

Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into His Harvest.—Matt. 9:38.


THE PRAYER FOR THE UNITED THANK OFFERING


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

Entered into Life Eternal, Emma LeConte Furman, Convocation Secretary of the Diocese of Georgia and later Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Atlanta 1910-1913.

Mrs. Furman's contribution to the work of the Church was through her deep Spiritual nature and life, and the stress which she laid upon the Spiritual in every phase of her work. She helped to keep Spiritual Fires burning in isolated places and in her later life was an inspiration to many through her Bible teaching and her keen interest in all that pertained to the work of the Church.

Entered into Life Eternal, Rosa Woodberry, who became in 1907, when the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta was formed, its first Vice-President, and later Diocesan Secretary, an office she held for fifteen years, Miss Woodberry's service to the Church was the motif of her life. Her keen mind made her a leader in the educational programs and her deep knowledge of the Church, and her various gifts were used for its upbuilding.

In interdenominational work she truly interpreted Church Unity. Miss Woodberry was always ready to help and inspire others, quick to praise and appreciate faithful work. She was so modest and humble, so unassuming in her work, that she filled a special niche in the hearts of all who knew her.

Sorrow filled our hearts in the passing of these two loyal friends and co-workers but our sorrow is mingled with joy and thanksgiving for their lives of faith and service.

Therefore, be it resolved;

That this Auxiliary has suffered a great loss and will miss the joy of their gracious presence and wise counsel and we thank our Heavenly Father for the blessed example of these, His servants.

We offer our tenderest sympathy to their beloved ones in their sorrow, praying that they receive comfort and have sure confidence in Him with whom they and their loved ones are knit together in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of Christ.

Mrs. E. R. Hodgson, Jr., President of the Emmanuel Woman's Auxiliary graciously welcomed the delegates and visitors to her parish and city. Mrs. Fearis Caldwell of Trinity, Columbus, made the response for the delegates.

The President gave her annual address outlining the accomplished work throughout the Diocese, and urging that we, as individuals, strive to make ourselves more fit to serve God.

The United Thanks Offering report was read by the Secretary in absence of the Custodian, Mrs. William Parker, Jr., of Cedartown.

A resolution was offered by Mrs. J. F. MacDougald, instructing the Secretary to write to Mrs. Hurt and Mrs. Parker, regretting their absence from the meeting.

Mrs. F. Robin Graham, Chairman of Missionary and Religious Education made her report.

Mrs. Frank Bone made the report of the Bishop's Educational Fund.

The Noonday Prayers were offered by Bishop John D. Wing followed by a meditation on Prayer. Bishop Wing gave a beautiful talk on the five points of the Cross and their meaning in Prayer.

Mrs. Graham offered resolutions on the death of Mrs. Emma LeConte Furman and Miss Rosa Woodberry.

Mrs. Graham then read the memorial, the members standing as the names of those who had passed into Eternal Life were read. They were: Mrs. E. Phillips, St. Luke's, Atlanta; Mrs. John E. Cay, St. Luke's, Atlanta; Mrs. Horace R. Chase, St. John's, College Park; Mrs. H. E. Rosenbusch, Epiphany, Atlanta; Mrs. John Barnes, Grace, Gainesville; Mrs. H. G. Cole, St. James, Marietta; Mrs. Frank Parker, Church of the Redeemer, Greensboro.

The report of the Gift of Life Chairman was read by Mrs. Will C. Irwin, in the absence of Mrs. John E. Talmadge, Jr. In closing the Chairman suggested that a memorial be established, called the ROSA WOODBERRY SCHOLARSHIP FUND, to be used for educational purposes.

Mrs. Marshall Ellis proposed a resolution be sent to Mrs. Talmadge regretting her absence and expressing our sympathy to her.

The report of the Prayer Partnership Chairman was read by Mrs. Marshall Ellis.

The Appleton Church Home Fund report was read by Mrs. John F. MacDougald.

The President then presented the new Chairman on Negro Work, Mrs. George P. Weathers, of Griffin, who acknowledged her appointment in a gracious manner.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon at the First Christian Church.

At 2:30 p. m. the meeting reconvened and Miss Frances Hagner, Executive Secretary of the Appleton Church Home, gave a short talk on the Home and the needs of the girls.

Archdeacon H. R. Moore gave an outline of his work among the Negroes in the Diocese.

An interesting report from the Synod at Kanauga was given by Mrs. J. LeConte Smith of St. James, Macon, followed by an outline on the Parochial organization under the Central Plan, by Mrs. Mildred Rhodes, Emmanuel, Athens.

At this time Rev. Robert Fletcher, Missionary to the deaf-mutes of the Fourth Province was presented to the Auxiliary by Canon Wm. S. Turner. Mr. Fletcher gave a talk on his work and its various aspects. He so gripped his hearers with his earnestness and willingness to serve, that as he left the hall a motion by Mrs. E. D. Pusey, Athens, seconded by Mrs. Wm. G. Jones, Church of Our Saviour, that a free will offering be taken at once. Carried. This amounted to \$36.30.

Mrs. F. Robin Graham then gave a message of greeting from the Federated Church Women of Georgia.

The President then asked that the new business resolutions be read by the Secretary as follows:

1st. That \$50.00 be reserved each year of this tri-ennium from the Expense Fund, for traveling expenses of a representative or representatives to the General Convention.

2nd. That the Woman's Auxiliary Corporate Communion be changed from the first Friday in Lent to the second Friday, as it conflicts with the World Day of Prayer.

3rd. That the Diocese be divided into several Districts—A Key Woman to be appointed by the President as Chairman of each District.

4th. That a Scholarship Fund of \$100.00 be established, called, "THE ROSA WOODBERRY MEMORIAL." This to be used for one year toward the salary of our Student Worker, Miss Louise Starr.

5th. The finance committee recommends for the 1933 BUDGET: (See page 29).

Upon a motion by Mrs. John Hart it was decided to vote on the items separately.

On the 1st. Moved by Mrs. Russell K. Smith, seconded by Mrs. Wm. Perrin Nicolson, Sr. Carried.

On the 2nd. Moved by Mrs. Lamar Rucker, seconded by Mrs. P. H. Plant. Carried.

On the 3rd. Moved by Mrs. Wm. G. Jones, seconded by Mrs. Wm. Perrin Nicolson, Sr. Carried.

On the 4th. Moved by Mrs. Wm. Perrin Nicolson, Sr., seconded by Mrs. Lamar Rucker. Carried.

On the 5th. Moved by Mrs. Frank Pogue, seconded by Mrs. Frank Bone. Carried.

The meeting adjourned with a closing prayer by Mrs. Wm. G. Jones, Jr.

On Thursday, January 26th, at 9:30 a. m. the meeting was called to order by the President and opening prayers said by the Rev. G. I. Hiller, rector of Emmanuel Church.

The President then presented Miss Louise Starr, Student Secretary at Athens, who quite won her audience by her earnestness and charm of manner.

The Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend H. J. Mikell, D.D., LL.D., then honored the meeting by his presence, thanking the women for their co-operation in the past and asking their aid in the future, and prayers for him at all times.

The branch presidents then gave three minute talks on their outstanding work during the past year.

The President appointed a Committee on the Appleton Church Home for any information regarding the clothing of the girls. It consisted of: Mrs. John F. MacDougald, Chairman, Mrs. G. Hinshelwood and Miss Frances Hagner.

Mrs. MacDougald then read a resolution that all funds for the Appleton Home Fund be paid through the Treasurer. Seconded by Mrs. Frank Bone. Carried.

The President announced her appointments as Key Women of the Districts as follows: Atlanta—Mrs. Wm. Perrin Nicolson, Sr.; Columbus—Mrs. John Young; Macon—Mrs. L. A. Graybill, Jr.; Rome—Mrs. A. E. Young; Athens—Mrs. Lamar Rucker.

A delegation from the Council consisting of Mr. Mac Dexter, Chairman; Mr. Frank Bone, Mr. Robert Pringle, came before the meeting to present the financial standing of the various parishes, asking the interest of the women in their home parish's apportionments.

A motion was made by Miss King, seconded by Mrs. Hart, that the Lenten Corporate Communion Offerings be presented to the Finance Committee of the Diocese to be applied as they see fit. Carried.

The President presented Mrs. Stephen B. Ives as the newly appointed Chairman of the Church Periodical Club.

The Committee on Registration reported 80 registered in all—55 delegates and 25 visitors.

The report of the Courtesy Committee was made by Mrs. H. M. Hall as follows: The following resolution is offered: "That the visiting officers and delegates of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta in convention assembled, do proffer to their hosts, the women of the Woman's Auxiliary of Emmanuel Church, Athens, their warmest appreciation for the delightful welcome accorded all visitors. The arrangements for their comfort, unfailing courtesy, the most agreeable entertainment and, above all, the spirit of cordial hospitality, have made this meeting one long to be remembered. Therefore, this resolution embodies unanimously their unreserved thanks and good will."

A closing prayer was made by Mrs. Woolsey E. Couch after which the meeting adjourned, the women being entertained at luncheon in the Georgian Hotel.

**PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS—TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING,
ATHENS, GEORGIA, JAN. 25TH-26TH, 1933**

Dear Friends and Co-workers of the Auxiliary, I give you a most cordial welcome to our Twenty-Sixth Annual Meeting, and extend to you my sincere wish that the year 1933 will be one rich in opportunity for service.

We are gathered here today to give an account of our stewardship for 1932 and to plan our work for 1933. May we allow the Holy Spirit to guide and direct all our undertakings, realizing more and more the source of all our power and strength.

I want to thank you, one and all, for the wonderful co-operation you have given me during this my first year of service as your leader.

To my own Diocesan Committee, words fail me to express my deepest gratitude for the splendid and effective work you have done and for the beautiful spirit of harmony that has pervaded all our meetings.

To the Presidents of the different branches, I can't say enough for your loyalty and for the spirit in which, during these hard times, you have carried on and met your obligations.

To the delegates and visitors here with us today, for your efforts and continued interest, I do thank you.

To several guilds throughout the Diocese, for their generous support and contributions, I am indeed grateful.

It was with deep regret that the resignation of our Chairman for the Negro Fund, Miss Lucinda Snook, was accepted, but we are pleased to announce the appointment of Mrs. George P. Weathers, of St. George's, Griffin, to fill her place. We welcome Mrs. Weathers to our board and will promise her every assistance.

The Chairmen will tell you of all work accomplished in their different fields. You will hear a report from the Synod, but I want to speak of what I consider our greatest cause for encouragement and rejoicing—that is the new interest and enthusiasm as expressed by several parishes adopting the plan of uniting all women's work with the Auxiliary, which, in some instances, has aroused women who have never been interested before, has greatly increased the number attending meetings, and has enlisted many of our younger women. I have just heard from two meetings held this month at which the attendance was eighty at one and fifty at the other.

Let's rejoice!

At the meeting of the Synod held in September at Kanauga Lake, N. C., this Diocese led all others in the number attending the Auxiliary. Eighteen of our women were registered.

Some of you know of the interest and enthusiasm manifested at the five conferences held during the fall. I want to take this opportunity to thank the Presidents and members of St. Philip's, Atlanta; St. James, Marietta; St. James, Macon; St. Peter's, Rome; and Trinity, Columbus, for the splendid preparation made in advance for these meetings in the way of publicity, for inviting all nearby churches to unite with you and for the gracious hospitality extended to all. At some of these meetings, over one hundred women gathered. At one, every available seat was taken. All were well attended.

Again, I say, Rejoice!

From the success of these conferences, the suggestion has sprung that we could do more effective work if we would divide this Diocese into four or five Districts with a Chairman for each District. By doing this, your President and different Chairmen could visit each District every year, meeting at a different place until every branch had been visited at least once during the three years' term of office. There would be advantages to it and many helpful contacts made. When this resolution is brought before you, I hope you will give it serious consideration.

All of the Clergy and Auxiliary Presidents have been informed of the approaching visit of Mrs. D. D. Taber, one of our U. T. O. workers. She is coming to assist us in strengthening our work and suggesting new plans, methods, etc. I commend her to you and ask your hearty co-operation in her behalf.

In the same capacity, a little later in the spring, Miss Esther Brown

will visit our Negro Branches. Having met Miss Brown, I feel sure much benefit will be derived from her visit also.

From March 30th through April 1st, there will be an Auxiliary Institute held in Savannah for the two Georgia and two Florida Dioceses. This will be conducted by Miss Grace Lindley and other Department heads from New York. We are asked to select twenty women who can avail themselves of this wonderful opportunity to learn from headquarters how best they can serve our Church. If each of you Presidents will hand to our Secretary, Miss King, the names and addresses of yourself, if you can attend, and several others, in order that the Committee might select the required number, I will appreciate it. This is one of the most unusual opportunities we have ever had for leadership training, so let's make the most of it.

While speaking of training leaders, may I urge you all to keep in mind the summer conference at Sewanee. Think about it, talk about it, then help send some of our women to it. What untold blessings this Diocese would have if each year a number of our women attended. To do our best in the Master's service we must try to gain knowledge, wisdom and inspiration, which we would find at Sewanee.

How many of you know that one of our very own young women, Billie Linthicum, a member of the Young Woman's Auxiliary of All Saints' Church, Atlanta, has left her secular position and is fitting herself to become a Christian Social Service Worker? More cause for rejoicing and thanksgiving.

As different suggestions and resolutions are brought before you today, don't be afraid to tackle them even though the times are dark, with none of us knowing what the future may bring. When it comes to doing our share in creating God's Kingdom here on earth, let's be bold, and dare to push forward, for who are we to place a limit on God's plans?

These leaflets are gifts from some New York Auxiliary women. The first shows how fine it is to be a real Auxiliary member and how far reaching the work is. The second, a meditation and prayers for World Day of Prayer, which occurs this year on Friday, March 3rd, and third, a few suggestions of mine that I trust may be helpful. Take these home and pass on to others.

Friends, during these depressing days, we Auxiliary women have a marvelous opportunity to show our faith and to stand like a rock in a weary and troubled world. So many people are just not sure what to believe or whether to believe anything at all. We must let others know that we know, without a shadow of a doubt, that Jesus is the answer and the only answer to the world's problems today. Jesus, who taught that it is more blessed to give than to get; Jesus, who proved that it is more wonderful to love than to hate; Jesus, who showed that it is more divine to serve than to be pampered to. We, as His ambassadors, must bring Him back to a world that has forgotten Him. How are we to do this? By cultivating our own spiritual lives until we be a medium through which others will be led to Him. Surely this is not easy, but it's a task I am asking all of us to set for ourselves.

Then, in closing, I want to say that to my mind, the most important thing of all, as we start a new year, is to daily search our hearts to find out whether we, as individuals, are making ourselves fit to serve God, and whether our work is acceptable to Him. No matter how efficient and capable we are, how much Church work we do, if we are failing to cultivate that kindly, lovable, forgiving spirit, our influence as Christians isn't worth much, and our efforts count for but little.

To obtain a beautiful Christian character takes much patient discipline, much refining, and a deep desire to be Christlike. So, as the days roll on let's

"Take time to be Christlike, speaking oft with our Lord,
Spending much time in secret with Jesus alone—
Thus led by His Spirit to fountains of love,
We soon shall be fitted for service for God."

REPORT OF SECRETARY

The work of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta has been faithfully performed for 1932.

There have been three meetings of the Executive Committee; in February, March, and October; and a called meeting in January of this year.

The Auxiliary was represented at the Provincial Synod at Kanauga, N. C., September 13-16, by Mrs. A. H. Sterne, Mrs. W. T. Downing, Mrs. J. LeConte Smith, Mrs. Banks Yonge, Miss Mary E. King and others. The Diocese had the largest number visitors present at the Synod.

The following services and meetings have been held: Diocesan Corporate Communion held the first Friday in Lent at St. Philip's Cathedral. Rev. Woolsey Couch and Canon Wm. S. Turner, celebrants.

The Inter-Denominational World Day of Prayer was observed February 12th in Atlanta at the Druid Hills Methodist Church. There was also held an Inter-Parochial meeting for branches of Atlanta and vicinity on February 16th at which time the Rt. Rev. Julius W. Atwood, D.D., retired Bishop of Arizona, addressed the Auxiliaries.

Five conferences for Auxiliary women have been held throughout the Diocese with from four to eight members of the Executive Committee present at each conference.

The Diocese had the pleasure of sponsoring Miss Regina B. Lustgarten, missionary from China October 29th through Nov. 1st. She spoke in several parishes and was most interesting and inspiring.

Your secretary has had prepared and printed two hundred copies of the annual report. Until discontinued your secretary has collected

and prepared material for the Woman's Auxiliary pages in the Diocesan Record, and co-operated with the weekly page of the Federated Church Women in the Sunday Constitution.

Your secretary has written one hundred seventy-two letters, fifty-five post-cards, mailed out one hundred and four copies of the Annual Report, six copies of the Record, a total of three hundred thirty-seven pieces of mail.

All Branches except two contributed in the spring: Christ Church, Macon and Holy Trinity, Decatur.

In the fall, several Branches failed to contribute: Holy Comforter, Atlanta; Ascension, Cartersville; Church of the Redeemer, Greensboro; Holy Trinity, Decatur; Christ Church, Macon; and the two new branches in Columbus: Trinity Y. W. A. and Ft. Benning.

Christ Church, Macon has plans for renewing the U. T. O. work.

Most Branches had much smaller offerings in the fall, which is readily understood. This makes the fact that some Branches increased their offering, more remarkable. These Branches are: Church of Our Savior, Atlanta; both the Branches in Griffin, St. George's and St. George's Y. W. A.; St. James, Marietta; St. James, Macon; also one new contributor: Miss Virginia Persons of Talbotton.

Holy Trinity, Decatur has reported an offering of \$24.26 but it is being kept in the bank there and is not included in my report.

I would like for all Branches to understand the United Thank Offering plan. The offerings are sent to me in the spring and fall and I am required to send them on to New York. This is the plan of the National Church and I feel, very strongly, that every Branch should conform to the outlined plan.

With very few exceptions, the prompt responses I have received have been most gratifying and in spite of the fact that the 1932 offering falls short of the one for 1931, I feel that when our loyal women can, in these troublous times, give a Thank Offering of \$1,359.64, our Diocese has indeed something for which to be thankful.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS AND MISSIONARY EDUCATION

From the reports which came in to your secretary of missions and religious education, we feel that the women of the auxiliary are at least trying to spread missionary and religious information and are stirring up interest concerning the Kingdom of God. But we must not weary of our task for real education is, "line upon line and precept upon precept" and our goal will not be reached until every woman is alive to her privilege and joy in carrying out our Lord's command to "go ye therefore and teach all Nations."

Nineteen branches reported mission study classes, nine of whom studied "Building of a Christian Nation;" three, "The Church Program," and "Our Expanding Church" and "Aggry in Africa" was studied by others. There were one hundred and twenty-eight program meetings, fourteen missionary lectures of which one was an illustrated lecture, beautifully presented by All Saint's Auxiliary in which all the Atlanta branches participated. There were seven Bible classes, three Prayer Book classes, one play, four pageants, four Prayer Groups. Seventy-five Auxiliary members are teachers in the Church schools, four attended the Adult conference at Sewanee, and seventeen attended the Synod meeting at Kanauga, N. C.

One outstanding piece of work was a summer vacation Bible School which lasted two weeks, which the Y. W. A. of St. Philip's managed most successfully. We had the pleasure of having Miss Regina Lustgarten, a missionary on furlough from China, Oct. 29th to Nov. 1st. During her visit an inter-parochial meeting was held at St. Luke's, a supper meeting for the young women's groups was held at St. Philip's, Sunday School and Y. P. S. L. groups, and the congregation of All Saints and St. Peter's, Rome, were addressed. Miss Lustgarten's visit was a real contribution to our missionary education program, and we wish that each branch might have shared in this vital contact. The Rt. Rev. J. W. Atwood retired missionary Bishop of Arizona also addressed an inter-parochial meeting at St. Luke's and made the Church's missions to the Indians very real to us.

At the conferences which were held at St. Philip's Atlanta, St. James, Macon, St. Peter's, Rome, St. James, Marietta, and Trinity, Columbus, we had tables of free literature and hundreds of pamphlets and other material distributed, and many study class books and other religious literature was sold. This had never been attempted in our Diocese before and we feel encouraged by the response to our efforts.

We hope this year to lay stress upon training and we are looking forward to the institute to be held in Savannah in April and we hope that our full quota will be reached.

Our Auxiliary has had an honor conferred upon it, in that our president, Mrs. A. H. Sterne has been chosen by Bishop Green of Mississippi to be Dean of Women at the Adult Conference at Sewanee for two weeks next August. We must show our appreciation of this, by sending a large delegation of Auxiliary women to Sewanee. The cost is small for so delightful and profitable a two weeks. We hope many will lay plans now, and work towards going themselves, or helping some one else to go.

In closing I want to urge upon the women to give more time to Bible reading and Bible study. In these days of trouble and distress we need to have a strong faith, hope and joy, and to exhibit a Christ-likeness to those about us. We crucify our Lord by our fruitless lives, by our lack of faith, by our carelessness to spiritual things. We must lift Him up that "He may draw all men unto Himself."

THE REPORT ON CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE, JANUARY, 1933

Someone has truly said that "Infinite pity is needed for the infinite pathos of human life," and we read in the gospels that "Christ had pity on the multitude."

The Christian Social Service Reports coming in from all over the diocese show that our hearts too have been touched by that infinite pathos, have felt that infinite pity, and that we have sought in many and varied ways to alleviate the world's distress.

I am convinced that each year we are arriving at a clearer and closer co-operation with the city and state welfare agencies, that by our contacts we are becoming better informed as to the community needs and are enabled to give more intelligent service.

Our Church in one city has helped organize The Church Woman's Institute of Social Service, which meets monthly for an address by a welfare specialist. Women from all denominations attend. All reports have been interesting and inspiring. To hear that one of our smaller parishes gives a hundred and twenty dollars annually to the family welfare is suggestive. Another parish reports three hundred and fifty visits to homes of the needy, and still another tells of an Easter party given the inmates of a county alms house. To know that all mothers in a certain hospital were remembered on Mother's Day with a flower breathes a beautiful thought. Not so beautiful but possibly more necessary the report from another group that roach powder was furnished a family in an effort to teach cleanliness.

Some of what I call the "but" reports have proved outstanding—"We have had little money but" two hundred and sixty beds have been visited monthly. "I don't believe our branch has any money to report but" we have sewed weekly for the poor and done community library work. These remind us of Peter's "silver and gold have I none but such as I have I give unto Thee."

It is most gratifying to note the organization of groups of younger women who are bringing to us their youthful enthusiasm and becoming increasingly active in carrying out the church's program.

For the coming year I am commanding to you two projects which I have stressed in my own parish for some time. Therefore, I note with interest that they are part of the suggested program coming from The Provincial Department of Social Service.

1. That each Church School have definite instruction in the social problems of its diocese and community.
2. That each parish create or adopt a social service program for itself in accordance with its needs. (N. B.—This is to be a parish program made up of representatives from every group in the church doing social service.)

In closing, with gratitude for the work of the past year let me urge you to still greater activity in the future, reminding you that "not to grow is a sign of decay." Fosdick tells us "goodness at its best means the hazardous flinging of one's life after one's ideals." I commend to you that hazardous flinging.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S EDUCATIONAL FUND

The Bishop's Educational Fund is eleven years old. During this period with your gifts of money and, I am sure by your interest and prayers you have aided twenty young men who were preparing to enter the ministry.

Today five of these men are priests in our diocese and are doing very effective work. Six are in universities. Two are in business, studying at night. The others, after serving in this diocese, have gone elsewhere into various fields working for the church.

Most of the students whom you are helping are doing some form of work in addition to their studies as the aid from this fund does not cover all their expenses but is only supplementary.

Perhaps you will be interested to know the names of these young men and the colleges and seminaries they are attending.

Mr. M. P. Skinner of Decatur, a student at Emory University.

Mr. Frasier Moore of College Park, a student of the University of Georgia.

Mr. Charles Sebillion of Marietta, a student in the Theological Department of Sewanee.

Mr. James Duncan of Atlanta a student at Emory University.

Mr. George Pardington of Atlanta, a student in the General Theological Seminary, New York.

Mr. Frank Blackwelder of Griffin, a student in the General Theological Seminary, New York.

We also have two students at Sewanee in the Academic Department who are not receiving aid but are graduating in June. They will enter a Theological Seminary next fall and will need some help from our fund.

All of these students are of a high type and are making excellent grades in their universities and seminaries.

The auxiliaries' pledge to this fund is \$1200. Your treasurer reports the sum of \$1008.50 received from you for this work.

I regret very much that we did not send the full amount to the Bishop and I bespeak for next year the active interest of every woman in this work.

Today there are more competent men wishing to enter the ministry than ever before in the history of the American Church and due to the present financial condition of our country many of these young men will be lost to our Church unless they are given some aid. Can our church afford to lose them?

May I thank the auxiliaries who have given such delightful co-operation and loyal support to this work. Many meeting their pledges in full, a few showing a slight increase, and to those who have failed, I assure you of a sympathetic understanding.

Let us labor diligently and pray fervently and in 1933 send to the Bishop for this work the full amount that we have promised.

For these Offerings of Life let us praise God, not only in words,

but by giving others an opportunity to receive the instruction and inspiration which The Church offers at her Summer Schools.

This committee suggests a memorial to be called the Rosa Woodberry Scholarship, as a memorial to the late and much beloved "Miss Rosa" who herself was a leader in educational programs and was always ready to help and inspire others in their Church work.

In closing the committee asks the help and prayers of each branch of the Auxiliaries and also special intercessions for new Offerings of Life and for the workers in the Fields from this Diocese; these intercessions to be made by the Parish Branches at the celebration of the Holy Communion in their Parishes on the first Sunday in each month.

REPORT OF PRAYER PARTNERSHIP

Taking it for granted that everyone knows the ideals of the Prayer Partnership Plan, I shall just give a brief report of what this Department has tried to do.

Since January of last year, when Mrs. Parker (retired Chairman Prayer Partnership), turned her lists and books over to me, this Diocese has been assigned several new missionary partners by Headquarters at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, and in turn I have assigned them to our various branches. Except in three instances, every branch has an especial field worker to write to, sending them assurance of the earnest prayers, both group and individual, of the women at home. Stress has been made that we should not, in any way, make this partnership a burden on those in the field, by expecting too frequent replies to our letters, and the branch partners are urged to write newsy, cheerful letters to help sustain the spirits of those who are handicapped by obstacles that we at home cannot imagine.

Our partners now are Miss Margaret Coles, Deaconess Anna Gilleland, Miss Louise Goldthrope, Miss Margaret Hester, Miss Inez Middleton and Sister Mary Phoebe, and they live almost at the four points of the globe! I have written 194 letters and cards and am trying to keep in close touch with both branch and field partners. Written one article for the Record and given two talks.

Our Bishop sent me the following poem as being appropriate to our Department:

*"Alone, in foreign lands
They wondered how
Their feeble word had power.
At home, the Christians
Two or three had met
To pray an hour."*

though falling short of our goal of \$1200. The total amount sent being \$915.90, I feel this is good however, with so many added demands on our incomes the past months. And more girls have been chosen, to be taken care of, which shows an added interest.

It has been an inspiration to be associated with our fine, conscientious Diocesan President, Mrs. Sterne, and with the splendid women comprising the Executive Board, in all lines of the Missionary work, and have met with them in each official meeting.

I attended the Council meeting held at St. Luke's Church last January in Atlanta, and also went to the Province of Sewanee, Synod, held at Kanauga Lake, N. C., this past September. And also had the pleasure of taking part in the program at St. Phillip's Cathedral at the Inter-parochial Auxiliary meeting. And represented you in the Appleton Home work at meetings held in Marietta, Macon, and Rome, Ga. Being invited and regretting that I could not go to Columbus for that meeting held at Trinity Church.

One of the greatest pleasures I have had during the past year was attending the Pilgrimage to the Home in Macon last Spring. I want to urge that all our Church people, all ages, will take the opportunity of going to Macon this Spring to the Annual Pilgrimage and see for yourselves what a splendid Institution we have for girls from the ages of five to 12 years.

And please always keep in mind that the Orphanage is not just an Auxiliary project, but one for all our men, women, and children to lend their aid to, through prayer, interest, and in donations of money, clothing, gifts, etc.

I want to thank the Auxiliary members and all those who have helped during the past year in this work for these girls who have been unfortunate in their family life and who are being taught to be self-sustaining citizens even in their handicaps, and often returned to their loved ones or alone to be able to cope with the world and its problems.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF ATLANTA

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this association shall be the Atlanta Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT

The object of this association shall be to promote within and without the Diocese the great aims of Christian service in Missions and Church Extension, in Religious Education, and Social Service.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

1. The Bishop and clergy of the Diocese shall be ex-officio members.
2. Any baptized woman whose declared intention is to actively engage in any branch of the work of this organization shall be eligible to membership.
3. Others on vote of the organization may be admitted as associates and known as Auxiliary Co-Workers.

ARTICLE IV—ORGANIZATION

1. This association shall be organized with departments along the lines of the National Council.
2. The officers shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents who shall be Department Chairmen, a Corresponding and Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Custodian.
3. There shall be a Diocesan Board of Directors composed of the officers, the Department Chairmen and Parish Presidents, and past Diocesan Presidents. This Board shall have power to organize departments along the lines of the work of the church at large. Each department shall make an annual report.

ARTICLE V—ELECTIONS

1. All officers shall be elected at the Annual Convention for three years, and shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office.
2. Nominations shall be made by a nominating committee, appointed by the President, and the election shall be made by ballot.
3. The Secretary of the Convention shall notify in writing all officers and chairmen of their election immediately after adjournment.

ARTICLE VI—REPRESENTATION

Each parish and mission shall be entitled to two delegates and its president.

No person may have more than one vote and no proxies are allowed.

ARTICLE VII—MEETINGS

1. The Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall meet annually on the day preceding the meeting of the Diocesan Council. The Executive Committee shall meet at least three times a year, preferably in January, October, and preceding the annual Convention. The Auxiliary Board of Directors should meet preceding the annual convention.
2. A quorum of the Executive Committee shall be five. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall be 10.

ARTICLE VIII—FINANCES

1. The fiscal year shall be from January 1st to January 1st.
2. The Diocesan assessment for Expense Fund shall be forty cents per capita annually on each member, this assessment to be collected and provided for by the auxiliary branch rather than from the individual members.
3. The Executive Committee shall order the disbursement of funds, subject to the action of the Annual Convention.
4. The several departments may hold and disburse funds acquired for their specific work. They shall make an itemized statement of receipts and expenditures at the Annual Convention.

ARTICLE IX

This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Convention by a majority vote, provided due notice has been sent every branch of the proposed amendment, and a copy of the same.
