Morganton Missions, and with almost prophetic vision that she would not be with the little band of faithful workers at that time, Mrs. Chester asked the Rev. Minor J. Peters last September to speak to the Auxiliary about that most interesting field. It is needless to say that the members of this Branch were deeply interested in his presentation of the work, and our Treasurer is able to see the practical result of these talks in the contribution for the Morganton Missions. It is not my province to suggest, merely to report, but I wish it were possible for each Branch to have the work of the chosen field presented by some one especially interested in that field. Intelligent interest always counts, and when the workers do not even know where the school or Mission for which they are working is situated, to say nothing of any more definite knowledge, how can we expect great results?

At our last Annual Meeting your Secretary of Mission Study sounded a note of encouragement, because she had found a more general interest in reading and in study, more earnestness, and a better spirit; and if we find it hard to "go on our way rejoicing," as was suggested last year, let us at least try to follow the Godly counsel of one who, "being dead, yet speaketh."

In glancing casually through the report there does not seem to be much difference. Though we have collected decidedly more money than last year, we can only boast of two new branches, while two or three of the old ones have given no signs of life even when questioned. But in my intercourse with the leaders of the branches I have had much to encourage me. There has been more promptness in response, more interest manifested in the work and more desire to make the branches faithful and zealous, and the gifts in money have been generous. When work or boxes were asked for, few if any have said they were unable to help, but many careful loving stitches have been taken by the young people, and the standard of gifts selected for the boxes is high, showing that the Juniors are learning the lesson that the poor mission children in the mountains, and the Indians, are not just heathens, and anything will do, but are young and like themselves, and have the same desires and are appealed to by the same amusements, and the careful selection of a gift bespeaks greater love and therefore begets greater love, and helps the forward movement and the uplift of those that are without, more than we can measure.

# WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DISTRICT OF ASHEVILLE

## CONSTITUTION

### I

The name of this Society is the Asheville Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

### II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the Missionary work of the whole church among the women of the District; to increase their interest and activity in the work; to encourage the formation of parish branches of this society; and by means of united and systematic efforts to prosecute the work of Church Extension.

### III.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, who shall perform the duties of the Treasurer; a Vice-President; a Recording Secretary; a Secretary for the Junior Branch; a Treasurer for the United Offering; a Secretary for Mission Study; a Secretary for Church Periodical Club; a Secretary for the Babies Branch and an Organizing Secretary.

These officers shall constitute the Advisory Board of the Auxiliary of the District. Vacancies in the Advisory Board shall be filled by appointment of the Bishop from nominations to him by the Advisory Board of two names for each vacancy. The Bishop may call together the Advisory Board at any time to make nominations for vacancies.

### IV.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, preside at them and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Society and as Treasurer to receive all money sent her and disburse the same in accordance with the determination of the Society at its annual meeting, making a detailed report of the same to the Society.

### V.

The duties of the Vice-President are to act as a member of the Advisory Board and in the absence of the President to preside at all meetings of the Society.

### VI.

The duties of the Recording Secretary are to keep the minutes of all meetings of the Society and with the President to have charge of the printing of its reports and other documents and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

### VII.

The duties of the Secretary for the Junior Branch are to call all meetings of the Juniors, to preside at them and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Juniors and as Treasurer to receive all money contributed by the Juniors and disburse the same in accordance with the determination of the Junior Society at its annual meeting.

### VIII.

The duties of the Secretary for the Babies Branch are to have the general oversight and direction of the work of the Babies and to receive and disburse the money contributed by the same.



## IX.

The duties of the Treasurer of the United Offering are to correspond with Parish Branches and with individuals in regard to this offering; to receive all money contributed therefor and to present the same at the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

## X.

The duties of the Secretary for Mission Stuny are to keep on hand a supply of literature on the Foreign, Domestic and District Missions of the Church and to advise with Parish Branches in regard to the study of the Missions of the Church.

## XI.

The duties of the Secretary for the Church Periodical Club are to correspond with the Parish Branches of this Club and to have the general oversight of the work of the Club in this district.

## XII.

The duties of the Advisory Board are to meet at the call of the President, to advise with her in regard to the general work of the Auxiliary in the District and to nominate to the Bishop names to fill vacancies in the Board. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

## XIII.

Each Parish Branch shall send to the President, acting as Treasurer, all money contributed for Missionary work, except such special contributions as the Branch may prefer to send direct to the beneficiary and shall make to the President an annual report of all work done by the branch.

## XIV.

There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Society at such time and place as may be determined upon by the Society itself and in the absence of such determination by the Society, the President, upon consultation with the Bishop, shall appoint the time and place of the Annual Meeting.

## XV.

At the Annual Meeting each Parish Branch shall be entitled to one delegate and an additional delegate for each additional ten members of the Branch after the first ten.

## XVI.

All officers of the Society shall make a report of all work done under their direction, to the Annual Meeting of the Society and the same shall be printed in the Annual Report of the Auxiliary.

## XVII.

At the Annual Meeting of the Society, any member of a Parish Branch shall be entitled to vote on all questions, unless there is a call by at least two delegates for a vote by Parish Branches, in which case only delegates shall be entitled to vote.

## XVIII.

This constitution may be amended by a two-third vote of the Society, voting by Parish Branches at any Annual Meeting, provided the Bishop approves of such ammendment.
