TENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE
Board of Missions in Central Pennsylvania,
1892.

We have now reached the Eleventh Birthday of our Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. We can no longer in reviewing our yearly work excuse our shortcomings with the plea of youth, or feel satisfied with "the day of small things." The time has come when, with God's blessing, the work of our hands should be established. While we have not progressed as rapidly as we could hope to have done, still there has been gradual growth both in the measure of work accomplished and in the matter of a more thorough organization. In the giving of money the improvement has been especially noticeable. In our first printed report the sum total in money was \$145. This year it is \$1507 (of this \$608 has passed through the hands of the Treasurer). At our Annual Meeting last year we decided, in addition to our pledges of several years' standing, to undertake one of \$50 for the life insurance of the Rev. Mr. Gring, who has gone from our Diocese to Japan. The objects proposed to us by Miss Emery were so interesting that we would willingly have given to all of them, but knew that our receipts would not warrant our making so many promises. We have given \$31 to the Chinese House Boat. From the \$608 above mentioned, in addition to our pledges, we gave \$104 each to the Bishops of Western Texas and Montana, who kindly journeyed to Reading to address our meeting, and \$50 to the Enrollment Fund. You will remember that last year we made an especial effort in behalf of this fund, and raised \$436. This year it did not seem practicable to make a general appeal for it. We sent toward the united offering in Baltimore \$64 (the gift of three individuals), making our entire contribution \$500.

- We regret to record the resignation of one of our Organizing Secretaries, Mrs. Palmer, of Wilkes-Barre, who has been compelled to relinquish the work, which seemed full of promise in her hands.

Last year one of our officers spoke of the willingness of some of the small Parishes that she had visited to help in the work. A gratifying feature of this year's report is the record of gifts from these same Parishes. These increased contributions are very encouraging, but they of necessity fall far short of the demands of the work in hand. The ever-widening field before us calls for the tireless zeal, the persistent effort, and unwavering faith of every earnest woman of the Church upon whom God has laid this great work. May each feel that her opportunity is the measure of her responsibility.

READING ARCHDEACONY.

The Organizing Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary for the Archdeaconry of Reading, Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, on entering upon the duties of this office, November 11, 1891, found the field had been so well worked by her able predecessor that their remained but eight Parishes in the Archdeaconry which had not joined in the Missionary labors of this Society. With the aid of her Advisory Board, the claims of the Woman's Auxiliary has been laid before the Rectors of these eight Parishes, and the forming of Parochial Branches been urged upon them. This has been without result, owing, perhaps, to the fact that none of these Parishes were very strong, and doubtless felt too weak to undertake work outside of their own limits.

From the Advisory Board, Mrs. Ethel W. Powers reports the new Societies at Frackville, St. Clair, Minersville, Delano, and Hazleton to be going forward in the Auxiliary work with a very earnest spirit, and, in most cases, to have reached a high standard of excellence. Mrs. Mary W. Tolman was energetic in urging the forming of Branch Parochial Societies in that portion of the Archdeaconry lying near Mauch Chunk; but, owing to adverse circumstances, none of these Parishes felt able to take up the work at this time.

It is much to be regretted that Mrs. J. S. Buckman, of Easton, so long associated with this Auxiliary and with this Advisory Board has, by illness, been denied participation in the work she loves so well.

In making appeal to the Rectors they were all asked: "Should they feel unable to engage actively in the work, to nominate, in their respective Parishes, women as correspondents for the Auxiliary, to whom the Organizing Secretary could write from time to time concerning the affairs of this Society and the General Missionary Work!" The Organizing Secretary regrets only *two* Rectors responded to this request. But "the Kingdom of God cometh not with observation," and the eye of faith can readily discern the leaven of the Word working in those Parishes from whom, as yet, there has been no report.

SCRANTON ARCHDEACONY.

The Secretary of the Archdeaconry of Scranton expected to arrange for several Parish Auxiliary Meetings within its precincts during the year, hoping by them to create new Missionary zeal, as well as to encourage, deepen, and strengthen that of those already engaged in the good work. These plans, however, as well as those for visiting Parishes where no Branches of the Auxiliary existed, were frustrated by her long and severe illness. The work, therefore, had to be partially delegated to others, and most of it done through correspondence. The results consequently, though encouraging, are not what they could and would have been under more favorable conditions. Three or four new organizations have been established. The Auxiliary at Springville though small numerically is energetic as shown by its report. Miss Lathrop, of Montrose, writes "the Young Ladies' Auxiliary organized July 1, promises a fair future." They have sixteen members and all are interested in the work. We shall expect to hear more from them another year. The same may be said of Great Bend and Dingman's Ferry where new branches are established.
