## Counsels to Parochial Officers

Where there is no Parish Branch, an individual may become a member of the Diocesan Branch by paying one dollar annually, or by giving regularly to the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund.

Every Branch and every member should have for reference **THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS**.

**THE PACIFIC CHURCHMAN** is the official organ of this Diocesan Branch. Its column is intended to keep Parish Branches advised of Auxiliary affairs and should be consulted at Parish meetings.

**THE UNITED THANKOFFERING** is the offering presented at each Triennial Service of the Woman's Auxiliary. At the Triennial Meeting in New Orleans in 1925, the following resolution regarding the next United Thankoffering was adopted:

*"Resolved, That the United Thankoffering of 1928 be given to the National Council for the work of women in the mission field whose appointment has been approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled; provided that one-tenth of the Offering may at the discretion of the National Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and the National Council, be set aside and added to the permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the National Council, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thankoffering workers. Also provided, that the sum of not less than \$25,000.00 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the National Council on the recommendation of the Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary."*

Every Branch is expected to contribute to the following Funds:

**THE BISHOP'S AUXILIARY FUND**, a general fund raised by the Auxiliary and placed at the disposal of the Bishop. At present he applies it to the support of workers in the Diocese. The Bishop asks every woman in the Diocese to give to this according to her means, that "The Bishop's Auxiliary Fund for the support of Workers in California," may parallel in enthusiastic interest and generous giving the United Thankoffering's great mission in the National Church.

**DIOCESAN OFFICE EXPENSE FUND** for printing, freight and postage.

**THE DIOCESAN PLEDGES** to the National Work.

**RESOLUTION ON THE APPORTIONMENT** to the National Council, May, 1912:

All moneys raised by Parish Branches for the apportionment made by the General Board shall be sent directly to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Auxiliary, as heretofore, the Treasurer of the Parish Branch being careful to report promptly this action to the Treasurer of her Parish. The Treasurer of

the Diocesan Branch will forward these sums to the Treasurer of the Diocese, stating amount given from each Parish, that he may so credit it.

SPECIALS TO MISSIONARY BISHOPS should be sent through the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer, the Branch Treasurer notifying the Bishop and thus receiving his acknowledgment direct.

In order to appear in the Treasurer's Report, all money must be forwarded to her.

TO SECRETARIES: Do not fail to report to the Diocesan Secretary change of address or absence, or change in list of officers, as it is absolutely necessary to the success of the work that Diocesan officers should know at all times to whom to send notices of meetings and other important communications. See that all packages are forwarded, prepaid. In case very heavy boxes are sent by freight, mail way-bill at once to the Secretary, who will forward to shipper bill for cartage from station. Send boxes for distribution by Diocesan officers to 1215 Sacramento Street, addressed to Woman's Auxiliary.

## THE ANNUAL SERVICE AND MEETING

THE FORTY-SIXTH Annual Service and Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in joint session with the House of Churchwomen on Thursday, February 4th, 1926, at 10 o'clock in Grace Cathedral. Bishop Parsons was Celebrant at the service assisted by Dean Gresham, Canon Hayes and the Rev. W. M. Bours. The offering, amounting to \$44.36 was for the Bishop's Auxiliary Fund, which is used for missionary work in our Diocese.

Directly after the Service the Annual Meeting convened. Bishop Parsons made a few introductory remarks dealing with the "Laborers in the Vineyard"; briefly, "Out of all that God has given us, we want to give to help the world. It is not what we get but what we give that counts."

Following the roll call, which showed a representation of forty-four Branches, the President called on the Convocational Vice-Presidents for their reports, which were read and accepted.

Next in order came the Supply Secretary's report. Mrs. Fessenden urged the Branches first to reply immediately to the Supply Secretary as soon as her letter requesting work and purchase money is received, and secondly, when sending in the completed work, to send also its valuation, keeping this same valuation on their own books, as it must appear again in their annual reports. Mrs. Lance called attention to the tardiness with which reports are sent in, and hoped this would be rectified.

Mrs. Deems, the Educational Secretary, followed with her report. She stated that her class, which she will personally superintend, is to begin Monday, February fifteenth, in Grace Chapel. There will be a Normal Class for Leaders in San Francisco, and also one in Oakland, led by Miss Harriet Bakewell. The subject will be Latin America.

Mrs. Kroll, Secretary of the Church School Service League, reported her work in the five fields of service—parish, church, diocese, nation and world. An increase in offerings and work shows that the boys and girls are realizing more fully the great need the world has for the knowledge and love of Christ. It is the desire of the Department of Religious Education that every Church School give the boys and girls an opportunity to study, pray for and give to the whole work of the Church.

Mrs. Christin of the Little Helpers showed how important her work is among the children of pre-Sunday-School age. These babies are taught very early to give of themselves as well as their money.

Miss Lena J. Gibbs, who so ably completed the work of the United Thankoffering Treasurer when Miss Lansdale went abroad, reported that the contribution of this Diocese to the Offering presented at New Orleans was \$8199.26, and there was in hand towards the Offering of 1928, \$92.38.

The next order of business was the report of the nominating committee. Miss Gibbs, as Chairman, submitted the list of officers nominated:—For Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Robert H. Wright of St. Peter's, Oakland; for United Thankoffering Secretary, Mrs. Wm. P. Berry of All Souls', Berkeley; for re-election as Vice-President

for San Jose Convocation, Mrs. R. K. Vickery of Saratoga. For Delegates to the meeting of the Provincial Synod were nominated Mrs. Lance, Mrs. Livermore, Mrs. White, Mrs. Deems and Mrs. Campbell, and for Alternates, Mrs. Fessenden, Miss Hawley, Mrs. Allen, Mrs. Ashton Potter and Mrs. McLeish. On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was directed to cast the ballot for those nominated.

Mrs. Lucas, on behalf of the President of the House of Churchwomen, submitted the following Resolution:

"That the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council empower its President to appoint a Committee to act in co-operation with a similar Committee of the House of Churchwomen to plan and carry out the ways and means by which the women of the Diocese may make as their corporate gift the altar rail for the new memorial Cathedral."

This Resolution was most enthusiastically carried, and Mrs. Holmes appointed Mrs. H. M. Sherman Chairman of the Committee for the House of Churchwomen.

The motion was then made and carried to recess. The happy idea of serving the Convention Delegates with luncheon at the Fairmont Hotel proved most successful. Two hundred and fifty guests were served a very delicious luncheon, and congratulations are due the Committee in charge for its success.

The afternoon session assembled at 2:15 in the Cathedral and opened with the report of the President. Mrs. Lance with characteristic graciousness, appealed for a leader for the Prayer Partnership Plan. Speaking in the spirit of the Triennial, she urged a re-consecration of ourselves,—talents and time and service—to God.

Mrs. Babcock, the retiring Corresponding Secretary, gave a brief resume of the work and meetings of the past year.

Immediately following came the Treasurer's Report, which was accepted. Mrs. White reported that the Corporate Gift pledged by the Woman's Auxiliary at New Orleans for the next Triennial is one hundred thousand dollars, to be used as follows:

Toward this gift, our Diocese has pledged \$1500.00, which may be given in three yearly payments. The Branches are asked to make their 1926 budgets with the Diocesan and National obligations in view.

Mr. Bullock, of the Teachers' Training College, Central China, a Presbyterian, gave an interesting account of what he termed their "new recipe for China's difficulties." He believes that the Church so far has not furnished the kind of an education that the Chinese really need and can use. They are trying to find points of con-

tact. China being a nation of finance and agriculture, these studies are considered essential. Further, he said, the whole aspect of the college has changed since adopting athletics as part of the curriculum.

Mr. Deems followed with a request to the President to appoint a Committee of three or more to form part of a larger Asilomar Committee to confer with him as Dean of the Summer Conference of the Episcopal Church.

A Resolution was then presented by Mrs. Deems "That each parish Auxiliary President be requested to appoint in her Parish Auxiliary an Asilomar Secretary who shall co-operate with the parish officers in the appointment of one delegate to the Asilomar Conference and help where necessary, to provide practical means for her attending that Conference." This Resolution was adopted.

By motion the Secretary was requested to send greeting to Miss Theodosia B. Prevost whose one hundredth birthday is near; to Mrs. Monteagle, who was in New York; to Mrs. Wilson Johnston, the Provincial President; to Bishops Barnwell and Mitchell, the new Bishops of Idaho and Arizona, and to Miss Edna Murray, who is at her home in Ross on furlough from Tokyo.

The Rev. L. R. Craighill of Nanchang, China, spoke interestingly of the progress made among the students. Three buildings have been completed in design somewhat Chinese to give a feeling of home. Mr. Craighill thinks there is a splendid group of young men in China. Speaking of the recent disturbances, he said it all had a far deeper meaning than just nationalism. He believes there are several causes for the trouble; first, injury to the feelings of the Chinese on the part of Western and Eastern countries, the large import duties into America in contrast with the low duties into China; second, concessions; third, foreign control of wholly Chinese cities. Mrs. Sherman spoke briefly in appreciation of Mr. Craighill's address, and urged our support in prayer and giving for such missionary work.

The offering was taken for the Diocesan deficit on the General Church quota for 1926. Cash and pledges amounted to \$425.00.

Mrs. Deems then read the Message of the Woman's Auxiliary in Triennial Meeting at New Orleans in 1925, accepting the Message of the Executive Board of 1924 as a challenge.

Bishop Parsons concluded the program with words of appreciation of the Woman's Auxiliary and added: "The big thing to meet this year will be the Cathedral plan, and we hope that groups will be formed in all the parishes for this work."

After a prayer by the Bishop, the closing of the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and the rising of the House of Churchwomen followed.

## THE REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

*Bishop Parsons, Members of the Clergy, whom we are always glad to welcome, and fellow workers of the Auxiliary and the House of Churchwomen:*

WE THANK GOD for many blessings in our work together in the past year; for the unfailing help of our Bishop and Clergy, for many evidences of a growing spirit of cooperation in all women's work in the Church. One happy result is the meeting together officially of the House of Churchwomen with the Auxiliary, each keeping its own identity, fulfilling its own function, yet all more truly learning that "We, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another."

There have been encouraging inquiries for work from Clergy and from Guilds where there is as yet no Parish Branch, and in many places the Guild has co-operated with the Parish Branch. One Guild that has formerly worked with us through the Supply Department and the United Thankoffering, will now be known as the Auxiliary of that Parish, taking on the "five fields of service," working with us in our Diocesan and General Church objectives. I refer to All Saints, Palo Alto. Trinity, San Francisco, has worked several years most successfully under this plan. We look for steady growth in service resulting from the unity of purpose evidenced by consolidation. At All Saints, Watsonville, the Auxiliary became an integral part of the Guild, all working together in the five fields of service, carefully safeguarding the purposes and work of the Auxiliary.

The questionnaire sent out by the President of the House of Churchwomen has been of the greatest help in clearly setting forth ideals for service in the Church. In our great busyness, it is so easy for us to forget our "Father's business," even in what we call "Church work."

Again your president would try to thank you one and all; the diocesan officers who have generously added her responsibilities to their own during her absences, the parish officers and members without whom we could have accomplished nothing. But I cannot adequately express my appreciation not only for your faithful work, but for your many personal kindnesses and messages when I could not be with you.

We all owe a debt of gratitude to Miss Gibbs, who, in the absence of our United Thankoffering Treasurer in Europe, stepped in and filled the breach; to Miss Heath, who has accomplished so much in the increase of subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions; to Mrs. Gardiner for her work for the Church Periodical Club; to Miss Stevens, who has so faithfully assisted the Rev. Mr. Bours, and to many, many others.

Through the generosity of St. Mark's Parish, Berkeley, the Synod met again in our Diocese, bringing a vision of problems and opportunities for service within our own Province.

Since the Church Divinity School and the School for Christian Service serve the entire Province, the Synod assumed the responsibility of raising annually a certain sum

of money for the former, and recommended that "the Woman's Auxiliary assume as part of its Provincial responsibility a sum of money (the amount to be left to its own determination) for the School for Christian Service."

For lack of time to consider the matter carefully we voted to postpone action until the next Provincial Meeting. Your delegates, therefore, must be prepared to vote on this question according to your wishes.

As the Synod brought the Province within our vision, so the Triennial and the General Convention brought your representatives in touch with the whole field where our Church is at work. We saw many of the missionaries and heard at first hand their wonderful stories of adventure for Christ. I hope we caught something of their enthusiasm and devotion, and a new realization of the necessity on our part of holding up their hands by prayer, by study, that we may know and make known the Church's mission, and by generous giving.

For a program of work, we should take the resolutions enacted in New Orleans as our guide. I would ask each branch to make a study of these in the minutes of the Triennial, to discuss them in your meetings and to decide what you can do to fulfill their promises. Especially do I commend to your prayerful consideration those bearing on, or rather, resulting from the Message of the Executive Board to the National Council. Our Provincial President has asked us to report in May what we have accomplished in carrying these out. The entire program of the Triennial seemed to have been built around the "Message," emphasizing individual responsibility for the welfare of the whole, and our own need for deeper consecration.

#### PRAYER

First importance was given to prayer and worship in the opening Quiet Hour, the great United Thankoffering Service, the Noonday Meditations led by Miss Lindley, the Day of Intercession, the great closing Communion Service where we promised to rededicate ourselves to the service of our Lord.

In our own Diocese, the Annual Quiet Day, conducted by our Bishop, is one of our greatest privileges and inspirations. The churches in Marin County came together for a quiet day, and some of our parishes observe such a day. There are earnest prayer groups in several of our parishes. One of these offered continuous intercession during the Synod, during the Diocesan Convention, and are praying for us today. Some of the Parish Branches have joined in the Prayer-Partnership, but we need some devoted person who can give time to make this plan better known in the Diocese.

The Meditations by Miss Lindley will soon be published and we shall send one copy to each Branch. I recommend it for the devotional part of your meetings and for private use. May our cry be that of those early disciples, "Lord, teach us to pray."

#### STUDY

Ten study classes on as many subjects were held under the auspices of the Auxiliary in New Orleans. They were crowded to the doors and many were turned away. Here at home we have been particularly fortunate in our leadership in this work,

and while it has grown slowly, it has grown steadily and surely. We cannot overestimate its importance, for upon our own information and zeal depends our ability to interest others and share with them the joy of service. Suppose each one here today should gain one new member, one new user of the Little Blue Box, one new contributor to the parish quota to the Church's mission!

### GIFTS

In the past triennium the gifts of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council for the Program, for various Missionary Specials and for the United Thankoffering of 1922 exceeded \$1,500,000.00. The Auxiliary Tuttle Memorial was over \$100,000.00, while the value of the Supply Work was over \$900,000.00, making the grand total well over \$2,500,000.00. This does not include our last great United Thankoffering, amounting to \$912,000.00, nor does it include, of course, any gifts for parish or diocesan purposes.

You all remember the last two National Auxiliary Specials, the Emery Fund, completed in 1922, and the Tuttle Memorial of 1925. These were for objects outside the General Church Program. Our project for 1928 is for items in the advance program, amounting approximately to \$100,000.00. This will provide for the completion of certain buildings. (See page 10).

As we have rejoiced to share in the past achievements of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, so we shall gladly take part in the present triennial objective, not neglecting service in our own diocese. Through our Bishop's Auxiliary Fund we have helped in the Racial and Social Service work at home, and we hope to be able to aid in our own rural work.

But let us remember that however great our gift of money, the gift of self is vastly more important. So let us think of these figures, not as so much money, but as the expression of love from thankful hearts, the result of combined prayer and study, the result of our conviction of the power of Christ to satisfy the need of the world.

Bishop Roots said to us, "Wherever there is a Christian, there is the mission of Christ." Let us determine to use this Power more fully, to seize with firmer hold the blessings of Sacrament and Prayer and Study, that we may grow daily in the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ our Lord.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

THREE MEETINGS of the Diocesan Auxiliary were held during 1925 with an average representation of twenty branches. At these meetings we gained much information and inspiration from religious and social workers in this land, and heard ringing messages from Missionaries in far countries, who might say with St. Paul, "In labors more abundant, in journeyings often, in perils of waters, in perils in the city, in perils in the wilderness, in perils in the sea: in weariness and painfulness, in watching often." Through them we vision the true significance of our Auxiliary work, but feel our labor is as nothing compared to theirs.

We listened to Dr. Addison who spoke on Missions as an international force. Dr. and Mrs. L. B. Ridgely of Nanking told of factory conditions and Christian Education in that district. Rev. and Mrs. Paul Maslin of Hankow spoke on alleviation of misery among afflicted Chinese. Also of the establishment of trade-schools. Bishop Logan H. Roots made an eloquent appeal for real friendship with China as a means of understanding. Our ideals have roused and unified China, increasing our responsibilities to her. Rev. H. S. Hanson challenged Auxiliary women to demonstrate their faith by zeal in the cause of Christ. Rev. S. W. Barnwell was sent to the Province of the Pacific by the National Council to present the program of the Forward Movement. He defined giving as a test of spiritual strength; not as a measure of faith, but as an evidence of faith. Prayer, to be profitable, must have outward expression. Service is prayer: "Your presence here is a prayer," Dr. Barnwell said.

The Annual Quiet Day was held on March 20th, at St. John's Church. Bishop Parsons delivered four very beautiful and helpful meditations on "Aspects of Christian Love."

The 58th Anniversary of the consecration of Bishop Tuttle was marked by several branches with corporate communion and completion of their pledges for the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund.

At the annual Altar Day Service of the Feast of the Transfiguration, Archdeacon Porter preached a most inspiring sermon on transfigured lives made manifest through joyful service.

Those who could not attend the United Thankoffering corporate communion at New Orleans, gathered at Grace Cathedral on that day to commemorate the event: though sundered far by faith we met, and joined in thanksgiving for the great growth of the Offering. At this time, we took the National Auxiliary pledge for re-consecration to the work of Church extension.

The Synod meetings, held in May at St. Mark's, Berkeley, were most profitable, with splendid attendance. At both Synod and the Asilomar Conference in August, young people were well represented, and opportunities for enlisting them in the five fields were stressed. Miss Florence Newbold addressed these bodies, and also spoke at two Auxiliary meetings, each time with a fresh viewpoint on youth today.

At our September meeting, Miss Pickering, Superintendent of Nurses at the Uni-

versity of California Hospital, told us of advancement in nursing methods, and development of character through training and experience. Miss Donaldina Cameron told of rescuing Chinese girls from moral and physical slavery, and of their ready acceptance of Christianity. Mrs. Holmes spoke at one of the monthly meetings on difference in standards of Christian and non-Christian nations regarding women.

With a wider knowledge of the World's needs comes a deeper sense of what we must do "to hasten the time, the time that shall surely be, when the Earth shall be filled with the Glory of God as the waters cover the sea."

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#### REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

OF THE five-fold plan for the Auxiliary educational work for the year just completed, progress has been made in all fields. First, steps have been taken to enlarge the educational committee, and while it has not reached its quota, we have three new members. Second, your secretary has visited and explained the work in eight parish branches. Third, a beginning is being made in the preparation of the "Loan Packets." Church magazines are being saved and sent in and a certain Girls' Friendly Society group are at work on the scrap-books. Fourth, vestibule book tables have been established in several of the parishes. And fifth, there has been a continued emphasis on the Mission Study Classes. During Lent, 1925, two teacher training classes were held on "The Real Revolution in China"; one at Grace Cathedral under Mrs. C. H. White, and one at St. Paul's, Oakland, under Mrs. Elliot. There were enrolled in the Mission Study classes about 150 people distributed throughout twenty parish branches.

In looking forward to the work of the coming year, it is urgently hoped that greater stress will be laid upon a knowledge of the *Church's Program* and an active participation in the Asilomar Conference.

## REPORT OF THE SUPPLY SECRETARY

THE YEAR 1925 closed with all work completed that had been sent to us by the New York Supply department, and some help sent to other missions also. During Lent we sent splendid boxes to both Deaconess Carter at Pyramid Lake and to St. John's Hospital at Jackson, Wyoming—and in Advent we sent useful boxes to two of our Domestic Missionaries, one to the Rev. John S. Foster at Montrose, Colorado, and the other to the Rev. A. L. Pacells at Wahpeton, North Dakota.

How I wish I could share all the letters that have come from these two missionaries, but this quotation from one of the last letters received will give you a better idea than anything I could say myself,—“How we will ever be able to have you know our appreciation of your generosity is our problem. We feel that ‘thank you’ is quite inadequate to express our full feeling”.

The actual money value of the boxes sent during the year is \$1,690.64, a little better than last year;—let us make it still more this year of 1926.

And while there are so many branches represented may I offer a few suggestions which I hope you will note carefully and take back to your Auxiliaries:

*First:* Kindly reply to the supply secretary as soon as her letter requesting work and purchase money has been read at a meeting, so that she may know at the earliest date whether or not you can accept the allotment.

*Second:* When sending the completed work, please be sure to send at the same time, its valuation, keeping this same valuation on your own books, as it must again appear on your annual reports.

*Third:* And while speaking of the annual report: why not start to make your report as soon as the Advent work is given out, so that it can be sent immediately when asked for by the Recording Secretary? As it is, some of the reports have not yet been received.

*Fourth:* These reports should be from January 1 to December 31; they should contain no account of parochial work. It should be very explicitly stated to whom things have been given and the date when sent and also, whether new things or old.

If these suggestions are followed, making the annual reports both for New York and our Diocese will be greatly facilitated.
