THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta held its Sixth annual Convention in Athens at Emmanuel Church, May 28th, representing eighteen parishes and Missions in the Diocese. Seventy delegates were present, including twenty Juniors, besides a large attendance of Athens representatives. It was opened with the service of Morning Prayer, read by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Thomas Duck. Bishop Nelson preached from the text, "He that is not with me is against me. He that gathereth not with me scattereth," urging that the women realize the spiritual nature of the organization, that if their work be not done in the blessed sunlight of His presence and love, prayerfully, with the highest Christian ideal of winning the world for Christ, it is scattered. He dwelt upon the Auxiliary as a spiritual society, not a mechanism for money gathering. He referred to the years of mutual sympathy and cooperation, the unselfishness of the individuals and as a society, of the Auxiliary, where ambition and worldly preference were notably absent in its prime motive for the progress of the Church of God, working in magnanimity and unity. He referred to the loss of Mrs. H. C. White, a former president, beloved in Athens, her rare personality and sweetness, and works, expressing, in the sorrow of her loss, the joy and comfort that she has passed into the dear presence of Him whom she served, enjoying the results of that service she has given lovingly and prayerfully. She was commemorated in the concluding prayers and in the Communion Service.

He expressed great regret that Mrs. Furman, the President, was kept away by sickness, and paid high tribute to her as a woman of vision, and deep spirituality, and that she had given richly of time, means and physical strength in this service.

He then explained the general plan of Missionary offerings, as indicated by the Church's united judgement, the mind of the Church, as the nearest approach we have to arriving at the mind of Christ. One part of the field is not to be emphasized to the exclusion of another. All offerings go through the parish, for the apportionment, which is not an assessment but a privilege.

At the close of the Service, the Auxiliary was formally called to order by Miss Rosa Woodberry, who made an address, and announced the program. Words of welcome were extended by Miss Basiline Prince. After a recess taken to attend the opening session of the Council, the Auxiliary completed its roll call, and sent a letter of appreciation and sympathy to Mrs. E. LeConte Furman. Reports of officers were then made, those of the Treasurer and Box Secretary and Babies Branch being read by the Secretary. The Junior Auxiliary, reported by the President

Miss Mary Pearson, showing that they had held a Missionary Institute, and more than doubled their apportionment, and greatly increased study classes, was received with a unanimous vote of thanks.

The Rev. R. W. Patton, Department Secretary, urged the ladies to attend the Conference at Black Mountain, N. C., for methods of study and work, which will be held the latter part of June.

After a recess taken for lunch, representatives from the various Parishes and Missions were presented, who told of their work. Among them, Mrs. W. C. Shaw and Mrs. Charles Lee of Macon, Mrs. J. Allen Miles of Elberton, Miss Geissler of Greensboro, Miss Basiline Prince of Athens, Miss Dora Duck of Toccoa, Sister Elinor of the Appleton Church Home, Mrs. E. L. Gordon of Cartersville.

Convocation Reports were made by Mrs. Frank D. Holland and Miss Sara E. White for Athens. Tabulated reports were received from Mrs. W. W. Curtis for Columbus, Mrs. Wm. E. Martin from Macon, Miss Almira Parker for Rome, who were unable to be present.

Miss Mary Pearson then made an address on the educational work of the Auxiliary, telling of the needs and difficulty of the work, and the absolute need of preparation, which as a means is ideal, as an end is death. The result of such development must be the gift of self, and the result that some must offer to go forth in the service. Miss Pearson's address was inspirational, and was received with earnest words of appreciation and prayerful commendation.

Mrs. Nellie Peters Black addressed the Convention on the forward work in China, showing the result of past labors, notably in reaching the higher people, in the extension of the field, the social and civic reforms, and the unifying of the churches, and the wonderful growth of St. John's University, and St. Luke's Hospital and St. Hilda's in Shanghai—all showing that the Christian world's prayers are being answered.

Mrs. Mallory Taylor presented her report on the United Offering for missions for women, showing its remarkable increase, having more than doubled the last offering, and dwelling upon the unselfish and spiritual nature of the gift. It is hoped to have it trebled by October, when it will be presented at the New York Triennial.

Miss Dora Duck was appointed to communicate with the various parishes, requesting each to take one or more orphans of the Appleton Church Home to clothe. A number responded then. A message of loving greeting was sent to Sister Louise of the Home. A vote of thanks was extended Mr. Thomas Peters of Atlanta for a map, showing the opportunities for work in the

Convocation of Athens. The Memorial report was then received standing, read by Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew, with a special set of resolutions adopted on the death of Mrs. H. C. White. The members of the Auxiliary attended the missionary service and addresses of the Council at eight o'clock.

The Thursday Session was preceded by a corporate Communion at half-past seven. After breakfast in the parish house, and Morning Prayer, an hour of meditation on the Gift of Self was lead by the Rev. C. E. Wheat of Griffin. Mrs. Frank Holland made an address on the Negro Work in this Diocese, making an earnest plea for industrial training among the 50,000 negroes in Atlanta, better sanitation, and moral and religious instruction and commending the work, judgment and energy of those in charge of the negro mission stations here, and urging a generous response to their humble requests for funds.

Mrs. Mallory Taylor gave a full account at the meeting at Charlotte of the Auxiliary of the Department of Sewanee, resulting in more compact organization, and strong resolutions on the reorganization of the General Auxiliary, sent to us from the Committee on Conference with the Bishops present, recommending departmental organization of the Diocesan Auxiliaries, especially for problems peculiar to this department, and that they be presented at the next Triennial Auxiliary Session. It was recommended, also, that more time be given at the Triennial for reports from missionaries in the field.

Miss Wilmer Chapin gave an account of the hospital work in the mill settlement work at LaGrange, and Miss Charlotte Wing of the Kindergarten there, and training of settlement workers.

A Chinese student of the University of Georgia, Mr. Ting Fang Woo, was introduced, and gave a Christian's message from his native land.

On motion of Mrs. Pettigrew, it was resolved to refer to the board of officers the details of readjustment to the new plan of sending all Auxiliary monies through the parish treasurer, except the expense fund. Each parish and mission was requested to slightly increase this, for the central expenses of printing, and other missionary educational work. To the officers were also referred the questions for discussion of the General Secretary's letter.

Resolutions of appreciation were passed on the services of the retiring President, Mrs. E. LeConte Furman, and her beautiful letter to the Convention read. Resolutions of thanks for the hospitality of Athens, in its many courtesies, were adopted.

The Bishop's letter and nominations of officers were read, and adopted, as published in first page of the Report.

The noontime Prayers and Benediction were pronounced by the Rev. Troy Beatty.

The Report of the Auxiliary was read to the Council by the Bishop, and received standing, with many expressions of commendation.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

On this joyous occasion of the sixth annual convention of the Woman's Auxiliary, where friends and co-workers of many years have again come together, with the lovingly welcomed newer members in this field of the Master's service, to take counsel together, and plan larger things for its development, we feel a sense of distinct loss in the absence of the valued and able president, who after five and a half years of loyal Auxiliary service, feels compelled to resign on account of ill health. Mrs. Furman's intense activity in fulfilling the high duties of her office proved too great a strain, and it will take some time for her to regain her usual strength. In sending her greetings to-day, and loving appreciation of her work marked by such splendid capacity and deep spirituality, in prayer for her complete restoration, let us commend her example to all officers and leaders, in that she placed first in her service the mission of prayer, next an intelligent knowledge of the field, and then generous and prayerful giving of time, means and self in furthering the work—the work that all the world may know Christ and have life more abundantly.

The Auxiliary in this diocese is particularly fortunate in having the privilege of meeting in Athens, in one of the oldest parishes in the diocese, among a Church people, who have done not only things in parish growth, but who have been an inspiration in zeal and accomplishment in missionary work.

We shall miss beyond all words of expression in our councils here and sweet association, one who was a leader and counsellor in our Auxiliary work, Mrs. H. C. White, a former president of the diocesan auxiliary, and constant worker in its ranks. Her gracious radiant personality was ever a welcome joy to Athens guests, and her wise counsels and enthusiasm ever a blessing in our conventions. It is a peculiarly sweet privilege to recall in this presence and within these walls of the church she loved so dearly and served so faithfully, the noble character and spiritual beauty of this dear friend and co-worker.

The history of the past year in this organization has been one of readjustment to the changed methods of the Board of Missions, and of seeking channels for the most effective aid as a missionary auxiliary. There has been a gratifying increase in enlistment, and a marked increase in efficiency, as shown by the tabulated reports. The Auxiliary, as such, would be possibly

strengthened by a more definite suggestion of lines of helpfulness by the Council or Conferences of the Church in this diocese, with perhaps a closer association in its councils in joint committee conference. This recognition of the Auxiliary as a part of the working force of the diocese, met with helpful results in the Griffin Conference, where the Auxiliary's problems were voiced. Inasmuch as all missionary apportionments and assessments are now met by women through their parishes, it is for this body to decide whether its aid shall be auxiliary to the parish work for missions, or continue some independent work for the general board of missions, as has been done in the past year. In view of the fact that the coming Triennial will do much to define the sphere of the Auxiliary in its relations it has seemed wise to make no radical changes in by-laws or methods.

It is hoped that a strong and earnest delegation will be present from this diocese, and give intelligent aid in the readjustment, by previous preparation of study and prayer.

Indicative of the larger vision of missionary service in the diocese, one parish auxiliary has undertaken an entire pledge of support of a missionary, and one individual in that parish has shown her sense of the reality and need of the work by undertaking another. One parish is training a worker in the home field, and many have exceeded their special apportionments, in addition to meeting their parish apportionments. All the pledges, general and diocesan, have been paid.

All Saints Day, the Epiphany, the Feast of the Annunciation and Ascension Day are suggested as appropriate Corporate Communion days.

There is a deepening sense of the need of corporate Communions in the branches, that the altar sanctifieth the gift, and many have set apart a day for this Service. The diocesan Auxiliary has found the hour of meditation and instruction following, so helpful, perhaps the Quiet Hour may be adopted by many branches. The subject chosen this year—the Gift of Self, that we will meditate upon to-morrow, will make us vividly realize that we must be seeking and training workers from this diocese. Perhaps the offering of a missionary prize to the Juniors might increase knowledge of the work among our young people, and lead them to a gift of self. As the office of an educational secretary develops its work, we may get more of our workers to go to the great missionary conferences held in the summer, and may secure a permanent exhibit of literature for use at our annual and Convocation and even parochial meetings. We hope we may develop a training class, who in turn may train others. Let us plan for such a class at our next annual meeting, announcing subject and leader before hand. The need for this has been created by the large number of mission study classes conducted

during the past year in this diocese. Such a class might be held at each Convocation.

One of the most marked expressions of loyal giving is the greatly increased amount of the United Offering, developed by an intelligent appreciation of its mission. In this connection it must be remembered that each diocese is urged to present with its offering one young woman for the mission field. She must be found by prayer and training.

The foregoing amount represents the special work of the Auxiliary, financially, and does not include the regular missionary offerings of the women in their various apportionments and assessments, all of which are now paid through the parish treasurer, including diocesan and general missions. The foregoing report does not include the work of the women in parish guilds and local charities.

The exclusion of these reports, which are now made by the parish treasurer, makes the financial total comparatively small. But the report in reality represents a year of especial activity in missionary work and service, more women enrolled, and contributing, and an increase not only in offerings, but in knowledge and intercessions.

REPORT OF THE UNITED OFFERING

The United Offering of the past year has been, for the most part, very encouraging, and notably, the enormous increase in many of the parishes. Eight new points have been added since last May, their offerings aggregating \$16.94. In three of these places, Washington, Cave Springs and Mount Airy, I have only had returns from three ladies, one at each point. There have been two removals on my list; Mrs. Bateman from Butler to Attapulugus and Mrs. Douthat from Unadilla to Byromville. I shall return their names in the convocation in which they were at first. Rockmart, Aragon, Powder Springs, East Point, Newnan, Austell, Montezuma, Decatur and Gainesville are still to be heard from. I hope for good things from the last two places this coming year, as they both have new rectors, who are much interested in missions.

I have had many letters to write and have been greatly helped by my assistant, Miss Rossiter Collins, in sending notices of the spring and fall collections. During the past year I have distributed 410 mite boxes, against 725 the eighteen months previous and yet—I have reason to believe there are several hundred women without one. Those who faithfully use the United Offering box, know that they give twice as much as they did before and scarcely feel it at all—certainly not more than they ought to feel their gifts to God's work. If we could only realize how small an individual offering is necessary to make a grand total, we would take more interest in it. For instance, if each woman in the diocese averaged a dollar a year—which is less than two cents a Sunday—we would have had an increase this May of over \$800.00. And surely there are as many women in the diocese, who can give \$2.00 and more, as there are women who cannot give the dollar.

From our end of the line perhaps \$2.00 looms very large, but from the other end, whether viewed by the heathen women with none of the comforts of the love of Christ, or by our dear Lord himself, it must look pitifully small and inadequate. Suppose we try in the future to look at it from the "other end."

OFFICERS' SUGGESTIONS TO THE BRANCHES

The diocesan officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, to whom was referred action upon the details of readjustment, by the annual convention in Athens, submit the following recommendations:

That the diocesan Auxiliary no longer maintain joint diocesan pledges, but send its offerings for missions through the parish treasurer. A parish, or group of parishes, or Convocation Auxiliary may maintain a pledge for general missions, preferably on the apportionment of the Board of Missions, above the parish apportionment, if that be met, designated if preferred, but sent through the parish treasurer. The duplex envelopes are kept by the parish.

Keep a record of all such offerings to report annually to the treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. C. E. Wheat, Griffin.

Send to Mrs. Wheat your part of the expense fund, which each branch is asked to somewhat increase. This is for printing, stationery, and other central expenses.

Do not stress money raising, but give an opportunity to all who may wish to make an offering, either through dues, or voluntary offerings at meetings or services. Rather give earnest prayers, influence and personal effort, and aid in raising the apportionment of your parish.

Promote in every way the annual Every Woman Canvas, and strive to enlist every woman for study and prayer, and the making of a weekly offering for missions, and the taking of a United Offering Box. Urge her to attend the Auxiliary meetings and read the Spirit of Missions.

Have frequent program meetings, with missionary talks from your Rector, returned missionaries, or others informed. Appoint a leader, to be trained, for the study. It is advisable for all the branches of a Convocation to have the same text book, that at the quarterly meetings of the Convocation, there may be a lantern lecture, or other general survey of the subject, presented. At the same time have reports on mission study from each branch.

The Church Missions House suggests the additional study the coming year of a four weeks course in St. Matthew's Gospel, or The Acts, and will send an outline for such study on request.

It is recommended that Oct. 28, (S. S. Simon and Jude) be observed as the day for the Corporate Communion of each branch of the Auxiliary annually.

Cooperate with the Junior Auxiliary and Babies Branch, receiving a report from the local directors at each meeting. Seek out those who may volunteer for trainers in study classes, or for wider missionary service. Strive to deepen the spirit of intercessory prayer for the parish, the diocese and the whole world.

Remember as a Communicant you share in the apportionments of the parish, parochial, diocesan, and general.

Extra missionary endeavors form auxiliary work.

WHAT PART CAN WE TAKE IN THE WORK OF THE AUXILIARY

Prayer.

I. You can pray daily, and at all meetings of the Branch for God's blessing upon the missionary work of His Church,

Interest.

II. You can do all in your power to increase your own intelligent interest in the work and to interest others in it.

Apportionment.

III. You can find out what is the fair share of your Branch for General Missions and see that it is paid.

Gifts.

IV. You can make special gifts of money for Missionary Bishops, Bible Women, hospitals, or schools.

V. You can fill a United Offering Box.

VI. You can send by yourself or among your friends a Missionary Box of suitable supplies to a Missionary or to a Mission School or to a Mission Hospital or to a Missionary Bishop.

Study.

VII. You can take the magazine, "Spirit of Missions," and read it at home and in your branch.

THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.
