To PARISH OFFICERS:

THE "UNITED OFFERING" is the Thankoffering presented at every Triennial service of the Woman's Auxiliary. The offering at the Triennial Celebration, October, 1913, in New York, is for Woman's Work in the Domestic and Foreign Fields. Every woman may share in the great Thankoffering. Mite boxes will be sent on application, and gifts or pledges received at any time.

THE BISHOP'S AUXILIARY FUND is a general fund raised by the Auxiliary and placed at the disposal of the Bishop. At present he applies it to the support of women workers in the Diocese.

The Bishop asks every woman in the Diocese to give to this according to her means, that "The Bishop's Auxiliary Fund for the Support of Women Workers in California" may parallel in enthusiastic interest and generous giving the United Offering's great mission in the National Church.

Envelopes and Mite boxes, and Pledge blanks for Specials may be had on application to the Treasurer.

The Fund must be increased to meet the growing demands of the field.

DIOCESAN BRANCH EXPENSES: It is obligatory on every parish branch to pledge a definite sum to the Fund.

RESOLUTION ON ALASKA BOX WORK, passed by Diocesan Board May 27th, 1908:

Resolved, That Branches are requested to place no value on second-hand clothing sent to headquarters for shipment to Alaska Missions, it being understood that the packers will value such articles at rates at which they would sell as second-hand clothing and apply them to the Missions for which they are fitted, unless designated, crediting them to the Branch contributing.

RESOLUTION ON THE APPORTIONMENT to the General Board, May, 1912:

All monies raised by Parish Branches for the apportionment made by the General Board shall be sent directly to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Auxiliary, as heretofore, the Treasurer of the Parish Branch being careful to report promptly this action to the Treasurer of her Church. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch will forward these sums to the Treasurer of the Diocese, stating amount given from each parish, that he may so credit it.

SPECIALS TO MISSIONARY BISHOPS should be sent through the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer, the Branch Treasurer notifying the Bishop and thus receiving his acknowledgment direct.

To SECRETARIES: Do not fail to report to Diocesan Secretary change of address or absence, or change in list of officers, as it is absolutely necessary to the success of the work that Diocesan officers should know at all times to whom to send notices of meetings, and other important communications. See that all packages are forwarded by express, prepaid. In case very heavy boxes are sent by freight, mail way-bill at once to the Secretary, who will forward to shipper bill for cartage from station. Send boxes for distribution by Diocesan officers to 1215 Sacramento Street, addressed to Woman's Auxiliary.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The thirty-second Annual Meeting was held in Trinity Church, San Francisco, on Thursday, May 9th, beginning with Holy Communion at 11 a. m., at which the Rector, Rev. Dr. Clampett, was Celebrant, assisted by Rev. Octavius Parker and Rev. W. B. Clark. The sermon by Rev. Walter H. Cambridge of San Mateo was from I Corinthians 1:23, "We Preach Christ."

After the service a bountiful luncheon was served in the Guild room by the ladies of Trinity.

The afternoon session was called to order at 2 o'clock, with Mrs. Lincoln in the chair, Rev. F. H. Church saying the opening prayers.

A message was read from the Bishop, regretting that he was unable to be present, and a cablegram bringing greetings from the absent President. Mrs. Lincoln made a brief address, bringing out the points, "Who are we?" "Why do we exist?" "How may we accomplish?" Roll call showed twenty-five Branches represented, and was followed by the Secretary's report, and that of the Treasurers, Secretaries of Junior and Babies' Branches and Missions Study Classes. Miss Fiedler gave notice of a summer school for Sunday School teachers, to be conducted in San Francisco June 4th-8th, and Mrs. Lincoln reported for the Seaman's Institute Committee.

A motion to cable affectionate greetings to Mrs. Monteagle was passed, and a vote of thanks given the ladies of Trinity for their generous hospitality, also one of gratitude to Mr. Cambridge for his wonderful sermon.

Rev. A. R. Hoare of Point Hope, Alaska, was introduced and told of our Mission farthest North, among the Esquimaux, who, he said, were a unique

people, having no idea of religion. He described their dwellings, manner of living, and the efforts he was making to improve them. He was taking back lumber to build not only houses, where young married couples could live by themselves, but a club house and laundry for the benefit of the whole village.

The offering was taken for Mr. Hoare's work.

Rev. Dr. Boyd of Emmanuel Institute, Berkeley, followed with a short talk intended to show that we can do what we desire to do, and we can do what we intend to do through Christ, who is All. Mr. F. T. Foster said a few words in behalf of THE PACIFIC CHURCHMAN, which, if only because it was the Bishop's mouthpiece, he believed to be worth while. The Doxology was sung, Mr. Church pronounced the benediction, and the meeting adjourned.

ADDRESS OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT.

It is with great diffidence that your Vice-President stands before you today, to bid you welcome, in place of her to whom all our thoughts are turned, our beloved President, Mrs. Louis F. Monteagle. Knowing her desires for us, our aim shall be to follow closely in her footsteps that way which she, by both precept and example, so unselfishly sets before us. In her name, I greet you.

From the heads of the different departments today you will hear of the work accomplished during the past year, so it is for me simply to make a few suggestions as to the year to come.

Who are we?

What is our aim?

How shall we accomplish?

We, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of California are a body of women over one thousand strong—baptized in His Name, fighting under His banner, soldiers of Christ, children of God, citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven. Believing firmly that we have the pearl of great price, the one great Truth which makes life worth living, ours is the joy of possession; and knowing this, we want the world to share our joy.

Therefore, what is our aim?

Having what we believe to be the only thing worth having, and knowing that it is the rightful heritage of every living child of God born into the world, we pass it on to them, awakening them to the consciousness of what they are, and showing them that the real object of man's life is to express God.

Now, how shall we accomplish?

S. Paul, who, more than any other apostle, comes nearer us in his experiences, for he did not have the personal, human acquaintance with our Lord, the long years of companionship, which, in spite of all our efforts to the contrary, makes us feel the twelve were different from all the rest of the world—and deep down in our hearts is the feeling that if we had really seen and known Jesus we would be stronger, braver, more faithful Christians. This S. Paul, who knew Him only as we can know Him, through the inner light, tells us boldly how we may accomplish this our heart's desire—a marvelous revelation, but having become familiar it has lost its wonderfulness.

Faith—the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen; the reality of the things we hope for; the bringing into visibility the things not seen.

Go home and read that eleventh chapter of Hebrews and see how, after telling of innumerable instances of marvelous things which resulted from faith, he closes with these glorious words:

"And what shall I more say. For the time would fail me to tell of Gideon and Barak, of Samson and Jeptha, of David and Samuel and the prophets, who, through faith, subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, waxed

valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens; women received their dead to life again"—and not excepting those whose sorrows could not dim the glory of their faith.

What more could we ask?—"Subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, waxed valiant, received their dead restored to life."

Beside this, the things which we of the Woman's Auxiliary look forward to doing by our faith seem so small and trivial that we are ashamed that we ask so little. The filling of our boxes, the support of our women workers, the teaching of our Mission Classes, the helping of our Seaman's Institute, the holding up of the hands of our beloved Bishop—are not these but the kindergarten of faith? Knowing that He who promised is true, that with Him is no variableness nor shadow of turning, and walking with our hand in His we shall go on to all good—for hath He not said, "Greater things than these shall ye do"?



SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Your Secretary returns to you at the close of this Auxiliary year too deeply grateful for all that you have done for her, to allow herself expression beyond the simple words: Thanks, from the heart, and God bless you all—every one of you—for every act and every thought and every prayer that have contributed to her recovery.

And, paramount, as I review the year which I try to look upon as a whole that I may learn its lesson, is the consciousness that this year has been good for us all, good for you and for the Church as well as for me; for you have put into exercise forces held in reserve and thus strengthened the whole body.

The fact that normal, healthy man holds within him great reserves of power which are tapped in *emergency* only, is now urged to persuade us to live more nearly up to our capacity, not only for the accomplishment of greater tasks but also for such personal development as will constantly raise the standard of normal activity. We all know the good we get from the physical exercise that we take on the strength of "second wind"; the vigor, mental as well as physical, that strangely gains with the demand of some unusual task.

You, dear women of the Auxiliary, have put in practice this theory; you have taken my duties upon you, adding them to your own. In the months when President, Vice-President or Recording Secretary have been absent, you have known to whom to go for leadership and efficient service. New committees have enlarged the old work, and all are stronger for the exercise. As you have proved this possible for the individual in the Branch, so may you make it a reality for the Auxiliary in the Diocese. For there exists not a parish or mission or a woman's heart, however indifferent now to the cause of missions, that has not riches of beneficent power in reserve. The sealed chambers that lie back of all the good we know in them will yield to the touch of the coal from off the altar. No soul is overworked for Christ!

And this is the message I bring you—the insistent cry of the Auxiliary in the Middle West as in our ultimate West—more workers, if we are to do more work. To bring in the Kingdom, the King needs all His own.

Pacific Coast Branches have credit with Eastern Branches for activity and initiative. Our own Branch has splendid equipment for a much larger body of learners and workers. Call up the reserves—the women half-heartedly waiting for a real call—and make the coming year a record for growth in numbers.

What stimulus for this awakening in the last twelve months. How many have been the preachers and teachers, most solemn our Corporate Communions.

On Altar Day the Bishops of Sacramento and Kansas City, as Celebrant and Preacher; at the September meeting our own Bishop with his world-wide message; the United Offering Service in October making its largest yet Thank-offering; in November, Bishop and Mrs. Keator, Bishop Paddock and our Mr. John W. Wood; at the Semi-Annual, one of our clergy, the Rector of Trinity,

San Jose, as preacher, Chaplain Ealand of the Seaman's Institute and the Rev. George C. Hunting, our Department Secretary, as speakers in the afternoon.

In February came unexpectedly Bishop-elect Tucker of Kyoto with his big message of hope, the Rev. the Educational Secretary sketching the work in view and the Rev. Dudley Tyng to give us the last word from China; and Cuba for the first time told to us her story by our Archdeacon at the March meeting. And besides these, all through the working year Diocesan needs have been voiced by our own missionaries, men and women.

The Bishop's Quiet Day in Lent was followed by a Day of Benediction in S. John's Parish, Ross, to which Marin County Auxiliaries were invited.

Our President in conducting meetings, and in organizing Branches in Our Saviour, Mill Valley; S. Augustine's Mission, Oakland; S. Mary-the-Virgin and Canon Kip Memorial, San Francisco, and in her extensive missionary tour with the Bishop and Archdeacon, has kindled missionary zeal in many an unwarmed soul and inspired the long-time worker with new faith and courage.

Inspirational forces have been at work in the Junior Department, in the Babies' Branch and in the Study Classes, as their several Secretaries will show.

What have we done with this deposit of information, this intake of spiritual life? Much has been transmuted into money and boxes; much has risen in prayer to the Throne of Grace. But there must remain large stores of unemployed energy, we have been given so much, and we need it all, for we face a new duty.

When, in 1901, the General Convention met in San Francisco, the Board of Missions apportioned to the Woman's Auxiliary the giving of \$100,000 in addition to what is expected of us as members of parishes. The Board has now released the Auxiliary from this separate apportionment and asks of us this larger duty, the contribution of our zeal and activity in raising the parish apportionment.

This does not so merge us in the parish that we may not keep tab on our efforts by keeping our own accounts. With this in view, the Board of Diocesan Officers asks your co-operation as expressed in the following resolution passed at its last meeting:

Resolved, All monies raised by Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary for the apportionment made by the General Board of Missions should be sent direct to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Auxiliary as heretofore, the Treasurer of the Parish Board being careful to report promptly this action to the Treasurer of her Church.

The Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch will forward these sums to Mr. Van Bokkelen, Diocesan Treasurer, stating amount given from each parish, that he may so credit it.

Readers of the recent numbers of *THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS* have missed the detailed tables of receipts. In view of these changes, which give sum totals from the Diocese only, it will be the more necessary that the Auxiliary Parish Treasurer conform to the above regulation, as only thus may we learn the measure of interest taken, and at Diocesan meetings compare methods employed in the several parishes.

With the exception of the service and after business meeting on the Festival of the Transfiguration, we part today to meet in September. May we so employ vacation days that we shall bring our sheaves with us—many new members in all our parishes, many new women giving thanks through the United Offering, many parishes gaining inspiration for missionary giving from Auxiliary women faithful to their duty. God grant it!

REPORT OF SECRETARY FOR MISSIONS STUDY CLASSES.

1911-1912.

First we must deal with facts and figures and from them draw our conclusions as to the quantity and quality of the work done in Missions Study in the Diocese of California in the past year. But today, as I read to you facts and figures, please look beneath them, and think that while they represent chiefly organization, the spirit of the undertaking is what has counted in the results attained.

Could we measure the spirit of each Parish Class and the knowledge gained from the study it would be a more profitable annual report.

From June, 1911, to April, 1912, the Secretary has received 60 letters; letters written and notices sent, 88; notices written for PACIFIC CHURCHMAN, 3; a paper on Missions Study prepared and read at four meetings; 165 books sold and sent to 34 different applicants, and money transactions amounting to \$119.88, based on a balance of 85 cents from the treasury of last year.

Names are given of those Parishes to which literature has been sent, at the request of the Rector, or a member of the Woman's Auxiliary. Where reports of actual work done have been received, notes are added.

During 1911-1912, literature for Missions Study has been sent to the following Parishes and used, no doubt, according to one or the other of the above mentioned methods.

The general subject has been the "Conquest of the Continent."

ALAMEDA.	Christ Church—During Lent readings at weekly Woman's Auxiliary Meetings; Rector's address on Missions each Wednesday; one Sunday devoted to teaching Missions in Sunday School; Sunday School Kindergarten taught about True Sunshine Mission, and all Parish organizations imbued with missionary spirit.
BERKELEY.	S. Mark's—The Woman's Auxiliary is divided into three sections for Missions Class Programmes, a Diocesan, Domestic, and a Foreign Section. In each Section eight meetings, with special subject of study, were held during the year. During Lent, literature on "Conquest of the Continent" was ordered and supplied for both Senior and Junior Classes. All Souls' Chapel—A well attended Study Class on the "Conquest of the Continent" was held each Tuesday in Lent. S. Clement's—Literature on "Conquest of the Continent."
FRUITVALE	S. Phillip's Mission—Literature on "Conquest of the Continent. Church of the Advent—Literature on "Conquest of the Continent."
OAKLAND.	S. Augustine's—Literature on "Conquest of the Continent." S. John's—In the various Parish Guilds from September to April meetings with addresses on the "Home Mission Field" were held. Utah, The Negro, South Dakota, The Seaman's Institute, The Philippines and Honolulu were the special subjects. Average attendance, 12 to 16. Literature on "Conquest of the Continent" also ordered and supplied. S. Paul's—Six lessons held during Lent on "Conquest of the Continent," the lecture and discussion method used. Average attendance, 14. Stereopticon views on "Conquest of the Continent" given to the Sunday School.
PACIFIC GROVE.	S. Mary's-by-the-Sea—At Weekly Service during Lent, readings to the Congregation from the "Conquest of the Continent."

PALO ALTO.	All Saints'—During Lent, readings from the "Conquest of the Continent," at Woman's Auxiliary Meetings.
SANTA CRUZ.	Calvary Church—During Lent and since, readings at weekly meetings from the "Conquest of the Continent."
SAN MATEO.	S. Matthew's—Held a Study Class each Tuesday in Lent with 14 members. Also a Lenten Sewing Class of 12 met weekly. Readings at both classes from the "Conquest of the Continent." Have begun an "Auxiliary Library" of books on Missions to be loaned at monthly meetings.
SAN FRANCISCO.	Interparochial Class held during Lent at the Diocesan House; studied the "Conquest of the Continent" with complete supplemental literature. Average attendance, 12. Miss Fiedler the Leader. Intensive study method used. Miss Fiedler's second class at the Diocesan House, average attendance, 9, held six study lessons on the "Conquest of the Continent." Literature on "Conquest of the Continent" supplied to Church of the Advent, both Senior and Junior. All Saints', Junior. Cathedral Mission of the Good Samaritan. Grace Pro-Cathedral, both Senior and Junior. S. James. Holy Innocents. S. Stephen's—Monthly meetings from August to April with special Missionary addresses. During Lent studied and discussed "Conquest of the Continent." The Sunday School gave the Missionary play, "The Cross Goes Westward," an object lesson upon the course in the Text Book of the "Conquest of the Continent." Trinity Parish—Literature on the "Conquest of the Continent" ordered and supplied. Three travelers in Europe from City Parishes report (informally) that on Sunday mornings during Lent they studied the "Conquest of the Continent."
SAN JOSE.	Trinity—At monthly meetings throughout the year read and discussed the "Conquest of the Continent." Christ Church—Throughout the year at monthly Woman's Auxiliary meetings studied "Conquest of the Continent."
SAUSALITO.	Each week during Lent at combined meeting of the Parish Guild and the Auxiliary a summary was given of a chapter from the "Conquest of the Continent," followed by general discussion.
ROSS.	No classes held, but Text Book and a full course of the literature ordered and supplied to individuals.

To sum up the list—at twenty-six (26) Parish Centers and by many individuals the recognized course for the year was followed.

The demand for Text Books during the week preceding Lent was unexpectedly heavy and the supply ran short. This happened also in New York, where the two editions, or 10,000 volumes, of the "Conquest of the Continent" were completely sold out before Lent commenced, and no more could be obtained.

The chief point to bring out in the year's work would seem to be the growth of the idea of Missions Study throughout the Church at large. The need of this study is being felt as an essential fundamental way to prove ourselves "Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

The visit of Mr. Gray, the Educational Secretary, to the Pacific Coast was a great stimulus. He strongly advocated intensive study classes of only eight to twelve members—the subject to be taught by assignment of topics, with original deductions to be drawn from them, and discussed by the class in general until a conclusion was formed.

This gave us advanced ideas of pedagogy as applied to Parish classes, and at first somewhat discouraged our would-be teachers, who felt themselves more than ever unequipped for leadership.

But only by such classes, inducing personal thought and effort, can leaders be prepared.

This is the ideal type of class to aim for, but it requires a trained leader, and most of those who attended felt it difficult to apply these methods to the average Parish class.

This Mr. Gray fully understands, and while emphasizing these study classes as the method giving best definite results, admits that they are not feasible in all places, and will not be until normal classes have been held in the many localities not yet reached.

In connection with this, it seems only logical that such a study class as that led by Miss Fiedler should be held in the Autumn of each year, instead of during Lent. Then its members, familiar with their subject, and with ample time for supplemental reading, would be well prepared by the following Lent to lead or join their local Parish Classes and do excellent work. California will aim at this arrangement for the date of its Interparochial Class this Autumn if possible.

Have we made progress this year?

Unquestionably yes—the reports sent in show more systematized work, and better class attendance in the Parishes.

Last year only 24 books were sold, as against 165 this season.

But, best of all, comes the assurance from many of their real interest in the subject studied. The "Conquest of the Continent" has proven a subject that appeals. It is a home subject. It gives the foundation record of Church Missions in America. Much of it is present history. The "Conquest" is still going on. We, personally, know many of the "Conquerors." We can help in the "Conquest."

Missions are not foreign fields to us in California. Some of us attend Mission churches that are not yet Parishes. We see and feel the need of further "Conquest," and are increasingly willing to read, mark and learn the work of the faithful soldiers and servants who are spreading the Kingdom of God—His Church on Earth.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

In the Junior Auxiliary the year has been one of great interest to the Secretary, being entirely new work to her, but as its details show it has been a year of life and growth in the work.

At the beginning of the year there were 16 Junior Branches, and at its close we number 24. The one Boys' Branch, that at Christ Church, Alameda, has been temporarily discontinued, but we hope for new life for it and the organization of more Branches for boys in the future.

On September 28, Mrs. Monteagle organized the Lydia Branch of Juniors at S. James Church, San Francisco. Since then eight new Branches have been formed, as follows:

At Trinity, Oakland, Juniors and Intermediates, and the same at All Souls', Berkeley; an Intermediate Branch at S. Mark's, Berkeley; one at

Christ Church, Sausalito, and one at Mill Valley, and a Junior Branch at the Canon Kip Memorial Mission, organized in January with six members, which has already doubled that number.

In the beginning of the year the Junior Auxiliary at Calvary Church, Santa Cruz, was reported disbanded. However, in January, at the Diocesan Convention we got in touch with Santa Cruz once more and among the Junior reports came one from the Children's League of Kindness of Calvary, Santa Cruz, with a nice contribution to the Alaska Box, so we still have our Calvary Juniors, over which we greatly rejoice.

Most encouraging reports have been received from 16 Branches. Eleven Branches contributed to the Alaska Boxes, others working for special objects nearer at home and some of our city Missions.

Some of the Juniors have visited both Chinese Missions, and at Christmas and Easter the San Mateo Branch sang carols at the County Poor Farm. There is a lively personal work among the girls, and a beautiful, earnest loyalty among the leaders.

Six Branches have done definite Missions Study during the year. An attempt was made to hold Missions Study Conferences during Lent among the Junior leaders in Alameda County, but only two were held, it proving impossible to find a time when more than two leaders with the Secretary could attend.

A most delightful and very great source of inspiration for us all was the reception given to the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese on December 2 by Mrs. Monteagle at her home. About 84 members and 19 officers were present. Mrs. Monteagle talked to the girls in her delightful, sympathetic, and convincing manner about the work, its aims and opportunities, and awakened a new enthusiasm among us all.

The Juniors have not confined their interests to Diocesan work only, but have kept in touch with the work generally in America, several of the Junior leaders, as well as the Secretary, corresponding frequently with Miss Lindley, the General Secretary in New York, getting counsel and a broader outlook on the work from her. We have by this means been able to have a voice in the selecting of a new Collect for the Juniors which is to take the place of the two heretofore in use.

With our five branches of Intermediates we are in line with the movement proposed at the Triennial in Cincinnati to form Branches of older girls, thus spanning the gap between the Juniors and the Woman's Auxiliary. At the present time this is a very important point in our Auxiliary life, and we must earnestly work and pray for its accomplishment.

Two of the Mystery Plays for children have been given during the year by our Juniors, and at present the latest one, "The Cross Moves Westward," is in preparation by the Branch at S. Mark's, Berkeley. In this way an interest is awakened and some knowledge of our Missionary work is given to many, both young and old, who would not be touched by Auxiliary work in any other way.
