THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Dear Women of the Auxiliary:

When I was elected to serve as President, on All-Saints' Day, the first of last November, I knew very little of the diocese of Chicago, while the women of the diocese were, with few exceptions, comparative strangers. Now, as I tell you a little of what I have tried to do, I look into the faces of many friends. Thank you, one and all, for your loyalty and your support.

Please remember that the data given, cover only seven months of the year. For the first five months there was no President, hence my report dates only from the first of last November, when I assumed the duties and privileges of office. Since that time, I have made sixty-one visits to parishes and missions. Fifty-nine of these visits have been within the boundaries of the diocese; two have been outside its limits, one to the diocese of Michigan City, and one to West Missouri. Four new branches have been organized, S. John's, Irving Park; Holy Trinity, Chicago; S. John's, Clybourn Ave.; and S. Mark's, Glen Ellyn. Three branches have been reorganized, at Aurora, Morgan Park, and Lawndale.

Two sectional meetings have been held, at S. Luke's, Evanston; and Trinity, Chicago. With our increasing numbers, we need opportunities for the hearing of missionary work other than those afforded by the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings. Hence these sectional meetings, so called, because they do not plan to include the diocese but merely a section thereof. It is a comparatively simple thing for one parish branch to invite one or more neighboring branches to unite in a missionary meeting, and every such meeting is a point gained. With Miss Higgins in Africa, Dr. Mary Glenton in China, and, until recently, the Rev. and Mrs. Pratt in Porto Rico, we have felt rich in missionaries. How much richer are we, when I tell you that three women in the diocese have offered themselves as missionaries, and two of them have been accepted. Miss Farthing, of S. Mark's, Evanston, is soon to start for Anvik, Alaska, where she will take charge of the girls' school under Bishop Rowe. Dr. Juliet N. Stevens will sail, in August, for China, where she will do work as a medical missionary. On Ascension Day, in the Church of the

Epiphany, Dr. Cora Carpenter offered herself for medical missionary work, wherever needed, and is now awaiting orders. With five women at the front, our missionary work at home must increase five fold, that we may keep pace with our opportunities. This has been a red letter year for the Junior Auxiliary, for, on February 16, in S. Andrew's Church, Chicago, was held the first Annual Meeting of the Juniors, with nearly two hundred delegates present. The Vice-President in charge of the work, Mrs. Duncombe, reports four new branches organized, and two Babies' Branches. The work of the Vice-Presidents has been unusually helpful this year. They report one new branch organized by Mrs. Chenoweth, at Highland Park, twenty-three visits to parishes and missions, and many letters. Each one of the five Vice-Presidents has charge of her own special department and is responsible for it, and, in addition, arranges the program for one monthly meeting at the Church Club Rooms. They have done much to assist me—faithful work, which statistics cannot tell, but which is none the less valuable.

And now, a few words about the work in general. Dear women of the Auxiliary, let us take as our watchword for the coming year, the words, "Unity of purpose," that, first of all, our work may be more symmetrical. We recognize symmetry in nature, when we see a tree or shrub, whose graceful contour is not marred by a stray branch or twig. We call such a tree or shrub symmetrical. And we recognize symmetry in human nature, for we all know characters so beautifully rounded that their virtues are not over-balanced by eccentricities. We call those characters symmetrical. But it is far more difficult to recognize true symmetry in our work for others, and it is still more difficult to make our missionary work so symmetrical that one portion shall not over-balance another.

It is easy to give generously to some one Missionary Bishop, to whom we are, perhaps, bound by ties of affection, or whose sermons we thoroughly like, or whose district is familiar to us, and to be oblivious to that vast army of silent pleaders, his brother Missionary Bishops, men just as worthy, whose daily routine is just as hard, but who do not attract us, simply because their lives have not crossed our own personal path.

It is so easy to confine our attention to some small corner of our own diocese, or, perchance, of the Domestic Mission field, utterly forgetful of the fact that our Savior said, "Go ye into all the world."

Those words have a clarion ring—"all the world." And thus, our prayers and work and gifts for missions, instead of being rich and round and symmetrical, resemble rather a tree on the windswept hill of some bleak New England landscape. One side is rich with foliage and fruitage, but the other side is bare and stunted. Of course the reason seems simple. We are sadly familiar with the very words. "Since we have so little to give, why not give it all to some one object?" But that reason satisfies none but the superficial. To give thus is to give unjustly. We see it clearly when we apply this reason to the case of a man who has not money enough to pay all his debts. The just thing is to divide what little money he has equally among all his creditors. The unjust thing is to give all he has to one creditor, called a "preferred creditor," and nothing to the others. In mission work, give as generously as we may, we cannot pay the debt of gratitude we owe to our God, or of obligation to our fellow man, in full, but we can give as much as possible to as many objects as possible. We should remember the three great divisions of mission work, Diocesan, Domestic, and Foreign. I do not say remember each alike—that would be asking too much of human nature, but each should be, at least, remembered. And, under the head of Domestic Missions, something should be given to Indian and something to Colored. With that five-fold division of what we have to give, our missionary work will be more symmetrical.

"Unity of purpose"—the words have a martial sound. Translated into common parlance, they mean "a common cause." Soldiers tell us that they forget the hardship of the march, the fury of the charge, the carnage of the battle field, the jaws of death itself, when they are inspired by a common cause. What matters it, though they faint and die by the way, so long as the cause for which they would give their lives, triumphs in the end! Never has a common cause lighted the page of history that can compare with the heritage of our Mother, the Church, that Church that stands out clear and strong against the gray mists of antiquity, and has ever presented a rock-like front against the encroachments of Rome on the one hand and of ultra-Protestantism on the other. How we love this Church of ours, scarred as she is by her age-long conflict with the allied hosts of evil! And we, as members of the Church, and of her missionary society, the Woman's Auxiliary, are pledged to do our very best to send her missionaries to the uttermost parts of the earth, that every

human being born into this world may have the opportunity of accepting the truths enshrined in our matchless Book of Common Prayer.

“Unity of purpose,” fires us with the enthusiasm of a common cause, and it does more. It unites more firmly, in human bonds, those banded together in the fellowship of good works. If there be one word that describes, more than any other, the secret of our missionary effort, it is the word love, love for God and love for man. The crown and glory of all love is to forget self, and to think of others. One of the sweetest singers among our English poets has said that when love takes up “the harp of life,” “the chord of self” passes “trembling out of sight.” What a wondrous comfort it brings to think of others and to forget self!

There are little bands of women scattered over our country and our diocese, doing missionary work. The best they can do seems to them so small, but the thought of others comes like healing balm, and they are lifted up above all thought of self. They realize that they are members of an army of workers, and that the strength of the army is the strength of the individual member, while the individual works with a strength a hundred fold his own, for to him belongs the strength of the entire army.

There are other bands of women, to whom God has sent rich material blessings. To them the thought of others comes like a benison, and they, too, forget self, or remember self only to look to it, that their lamp of spirituality and devotion burns so brightly as not to be dimmed by their wealth of material blessings. Thus the woe of one becomes the woe of all, and the weal of one becomes the weal of all. And, if it should happen that the opportunity of forgetting self should come to some individual, some woman to whom God has given the quality of leadership, and she should embrace the opportunity, she will find the strange paradox that never has she been so rich, so free, so powerful as when she has forgotten self and voluntarily taken the lowest place. Let us take then, as our watchword, “Unity of purpose” for the coming year, that our work may be more symmetrical, that we may glow with the enthusiasm of a common cause, and that we may think more of others and less, far less, of self.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The sixteenth semi-annual meeting of the Chicago branch was held in S. Mark's Church, Monday, October 29, 1900, at 2:30 p. m.

Bishop McLaren presided. The minutes of the sixteenth annual meeting were read by the Recording Secretary and approved. Roll-call followed. Owing to the enforced lateness of the notices and the rainy weather only about one hundred members, representing twenty-nine branches, were present.

The Bishop of Chicago gave a short address on the "Possibilities of Prayer."

He was followed by the Rev. J. Lambert Rees, of Shanghai, China. Mr. Rees said that the Macedonian cry which came from the Orient was not a single call but a complex cry from many sources.

Miss Tannott, of Spokane, Washington, presented a plea for S. Paul's School for Girls, located in Walla-Walla. This school, established thirty years ago by Bishop Wells, now makes its first appeal for help in order that it may compete with the advancing steps taken by the Church of Rome in that region. In accordance with a motion to that effect, pledges amounting to \$158 were made toward a scholarship of \$250.

The question of a president for the Chicago branch was brought forward by the Bishop and was disposed of by the following motion: That the matter be again referred to the Bishop and to the Executive Committee.

The last address of the afternoon was given by the Rev. William White Wilson, L. H. D., rector of S. Mark's, and was one of combined welcome and encouragement.

A delicious supper was served by the women of S. Mark's parish in the Douglas Club House. A vote of thanks was tendered them by motion of Mrs. Street, made before leaving the dining-hall.

The evening session began at 7:45 p. m. and comprised the evening service and an eloquent and powerful sermon by the Rev. R. H. Weller Jr., D. D., Bishop-Coadjutor-elect of Fond-du-Lac.

The first annual meeting of the Junior Auxiliary branches in the Diocese was held in S. Andrew's Church, Saturday, February, 16,

1901. The attendance at both sessions was most encouraging, and the interest so marked that the yearly recurrence of the day is now assured.

The morning session began at 10:45 a. m. and consisted of morning prayer, an address of welcome by the Rev. W. C. DeWitt, and a sermon especially for the children by the Bishop-Coadjutor of Chicago.

Luncheon was served to three hundred and fifty delegates and children.

The president of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. John Henry Hopkins, occupied the chair in the afternoon, and extended a hearty welcome to the representatives from the parochial branches, expressing her satisfaction that such a meeting had been possible, and her conviction that great results would ensue therefrom.

The Corresponding Secretary made an approximate report of the work accomplished and boxes sent out thus far in the year, by the Junior branches.

Mrs. Duncombe, vice-president in charge of Junior Auxiliary work, conducted a "Model Missionary Meeting" taking for her subject the work of Bishop Hare among the Indians in South Dakota. Papers bearing on this subject were read by the youthful delegates from several branches, and an address was given by Rev. P. C. Wollcott, of Highland Park, who spent a number of years working among the Indians of that district. The offering was for Bishop Hare's work.

The seventeenth annual meeting was held in the Church of the Epiphany, Friday, May 31, 1901.

The morning session, which began at 10:30 o'clock, consisted of the celebration of the Holy Communion, and a sermon by the Rev. Frank Du Moulin, of S. Peter's Church. Bishop Anderson was the celebrant, and was assisted by Rev. J. H. Hopkins and the Rev. Chas. Scadding. The benediction was pronounced by the Bishop of Chicago.

The women of Epiphany parish served luncheon to nearly six hundred persons during the noon hour. The receptacles which held the United Offering of 1898, and a collection of curios gathered by Mrs. George B. Pratt while in Porto Rico, were exhibited during the luncheon interval.

The afternoon session opened at 1:45 p. m. with devotions by Bishop McLaren, who presided. The Rev. J. H. Hopkins, rector of the Church of the Epiphany, extended an address of welcome to the visiting delegates.

Four hundred and twenty-six representatives from forty-seven branches responded to the roll call. The minutes of the sixteenth semi-annual meeting were read by the Recording Secretary, and the yearly reports of the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer were read by the Corresponding Secretary. The report of the Comfort Club was read by Mrs. Blair; that of the Society for the Relief of Widows and Orphans of Clergymen was read by Mrs. Meacham; of the Church Periodical Club by Mrs. Starbuck; and of the Library Committee by Miss Banks. A most encouraging report of the Linen Committee was presented by Mrs. Ridlon. The combined report of the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer showed disbursements of \$21,685.74, including boxes valued at \$8,926.30 and \$12,759.44 in money. In addition the Treasurer holds \$967.81 to be applied to the united offering and general expenses.

The annual address of the president, Mrs. Hopkins, was inspiring and ably delivered.

Pledges amounting to \$1,383 were made for the work of the Sisters of S. Mary and for City Missions.

The election of officers was next in order. They are as follows: President, Mrs. John Henry Hopkins; vice-presidents, Miss Katherine D. Arnold, Mrs. V. B. Fullerton, Mrs. W. D. C. Street, Mrs. E. M. Duncombe and Mrs. C. L. Chenoweth; treasurer, Mrs. Jas. T. Hoyne; corresponding secretary, Miss Mary L. Banks; recording secretary, Miss Florence Beckett.

Before introducing the speakers of the afternoon, Bishop McLaren wished Miss Crummer God-speed on her return trip to China, and gave his benediction to the three devoted women who have recently offered themselves for the mission field. They are Miss Farthing, who goes to Anvik, Alaska; Dr. Juliet Stevens, with China as her destination, and Dr. Cora Carpenter, whose future location is as yet undecided.

Dr. Lloyd, General Secretary of the Board of Missions, in his address, set forth the advantage of placing all money, dedicated by the Woman's Auxiliary to Missions, in the hands of the Board of Managers that they may, without restriction, direct it into the most

useful channels. He characterized it as wicked to classify missions as Foreign, Domestic or Diocesan. Christ left but one Mission.

The Rev. George B. Pratt spoke of Porto Rico, dealing with its governmental problems, its defective school system, diversity of race and climatic influence as directly affecting the establishment of the Church there. He expressed the hope that the island would be as easily vanquished by the Cross in the near future as it had been by the flag in the not distant past.

Before adjournment, resolutions of thanks were offered the members of the Epiphany branch for their hospitality by Mrs. Meacham, of Grace Church.

The offertory was for the General Fund, and the offering of the afternoon for the Diocese of Florida.

After adjournment the Bishop-Coadjutor pronounced the benediction.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LINEN, WOMAN'S BOARD OF
ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL.**

The aim of the Committee on Linen is to increase the number of earnest workers in every parish, to the end that the only Church Hospital within the Diocese of Chicago may profit by the more interested labor of Church women.

During the past year eight regular meetings of the Committee have been held at St. Luke's Hospital, with an average attendance of twelve. Two semi-annual meetings, with Delegates, were held at the Church Club rooms, with an average attendance of seventy-five.

For working purposes the Committee has divided the Diocese into twelve districts, placing each district, containing from two to five parishes, under the personal care of a member of the Committee, this member to be Chairman of a Sub-Committee, which shall be composed of two delegates from each parish, a Delegate on Linen, and a Delegate on Associate Membership. The Committee has enlisted in its work thirty-eight parishes, seventy-six societies, and fifty-nine delegates, in charge of these societies. The total number of articles supplied to the Hospital the past year was 6,558.*

Patterns supplied to societies by Mrs. Noyes, Chairman of Pattern Committee, 51, being 16 more than the preceding year.

The Associate Membership List has increased from 154 to 301.

\$291.21 being donations from friends of the Committee.

Of the Committee's funds, \$132.23 were spent to supply materials to the smaller parishes. If this amount could be saved to the Committee it would mean not a few comforts to the sick and suffering in our wards, and (if we had been able to fill the Linen List, which we some day hope to do, with your help) would mean the support of some poor little cripple for six months or more. Will not all the missions and churches make a special effort to save us all similar expenditure another year? A donation, however little, will be most gratefully received, and old tablecloths, which nearly all can reach, make very useful tray cloths for the open wards.

For your efforts in the past we thank you warmly, at the same time begging you to remember that work that does not progress, retrocedes.

Remember! You are not only helping the sick, but oftentimes, alas! the dying.

Is there one among you that would withhold the smallest thing she could give, or do, for such as these?

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called THE CHICAGO BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

The object of this Association shall be to unite all the congregations in the Diocese of Chicago in the different branches of missionary work, as conducted by the General and Diocesan Boards.

ARTICLE III.

Every parish or mission in the Diocese is a member of this Association, and, upon the payment of an annual membership fee of one dollar, shall be entitled to representation at the meetings, each parish or mission voting as a unit, when such vote by unit shall be demanded by two parishes or missions.

ARTICLE IV.

SEC. 1. An annual meeting shall be held the day after the close of the Diocesan Convention—except when that day falls on a legal holiday, when the Executive Committee shall appoint another day—for the election of officers, the adoption of the annual report, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before such meeting.

SEC. 2. A semi-annual meeting shall be held in the autumn at the discretion of the Executive Committee; which meeting shall consist of an afternoon session for the transaction of business, followed by a general missionary meeting in the evening, when addresses shall be made by speakers, approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.

SEC. 1. The officers shall be a president, five vice-presidents, a corresponding secretary, a recording secretary, and a treasurer, who shall constitute the Executive Committee, and meet monthly.

SEC. 2. The Executive Committee shall have power, as neces-

sity may arise, to appoint annually, with the approval of the Bishop, other officers who shall not, however, be members of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 3. The duty of the president shall be to preside at all meetings of the Association and of the officers; to arrange for the organization of branches, to visit the same, and to have the general charge of the work, under the direction of the Bishop.

SEC. 4. The duty of the vice-presidents shall be to choose one of their number to preside in the absence of the president, to co-operate with her in the general supervision of the work of the Association, and to take special charge of the departments of work to which they may be assigned by the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The duty of the corresponding secretary shall be to conduct the necessary correspondence required by the Auxiliary, and to prepare such reports as are needed. The duty of the recording secretary shall be to send out notices of all meetings, to keep a record of the same, and to assist the corresponding secretary in the preparation of reports.

SEC. 6. The duty of the treasurer shall be to receive all special and general funds, to disburse the former as the donors indicate, and the latter under the direction of the Executive Committee, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

SEC. 7. There shall be a committee of two appointed to audit the treasurer's accounts each year.

ARTICLE VI.

Each branch shall submit a report of the year's work to the corresponding secretary of the diocesan branch, to be incorporated in the annual report and read at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII.

This constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, subject to the approval of the Bishop.

BY-LAWS.

I. The election of officers at the annual meeting shall be by ballot, each parish or mission having one vote.

II. When a vacancy shall occur in the Executive Committee by death or resignation, or removal of residence from the diocese, the members of said Committee shall have power, with the advice and consent of the Bishop previously obtained, to appoint an officer to fill the vacancy. The officer so appointed to serve until the next annual meeting.

III. Special meetings may be called by the president at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

IV. It shall be the duty of every parochial branch to contribute annually a sum of money, the amount thereof to be determined by itself, to the Executive Committee of this diocesan branch, to be appropriated by them according to their discretion in the Missionary work of the church, which money shall constitute the General Fund of the Chicago Branch, and shall be so designated by the contributors.

V. The regular order of business at the annual meeting shall be as follows:

1. Offices of devotion.
2. Calling of roll by branches.
3. Reading of minutes of last meeting.
4. Reports of officers and committees.
5. Election of officers.
6. Unfinished business.
7. Miscellaneous business and addresses.

VI. These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the branches present.

THE ANNUAL DAY OF PRAYER for Missions is held on S. Andrew's Day, November 30.

The Annual Meeting is held on the day after the close of the Diocesan Convention.

The Semi-Annual Meeting is held in the autumn, generally in October, the date being fixed by the president, and due notice being given to all Parochial Branches.

A meeting of the Diocesan officers is held on the first Thursday of each month, at the Church Club Rooms, room 510 Masonic Temple, Chicago.

Different branches are asked to co-operate with the President in taking charge of the noonday meetings. Interesting papers are read, and Missionaries speak on the work in their jurisdictions.

It is hoped that each branch will send at least two representatives to these monthly meetings.

REQUESTS TO PARISH SECRETARIES.

Please write to the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary for letters from missionaries. Return the same within one week, unless accepted. If a letter is accepted, inform the Corresponding Secretary at once.

Please write at once to the missionary stating when he may expect a box, and from whom. As soon as a box is sent please notify the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary, giving its estimated money value.

Please send the names and addresses of all parish officers to the Diocesan Corresponding Secretary, and notify her at once of any change of officers.

Please see that all notices of meetings sent out by the Diocesan Recording Secretary are read by your Rector at the Church Services
