NOONDAY PRAYERS FOR MISSIONS.

And while they plant and water, send Thou, O Lord, the increase; gather in the multitude of the heathen; convert in Christian lands such as neglect so great salvation; so that Thy name may be glorified and Thy Kingdom come, O gracious Saviour of the world; to Whom, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, be honor and glory, world without end. Amen.

O Lord, Jesus Christ, Who in the days of thy flesh didst accept the services of faithful women who ministered unto Thee of their substance; be pleased, we humbly ask, to bless our endeavors to aid and encourage missionaries. Put into our hearts the things we should do and say to promote Thy glory. Grant that we may never be discouraged under difficulties, but go forward in faith and hope looking unto Thee. Have pity on those who know Thee not; on those who are far from the Church of their fathers in a strange land; visit them with Thy salvation, and grant that all may be speedily brought to acknowledge Thee as their Lord and Master. Christ, hear us, and answer this our prayer, for Thine own Name's sake. Amen.

SPECIAL PRAYER.

O Heavenly Father, Lord of the Harvest, look graciously upon Thy servants who earnestly desire the extension of Thy Church among those who have not known Thee or do not call upon Thy Name, and send forth more laborers into the harvest-field which lies ripe to Thy Church in this Diocese, especially among the mill workers and mountain people. Bless we pray Thee the work undertaken in Thy Name and Favor, give abundance of Thy Grace to the laborers and a right judgment in all things, and we beseech Thee to open the hearts of Thy people to contribute freely of their means to the support of this and other like efforts for the edification of Thy children, so that Thy Kingdom may be enlarged and Thy Holy Name be forever glorified amongst us, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

MRS. FURMAN'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

The report of the past year is one we anticipate with unusual interest and some anxiety, because it represents our first effort to work under the new relation to the Board of Missions. Each branch has had to solve the problem more or less for itself with the help of its Rector, and results will be given in the Convocation Reports. In the light of these reports and with the help we expect from our General Secretary, whom we are so fortunate as to have with us at this important juncture, it is to be hoped that we will gain a clearer view of what we are aiming at, increased enthusiasm and perhaps during the ensuing year reach a greater degree of general uniformity in our methods of work.

I will not detain you on this subject, as I would give all possible time to its general discussion and to the speakers you are privileged to hear this morning.

One subject, however, I do wish to stress briefly in connection with the appointment of officers just made, and that is the quickening and intensifying of the Convocation work.

During the four and a half years I have served as an auxiliary officer—in the Convocation first, and lately in the Diocese—it has seemed to me that the most important part of the work was the personal element. Nothing tells so much—certainly nothing helps the officers so much—as the sympathetic interest the office gives you the opportunity of exercising. And in giving this sympathetic interest, you can become a unifying influence, the value of which it would take too long to explain here.

Now, one person cannot possibly do this work—the field is too large. But there are five districts in our Diocese. Suppose a woman at the head of the work in each Convocation, with the same kind of responsibility in the smaller field as the President in the Diocese—who tries to be in touch with each point, each isolated woman in her department—as far as possible enters into and understands the work of each—the needs of each mission—feels ready to explain, to help, to suggest when called upon, to carry encouragement to the weak from the strong—calls two Convocation meetings a year where members can gather for counsel and stimulation and to exchange experiences, as we do here—do you not believe that would mean life and growth?

In appointing these officers vice-president instead of secretaries, as heretofore, it is not merely a change of title to bring our organization into more general harmony with other Dioceses about us, but the Bishop desires to imply increase of responsibility to the work.

I earnestly hope that our vice-presidents will undertake this responsibility with a determination to find their duties as they work. Those duties will not prove too onerous—I wish I could promise they should be more so—but, sad to say, the Church is so weak in most of our divisions, that you will not be burdened. In this Convocation there are but two organized branches outside of Macon, and only one or two other points where at present possible branches may be established. And all points are easily accessible. Other Convocations, except Atlanta, are little if any stronger.

Our duties are not clearly defined because of our lack of definite organization, but if you put your heart into your work you will find them in the way you can best do them.

The only thing necessary to success is real interest and the realization that God does the work—not we. You will find a reward for your poor efforts altogether disproportionate—you will get so much more than you give, both from your Master and from those you try to serve, that you will be ashamed and humbled. If we would all only test it we would know the joy—the greatest joy on earth—the joy of consciously working along with God for the salvation of men—the joy of corporate service and the love of another it begets. There would be no one who would not enter heart and soul into this work, no one who would not feel that she *must* have a personal share in that harvest where *every* laborer, even the least, may gather fruit unto life eternal and even in this life receive most blessed wages.

THE ANNUAL CONVENTION.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION.

The fourth annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta met in Churst Church, Macon, May 22nd, immediately after the opening service of the Diocesan Council. There were twenty-one different parishes and missions represented and an attendance of over ninety at the opening session, which was called to order by Bishop Nelson. An address of

encouragement and counsel was made by him, after which he announced the nominations for officers for the next year:

Honorary President—Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, of Atlanta.
Secretary—Miss Rosa Woodberry, Atlanta.
Treasurer—Mrs. Nell Cooper Frederick, Columbus.

President Junior Auxiliary—Miss Mary Pearson, Macon.
Secretary Babies' Branch—Mrs. Carryl Harper, Atlanta.
Box Secretary—Miss Lillian Fickling.
Educational Secretary—To be appointed.

Vice-Presidents of Convocations—Miss Sara E. White, Athens; Mrs. Frank D. Holland, Atlanta; Mrs. W. W. Curtis, Columbus; Mrs. Wm. E. Martin, Macon; Miss Almira Parker, Rome.

The officers will take charge at once, and hold an early meeting of their Convocations to plan work for the new Convention year, and make their first annual report at Athens next May, where the Convention meets. The Convocations are instructed to call their branches together for a conference at the Diocesan Conference at Griffin the coming fall.

The Bishop then defined membership in the Auxiliary as any woman who aids in missions, whether she attends meetings or not. He urged them to come together for prayer and inspiration, not for mechanical collection of petty dues, but to plan large things, and be on a high plane and broad sympathies, wide knowledge, and intelligent co-operation in the great statesmanlike plans and purposes of establishing a world wide Kingdom of Christ.

Miss Julia C. Emery, Secretary of all the woman's work of the Auxiliary, of the Church Missions House in New York, who was the guest of the Convention, addressed the women on the Auxiliary as a living organism, whose growth, development and changes have been for greater efficiency for more than a quarter of a century. She traced its gifts from first boxes to missionary families, then the sending out of prayer books, then the begininngs of pennies and dimes on to the great offerings of thousands and hundreds of thousands of dollars for extending the Kingdom in other lands, and then she spoke of the crowning act of service in the offering of women to be trained for school and hospital and teaching in the distant and near missionary fields, and their going forth in the joy of personal service.

Miss Emery stated the contrast between what is done at home and abroad, most forcefully when she said that Columbia asked for \$3,000,000 for carrying on its great university work, and that the Board of Missions asked for only one-half of that of the whole American Church to carry on its great teaching in universities and schools and hospitals and churches throughout the great vast world that knows not Christ. Of this \$5,900 is asked of the Diocese of Atlanta. Is there not a danger that we may do too much for ourselves in proportion? She said the systematic weekly offerings for missions was vastly greater in its totals than the spasmodic giving of a dollar or two at a time once a year. Make an individual, not family canvass to account for every women in this great service. Then keep in touch with them and invite them to the meetings of the Auxiliary, and get them to read the Spirit of Missions. Miss Emery urged that one woman be trained from each parish to teach, and perhaps she will add her life as a gift. She is needed now to lead the mission study classes. She said that Bishop Lloyd had said in sending out a lovely young woman as a missionary, that she would never feel loneliness in that great field, except when she felt the lack of the sympathetic touch of interest and helpfulness among the dear people she had left at home.

She then urged those at home to live the lives we expect to have them lead, so that their strength may be as the strength of ten because our hearts are true.

The Rev. R. W. Patton, Secretary of the Department of Sewanee, was introduced, and spoke of the wider sphere of the Auxiliary as not a society but in its vastly greater work the Church. He said that Christ is calling the roll of his militant army as never before. He urged that women of loving tactfulness and sweet winsomeness of a spiritual personality be appointed to call on the women of the parish to enlist them in study and prayer for missions and a weekly contribution.

The Treasurer's report showed a larger total than ever before, in spite of the fact that offerings for general missions are made through the parish. The United Offering report was enthusiastically received, as made by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, Custodian, showing that about \$1,200 had been given in eighteen months, as against that amount previously for three years. A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Taylor. The Babies' Branch reported by Mrs. Alexander Blair showed a most interesting extension of this service and training of the children. The Junior Auxiliary showed a splendid total of over a thousand

dollars, and record of study classes and widening influence. Appreciative congratulation was expressed by the Convention. The Box Secretary's report showed the value of systematizing the sending of boxes as to contents and destination, through the Secretary, Miss Lillian Fickling of Macon. Miss Rosa Woodberry gave an account of the organization of the Auxiliary of the Department of Sewanee last fall for the proposed co-operation of the Southern diocesan Auxiliaries, especially in the mountain, mill and negro work. The Bishop was asked to appoint four Auxiliary delegates to the coming November meeting in Charlotte.

The Secretary's report was then read by Miss Woodberry, who reviewed the work of the past year and gave various suggestions for furthering the interests of the Auxiliary. All of the officers' reports are published in the Annual Report.

The feature of the afternoon session was the address of the Bishop on the Church's work for the negro in this diocese. He spoke of the extension of the work from St. Paul's Atlanta, and in Marietta to that in Athens, Columbus and Macon, and another in Atlanta, and of their needs, particularly in furthering the industrial work among the children in simple household and mechanical attainments. He spoke of the self-sacrificing, self-respecting spirit of the negroes in charge, where no begging was countenanced. He spoke of the lamentably poor and inadequate equipment of St. Paul's, Atlanta, and urged the women to become informed as to this work and show a spirit of co-operation and sympathy.

The remainder of the afternoon session was devoted to the Convocation reports read by Mrs. John C. Hart, Mrs. J. N. Talley, Miss Almira Parker, and the Columbus and Atlanta reports read by the secretary.

THURSDAY.

The Thursday sessions of the Auxiliary were preceded by a Corporate Communion, the Bishop Celebrant, at half past seven in the morning, and a quiet hour led by the Rev. V. C. Lacey at nine o'clock, whose theme was the privileges, opportunities and responsibility of a member of the Auxiliary.

The business session was called to order at ten o'clock. The appropriations for the year were taken up, and it was resolved to give \$100 for work among the negroes of the diocese, and \$300 to train a worker in the settlement house at LaGrange for mill workers, and \$200 for the Rev. C. K. Weller's work among the people of the mill district near College Park, at St. Mary's.

Outside of the Diocese it was resolved to give \$50 a year to the insurance fund of the missionaries, and to support a Bible woman in Hankow, \$50, and to train a native worker in Sendai, Japan, \$50. In addition the Auxiliary gives to an expense fund for printing and other expenses of its own.

Columbus asked to pledge \$50 for this work above its apportionment, to Trinity Church.

Miss Theresa Griffin read an account of a proposed plan, urging an immediate Every Woman Canvass in each parish and mission, that the Rector be requested to appoint a separate treasurer for the weekly offerings of the Auxiliary, and that after the full apportionment has been met, the remaining funds may be given for extra missionary pledges. She suggested also that the Auxiliary may designate the object of its offerings through the parish, and make frequent reports to them at the Auxiliary meetings, when all contributors shall be urged to be present. These resolutions were received as information with much interest and appreciation.

A report was read from Mrs. Isabel O'Hear giving the disposition of the deGraffenreid dollar in aiding in fitting up a ward in the Home for Incurables, for boys.

The President was requested to have uniform blanks for reports sent out at an early date. Co-operation was promised in the plan of the Bishop of Alaska to get Congress to provide medical and sanitary relief for the natives of Alaska, by urging Senators and Congressmen to vote for the bill. The Auxiliary urged the publication of a diocesan paper, extending the present Atlanta Churchman. Miss Minnie Harper told of the value and methods of the Church Periodical Club, in mailing papers to the clergy in remote places. Words of greeting and discussion of problems were given by Mrs. John C. Hart, Mrs. C. M. Strahan, Athens, Dr. Brewster, LaGrange, Miss Almira Parker, Miss Virginia Persons, Mrs. Allen Miles, Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew. A committee, consisting of Miss Woodberry, Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, and Mrs. H. N. Hurt, was appointed to draft a new Constitution and By-Laws, if deemed necessary. Resolutions of a rising vote of thanks were given Mrs. Mallory Taylor on the United Offering, Miss Kate Ayers, for her hospitality in the use of her beautiful drawing rooms for the sessions, to Mrs. Furman and Miss Woodberry for presiding at the Convention.

The Committee on Resolutions, of which Miss Minnie Harper was chairman, also reported resolutions adopted by a rising vote, expressing its happiness over the Bishop's restoration to

health; for the hospitality of Christ Church parish; for the delightful lunches, and reception of Mrs. Furman and Mrs. Mallory Taylor, and the breakfast served by St. Paul's ladies, and for the many courtesies of Miss Katie Ayers. Regret was expressed over the loss of the valuable assistance of the retiring officers, Mrs. R. M. Walker, Miss Edith L'Engle, Mrs. Alexander Blair, Mrs. John C. Hart, Mrs. A. P. Coles, Mrs. Samuel Wight, Mrs. Robert E. Carter, Mrs. J. N. Talley, the resignations in almost every case being on account of sickness in the family or other pressing obligations of service.

Miss L'Engle urged each parish to send at least one girl or woman to be trained at the Asheville Conference on Missions in June. She will give full particulars.

The Report to the Council showed over \$4,000 given for missions. It was presented by the Rev. Troy Beatty, and was received by the Council with a rising vote of appreciation, with special commendation of the United Offering.

The Memorial Committee's report was read standing, and a prayer made at its close. A special In Memoriam was read commemorating the life and service of Mrs. Richard Peterson, Atlanta. Resolutions of sympathy were passed for Mrs. Nellie Petters Black and regret over her absence from this Convention.

THE SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Secretary in reviewing the work of the Diocese reports: the Missionary work of the Diocese has been unusually effective the past year. The golden jubilee of foreign missions celebrated in Atlanta in October enlisted the Woman's Auxiliary workers' co-operation, there being more Church women in attendance at the rally at St. Luke's than have ever been present before at a missionary meeting of record in the Diocese, and an offering of more than four hundred dollars was made, that was sent to the Church Missions House for general missions.

The Bishop's Guild has been formed, and had its first annual corporate Communion on May first. Vestments and altar linens have been made, and books distributed, as its initial work the past year.

The prayers of the Auxiliary are asked for the various efforts looking to Christian unity, notably in Union Mission Study Classes and training schools, and especially for the

World's Conference on Christian Faith and Order, towards which preliminary steps are now being taken.

The Diocese of Atlanta was largely represented at Knoxville November 15th, where the Woman's Auxiliary of the various dioceses in the Department of Sewanee, met for a departmental organization for united work in its common problems, especially in negro, mountain and mill work, and for conference, annually, on general missionary subjects.

The next meeting is in Charlotte, N. C., and the Bishop is asked to nominate the four delegates from this Diocese, one of whom shall be a Junior officer. The meeting occurs in October, the presiding officer being the president of the Auxiliary in the Diocese in which the Convention is held.

The Every Woman Canvass has been made in many parishes, with gratifying results in increased interest in missions and parish work, the use of an envelope for a weekly offering for missions, and the enrollment of many new members. Many of the parishes are having a monthly corporate Communion. Lantern slides illustrating the work in missionary fields are being used from the Church Missions House. Some are volunteering for training as leaders.

Many of the parishes are adopting the method of a voluntary offering at Auxiliary meetings, instead of regular dues, since the weekly offerings for missions are being made through the parish offertory. Others have found it helpful in carrying on their special pledges to retain the dues.

It is hoped that isolated Churchwomen will be affiliated with the nearest parish Auxiliary, in contributing to boxes, the united offering and study of missions, and in Corporate Communions.

The Auxiliary workers are co-operating with the United Charities organization in local work.

The Woman's Auxiliary News has not been published, since the Atlanta Churchman has extended the use of its columns, and Auxiliary matter is there published, and extra copies ordered for general distribution in the diocese to the various Auxiliary branches. This will continue to be in future the means of printed communication.

There was no printed annual report for the six months preceding this past year, but the convention of the Auxiliary was held mainly for conference, at St. Luke's, May 10th, 1911. An account of this is printed on another page.

The Secretary would direct the attention of the Auxiliary to the small number of women enrolled, in comparison with the total number of women in the diocese, and urge that we resolve to account for them before our next meeting. Let's make them know, and then they cannot resist helping. The Board of Missions, our own Bishop, calls us to greater, broader service—a splendid "Adventure for God."

LILLIAN FICKLING.

It is the request of Bishop Nelson that the following report be read at the first fall meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in each parish. He also suggests: "It will be stimulating I think to add that there is a good opportunity for the Diocese of Atlanta to make a record in this tri-ennium."

UNITED OFFERING.

When I received my appointment, December, 1910, as Custodian of the United Offering, I found my predecessor had laid a strong foundation for all future building. I only regret that never having had access to her books, my only data has been the Columbus report of the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of December, 1910. My list of new points, therefore, may not be entirely correct, as it is based on that report.

During the last eighteen months I have distributed 725 mite

boxes, which shows a steady persistency, perhaps not always appreciated by those receiving them.

Kingston and Decatur have dropped out for the time, but we have gained thirteen new points, whose offerings aggregate \$45.40.

It forms a strong link connecting them with all the other churchwomen in the Diocese—and for that matter—in the world, for we are "United" in the "offering" which is made by women and girls, for women and girls. I will esteem it a favor to receive the names and addresses of any such women and to have the privilege of sending boxes to them.

May I not ask that your interest, zeal and money contributed to the United Offering, shall be more than doubled this coming year. Then I can easily see the fulfillment of my wishes and be the proud conveyor to the next tri-ennial (October, 1913) of \$3,000.00, the United Offering of the Diocese of Atlanta.

BABIES BRANCH.

REPORT OF MRS. ALEXANDER BLAIR.

Our Babies Branch has not gained but one point this year. We now have nineteen branches. So many of the babies enrolled do not send in their boxes.

It is the idea of teaching the children to give, when they are young, and being imbued with the spirit and soul of Missions that is uppermost. All babies as soon as baptized should be enrolled in some branch. We keep them until old enough to be Junior Juniors.

I have written sixty-five letters since last report. The branches and their offerings are:

FOURTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY, HELD IN ST. LUKE'S CHURCH,
ATLANTA, MAY 10, 1911.

At the Third Annual Council of the Diocese of Atlanta, held in Trinity Church, Columbus, December 7th and 8th, 1910, the time of meeting was changed from December to May, and the Council adjourned to meet in Christ Church, Macon, on May 22nd, 1912. The Fourth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary was called together, for conference and stimulation rather than legislation, in St. Luke's Church, Atlanta, on May 10th and 11th, 1911. This Convention, after the opening service, and sermon by the Bishop, was called to order by the President, Mrs. E. LeConte Furman. Her address was followed by the report of Miss Rosa Woodberry, the secretary, who gave a survey of the field and suggestions in furthering the details of the work. The treasurer, Mrs. Murdock Walker, showed a healthy financial activity in offerings.

Mrs. Alexander Blair, of Macon, sent in her report, showing that the training of the babies to drop in their missionary pennies and lisp a prayer was training for future service. Miss Minnie Harper showed how the workings of the Church Periodical Club was sending delightful literature into needy homes and studies. Mrs. Mallory Taylor spoke of the great unselfish united offering for women's missionary workers, and her prayerful efforts to so make its blessedness known as to send \$3,000 to the next great triennial convention in New York. The blue mite box receives gifts over and above all other missionary activities. The fund that each third year amounts to over \$200,000 is used for the training, support and care of women workers for missions.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session was marked by convocation reports by the secretaries—Mrs. John C. Hart, for Athens; Mrs. A. P. Coles, for Atlanta; Mrs. J. N. Talley, for Macon; Mrs. Cuttle, for Mrs. Robert Carter, of Columbus, and Miss Almira Parker, for Rome—each telling of the problems and progress in her field. A most thoughtful and able address was made by Dr. Brewster on the problems of mill settlement work, and in detail

of her work at LaGrange. Dr. Brewster is a Wellesley graduate and Smith professor, who has also taken her degree in medicine, and is giving a consecrated service in upbuilding these children of the mills. The Rev. Mr. Ledford gave an account of the traditions of the mill workers, and Sister Elinor spoke of the self sacrificing labors of the sisters of the Appleton Church Home for Orphan Children in Macon. She expressed gratitude that the bishop could rely upon the workers of the auxiliary. Miss Singleton then told of the large kindergarten, Mothers' Club, and Sunday school at St. Mary's mill mission under the direction of St. John's, College Park. A short business session was held. A telegram of loving greetings was sent the Woman's Auxiliary of Georgia, then in session at Thomasville, and a happy response received from Mrs. Elliott, President of the Georgia Auxiliary.

The Bishop told the Auxiliary that he had accepted a general apportionment for the support of general missions of \$54,900. The Auxiliary expressed the hope that they might be able to give a fourth of it, and resolved to submit a proposed apportionment of this amount to all the parishes and missions. The roll call showed nineteen branches represented by an attendance of over a hundred. It was resolved that as far as practicable all pledges be sent undesignated for general missions, and that all moneys sent out of the parish be sent through Mrs. R. M. Walker, the diocesan treasurer.

The evening session was a missionary rally at St. Luke's, the Litany for missions being read by the bishop, and the missionary hymns being heartily sung. The addresses were made by the Rev. Henry D. Phillips, in charge of the mill settlement work at LaGrange; by the Rev. C. K. Weller, in charge of the mill settlement work at College Park, and by Bishop Nelson, who told of the great missionary exposition in Boston.

On the following morning the auxiliary had a corporate communion at 7:30 o'clock, celebrated by the Bishop, which was very largely attended. This was followed by a devotional quiet hour, led by the Rev. W. W. Memminger. A conference of the leaders of the junior work was held following breakfast, served by St. Luke's ladies, and in the afternoon an inspiring convention of the Junior Auxiliary, led by Miss Edith L'Engle, their president.

The ladies of St. Luke's served a beautiful luncheon Wednesday for their guests.

THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913.

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.

PRAYER FOR MORE WORKERS.

ALMIGHTY GOD, Lord of the harvest, we humbly beseech Thee to send forth more labourers into Thy harvest, and especially to put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to Thy work in the Mission field; that so the bounds of Thy blessed kingdom may be enlarged; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
