**MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL CONVENTION**

---

The Seventh annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese of Atlanta was held in the Church of the Incarnation, led by Bishop Nelson, who gave the Auxiliary an address of great breadth of vision and spiritual counsel. On request of the Bishop the Auxiliary then adjourned to meet with the Council at its opening Service of the Holy Communion, immediately following, this service being substituted for the proposed Corporate Communion of the following morning. The address of the Bishop and extracts from the addresses of the officers at the morning session of the Auxiliary are found in this Report, following the Minutes.

The roll call showed one hundred and twenty present, representing nineteen parishes and missions. Following Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew's address, giving the earnest counsel and experience of the President, the Memorial Report, presented by Miss Lucinda Snook, was received standing. The Secretary and the Treasurer then presented reports, and the United Offering report was given by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, Custodian. This report showed the remarkable extension of the work, and reminded the convention that at the Triennial last fall in New York, this diocese had more than doubled its United Offering of the previous Triennial. Miss Mary Pearson presented the Junior Auxiliary report, showing its splendid organization and growth. She was followed by Mrs. Robert C. Little, giving the report of the Little Helpers. Mrs. Little's resignation as Secretary of the Babies Branch was accepted with much appreciation of her faithful service.

Miss Rosa Woadberry made an address on the educational opportunities of the Auxiliary. She referred to the Educational Board of the Church, and its work of extension as a result of the profound sense of need expressed at the General Convention in New York. Its general and traveling Secretary, the Rev. Wm. E. Gardner, and Deaconess Goodwin for the woman's schools and colleges, are always ready and eager to promote the work in any parish or diocese. Phases of the work are the developing of Christian education in Church Schools, in Sunday Schools, the use of Churchly literature in Church summer conferences and in mission study classes and missionary plays, and Sunday School institutes, and through a greatly intensified devotional life. Miss Woodberry urged an education in faith as well as science and literature, the study of the history of the Church, and its worship and teachings, the realization of a personal God through a knowledge of His ways—a seeing through the senses the things of eternity.

An invitation from Bishop and Mrs. Nelson to a buffet supper at their home Thursday evening was received and accepted with

much appreciation. The convention adjourned its morning session to lunch with the Council, the guests of the ladies of the Incarnation.

The afternoon session was opened with an earnest presentation of the mill settlement work at Unity Mills, LaGrange, by Dr. Mary Brewster. She urged the Auxiliary to seek out women who are taking up a profession or business, and urge the claims of settlement work upon Christian women, who could get this training here, and in the hospital also. An opportunity to know this work by inspection will be afforded the women when the Council meets there for its annual Conference, in October, to which the Auxiliary is also invited. Miss Sara E. White made an appeal for aid in behalf of the proposed Church kindergarten to be established at the Pines, Tallulah Falls. The opening of the power plant at the Falls has brought a number of engineers and mechanicians here with their families, who will be greatly helped by such a work. Miss White offers expenses to any trained Church kindergartener, who will come for the summer, and inaugurate the work at this ideal summer resort. Mrs. Isabel O'Hear gave a very full account of Dr. Teusler's work in St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, and his aspiration to make it the International Hospital of the East, showing the Board of Missions' endorsement. Following her address, pledges for this work were received from the parishes, amounting to \$270.00, with many still to be heard from.

The Every Member Canvass, as carried out by St. Luke's, Atlanta, was described by Mrs. W. H. Allen, who told of the wonderful results accomplished. She told of the information gained regarding the members of the parish, the strengthening of the Auxiliary and Guild work, and the marked addition to the finances of the parish. Many questions were asked Mrs. Allen of the details of the canvass, and other parishes gave much valued information, especially Trinity, Columbus.

Especially valuable was the account of the colored work at St. Paul's, which is maintaining an industrial school for colored youths, under most limited financial support. Yet its woman's auxiliary reported a fund raised for the apportionment and for its organ fund.

The following resolutions were adopted and referred to the Council, which referred them with favorable recommendation to the Clergy:

Whereas, This organization is pledged to co-operate in the plans and work of the Board of Missions, and

Whereas, It is the expressed wish of the Board that the Auxiliary shall aid in raising the parish apportionment,

Be it resolved, That the clergy and officers of the parishes of this Diocese be requested to assign to the parish branch of the

Auxiliary a proportionate part of the parish apportionment to be raised, and

Be it resolved further, That the clergy and officers be requested to furnish to the Auxiliary treasurer a monthly statement of the status of the woman's offerings for missions through the duplex envelope and otherwise, and also the amount paid monthly to the Church Missions House on the apportionment by the parish as a whole.

The Thursday morning session began with a Quiet Hour, following the Council Service of Morning Prayer. This was led by the Rev. Dr. Merlinjones, of Gainesville. He said that a quiet hour was particularly appropriate that His workers might listen and hear the Voice of omnipotent love and be ready to answer the call. He stressed the blessedness of the early Communion on Sunday mornings. Taking the letters of the Woman's Auxiliary, he gave a "string of pearls" of very beautiful thoughts, to cluster about the letters—suggesting that *W* might remind of work and worship; *O* of opportunity, obligations and obedience; *M* manifest, master, missions; *A* of auxiliary, ascension, attention; *N*'s of new sacrifice, new strength, new surrender.

Sister Mary Frances told of the great assistance the Auxiliary has been to the Appleton Church Home in Macon, and of the eagerness of the children's interest in their benefactors. Of the thirty-nine children, thirteen are not yet provided for by this method of each parish taking one or more as its especial charge. It is hoped that soon each child will have "her lady."

Each branch was asked to contribute something towards the Missionary Insurance Fund, which is a "Special", and also to the Expense Fund of the Auxiliary for publication of its Report, postage, printing, etc., to be sent to Mrs. H. N. Hurt, Treasurer.

Miss Lucinda Snook was introduced to the Auxiliary, as the New Atlanta Convocation Vice President. She thanked the Auxiliary for this opportunity and the privilege of serving in its work, and expressed the intention of visiting each branch. She urged co-operation.

Resolutions of thanks were presented by Mrs. W. C. Shaw of Christ Church, Macon, voicing the appreciation of the entire Auxiliary of the gracious hospitality of the ladies of the Church of the Incarnation, and of its Rector, the Rev. Leonard B. Richards and Mrs. Richards, and to Bishop and Mrs. Nelson.

The Auxiliary will meet at the time of the Council, in Marietta, St. James, the first week in May, 1915.

It was especially urged that the parishes send representatives to the Summer Church Conferences for training. Each auxiliary was asked to learn how her parish apportionment stands and to

write to the Church Missions House for its monthly report on the diocese of Atlanta apportionment.

#### THE ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP

---

My dear friends and fellow helpers:—As from my position as an executive member of the Board of Missions of the Church in this country, I am so situated as more accurately to know and measure the world's needs and the demand of those who have not known Him upon our charity; so I can the more highly value your labors of love, your self-denial and your devotion for the extension of the Blessed Gospel.

This double responsibility presses me to ask your renewed and enlarged efforts for the great Cause. I do not know any contributors who toil and energize to the same extent as your Board of Missions. We were compelled this year to deny at least \$50,000 to places and to people which convinced our judgment of their great necessity.

The work and gifts of the women of the Church were practically our only resources to make an increase in a few appropriations and assist a very few new ventures.

I am keenly alive, and so is your President, to the importance of commanding wider attention to the aims and plans of the Auxiliary. We have not begun to secure and utilize all the forces which are ready to hand if, by proper methods, they can once be enlisted in the purpose of your organization.

The concrete expression of these forces will be found when we shall have given to all the women of the Church the vision which has been caught by the thousands of men in the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

As in that splendid combination of effort there are enrolled not only the men of deep devotion but of light capacity and small means but a very large number of the most successful business men, men of highest social standing and of largest enterprise; so we want it to be known and understood that the Woman's Auxiliary is not preempted by the quiet, gentle and retiring women of the Church, whose interest and sympathy far outrun their ability; but that the Church asks and does not expect to be denied the hearty co-operation and sympathetic interest of that large number of those of Her daughters who are prominent in civic movements,—for education, for health, for the welfare of women and children, and for all other objects which affect the moral, intellectual and physical welfare of our people. We must make to them a dignified and impressive appeal to take their proper places in the program of the world—uplift, which is the Church's mission.

They must be brought, by judicious suasion, to realize that no woman of intelligence and heart, however exalted her station, has come into the full measure of her privilege until she has allied herself with the larger scheme of beneficence and becomes a factor in the progressive power which is moving the world toward Christ and hence toward its highest happiness. We must disabuse their minds that the Woman's Auxiliary is a little semi-social gathering of a limited number of women whose hearts are particularly tender to foreigners, and taught kindly and considerately that in the mission of the Church quite as much as in any other kind of human betterment, women have their part and will not be outstripped by the men of the Church. We must bring the clergy to see that the Church is not satisfied that all other parochial organizations may be filled with earnest workers and a few that are left over, or those who have a genius for accepting the harder and less attractive tasks of the parish, be remitted to the Woman's Auxiliary. And you must also see to it that for the more positive certainty of results and encouragement of your members, the vestries recognize the propriety, not to say the right, of the women to be fully and fairly reported in the gifts and offerings for the Church's larger work.

#### ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

---

The past year has been one of unusual interest and significance, because of the Triennial in October in New York. Our Diocesan representatives were wonderfully refreshed, encouraged and inspired, by corporate communion, quiet hours, mission study classes—business and social meetings—and their reports have deeply interested and encouraged our members at home.

At the meeting of the Convocation at Rome in November, the Bishop invited all the women of the auxiliary to meet with him and the clergy. Quite a number of our members were present, and the whole occasion was one of deep interest and enjoyment. Realizing the need of definite work and responsibility for the women of the Auxiliary and having no apportionment, a plan was submitted to the Bishop and clergy, and approved by the Bishop, that every parish branch should assume a definite part of the parish apportionment, the amount to be decided by the Rector and raised by voluntary offerings, dues, or the use of the duplex envelopes. Some of our largest parishes have adopted this plan, with great success: notably, St. Luke's, Atlanta; Christ Church, Macon; Trinity, Columbus, and the Cathedral. With the Bishop's approval and endorsement, I strongly urge this plan, and hope for the best results. The matter of collection and reports can easily be adjusted in each parish.

I have visited twenty-one branches, some of them twice, and have had the joy and privilege of organizing four new branches. One at Decatur, one at Gainesville, one at Manchester, and one at Sparta. All of these are doing splendid work, and we give them a loving and hearty welcome.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my thanks and deep appreciation of the delightful hospitality received from every branch I visited. The Mission at LaGrange, under the Rev. Henry Phillips, interested me deeply. I am convinced the mills in Georgia furnish a splendid field for Auxiliary endeavor, especially kindergarten and settlement work.

The personnel of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, and the deep interest evinced in our work in every branch, have assured me of the fact that we have splendid material and possibilities, but we need development. We need real HEART work. I beg for greater co-operation from our rectors, from our diocesan leaders, our parochial leaders, and from every member of the Auxiliary—but, my friends, the most vital need we have is a deep abiding, profound conviction, of our individual and corporate responsibility to Christ Himself, in spreading His Kingdom—and a deep realization of the fact, that the values we are working for are immortal, and call for the highest spiritual loyalty that the human heart can offer. Therefore, we must ask The Spirit of Truth, that Kindly Light, to lead us—and teach us to say, “I will,” not “I must,” “I am constrained to spread His Kingdom”—kneeling in our weakness, we will rise with strength, and will learn to say this from our hearts. Then we will have joy and glory in service, and it will become efficient, and then we will ally ourselves to the glorious work in the vision of the world for Christ—not a single jewel lost that should deck His crown.

The message that I leave with you to-day is, that if we are going to be true to our stewardship, we must struggle and strive in prayer—we must work with much greater love, enthusiasm and faith—work with the spirit that refuses to acknowledge the possibility of failure, because of His promise, “Lo, I am with you unto the end of the world,” and give more freely of our substance, give with a love of privilege. Not how much shall I, must I give, but how much CAN I give. If we do these things, my friends, there will be no further problems in our work, for the spread of Christ's Kingdom in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta. Let us catch the vision, in all its fullness and glory.

**SECRETARY'S REPORT**

---

I feel that I am somewhat of an usurper in the position of Secretary, but when our Bishop requested me to serve for the past year, I felt that it was my duty to answer the call and do my best for the Auxiliary.

We have been trying this year to become adjusted to the changed methods of the Board of Missions, but I must confess the adjustment has been very slow and our ideas vague; some of us, however, are beginning to see light.

Our President has labored strenuously and earnestly this year; she realizes the responsibility we have placed upon her, and has spent much of her time in visiting the parishes over the Diocese. Her earnest and intelligent suggestions have been received with enthusiasm. Through her influence several new branches have been formed and the work greatly systematized and unified.

I had the pleasure of attending the General Convention in New York, in October, and my eyes were opened to our possibilities, responsibilities and defects. I realized more than ever there must be some mighty power in our Church and religion when for 18 days 106 Bishops, 610 clerical and lay delegates, the finest and most capable men in our Church, gave up home and business and assembled at St. John's Cathedral and mapped out plans for our guidance. At the same time the delegates to the Woman's Auxiliary were holding their session at All Angels.

The meetings were wonderful, not only in attendance, but in depth of interest and fervor of spirit. Conspicuous among the greater meetings stands the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, at which time more than 2500 women received the Holy Communion, and at which service a gift of more than \$307,000, our United Offering, was presented for our women workers in mission fields.

More important than any actual legislation was the spirit of the Convention and the fine Christian temper displayed—it was a gathering of men and women, to whom nothing human was foreign.

We were represented by our officers, Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew, Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, Mrs. H. N. Hunt, Miss Rosa Woodberry, Mrs. Mallory Taylor, Miss Mary Pearson, Miss Sara E. White and a number of splendid workers from the various parishes of the diocese.

In November the Auxiliary met with the Council in Rome. This conference strengthened our interest and increased cooperation. The principal outcome was a pledge by the Auxiliary of \$500.00 to the International Hospital, Tokio, Japan. The Rome women were charming and their hospitality royal.

Last September a number of our Atlanta women availed themselves of the opportunity offered by the Jubilee Union of Mission Workers of attending a study class, led by Mr. B. C. Milliken, of N. Y. As a result mission study classes have been formed in a number of our parishes. I find quite a number of study classes among our Junior Auxiliary; they are doing fine work.

Every member Canvasses have been made in some of the parishes with very gratifying results. I participated in one of them and earnestly recommend them in every parish. It is a beautiful way to reach those who need our friendship and aid; and we are working in this way to give help as well as to assist the Church financially.

Now that the Auxiliary money is chiefly counted in the parish apportionment, I feel that it is our duty to try to make the duplex envelope understood and used, and assist in bearing our share. Some of the parishes are adopting the method of voluntary offerings at Auxiliary meetings, instead of regular dues. Others have found the yearly pledges or dues best for their particular parish. This matter is left to your own discretion.

There has been quite an increase in enlistment and interest, but why do we have so much trouble in getting members and officers? Women will work themselves to death in a Guild and yet fight shy of the Auxiliary. Are we members of the Auxiliary a peculiar class of women? Isn't it just as interesting to aid the cause of Church Extension, as it is to decorate or patch the Church building?

There are in the Diocesan Journal quite a number of parishes and missions we have no report from. Won't you Vice Presidents look up these churches and see what the trouble is and extend a helping hand?

I noticed a little note from the Auxiliary Minutes of 1826 which I think will bear repetition: "Were Auxiliaries general throughout the United States our Society would not be deficient in funds adequate to our most extended operations, and what congregation would suffer by this nurturing within its bosom the fire of missionary zeal—a love for diffusing that knowledge of Christ which is eternal life."

### REPORT OF THE UNITED OFFERING

If every one of the church-women of this part of Georgia would work and talk for the United Offering the next two years and a half, try and place a good many of the mite boxes with other women, and practice economy for themselves, and a corresponding liberality of gifts for the Offering, it can easily be doubled again at the next Triennial. But if we do none of these things and the offering falls behind, how dwelleth the love of God in us, and what of the souls of the women and girls we should have helped. Do not wait until too late, to remember that we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God to give an account of the deeds done in the body.

Bishop Nelson has appointed Mrs. J. N. Talley to assist me and she has kindly consented to take charge of the collections. I am sure the diocese will find her officially, what I have always found her personally, a most earnest and capable woman.

As the three years of the Triennial concluded in October and our diocesan year ends in May, I shall report each six months separately.

We must double at our fall collection, if we expect to double the offering at the next Triennial, 1916.

**JUNIOR DEPARTMENT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY****Annual Convention, Church of the Incarnation, Atlanta,  
May 27, 1914.**

The Open Conference of the Juniors was held in the Rectory, at 11:30 A. M., for the purpose of freely discussing the questions that would be put in the form of motions, at the afternoon business meeting.

The regular Junior Meeting was called to order promptly at 3 P. M., in the South Transept and opened with prayer. Miss Dora Duck was elected Secretary of the meeting, and read the minutes of the last Convention. Mrs. M. F. Fickett, of Emmanuel, Athens, gave the Treasurer's report.

The pledge to General Missions had not quite increased the 25 per cent. worked for; but there was one 500 per cent. individual increase and some of over a hundred per cent. And though St. Mary's, Columbus, and St. Peter's, Rome, were reported inactive,—St. John's, College Park; St. Andrews, Fort Valley;

Good Shepherd, LaGrange; another branch at St. James, Marietta, and a Young Woman's Auxiliary, St. Stephen's, Milledgeville, had been organized.

It was resolved that "two Juniors and the leader" for delegates be officially recognized.

After discussion, it was decided that the Vice Presidents were to have entire charge of their respective sections, and the Convocational Secretaries were to work under their direction, and all were to be responsible only to the Junior President.

On motion, that a Traveling Expense Fund be created, and apportioned among the branches just to pay the President's traveling expenses. The motion was carried. It was moved by Miss Pise, of the Cathedral, seconded by Miss Hill, of All Saints, that the \$50 Scholarship be transferred to the International Hospital, Tokyo, Japan. The motion was carried.

It was resolved that 50 cents be again each branch's portion of the expense fund.

It was moved by Mrs Downing, of St. Luke's, and seconded by Mrs. Claiborne, of St. James, that the President appoint committees: 1st. For the consideration of a Junior Magazine; 2nd, To work up a programme for the 1915 meeting to be held at James, Marietta. Miss Schnell of Trinity, Mrs. Downing, of St. Luke's, and Miss Dora Duck of St. Matthias, were appointed committee on Junior Magazine. The Diocesan officers were appointed committee on program for 1915 meeting.

It was moved by Miss Schnell, of Trinity, that a rising vote of thanks be given the ladies of the Church of the Incarnation, for their gracious hospitality. This was enthusiastically given.

The meeting closed with prayer.
