## REPORT.

### READING ARCHDEACONY.

The Secretary of the Archdeaconry of Reading makes the following report of work for the year 1896-'97. In January letters were written to every Parish and Mission in the Archdeaconry and four hundred and twenty-five (425) envelopes were sent out. Of the Parishes written to, nineteen have reported actual missionary work being done. Three others have organized branches, but owing to needed repairs and additions to their churches, no outside work could be done. Churchtown organized a branch in June, too late to report any work for this year. Seven Parishes have branches of the Junior Auxiliary, and delegates from two or three of them have been present with us at our Archdeaconry meetings and presented their reports. It is hoped that the Junior Auxiliary will have branches in all of our Parishes before another year goes by;

The first week in February a most successful meeting of the Archdeaconry was held in East Mauch Chunk. Representatives from several Parishes that have not been doing any Missionary work were present, and an interest in the work of the church at large was aroused, which is one object of these meetings. The offering was sent to Bishop Barker. The May meeting held in Shenandoah was not as satisfactory, not through any fault of either the Rector or people of "All Saints Church," as they did all that they could to make it a success. The trouble was with the arrival and departure of trains, and for the future we shall have to accept invitations from those places offering the best railroad facilities. The offering made at this meeting is held by the Secretary until such time as the Archdeaconry can take action for its disposal.

The middle of May reminders were sent to all branches that the money from Diocesan envelopes was due on the first of June, and fourteen branches responded.

In September similar reminders were sent in regard to the United Offering Boxes due in October; only nine answers were received, amounting to \$133.85.

In summing up the year's work, we find that while there has been a marked increase of money and work in some Parishes, there has also been a serious falling off in others. The envelope fund in 1896 was \$322.10, while in 1897 it is only \$206.31, a loss of \$115.69. In the value of the boxes sent the difference is not so great, being

only \$54,43 less than last year. In 1896 the boxes were valued at \$1,925.36, while in 1897 it is \$1,870.93, making a total loss on envelopes and boxes of \$170.12. We trust that this deficiency will be more than covered this coming year.

## HARRISBURG ARCHDEACONY.

In making our first report of the work done during the past year by the Women's Auxiliary of the Archdeaconry of Harrisburg we wish to say first of all, that the duties of the office for the first half of the Missionary year were performed by our predecessor, Mrs. Neal, of Harrisburg, our appointment as her successor having been made in March, 1897. Under the able management of those who preceded me, we found the work of the Archdeaconry that came into our hands thoroughly and systematically organized. Branches were established in nearly every Parish, so that little remained to be done in that direction. St. Paul's Church, Columbia, and St. Paul's Church, Harrisburg, are the new branches for the year. We regret to record that two of our largest Parishes have thus far failed to establish branches, but we trust it will not be long before the missionary work, which we feel sure they must be doing, will have the help and stimulus which we all receive by being connected with an organization like the Women's Auxiliary. On the other hand we are pleased to record the good work of the small Parishes which abound in our Archdeaconry, including twelve Missionary Stations, six of which have sent an offering.

On Thursday, May 13, 1897, we held the first meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Archdeaconry, in St. Stephen's Church, Harrisburg. Although the weather was very inclement we had a good attendance, and a most interesting meeting. The especial features of the day were an address by Dr. Angell on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and a paper by Miss Goodwin on the training of women workers for the Missionary field. The next

meeting will be held in January, 1898, in St. John's Church, Lancaster, when the special subject for consideration will be the Junior Auxiliary. We hope to be able to hold these meetings semi-annually. Altogether the past year has not been favorable for an increase in Missionary gift, we are pleased to report that the contributions from the various Parishes have, in nearly every case, been increased.

Seven Parishes prepared and sent away boxes amounting in value to \$291.45; the Envelope Fund was \$86.62; the United Offering, \$247.12; and the money sent direct to various Missions. \$64.93, making a total of \$690.10. Respectfully submitted,

## WILLIAMSPORT ARCHDEACONY.

It is with a feeling of encouragement that I send in my first report to the Women's Auxiliary, as there is such a marked improvement in the work this year, and I hope it will prove satisfactory to my superior officers. A number of good working auxiliaries have been formed, and through the help of Mrs. Twing's hand-book and the personal interest of the rectors in some Parishes they have become zealous missionary societies. From these auxiliaries which are composed of all the societies and guilds in the churches, each doing its own individual charitable work, and all meeting together once a month, it is hoped in time more Junior branches will be formed, which they practically now are, in all but name.

The mite boxes and Epiphany envelopes, with one or two exceptions, had not been given out until this year. Now there are over two hundred mite boxes in use, and the envelopes were well distributed, but did not meet with the expected success, owing to so many Parishes having quarterly Missionary Envelopes that must suffice. But one good result came of these envelopes, and that was the finding of three isolated churchwomen in different country towns, without rectors and indeed, without churches, who gladly responded. If letters and pamphlets will keep the Women's Auxiliary in the minds of the rectors and churchwomen, certainly our branch ought to be well-known, for at least three letters and numerous pamphlets have been sent to each Parish during the year; very cordial and prompt replies were received to many, and many had no attention whatever paid them. But let us hope that the time will soon come when all of the rectors will be proud to have every baptised woman join in our work.

I cannot close my report without saying that the women of the Williamsport Archdeaconry join in the universal sorrow felt in the loss of their beloved Bishop.

## SCRANTON ARCHDEACONRY.

In reviewing the work of the Woman's Auxiliary of Arch-deaconry of Scranton for the past year, it is with regret that we find the value of boxes and the amount of money sent to Missionary causes, much less than last year. It is not in our power to explain the cause of this falling off, and we pray that our hearts may be so

filled with zeal and earnestness for the cause of Christ as we begin another year, that at its close we may rejoice that we have grasped the opportunities God has given us to help in His work. We have reports from sixteen Parishes who have sent either boxes or contributions of money. The value of boxes amounts to \$1,400.85. The amount of money sent to various Missions was \$286,63; to the Envelope Fund, \$227.54, and to the United Offering Fund, \$33.00, making a total of \$1,948.02.

But we cannot always measure results by money value, and so we hope that much more interest has been created in the Woman's Auxiliary by the Archdeaconry meetings which have been held in the various Parishes during the year, and that the coming year will give evidence of the knowledge thus acquired in the work done by the societies.

On January 27th, the first Archdeaconry meeting was held in St. Luke's Church, Scranton. Ten Parishes were represented by forty-one delegates. Miss Susan Dickinson, of Scranton, made an address on the beginning and growth in the Church of women's work for missions. Mrs. Horace Hayden, of Wilkes-Barre, gave a report of the annual meeting held in St. James' Church, Lancaster. Reports were given by delegates from the various Parishes respecting the work they were doing.

On May 26th the second meeting was held in St. Stephen's Church, Wilkes-Barre, when ten Parishes were represented by fifty-six delegates. Mrs. Charles B. Wood, of Wilkes-Barre, read a most admirable paper (illustrated with maps of her own drawing) on Africa and our work there. Mrs. E. S. Moffat, of Scranton, gave an interesting account of the mission work among our American Indians. The delegates gave reports of their work, which was most suggestive and helpful. An offering was taken which amounted to \$26.12, to be sent to Alaska towards a scholarship in Mr. Chapman's school.

At the spring meeting of the Archdeaconry held at Sayre, an afternoon was devoted to the Auxiliary. At this time Mrs. Scott, our President, read an exhaustive paper on "The Auxiliary, Its Past, What it has done;" and Miss Mercur, our Secretary, told us of "Its Present, What it is doing."

One new branch of the Junior Auxiliary has been formed during the past year at St. Luke's Church, Scranton. There are now Junior branches at St. Stephen's Church, Wilkes-Barre; Trinity Church, West Pittston; St. Paul's Church, Montrose, and St. Luke's Church, Scranton, all of which are doing excellent work.

We cannot close this report without reference to the great loss we have all sustained in the passing away of our beloved Bishop. We miss his loving presence, his cordial greeting, and his earnest counsel and support. Much of our success as an Auxiliary has been due to his faithful guidance and unfailing interest. But we weep for ourselves, not for him. He has gone to his well-earned reward, and rests from the heavy burdens which he bore so sweetly and bravely until he sank under them so suddenly that we cannot yet realize that his life here is ended.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The reports of the Organizing Secretaries are so full and comprehensive that there is little left for me to say upon the subject of what has been done in Central Pennsylvania during the past year. I might, however, tell with regret, of much on my own part that has been left undone and can offer, as an excuse for these shortcomings, only the fact that it has been for me a year of experiment and I hope education—a slow initiation into an acquaintance with the aim and methods of the Auxiliary.

One who is in constant communication with Miss Emery, our General Secretary, cannot fail to learn many things, but the one thing that she has taught me most clearly is the distinction between the week of the "Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions" and other weeks of benevolence and charity.

The Woman's Auxiliary was organized solely for the purpose of assisting those who are working in the church, for the church or under the direction of the church, and also only for those outside of one's own Parish, or even outside of one's own city. One of the pamphlets sent out from the Church Missions House requests, that in the report from the various dioceses there shall not be included "supplies provided to the poor within the city where the branch is established, or to any institution unconnected with the church." As it seems right to apply the general rule to particular cases, I have felt it my duty, though with much regret, to omit from the printed report, donations made by Parishes, either to their own parochial institutions or to others not under the direction of the church. Certainly no one can question the importance or benefit of those other "labors of love," and it is the misfortune, not the fault, of the Woman's Auxiliary that, like other organizations it has its limitations and, as an organization must confine itself to its own work in order to do it well. It is quite possible though, for a band of women to act for a part of the year as a branch of the Auxiliary and for the rest of the time to devote its efforts to its parochial or local duties and charities.

It is pleasant to know that our United Offerings for this year is larger than before, but it will be disastrous if the Envelope Fund is thereby decreased, for upon that fund depends the fulfilment of our pledges and our credit and reputation as a Diocesan Branch.

My year of intercourse with the members of the Auxiliary, throughout the Diocese has brought me much pleasure, and I am grateful for the kindness with which they have received my efforts to fill this place, especially for the friendly encouragement given me by my predecessor, Miss Stone. It is natural though that the spirit of good-will should prevail among a people, fortunate in having been under the guidance of a chief Pastor who personified the charms of gentleness, patience and unselfishness, and whose presence was always an inspiration for good.

May the influence of our Bishop ever remain with this Society which in his last Convention address, he commended to "all our people as one of the most helpful agencies of the Diocese."
