SECOND ANNUAL REPORT
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY DIOCESE OF ATLANTA

DEC 8, 1909.

The close of our second year brings together the women of the Diocese of Atlanta. It is good to see you once more and I hope we may gain much inspiration from the personal contact and the exchange of ideas and plans. It is much easier to talk to each other than it is to write, for letters often tell a tale between the lines of interruptions, bodily fatigue and the "duty" note, all of which takes away from the cheerful spirit in which we should confer together. I sometimes wonder if you ever stop and think how much time must be spent in the preparation of the Annual Report, the care required in reading the proof for the printer, mailing the books to the points; and then another labor, involving much time, is the preparation of the report to be sent each year to Miss Emery. It would make you more patient when requests come to you for items which constitute the basis of the reports, if you could know just how tedious these duties are, and I believe you would give a more cheerful and prompt compliance to the request to "fill out the blanks" if you did think of the other side of the question. A business method of entering the items carefully and promptly on your books, with names, dates, and amounts set down at the proper time, leaving no recourse to memory which is often so faulty, will be of the greatest help, as anyone could copy the items upon the report blanks, and thus make a hard task become an easy one.

I am glad to tell you our apportionment has been met, to the Board of Missions, and instead of two hundred dollars you have paid three hundred and eighty-one, which is an indication of your interest in the great missionary work being done in the Foreign and Domestic field. Mrs. Walker's report will show that you have done well for the Diocesan pledges also. I congratulate you upon this financial showing, and I believe we are in a condition to push forward in a more positive and earnest fashion than we have ever done before. As members of this blessed Church of ours, we have stood back too much, especially in the communities where the membership is small—like the twelve

apostles of old on the night of our Saviour's trial, while we have not actually denied the Master, we have not spoken up boldly and said, "we are His disciples; we are not ashamed to confess Him before Pilate, or Herod, or all the powers of earth."

We are rejoiced to know that more points are represented this year in the United Offering and in the Treasurer's report than heretofore. This is very encouraging and means that we are waking up to our duty and privileges.

Bishop Nelson has appointed a new officer in our Woman's Department, a "Missionary Deaconess" and I am sure you will be glad to meet Miss Eleanor Henry, the first appointee for this position, and to welcome her to your homes. She has been an active worker in the mission field for years and will be ready to tell you how you can best help the missionaries, whenever you invite her to do so.

Your offerings for the salary of our Woman's Auxiliary missionary have been abundantly blessed, and I hope you will be willing to continue them, as the Bishop wishes us to give this help again.

I have asked the Rev. Thomas Duck to tell us of his year's work, and you will certainly be thankful for the part you have had in it. I met with the women at one of his points, Elberton, on Nov. 19, and it was a joy to see their interest in the Church services. There were two gentlemen at the meeting also. Meetings have been held with the ladies of Marietta, College Park, St. Philip's Cathedral, All Saints and the Incarnation, Atlanta.

On May 17, Mrs. Heard, of Rome, arranged a most delightful meeting of the Rome Convocation. Four points were represented at the service, forty women and several gentlemen being present. The occasion was full of interest and good cheer—showing the good effects to be derived from these conferences.

It is with sincere regret we have had to accept the enforced resignation of the Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, Miss Nita Black, she was always earnest, faithful and full of enthusiasm. We are glad it was possible for Mrs. W. W. Curtis, of Columbus, to accept the Bishop's appointment to the position.

The Babies' Branch calls for your co-operation. Mrs. Blair is doing her best to arouse interest in her little mite boxes, and we hope the baby fingers that drop in the pennies with a prayer for the missionaries may increase in number. We ask for your con-

stant and earnest prayers for the spread of Christ's Kingdom, and for your personal and loving sympathy for all "the neighbors," big and little, young and old, who need you, your kind words and the tender touch of a friendly hand. After all, the personal gift of a "little deed of kindness, a little word of love," is often more blessed than the full purse which makes a bountiful gift of money possible.

Then, besides this, we must not be indifferent to "the gift of knowledge." We should study the "Spirit of Missions" and keep in touch with the heroes who are planting the flag of the Church side by side with the flag of our own country, and who are opening the way through commerce for the friendly intercourse of nations. In our own State, the Appleton Church Home, the Church House at Unity Mills, LaGrange, and the Benedict School, Cedartown, are open to your inspection at any time and appeal to your sympathies. It is a lack of knowledge which causes the remark so often made, "we do not believe in Foreign Missions." With knowledge comes interest and with interest comes the desire to have a share in the Master's work wherever it may be. In the heart of every one is the hope that we may enter the Kingdom of Heaven for our eternal rest, but if we do not give ourselves to holy duties while we are in the flesh, the question is, will we find congenial pursuits and enjoyable company in that Kingdom where Spiritual things leave no place for the all absorbing affairs of earth. Perhaps this thought may help us to re-consecrate our lives to the duties we are called upon to perform each day and each year.

THE OPENING SESSION OF THE AUXILIARY.

WEDNESDAY.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta held its annual meeting Dec. 8, at the same time the Council was holding its second meeting.

Bishop Nelson made a short address of welcome, and nominated the officers for the ensuing year. The roll call showed responses from 18 points, and an attendance of about 110 women, with a representative from the Charleston, S. C. branch.

Mrs. E. S. Gay spoke a few words of welcome, to which Mrs. H. C. White, of Athens, responded.

The meeting was then called to order by the President, Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, who gave her annual address, in which she made an earnest appeal for more zeal in our missionary work. This strong address will be published in full in the Corresponding Secretary's Report. She bespoke special aid to be given the Deaconess whom Bishop Nelson will place in the diocese to aid in parochial and mission work.

Reports from the Treasurer and Convocation Secretaries were next in order, and showed a fine financial result from the year's work, and marked increase over previous years.

Mrs. T. S. Lewis, Custodian of the United Offering made her report, followed by Mrs. Alexander Blair, Secretary Babies' Branch.

Invitations were extended to lunches and a tea, that all might enjoy the social side of the meeting and become better acquainted.

After much profitable discussion the meeting adjourned until 2 P. M.

After the enjoyment of a bountiful luncheon to which the Council was also invited, the Woman's Auxiliary again convened.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Bishop at the second session introduced Deaconess Henry, who made a most interesting address, appealing to the ladies for their help and co-operation in the work she was to take up in our State.

Mrs. E. LeConte Furman, from Macon, was called upon for her report, in which she stressed the duties of the secretary's office, and the opportunities for missionary services.

The Auxiliary then adjourned, to hear the Bishops address to the Council.

Telegrams of good wishes were received from Miss Sara White, of Tallulah.

THURSDAY.

The meeting on Thursday was most interesting, dealing in the detailed work of the different sections.

The opening address was by Rev. Mr. Duck, the Woman's Auxiliary Missionary of North Georgia, giving an account of his different points and their awakened interest. The Church at Clarkesville under his care has one of the oldest church buildings in the State, built in 1838, was where the first Bishop of Georgia was consecrated.

Rev. J. J. Perry spoke on the subject of "The Church School a Burning Necessity in Our Work. Graduates Keeping Alive the Church in Remote Places in the State and Stimulating Education."

Mrs. Mallory Taylor made a plea for Barnesville, and urged the personal touch in Church work.

Sister Louise gave, as she always does, an interesting talk on her care at the Appleton Church Home.

Brief, helpful addresses were made by Mrs. Scarritt, from Milledgeville, and Miss Rosa Woodberry on "How we can best help the Bishop"; Mrs. Furman, of Fort Valley, Mrs. Shaefer, of Toccoa; Mrs. T. S. Lewis on the "United Offering."

The reports were interrupted to hear Rev. George Benedict and Rev. Henry Phillips, on the work in Cedartown and La-Grange, of vital interest to the women of the Church. A plea was made from the Benedict School for a Bible Woman, to instruct the poor and ignorant. The Auxiliary authorized that one be selected.

Mr. Phillip's work and its growth among the mill people showed wonderful progress in the temporal and spiritual uplift of his people.

Miss Almira Parker, of Cedartown, was introduced as the new Secretary of the Rome Convocation, vice Mrs. E. A. Heard.

The Memorial Report made by Mrs. Charles L. Pettigrew, was received standing.

Miss Woodberry offered the following resolutions which were adopted:

Resolved, That the Auxiliary express its hearty appreciation of the services of Miss Nita Black as President of the Junior Auxiliary, with deep regret that ill health causes her to lay down the work. We rejoice that she is regaining strength and health.

Resolved, That in the resignation of Mrs. E. A. Heard, Secretary of the Rome Auxiliary, the Convocation has lost a valued officer and worker, and we are sorry to give her up.

Resolved, That sympathy be expressed in the sorrow of Mrs. Robert Emory Park, our valued co-worker, and our sense of loss in her absence.

Resolved, That we tender our sympathy to Mrs. T. S. Lewis in her sorrow and bereavement, and to our Bishop's household in the sickness there that has kept Mrs. Nelson from our midst, whose presence is always so valued and enjoyed.

Resolved, That the earnest thanks of the Auxiliary be given Bishop Nelson for securing Deaconess Henry to aid in the missionary work of the diocese, and that we pledge our hearty co-operation with our prayers.

Resolved, That the Auxiliary express its thanks for the beautiful hospitality of St. Luke's congregation in their homes; for the bountiful luncheons served us in the parish hall and for their delightful reception at the beautiful home of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Howard.

RECEPTION OF AUXILIARY REPORT BY CONVENTION.

The Report of the Auxiliary was presented to the Council at the third day's session by the Rev. Troy Beatty. The Bishop read the detailed Report, and commended the officers and members most heartily, on this splendid result, showing marked progress, and congratulated the Auxiliary in giving themselves as well as their means to the work. The Report was received standing, as a mark of appreciation, by the Council.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING.

A meeting of the Executive Board was held with Mrs. Black, the President of the Auxiliary, in the chair, Friday afternoon, Dec. 10, the following members being present: Mrs. O'Hear, Walker, Rhodes Brown, Furman, Coles, Lewis, Hart, Miss Woodberry.

A resolution was passed requesting Bishop Nelson to continue Mr. Duck as the Woman's Auxiliary Missionary for 1910.

Mrs. T. S. Lewis was authorized to incorporate the Birth-day Fund into the United Offering under the same head.

The Convocation Secretaries were urged to make as many personal visits as possible to their points.

After a pleasant interchange of plans and ideas the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF MRS. T. S. LEWIS, CUSTODIAN.

From a money point of view my report is rather disappointing; it shows a gain of \$51.21 over last year, still the Auxiliary should give as much in one year as she has in the two. panionship of your loved ones that there are two hundred women who have given up their homes and left their kindred, to go to strange lands and carry the gospel and the hope and enlightenment that always goes with it, to the poor ignorant women there, and that you have promised to give them the means to carry on the work in our Lord's vineyard already and to spread it still farther. It is a debt of honor; let us not fail to pay it.

LETTERS FROM CONVOCATION SECRETARIES.

ATHENS CONVOCATION.

In submitting this, my second report, for the Athens Convocation, I feel that we have cause to rejoice that there has been progress made—with one exception. Composed entirely of mission stations, very few of the points have even a church building, and at many points one family or maybe the one woman, to bear the standard of the Church—great things cannot be expected. And, yet, if we will each in the coming year realize that we each have a part in the Church's work to do, with united hearts and efforts, great things can be accomplished. I regret that some of the points failed to respond to my request for a report, and that at others—Clarksville for one—the work was so recently organized, that a financial report was not possible. But more points are active this year than last. Our women have learned what an inspiration and help it is to have a letter answered promptly—a great step in the work—and I trust that in the coming year, as we work together to that end, the work will grow and prosper as never before.

COLUMBUS CONVOCATION.

The Secretary of the Columbus Convocation has been diligent through the past year in writing to the various points in the Convocation, numbering in all eight points. An average of five letters, total forty, having been sent out, urging the organization of an Auxiliary at each point. Five points out of eight in the Convocation replied to the Secretary's letters, but owing to the scarcity of members, Auxiliaries are in operation only at Columbus, LaGrange, and West Point. Good reports come from all these points, and we hope by next year to have a Woman's Auxiliary flourishing at Talbotton.

MACON CONVOCATION.

I think we can claim that there has been a decided growth in missionary spirit during the past year. While the Auxiliary seems not entitled to any share in the large increase of the grand total on the tabulated report in actual dollars, yet, undoubtedly, that increase is in a large measure due to the missionary spirit.

That distinctly Auxiliary work does not show a proportionate increase in figures, is explained by circumstances we have not space to go into now—\$212 of the work reported by Christ Church and society is purely missionary, and increased interest in Missions is strikingly evident at every point.

During the year we have held two Convocation meetings of the Auxiliary in Macon. On Jan. 18th, I called the first one to meet in Christ Church; but left before that date for California, and the meeting was conducted by the Assistant Secretary.

I was absent from the Diocese until October 5th, so that I have but a short record of work to give. The duties of the Secretary are not clearly defined, but it seems to me she might be a link between the Branches in her territory—to enter into the work of each and communicate to each her interest and sympathy in the others, in some sense to unify the work of all. Thus I visit each Branch as a member and not as a stranger.

Between Oct 8th and Dec 1st, I visited five Branches and wrote 24 letters.

Oct 8th, met with St. Paul's Branch, Macon, and gave a brief talk on Auxiliary work in California.

Oct. 15th. Met with Christ church Branch, Macon. and spoke briefly on the same line, especially in regard to the United Offering and Babies Branch.

Nov. 1st. Met with St. Stephen's Branch, Milledgeville This was an encouraging and inspiring meeting. A very unusual and ideal condition is found here, in that practically every woman in the Parish works actively in the Auxiliary.

Nov. 3. By the Rector's invitation, I attended the semi-annual meeting of the Guilds of Christ church, and was interested in the splendid reports there made.

Nov. 9th. Met with and joined St. Andrew's Branch, Fort Valley. Ten members were present and gave me such a cordial welcome. I must call attention to a distinguishing mark of this mission—it has had no organized society of women except the Auxiliary. They began on the true principal of church life, to build up a Parish through the missionary spirit. They will work up to a Guild through the Auxiliary instead of putting the cart before the horse. I left twelve United offering boxes.

Nov. 21st. I met a faithful band of five in Barnesville. They gave me five other names and organized All Saints Branch, allow-

ing me to become a member of it. The situation here is a very pathetic and they have little to encourage them, but we can help them with our sympathy and prayers and work. Christ church, Macon, is doing much for them, and I think every well-established parish should follow her example and adopt a struggling mission, foster it and make it a success. A rich reward would be reaped, not only there, but at home as well. I left ten United Offering boxes.

I am sorry I was unable to reach Sparta before this meeting, but will do so as soon as practicable. Only three women compose this Branch. Yet they report \$18—\$7.00 of which was given to missions.

Nov. 23rd. Held the Second Convocation meeting in St. Paul's, Macon, with delegates from Milledgeville and Fort Valley in attendance from outside Macon. We hope very much to increase the attendance at these meetings, as the Branches become better acquainted and more interested in one another. Here as always, I made a plea for the United Offering, which seems to me a special work for the Auxiliary, not surpassed in importance by any other work. In our Convocation each Branch has a special officer for this work, whose duty it is not only to make semi-annual collections, where boxes are not turned in, but to arouse interest in and talk up the offering on each possible occasion. I would also urge that this semi-annual offering should be a real offering upon the altar at a special service.

ATLANTA CONVOCATION.

The last year has not been altogether satisfactory. We have gone forward in some places only to fall short in others.

I wish to thank the officers of the Auxiliary and other societies of women connected with the churches of the Atlanta Convocation for correct and prompt replies to my letters and calls for pledges and yearly reports. I wish to express my grateful appreciation of their promptness and beg for a continuance of their kindness in the coming year. During the year closing Dec. 1st 1909, I wrote fifty-seven letters, received thirty-seven replies, made seven visits to the Auxiliary meetings, and talked to about one hundred and thirty women about missions.

At the end of a year's work, a good business man always takes

stock to find out just what his profits are, what stock he has on hand and his resources for another year's work. This is what it means for me when we meet together once a year to make our report and talk over the work we expect to do. The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions is strictly a business organization, dealing not only in dollars and cents, but in human lives, our brother's lives, crying to us for daily bread; men and women we have promised to pay for work done in the Master's vineyard, while we remain at home to pursue our own avocation, of either business or pleasure. We should try to realize this, and when we do, this debt will come first. We have promised to pay and it is a sort of a "debt of honor" that must be met.

ROME CONVOCATION.

We have great reason for encouragement in the growth of interest in the mission work of the Church, as shown by many persons in this section. The Church women of Dalton, Cedartown and Rome are wide awake to their duties and have made excellent reports. The Auxiliary in Kingston, though small in number, has done valuable service in distributing church literature in that immediate neighborhood.

A meeting of the Rome Convocation was held in St. Peter's Church, Rome, May 17,—there were forty women present, and three gentlemen. Dalton, Cedartown, Rome and Atlanta were represented. Rev. Mr. Hudgins opened the morning session with prayer, and Mrs. Black, President of the Auxiliary, made addresses on the subject of Missions and the opportunities for spreading the gospel through personal instruction of children in our immediate neighborhoods. Lunch was served to all present by the women of St. Peter's, and after a pleasant hour the second session was called to order to hear an informal talk from Miss Nita Black, Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary. We all felt that the joint meeting was full of help and inspiration and was greatly enjoyed by all present. I regret very much the necessity of sending in my resignation as Secretary and ask for my successor the same spirit of co-operation which has been shown to me.

BABIES BRANCH.

REPORT OF MRS. ALEXANDER BLAIR, SECRETARY.

I have been at the head of this branch of the Auxiliary work only since March.

There were seven points reported last year. I have written to all the sixty-two points represented in the five Convocations. Thirty-five made no reply, while twenty-eight replied with the result of thirteen established branches.

Two of these branches, Fort Valley and Milledgeville, are only a month old and have no report for this Convocation.

EXPLANATION OF THE JOINT PLEDGES OF THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY FOR THE DIOCESE OF ATLANTA.

UNITED OFFERING.

The United Offering in which every woman is asked to join represents especial birthday and other thank offerings, over and above general missionary work. This is presented triennially, and from it comes, through the Board of Missions, the means of supporting women workers in all parts of the field, to build schools, churches, and homes for the clergy, and to educate and train women workers, and the care of such workers, when sick or disabled. "To it we bring the incense of love, poured out in thankful gifts for special mercies, in memory of loved ones, for the everdaily mercies which bless us all. And if each woman in every parish gives something every day as she numbers her blessings, and with it the daily prayer, how near she must live to the Master, and imbibe of His spirit, thus helping herself, while the influence of such good work circles the whole church in loving deeds, spreads the Gospel, and hastens His coming."

THE EXPENSE FUND.

Each parish and mission is asked to contribute some little amount towards the expense fund which meets the expenses of the publication of the Minutes, circulars and report blanks, postage, &c., and also pays the expenses of missionaries invited to address the Auxiliary.

GUANTANAMO, CUBA SCHOLARSHIP.

A child is supported and educated in the large school of over two hundred students in Guantanamo, Cuba, by the Bishop Knight Scholarship, established at the suggestion of Mrs. Nellie Peters Black in 1905 when the convention met in Macon. This flourishing church school is most popular throughout that section of Cuba, and its opportunities are only limited by its endowment.

BIBLE WOMAN IN JAPAN.

Mrs. Hiratsuka is the native Bible Woman supported by Georgia women in Sendai, Japan. This was proposed by Mrs. Alexander and established in 1889, when the convention met in the Cathedral in Atlanta. As is well known, the duties of a Bible Woman are many and varied. She visits and nurses the sick, trains the women, has Sunday School classes, assists in teaching

and preparing for confirmation, cares for the church furnishings, and is general parish visitor. A native woman is particularly valuable when trained for this work.

BIBLE WOMAN IN CHINA.

The training of a Bible Woman in Wuchang, China, fits her for doing the same service among the native women as is done in Japan by trained workers. This pledge was also adopted at the meeting held May 1908, at St. Phillip's Cathedral.

BENEDICT SCHOOL, CEDARTOWN.

Rev. George Benedict is devoting his life to the education and betterment of the boys and girls in the rural districts of North Georgia. The needs are many and various, the cause a worthy one which appeals very closely to the hearts of those who have visited his school. Money and clothing are always acceptable.

THE APPLETON CHURCH HOME,

for girls in Macon receives orphan girls from baby-hood up to sixteen years—the children receive the best of care, the training, moral, religious, and industrial is excellent—the annual boxes sent from various churches are always most welcome.

BISHOP BECKWITH COT, ST. BARNABAS HOSPITAL, OSAKA, JAPAN.

This pledge was made at the meeting held in Atlanta at the Cathedral, May 1908—and takes the place of the one formerly filled by the Macon and Thomasville churches.

SETTLEMENT WORK—CHURCH MISSIONS HOUSE, UNITY MILLS,

LA GRANGE.

Under the direct management of Rev. Henry D. Phillips, a kindergarten for the little children of the mills, a circulating Library, and Sunday services with a Sunday School, are conducted with great success. Two women supported by the United Offering, assist in the work—gifts of money, clothing, books and household supplies, are needed for this object.

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY MISSIONARY.

In order to mark the appreciation of the women for Bishop Nelson's choice of the Diocese of Atlanta as his Episcopate, Mrs. Black suggested, at a meeting held in St. Luke's Sunday School room, November 27, 1907, that we should raise \$600.00 dollars a year to be used towards the support of a clergyman to be known as the "Woman's Auxiliary Missionary." This suggestion was accepted with enthusiasm, and it was assumed as one of the "joint pledges"—after receiving the endorsement of Bishop Nelson.

BY-LAWS OF THE ATLANTA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY.

I. This Society shall be called the Atlanta Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

II. Its object is by united and sympathetic action, to increase the interest, and unite all Parishes in the Diocese in the various branches of the Church's Missionary work, General, Diocesan or local.

III. All Baptised women of the Diocese of Atlanta, who work for Missions, shall be regarded as members of this Society.

IV. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Treasurer of the United Offering, President of the Junior Auxiliary and President of the Babies' Branch, to be appointed by the Bishop at the annual meeting.

V. All Parish Societies in the Diocese, which so desire, shall be considered constituent members of this Society, provided they send their reports of money collected and work done for Missions to their respective Parish Representatives in the Board of Managers.

VI. The Board of Managers shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, the Treasurer of Special Funds, the Junior President and President Babies Branch, Secretary of each Convocation and the Parish Representatives. Three shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VII. There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Special Funds, who shall have authority between regular semi-annual meetings, to appropriate funds in the hands of the Treasurer. Three to be a quorum.

VIII. Each Parish or Mission with a Society or Societies working for Missions shall be entitled to four Representatives in the Board, one of whom shall be their Corresponding Secretary.

IX. There shall be two meetings of the Board of Managers each year, to be held as follows: On or about the last Friday, respectively, in February, and the annual meeting which shall be held on before the Friday following the Diocesan Convention.

X. One or more of said meetings may be also a general meet-

ing of the Society and shall be directed by the Bishop of the Diocese.

XI. The meetings shall be held in any Church or Chapel designated by the Bishop.

XII. Special meetings may be called by the President at the request of the Bishop or of any five of the Managers.

XIII. 1. The President shall call meetings and preside over them.

2. The Vice-President shall take the duties of the President in her absence.

3. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society; send notices of the meetings, and keep a record of them; keep an account of the work done by the women of the Diocese, as reported by the Parish Secretaries.

4. The President shall report annually to the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York and prepare an Annual report for circulation in the Diocese, a review of which shall be presented to the Diocesan Convention.

5. The Treasurer, under the direction of the Board or Executive Committee, shall receive and disburse all money sent to the Society for any branch of Missionary work, and for the expenses of the Society, presenting a report of same at each semi-annual meeting.

XIV. The Parish Representatives to report through their Corresponding Secretary to the Diocesan Secretary all work done for Missions, and all money raised for Missions by the women of their Parishes; also all new work undertaken for Missions. They are to attend the regular meetings of the Board and to carry back to their Parish Societies Missionary intelligence, and to endeavor in every way to increase an earnest and prayerful interest in Missions.

XV. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Board of Managers present.
