## Twenty-first Annual Meeting

---

JUNE 3RD, 1901, CHRIST CHURCH, ALAMEDA.

The California Branch of the Auxiliary, this year, tried the experiment of holding the Annual Meeting outside of San Francisco. Christ Church, Alameda, gave a cordial invitation, and rector and people did everything possible to make the occasion successful. The attendance of women not only from Alameda County, but from San Francisco was most satisfactory, the roll-call in the afternoon showing seventeen branches and five Junior branches represented.

At the morning service, the Bishop celebrated, assisted by the Rev. J. D. Yoshimura. The Rev. H. S. Jefferys and Dr. Lacey were also in the chancel. The Bishop's address dealt largely with the Triennial, the preparation necessary that we may be free fully to enjoy its coming among us, the results in increased sense of duty and enlarged sympathy.

The noon hour, for which the ladies of Christ's Church had bountifully provided, was very refreshing and afforded pleasant meetings with friends.

At two o'clock the President called the meeting to order. Dr. Lacey gave a word of welcome, and the President made a brief address.

Reports were read by the Secretary and the Treasurer, by Miss Wade for Missions Classes, by Miss Stocker for the Juniors, and by Mrs Nichols for the Babies' Branch. Illness preventing the attendance of Mrs. Lincoln, the report of the Church Periodical Club was read by Mrs. Lawver, who was requested to express to Mrs. Lincoln and to the Recording Secretary regrets for their enforced absence.

Supplementing Miss Stocker's reports, Mrs. Kelley spoke of the offering for the Font Fund given by St. Peter's Sunday School. She told how eagerly the children gave when they understood the appeal. Mrs. Kelley also offered a resolution, which was adopted, that some member of the Auxiliary be appointed to present the subject of the Font Fund to the Sunday School Commission.

A letter from Miss Emery was read and acted upon.

Archdeacon Emery gave a short account of Miss Dorsey's work, urging the need not only to support our one Deaconess, but to put others in the outlying parts of the diocese.

He was followed by the Rev. A. B. L. Karney, who begged our interest and aid in the work of the Seamen's Institute, especially at the Marine Hospital and at Port Costa.

The Rev. H. S. Jefferys introduced Dr. Motoda, rector of Grace Church, Tokio, and Head Master of St. Paul's College. Dr. Motoda briefly described his labors, giving interesting glimpses of pastoral and educational work in Japan.

Very naturally followed some account of the Japanese Mission in San Francisco, by the Rev. J. D. Yoshimura, whose picture of a recent service where seventy-five people had but thirty chairs, called out a collection for chairs.

By a rising vote, the President was requested to express to Mrs. Twing and Miss Emery our sympathy in their recent bereavement.

A resolution of thanks to the rector and ladies of Christ Church was adopted. The meeting closed with the Doxology and Benediction.

## Twenty-first Annual Report

A review of the past year shows our Branch of the Auxiliary moving on its accustomed lines with, on the whole, encouraging progress.

But on coming of age, today, in this pleasant city, Alameda, with the warm welcome of Christ Church tempting us to think only of our successes, I must open this report with a distinct statement of our disappointment that in the weaker parishes and in the missions we have so few branches with any persistence. We ask of them little in the way of regular dues, we make all possible concessions to the demands of local interests, in some instances our organization being used by Rector and Vestry to raise parish assessments to general Diocesan funds, but we know that there is no place in the Diocese so poor that with the desire it cannot find the way to share, regularly, the pleasant burdens imposed on the Auxiliary by the Church herself.

Of the ninety-eight parishes and missions of this diocese I know of sixty-nine that have been helped by the Auxiliary, many of them for long periods of years, yet when our Committee on the United Offering, wishing to have every station of the Church represented in the great thankoffering to be made in October, asked of organizations in forty places where we have no representation or are only nominally represented, to appoint some one to lay the matter before their people, ten only responded, of them, seven favorably.

Indifference to the work of the Auxiliary is indifference to that part of the Church's work which she has committed to us, and all we can do is to "screw our courage to the sticking point" and try again.

Affairs within the Auxiliary are very encouraging. We have held our usual monthly Diocesan and Alameda County meetings with increased interest and growing attendance, and the Semi-Annual in St. Paul's, San Francisco, on Friday of Convention week, was a success throughout.

In addition to addresses by local speakers, Miss Marian Taylor has told of her work at Pyramid Lake, and we have taken advantage of the furlough with us of the Rev'd and Mrs. Jefferys, to hear them at general and branch meetings on the missions in China and Japan.

Custom does not stale our deep enjoyment of the appointed Quiet Days. The Bishop conducted the Day held in the Advent, East Oakland, November 21st, and the Rev'd L. C. Sanford at St. Luke's, San Francisco on March 20th.

The latter occasion was made opportunity for an address by the Rev. E. J. Lion, memorial of Mrs. Lafayette Maynard.

The re-organization of Woman's Work, St. John's, Stockton, as effected by the incoming rector last September, is worthy of particular mention.

Mr. Bryan, unwilling that parish interests should overshadow the Church's demands and fearing that two organizations would mean conflicting interests, organized all the women of his parish a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, "for the purpose of assisting the missionary work of the Church to which we belong and to promote the interests of our own parish." Committees have in charge the several departments of general and parish work, all reporting at the monthly meetings, when a missionary topic is presented by a member, followed by an address on the subject by some one from outside.

What seemed to us a doubtful experiment has proved an unqualified success, seventy women thus working for the general and parish work as one.

On these same wisely drawn lines the missionary in charge of St. Stephen's,

Gilroy, with the Secretary's assistance, made St. Stephen's Guild a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary; on the afternoon of April 20th.

Another quickening, in a strong center, full of particular promise is the formation of a Young Woman's Auxiliary in St. Luke's, San Francisco, which was so well represented at our Annual Officers Meeting. We have long believed that our young women, especially those who have not grown up among the Juniors should have organization among themselves.

Already St. Felicia's Guild, Trinity, San Francisco, Trinity Guild in Trinity, Oakland, and the Girl's Guild in St. John's, Stockton, have occupied our girls no longer to be ranked as children, and the Junior Auxiliary in Trinity, San Jose, will be ready to class itself with these when the time shall come for a young woman's Auxiliary as a Diocesan department.

Although we hold our Twenty-first Annual Meeting to-day, our real anniversary fell on the second of last February, and there are some here who recall that notable Feast of the Purification, when, assembled in Mrs. Maynard's parlor, our San Francisco women organized "The Woman's Missionary Society of California."

Mothering the Auxiliary throughout its infant years, proud of it as it grew to meet her ambitions, this branch has had no truer friend than her whose dear form we laid to rest last March. In the years of our earthly separation she was not forgotten, and now that Paradise enfolds her we thank God for all he gave us in the good example of our first Vice-President, Mrs. Lafayette Maynard.

Some of us who remember these old days and the gatherings of all the Auxiliary in "old Trinity" may think we have lost some of the fervor of our youthful days. Perhaps this is true, it may be that enthusiasm has given place to habit, as our Bishop has phrased it. Let us see!

In May, 1883, we made our first printed report.

Then we had one organization in the city of San Francisco. Now we have sixty-four branches, including Juniors, and of the organizations on the list of the Los Angeles Auxiliary, we gave up twenty-four Woman's Auxiliaries at the time of the division of the Diocese. Then our membership was one hundred and seventy-five. Now we have reported about seven hundred, a very imperfect roster, we are sure. Then membership was confined to the women. Now in some way we touch a majority of the Sunday Schools and besides our active working branches have one hundred and seventy-two babies on the roll. Then we met once a week, at the most, fifty-two meetings annually. Now in addition to eighteen General Meetings, I have a record of four hundred and ninety-six meetings held by parish branches, a total of five hundred and fourteen gatherings of women for missionary work or study during the year. Then we met to sew and occasionally for an address from a missionary. Now our Diocesan meeting and the monthly meetings of many parish branches are given up wholly to business and instruction of some kind. In addition to the mission classes, technically so called, and to be reported by Miss Wade, twelve parish branches have regular definite instruction or addresses by program. Then box work monopolized our interest. Now gifts of money exceed the value of gifts in kind.

Do we not recognize in these imperfect statistics a something behind the habit that is so good to gain—enthusiasm, with a meaning back of its ordinary application, the God in us moving us to do His will, Christ in us the hope of glory.

But it is prospect now rather than retrospect. We are getting our house in order for the highest earthly guest—dear Mother Church herself. You are all interested in the smallest detail of this preparation, and we know we may rely on every one of you for the help you may at any time be called upon to give.

We do not expect you to begin your Christmas box work until after General Convention, but we will have lists ready in September, and depend on every branch to take its share in providing for them, letting us know by September 15th what that share may be.

It would seem that there is nothing left to be said about the United Offering.

We had placed before us the ideal of every place in the Diocese a contributor, and our Committee acted on this with the result noted above. All of Miss Emery's letters and leaflets have had due consideration, and it seems as though the blue boxes had accompanied us in all our goings out and alas, in many of our comings in; but until the hour of service on October 3rd, the check from California may be raised and every woman now a giver may interest some one else.

We are expecting to learn much at Convention. The value and accuracy of this information will depend largely on what we know before hand of the subjects discussed.

Indeed, I think it would not be bad to have a summer school for much study of church history, some instruction in the scope and prerogative of National Church Councils, and a clearer understanding of our present canon law on the questions expected to come up. Failing this, the Church periodicals will prepare us through others' minds.

But there is an inner preparation for General Convention and the great Triennial that I should love to know we all may make.

Let us try to fix our minds steadfastly on the Church's inner life in Christ her Head, and by prayer and sacrament so make ready our hearts that what they receive imperfectly, He may perfect, so that we may be seed ground for an abundant harvest that in His good time His own hand shall reap.

### Second Annual Report of Missions Study Classes

The "beginnings" of last year's report have more than fulfilled their promise. Meetings of the Diocesan Class have been held every month, beginning with August 6th, 1900. We have had eighteen very interesting papers upon the General Subject of China—ten upon its history, etc., and eight upon the work of our Church in China. The meetings have been well attended, and many have been present who had not been in the habit of coming to the Auxiliary meetings. We have sometimes wished that we could hold our classes on some other day than that on which the Auxiliary meets, but for the present it seems best to continue our plan of combining the two. We still hope, however, that we may carry out the other suggestion made at the Semi-Annual meeting and have parish classes for the study of missions, especially in those places too distant from San Francisco to attend the Class there. We intend to use next year an admirable series of leaflets for Missions Study, prepared by the Church Missions Publishing Company, in Hartford, Conn., issued monthly at ten cents per year. They give a brief, but clear and connected historical account of the Church from its foundation and lists of subjects for papers and of books in which to find material. We feel sure that other classes undertaking the study of missions would find much help from their use.

Already some of our branches use the Junior Grade of these leaflets and I am happy to report an increasing number of branches that regularly, by readings with occasional papers, or by courses of addresses, stimulate and satisfy what Miss Emery characterises as our present most hopeful development "the desire to know."

### **Seventh Annual Report of the Junior Department**

The condition of the Junior Auxiliary for the year is comparatively unchanged. There has been one new branch formed at Gilroy under the charge of Miss Ingham, which promises well for the future, also from Miss Dorsey comes the news of the formation of two branches at Modesto, one of older girls and one of younger ones. She also hopes to organize a branch in Oakdale. Several branches have been given up.

The record for the Sunday Schools and working branches is excellent. Nearly all reports show that they subscribe to the Font Fund, and central expenses, and that they have missionary study. The working branch of St. John's, Stockton is especially worthy of notice. Besides their regular work they have raised twenty-five dollars for Miss Dorsey's salary. The Font Fund is being paid in rather slowly, if this could be attended to more promptly it would greatly help the officers. As it is, they are never quite sure how much is coming in, and it handicaps very greatly their orders for fonts. If every officer would make it her special work to see that the money was paid in at Whitsuntide, I am sure that the general secretary would be greatly relieved. I should like to make an appeal for the keeping up of the working branches. It is a very difficult thing to keep children together, and the only way is to keep them personally interested.

The Junior Auxiliary has not done anything towards swelling the amount of the United Offering except in a very few instances. It seems as if they had as great a privilege in that work as their seniors. Cannot something be done to interest them in this work? If not this year, at least let us help them to bear a part in this great gift at the next Triennial.

### **Seventh Annual Report of the Babies' Branch**

The Babies' Branch now numbers one hundred and seventy-two. At Easter we received money from one hundred and twenty-eight members, and have more money to do with this year than ever before, and can keep up our contributions to our old friends and send some small sums to other places. Mrs. Hunter to whom we sent five dollars last year, wrote me:

"The bed has been occupied all summer, and has been a blessing to some poor little ones who could not have had the attention and care that was needed in their own homes. At one time we had two little babies in the same bed during the day, and Dr. Hayden was much amused one day when making her rounds in the ward to see the older child take the bottle from the mouth of the little one and drink the milk himself. I am afraid he was a greedy baby." Mrs. Hunter also says she has a small branch of Little Helpers, about five I think, of these little colored children. And Miss Bull expressed her pleasure that we continued the support of the little Japanese girl, Takue, who she says is doing well and has a strong character.

I hope next Easter will find our work growing and getting stronger.

**Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club**

The work of the Club during the past year has shown a healthy increase and the interest taken in it by the librarians has been most gratifying.

We have now seventeen librarians.

190 persons receive literature from us and 285 periodicals are regularly mailed. There have been sent out 8,493 odd magazines, 939 bound books, 36 bound short stories, 3,983 odd numbers of newspapers—church and illustrated, 1248 Sunday School papers, 4 calendars, 1,500 cards, 2 games, 60 pieces of music, 2 sermons and 3 dolls. Many boxes of flowers, and Christmas and Easter boxes have also been sent. \$18.00 has passed through the correspondent's hands but each librarian has also spent money on postage that has not been reported.

## Counsels to Parochial Officers

Impress upon the women of your parish that they are, by virtue of their baptism, members of the Auxiliary. Urge them to recognize this claim by working along the appointed lines, and by giving such dues as your Parish Branch may settle upon.

When there is no Parish Branch, you may become a member of the Diocesan Branch by paying one dollar annually or by giving regularly to the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund.

Every Branch is expected to give to the United Offering, to the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund and to Diocesan expenses, and report to Diocesan Treasurer, and to do its share of the work as planned by Diocesan Officers.

After this, develop any general or diocesan work that has the approval of your rector, after consulting with Diocesan Officers.

The "United Offering" is the Thankoffering presented at every Triennial service of the Woman's Auxiliary. The offering of 1901 will be laid on the Altar at the Triennial Celebration, October, 1901, in San Francisco. It will be divided equally among all the Missionary Bishops and the Commission for Colored Work. Every woman is given an opportunity to share in the great Thankoffering. Mite Boxes will be sent on application, and gifts or pledges received at any time.

The Bishop's Auxiliary Fund is placed by the Woman's Auxiliary at the Bishop's disposal for diocesan missionary work carried on by women. It supports at present a sister assisting the City Missionary in San Francisco, and a deaconess working most acceptably in a mining district.

The Auxiliary asks every Churchwoman in the Diocese to contribute to the fund, through envelopes which will be furnished.

Every congregation is asked to give one dollar annually to the Altar Fund, and thus to share in erecting an Altar in a new mission every year. See that your Church responds. Payments are due on the Feast of the Transfiguration, August 6th.

Every Sunday School and working branch of the Junior Auxiliary is asked to give fifty cents or more to the Font Fund that a stone font may be given every year.

Take the *Pacific Churchman* and read to your Branch the Woman's Auxiliary page. Keep ready for reference a Church Almanac with clergy list, the last report of your Diocesan Branch, Miss Emery's last report and the Spirit of Missions; and keep in supply, copies of the Auxiliary prayers, leaflets from the Church Mission House, mite chests for the United Offering, Auxiliary Fund envelopes and blanks for box lists, and leaflets for the Junior Auxiliary work.

When a project is laid before your Branch, do not fail to report its action, after due deliberation.

When you begin a box, advise the recipient and the Diocesan Secretary. When you ship it, advise again, giving date and mode of shipment. If you cannot secure free shipment, prepay charges on *all* packages to clergy, institutions and diocesan officers.

Remit money by express, P. O. Order, bank drafts or checks on San Francisco banks; *never by bank notes*.

Report at once changes of address, or temporary absence, and apply to the Secretaries of the various departments for further information.

Fear not; trust and pray.
