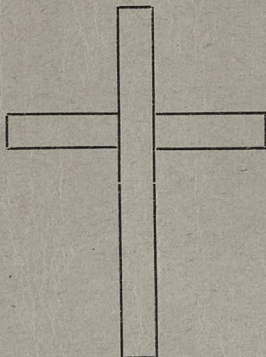

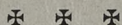

MINUTES

OF THE

ANNUAL MEETING OF 1920

The thirty-eighth annual meeting of the Bethlehem Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was held in Trinity Church, West Pittston, on Tuesday and Wednesday, May 4th and 5th.

The meeting was called to order at 2:40 p. m., and opened with prayer by the President. A motion was made to dispense with the reading of the minutes. Motion carried.

The President's address followed, bringing to the Auxiliary possibilities for larger work in the future.

The Treasurer's report showed \$563.36 in the treasury.

Regularly moved, seconded and carried to send Bishop Rowe an extra \$100.00 this year for his work in Alaska.

Moved, seconded and carried to contribute the sum of \$25.00 to the Mary E. Hart Memorial.

The report of the Nominating Committee showed the nominees for Vice-President to be Mrs. Edgar Sturge, Mrs. W. R. Sewell and Mrs. Guy Johnson.

Moved by Mrs. Sturge, seconded and carried that the Vice-President be elected for three years and may not succeed herself.

In the absence of the Vice-President of the Reading Archdeaconry, Miss Ruddle, acting in her place, read the report.

Mrs. W. A. Lathrop read the report of the Scranton Archdeaconry.

The Education Secretary, Miss Boyer, expressed her pride in the report she sent to Dr. Sturgis. The report covered the period from January 1st, 1919, to January 1st, 1920, so it does not include this year's Lenten meetings. There were approximately two hundred meetings.

The Bishop having arrived, the delegates rose to greet him and he was given the floor for a short talk.

In the absence of Miss Gettel, the Girls' Friendly Society message was read by Miss Darling.

Miss Farrer spoke of the United Thank Offering and gave plans for its growth.

Mrs. Hildebrand spoke of the successful work of the Parish Branches in the Box work and expressed the hope for great results under the new plan.

Miss Maurice spoke of the Church Periodical Club and of her plan to have the Diocese give a Traveling Library during the year 1920. The library is sent into isolated districts where public libraries and book stores are unknown. The library is placed in one locality for six months or a year, under the care of a responsible person. The only expense to the recipient is the freight charge when the library is forwarded to another place. The case for the books and the brass plate bearing the name of the Diocese have been contributed. The donation of books for this object is asked.

Miss Farrer read the message from the Junior Auxiliary.

The Rev. Mr. Neikirk presented the program for the Summer Conference at Montrose, July 5th to 10th.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 p. m.

Wednesday, May 5th.

The meeting on Wednesday was preceded by a celebration of the Holy Communion. The Bishop was the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Neikirk.

The meeting came to order for business at 10:20 a. m., Miss Ruddle presiding.

Miss Tillotson, from the Church Missions House, conducted a conference on the Church Service League.

Noonday prayers were read by the Rev. J. L. Ware. These were followed by a short meditation conducted by the Rev. F. W. Sterrett.

At the close of the luncheon, a rising vote of thanks was given to the ladies of Trinity Parish for their hospitality. The afternoon meeting convened at two o'clock.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the Program Committee.

The election of the Vice-President followed. Mrs. Edgar Sturge received the majority of votes and was declared elected.

During the counting of the votes the Rev. Mr. Clattenburg of Hazleton spoke of the help that members of the Auxiliary can render by making a special offering on the Sunday following the consecration of a Missionary Bishop. This offering is to be used toward an endowment fund to help the Bishop in developing an independent diocese.

Miss Maguire's message from the Church Home at Jonestown showed the immediate need for an electric washer. Motion was made by Mrs. Groves, seconded and carried, to call for pledges for that object.

Miss Boyer moved that we contribute \$50.00 to the Liberia League. Motion seconded and carried.

The register showed 28 parishes represented by 154 delegates.

Miss Tillotson then conducted a conference on the new plan for Box-work. The meeting was adjourned at 5 p. m.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Since our last annual meeting the great Convention and Triennial of 1919 have passed into history, marking an epoch in the life of the Church. It was said that the Triennial despatched more business and passed more constructive legislation than ever before. The spirit shown by the women was most courageous and devoted. They realized fully that more responsibilities were being put upon them, and they were ready and willing to accept those responsibilities.

One of the most radical changes made by the Convention was the abolishing of the Board of Missions. By the stroke of the pen that Board, which had served the Church for so many years, went out of existence; and its place is now taken by the organization known as The Presiding Bishop and Council. This organization takes care of the Missionary work of the Church, and also the Religious Education and the Social Service work. As there is no Board of Missions there can not be an Auxiliary to that Board, so our official title is now The Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, and our work, of course, is enlarged to include Religious Education and Social Service.

When we contemplate and realize the bigness of the work, it ought to lift us above all littleness, all personal pride and selfish ambition; we ought not to have time for petty quarrels and contentions.

We are "sore let and hindered" by all that; but we ought to set ourselves faithfully and honestly to do the work the Church has put into our hands while we have time and strength to do it.

The Triennial elected Miss Grace Lindley Executive Secretary of the Auxiliary, and also elected an Executive Board to assist her in carrying on the work between Triennials.

There are sixteen members of this Board, eight being selected by the Provinces and eight from the Church at large. Mrs. Adams of Pittsburgh and Mrs. Pancoast of Philadelphia were elected from this Province.

As this committee must have funds to carry on their work the dioceses are asked to contribute to such a fund. The dioceses are divided into five classes,

pledging from twenty dollars to three dollars annually, and each diocese decides to which class it wishes to belong. This diocese is in class C, pledging ten dollars annually.

The year 1921 is our Jubilee year, when the Auxiliary will have completed fifty years of service. It has been proposed that we mark this anniversary with a special offering of not less than fifty thousand dollars, to be called the Emery Fund, the income of which may be used by missionaries home on furlough. At the Triennial of 1916 the sum of fifty thousand dollars was pledged to St. Agnes' School in Kyoto, and this diocese pledged \$750.00—gave much more. Surely we can give \$800.00 to this Emery Fund before October, 1921.

The formation of the Church Service League, and the re-organization of the box work of the Auxiliary on Red Cross lines were very important points in the work of the Triennial. These will be discussed fully at the conference to-morrow, when Miss Tillotson, from the Missions House, will be here to answer all questions we may want to ask.

The Bishop has appointed a committee for the diocesan branch of the Church Service League, and some of the parishes have been working towards it during the past winter, but we have not progressed very far.

The re-organization of the box work will necessitate the election or appointment of another officer—a box secretary—who will do all the work of arranging for the missionary boxes in the diocese. In most dioceses there are at least two secretaries, sometimes three. In this diocese the work has all been done by one. Our present secretary is willing to begin the reorganization of the box work, and as she is so familiar with the details of the work she can do it better than any one else, but at the next election there ought to be a change.

A great honor has come to this diocese, and like all honors it demands great sacrifices. Our Educational Secretary has been added to the staff at the Missions Home and will leave for her new position the first of September. We who know the work Miss Boyer has done among us and are gratified

and proud to know that her ability is recognized by the whole Church; we rejoice that the Diocese of Bethlehem can give such a leader to the whole Church; but we shall miss her much in our parishes, in our meetings and our deliberations. I am sure she will have the support and the prayers of the women of this diocese that she may be successful in her new undertaking.

The work of the Auxiliary in the Archdeaconry of Reading has been seriously hampered this past year by the resignation of the Vice-President, Mrs. Ware, who has served the diocese in this capacity for two terms of three years each and has been thorough and faithful in everything she undertook. We accepted her resignation most reluctantly, only because she was physically unable to carry on the work at present.

The diocese has sustained a serious loss in the death of Mrs. A. A. Beaumont of Wilkes-Barre. Although Mrs. Beaumont never held a diocesan office, it was only because she felt unable to accept the many nominations she received; but she served on many important committees, always giving her best cheerfully and faithfully. The program for this meeting was prepared by her and Miss Troxell; the finished copy was in her house at the time of her death, ready for her to take it to the printer. Her place will be difficult to fill.

Since our last meeting our fiscal year has been changed to coincide with that of the General Convention; so the report which will be printed this spring will contain only the report of work done and money given between May 1st and December 31st, 1919. The next year's report will be for 12 months as usual. It is a matter of great rejoicing that the number of boxes sent and the value of them during those eight months almost equals that of the 12 months previous. We hope this record will be maintained.

During the past winter it has given me much pleasure to visit a number of the parish branches of the Auxiliary, and I am convinced that much good will result if there were more intercourse between the parishes. The neighborhood meetings have been very successful in promoting good feeling. I hope they may be continued.

The Nation Wide Campaign was well begun in this diocese and many of our Auxiliary women did very good work for it.

Please remember that this campaign is not finished, it has just begun. It is a call to every woman to Service, to Pray, to Give; and the women of the Auxiliary should be the leaders in this movement in every parish.

In connection with this I would like to say that our General Fund is not included in the Nation Wide Campaign budget. Contributions to this fund, which pays our pledges as well as the expenses of our diocesan branch, are still necessary. The plans for our future work include a conference for Church workers which will be held in Montrose the first week in July. There will be classes and lectures on Missions, Religious Education and Social Service; conferences on the different phases of Church work, and mass meetings with distinguished speakers. This is the first time our diocese has tried to have anything of this kind, and we will need the united support of us all to make it successful. Among the many appeals for money that come every year there are three which I feel ought to be put before you to-day.

The first is for the Mary E. Hart memorial, which is to take the form of a gift of \$5,000.00 to the school for the Navajo Indians in Farmington, New Mexico. Miss Hart, always a devoted Auxiliary woman, was also the founder of the Little Helpers. I hope this diocese may have a share in this memorial.

We have been sending for 20 years or more the sum of \$100.00 annually to Bishop Rowe for his work in Anvik, Alaska. He has asked if we can double this amount this year to enable him to meet the increased cost of supplies, freight rates, etc.

Then there is an appeal from the Liberian League. Bishop Overs has just been consecrated to this difficult field, and we ought not to send him empty handed. I would like very much to make an appropriation to each of these requests.

It has been proposed that the date of our annual meeting be changed to January or February so it will fall nearer the close of our fiscal year. We have been reminded by our Bishop that our diocese will celebrate its 50th anniversary next year, and it is possible the plans for the celebration will include the presence of the women of the Auxiliary. Therefore I recommend that the discussion of this question be postponed until our next meeting.

Changing the days of the meeting from Tuesday and Wednesday to Friday and Saturday has also been

proposed in order that those employed in schools may be able to attend. This question ought also to be postponed until next year.

A great task is presented to us Auxiliary women to-day; the work of Missions, Religious Education and Social Service; of world service through the Church; of making ourselves and all women see that work for Christ and His Church should come first. In the weaker moments that come to us all at times we think we can not do it; it is too much for us; but some one has said, "do not pray for

strength for our tasks, but rather for tasks worthy of our strength." This task is worthy of our strength, and if we have the will to do it we can.

Not alone, nor in our own strength; but by working together as individuals in our parishes, as parishes in our diocese, as dioceses in the whole Church, with the help of our great Leader we can do all things; and as Miss Lindley says "the very greatness of the work should be a joy and inspiration."

READING ARCHDEACONRY.

REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT.

The resignation of Mrs. James P. Ware, the Vice-President, has seriously interfered with the work of the Auxiliary in the Archdeaconry of Reading. Mrs. Ware has served the diocese in this capacity for two terms of three years each, and the flourishing condition of the organization is largely due to her faithfulness, wisdom and devotion. We hope her successor may be appointed very soon, so that the work she has so well begun may not suffer.

Two Archdeaconry meetings were held during the winter. One at Hazleton in November, when the Nation Wide Campaign was the topic for the day; and one in Trinity Church, Bethlehem in February, when Archdeacon Claiborn of Tennessee was the speaker. After his address, the proposition to contribute a sum of money for the education of a little girl in his Missionary district was accepted; and since that time seven parishes have contributed seventy-five dollars to this object.

Several neighborhood meetings have been held during the winter at centers suggested by Mrs. Ware, which have been most successful.

A larger number of parishes than ever before have held series of program meetings, carrying out a scheme of education which had been carefully prepared during the summer. When this plan becomes general throughout the diocese we may look for greater things from the Auxiliary.

SCRANTON ARCHDEACONRY.

REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT.

From our annual meeting last May until the summer, when many parish branches are inactive, the Woman's Auxiliary of this archdeaconry worked with the usual vigor and enthusiasm that is always inspired by the annual meeting.

However, this last year that enthusiasm was not allowed to lag during the summer, for the Nation Wide Campaign was much talked of, and although it could not be definitely decided upon until the time of the Convention in Detroit, we were all thinking and reading more or less about it—and—expecting it.

This decision coming late in October gave us about a month to actively prepare for the Campaign, and the women of this archdeaconry took their places in the work, holding prayer circles and classes of instruction, while many with trembling knees, and shaky voices entered the ranks of the Four Minute Speakers.

All this campaign work resulted in showing us our defects and in creating a desire to correct them.

On Sunday, December 7th, 1919, teams of devoted women of this archdeaconry went forth with teams of equally devoted men in a house to house canvass for pledges of service and of more material support.

I believe this effort has given us the inspiration we needed, for from many parish branches comes word of an increase of membership, and, we believe, its equivalent in spiritual awakening. With the new scope of work for the Woman's Auxiliary we have faith to hope for a large increase in the personal service of our members.

Our archdeaconry meeting held in Grace Church, Dorranceton, November 18th and 19th was largely attended and enthusiastic. Convention reports, and Nation Wide Campaign plans, were followed by an address by Mrs. John Ely of Shanghai, China, who so thrilled us with the work in that field that the offering taken at that meeting (fifty dollars) was given for the work there.

A "Neighborhood Meeting" held at Towanda considered the Nation Wide Campaign, also a "Round Table on Missionary Work of the Auxiliary." This meeting also had a large attendance, including the nearby parishes, and went a long way towards keeping up our interest.

It is our hope that with better weather conditions we can arrange for more frequent neighborhood meetings. They can be made a means of keeping alive the interest in the Woman's Auxiliary during the summer, when many of the parish branches become inactive.

We regret that our financial report is less than it should be, not because we have not given, but because some of our branches have sent their contributions to Miss Farrer, our United Thank Offering Treasurer; some to Mrs. Linderman, our Diocesan Treasurer, and others direct to their destination.

Naturally we cannot report that which we have not received; in this instance we are over \$400.00 less in our archdeaconry report than we should be. May we have the co-operation of the Scranton Archdeaconry and ask again that you send all money contributions to your Organizing Secretary or Vice-President.

Report of Diocesan President

FROM MAY TO DECEMBER, 1919.

Some changes have come to the Junior Auxiliary in this half year, the result of the General Convention held at Detroit in October. The name has become "The Junior Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council," instead of the "Junior Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary." With this change we ought to feel that we have grown in importance, and must endeavor to be worthy of the increased responsibility. Our faces are turned toward the gradual approach of the Church School Service League, which will bring the fulfillment of our own Junior ideal,—every boy and girl in the Church praying, working and giving for the Mission of the Church. Toward that ideal we are striving earnestly to build up and strengthen the Junior branches in this diocese. The success of the Church School Service League will depend in large measure upon the strength of the Junior Auxiliary.

It is most cheering and inspiring to present the report of the Junior branches for these six months. It shows an activity and interest greater than ever before. Three neighborhood meetings were held—November 22nd at the Church of the Mediator, Allentown, when there were 17 delegates, representing four branches, and two officers present; November 29th at St. John's Church, East Mauch Chunk, when there were 70 delegates, representing six branches, and three officers; and an unique meeting at Christs Church, Frackville, December 6th, when we had representatives of the Girl Scouts and the G. F. S. from Pottsville, as well as girls from Ashland, St. Clair and Shenandoah, where there are as yet no branches of the Junior Auxiliary. All of the delegates thought they might take up some of the Junior work. The Frackville Juniors presented the pageant of the

Nation Wide Campaign, "The Builders," most creditably.

Our Educational Secretary (and we could not have a more splendid one!) is pleased with the reports of mission study sent in by the branches; but as most of the work was done in the early months of 1920, it will be included in the 1920 report. In October leaflets suggesting definite work in the five fields of service were edited and distributed by Mrs. Glick. They received the hearty commendation of the Junior officers at the Church Missions House in New York, as well as the approval of the Junior leaders in this diocese.

The Christmas boxes for 1919 were sent to mountaineer schools in North Carolina, South Carolina and Kentucky. This year we had enough money contributed by the branches to send candy with our Christmas gifts besides paying the freight on the boxes.

In addition to their regular work in fulfillment of their Junior pledges, the branches have done some C. P. C. work, have sent a box to Jonestown Home, have distributed Christmas baskets in the community, have sent cards to hospitals, have given a doll and bed to a hospital, and have provided for a party for children at a community house.

In six months \$43.00 was raised for Valle Crucis, though our pledge is only fifty dollars for a whole year. The value of money and boxes for these six months is as follows:—

Report of Educational Work.

The report of the educational work in the diocese for the half year from May, 1919, to January, 1920, shows an encouraging number of parishes conducting regular missionary program meetings either along the lines outlined by the Diocesan Educational Secretary or on original plans worked out for the individual parish. Since the period covered in this report does not include the season of Lent, in which most of the mission study classes are held in the diocese, the report naturally shows very few classes.

This year the educational work has been greatly helped by Mrs. DuHamel of Douglassville, who prepared herself to speak at parish branch and neighborhood meetings on the subject of "Our Southern Mountaineers," and by Mrs. Sturge of Scranton, who was prepared to speak on the subject of "The Foreign-born Within the United States." The diocese profited greatly by the work of these two field secretaries, and next year it is hoped that

we may have a larger number of field secretaries ready to speak at meetings about the work of the Church in other fields.

During the half year the Diocesan Educational Secretary has led mission study classes at Charlestown, West Virginia and at the General Convention in Detroit in addition to the diocesan work.

For the half year from May 1st, 1919, to January 1st, 1920, 30 parishes report:

Twenty parishes holding missionary program meetings.

Two parishes holding mission study classes.

A number of parishes postponed their program meetings until after Christmas on account of the work of the Nation Wide Campaign. These meetings will be included in the next report for the full year, January 1st, 1920, to January 1st, 1921.

United Thank Offering--Annual Message.

It is ever interesting and encouraging to mark progress in our work, that privilege was ours on the morning of October 9th, 1919, the day set for the Triennial Corporate Communion of the Woman's Auxilliary and the presentation of the United Offering. In the history of the Church it is the largest United Offering every made, \$468,060.41—in the history of our diocese \$7,410.52 stands as the largest contribution to the great United Offering we have yet made. Our United Offering in the past three years shows progress:

\$1,955.07 October, 1917.
2,061.99 October, 1918.
3,393.46 October, 1919.

\$7,410.52 Triennial check.

Decided in Detroit:

"Hereafter the United Offering is to be known as the United Thank Offering.

"The United Thank Offering is to be considered the gift of all church women and not merely of those identified with the Woman's Auxilliary.

"United Thank Offering missionaries are to receive a minimum salary of \$1,000.00 or board and lodging and \$600.00.

"No woman may be appointed to serve as a United Thank Offering missionary whose training and qualifications have not been passed upon by the Woman's Executive Board, and does not hold a certificate of health."

A United Thank Offering from every woman in the Diocese of Bethlehem will be our aim during this triennium: such an offering of united prayer, love and money would mean very much to the offering at Portland, Oregon, in 1922!

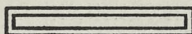

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

The name of this Society is the Bethlehem Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the Missionary work of the whole Church among all people in the Diocese; to increase their interest and activity in that work; to encourage the formation of branches of this Society in every Parish and Mission of the Diocese; and by means of united and systematic effort to promote the work of Church extension.

ARTICLE III.

The Church is the Missionary Society. Every Baptized person is a member of this Society; therefore all baptized women who aid the Missionary work of the Church by their prayers or offerings are recognized as actual members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, an Organizing Secretary for each Archdeaconry of the Diocese, and an Educational Secretary. Other officers may be chosen at the discretion of the Society.

1. These officers (except the Organizing Secretaries and the Educational Secretary, who shall be appointed by the Bishop) shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the Society.

2. A Nominating Committee shall be appointed by the President two months previous to the annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to prepare a ticket containing, if possible, the names of two candidates for each office.

3. A Treasurer of the United Offering shall be elected once every three years, at the May meeting in the same year as the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her election shall take effect November 1st of that year, and she shall hold office until her successor is elected.

4. The Chairman of the Junior Auxiliary and the Chairman of the Babies' Branch shall be appointed by the President and approved by the Bishop.

5. The above officers shall constitute a Board of Managers, to which the affairs of the Bethlehem Branch shall be entrusted.

ARTICLE V.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, to preside at them, and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of this Society.

ARTICLE VI.

The duties of the Vice President are to assist the President, and in her absence, to preside at all meetings of the Society.

ARTICLE VII.

The duties of the Secretary are to prepare a report of the work of the Society for its annual meeting; to keep the minutes of all its meetings to have charge of the printing of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other branches as the President may direct and approve.

ARTICLE VIII.

The duties of the Treasurer are to receive all moneys of the Society, to keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, and to present to the Society at the annual meeting a full report of the same. She shall pay out money only by the direction of this Society, or its Board of

Managers, except such sums as may be received for definite purposes. All money received for purposes outside the Diocese shall be forwarded to the Treasurer of the General Board of Missions.

1. The duties of the United Offering Treasurer are to increase and deepen interest in the United Offering, to receive all money for this offering through the Organizing Secretaries and the Junior Board and with the advice of the Board of Managers to place this money at interest until it is presented at the next Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IX.

The duties of the Organizing Secretaries are to form new Parish branches in their Archdeaconries, to stimulate the missionary spirit and to increase intelligent interest in the missionary work of the Church. They are authorized to hold meetings within their Archdeaconries and are free to conduct their work under the general approval of the President of the Society and the Bishop of the Diocese.

1. They shall receive from the Parish branches reports of all work done by them and all moneys contributed by them or through them and give a receipt for the same.

2. Each Organizing Secretary shall send to the Treasurer of the Society all moneys, except the United Offering, received from its branches immediately on receipt of the same, together with a detailed account designating

the source from which, and the object for which they were received.

3. The Organizing Secretaries shall make an annual report to the Secretary of the Auxiliary of the work done in their Archdeaconries, the same to be printed in the annual report of the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE X.

At each annual meeting the President shall appoint a committee of two persons whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer, and the United Offering Treasurer.

ARTICLE XI.

Before May 1st of each year each Parish Branch shall send to the Organizing Secretary of its Archdeaconry all moneys contributed for the Society, and also reports of all work done, including the furnishing of boxes for Missionaries.

ARTICLE XII.

There shall be one general meeting of the Society in May of each year at such time as may be designated by the Bishop.

ARTICLE XIII.

Special meetings of this Society may be called by the President at the request of the Board of Managers or of four Parish Branches.

ARTICLE XIV.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Society present at any annual meeting.

THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY MESSAGE TO THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

On all sides one hears these words—"the day has come for co-operation."

A deep relationship that has always existed between the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society is that some of the active members of the Auxiliary are some of our best associates in the G. F. S.—inspiring and real objects of the Society. Up to this year the Diocese boasted of 61 active associates—to-day we number 98—and I believe many good leaders may be found among these new ones.

The relationship of the individual associate to the individual girl placed under her care in the G. F. S. is unique—no other organization uses just this same method of mutual help and sympathy—we take it so much as a matter of course that we frequently lose sight of what the power of the bond can be.

Some of you may say that you cannot be active or even interested in both the Auxiliary and the Friendly, or that you do not have the time to give to both. I know our lives are very full as a rule, but personally I feel we really can be interested in both—perhaps we may be a little more active in one than the other. We must not fail to grasp the great opportunity before us—of getting closer together of two powerful organizations like these—and thus of making all our work stronger. The longer I work in the G. F. S. the more I value its work and constitution—how wisely it has been planned to suit the pressing needs of the times.

In one parish the imaginary barrier between the two societies is starting to break down by the W. A. giving parties and giving the G. F. S. a special invitation to them. In many ways they make it pleasant for each other.

Another hopeful sign of co-operation is that one society is getting itself more and more informed of the other's doings, and thus becoming helpful to each other, just as the purpose of the Church Service League is "to understand what each society is trying to do and how each may co-operate in a united call to service through the Church."

The welfare and the future of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society must concern us, and great is that future, I am sure—growing not only in numbers, but together we could uphold our ideal; strengthen our friendship, and have a bond of prayer. Not only do we realize both that work is prayer and that prayer is work, but that prayer must be the underlying force beneath all our work.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING, 1920.

The twelfth Annual Convention of the Girls' Friendly Society in the Diocese of Bethlehem was held at Christ's Church, Reading, May 21 and 22nd, 1920.

The roll call showed 22 associates and 73 members present. We now have 17 branches in the Diocese, 8 having been organized within the past year.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved; then followed reports by the President, three Vice Presidents, one each from the Bethlehem, Reading and Scranton Districts, the Secretary, Treasurer, and departmental heads.

Treasury showed \$46.00 in bank and supplies to the value of \$50.00 on hand.

Missions—\$200.00 was given in money and boxes.

Social Service—\$336.35 was given in money, clothing, food, medicine, toys, etc.

Holiday House—St. Luke's Branch, Lebanon, reports having bought and paid for a Holiday House fully furnished at Mt. Gretna, Pa.

Commendation—Three members were transferred to other diocese and three

received into this, two of the girls so received coming from England.

Candidates—This is an important branch of G. F. S. work, forming children from 6 to 14 years of age into classes, teaching them to be useful at home, also for church service.

A new Diocesan Constitution was presented for consideration and was unanimously adopted.

At 8 P. M. our annual Festival Service held in Christ's Church, with fine sermon by the Rector, was most impressive.

Saturday—A. M.—After Corporate Communion and breakfast in Parish House, the meeting opened with election of officers and other unfinished business was disposed of.

Miss Ruddle brought us a very interesting message from the Woman's Auxiliary showing how the two societies can co-operate, and Miss Lukens of Philadelphia, our Vice President of Third Province, gave the girls a most interesting and instructive talk, after which the meeting was adjourned.

the Church (no such restriction being made as to Members), and the organization of the Society to follow as much as possible that of the Church, being Diocesan and Parochial.

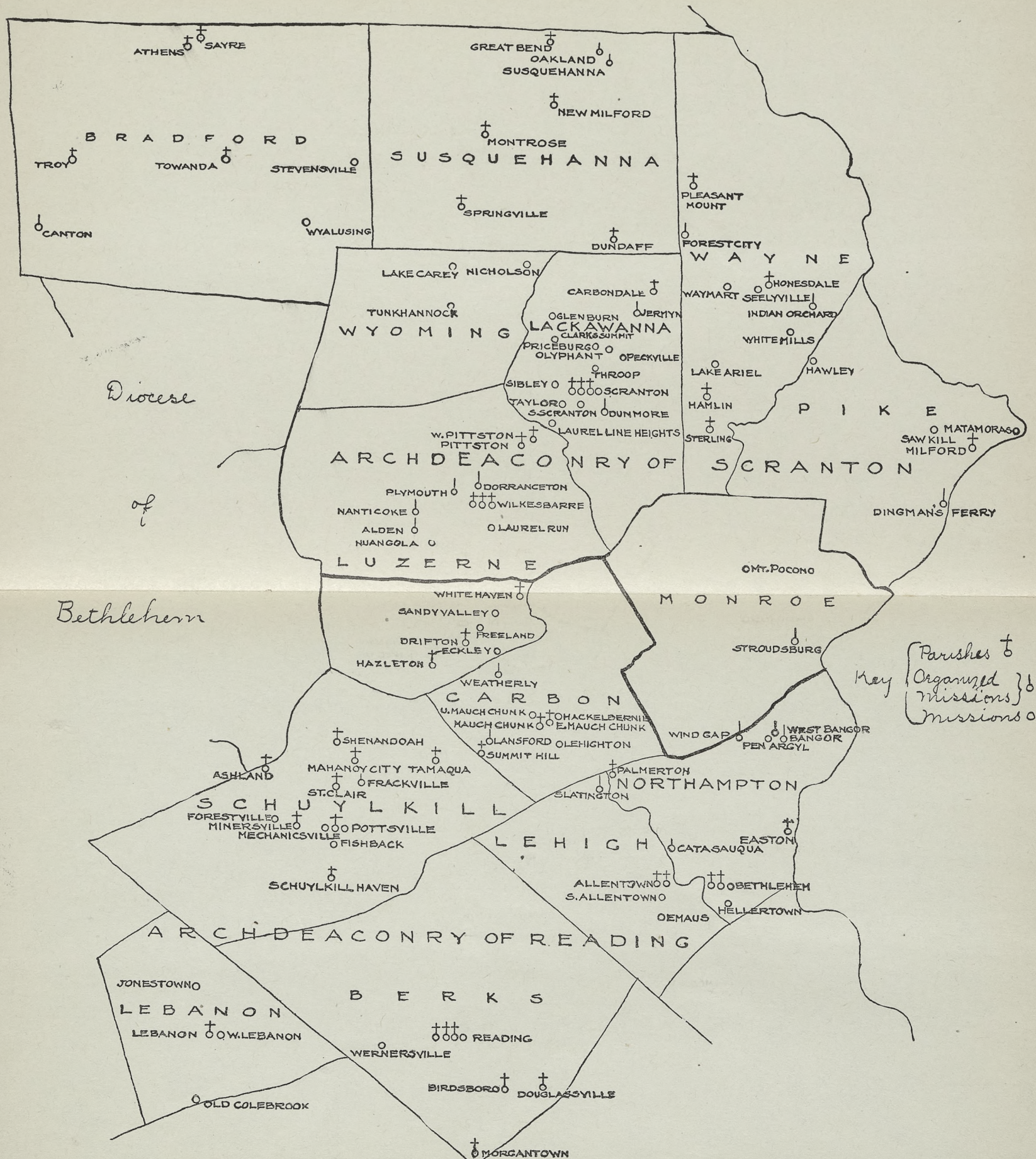
