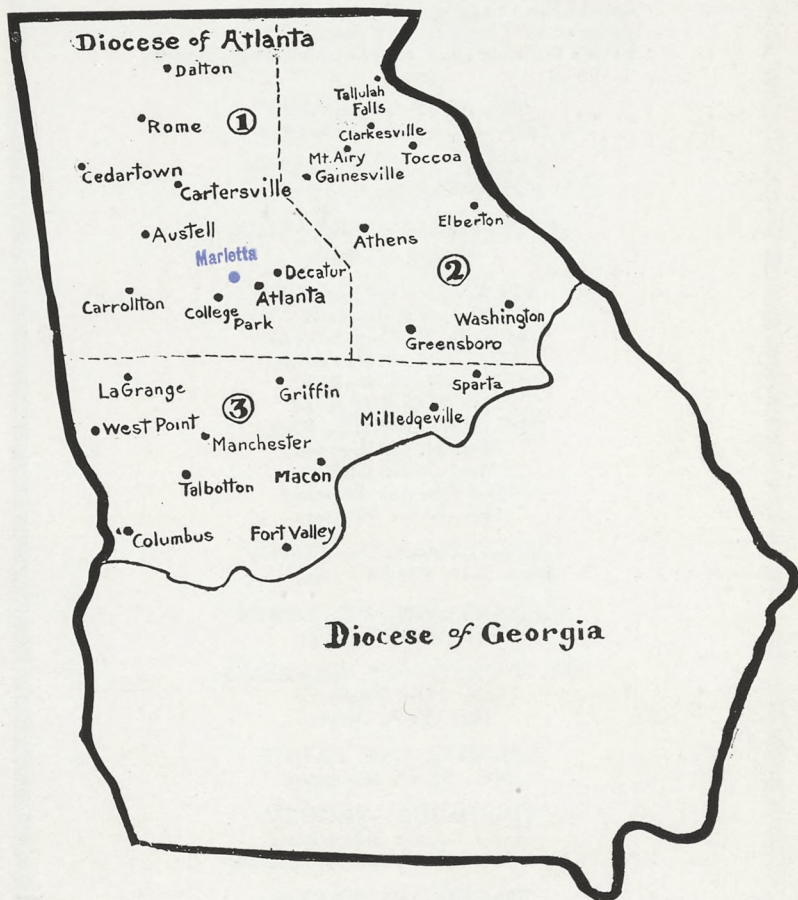

**THEME: "GO YE INTO ALL THE WORLD"****MINUTES OF THE THIRTIETH ANNUAL MEETING**

The thirtieth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Atlanta was called to order by the President, Mrs. Marshall J. Ellis, at 10 o'clock, Wednesday morning, January 27th, in the First Presbyterian Church, Columbus.

The President announced the opening hymn, "Faith of Our Fathers," which was followed by the devotional led by Mrs. Russell K. Smith, Church of the Epiphany, Atlanta. She spoke on "Marking the Bulwarks of Our Church and Preserving It for Them That Come After" (Psalm 48), pointing out our personal responsibility in preserving the Church for those who come after, and asking ourselves searching questions in our own attitudes.

Mrs. Rhodes Brown, vice-president of the Woman's Auxiliary, Trinity, Columbus, welcomed the delegates and visitors in a most gracious manner, and the response was given by Mrs. John Gilmore, All Saints Church, Atlanta.

The President made the following appointments of committees:

**Courtesy:** Mrs. John Crea, St. John's, College Park, Chairman; Mrs. J. A. Hume, Incarnation, Atlanta; and Miss Martha Gramling, St. James, Marietta.

Announcements of exhibits, book display and literature for distribution, and the mimeographed report, "Pathways," of the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, was then made.

Greetings and good wishes for a successful meeting were read by the secretary, from the following persons: Mrs. H. J. Mikell, Mrs. Henry J. MacMillan, Provincial President, Mrs. Sheldon Leavitt, Field Representative of the Province, and Mrs. F. W. Thomas, Provincial Representative on the National Council.

The President gave her annual address, pointing out the increased interest and growth of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year. (See full report.)

The roll call of the branches was then made, with the following representation from each branch: Athens, Emmanuel, 5; Atlanta, All Saints, 12; Bishop's Branch, 4; Epiphany, 6; Holy Comforter, 5; Holy Innocents, 1; Incarnation, 5; Our Saviour, 1; St. Luke's, 10; Business Women's Club, 1; St. Paul's, 2; St. Philip's, 3; St. Timothy, 2; Cartersville, Ascension, 1; College Park, St. John's, 2; Columbus, St. Christopher, 1; Trinity, 50; Decatur, Holy Trinity, 5; Ft. Valley, N. & I. Chapel, 2; Gainesville, Grace, 6; Griffin, St. George, 3; LaGrange, Good Shepherd, 3; St. Elizabeth, 3; St. Mark's, 5; Macon, Christ Church, 13; St. James, 8; St. Paul's, 8; Marietta, St. James, 6; Milledgeville, St. Stephens, 1; Rome, St. Peter's, 5. Total, 179.

The President introduced Mr. Howard Kester, Executive Secretary of the Committee on Economic and Racial Justice, who spoke on "Tenancy and the Future of America." In opening his address, Mr. Kester stated that he was in no sense condemning individuals or groups of individuals, nor tenants, but a system which had grown up through many years; no one had planned it and he felt no one desired to see a system continue which warped the lives of people. He was attempting rather to present a sound aggregarian philosophy which in practice would gradually change a system which must be altered.



Following Mr. Kester's address the meeting adjourned at 12 o'clock to meet jointly with the Diocesan Council, at which time Bishop Mikell delivered his annual address.

The meeting reconvened at 2 o'clock, following a luncheon served by the women of Trinity Church.

Mrs. Alan MacDonell of St. Paul's Church, Macon, presented the names of those who had passed into Life Eternal, followed by a prayer for their continued growth and service.

Mrs. Harold Castleberry, Grace Church, Gainesville, then introduced Mr. William C. Turpin, Jr., who spoke on "World Peace." He stated that there was no subject more talked about than peace, and that while no one wanted war, the nations of the world were re-arming as never before in time of peace. His address was fearless and presented in a most courageous manner.

Mrs. Walter J. Grace, Jr., Treasurer, gave her annual report, which was accepted by motion of Mrs. J. N. Talley, Christ Church, Macon, and seconded by Mrs. W. W. Owens, All Saints, Atlanta. Mrs. Grace's report was most gratifying, as she stated that the budget for 1936 had been met fully, and in some cases exceeded the amounts specified in the budget.

In presenting the budget for 1937, Mrs. Shepard Bryan, St. Luke's Church, Atlanta, gave "The Story of the Budget," in a most vivid and living manner—she likened the world in the time of Christ and now, following with a picture of each item of the budget, and how the need of the world today could be met with the spirit of Christ working in our hearts.

Mrs. Chas. Schilling, Church of Our Saviour, suggested that "The Story of the Budget" as given by Mrs. Bryan be mimeographed and distributed to all branches.

On motion of Mrs. J. N. Talley, Christ Church, Macon, and seconded by Mrs. Clifton Robards, St. Luke's, Atlanta, the budget for 1937 was unanimously adopted.

Due to changes in the Constitution and By-Laws which would be presented in full on the following day, and the election of officers for the coming three years, the President called on Miss Mary King, Chairman of the changes, to present two articles which had to be adopted before the election of officers could take place. Miss King presented the following changes:

It was moved by Mrs. James A. Higgs, St. Luke's, Atlanta, and seconded by Mrs. J. N. Talley, Christ Church, Macon, that these changes be made. Carried.

The President then called on Mrs. A. H. Sterne, Chairman of the Nominating Committee for a report of her committee, and she submitted the following names:

The President called for nominations from the floor, but there being none, it was moved by Mrs. F. Robin Graham, St. Luke's, Atlanta and seconded by Mrs. Shepard Bryan, St. Luke's, Atlanta, that the Secretary cast the ballot for the names as presented. Carried. The Secretary then cast the ballot.

The President presented an installation service, bound in beautiful purple brocaded silk, with an embroidered gold cross on the front, to be used by the Bishop in his installation of the officers on the following day and in the succeeding years. It was most graciously accepted by Mrs. Sterne in behalf of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. J. F. MacDougald, All Saints, Atlanta, suggested that a message be sent to Mrs. Shapard and also Mrs. O'Neal, both of whom could not attend the meeting on account of illness. The Secretary was asked to carry this suggestion out.

Mr. Hubert Rutherford of the Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School sang two songs, which were greatly appreciated by the members present.

The Rev. R. C. Fletcher, traveling missionary for work among the deaf in the Province of Sewanee, was present, and the President asked him to tell something of his work, which he did in a most interesting and inspiring manner.

Mrs. A. A. Hewitt, President of the Auxiliary at St. Christopher's, Columbus, spoke of her appreciation of the interest of the women in St. Christopher's Mission and of the financial help given by the Diocesan Auxiliary toward the salary of one of the teachers in the school during 1936.

The President then called the main meeting adjourned for the afternoon, to be followed by special interest group meetings, to be presided over by the newly elected officers and secretaries of the various departments.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 o'clock on Thursday morning, with the Rev. Harry Walker, D.D., rector of Trinity Church, Columbus, giving the meditation, using "motherhood" as the theme



for his meditation. He spoke of the motherhood of the Church and the theme of our meeting—Go ye—which carries with it not thought of the present, but of the future, and the example we are giving to our children.

The President announced that due to flood conditions around Cincinnati that it was impossible for the Rev. John S. Bunting to come to Columbus, but that the Rev. W. W. Clem, rector of St. Paul's Church, Macon, had consented to give the final meditation before the close of the meeting.

The report of the Registration Committee was called for, which was given, showing 138 delegates registered with 30 visitors.

Mrs. C. C. Harrold, in the absence of Mrs. Owens, read the following resolutions from the Executive Board:

That the Provincial Gift be raised through a corporate communion to be held in February; \$25.00 of which goes to Provincial projects as listed by them, and the balance to work for the deaf in the Fourth Province.

That a letter be written to the Rev. David C. Wright and Mr. H. M. Heckman for the splendid work they have done in connection with the Diocesan Record, and the informative and useful publication it has proven to be in the Diocese.

Mrs. Harrold moved that the first resolution be accepted, and with second from Mrs. A. H. Sterne, All Saints, Atlanta, it was unanimously adopted. On motion of Mrs. Harrold and seconded by Mrs. Fred Barkalow, St. James, Marietta, the second recommendation was unanimously adopted.

The President then called on Miss Mary King for further presentation of changes in the By-laws (which are printed in full on mimeographed sheets). On motion of Miss King, and seconded by Mrs. C. C. Harrold, Christ Church, Macon, these changes were unanimously adopted.

The President reported on the committee appointed for the re-districting of the Diocese, and stated that after careful study, the committee felt no better plan than the present one could be made.

Miss Mary King, as Educational Secretary, spoke on the standard of excellence, "How Tall Are You?" which had been sent the branches in the spring of the year as a measuring rod of their accomplishments. While only sixteen had been received from the branches, they showed a fine standard of excellence, and Miss King stated that with some changes, blanks would be sent to the branches for their use during 1937. She also stated that the Educational Department of the Auxiliary would no longer handle books for sale and distribution, but would co-operate fully with the Diocesan Book Store, which is sponsored by the Rev. David C. Wright, Athens. Also that the Lending Library would be abolished, and everyone urged to use the one at National Headquarters, 281 Fourth Ave., New York.

The President appointed the following delegates and alternates to General Convention:

Delegates: Miss Mary E. King, Mrs. J. F. Heard, Mrs. John Gilmore, Mrs. Alan MacDonell, Mrs. Mildred Rhodes.

Alternates: Mrs. E. B. Harrold, Mrs. Harold Castleberry, Mrs. Ross Cox, Mrs. Walter Howard, Miss Martha Gramling.

Mrs. A. H. Sterne, All Saints, Atlanta, moved that a note of love and affection be sent to Mrs. Mikell, Mrs. C. K. Nelson, and to those members of the executive board and committee chairmen who could not be present. Secretary was instructed to carry this out.

Miss Fannie B. Duvall, Executive of the Appleton Church Home,



introduced Miss Cathryn Sammons, of the State Department of Public Welfare, who spoke on "Child Welfare in Georgia." Her address was most challenging and covered child welfare in the fields of education, legislation, and social security in Georgia. She was a most charming speaker.

Mrs. John Crea, as Chairman of the Courtesy Committee, submitted the following: "On behalf of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Atlanta, may we express our appreciation for the hospitality extended to us by the Rev. Harry Walker and our hostess Auxiliary of Trinity Church. You have made us so welcome.

To our Bishop and the retiring officers who have made this program possible, we are very grateful.

To all of you who have opened up your homes and your hearts to make this Council a success, we say, "thank you."

We wish to express our thanks to the members of the First Presbyterian Church of Columbus for their generosity in extending to us the use of their Church.

We are thankful to our Heavenly Father that we are given the privilege of meeting together to plan for the extending of His Kingdom here on earth; that we are able to help others through the fruitfulness of our prayers and make this a better world in which to live. To the fulfillment of this aim we are grateful for those speakers who have come to us with constructive messages of practical Christianity.

My Church!—what a possessive feeling that gives us; what loyalty it demands. How much faster our Church will Go Forward if we all think in this manner. May we take a more positive attitude in our worship and activities this coming year.

The Rev. W. W. Clem then spoke on "Quietness of Life," reading as the opening to his meditation, "Lord, Speak to Me." He spoke of peace and joy—qualities of life which one can have within one's self; the finding of God in every-day living; and the contemplation of God in his wonders in the world and in our fellowmen we find a new meaning and a new purpose.

Immediately following Mr. Clem's meditation, Mrs. A. H. Sterne presented Mrs. Ellis with a prayer book and hymnal, the gift of the Executive Board who had served with her during the past two years. Mrs. Ellis accepted the gift in a most gracious manner.

Mrs. Ellis then turned the gavel over to Miss Mary E. King, the new president, and she accepted same, pledging her co-operation and every effort in carrying forward the work of service of the Woman's Auxiliary, and asking for the support of the members in carrying on this work.

Bishop Mikell then installed the elected officers for the coming three years, and following his benediction, the meeting was adjourned.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Trinity Church, Columbus—1937

**"Go Ye Therefore Into All the World"**

Realizing that I go out of office at the close of this, our thirtieth annual meeting, my greetings today are given with more or less mixed emotions.

Mixed emotions because already I anticipate a great sense of loss when I think that I shall no longer have the privilege of the frequent contacts with all of you who have meant so much to me during these past two years. A sense of relief that I can pass the responsibility along to competent hands. A quite real sense of humility when I realize how very much it has meant in my life to have had this chance to serve my Church and my Bishop and you. And above all, a sense of gladness that the Auxiliary is prepared to go forth into the pathways to which the theme of this meeting points—

"Go ye therefore into all the world."

It will be legitimate, I believe, to borrow in this connection some quotations which one of our former Auxiliary presidents used in her address in 1930. She said, "The theme of this message of greetings is 'Paths'." And again, "Lead us, O Father, in the paths of right." "Lead us, O Father, in the paths of peace."

Long before I re-read Mrs. Davis' address the program committee of this meeting had chosen our theme, and the coincidence seems rather significant that "Paths" should have been the theme in 1930 and today we select "Pathways" as the title of our year-book with the charge of "Go ye therefore into all the world."

Certainly since 1930 we have travelled many pathways. Some of them seemed circuitous and doubtful and endless during those depression years, but now there is undoubtedly a note of hope which we cannot fail to hear.

Your incoming officers will be the ones to direct the pathways into which our hopes and optimism will be guided, and it is not for me to set forth new policies for the Auxiliary today. I can, however, ask you to think through some of our accomplishments with a view to our being ready to travel along together with those who will take up the diocesan reins.

To that end I remind you of the booklet of statistical reports, which, by dint of much detailed effort, our secretary has prepared for us. If we read these reports carefully and with imagination we cannot fail to feel that we have grown. The evaluations of our accomplishments give proof of that. My own statistical report is given there with those of your other officers, and the narrative reports are interesting to compare with those in our "Rainbow" book of last year. Especially the summary pages.

Study the page telling of the Christian Social Service Departments of our branches. The very adding of that word "Christian" has given our efforts a new significance. Our scope in this department covers a reach that is almost unbelievable. Our booklet tells of branches who have rehabilitated whole families, secured Federal aid for girls and boys for their schooling, of medical care given to suffering people. One branch alone has secured jobs for 140 unemployed, with the so necessary follow-up work afterwards. It shows help given and a broader understanding of the major social problems which exist in our very midst—such as the interracial problem, the share-cropper and tenant-farmer situation, child welfare, etc.



Our statistics show many of our women usefully serving on community committees and boards in the interest of Christian welfare.

In Religious Education our growth, on the whole, has been slow but very sure. A few branches report classes held for leadership-training and undoubtedly those groups who have adopted the Forward Movement study-class methods have felt a depth of spiritual strength and a greater belief and help in the power of prayer. Some branches are not using the Forward Movement leaflets and helps at all, and I am sorry for them, for I believe that they are letting a wonderful opportunity slip by. I am sorry, too, for those who have not experienced the joys and benefits of attendance at summer conferences. Atlanta was well represented at Kanuga last summer, in addition to our scholarship delegate there, and the ones whom we sent to St. Augustine's and Sewanee. Several of our women served as faculty and staff members at conferences and Church camps. From my observation I am sure that the parishes which are making the strongest contributions to the spiritual life of our diocese are those who see to it that some of the members attend summer conferences each year. I urge that you include scholarships for this purpose in your branch budgets.

Our United Thank Offering has shown a splendid increase which should make us glad. Possibly this is due in part to our women being thankful in a concrete way that our country is being lifted out of the nightmare of the recent depression.

In the interest of Missions—our own and world-wide missions—I sometimes fear that we do not have constantly at heart the great commission that we "Go therefore into all the world." We are rather prone to take the easy course and become absorbed in our personal affairs and not seek all of the opportunities for service which are ours. We can begin by knowing our own diocesan missions and by taking pilgrimages to our Church projects. (Incidentally, St. Christopher's is here in Columbus and you would do well to visit the Hewitts, whom I am sure would give you a cordial welcome.) Make inquiries about just how un-churched most of the counties of this diocese are, so far as our denomination is concerned. Find out about how much your help and interest would mean to our North Georgia missions. And from there read your Church papers and become familiar with the broad missionary program of our great Church.

From a material angle our status today is amazing. A year ago the Auxiliary Executive Board asked that an entirely new basis of pledges be tried and also everyone was asked for a 10 per cent increase. We sensed that a great many individuals and branches rather felt that the new method was complicated, yet without a dissenting vote the new system was adopted. The Board appreciated the confidence which that indicated. We were reasonably sure that the suggested change was built on a sound and fair basis, but we knew that it was quite possible that we might be mistaken. It is with relief and pleasure that I can say that today, for the first time in the memory of most of us, the entire budget for 1936 was pledged and has been paid a fraction over 100 per cent. This was not true on December 31, 1936, when the treasurer closed her books, and we regret that because some were slow our perfect record could not be shown in the treasurer's report; but since that date, those few who were delinquent have sent in every penny pledged, and you can realize with what joy I bring you this message. The proposed budget for 1937 was sent for your approval in early December, and as a reward—or call it what you like—the finance committee asked for no increase, and I am confident that your new officers need feel no anxiety about a continued co-operation being shown them.



The following figures will interest and appall you, as they did me. You women have made contributions of one sort and another which, in all, amounted to over twelve thousand dollars. This came from the budget which was \$3,845.00:

United Thank Offering, \$1,927.29; value clothes and cash in supply boxes, \$566.36; value clothes for Appleton Home, \$701.69; provincial gift, \$118.00; Hudson Stuck Memorial, \$50.00; value clothes for Alto, \$100.00; literature for the blind, \$16.63; value clothes, gifts, hospital supplies, milk, food, etc., \$4,199.27; extra items, \$858.75. From these figures, totaling \$12,382.99, you can see what a wide range your activities cover.

Someone has said that the scope of the Woman's Auxiliary covers "the whole of life." We may well believe it after reading our reports. Don't YOU think that we have grown? I hope, however, that our growth has not been confined simply to material gains.

I cannot close without giving each of you thanks for your friendship and loyalty. Almost without exception every request of mine has been gratified, and it has been a rare privilege to be an officer on your Board. I want you to know that if the past two years have counted for anything, no smallest part of our success could have been accomplished except for the wonderful, closely-knit fellowship of every member of your Executive Board. I have told those nine women who have worked with me how grateful I am for their help and friendship, but I want you to know how they have stood shoulder to shoulder with me, and have worked for you in every enterprise undertaken. At all times I have known that I could turn to Bishop Mikell, and he has met with and advised us and assured us of his approval. Our Auxiliary is lucky indeed to have had such leaders as they have been.

The incoming officers will be installed tomorrow. One of the promises which they will make will be to endeavor to promote harmony, good will and co-operation among all the members of the Woman's Auxiliary. This is a warning which we may all take to heart. Our organization is an Auxiliary to the National Church, but we are of little worth unless we create harmony and strength and forbearance within our own parishes and diocese, and I urge you to give to your new leaders and to your rectors and our Bishop the best that is within you. Let us this year try to make all of the parishes harmonious units in the Atlanta Diocese, and I know of no surer way of bringing this about than for our women to be banded solidly together with the single purpose of Christ in our hearts.

I can do no better in closing than to quote from the recent inaugural message of our President. He spoke of the "ever-richer life and ever-larger satisfaction of the individual." He said, "Shall we pause now and turn our back upon the road that lies ahead? Shall we call this the Promised Land? Or, shall we continue on our way? For 'each age is a dream that is dying, or one that is coming to birth.' Many voices are heard as we face a great decision. COMFORT says 'tarry a while.' OPPORTUNISM says 'this is a good spot.' TIMIDITY asks 'how difficult is the road ahead?'" Can't we women of the Auxiliary hear the voice of COURAGE which would say, "I shall give my best to my Church, and shall help make our restored prosperity a power for Christ in the world today." If we take that path of COURAGE, I believe that our road will lead us to the "Happy Valley."
