### MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL CONVENTION

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The Woman's Auxiliary met in annual convention May 26th, 1915, in the parish hall of St. James, Marietta. The Bishop of the Diocese made the opening Address. He spoke of the great opportunities in this organization for women of all kinds of talent and ability, of many whose very success in other woman's organizations brought trained workers for this highest call of service. He spoke of the increased zeal and efficiency developed through the personal work and visiting of the president, and counselled the vice-presidents and other officers to give a similar cooperation to expand the work by mutual conference. The Bishop said he would be greatly cheered by this cooperation, and especially asked that the Auxiliary aid him in the negro work in this diocese, in which for twenty three years he had carried the work, practically alone.

The Auxiliary then attended the opening Service of the Council, which was the Corporate Communion, celebrated by the Bishop, who preached the sermon on the guidance of the Holy Spirit in the Church.

At 11:30 the Auxiliary business session was called to order by the president, Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew, who made an address, expressing first her appreciation of the privilege of serving in this high and holy work, and then urging increased efforts to extend the membership and to promote the study classes, and above all to make prayer, persistent prayer, the foundation of all work, especially in frequent and corporate Communion. She warned against buying oneself off from personal duty by moneyed gifts alone, but prayed for a high vision of new responsibility and determination and deeper love for Christ the great and beloved Leader.

The roll call showed an attendance of 75.

The Secretary read a report of the year's work and the forward plans. Miss Woodberry spoke of the closer touch of the Auxiliary with the Board of Missions, and the intelligent following of the Monthly Report of the Church Missions House on the missionary offering in the diocese of Atlanta. The offerings of the women have been sent mainly through the duplex envelopes of their parishes, but in addition the \$500 pledge for the International Hospital has been nearly completed, and several parishes have given to the Emergency Fund. There has been an increase the past year in offerings for general missions, Diocesan missions, parish apportionment, and in the United Offering, a most encouraging evidence of spiritual interest in the Auxiliary of this diocese.

The Secretary referred to the great Epiphany rally of the



Auxiliary at the Cathedral where they took counsel with the Bishop, and of the Quiet Hour led by Dean Atkinson at the Cathedral, attended by many, the Corporate Communion following. Many parishes the past Lent had one afternoon service a week devoted to Missions, and a missionary offering made. Representatives had attended the Conference of the clergy and laity in LaGrange.

Two diocesan officers' conferences had been held, and plans carefully made for the progress of the work. Miss Mary Pearson represented the Auxiliary at the New Orleans convention of the Auxiliary of the Fourth Province. It was urged that a full representation of this diocesan branch be sent to the meeting this fall in Sewanee, Oct. 19th. An added interest is that the Bishop of this diocese is president of the Synod of the Fourth Province. The Appleton Church Home has been the recipient of the loving and well directed interest of the women, who in conference with Sister Elinor have been most helpful.

The Mission study work has been widely extended in classes, program meetings and normal classes for teachers. Miss Emily Tillotson of the Church Mission House gave a most valuable course in training mission study leaders at St. Luke's, Dec. 7th-12th. This was followed by the organization of training classes in time for the Lenten classes, many of the parishes having classes formed by these leaders, the subject this year being the Social Aspect of Foreign Missions.

Church workers were urged to take a vacation at one of the great Missionary Conferences, the nearest to Atlanta being Blue Ridge, N. C. The courses of study and addresses include the many departments of Church work, and this diocese would reap a rich blessing in a deepened spirituality and helpfulness of its workers. Miss Woodberry closed with an appeal to present this work to earnest young women as a worthy life work, calling for the best equipment.

The Memorial Report was presented by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, with an especial tribute to Sister Louise, the beloved head of the Appleton Church Home.

The Treasurer's Report, and United Offering Report, following are given in full in this report. The report of the Junior Auxiliary given by Miss Mary Pearson, will be published in a separate report by the Juniors.

After Luncheon, the session was devoted largely to reports from the delegates present of the special features of their work.

Mrs. Nellie Peters Black spoke on the Life of Service, and Miss Margaret Camblos on the text of the year, The Social Aspect of Foreign Missions. Miss Dora Duck discussed the Summer Conferences, and had a full exhibit of the work, and Mrs. Bowney explained Mission Study Methods.



In a short business session, the members discussed the ways and means of cooperating in the Bishop's negro work, and appointed a committee of officers with full power to act after heartily endorsing the work. The officers as nominated by the Bishop are published at the beginning of this Report.

The Secretary's Report and the financial statement of the year's work were received by the Council, with words of earnest commendation by the Bishop, who read the report. Many Auxiliary workers were present at the Council when the report was presented, and were greatly encouraged and cheered by the Bishop's words of praise. Many members and officers remained over for the splendid Junior Auxiliary convention the following day.

ROSA WOODBERRY, Secretary.

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Following the Convention, the committee appointed to confer with the Bishop on the plans for cooperating in the negro work of the diocese, adopted his suggestion that the work this year be concentrated on paying off the notes on the property of St. Matthias Mission, for colored children's industrial training. This property is on Lee Street, Atlanta, and the Church work here is far reaching in making these children useful and self-respecting.

The Executive Committee of the Auxiliary resolved to try to raise \$500 this year, and according to the instructions of the Convention will apportion this amount among the several branches and Juniors.

In acknowledging this cooperation the Bishop wrote, "It is a great satisfaction to me that the Woman's Auxiliary adopted so promptly my suggestion of cooperation with me in the difficult and poorly financed department of diocesan work, that among the negroes."

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Within two short weeks of the Convention, came the tragic news of the killing of Miss Mary Pearson in an automobile accident in Macon on June 7th. The news caused widespread sorrow throughout the diocese, where Miss Pearson had served with loving devotion as the beloved president of the Juniors. Many were the tributes paid her character and work.

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Miss Dora Duck has been appointed by the Bishop as president of the Junior Auxiliary, to fill the office so faithfully held by Miss Pearson.

### MARY AYRES PEARSON

#### An Appreciation by Her Bishop

The subject of this sketch, whose earthly life suddenly terminated on June the 9th, 1915, after a tragic accident on the previous day, while she was in the fullness of womanly strength and increasing in value and usefulness to her kind, was a native of the City of Macon, being the grand-daughter of Mr. Asher Ayers so well known to the older members of the community.

As a member of Christ Church, Macon, from her infancy she began early to manifest those traits and capacities which developed in a womanhood of strong vitality, great activity, consecrated purpose and tender sympathy.

Miss Pearson was deeply interested in the Mission Study Classes and was extending her work outside of the parish into the Diocese of Atlanta as rapidly as possible, having been appointed by the Bishop the Educational Secretary, which office she held along with that of President of the Junior Auxiliary.

For the past two years her vacation trips had taken the form of attendance at the Missionary Educational Conferences, in preference to the pleasures offered at resorts. In this way she fitted herself in successive Summers to prepare the leaders of Mission Study Classes; aroused much enthusiasm in other young women and secured interest and attention on the part of many to studies concerning the Church's Mission at home and abroad.

As the head of the Junior Auxiliary, including all but the youngest girls, she spread the spirit of missions wherever she



went, and by her example of unselfishness and the influence of her own appreciation of the Church's work she added greatly to the membership and increased the gifts of that branch of the Auxiliary.

While alive to the pleasure and advantage of every form of legitimate amusement, physical and mental, she was wise to place ahead of them all her love of the Church and her readiness to serve at the behest of those who were in authority. Hence, not only her own parish mourns her loss but her Bishop, who was her confidant and friend, experiences in her passing a deep sense of bereavement.

Her end came in a doubly-kind charity; to refresh a sick friend and to supply the necessities to some needy people, not accessible or not known to many. It seems that when not engaged in more exacting duties she was constantly employed in a multitude of small acts of thoughtfulness and beneficence, so commonly overlooked or omitted.

As we keep this beautiful life in perpetual remembrance it should incite many to the maintenance of the highest ideals and the accomplishment of ever greater and greater things for the Master.

The celebration of the Holy Communion in Christ Church, Macon, on the morning of her Burial was a sacrament of blessed unity of the saints living and the saints departed, and the burial itself with its expression of animated devotion to the sacred purposes of life was of the nature of a triumph, and the hymns paens of victory won through Christ.

If there be an inspiration in a life well and truly led, the Church girls of the diocese have in Mary Ayres Pearson a leader and example which should stimulate them to the best things of which they are capable, for "she being dead", in popular expression, but alive in the truest sense of the Life perpetual and more abundant, "yet speaketh" in terms of faith and hope, of loyalty and love, of sacrifice and of expectancy.

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#### REPORT OF THE UNITED OFFERING

May 1914—May 1915

In presenting this report, I desire to give all credit to my assistant, Mrs. J. N. Talley, for her faithful and efficient work in receiving and taking charge of the United Offering, thus relieving me of much labor and care.

Exactly one half of the time, between the Triennial of 1913 and that of 1916 has elapsed. We glance over the eighteen months past and see—what? Do the figures look as if over-much self-denial has been practised? Do we see anything—ex-



cept in size—that reminds us of the widow's mite? She cast in *all* that she had. Fortunately for us, we have another eighteen months in which to turn back the tide of selfishness—whether personal or parochial—and increase our prayers and the Offering to some proportion of what they should be.

We ought to have \$3,000.00 to place on the altar at the Triennial of 1916. But this sum can only be raised now by acute self-denial. It will not be enough to give what happens "to come handy", and it will have to be given daily or weekly. To wait until the end and then in desperation pull out a dollar, will not help you nor the fund, as your offering should.

A dollar a year is less than one two-cent postage stamp a week. Divide what you gave last year by the number of weeks you were collecting it.
