ANNUAL MEETING, 1908.

The twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at S. Paul's Oakland, on Wednesday, May 27th. Holy Communion was celebrated at 11 o'clock, the Bishop being assisted by the Rector, the Rev. Alexander Allen. The Rev. Mr. Bradley, of San Rafael, preached the sermon. After service luncheon was served by the ladies of St. Paul's, and at 2 o'clock the afternoon session was called to order in the Sunday School room by the President. Twenty-three branches responded to roll call. The minutes of the semi-annual meeting were read, after which Mr. Allen said a few words of welcome to the Auxiliary, ending with an invitation to hold every annual meeting at S. Paul's.

Mrs. Monteagle gave her greetings to the Auxiliary at this her first annual meeting as President. The Bishop then made an address in which he contrasted the present full meeting with the one held two years ago immediately after the earthquake and fire, which, he said, was evidence enough that the Auxiliary had found herself again. Turning to the material aspects of the work, he spoke particularly of the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund, explaining what it was for, lest anyone might think it was a fund for the Bishop's own private gratification, and told of the great need for increasing it to keep up with the growing demands of the work. Mrs. Monteagle added a few words, and leaflets on the subject were distributed.

Archdeacon Emery told of the recent conference of the Eighth Department in Portland. He went on to speak of the work waiting to be done on this peninsula and across the bay and the need of not only men but women to do it—and made this offer, that if by the first of July the Auxiliary succeeded in raising an additional hundred dollars for the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund, he would send a check for another hundred.

The Secretary read her annual report and Mrs. Ruckman reported on the Mission Study Class. Miss Deal reported for the Junior Auxiliary and Mrs. Nichols for the Babies' Branch. Mrs. Stoney closed report making with the year's record of the Church Periodical Club.

Deaconess Drant told of her work among the Chinese and made a strong appeal for more helpers, the result of which was that before the close of the meeting she had obtained one volunteer. She introduced her Chinese assistant, Mr. Ng Peng, who thanked the members of the Auxiliary for what they had done for him.

Miss Dorsey then spoke of the great necessity for a Church training school for girls.

Mrs. Lawver read a letter of greeting from Miss Emery, and Mrs. Monteagle announced that Miss Emery would visit us on her return from the Orient.

Resolutions passed at the Officers' Conference were given: First, that the Board of Missions be asked to apply California's contribution to the Foreign Missionary Life Insurance to that of O. O. M. Second, that it be made obligatory for every Branch to use a particular kind of record book which would be obtainable from the Secretary. Third, that at every official visit made to a Branch by the President or Secretary, an offering should be taken for the Auxiliary.

Regret was expressed at the absence of Mrs. Sherman, Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Taylor, and a vote of thanks passed to the Rector, choir and ladies of St. Paul's and all who had assisted in entertaining the Auxiliary. A special vote of thanks was also given Mr. Bradley for his helpful and inspiring sermon. Rev. Mr. Gassman pronounced the benediction and the twenty-eighth annual meeting adjourned.

## ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT.

At this, the first annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary since my appointment as President, I want to begin my greeting to you with words of thanks and appreciation for what you have done in the past year. As I am gradually becoming familiar with the inner workings of the Auxiliary, I am impressed more and more with the fine work done by many Branches in the different conventions, the quiet, steady growth of others and there is great encouragement in the fact that several Mission Branches are being held together by the efforts of a few faithful women.

We have four new Branches to report since the last Annual meeting—in Christ Church, San Jose, S. Philips, Fruitvale, a Junior Branch reorganized in St. Luke's, San Francisco, and an Intermediate Branch in St. John's, Stockton. And a little society calling itself the Bandage Guild in Ross Valley, will soon become a Junior Branch, we hope.

I am delighted with the activity that has taken possession of several of our Junior Branches. Such a movement must inspire other Parishes with the desire to have Junior Branches of their own. What the Sunday Schools are to our Churches, such are our Juniors to the Senior Branches of our Auxiliary!

The reports of the different Churches speak for themselves, and let us examine them carefully. And yet with all that has been done, do any of us feel that we have done all we could? Let us be practical and face the question squarely and strive to suggest new ways and means of awakening interest and of deepening the spiritual life of our organization. It is on this second thought that I want to say a few words.

You have probably heard that it is said by those high in authority that this past year has been noticeably marked by the wave of increasing interest in religious thought and observance. The Lenten Services all over the country were never before so well attended and the great Feast of Easter was kept in the true spirit of the day as it has not been for years!

Does it not make one ask the question, Why? And I believe one of the chief features in the spiritual up-lift is the more active part prayer is taking in the lives of many people. People are not only giving more time and thought to prayer themselves, but speaking of it and of their faith in its efficacy.

Do we realize that prayer is the very source of all power? Nothing can take its place. If religion is the bond between the soul and God, then prayer is the essence of that bond! Prayer is the very breath of the spiritual life and should be viewed in the highest possible light. It is the greatest force that we can wield and is the greatest talent which God has granted us—and He has given it to every Christian. Think what the possession of such power means, and do we feel the tremendous responsibility of it? Should not our "hearts burn within us" to pass on the vision splendid? Do let us make a resolve this very day that we will be more fervent, more faithful in our prayers.

I have read recently a book of John Mott's in which remarkable instances are given of answers to prayer. I cite two cases. "In 1872 the Church Missionary Society instituted the observance of a day of intercession in order that they might obtain more workers. In the five years preceding 1872 they sent out fifty-one missionaries; in the five years following that year, during which they observed this day of special intercession, they sent out 112 missionaries."

"In 1886 the China Inland Mission had 200 missionaries. A number of them met that year for an eight days' conference for Bible study and also for united prayer. While they were together they were led to unite in prayer that God would thrust forth into that Mission during the year 100 additional missionaries; and before the conference closed one of them suggested that they have a praise meeting to thank God for answering the prayer, because he said, "We shall not all of us be able to come together for that purpose a year hence." They did so. Within the following year there were 600 who applied to be sent out. The Mission selected and sent out 100 of them. "Surely to him that believeth, all things are possible."

And as our organization is an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, should we not lay stress on the bond which connects prayer and Missions?

Prayer and Missions are as inseparable as faith and works, in fact, prayer and Missions are faith and works. "Jesus Christ, by precept, by command, and by example has shown with great clearness and force that he recognizes the greatest need of the enterprise of the world's evangelization to be prayer." Before give and before go, comes pray. This is the Divine order. At one of the great Missionary meetings in Richmond, I heard it said: "Missions is the very essence of the Gospel" and the message to us in the Gospel is "Go ye therefore into all the world." And as the source of the spiritual vitality and power of any Christian movement is prayer, does it not bring it home to each one of us that we can show our colors and take a part in the carrying out of the Great Commission.

Are more workers needed? Prayer is the secret of securing them. The one method which Jesus Christ emphasized for obtaining laborers is prayer and He went to the center of every problem. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He send forth laborers into this harvest."

Every Auxiliary formed and every Missions Study Class is a step forward. It is my earnest hope that before the next Annual Meeting we shall have several new Branches of the Auxiliary to report and I want to urge the formation of more Missions Study Classes. The Class held in San Francisco during Lent under the able leadership of Miss Caroline Fiedler was absorbingly interesting and every one who was privileged to attend was fired with added zeal to further the cause of Missions. And our Class has not disbanded since Easter, for our Leader holds us together in a beautiful way by chains of prayer—prayers for definite objects, the prayer for this month of May being for our own missionary, John Nichols, in Sinza, Shanghai. So until we are able to meet together again we are kept in close touch with each other and with the real object of our class formation, expressed so well in the motto adopted: To know, to pray, to serve.

When I recall that this is the twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of our California Auxiliary and only my first year as a Diocesan officer, I wonder at my temerity in speaking to you, but I am sure you all understand it is from my feeling of the deep responsibility resting upon me and my heartfelt desire for the upbuilding and developing of the efficiency of our Auxiliary.

Let us remember that we are all members of one Diocesan family, with our beloved Bishop as the head, and that he needs the co-operation of each one of us to carry on the work he has in mind. I do not say co-operation of Branches and Parishes as Branches and Parishes, but each individual soul in each Branch and Parish. Let no one feel two small or too insignificant to take a part, or no Branch

so new or struggling that it cannot take some part in the general Missionary work. There is great danger of becoming narrow and self centered if we allow ourselves to work only for our own Parish or for what specially appeals to us. Jacob Riis says that for every dollar given to those abroad the spirit that gives provides ten for home use. If that is true of material things how much more is it true of spiritual?

With 105 organized Parishes and Missions in our Diocese, do you know how many Branches of the Auxiliary we have?

So you see there is much Missionary work for us to do right here. Who will volunteer to be the inspiration of forming a new Branch before our next Annual Meeting? In so many instances all that is needed is the information. As the Bishop said in his stirring address at the last United Service during Lent: Let us look to it that as our city is being rebuilt in a material way with Class A, steel structures, so let us pray and work for a spiritual rehabilitation that is worthy of our heritage as children of the Heavenly King.

## TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The twenty-eighth year of the California Branch, just closing, has been an eventful period, especially to the Board of Diocesan Officers so closely concerned with administration.

Most generously, Mrs. Newlands, prolonged beyond the time of her resignation, oversight of the work to cover the new President's absence and added to this the exacting duties of Secretary, thus continuing until her final withdrawal the unselfish devotion which has characterized all her term of office.

Miss Gibbs, with like fidelity and consideration, during a period of continued ill health, did her double work as Diocesan Treasurer and Treasurer of the United Offering until, in February, her resignation became imperative and its acceptance by the Bishop and the Auxiliary a duty to be performed most reluctantly.

We record here the Auxiliary's gratitude for these extra gifts of valuable service.

To us has come a new President to carry on the traditions of the past and to interpret in her own way their leadings. In her gracious presence I can say this only, that we have every day new reasons to believe the Bishop to be an infallible prophet!

Around the great Richmond Convention surged waves of the Auxiliary's greatest interest and emotion, to flow back in tides of blessing on the Diocesan Branches of the National Church, and how long before Convention had we looked forward to its glories!

You will recall how on a stormy day in January, 1907, the Bishop came to our little monthly gathering in Mrs. Kelley's rooms, Diocesan House, with a big motto for this day of small things,—S. Frances' very own—"Keep a large mind in a small house," and suggested that we make our share of the United Offering a special thankoffering for the mercies that came with earthquake and fire, and how blessedly it fell on hearts still vibrant to the touch of Nature's awful hand.

By this effort the Auxiliary steadied itself, I am sure, in God's Providence, and said so to unbelieving souls when it laid on the Altar at the Corporate Communion in Richmond a larger gift than in more prosperous years.

The Bishop, Clerical delegates and Auxiliary delegates, on their return from Richmond, and many of the stay-at-home Clergy have continued the inspiration and instruction of General Convention in addresses in many places, on the "Missionary Spirit in the Convention," "Convention Legislation," "What Convention Accomplished," "Auxiliary Ideals Fulfilled."

This force is not spent. This inspiration is a vital, growing energy. The missionary accomplishment of the Richmond Convention is on the lines of God's own purpose, and I am sure many of us are still ready to carry its message to those who may need it.

Diocesan Auxiliary life has followed its usual routine of services and meetings with few exceptions. The Quiet Day conducted by the Bishop in S. Stephen's Church, San Francisco, on the Feast of the Annunciation, crowned the teaching of all the Quiet Days that reach back through twenty-three years of our history. The Bishop in his treatment of the profound subject "I believe in God, the

Father, Almighty, Maker of Heaven and Earth" so clear and yet so intimate, unlocked the mysterious recesses of the spirit in many of God's children and gave them new intimation of their destiny.

The great gains of the year have been spiritual gains: Convention's uplift into a newer, rarer atmosphere, pervading all Richmond for us, diffusing itself over the commonplaces of home life; the Bishop's Quiet Day teaching; the constant bidding to prayer of our President, and not least the epiphany that shed its light on all the intellectual effort of the Missions Class—the Christ ever present in the footprints of those who obey His last command.

How are we to embody these spiritual gains, how may we prove them, for "the internal without the external cannot exist." But this gift of the spirit, this enthusiasm has no new, strange duty as means of external expression. The special commission of the Auxiliary is still to find a way to bring the women of every parish and mission together in organization, to carry out the purpose of Auxiliary life, to learn about missions, to pray and to work for missions, and as ultimate aim to find in every woman a true auxiliary.

Within the year we have made some gains on these lines: A new branch formed in S. Philips, Fruitvale, another in Christ Church, San Jose, both beginning with study of Missions. Our Junior Secretary has initiated new methods and progress among Juniors is marked, as you may read. Mrs. Nichols has more babies to bring up in the Babies' Branch. Mission Study has engaged Branches as never before, twelve reporting regular instruction besides those belonging to the Interparochial Class.

But what of the others. Let us turn to the history of the General Auxiliary. Most wonderfully the Auxiliary has done its work in a distinctively womanly way. In these days of woman's progress and great efficiency alongside men and independently in man's work, the emphasis in the Auxiliary has been, unconsciously I think, to develop those gifts and traits which are especially hers and not especially man's. She has not had the burdens and restrictions of a legislative body or the responsibility of regulating the machinery of a great central organization, and great has been her gain. For authority she has had influence, instead of machinery a flexibility that may fit every Diocesan, every Parochial Branch, every woman into her special vocation.

In these days of profound technical study in all departments of social science, more and more it is revealed that the mission of woman is not to drive the world, however sadly she may be forced to it sometimes, but that whatever she may gain of new powers she can never be divorced from her inherent mission as woman, the building up of human life, the mothering of the world. And so in the Church the Auxiliary is a power because she has remained womanly and has grown and prospered because she has remained auxiliary, and has not only had her work as woman in the building up human life but has done much to make it holy life because she has taught the high mission of all human life.

To adapt this to our Diocesan life, let us not be dismayed because we find it so hard to make go round the wheels of mission work in so many places where we know it could be done if only "they" would try. Let us rather set ourselves this coming year the task of forming wherever permitted, in every little mission, a Branch with the simplest obligations consistent with organization, for the study of what the Church is doing, which is Missions, help the Clergy to make the new organization in his cure the center of intelligence and the inspirer of loyalty to Mother Church.

In addition to the visits of Diocesan officers, may we not ask Parish officers to visit Guilds in nearby places just to tell all they know of what is new and interesting in Mission work. And in our Branches let not the members rest until every woman in the Parish has some connection with some line of Missionary work.

In other words, may we not make of ourselves more really one family in Diocesan life, teaching, leading, inspiring, gaining the little ones and giving occupation in God's work to the feeble ones, hoping sometimes to know of the travail of our soul in the one family of the heavenly home, the Household of the Father.

### INTERPAROCHIAL MISSIONS STUDY CLASS

The Interparochial Class for the study of China met in San Francisco on Thursday afternoons in Lent. The original plan was to form a class for Normal work and prepare leaders for future classes, but so many responded to the call that the class shaped itself into just a body of earnest students seeking information.

On the Bishop's appointment, feeling unequal to the work, new to me, I made special preparation by reading such books as would create a missionary atmosphere, give me the right view-point and the proper spirit. I also studied the history of the Chinese as a race and a people that I might know them sympathetically, and realize the nature of the difficulties and measure the triumphs of our own workers in the field.

"The Interdiocesan Study Course, Missions in China," issued by the Church Missions Publishing Company, was used as text book, with the publications of the Board and the books advised as references, supplimented by items in current periodicals and other references on China. The Bishop opened the Class with words of counsel, encouragement and hope, and solemn prayer for guidance and illumination.

Not having met the class before this first Thursday, I gave a brief survey of the history, and of the Missionary efforts up to the opening of the 19th century, emphasizing the vital forces for good and evil that had made the people what they are. Before the class assembled, the aim of the next lesson and the topics to be assigned were written upon a blackboard. At first the members volunteered to take the topics, but later all were ready to do what was asked. The reports were good, to the point, showing thoughtful study and careful preparation. No less than six or seven reports were given each meeting, many followed by discussion, and I caught up the threads as we went along, if necessary, or summarized at the end. We looked up points in the Bible significant of missionary work and spirit. The leading all along was on spiritual lines—emphasis on the Divine Commission; the ultimate aim of the Class, "To know, to pray, to serve" better; and at the last meeting in the holy hours of Maundy Thursday, a reading of the leader's paper with a summary that rounded out the whole course, a report completed on the work of "Our own Missionary in China," a paper on the "Most pressing needs in China today; How shall we help to meet them as a Church? As a Christian?" and finally an excellent talk on "Intercessory Prayer" by the president of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The meeting ended with intimate revelations of the power of intercessory prayer. The spell went out with us, and we were able to put into effect the after-thought of a prayer cycle for each month, which is holding us in the spirit of missionary work through intercessory prayer, and in close spiritual communion—knowing one field, hence the spirit of all, praying, serving in His name as we can.

### FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY

At the close of this year there are ten Working Branches, total membership of about one hundred.

S. John's Branch, San Francisco, has not been reorganized since 1906, and S. Paul's Branch, San Rafael has no Directress at present.

All of the suggestions made at the Convention in January have been carried out with success; the new Membership Cards proving satisfactory; the Study of Missions meeting with a hearty welcome.

The Secretary has not been able to visit all Branches but her visits to S. Paul's Branch, Oakland and S. Stephen's and S. Luke's Branches, San Francisco will always be held in pleasant memory. The meetings of S. Paul's Branch, Oakland, are held at the different residences of the members. The meetings are opened and closed with prayer and the singing of hymns. The children are sewing on fancy articles for a sale to be given for the benefit of the Chinese Hospital. S. Luke's Branch, San Francisco, meets at the residence of Mrs. J. H. Mallett. These meetings are also opened and closed with prayer and hymns. The members at present are busy etching squares of linen with red cotton to be used in making a quilt for a hospital bed. Quite a sum of money was raised last winter by this Branch. One of the members wrote a play and the children presented it at the home of Mrs. Ruggles. A part of the time of each meeting is devoted to the study of Missions; papers being assigned to two or more members which are prepared at home and read before the Branch.

This Study of Missions is most important and we are sure if the above system will be followed by all Branches much will be gained during the winter. We all know that our interest in that which is familiar is much more intense than it is in something we have merely heard of, therefor I recommend this course of Study to you knowing the good results that have followed its pursuit.

The children of S. Stephen's Branch, San Francisco, meet in one of the rooms in the Church. The members of this Branch are little tots just learning to sew and it is a pleasure to see them struggling with needle and thread finally making "things," as one child announced. A short catechism by the Secretary showed that these little ones were awake to many Missionary facts and felt their share of responsibility.

The Missionary Tea in Alameda County was held April 25th in S. John's S.S., Oakland. Forty-five children were present and five church women assisted in their entertainment. The afternoon was spent in playing games; "Missionary Journey" and "A Missionary Guessing Game" proving instructive and amusing.

The Branches of S. Luke's and S. Stephen's Churches, San Francisco, held a tea at the home of the Secretary, June 6th. The members of S. Luke's Branch had prepared a most interesting program. All the children came in Japanese costume and a very jolly time we all had.

The work of the Junior Auxiliary has gone forward this year and may we not hope that during the coming year new Branches will be formed. Your churches may be progressing and your Woman's Auxiliary may be progressing but you must look to your children—your foundation. No work lifts us out of ourselves and brings us nearer to Him, in whose name we do all things, than work that brings us close to youth and childhood.

### FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BABIES' BRANCH

The Babies' Branch has made progress this year in having more Parishes represented, but most of them have so recently begun their work that they will not contribute to the offering from the Easter boxes. Another year we hope the new Parish Branches will show an increase in the funds.

We have done very well this year and will be able to give to most of the objects upon which all the Diocesan Babies' Branches unite, besides continuing to support the little Japanese girl, and giving to work in our own Diocese.

Two offerings this year were given at the time of the child's baptism and it has occurred to me that the Secretaries would sometimes find the parents willing to give an offering at the time the child is christened in preference to keeping a box. It is much better however for a child to be a member of the Babies' Branch and to learn the prayer and text and by having the Easter letter read and explained, learn about the work in the church.

The work is so beautiful, almost entirely for little children, and if the parents would learn about the various objects, and tell their little ones about the colored children who are taken care of in the little Helpers Bed in Raleigh, North Carolina, about the Little Helpers Day School in the Shanghai District and about children taken to S. Dorothy's Rest, what it means to give to the Font fund, and so on, it would give them a high ideal of what it is to be a "member of Christ and a Child of God."

S. Mark's Berkeley, continues to be the banner branch.

The first Librarian to be called by death was Miss Maria M. Thomas, who was for many years the faithful Librarian at Trinity Parish, San Jose. The work is now being carried on successfully by Mrs. Carpenter.

One feature of the work to which I wish to call special attention to this year is the story leaflets for use in the Hospitals. We all know how difficult it is for an invalid to hold a magazine, so the stories are taken out and bound separately, with an attractive cover, making them very light in weight and easily held. I wish some of the Young Ladies' Guilds would help with this work and I'll be glad to furnish a sample "Hospital Magazine."
