MINUTES

of the

Annual Meeting of 1922

The Fortieth Annual Meeting of the Bethlehem Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, was held in Trinity Church, Carbondale, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 2nd and 3rd, 1922.

The meeting opened with evening prayer at 7:30 Tuesday evening, followed by a welcome from the Rev. E. J. N. Holmes, rector of Trinity Parish, an address by Bishop Talbot, and a talk by Miss Meeting of Philadelphia, on Liberia.

Wednesday morning at 7:30 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion, Bishop Talbot, celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Holmes.

Breakfast was served in the Parish House at 8:30 by St. Agnes' Guild.

Business meeting called to order at 10 a. m., the President, Miss Ruddell, in the chair. On motion, the reading of the minutes of last meeting was omitted, but Mrs. Hildebrand, former Secretary, offered a correction which was the omission of the gift of three gavels to the Diocese by the Auxiliary of St. John's Church, East Mauch Chunk. These gavels were made from one of the pews used at the time the Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary was organized in 1882, and are for the use of the President of the Diocese and the two Vice-Presidents.

The President read her annual address, and that of the President of the Reading Convocation, who died on April 30th. Mrs. Lathrop read her report for the Convocation of Scranton.

Mrs. Hildebrand gave the report of

the box work and stated that three children in the Jonestown Home are to be graduated from high school this Spring, and the following Parishes pledged five dollars each toward providing suitable clothing for that occasion: Grace Church, Honesdale; Church of the Mediator, Allentown; St. Luke's, Lebanon; St. Stephen's, Wilkes-Barre; Trinity, Bethlehem; Nativity, Bethlehem; St. Luke's, Scranton; Good Shepherd, Scranton; St. Clement's, Wilkes-Barre; Grace, Dorranceton. Daughters of the King, Honesdale, will supply material for a dress.

Report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Linderman.

Discussion with regard to time of sending current expense envelopes. This matter to be decided at the Convocation meetings.

The offering of \$32.42, taken at the two services, to be given to help enlarge the hospital at Liberia as a memorial to Mrs. Ramsaur. Motion by Mrs. Linderman that this amount be increased to \$35.00. Motion was adopted.

Report of the United Thank Offering Treasurer, Miss Farrer.

Report of the Nominating Committee named Miss Ruddell for President, and Miss Farrer, United Thank Offering Treasurer. On motion this report was accepted.

Report of Committee on Resolutions for Miss Emery was read. Motion by Mrs. Shipman, that this memorial be

printed in Annual Report. Motion adopted.

Mrs. Lathrop, Mrs. Bates and Mrs. Linderman were appointed a Committee to draw up resolutions on the death of Mrs. Barber. This Committee submitted the following: "The officers and members of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Bethlehem, wish to put on record a resolution of most sincere sympathy for the bereaved family of the late Mrs. L. H. Barber, of Mauch Chunk. Mrs. Barber has been a most devoted Church woman and an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary. Although we shall miss her kindly presence, her influence will remain with us as a guide and an incentive to service for God and his Church." Mrs. Bates moved that a copy of resolution be sent to the family and printed in Annual Report and Bethlehem Churchman. Motion was adopted.

Report of Educational Secretary, Mrs. Bates. Mrs. Bates is obliged to resign her office as Educational Secretary. She has been most efficient and it is hoped this vacancy will soon be filled.

Report of the Church Periodical Club. Miss Maurice hopes that a set of books may be purchased for the library in Tokyo, in memory of Miss Julia Emery, through sums given by each Auxiliary.

Greetings from the Girls' Friendly Society read by Mrs. Joseph Jenkins for Miss Gettel.

Short talk by Bishop Talbot on the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund, the Near East Relief, and the School for Middle Aged Men who want to enter the ministry.

At noon Bishop Talbot offered prayers for Missions after which Dean Holmes conducted a meditation.

Adjourned at 12:30 for lunch, served by the Auxiliary of Trinity Parish. Before leaving the table Mrs. Sturge proposed a tribute on behalf of "The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese

of Bethlehem to St. Agnes' Guild who served the breakfast which strengthened us for the day, to the Woman's Auxiliary who served the splendid luncheon, to those who furnished automobiles and to our hostesses for the night." This was made a motion and adopted by a rising vote.

Afternoon business session opened at 1:15, with the Vice-President, Mrs. Sturge, in the chair.

Report of Nominating Committee was read and nominations from the floor called for. Mrs. Lathrop moved that nominations be closed. Motion that the election of Miss Ruddle for President and Miss Farrer, United Thank Offering Treasurer, be carried by a rising vote. Motion that Mrs. Linderman be authorized to take from the general fund some amount that can be spared to help defray the expenses of the President to the General Convention at Portland. Mrs. Hildebrand amended that motion to read: The Treasurer shall be authorized to draw from the general fund up to \$200.00. Motion as amended was adopted.

Miss Ruddle again took the chair and a discussion followed regarding change of date of annual meeting. Mrs. Sturge spoke against changing the time from May to January, and Mrs. Lathrop spoke in favor of the change. Motion by Mrs. Lathrop that we try holding the annual meeting the latter part of January in 1923. Motion was seconded and carried.

Miss Mary James of Scranton, spoke on the opportunities of the Auxiliary for social service, and the Rev. Mr. Kreidler of St. Luke's, Scranton, told how the Church could meet the sociological problems.

Miss Margaret Elliott gave an interesting talk on her work among the Indians of North Dakota. On motion meeting adjourned.

Memorial

In the death of Miss Julia C. Emery, who passed to the rest of Paradise, in January of this year, the Diocese of Bethlehem, with the entire Church, has sustained an irreparable loss.

During the forty years leadership of this quiet, unselfish woman the Auxiliary grew from a comparatively small group to the great organization of to-day. Those were years of tireless labor, of endless correspondence, of journeyings from coast to coast, of personal interviews with Auxiliary workers, officers and privates, who coming from near and far, wished "to see Miss Emery." Her gracious and ready help was never withheld, and her counsel and advice was always cheerfully given to the least one among us.

In gentleness and with deference to the opinions of others, in courage and faith, in unswerving loyalty to the Church and with a clear vision of the Church's Mission, Miss Emery's life was one of service to the Master, to Whom she had consecrated her whole self, and for Whom her devotion never wavered; truly her life shines like a beacon light to guide the footsteps of every woman of the Auxiliary.

To few is it given to say, at the close of life, "I have finished the work which Thou gavest me to do," and Miss Emery would have been the last to say it, yet, time was given her to complete her literary labors, an invaluable contribution to Church history, and then she resigned her office into younger hands, and in supreme confidence awaited the summons "come up higher."

Let us give thanks to the dear Lord, for the wonderful grace and virtue manifested in this Saint, who was truly a light in the world in her day and generation, and whose life was given for the extension of the Master's Kingdom, and Whom she followed with simplicity of faith and whole-hearted devotion.

President's Address

Since our last meeting the Auxiliary has lost the counsel and advice, the visible presence of one who, from the beginning has been one of the greatest factors in the development of the organization. Miss Julia Emery died on the tenth of January, and it seems fitting that our first thoughts and words to-day should be of her. You have read the many beautiful things that have been said of her, and later in the day you will hear resolutions prepared for you to act upon.

Shortly after Miss Emery's death we were grieved to hear of the passing of the Reverend Charles Betticher. Always a firm friend to the Auxiliary, personally known to many of us, he will be much missed. He compressed into comparatively few years the amount of work which many of us require a much longer time to accomplish, and was called to his reward while still young. And now we are called to mourn the death of one who was better known in this Diocese than either Miss Emery or Mr. Betticher. Mrs. Laird Barber, Vice-President of the Auxiliary in the Reading Convocation died last Sunday. Mrs. Barber had always been interested and active in the work of the Auxiliary, but had held no diocesan position until about a year ago. In the short time she held the office she made many friends by her charming gracious manner, and she showed such interest in the work that we hoped great things for the Reading Archdeaconry. She has shown us how to do the work; who will carry it on?

The annual meeting last year was held in Bethlehem during the week of

the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Diocese, and the inspiration we gained then carried us through the winter, enabling us to accomplish all the work that was given us to do. You will hear the reports in a few minutes, so I will not dwell upon this subject; but let me say that the past year has been an encouraging one. More of the younger women are becoming interested in the work, and people are working together more harmoniously.

At the time of our last meeting we were looking forward to the celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Auxiliary, and to the presentation of the gift of \$50,000.00 which was to mark that occasion. We were much interested in this gift, watching the church papers to see how the amount grew from week to week, and the result amazed even the most sanguine. Instead of \$50,000.00 which was the goal set, and which seemed unattainable, the Treasurer has reported more than \$90,000.00 given by the women of the American Church to show their love for Miss Emery and also their interest in the comfort of the Missionaries home on furlough. It is very beautiful that Miss Emery lived to see the completion of this gift.

It gave me much pleasure to visit so many of the Parish Branches of the Auxiliary during the past year. It is a great inspiration to see the work being carried on by small groups of women quietly and courageously. The strength of the Auxiliary is not in the Church Missions House in New York, not entirely in the large wealthy Parishes, but in the small Parish

Branches, whose members are carrying on faithfully, amid discouraging conditions, and with little to arouse enthusiasm. It requires determination, consecration and a genuine love for Missions, and that is the strength of the Church. Some one has said "the strength of the early Church lay in the consistent daily life of the average Christian", and that is true to-day.

One of the visits that gave me great pleasure was to the Jonestown Home where I spent a night last November. The Home is very attractive, the children happy, well cared for and normal; and I think we may well be proud of our one Diocesan institution, but not satisfied with it. There are still many things needed there in the we can supply.

When Madame Yajima came to this country from Japan last winter she brought a greeting from her countrywomen to the women of America. The Executive Board of the Auxiliary suggested that we send a message to the women of Japan by her when she returned. Resolutions were sent to each Diocesan President from headquarters, and the one sent to this Diocese was signed by a large number of our women. The Women's Boards of Missions were asked to do the same, so this message of good will has gone to Japan signed probably by thousands of Christian women in America.

The Executive Board of the Auxiliary at a meeting held last February passed a resolution suggesting that the members of the Auxiliary join with the women of other Christian bodies in observing March third as a day of prayer for Missions. Letters were sent throughout the Diocese asking that this be done, and many Parishes made the effort. It would be

interesting to know in how many the plan was carried out. It is recommended that each year we meet with other women interested in the same work, to discuss and pray for Missions in the whole world.

The Second Annual Conference for Church Workers was held at Montrose last July with a very gratifying attendance. This year the time of the session is to be lengthened. The school will open the fifth of July, and continue until the fifteenth. It is hoped that many men will come for the Saturday evening and Sunday conferences; Brotherhood men Sunday School teachers, Lay Readers, and Vestrymen will profit by such gatherings, and ought to have them. The leaders of the course in Mission study is Mrs. Williams of Newark, recommended by Miss Boyer, and the text book used will be "The Task of the Church." We of the Church ought to know what our task is, how we ought to perform it, and gain strength to carry it on. One of the Executive Board of the Church Mission of Help will be present to tell of the work of that organization. This work is much needed in our Diocese, and we ought to know something about it, and how to approach it. The Field Secretary of the Church Service League in the Diocese of Western New York, will lead the course on the Church Service League. We ought to know more about this great movement in the Church, and try to strengthen it in the Diocese of Bethlehem. The Summer Conference is the time to discuss all these matters, and to learn how to carry on the work of our Diocese, and I hope it will be so popular next July that we will have to look for a larger place to hold it next year. way of equipment and comfort which

Some of the members of the Auxiliary have been much alarmed at the possibility of the merging of the Society in the Church Service League. The alarm was so general that a resolution was offered at the meeting of the Synod by the Pennsylvania Branch of the Auxiliary, seconded by all the Diocesan Branches present, requesting the Synod to recommend to the Presiding Bishop and Council "that the Woman's Auxiliary be preserved intact as to its organization and scope of work." When this resolution was presented to the Synod it called forth many expressions of gratitude and appreciation for the work the Society had done in the past. The delegates thought it would be a mistake to change the status of the Auxiliary, and they made a recommendation to that effect to the Presiding Bishop and Council. The committee appointed to consider the development of the Church Service League and the future status of the Auxiliary met in New York during the past winter and recommended that the "Woman's Auxiliary shall continue to hold its present status, and shall therefore be responsible for stimulating women to assist in the general work of Missions, Social Service and Religious Education, conducted on a five field or service."

The Auxiliary has served the cause of Missions faithfully for fifty years; we celebrated our fiftieth anniversary last October, and much was printed at that time about the wonderful things we had done. The reading of it all filled us with pride and made us very humble. How much did each one of us contribute to the grand total? Could we appropriate to ourselves any one of the beautiful, grateful words that were said of the Auxiliary? In great humility we ought to grasp the opportunity to atone for our past indolence and indifference, and resolve to do what we can to make the record of the next fifty years as splendid as that of the first half century of the life of the Auxiliary.

Many appeals have come to us this past year.

A music teacher is needed in Kyoto and in Tokyo. Cannot this Diocese supply one of these?

Archdeacon Claiborne, whom many of us know, asks help for the DuBose Memorial Church Training School at Monteagle, Tennessee. This school trains men who have made good in the business world and wish to devote the rest of their lives to the ministry of the Church. It is the only institution of this kind in America. They have three men at present from the State of Pennsylvania; one from our Diocese. Mr. Claiborne asks if we can send him \$300.00 annually.

Bishop Weller endorses the appeal of the Dean of Nashotah House, Wisconsin, for help in their work of educating young men for the ministry. They have more students now than for many years.

Mrs. Wetmore writes from Christ School, Arden, North Carolina, that the appropriation for her school has been cut one-third. Can we help her?

Archdeacon Baskerville sends an urgent appeal for aid to carry on the work among the Negroes in South Carolina.

The National Committee of the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund asks that the \$52,000.00 needed to complete the sum of \$100,000.00 be in hand before the Convention meets in September.

The Presiding Bishop and Miss Lindley together sent an appeal for the Near East Relief, which, with the consent of our Bishop was sent to each Branch of the Auxiliary in the Diocese.

I presume we all feel much the same when we hear these appeals. We cannot satisfy every need, and we are very apt to do nothing for any of them.

Several years ago Mrs. Coxé quoted this verse which I think is very appropriate now:

"Go break for the needy sweet
Charity's bread
For giving is living" the angel said.
"And must I be giving again and again?"

My peevish and pitiless answer ran
"O no," said the angel, looking me through,

"Just give till the Master stops giving to you."

The Educational Secretary wishes to express her appreciation to the District Educational Secretaries for their splendid assistance in sending in the reports from the Parishes.

The books for next year will include "The Task of the Church," which will probably be the basis of our program meetings. Bishop Bratton's book on the Negro; Miss Emery, "A Century of Endeavor."

Besides attending the Convocational and Annual Meetings in the Diocese the Educational Secretary has conducted a Conference at the Provincial Synod in Wilmington, and has been asked to visit the Harrisburg Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to assist them in forming an Educational Department, and to conduct a ten day course at the Summer School for the Diocese of New Jersey at Princeton.

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

One of the questions recently sent from the Church Missions House was, "Do you consider last year successful?" and the reply was, "Encouraging rather than successful."

The reason for that reply was the fact that we had not accomplished as much as we should, and in that respect were not successful, but the encouraging part was that in several instances, younger women had been taking an active part in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and were willing to assume the responsibility of holding office in their respective Parish Branches. Can anything be more encouraging to those of us who have been in the harness lo! these many years?

A very interesting and enthusiastic Convocation was held in the Church of the Redeemer, Sayre, October 11th and 12th, which included an Institute for Leaders of Mission Study Classes, with Mrs. W. E. Bates as leader.

This was a feature which brought more delegates to the Convocation

than perhaps would otherwise have attended, and helped materially toward its success.

Neighborhood meetings took the place of the former mid-winter meeting thus keeping us in touch with one another.

Report of the Church Periodical Club, Diocese of Bethlehem for 1921.

As several Parish Librarians failed to send in their reports for 1921, that of the Diocese is necessarily incomplete. The following brief statistics are the best that could be obtained:

254 Magazines have been sent regularly by 163 people.

220 Books.

1775 Christmas and Easter cards, etc.

318 odd magazines have been given, and fifty-one contributions of miscellaneous bulk material made.

\$53.90 was given for books for St. Paul's Library and \$32.00 was given as annual dues. The present custom is to expend the annual dues for a gift to one definite object; in accordance with this custom a set of books was purchased for St. Paul's, the book plates bearing the name of the Church Periodical Club of the Diocese of Bethlehem.

Since January 1st, 1922, \$132.25 has been given for St. Paul's Library, bringing our present total up to \$218.15. A more detailed report of these gifts will be made after the fund has been completed.

There is a fund being raised by the Auxiliary of the whole Church to purchase a set of books for St. Paul's in memory of Miss Julia Emery. Some Parish Branches or individuals may

not have felt able to give a book to the library, but might care to contribute a small sum to this memorial fund, which will be held open until May 10th. Any such sums will gladly be received and credited to the Parish from which it comes. This also would give an opportunity to people in Parishes where there is no branch of the C. P. C. to take part in this important work.

At the present time the lists of all the magazines which are being sent from our Diocese are being revised and brought up to date, with the unpleasant result that several of the Parish Librarians find that many people who promised to send magazines have failed to do so, and have not notified the librarian of their failure. So I make an especial request that in future when the contributors are unable to forward their magazines, they will be prompt in telling their librarians, so that the recipients may not wait hopefully, expecting periodicals that will not arrive. Such notifications would materially aid the work at the central office. Miss Thomas, the executive secretary, has told me that nearly four-fifths of her correspondence is trying to trace magazines which are not reaching the supposed recipients.

Constitution

ARTICLE I.

The name of this Society is the Bethlehem Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE II.

The object of this Society is to diffuse knowledge of the Missionary work of the whole Church among all people in the Diocese; to increase their interest and activity in that work; to encourage the formation of branches of this Society in every Parish and Mission of the Diocese; and by means of united and systematic effort to promote the work of Church extension.

ARTICLE III.

The Church is the Missionary Society. Every baptised person is a member of this Society; therefore all baptised women who aid the missionary work of the Church by their prayers, work or offerings are recognized as actual members of the Women's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV.

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Supply Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Treasurer, an Organizing Vice President for each Convocation of the Diocese. Other officers may be chosen at the discretion of the Society.

2. These officers (except the Organizing Vice President and the Educational Secretary who shall be appointed by the Bishop) shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of the

Society for terms of three years.

3. The President's tenure of office shall not exceed two consecutive terms.

4. The Vice President shall not serve for two consecutive terms.

5. The Convocational Vice Presidents and Educational Secretary shall be appointed by the Bishop.

6. The above officers shall constitute a Board of Managers to which the affairs of the Bethlehem Branch shall be entrusted.

7. A Nomination Committee shall be appointed by the President two months previous to the annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to prepare a ticket containing, if possible, the names of two candidates for each office.

ARTICLE V.

The duties of the President are to call all meetings, to preside at them, and to have the general oversight and direction of the work of this Society.

ARTICLE VI.

The duties of the Vice President are to assist the President, and in her absence, to preside at all meetings of the Society.

ARTICLE VII.

The duties of the Secretary are to prepare a report of the work of the Society for its annual meetings; to have charge of the printing of its reports and other documents, and to conduct such correspondence with the parent Society and other Branches as the President may direct and approve.

The Supply Secretary shall have entire charge of all the Box work of the Diocese.

ARTICLE VIII.

1. The duties of the Treasurer are to receive all moneys of the Society, to keep a full and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements, and to present to the Society at the annual meeting a full report of the same. She shall pay out money only by the direction of this Society, or its Board of Managers, except such sums as may be received for definite purposes. All money received for purposes outside the Diocese shall be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Presiding Bishop and Council.

2. The duties of the United Thank Offering Treasurer are to increase and deepen the interest in the United Thank Offering; to receive all money for this offering and with the advice of the Board of Managers to place this money at interest until it is presented at the next Triennial meeting of the Women's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IX.

1. The duties of the Organizing Convocational Vice Presidents are to form new Parish Branches in their Convocations, to stimulate the missionary spirit and to increase intelligent interest in the missionary work of the Church. They are authorized to hold meetings within their Convocations and are free to conduct their work under the general approval of the President of the Society and the Bishop of the Diocese.

2. Each Organizing Convocational Vice President shall send to the Treasurer of the Society all monies except the United Thank Offering, received from its Branches immediately on receipt of the same, together with a detailed account designating the

source from which, and the object for which they were received.

3. The Organizing Convocational Vice Presidents shall make an annual report to the Secretary of the Auxiliary of the work done in their Convocations, the same to be printed in the annual report of the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE X.

At each annual meeting the President shall appoint a committee of two persons whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer, and the United Thank Offering Treasurer.

ARTICLE XI.

Before January 1st of each year, each Parish Branch shall send to the Organizing Vice President of its Convocation all moneys contributed for the Society, and also report of all work done, including the furnishing of boxes for Missionaries.

ARTICLE XII.

There shall be one general meeting of the Society in January of each year at such time as may be designated by the Bishop.

(This Article not yet accepted).

ARTICLE XIII.

Special meetings of this Society may be called by the President at the request of the Board of Managers or of four Parish Branches.

ARTICLE XIV.

Amendments to this Constitution must be proposed at one annual meeting and voted on at the following annual meeting when a two-third vote of the members present will be necessary to carry the amendment.
