ANNUAL MEETING, 1909

The twenty-ninth Annual Meeting was held at S. Paul's Church, Oakland, June 8th, 1909. A large number of women gathered for the celebration of the Holy Communion at 11 o'clock. The Bishop was celebrant, assisted by the clergy of the parish. The Reverend G. M. Cutting preached from the texts, "The Kingdom of God is not in word, but in power," and "Ye shall be witnesses." The sermon was a searching inquiry into the reasons why the idea of power is not commonly associated to-day with the Church or with religion. The preacher thought it was for lack of faith in Christians, and appealed for greater obedience to Christ's three-fold command, "Come, Abide, Go!"

At the intermission, luncheon was served by the Alameda County branches in the Sunday School rooms of the Church.

At 2 o'clock the afternoon meeting was called to order in the Guild Room and a short opening service was conducted by the rector. So many were unable to gain entrance that adjournment was made to the Church which immediately filled with an interested congregation. Many branches, both senior and junior, were represented, and visitors were present from the northern jurisdiction and even from Georgia. A letter was read from the Diocesan President, now in Germany, and in response the greeting of the auxiliary was cabled to her.

After reports had been read the following minutes was offered by Miss Hill and adopted by a rising vote.

MINUTES

George C. Thomas

We, members of the California Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, assembled at our annual meeting, desire to express deep sense of loss in the death of Mr. George C. Thomas, so many years Treasurer of the Board. The extension of Christ's Kingdom, the cause of Missions, to which we are pledged, was the supreme and absorbing purpose of his life. To it he brought heart and soul, mind and body, time and business training. Surely the greatest tribute we can pay to the memory of his consecrated life will be to follow his example as best we may, to consecrate ourselves anew to the cause that he so loved, to say in the words of one of his favorite hymns, which so fitly describes his life;

"All we have we offer,
All we hope to be,
Body, soul and spirit,
All we yield to Thee."

The Bishop, in his address, expressed his pleasure that the work set before the Auxiliary at the last annual meeting had been accomplished, namely, the increase of the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund. He asked that our thought and prayer and work this year might be directed to the increase in the number of workers—that more young men and women may obey a call to give themselves wholly to God's service. And as president of the Eighth Missionary Department, the Bishop asked the auxiliary in California to send to other parts of the department a message by the secretary, Rev. L. C. Sanford, a request to join in this endeavor. Such a message was gladly sent.

The meeting was marked by the presence of Miss Julia C. Emery, General Secretary of the Auxiliary. She spoke of the impression she had received in her visits to our missions across the Pacific. Each missionary jurisdiction represented to her some special element of Christian work. Hankow seemed pre-eminent for the Christian unity which all long for—Christian workers of all names showing love for each other. In Shanghai the meeting during her visit of the conference of Anglican Bishops symbolized the upbuilding of the Catholic Church. In Tokio the institutional work was prominent—the kindergartens, the college, the hospital. In Kyoto there were so many confirmations that the upbuilding of the individual life seemed to be emphasized. In the Philippines there is the self-forgetful service that is leavening all by holding a high ideal before the natives who have had very imperfect Christian training. In Honolulu, where so many races are worshiping together, we see symbolized the hope of Christians to be realized when the knowledge of God shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea.

With the Bishop's blessing the meeting adjourned.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

To our Beloved Bishop, the Clergy, our General Secretary and the Women of the Auxiliary, Greeting!

Again it is time for our Annual Meeting, and how much I regret I am not able to greet you in person and see you face to face. However, as that is impossible this year, I cannot resist sending you a message from across the Sea to let you know I am thinking of you and wishing I were with you. Particularly do I regret being away this year as I counted on sharing with you all the pleasure of welcoming our General Secretary. I envy you your opportunity of hearing her tell of the wonderful trip she has had to all the different Missions of the Church in far distant land. Her travels must be inspiration to do even more than we have yet done. I feel so stirred when I reflect on our opportunities and the joy that can be ours if we will but take a little part in the carrying out of the Great Commission.

Perhaps when one is far away from home, one realizes even more deeply what a glorious privilege is ours in the Holy Catholic Church, for distance is eliminated, and whether we be in Asia, Europe or America we are one family in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Now, for a word about the California Branch of this great family and what it has been doing in the past year. Senior Branches have been added in All Saints', Watsonville; S. John's, Lodi and St. Clement's of S. Mark's, Berkeley, and we are happy to have again on our lists Branches in S. James, San Francisco and S. Paul's, Visalia, and to report for the Junior Auxiliary the new Branches in All Saints', Elmhurst, S. Michael's, Fowler, S. John's, Oakland, S. John's, Ross, S. Matthew's, San Mateo, S. James, Sonora, S. Michael's, Tuolumne and All Saints', Watsonville; also that several guilds not formally Auxiliary Branches work with the Auxiliary during a part of the year, still further increasing our members.

All this is very encouraging, and although I have not accomplished half I had hoped to do this year, I am willing to go on and with your co-operation strive to reach the high ideals the California Branch has ever held. You notice I say your co-operation, and I mean just that. An officer or a member can do a certain amount of work by herself, but it is the united work that tells and gives the enthusiasm and stimulus we all need to make us do our very best. Just here, may I remind the members of the Auxiliary again, of a great source of strength we sometimes overlook, or do not lay sufficient stress upon—the power and efficacy of prayer.

Are we earnest and faithful in our prayers? Do we all use the little prayer leaflet we have printed within the past six months, to meet the many requests of women in the different parts of the Diocese? It is our sincere hope that these prayers may be said not only at meetings but in daily devotions. I brought some copies with me and have already found several people who were very glad to have them.

It may be interesting to some of you to know that since our last annual meeting I have made forty-six official visits to Missions and Parishes from Tuolumne to Paso Robles and covered over four thousand miles by railroad, automobile and carriage.

Our Bishop says California has instituted a new method in Auxiliary Work, that of Auto-Missioning and we have been so cordially greeted and hospitably received by the people at all the points visited, we hope to do more auto-missioning every year. Indeed, I shall not be satisfied until I have reached every Mission and Parish in the Diocese several times over. I am a firm believer in personal contact. Women of the Auxiliary, do let us be willing to give more of ourselves as well as our time to the work of Our Master. Let us not forget the woman in Maine, who lived seven miles from her Church and yet always remembered the Auxiliary meeting day and when unable to attend held a meeting by herself. Surely such an example should inspire us. Let us strive to keep in mind the date of our own Parish meetings as well as the Diocesan meetings. It is the greatest help and encouragement to have these meetings well attended. We endeavor to make them interesting and how can we keep in close touch with each other as a Diocesan family and know what is going on unless we meet together? You all realize the impetus that comes from a large meeting, and yet there can be no large meetings unless the responsibility is shared and each one takes her part.

These are busy days, to be sure, and there is much for all of us to do, but it can be done if we will use our time systematically and plan ahead. Virgil says "Think that the day will never dawn again." Has it ever occurred to you that we receive our income from our Heavenly Father every day—an income of twenty-four hours, and a wonderful thing about this income is that we can save it only by spending it, and the more completely we spend it for ends that are worth while, the more we convert it into capital of character, intelligence and power.

God grant that we may awake to the privilege of using this character, intelligence and power to the glory of His Holy Name and the spread of His Kingdom.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The message of our President, which you have just heard brings the inspiration of a presence that has animated our counsels throughout the past year. I ask you to let it inform the necessarily statistical presentment of your Secretary.

As chief gain of the year we count closer intercourse with the old and new branches and with the guilds we devoutly hope to list as branches next year, through the stirring up of Mrs. Monteagle's visits, the gatherings of women at Convocations of the San Joaquin, and the meetings in such cities as Stockton and San Jose, to which came women from neighboring missions, bringing nearer the time when we shall have in such places centers of Auxiliary work and administration.

To make operative these added forces, these stirrings of missionary ardor, your officers have given increasing effort to plant in hearts thus warmed, a desire to know more about missions.

Again, weekly during Lent Miss Fiedler conducted her Interparochial Mission Study Class, in San Francisco, and like classes in Oakland and Sausalito, with wonderful helpfulness.

Parish Branches are developing new leaders. New branches begin with missionary study. Very generally, by readings, addresses—programmed or occasional, the field is kept in view, and in many ways we are learning how to teach the children.

This partial report of Missionary Study is introduced here to encourage every one of us to enlist as an ardent, wideawake auxiliary to the Diocesan Secretary recently appointed by the Bishop to oversee this department, Mrs. C. Edward Holmes, of S. Stephen's, Belvedere.

Owing to long illness which has for many months withdrawn her from active duty, our Junior Secretary is unable to present a report. Miss Deal has the satisfaction of knowing that the good work goes on and that new and lively branches have been added.

On the fifth of last October in Grace Church, San Francisco, the Bishop inaugurated a new observance, the Annual United Offering Service, by which this branch gains another occasion for Corporate Communion and special consecration to a definite purpose. This service is instituted to call to mind the sacred significance of the United Offering and to enable the many who cannot attend the Triennial Service to place on the Altar their gift. Twenty-eight branches made their offering for the year. The Bishop's lofty thought, all the movement of the service were toward an ideal which should be reached, at least by large giving, next October.

Gathered here at last year's Annual Meeting we faced a serious financial problem. You will remember that the Bishop told how the Advent Offering of the Sunday Schools which for some time had been made for his Auxiliary Fund, was to be applied to an object more directly the concern of the Sunday School, how he encouraged us to believe the Auxiliary equal to making up the loss, how he suggested ways and means and how gladly our President pledged us to fulfill the Bishop's expectations.

This, I am happy to say, has been done, largely by Mrs. Monteagle's efforts, more branches pledging to it, some branches increasing the pledges. But by far the larger increment is by individual subscriptions as specials, gained by personal appeal.

A little pledge leaflet which explained itself has been given to Auxiliary women not already contributing and to others of that large contingent which is likely for many reasons, does not know all the Auxiliary is trying to do, but is interested, just as we are, in what it feels itself responsible for in the Church's life and growth. The plea of the little leaflet has seldom been disregarded.

These subscriptions, monthly or yearly, are paid directly to the Diocesan Treasurer, who credits every parish with the sum total given by its members as specials.

This success is cause for thanksgiving but much more than that—reason for a deeper faith and further effort on these very lines. Many causes operate to make receipts variable, but beyond this, there is more to be done.

When the fund was instituted it was to provide the Bishop help he could not get elsewhere. He applied it to the support of women workers in the diocese.

I beg you to see to it that receipts outrun the immediate demand. Give the Bishop an Auxiliary pocket into which he may put his hand when he sees some new opening for woman's work. Strive for the ideal of the United Offering and the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund—every woman in the diocese, according to her ability, a giver to the support of our women workers throughout the world.

This may seem a millenium dream. Granted. It is but the extention of the life we are living now in home and parish, the projection of it through other lives, if the Christian woman be leading the Christian life. Do we doubt it shall help to bring in the Kingdom!

In the past year Missionaries have come and Missionaries have gone through San Francisco but none have been available at Diocesan Meetings. Yet general meetings have not failed of the larger interest.

We have heard: on the Pan Angelican Congress, our Bishop, the Bishop of Sacramento, the Reverend D. C. Gardner, and Mrs. Gillogly; on China and Manila, Dr. Clampett; on the Emmanuel Movement, the Reverend A. B. Shields and the Reverend Clifton Macon; and Father Lathrop has spoken on Social Service and on Missions and Orthodoxy. And coming to us often our own Department Secretary, the Reverend L. C. Sanford.

The Semi-annual Service and Meetings in Convention will be recalled by us in years to come as a blessed time, when face to face with Dr. Lloyd, the California Branch drank in his words of cheer and counsel and thrilled to his appeal to every woman present to have her share in the United Offering, dearer to him than any other giving as its motive is purer, beyond duty, deeper than even responsibility—just love from the thankful heart.

Dr. Worcester preached the Semi-annual Sermon before a congregation that overflowed Trinity Church; his theme "The Life of the Spirit." This sermon was, considered from the standpoint of the Church, the crown of all his previous teaching here.

And now we are parting for vacation days, but while we do need rest, most of us, shall it be an empty rest! Rather let me pass on the message from headquarters in Church Missions House that bids us at this time to find in change of scene and companionship some one thing to do, each for the cause of Missions. And how blessed if it may be to add one enthusiast to the cause, from among the women about us, indifferent only because you and I have yet to show it to her in a different light!

Taking her cure in far away Germany that she may return better equipped for life's duties, our President rejoices that she has gained strangers to use the Prayer Leaflet. How many treasures have we all to share or to exchange with those about us, all of us whose hearts have been touched by a coal from the Altar of the Heart of Jesus, if only love shine clear and faith burn bright, even though speech be simple or there be only silence, whose witness is the life that is hid with Christ in God.

A FOREWORD FROM THE SECRETARY FOR MISSIONS STUDY

As the newly appointed Secretary for Missions Study, I have the honour to come before you today.

My work is still embryonic, but I hope to gain much by being present at this Annual Meeting to become familiar with the faces and names of those from the different Parishes of our Diocese, whom I hope soon to know by correspondence on the subject of Missions Study Classes.

Many of you know much more of such Classes than I do myself, having lived in Parishes where they are a well established part of the Auxiliary work.

I expect also to learn much from the reports now due from the organized Classes, telling of the methods used, and the field covered. These will come to me in response to the request of our Secretary. On receipt of these the work of the Missions Study Secretary will begin, its scope being outlined as follows:

(1) To form a distributing center from which literature for the Classes may be asked and obtained.

(2) To keep a Record Book showing all Parishes in the Diocese, which at present are holding Classes, with the names of their Leaders and Secretaries.

(3) To correspond with the Parishes and Missions having a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, where study classes have not been held, to send to them special literature on the subject and to aid in the forming of new Classes as a helpful portion of the Auxiliary work in each Branch.

(4) To invite and focus correspondence on these subjects, that from a Diocesan center new material for study may be sent from time to time, papers on Missionary topics be interchanged if wished, the stronger Parishes thus helping the weak, and that the desire for knowledge of the great Missionary work of our Church may be stimulated or renewed, which is always the result hoped for and attained in a Missions Study Class.

Each Class will be asked to assemble the papers read before it upon any given topic, and when the course is complete, forward them to me, as Secretary. They will be catalogued, and filed, and be on hand for further use in lending to other Classes where needed for reference, special, or emergency use.

You will recognize this as really *old* work not *new*. It has all been done in the past by more experienced workers than myself, who have no doubt covered all these aims; it is only a division of labour on the part of those who have so earnestly upheld and furthered all sides of Auxiliary work in this Diocese, but who now wish to organize this as a separate Department with one more worker assuming definite obligations.

Indeed, I strongly suspect that the need of a Secretary was suggested by the thought that a long delinquent member of the Diocesan Auxiliary could herself be taught more about Missions and auxiliary work if her personal responsibility could thus be brought home to her.

So you see my first work as new Secretary will be to teach myself. This I hope to begin by correspondence with the Parishes and Missions of our own Diocese.

Please write to me when you need information and I shall give my best efforts in reply.

COUNSELS TO PAROCHIAL OFFICERS

Impress upon the women of your parish that they may become, by virtue of their baptism, members of the Auxiliary. Urge them to recognize this claim by working along the appointed lines, and by giving such dues as your Parish Branch may settle upon.

Where there is no Parish Branch an individual may become a member of the Diocesan Branch by paying one dollar annually, or by giving regularly to the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund.

Every Branch is expected to give to the United Offering, to the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund and to Diocesan Expenses, to report to the Diocesan Treasurer, and to do its share of the work as planned by Diocesan Officers.

After this, develop any diocesan or general work that has the approval of your Rector, after consulting with Diocesan Officers.

The "UNITED OFFERING" is the Thankoffering presented at every Triennial service of the Woman's Auxiliary. The offering of 1910 will be laid on the Altar at the Triennial Celebration, October, 1910, in Cincinnati. It will be given for Woman's Work in the Domestic and Foreign Fields. Every woman is given an opportunity to share in the great Thankoffering. Mite boxes will be sent on application, and gifts or pledges received at any time.

Parish Treasurers should call in the contents of the mite boxes by September 15th that they may present their parish offering at the annual United Offering Service to be held in San Francisco early in October 1909, or send it to the Diocesan Treasurer by that date.

THE BISHOP'S AUXILIARY FUND is a general fund raised by the Auxiliary and placed at the disposal of the Bishop. At present it is wholly applied to the support of women workers in the Diocese.

The Fund must be increased to meet the growing demands of the field.

The Bishop asks every woman in the Diocese to give to this according to her means, that "The Bishop's Auxiliary Fund for the Support of Women Workers in California" may parallel in enthusiastic interest and generous giving the United Offering's great mission in the National Church.

Do not be afraid to pledge a small sum or hesitate to give a large one.

Envelopes and Mite boxes, and Pledge Blanks for Specials may be had on application to the Treasurer.

Do not neglect to report change of address or temporary absence, or to notify when changes occur in list of officers.

Every Branch should have for reference THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS.

THE PACIFIC CHURCHMAN is the official organ of this Diocesan Branch. Its column is intended to keep parish branches advised of Auxiliary affairs and should be consulted at every parish meeting.
