**CLELAND KINLOCH NELSON—OUR BISHOP****In Memoriam—The Woman's Auxiliary**

It is with a sense of inexpressible sorrow that we meet in this annual convention, the tenth of our Bishop's Episcopate in the diocese of Atlanta, the first without his beloved presence. The message of his death on the eve of his twenty-fifth anniversary brought a great grief and a great loneliness and bereavement to the women of the Auxiliary. Ours was a peculiar privilege to join hand and heart with him in the Master's service, and cherished indeed were his words at this opening session—words of gracious commendation, loving sympathy and wise counsel. Here we could see most intimately his vision for bringing the world to Christ—know the consecrated life of prayer, of courageous adventure—of patient service. We could feel somewhat the difficulties, the disappointments, yet through them the wise constructive plans, the abiding faith, the worship and work of this man of God.

Our hearts are very full as we think of the stress and care and oftentimes weariness of the labors of these twenty-five years—that we might have life more abundantly. We who worked with him know only too well that often he must have made bricks without straw—yet how gladly he served—with what industry and loyalty, what great business ability, what strength and inspiration in leadership, with what infinite sympathy in our weakness. And truly God blessed his labors—not only in a wonderful increase in parishes and missions established, in more intelligent and abundant offerings, in extending the blessings of the Church to the weak and unfortunate, in a deepened spiritual life of his people, but also making the voice of the Church honored and potential in the great constructive forces of his state and nation—in his service, as patriot, statesman, Churchman.

In our companionship in the house of God through the years we can never forget the well ordered Services, the beloved voice in Confirmation and Holy Communion, the rich store of knowledge and experience in sermon and instruction. And those of us who have been privileged to see and hear him in the General Convention of our Church can never forget his noble leadership and wise counsels there. On its many committees, on the Board

of Missions, in its joint sessions, our Bishop was notably honored in expressing with courageous loyalty and power the mind of the Church. Of commanding presence, in the dignity of his lofty office, with noble justice and high courtesy, he was ever marked as a man among men,—the Christian gentleman, the Bishop in the Church of God.

As women of the Church, to whom the Christian home is very sacred, and to whom love and sympathy are very dear, our hearts tenderly cherish the sweet memories of his presence in our homes, the benediction of his presence, his genial comradeship and kindly solicitude, his tenderness to the aged and sick—all cement an everlasting friendship.

And there was a spot dearly loved, sacred to him, cherished for rest and refreshment, around which clustered chivalrous devotion and the holiest of human devotions—his home. Here amid surroundings of the beautiful simplicity and refinement of taste that ever marked his life, he found his highest earthly joys with the beloved, the idolized companion of his life. No nobler tributes were ever paid to woman than those our Bishop paid his wife—often in sermons, in addresses—the inspiration of his life, his sunshine and comfort, in the long years of their wedded life, a woman whose nobility of soul and radiant spirit made home a paradise on earth for her husband. It is to this beloved one to-day our hearts go out in tenderest loving sympathy in the awful loneliness and grief of separation. There where every spot is so richly associated with his presence, his flowers, his books, his pictures,—there where he lay in the majesty of death, where the sweet cathedral chimes pealed as they lovingly bore him to his last resting place,—there in her sorrow we can utter no words, but earnestly pray our God whom he served to bring her comfort and peace.

Surely such a life of prayer and faith was ordered in all its ways by our heavenly Father, and the call home was the voice of God—to enter into the joys of his Lord, the blessedness of the spirit life,—closer now in the Communion of saints in Christ our Savior.

God grant that we may follow his life and precepts and carry forward his work by God's help as we say

O blest communion, fellowship divine,
We feebly struggle, they in glory shine.
Yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine.
Alleluia.

MINUTES OF THE TENTH ANNUAL CONVENTION

The tenth annual convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta met in the Appleton Church Home Chapel, Macon on April 18th, the guests of St Paul's Church, following a Corporate Communion with the Council in St. Paul's, Bishop Bratton of Mississippi, Celebrant and preacher.

Following the opening prayers, a Memorial to Bishop Nelson was read by Miss Rosa Woodberry, followed by the All Saints Collect.

The session was called to order by the President, Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew, whose address gave an inspiring account of the recent Triennial, and an earnest appeal for extending the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Mallory Taylor presented the United Offering report, with an account of the great Triennial United Offering Service. The amount from this diocese was \$2407.

Miss Margaret Camblos, educational secretary, told of the great growth of the Study Classes, and that \$30.15 had been sent for Bishop Colmore's Rest House, Porto Rico. She urged attendance on the Summer Conferences—Blue Ridge, June 28th, Sewane, August 5th-17th. The next year's subject for Mission study is the Bible Course, Bishop Rhinlander's text, and "Missions according to the Bible."

Following the Secretary's report, was presented the Treasurer's report, showing \$60 received for the expense fund to be represented by the president at St. Louis, and that \$1064.40 had been received to date for the Bishop's fund for negro and mill work. This has been increased since.

The Church Periodical Club of the diocese, showed a widening and far reaching organization, under Miss Sara E. White. It plans to aid in programs, study classes, and in being used for Christmas gifts, as well as sending its literature into needed circles, also in camp and hospital.

The Junior Auxiliary report by Miss Dora Dick, showing the growing interest in offering personal service for the foreign field—and the more earnest preparation of leaders of branches. Twenty six have had study classes, Manana being the text. Over 350 Christmas gifts have been made, and a \$500 memorial class room, St. Mary's Shanghai, in memory of their beloved leader, Mary Pearson, is nearing completion. There are 55 branches.

Section 1, under Mrs. J. C. Hoke, has doubled its membership. The new Junior plan works through the Sunday School, calling for more leaders for boys and girls.

The Appleton Church Home was asked to tell of its work, and the account given by Sister Elinor showed over forty little

ones cared for on a very slender income. Many spoke of its beneficent work, the spiritual, mental and physical care of these little ones, of the beautiful home life, of the daily chapel services, where the school is the well trained churchly choir. On motion of Mrs. Mallory Taylor the Appleton Home Society, was endorsed.

Mrs. Taylor read the constitution and by-laws as revised by Bishop Nelson. Each parish was urged to form a branch society, reporting to the central organization under Mrs. Taylor. It was urged that money instead of clothing be sent, for greater uniformity and certainty of income. It was clearly shown that this is no charity, nor mission work, and while situated in Macon, is a diocesan debt, as we accepted Mr. Appleton's gift. Christ Church, Macon, forms the central chapter. This is not an auxiliary but a diocesan society.

It was voted to send the \$1200 special for negro and mill work through the board of missions.

The Auxiliary voted to appropriate this year \$250 for St Agnes School, Kyoto, and \$250 for the Church General Hospital, at Wuchang, leaving a balance of \$700 of the proposed \$1200 to be raised, for negro and mill work, in the discretion of the officers.

Two committees were formed, one on Pledges, Mrs. Ulric Atkinson chairman, and one on Auxiliary Extension, Mrs. J. N. Talley chairmau.

Action was taken on the recommendations of the joint committee of the Auxiliary and Board of Missions, affirmatively in each case.

A suggestion from the president that an election of officers be ordered was set aside, with the resolution that the present officers be continued in office.

A committee on constitution and by-laws was appointed, Miss Rosa Woodberry, chairman, to report at the next convention a completely revised constitution, in harmony with the reorganized general Auxiliary.

It was voted that Auxiliary work be confined to that supported by the Board of Missions, and that in future only such reports as bear upon Auxiliary work be included in the annual Report. It is understood that this excludes all guild and local philanthropic work.

A committee was appointed to increase the expense fund in order that the expenses of officers might be met.

Resolutions of thanks were extended the Macon ladies for their delightful hospitality.

Concluding the program was an address on the negro work, by the Rev. J. S. Braithwaite, of St. Christopher, Columbus.

The financial report of the Auxiliary was presented to the

Council, and was received with a standing vote of thanks. It showed a notable increase in nearly all lines of Auxiliary endeavor.

On Thursday morning the Auxiliary held its United Offering Service, with a Celebration of the Holy Communion.

The ladies were entertained at breakfast later, in the parish hall of St. Paul's.

There were fifty two present, as delegates, and twenty visitors.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In a brief survey of the past two year's record of the Auxiliary there is cause for thankfulness in the increased opportunities for knowledge and service, and the marked increase in offerings.

The challenge of the Bishop for greater things in diocesan service was gladly met with a pledge for \$1200 for his work among the mill operatives and negroes, double the pledge of the year previous, and both have been practically completed, having brought joy to his heart, and greatly lightening these burdens. Not the least blessing to the women in it has been increased knowledge and sympathy in the negro and mill problems.

The branches throughout the diocese have felt the stimulus of the periodal visits and spiritual leadership of our beloved president, who has given her time and strength to this service. Her attendance at the Triennial brought to the parishes valued benefits in knowledge of the tried methods of the Church, and in a world wide vision of the Master's work. Mrs. Pettigrew's story of the General Convention as told in many a city and hamlet of the diocese will be an inspiration and guide in the coming years.

The Auxiliary observes its annual corporate Communion on the Feast of the Epiphany. The devotional life of the women was further deepened in the Pilgrimage of Prayer that was observed during Holy Week throughout the diocese.

The Mission study classes have been widely extended, under the direction of Miss Margaret Camblos, particularly through her normal classes for leaders. A gratifying extension of the Auxiliary work is in the organization of study and program classes among the business women, the attendance and offerings being most gratifying.

The Auxiliary has been represented at the summer conferences of Church workers, but we are losing a great source of power in not sending more workers. Cambridge, Blue Ridge, and especially Sewanee offer an ideal vacation amid most uplifting influences.

Many of our women recognized the One Day's Income as a

personal opportunity for special gifts to the Church's missions. Deep interest centered in the Triennial United Offering, a full story of which will be found in Mrs. Mallory Taylor's report.

Among the missionary speakers that the branches were able to secure the past year were the Bishop of Tokyo and Dr. Ludlow, of Wuchang General Hospital, and Mrs. Biller for the Indians.

The diocese had its full quota of delegates from the Auxiliary at the St. Louis Triennial, who brought back inspiring messages to their several parishes.

There was no Annual Report published for 1916, the officers deciding that the expense fund would be best used by having the president of the Auxiliary represent us at St. Louis. The present report gives a summary of last year's financial activities, and the detailed record is on file for reference.

Last year the Auxiliary sustained a great loss in the death of the Junior President, Mary Ayres Pearson. She had wonderfully developed the work in numbers and efficiency, in study classes and the Junior Magazine. Great indeed was the sorrow in the tragic ending of her life. But surely no passing was ever more triumphant. Her passionate devotion to the Master's service still permeates the Junior work. They are erecting a memorial to her in St. Mary's, Shanghai.

The closing months of the Auxiliary year have been intensely saddened by the death of our beloved Bishop, whose loving sympathy and guidance deepened the joy of service. Our most fitting memorial to him will be in carrying forward the work for which he gave his life in richest measure.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR PRESIDENT TO THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF ATLANTA****APRIL 18, 1917**

Miss Dora Duck*Dear Women of the Auxiliary:*

A great cause for thankfulness is the growing number of young women who are seriously considering giving themselves as workers in the foreign and home field. One leader offered her life as a missionary to Japan, but has not yet been accepted by the Board. Will you not pray that many young women may give themselves as messengers of the King?

Two normal classes for leaders were held in Atlanta—one in November on general Junior work, with an attendance of 19—and one in January on the Junior study book, *Manana*, with an attendance of 14. Twenty-six branches have had study classes, besides programs on "Where the Christmas box was sent", St. Mary's Hall, the United Offering, etc. Eight have held program meetings, and missionary books have been loaned in five small Sunday School auxiliaries. Lasting results of the splendid educational methods are shown in the lives and characters of the Juniors.

About 350 Christmas gifts were sent to mountain, mill and Indian missions, beside several miscellaneous boxes. Two Indian girls have been entirely clothed, and a child in the Appleton Church Home. Our gifts of money are to go toward General Missions, and to complete a \$500 memorial class-room in the new St. Mary's Hall Shanghai, China. This is given as a loving tribute to our beloved leader Mary Ayres Pearson. The class-room is to be called the Mary Ayres Pearson Room.

One of the most encouraging things about the work of the past two years, is the increased number of leaders who are doing Diocesan work. Now we have, to assist the President, an Educational Secretary, a United Offering Custodian, and six other officers sharing the responsibility of the Junior Department.

Another cause for encouragement is the splendid growth in Section I or the Little Helpers, under the intelligent and consecrated leadership of Mrs. J. C. Hoke. The number of branches has increased 50 per cent and 6 have been organized to reach all of the children of the Kindergarten Department of their respective Sunday Schools. She has also developed an educational program as only a kindergartner can, exactly suited to the ages of the Little Helpers and as it is the first thing of its kind ever written for Section I, we hope that our Diocese will make a definite contribution to the Junior Educational material, as soon as it is printed.

And now just a word as to the very radical change in plan made in the Junior Department at the late Triennial in St. Louis, Mo., to use the Jr. Auxiliary as the organization for all of the Sunday School children, requiring more leaders, more training, more sacrifice to educate all of the children of the Church to love, pray and work for the spread of Christ's Kingdom.
