MRS. BLACK'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

The presentation of the third report to the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta is of particular interest this year because it is our privilege to assemble in the parish of Holy Trinity, Columbus, where the final decision was reached as to the practicability of dividing the Diocese of Georgia. As we look back to the bright May day in 1906, when we listened to the report of the special committee which took favorable action in this important matter, we can recall the feeling of sadness which filled our hearts and the sense of doubt also, because no one could foresee what the result might be. Besides all this, we were wondering which side would gain our dear Bishop Nelson, and he certainly kept us guessing for a good many months, until finally the decision was made in favor of the new Diocese, to our very great joy, and now the work has passed beyond the experimental stage and we feel that God's blessing has rested upon it. Do you wonder that we are glad to be in Columbus again, bringing the garnered sheaves of the third year of woman's work in the young Diocese.

It is again my pleasure to tell you that our apportionment to the Board of Missions has been more than met. I find that we were asked to give as follows: For 1909-1910, the Women, \$200; Juniors, \$100; Babies, \$20—Total, \$320. According to Miss Emery's letter of recent date, she has really received from the Women \$268.75; Juniors, \$100.09; Babies, \$64.30—total, \$433.14, an increase of \$113.00. Last year the excess was \$181, but our Treasurer, Mrs. Walker, will show that your gifts through her office have exceeded those of last year, and Mrs. Lewis with over 1200 dollars for the United Offering, which was presented in your name at the Triennial, in Cincinnati, will tell you that this was only \$400 less than was given by the whole State three years ago, and it is four hundred dollars more than was sent by the Diocese of Georgia this year. These facts are very encouraging, and I congratulate you upon the systematic manner in which your offerings have been sent through our Treasurer.

Your President has had the pleasure of holding a Convocation meeting in each of the five divisions of the Diocese, in company with Mrs. Lewis, who represented the United Offering in such an

enthusiastic way, that a new and vivid interest has been aroused in this branch of our Woman's Work. The first of these meetings was held in Macon at the residence of Mrs. Mallory Taylor, on April 27, twenty women being present.

On the next day Mrs. Furman called the meeting of the Macon Convocation to order in St. Stephen's Church, Milledgeville, and 35 women were assembled together, there being delegates from Macon, Sparta, Atlanta, Milledgeville. The occasion was very delightful in every way and was enjoyed by every one, the services in the Church which preceded and followed the Woman's Session being particularly impressive and solemn.

On Sunday, May 1st, it was my privilege to attend a most notable service in the old Church at Clarkesville, it being the 70th anniversary of the election of Bishop Elliott as the first Bishop of Georgia. Bishop Reese assisted Bishop Nelson in the service and a large congregation filled the Church in the morning. In the afternoon, Mrs. Hart presided over a meeting of the Athens Convocation, 25 persons being present. They represented six points, Toccoa, Demorest, Union Point, Cornelia, Clarkesville, Atlanta. This meeting was particularly interesting, because we were formally welcomed by some women of the Methodist and Baptist churches. This showed a friendly spirit of co-operation among the christian workers of this historic town, which was very delightful.

On May 11th, Miss Lewis and I made a trip to Rome. The Convocation meeting was called to order by Miss Almira Parker, in St. Peter's Church. Thirty-seven persons were present. Kingston, Cartersville, Cedartown sent delegates. The women of St. Peter's are rejoicing in the completion of the tower to their handsome stone church, the larger part of the expense having been paid by their societies.

The Atlanta Convocation met in St. Phillip's Cathedral, with Mrs. A. P. Coles in the chair. After the morning session, the one hundred women who were present were entertained at a delicious lunch by St. Phillip's ladies, and the Bishop with quite a number of the clergy were also guests of the occasion. An afternoon session was highly enjoyed and quite a number of resolutions were presented, which will be acted upon by your body in due time.

Early in June, while in LaGrange for a short time, I arranged

with Rev. Henry Phillips for an Auxiliary hour at the Good Shepherd Mission, and about fifteen women were assembled to hear of our work and to tell us of theirs.

Dr. Brewster, assisted by Mrs. Phillips, served tea to her guests, and we were invited to inspect the building and to see the kindergarten babies on their circle. It is wonderful how much Mr. Phillips and these good women have accomplished among the mill people and we commend the work most highly. I wish you could have seen the beautiful, well kept flower gardens surrounding these homes. I counted at least twenty-five of them. All of these are the result of the personal influence of Miss Flemmie Ward, who has for years been supplying seeds and cuttings from her own, old-fashioned, box-bordered, flower garden, which will always recall to me the white-haired mother who welcomed me years ago to the home. It is impossible to conceive of a more beautiful way to perpetuate the memory of her life than to bring to these people, whose lives are so hard and so devoid of poetry or beauty of any kind, the charm of these old time roses and lilies.

To sum up the result of these various meetings, I find that there were about 300 persons representing 28 points, to whom we had the honor of presenting the objects of our Auxiliary, and it was a rare pleasure to meet so many earnest-minded women who are doing the Master's work, often in remote places where service represents much self-denial and very little of the easy settled comfort of well organized Church effort.

Our program for this present occasion has been arranged so that you may hear from the notable workers in the Diocese, namely, your Woman's Auxiliary Missionary, Rev. Thos. Duck, Dr. Mary Brewster, resident physician of the Good Shepherd, LaGrange, Sister Louise, of Appleton Church Home, Deaconess Henry, our Woman Missionary, Rev. Henry Phillips and Rev. George Benedict. So I will not anticipate the interesting accounts they will give you of their various activities.

We are sorry that Mrs. Curtis found it impossible to retain her position of President of the Juniors, but the Bishop has appointed Miss L'Engle to fill the place and we are sure she will do good work, with your sympathetic assistance.

We congratulate Mrs. Blair upon her success with the Babies Branch and ask for her your active co-operation.

Five years ago I made my first report as head of the Woman's Auxiliary for the Diocese of Georgia, in Trinity Church, and it seems a strange coincidence that this, my last report before your new President takes the chair, should be made in the same Church. You have borne with me most patiently as your leader, and I beg you to accept my love and gratitude for the many acts of courtesy and hospitality you have shown me, and to beg you will forgive me for my failures, and think only of the happy hours we have spent together. Always remember that sympathy, love and human kindness will smooth the path for those who lead the way, and who stumble along over dark and rough places very often.

I bespeak your abundant kindness for your new President, whose appointment has just been announced to you by our dear Bishop. She brings to you a heart full of love and good will and a spiritual insight of the things which pertain to the Kingdom of God.

THE ANNUAL CONVENTION.**WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION.**

The third annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta, met in Columbus at Trinity Church, December 7th, immediately following the opening service of the Council, the Celebration of the Holy Communion.

The Auxiliary was opened by the Bishop with prayer, and a brief address, in which he urged the members to serve one another—not confining their efforts to congregational demands, but keeping in mind that they are part of a whole, have a wide outlook, not influenced by sectionalism nor soul near-sightedness. The whole world will be akin when we are more kind. Be an auxiliary to the missionary work of the Church both at home and abroad.

The Bishop expressed great sorrow in giving up Mrs. Black as president of the Auxiliary, his appreciation of her services for missions and his own sense of her worth. He spoke of how difficult it is to lay down a valued duty cheerfully, and yet the joy in believing there are others ready and willing to carry on the work. He spoke also of the faithful work of Mrs. T. S. Lewis for the United Offering and Mrs. Isabel S. O'Hear as Secretary, so lovely and charming in all her services. He spoke also of the great loss to the Junior Auxiliary of the leadership of Miss Nita Black and of Mrs. W. W. Curtis. He commended to the interest and cooperation of the Auxiliary the work of the Rev. Thomas Duck, and of the diocesan woman helper, Miss Henry, who has been eminently successful in her work at Lindale.

Gracious words of welcome and strong sympathy in the Missionary work of the Church were made by Mrs. Robert Carter of Columbus, a cordial response being made by Mrs. A. P. Coles.

Following the address of the president, which is printed on a subsequent page and in which Mrs. Black expressed joy in the bringing in the sheaves since the division of the diocese, a motion was carried expressing the appreciation of the Auxiliary of Mrs. Black's faithful service and deep regret in her resigning the office.

The Bishop's nominations for the officers to serve the coming

year were then accepted: President, Mrs. E. LeConte Furman; Vice-President, _____; Secretary, Miss Rosa Woodberry; Treasurer, Mrs. R. M. Walker; Custodian United Offering, Mrs. Mallory Taylor; President Junior Auxiliary, Miss Edith L'Engle; President Babies Branch, Mrs. Alexander Blair; Convocation Secretaries—Atlanta, Mrs. A. P. Coles; Athens, Mrs. John C. Hart; Columbus, Mrs. Robert Carter; Macon, _____; Rome, Miss Almira Parker. The early distribution of the pledge cards at this time secured a most satisfactory return of pledges from many parishes and missions before adjournment.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

After a beautiful luncheon served the Auxiliary with the Council, a largely attended session was held, when the splendid Convocation reports were read, all the Secretaries being present but one. These reports showed great progress and a total of \$15,832.56 given for various missionary and parochial purposes the past year, showing a large gain over preceding years.

This consolidated report was sent to the Convention, and read by the Bishop with warmest commendation, the Council standing. The Auxiliary was invited to seats on the floor during the session. Accompanying the report was a resolution of congratulation from the Auxiliary that the Council had made such a splendid report of missionary progress in the diocese the past year, and expressing appreciation of the Bishop's leadership in this great work.

Greetings from the Auxiliary of Georgia were brought by the Rev. James B. Lawrence. He spoke of the loving bonds of sympathy and interest between the two, and the earnest zeal for souls and deep faith in prayer of Georgia's president, Mrs. Elliott. He urged that Atlanta strive to extend its Auxiliary work so that the forty seven counties with no Church influence might be brought in contact with the Church. Greetings from Atlanta to Georgia were sent in earnest appreciation, and expressions of the great value Mrs. Elliott was to the Auxiliary in its conferences at the Cincinnati General Convention and what a joy it was to the representatives of Atlanta to be there with her in representing Georgia. Her counsels were frequently sought, and her presence a sweet pleasure at its conferences and social gatherings. Those representing Atlanta in Cincinnati

were Mrs. E. LeConte Furman, Miss Rosa Woodberry, Mrs. Mallory Taylor, Mrs. Ragland, Deaconess Wood, Mrs. Troy Beatty, Mrs. F. B. Murray, Miss Mitchell.

Miss Rosa Woodberry made a short address giving some missionary aspects of the Cincinnati General Convention, quoting some of the great thoughts of the Convention and giving an account of the great United Offering Service of means and self. Mrs. Furman told of the deep spirituality pervading the Convention and stressed the power of prayer.

The Junior Auxiliary report was received with highest praise. Miss Edith L'Engle, the President, reported \$883.04, for missions, and asked for advice as to what to do with the grown up Juniors. She was advised by the Auxiliary to try to secure them as Junior leaders, and to try in any event to keep them in either the Junior or Woman's Auxiliary. The Treasurer submitted a report that was received with great enthusiasm. Mrs. R. M. Walker congratulated the Auxiliary on having met all its obligations and twenty six points having sent offerings.

Mrs. Alexander Blair presented the Babies report, \$98.40 for missions, and urged all parishes to send to her for boxes and form a local branch. Mrs. T. S. Lewis reported for the United Offering that Atlanta's Triennial offering in Cincinnati was \$1210.47 for 1910.

THURSDAY MORNING.

After prayers read by Miss Woodberry, Sister Louise told of the Appleton Church Home. She described the daily life of the orphan children there and of their success in life after they left the home. She elicited a cordial response from the Auxiliary which it was hoped would result in substantial aid.

The Rev. Thomas Duck was listened to eagerly as he told of the gradual growth of his mountain missions, with the assistance of the Rev. Malcolm Lockhart, recently ordained Deacon.

Mr. Duck told of the great celebration of Bishop Elliott's consecration, seventy years ago in Clarkesville, last spring, and the cooperation of all the denominations in the arrangements. He spoke of the growing interest in his mountain stations, particularly in Elberton, where there is a Sunday School and four have been confirmed. Toccoa is aiding the Appleton Church Home, along with its many other lines of activity.

The Rev. Henry D. Phillips gave a strong presentation of the growing needs of his work at LaGrange. He secured \$15,000 for a training school for mission workers for a dormitory, and needs about \$2,000 a year more to run it. The Settlement work now includes a night school, kindergarten, infirmary, kindergarten and nursery courses with Bible study. While working side by side with various denominations, yet the Church has control of this mission and its interests. Through the operation of the Holy Spirit people have turned naturally to serve Christ in the Communion that brought Christ to them. The Charter requires that control shall never pass from the Church and we are not timid in declaring our faith. Mr. Phillips asked for books and a \$300 scholarship to train a girl to carry on this work. The mill owners gave \$14,000 and two acres with three thousand a year annuity, and we were not tempted to deny our Faith nor did we fail to proclaim it, in accepting this generous gift to aid us in operating for humanity in the name of Christ Jesus. All is done in the spirit of prayer.

The Auxiliary then knelt in silent prayer for this work.

Dr. Brewster of the LaGrange Settlement then told of local conditions and their means of helping and strengthening. Her address made a profound impression. The Auxiliary voted to try to maintain a \$300 scholarship to train a girl there. Those pledging immediately were: Mrs. N. P. Black \$25.00, Mrs. John C. Hart \$5.00, Mrs. E. LeConte Furman \$10.00, Mrs. T. S. Lewis \$5.00, Mrs. A. P. Coles \$5.00, Mrs. Whiteside, of Columbus, \$25.00. Miss Henry, the Diocesan woman missionary, then gave an earnest account of her work in the mill district at Lindale among five thousand souls, going from house to house among the dirty and the needy and the sick. The people have grown better. They need the Church. She asked for the Georgia women's prayers for her and them.

Mrs. Black then gave an account of the great work being done at the Benedict Memorial School for the poor and ignorant. On motion the Bishop was asked to send a missionary there to aid Mrs. Benedict, using the funds of the Auxiliary for her support until summer, as this is an immediate need.

On motion of Mrs. T. S. Lewis it was resolved to appropriate \$300 a year to the support of the North Georgia Missionary.

The resignation of Mrs. Rhodes Brown as the Convocation Secretary for Columbus was accepted with great regret.

Acting on a resolution referred by the Auxiliary in Cincinnati, it was voted that only such money and boxes as are sent through the Church Missions House be reported to the Auxiliary Secretary of the General Board.

Congratulations were extended the Holy Comforter on becoming a parish and on sending such a splendid representation to Columbus.

Great happiness was expressed to the Rev. Thomas Duck on his great work in North Georgia as the Auxiliary's missionary.

Resolutions were adopted expressing the sense of loss in the absence of Mrs. C. K. Nelson and rejoicing with the Bishop in her returning health and strength; in the great regret of the Auxiliary in the retirement from office of Mrs. Lewis, Mrs. Curtis, Mrs. O'Hear and Mrs. Rhodes Brown; in the pleasure of the Auxiliary of the Bishop's appointment of a diocesan woman missionary, and of congratulating the Council on its splendid missionary report from the Treasurer under the inspiration of its missionary Bishop.

Resolutions of appreciation were passed for the beautiful hospitality of the Columbus ladies and the two delicious luncheons served. Presented by the resolution committee, Mrs. H. Hart, Mrs. A. Blair, Mrs. J. L. Tison.

The report of the Memorial Committee was received standing. Miss Woodberry asked for parish items for the Auxiliary News, and aid in its wide distribution without cost.

Mrs. Furman was presented by Mrs. Black to the Auxiliary, who made a brief address asking for cooperation and prayer in the great work she was undertaking.

A resolution was sent the Bishop by the Executive Board expressing its preference for a spring meeting. The Bishop informed the Auxiliary that the Council had decided on May as its future time for meeting, the next occurring in Macon.

The Bishop explained to the Council on reading in detail the Auxiliary's annual report that important work in many lines was done under the aegis of the Auxiliary, all aiding in the missionary work of the Church whether at home or abroad. He expressed cordial appreciation of all they were doing and said any man must be a good missionary under such inspiration as the strength of his brethren and the beauty and charm of the ladies.

After singing the Doxology the session was closed with the Blessing.

UNITED OFFERING.

This year closes another chapter in the branch of the Church missionary work that I have had the privilege of representing for the last five years. The knowledge that the offering at each triennial has gained in volume is a fact that the women of the Church should be congratulated upon. Our offering in Cincinnati amounted to \$1189.14. Since then I have sent to Miss Emery \$21.33, making a total of \$1210.47, the largest offering we have ever given, almost as much as the whole State gave before. The amount in dollars and cents is not the only gain the work has made. Many Churches are represented in the fund that have never given before. It has also been collected with less effort, and accompanying the checks have come letters filled with interest for the work showing that the hearts of our church women are touched by the worth of the work, and with a deep sisterly interest in their sisters in the mission fields and the poor benighted women their aims are raising from ignorance and

degradation into a life of civilization and Christianity. In passing my work on to another let me thank the women of the Diocese of Atlanta for their kind responses to my appeals and bespeak for my successor their kindly co-operation.

GREETINGS FROM MRS. FURMAN, PRESIDENT.

TO MY FELLOW WORKERS OF THE ATLANTA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY:

I send a loving greeting to each one of you, assuring you of my earnest desire to serve you in any way you will help me to see and especially asking at the same time for myself from each one of you that sympathy and cooperation which alone can enable me to serve.

Let us resolve that we will do great things during the next three years. Great as was the growth during the triennial just passed, it must be far greater during this one. In spiritual things we cannot simply hold our own—we must go forward or we fall back. Let us make the key note of this triennial of work the growing realization of *personal*, individual responsibility in one way or another, the command to carry the Kingdom of God through all the world. And let us not rest content that we individually are realizing our duty. We do *not* realize it until we have done all we can to make every other woman realize it—until we make every woman who feels the obligation of her baptismal vows, see that no amount of faithful parish, or other work, absolves her from some share in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. Let each Branch feel that it is in some sense a failure—at least is incomplete—until every woman in the Parish, who has a spark of the love of Christ in her heart, is interested in our work and doing what she can.

To give is to receive and your Church is a living Church in the ratio of its missionary activity. See that each member of our organization does her best to impart this life to her Church, and let her feel that her greatest power to do this lies in prayer and her will to love.

LETTERS FROM CONVOCATION SECRETARIES.

ATHENS CONVOCATION.

In submitting this, my third report from the Athens Convocation, I am sure I can report progress along most lines. There is a feeling of a disappointment that our financial report falls short of what it was last year, but that, I think, is explained in

the report of the parochial work done by the women but reported in a different branch of Church work, and also by the fact that there were only occasional services in four of the mission points in Middle Georgia, namely, Greenesboro, Union Point, Madison and Washington, and no services at one or two points.

The Athens Convocation is strictly a missionary Convocation, with only one Parish in the entire convocation, but I feel that one or two of the Missions are stronger than last year, and I hope for greater strength in the years to come.

The Convocation meeting in Clarkesville in May was a great blessing and help to those women from the near by points who attended, and to those who came so far to meet with them. The work in that part of the Convocation, under the Rev. Thomas Duck, has made great progress. The support given him by the Woman's Auxiliary will, I am sure, bring a rich harvest, and I trust that support will be continued.

It is only by supporting the Bishop, in his efforts to put more missionaries in this home field, can we do our part of the work waiting to be done in this part of our Master's vineyard.

ATLANTA CONVOCATION.

I am very glad to report the work for the past year in the Atlanta Convocation has been unusually satisfactory. I do not mean we have been giving more to Missions. (I wish I did.) But the work has been carried on with much more system than usual, which means a better understanding of the pledges and much greater ease in carrying them out. I have had fewer letters to write, but when I have written I have received prompt answers, even when the report had to be a discouraging one. For this interest and promptness I thank each one of the points in the Convocation and want to express my sincere appreciation. I am sorry to say we have had to give up three points this year without any work being done at all—St. Andrew's (Atlanta), Hapeville and Buford—but I hope to have something from them this year. Several other points have shown great strength and progress, notably the Church of the Epiphany at Inman Park and the Holy Comforter, Atlanta.

The coming year is very unusual, in that the Council has changed the time of meeting from December to May. This will force us to redeem our pledges for the year by the 15th of April, if possible, so that we shall start the new year's work in May, 1911, to report at the Council of 1912. The work for the Church year is practically all done in the winter and spring, so I hope the short term, ending in May, 1911, will not work much hardship after all.

COLUMBUS CONVOCATION.

In reviewing the record of the Columbus Convocation, I would like to urge that a fuller report be made of all work done by the women. The published report last year did not give a full account of the work, especially from some of the smaller branches. They perhaps do not understand how important it is to keep a record of all moneys made or donated, and for what purpose used or expended. This is especially true of Talbotton, Manchester and probably other points who always have good reports, especially when taking into consideration the few faithful workers at these points.

MACON CONVOCATION.

An examination of the tabulated report of this Convocation shows a gratifying increase, in purely auxiliary work, over last year. This increase, especially in numbers of workers and in the United Offering, is noticeable in Christ Church, Macon. In St. Paul's, Macon, there appears a falling off in active workers, but the increase in results shows how the work itself develops those who are faithful to it. Both Milledgeville and Fort Valley make larger reports than last year, in the face of most discouraging conditions. St. Andrew's has fulfilled its pledges and paid off its parochial debt, and that without the comfort and help of the ministrations of the Church. I am glad to say they are now having services twice a month. In Barnesville and Sparta the situation seems more hopeless than last year. Deplorable as is the outlook in these and other points, we must not lose heart, but remember that all things are possible with prayer and persistent effort.

I report for my own work: Nine visits to Auxiliary branches; six visits in the interest of the Auxiliary work; held one convocation meeting in St. Stephen's Church, Milledgeville; attended one convocation meeting by invitation in Rome; attended as delegate the General Convention Auxiliary, Cincinnati; have written 42 letters.

ROME CONVOCATION.

This was my first year as a convocation secretary, so I could not expect too much, but feel that something has been gained in that I now know the people personally. That has been my main object, to keep up social relations with the different points, for some of them are so small that very little active work can be done, but in this way they realize they are yet in touch with the Church.

In the spring we had our Convocation meeting in Rome which was well attended and a help to all, Mrs. Black, Mrs. Lewis, Mrs. Furman and Deaconess Henry being the visitors, all giving fine instructive talks. I have been present at two meetings of the Rome Auxiliary. They and Cedartown have very flourishing branches, but the others are in a rather pathetic state; but they are all faithful, so hope for better things to come.

In Lindale and Cave Spring I have tried to start branches, but they feel too small for the undertaking, so I have no new ones to report, but rejoice in the fact that the others still exist. This fall I made a visit around to them, and although probably not very fruitful, was most pleasant.

I have kept no account of my correspondence, but I am sure that the points will testify that I have not neglected this phase of the work.

Hoping the new year will be one of unusual success.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

In making this report as President, I want to say that it is almost entirely the work accomplished by our former President, Mrs. W. W. Curtis, of Columbus. In May we were obliged to accept the resignation of Mrs. Curtis. Mrs. Curtis' term of office was less than a year, but she endeared herself to us as a faithful and valuable officer. In October the Bishop appointed the Treasurer as her successor, to hold both offices until after the Auxiliary meeting in December.

Our apportionment of \$100 was fully met this year, and we also supported a Special Scholarship of \$50 at the Brooks Institute, Guantanamo, Cuba. Besides this \$140.50 was sent as Specials—All Saints'. Atlanta, sending \$40 of this amount for St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, China; and Christ Church, Macon, \$75 for special work at Zangzok, China.

The total amount contributed by the branches for all purposes was \$821.54; to this should be added \$61.50 contributed for the expense fund, making a total of \$883.04. Boxes valued at \$307.98 were sent to the Appleton Home, Macon, Benedict Home, Cedartown, Unity Mills, LaGrange, Mrs. Fleet, Mt. Airy, St. Mary's on the Mountain, Sewanee, Tenn., and Oakley Depot, S. C.

Last year we had twenty-one branches, this year seven of them had to be disbanded for lack of leaders. Two new branches

have been gained, so that now we have sixteen branches with a membership of two hundred and fifty.

It is very much to be regretted that so few branches have reported Mission Study. Several however reported having used the *Spirit of Missions* at their meetings. Our study for the coming year is General Missions and the Leaders are urged to give some definite instruction and to set a specific time for study such as the six weeks of Lent. "Winners of the World" and "Servants of the King" are the courses suggested.

The Junior leaders and Juniors who gathered in Columbus asked that the Bishop allow us to have five Diocesan Vice-Presidents, one for each convocation as a means of strengthening our work. The Bishop has granted the request and the officers will be appointed as soon as each convocation nominates their candidates to the Bishop. A new Treasurer will also be appointed as soon as possible. The President is acting in the meantime. The Treasurer urges that all money to be paid out be sent to her first, so that it can be recorded on the books.

At the Annual Convention it was decided to undertake our same work for the Board of Missions, i. e., our apportionment of \$100 and our Special Scholarship of \$50 in the Brooks Institute, Guantanamo, Cuba, and also to aid Bishop Nelson in the educational work of the Diocese. For our United Work for 1911, each branch is asked to give as follows:

These pledges are just a goal to work for and are not all that each branch should do. Some branches will not be able perhaps to give that much, while others will be able to give much more than this amount. All that is asked is that each branch will do its best.

Our next Diocesan Convention will be held in May, 1911. We have therefore only a few months before us for work before we make our next report. Let us endeavor to strengthen our Junior work in that time, by faithfully studying, praying and

working for the coming of Christ's Kingdom. Let us try more and more to share the gifts that have been entrusted to us, and to fill our lives with loyal, loving service, keenly realizing that we are the chosen messengers of the King.

LETTER FROM MRS. MALLORY TAYLOR.

My Dear Co-Workers:—The Press Committee of the Annual Report have kindly offered me space to give you greeting. The Bishop, as you know, has appointed me Custodian of the United Offering for our diocese in place of Mrs Davis, resigned. First, I am going to use my space for an appeal. The former Custodian's work was very largely that of a pioneer, in other words, she broke the ground and sowed, that we might reap. The diocese, therefore, starts to work towards the next Triennial in a very different condition from that of three years ago. We sent twelve hundred dollars (in round numbers) to the General Convention in Cincinnati. Surely, if we work and give as we should, we can send three thousand dollars by the next General Convention in 1913. To that end I shall strive and expect help from each Churchwoman in the diocese. I hope when I turn over my work, three years from now to my successor that virtually every woman in the diocese will have, and love to have, her "Little Blue Box." At present I am detained at home by the disability of a member of my family, but as soon as possible I intend to visit each parish in my jurisdiction. Perhaps, if you realize that my office is not one for personal glory, only work, work, work! and when I come to you it will mean an expenditure of my time, strength, and money, to help and encourage you, you may find it easier to deny yourselves and make a little sacrifice to help and encourage me. I hope by the end of the year to have met personally every Churchwoman, whether auxiliary members or not.

Will not each one reading these lines try and work up the United Offering in her parish. I will gladly send information and mite boxes to any one desiring them, and shall always stand ready to serve or assist in any way. Think, for an instant, what the amount would be if each Churchwoman in our diocese put one dollar a year in the little box. Then divide the dollar by the number of weeks in the year, and see how small a weekly sum will be required, and you will feel as I do, that a thousand dollars a year is a small amount to ask.

**A LETTER FROM MRS. TAYLOR ON THE APPLETON
CHURCH HOME.**

Probably you do not know that although the home with its small endowment was a gift to the Diocese from Mr. Appleton, of New York, it has received no regular income from any parish—except those of Macon—notwithstanding it is listed as a Diocesan institution. Our Christ Church Society was founded between 1870 and 1872 and has steadily contributed in the neighborhood of \$90 a year, without which it would have been impossible to pay for the necessary fuel. The churches say: "Our Juniors sent money or we took up a large offertory or our Woman's Auxiliary sent money or a box." Yea, verily. This ought we to have done and not left the other undone. Christ Church, Macon, takes up an offertory and the ladies of Christ Church have not failed in more than a quarter of a century to give a Xmas dinner of turkeys, etc., to the orphans, or a Xmas tree with fruit, candy and presents for all, or a pantry filling party, and sometimes all three.

Perhaps a few facts will help you to see the need for organized help. The Home accommodates 38 and averages 40 inmates. The helpers are three at present, Sister Louise, Sister Mary and Sister Sophia. A house-keeper is hired to take charge down stairs and (when possible) she assists the children with their work, teaches them to cook, etc. A woman is hired to wash two days of the week and the children iron. The inmates should be taught book-keeping, typewriting and dressmaking, but with present lack of funds can only be trained to be home-helpers.

The Treasurer of the Home writes me on this subject: "The endowment fund, if kept going at 7 per cent, which is not always possible, will bring in \$200 per month which is now paid by me to Sister Louise, leaving nothing for insurance, repairs, etc. With a systematic effort I feel sure great things could be done and enable us to extend the splendid benefits of the Home."

Peradventure, you wonder where the money comes from to buy the clothes, shoes and things incidental to covering 40 girls. Well, Sister Louise also wonders twelve months of the year. Their menu may be of interest: For dinner Sunday and Thursday, meat; Monday and Wednesday, cabbage or greens

with meat to flavor but none to eat; Thursday, nourishing soup; Friday, hominy, bread and butter or eggs in place of the latter when plentiful; Saturday, rice and gravy from small piece of bacon. Children call it little Sunday, because they have gravy. Breakfast, hominy, milk and corn bread, corn bread for dinner, light bread and milk for supper, cheap vegetables every day, also fruit raw or stewed for health, yams every day when less than a dollar a bushel, butter Sunday breakfast.

Will you not place this letter where it will accomplish what should have been done years ago. I cannot think the Church women of this diocese will allow such a state of affairs to continue when they once understand the conditions under which the Home is striving to exist. Cordially yours,

The Appleton Church Home Aid Society was organized in Christ Church, Macon, a number of years before the death of Bishop Beckwith. The members feel, in view of the fact, that the "Home" is a Diocesan Institution, the work to assist in maintaining it should be more extended, spreading over the entire Diocese.

Therefore, at the last meeting, the constitution was adopted and sent to the Bishop for his consideration. He writes in regard to it, "I not only approve but am in full sympathy with the proposition and effort to form a Diocesan Society in aid of the Appleton Church Home, and Christ Church, Macon, is the place to initiate the movement."

The "Home" has an income but it is inadequate for the needs which have grown with the years.

Boxes have been sent and were most acceptable but what is desired is a CERTAIN income in place of, or in addition to, the uncertain boxes.

The care and responsibility, mentally and morally, of thirty-five or forty girls, is surely sufficient without having to worry about the physical aspect as well, and to be driven to self-denials and the closest watching of the smallest things in order that the ends may meet and have something on hand for an emergency. Sister Louise, in charge, was known as the "delicate one" during Sister Catherine's regime, and yet now she has burdens and responsibilities to bear, from which a strong man would shrink.

She, and the two Sisters helping her, are giving their lives to the work and receive no financial recompence.

EXPLANATION OF THE JOINT RLEDGES OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY FOR THE DIOCESE OF GEORGIA.**UNITED OFFERING.**

The United Offering in which every woman is asked to join represents especial birthday and other thank offerings, over and above general missionary work.

THE EXPENSE FUND.

Each parish and mission is asked to contribute some little amount towards the expense fund which meets the expenses of the publication of the Annual Report, circulars and report blanks, postage, &c., and also pays the expenses of missionaries invited to address the Auxiliary.

GUANTANAMO, CUBA SCHOLARSHIP.

A child is supported and educated in the large school of over two hundred students in Guantanamo, Cuba, by the Bishop Knight Scholarship.

BIBLE WOMAN IN JAPAN.

A native Bible Woman is trained in Sendai, Japan. As is well known, the duties of a Bible Woman are many and varied. She visits and nurses the sick, trains the women, has Sunday School classes, assists in teaching and preparing for confirmation, cares for the church furnishings, and is general parish visitor. A native woman is particularly valuable, when trained for this work.

BIBLE WOMAN IN CHINA.

The training of a Bible Woman in Wuchang, China, fits her for doing the same service among the native women as is done in Japan by the Auxiliary's trained native workers.

BENEDICT SCHOOL, CEDARTOWN.

The Rev. George Benedict is devoting his life to the education and betterment of the boys and girls in this rural district of North Georgia. Money and clothing are always acceptable.

THE APPLETON CHURCH HOME,

for girls in Macon receives orphan girls from baby-hood up to sixteen years—the training, moral, religious, and industrial is excellent—Boxes and money sent from various churches are always most welcomed.

BISHOP BECKWITH COT, ST. BARNABAS HOSPITAL, OSAKA, JAPAN.

St. Barnabas Hospital, under the direction of Dr. Laning, and his daughter, Miss Serena Laning, a graduate of the Philadelphia Training School, who assists him. The care of the sick is most scientific, and the religious influence is felt throughout the work. The Auxiliary supports a cot.

SETTLEMENT WORK—CHURCH MISSIONS HOUSE, UNITY MILLS,
LA GRANGE.

Under the direct management of Rev. Henry D. Phillips, has a kindergarten for the little children of the mills, a circulating Library, and Sunday services, a Sunday School and Night School and hospital are conducted with great success. Two women, supported by the United Offering, assist in the work. Gifts of money, clothing, books and household supplies, are needed for this object, the Auxiliary pledges itself to try to give \$300 for the training of a Georgia settlement worker here.

THE AUXILIARY MISSIONARY.

A pledge of \$300 is made toward the salary of a North Georgia Missionary to take the Church into the small towns and rural districts of the mountains. The Church work has been wonderfully strengthened at Elberton, Toccoa, Clarkesville, Mount Airy. This pledge is a thank offering for Bishop Nelson's choosing the Diocese of Atlanta.

THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913.

RESOLVED:—That the United Thank-Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.
