Minutes

of the

Annual Meeting of 1910

The twenty-eighth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Bethlehem was held in the parish house of the Church of the Nativity, South Bethlehem, Tuesday, May 17th.

After an opening prayer by Bishop Talbot, Mrs. Israel, the president, took the chair. Roll call was made by the secretary and responses received as follows:

making a total of one hundred and ten delegates from twenty-seven parishes beside the large number from the Church of the Nativity, South Bethlehem.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved followed by the reading of the Treasurer's report. A falling off of contributions from the preceding year was noticed and was traced to the fact that there had been but few appeals for special offerings. The desire was expressed that in the future such sums as were not required for "Specials" might be applied on the General Fund.

The reports of the Archdeaconries of Reading and Scranton were read by the Organizing Secretaries. Emphasis was laid by the president upon the importance of sending all money through the Organizing Secretaries so

that it could be reported by them and also of punctuality in turning in the different funds.

The President gave a brief outline of the business to be transacted at the afternoon session and read a letter from Miss Emery which referred to the representation of diocesan officers at the Triennial meeting. Emphasis was laid upon the importance in the coming election of officers, of selecting those who were qualified to represent the diocesan branch in Cincinnati at the Triennial meeting of 1910.

A motion, made by Mrs. H. L. Jones, of Wilkes-Barre, was carried that a committee of three be appointed to nominate officers for the coming year and was followed by another motion, also carried, that Mrs. Jones be the chairman of that committee with power to select the other members, their re-

port to be presented in the afternoon.

Adjournment was then made for luncheon and the meeting was again called to order at 2:45 P. M., the attendance being much increased by the officers of the Junior and Babies' Branches, who, at the time of roll call, had been in separate session.

At the opening of the afternoon session, Bishop Talbot announced that he had accepted with deep regret the resignation of Mrs. Cooper, whose marriage and removal from the diocese had necessitated her giving up the office of Organizing Secretary of the Archdeaconry of Reading. The Bishop followed this with the news that Mrs. J. P. Ware, of Drifton, had consented to take Mrs. Cooper's place, whereupon a cordial welcome was extended by the President to the new Organizing Secretary.

The report of the Junior Auxiliary was read by Miss Donnelly with a brief account of the business meeting of the Juniors that had been held in the morning and Miss Troxell followed with her report of the Babies' Branch, also announcing that eleven parish branches had been represented by their secretaries at the meeting just held.

No report of the Church Periodical Club being presented the President described in a few words the object of that society.

The report being called for from the committee appointed at the annual meeting of 1909 to arrange a schedule of places adapted to entertain the annual meeting it was announced that the list had been made out and would be published.

The President then read her address.

Mrs. Wood, chairman of the Diocesan Committee on Mission Study, gave her report, following it with a carefully thought out explanation of the means by which a trained leader in mission study for the Diocese could be prepared and the methods by which she could carry on her work. The President invited discussion of the plan and suggestions for carrying it out. After a little more information upon the subject furnished by Deaconess Goodwin, of the Missions House, New York, a motion was carried that the diocesan branch should send a candidate during the coming summer for a course of study at the Silver Bay conference.

Volunteer offerings toward the fund

needed for this purpose were invited and amounts pledged from the floor as follows: The Church of the Nativity, South Bethlehem, \$5.00; St. Stephen's, Wilkes-Barre, \$5.00; Trinity, Easton, \$5.00; St. Mark's, Mauch Chunk, \$5.00; St. Barnabas', Reading, \$5.00; St. Luke's, Scranton, \$5.00; Trinity, Bethlehem, \$5.00; St. Clement's, Wilkes-Barre, \$3.00; Church of the Good Shepherd, Milford, \$2.00; Grace, Dorranceton, \$1.00; St. Michael's, Birdsboro, \$2.00; Grace, Allentown, \$2.00; Trinity, W. Pittston, \$2.00; St. Mary's, Reading, \$2.00; Christ Church, Towanda, \$2.00; St. Peter's, Hazleton, \$2.00, making a total of \$53.00.

A motion was made and carried that whatever surplus there might be in this fund should be used at the discretion of the Executive Board.

The list of Annual Pledges was read each pledge being considered separately and it was voted that all should be continued not including the \$50.00 for the Foreign Life Insurance Fund, that pledge having been only for the one year.

The President called for the report of the nominating committee and was informed by the chairman that she had selected Miss Stein, of South Bethlehem, and Mrs. Woodward Leaveworth, of Wilkes-Barre, as the other members of the committee and that their candidates would be announced later.

An address was made by Deaconess Goodwin, of the Church Missions House, New York, in which she dwelt upon the subject of women workers in the mission field, beginning with the need of, and demand for such helpers, describing the various kinds of work required from them and emphasizing the qualities of character and temperament essential to their success.

The nominating committee then reported their nomination of the former President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary to continue in office, and their election was unanimously carried.

The President made an earnest appeal for renewed and increased support from the members of the Auxiliary and after a rising vote of thanks for the delightful hospitality of the Church of the Nativity, a motion to adjourn was carried.

President's Address

With this meeting closes the twenty-eighth year of the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese, twenty-seven of which have been under the name of Central Pennsylvania, and one under the new name of Bethlehem. And while for five years we have been reduced in numbers by the division of the Diocese, there has been a slow but steady growth in every branch of the work, so that now in this first year under our new name we are giving about as much as we did before the Diocese was divided. I regret that our officers report a falling off in the work this past year in comparison with the previous year. In some cases the reason for this can be given, but in others I fear we must look to our own indifference and lack of enthusiasm. Let us trust that the inspiration of the new name may lead us to greater effort worthy of our King—the Babe of Bethlehem.

There can be no permanent growth without a perfect understanding and knowledge of the scope and aim of the Auxiliary—"a helper to the Board of Missions of the Church as a whole—an association formed to extend through every diocese and missionary district—through every parish and mission—to gather into its membership all women, young and old throughout the Church, with a Junior Department to enlist the young girls and children even from the day of baptism."

To have a perfect organization we must develop along all its lines—devotional, educational and practical. Let me quote from the Memorandum adopted by the Church's representatives at the National Missionary Congress held in Chicago a few weeks ago, and which we can well apply to ourselves:

"We recognize that we face today a world-wide opportunity and responsibility which call for new and better methods and for earnest devotion to the Church's Mission."

"We advocate the use of every effective means for the dissemination of missionary information, especially frequent missionary sermons, the systematic study of missions, the reading of the Spirit of Missions, and missionary education in the Sunday School."

"We would remind Churchmen everywhere of the vital importance of creating in their own homes a missionary atmosphere, and a love, especially on the part of the young people

of the home, for the Church's mission. There is no more effective way of insuring an adequate supply of volunteers for missionary service."

"We should guard against the mistake of supposing that we can discharge our duty to the Church's mission by our money and our work alone. It must have our constant and intelligent prayer as well."

There are several matters which must receive our careful attention at this time. We have reached a point when it seems best that a special officer should be appointed for the leadership in mission study. Such an officer must be willing to give much of her time to visiting parishes and missions and teaching or training leaders for home work. She must receive the stimulus and training herself of some training school or conference on missions. In these days of progression we can no longer work on primitive plans, and the chairman of Mission Study has carefully prepared a plan which will be presented to you to-day and on which some action should be taken.

Doubtless you have all realized that this is the last year before the United Offering will be presented. Only three months remain to gather in what is to be presented in October at the Eucharistic service preceding the great Tri-ennial Meeting to be held in Cincinnati. Mr. John W. Wood says:

"There is one phase of the Auxiliary's giving upon which a further comment would be timely. It is the 'United Offering.' This is the special gift gathered during each triennium, in addition to all apportionments and pledges, and offered at the great Eucharistic service of the Auxiliary held at the opening of each General Convention. The growth in this offering has been phenomenal. Beginning in 1886 in Chicago with an offering of \$82.71, it reached in Richmond, three years ago, the sum of \$224,251.55.

"For some time this offering—or the greater part of it—has most fittingly been devoted to the training, support and care of women, at home and abroad, and it has made possible an expansion and prosecution of work by and for women which could not have been achieved in any other way. With such a fund actually on hand to cover a period of three years in advance, wise plans can be made and timely help given with definiteness and certainty. The Board has had no better

or more acceptable aid than that given by the United Offering.

"This it is, then, to which we would direct the attention of the women of the Church. The next six months will decide what shall be the amount of the next United Offering. Noble as was the total of the last one, the response to its call was nobler, and the provision proved inadequate to supply the need. It seems certain that the offering of lives will be greatly increased during the coming triennium. The missionary impetus which is sweeping over the country is awaking a sense of vocation in many souls; and the work of our special student secretaries is contributing largely toward the same result. If the women of the Church desire adequately to supplement by their gifts the offering which so many are making—and will make—of their lives, it behooves them to work and pray and give most earnestly for the United Offering which is to be presented in Cincinnati next October."

In 1907, we gave at Richmond \$3,593.56. This year we should have at least \$4,000. Our treasurer reports \$2,497.56 of this amount on hand, the balance must be raised by the first of September. I feel confident this will be done, but in order to succeed every woman must make some individual effort. The greatest and best gift would be the missionary herself. And as we have been praying for more women workers, why not look at home for the answer to our prayers? Is there not one women in our Diocese ready to answer the appeal with "Send me"?

In reviewing the work of the year as a whole we find a slight falling off all over the Diocese except in the Junior and Babies' Branches. They have both met their apportionment of \$150 each for General Missions while the

women have fallen short by about \$200. The year is open till September 1. In our effort to not multiply separate funds we have failed to receive enough in the General Fund to meet our Apportionment for General Missions after paying our pledges and our regular expenses. It has been in my mind to suggest a committee to apportion to each parish some definite amount in order that we may have some basis to work upon. In this we would only follow out the wise methods of the Board of Missions, and the Missionary Board of our own Diocese. We have depended on the generosity and good will of each branch to send what they could for the General Fund, but this is too much a matter of uncertainty. Would it not be better for each parish to have some definite sum to work up to? I commend this to your consideration.

That the general work of the Auxiliary has grown is shown by the following written by the editor of the Spirit of Missions: "The work of the women is cause of rejoicing. Their increase has been steady in its growth and magnificent in its aggregate. Had the whole church made a like record, we should never have heard the word deficit, and we should also be doing much good work which now goes undone."

My friends, let the Diocese of Bethlehem in this coming year deserve these words of praise. Let us consecrate ourselves anew to the spreading of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world, each of us doing our little part in that sphere in which it has pleased God to place us.

Reading Archdeaconry

There are twenty-eight branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in our Archdeaconry. Of these twenty-three are active—one can only do parish work at present with the hope of doing outside missionary work in the future. Four branches have not reported.

The Fall meeting was held at St. Peter's Church, Hazleton. Nine parishes were represented by seventy-two delegates.

Bishop Talbot and the Rev. Dr. Correll, of Kyoto, Japan, were the speakers.

The President and Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary of our Diocese were present.

Mrs. Israel gave us some very helpful suggestions for the work for the coming year. Miss Mercur reported that at that time all requests for missionary boxes had been filled. Miss Donnelly hoped all the branches would encourage the young people to form Junior Branches. The Rev. Mr. Montgomery, of the Church Home, at Jonestown, said they were in need of financial aid. Five boxes valued at \$87.53 and \$129.25 in cash were sent to the Home during the past year.

Instead of the regular meeting three sectional meetings were held in January.

At St. Mary's Chapel, Reading, four parishes were represented by thirty-two delegates.

At Allentown four parishes were represented by twenty-eight delegates.

At Tamaqua only the members of Calvary Church were present.

Most of the parishes have had reading classes on the work in the mission field.

A branch has been formed by the young women of Christ Church, Reading, called the Young Women's Branch of the Auxiliary. Their report for both Diocesan and domestic missions is very encouraging.

The branch of the Woman's Auxiliary at Calvary Church, Tamaqua, has been reorganized.

Fourteen missionary boxes have been sent valued at \$1,296.66.

Scranton Archdeaconry

Two Auxiliary Meetings have been held in the Scranton Archdeaconry during the past year.

The Fall meeting was held in St. Paul's Church, Montrose. The United Offering for the year was presented at the morning service. The speakers at the Missionary service were Miss Ridgley, Cape Mount, Africa; Rev. H. L. Burleson, assistant secretary to the Board of Missions, and Bishop Talbot.

The January meeting was held in Calvary Church, Wilkes-Barre. The missionary study for the winter formed the chief topic of the business meeting. At the Missionary meeting, Miss Julia Emery gave a very earnest address on missions at home and abroad.

Circular letters have been sent to all the branches, urging the increase of offerings to General Missions and the United Offering.

One new Auxiliary branch has been organized and another has started in by taking up the Missionary study during Lent.

We now have twenty-four parishes doing Auxiliary work and contributing to the Auxiliary funds.

For the first time to my knowledge, all the funds of the Auxiliary show a decrease instead of an increase, with the exception of General Missions which is a few dollars more than last year. This cannot be laid to a lack

of interest in the work, as we have a larger number of branches than ever before and all have been active and interested in their work.

Several branches have helped pay their parochial, Diocesan and General Missionary apportionments which cannot be reported as it is home mission work.

The Directress of the Junior Auxiliary reports thirteen branches in this Archdeaconry, two of which were organized this year.

The Directress of the Babies' Branch reports ten branches of "Little Helpers."

The chairman of the Mission study reports twenty branches as having studied or read about missions during Lent.

Twenty-seven boxes valued at \$1,420.21 have been sent from nineteen branches of the Auxiliary.

The minutes of the last meeting were accepted as read. After the reports of the delegates present, telling of the number and kind of meetings held during the year and the different methods of raising their money, the report of the Diocesan pledges was read and, when it was shown that there was a deficit in the apportionment of \$1.08 the delegates from the several parishes volunteered to give the amount, All Saints', Lehighton,

finally claiming the privilege of contributing the amount.

The proper way of filling out the blank reports was then explained and the delegates notified that money not sent through the hands of the Junior Directress could not be credited, neither could the money given to the different parish pledges and institutions, as all money credited in the Annual Report must pass through the proper channels.

Of the different parishes represented only eight reported having done any Mission study during the year.

The Christmas Boxes for next winter were then discussed and the Juniors of St. Mark's, Mauch Chunk, volunteered to pack them.

A letter from Miss Lindley was then read asking the Juniors not to forget during the summer that, though they do not meet as such they are still Juniors, and urging them to begin now to prepare for next winter's work; first by continuing their prayers and then by keeping their eyes open for any opportunity that may come to them to further the work; to try and interest children and young people who do not already belong to a branch and try to persuade them to join a branch next winter.

The time for luncheon having arrived, the meeting then adjourned.

General Report

Though the total amount of the Juniors' work, as expressed in figures, is not as large as last year, the real value of the work is not less, as the whole difference lies with the value of the boxes sent and is accounted for by the more conservative valuation put on them by those to whom the matter was entrusted. The Christmas boxes, containing two hundred and fifty more gifts than last year, were valued at \$51.17 less than last year, the same thing being true of the other boxes.

The amount of money contributed

to the different pledges is in advance of last year. The Valle Crucis Scholarship has been paid, the United Offering is increased, the United Junior Gift is larger than ever, and, while the apportionment is not fully paid, it is only \$1.08 short of the whole amount asked for, showing that the Juniors are awakening to the fact that if they are to be HELPERS to the Board of Missions, they must try to meet this pledge first of all.

Two of the old branches have been discontinued and one, Christ Church, Reading, has begun working with the women. Three new branches have been formed, at Grace Church, Allentown, Grace Chapel, Dorranceton, and

Trinity Church, West Pittston, making the number of branches the same as last year.

Three Archdeaconry meetings have been held. In October at St. Paul's, Montrose, with 12 delegates present, representing seven parishes, and at St. Peter's, Hazleton, with twenty-eight delegates from five parishes. A mid-winter meeting was held in Calvary Church, Wilkes-Barre, in January, with 18 delegates present from nine parishes.

At the request of the persons in charge, four parish branches have been visited during the year.

Mission Study for Lent, 1910.

Since the last annual report was printed the Woman's Auxiliary of the Bethlehem Diocese has lost by removal its chairman of Mission Study, Mrs. Miriam Stoek, who ever gave to this department of Church work an active interest, a clear judgment and a practical ability that could not fail to stimulate others to greater achievement.

Standing in her place, and looking on the work to be done, the shortness of our time, and the blessed privilege of the one who is to succeed us, we feel that Missionary study has, in its missionary and historic exhibits, its missionary lectures illustrated by stereopticon views, missionary libraries, missionary scrap books, its classes, its trained leader or teacher, many powerful factors which will serve to kindle in the Woman's Auxiliary the spirit that lives for Christ and the establishment of His Kingdom.

Possibly, no greater problem confronts the Church of Christ in America today than the peaceful invasion of alien people to the number of 12,500,000 since 1880, who depend upon the vitality of her religious life to fuse the diverse elements of these many races.

As the Diocese of Bethlehem contains a large number of alien people the subject selected for study "Aliens or Americans?" and the "Incoming

Millions" proved most timely and pertinent.

In January a letter was sent to the 65 parishes in the Diocese giving the subject for study and other needful information, which was followed by another letter in April asking for report of work accomplished. From the letters received the following report has been made:

Total number of reports received, 35.

18 parishes studied: "Aliens or Americans?"; "The Incoming Millions"; "The Trail of the Emigrant."

7 parishes studied: General Missions.

1 parish studied: Alaska.

2 parishes studied: Missions of Northern North America.

2 parishes studied "Mountaineers of Kentucky and Virginia."

3 parishes studied: "The Islands of the Sea."

2 parishes report no study.

Never since mission study was made general throughout the Diocese have so many parishes reported. This is indeed a matter for congratulation, but with the help of a trained leader may we not hope for an increasing number of those who study, know and do?
