**MINUTES OF THE 30TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COLORADO BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.**

The 30th Annual Meeting of the Colorado Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was held in the Chapter House of St. John's Cathedral, on Tuesday, June 9th, beginning with a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Cathedral at 9:30 a. m., by the Very Rev. H. Martyn Hart, assisted by the Rev. J. W. Ohl, of St. Thomas', Park Hill. The hymns “Holy, Holy, Holy,” and “Three in One and One in Three” were sung. The Recessional was “From All Thy Saints in Warfare.” A large number was present and about seventy-five women received. After the service, the delegates and members assembled in the Chapter House for the business session, the President, Mrs. C. L. Olmsted, in the chair. The meeting opened with the hymn, “The Morning Light is Breaking,” during which the offertory, amounting to \$16.16, was taken. Archdeacon Schofield read prayers.

The President's address followed, showing the growth of Auxiliary work in the past twelve years.

The Corresponding Secretary read Miss Emery's annual letter.

Mrs. Charles G. Mantz explained most clearly her "Auxiliary Chart." A number of copies had been printed so that each delegate and member might be supplied with one.

Questions were brought up as to the payment of pledges and assessments. The chair stated that all Auxiliary pledges must be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Auxiliary, in order to be credited in her report, and that all assessments were shown in the Auxiliary Chart.

Mrs. Charles G. Mantz, auditor, reported she had examined the Treasurer's report and had found it correct; also that the books were beautifully kept.

Miss Carrie Clinton reported for the Committee on Arrangements, that the committee had been able only to procure uniform banners for the visiting delegations, but promised better things at the next meeting.

The Alaska Scholarship question was discussed. It was moved by Mrs. Touret, of Colorado Springs, seconded by Mrs. H. F. Hoffman, of Denver, that the Scholarship should be continued by the Diocese. Carried.

A letter was read by the Corresponding Secretary, regarding Auxiliary officers for the newly created Sixth Province. On motion of Miss Clinton, it was laid on the table.

The Chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mrs. Henry Read, presented the following list of nominations:

There were no nominations from the floor and on motion of Mrs. Hoffman, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot.

The President made the following appointments: Secretary Junior Auxiliary, Mrs. Alfred Barnes Bell; Secretary Little Helpers, Mrs. T. A. Schofield; Treasurer, United Offering—Mrs. E. LeNeve Foster; Educational Secretary—Mrs. H. F. Hoffman; Correspondent, Church Periodical Club, Miss Anna P. Livingston; Director Altar Department—Mrs. W. R. Eaton; "Spirit of Missions"—Mrs. L. O. Trowbridge; Committee on Entertainment—Mrs. G. W. Cooke; Printing—Miss Clinton, Miss Brent, Miss King; Auditing—Mrs. Charles G. Mantz, Mrs. Ruffner.

Roll call was responded to by 183 delegates and members, representing 22 Parishes and Missions; two visitors were present, one from Louisiana, and one from Omaha.

Pledges were given at the same time; for Diocesan Missions, \$429.00. General Missions, \$154.66. Alaska Scholarship, \$9.00.

Mrs. Hoffman gave an outline for the Educational work for the coming year. She also spoke of the Boulder Summer School of Missions, the Estes Park Conference, and the advisability of holding an Institute in Colorado, in which case it might be possible to secure Miss Tillotsen, of the Church Missions House, as a leader.

Delegates were asked to read the annual reports of the officers, which had been printed and distributed, and be ready to act upon them at the beginning of the afternoon session.

Announcements were made of the stereopticon Lecture, Tuesday evening; dinner and Missionary meeting at St. Mark's, on Wednesday evening, and of the reception at Matthew's Hall on Thursday evening.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon, which was served in the Crypt at 2 p. m. The afternoon session was opened by singing the hymn, "O Zion, Haste," and prayers read by Mr. Ohl; Mrs. Frank Bishop, Chairman of the Program Committee, presided during the afternoon.

On motion of Mrs. Skinner, seconded by Mrs. E. LeNeve Foster, the reports of the officers were accepted.

Bishop Olmsted gave a most earnest address, and in conclusion, introduced the Rev. E. W. Sibbald, whom he said was going to endeavor to raise funds for Wolfe Hall.

Mr. Sibbald spoke of the need of a Church school in the Diocese.

The chair appointed the following committee to keep in touch with the Council in any effort made in connection with Wolfe Hall: Miss Spalding, Mrs. Henry Read, Miss Letts, Mrs.

N. O. Vosburgh, Jr., Mrs. Charles G. Mantz. A short recess was taken to remove banners.

Mrs. Henry Read read a most thoughtful paper on, "The Benefit of the Mission Study Class and Program Meeting," speaking of the banner offered to the Sunday School having the largest offering per capita in the Lenten Mite Boxes, and won this year by St. Barnabas; the handsome banner was displayed.

A most interesting and helpful talk was given by Bishop Griswold, of Salina; "A Scene from St. Margaret's School, Japan," was given by the St. Mark's Juniors, followed by "Chinaland," presented by the St. Thomas' Juniors.

An able paper on "The Philippines" was read by Mrs. W. B. Harrison.

The chair stated that the paper written by the late Mrs. Charles Ruter on "Alaska," which was to have been read, would be omitted, though with much regret, as justice could not be done to it in the short time allotted.

The hymn "Jesus Shall Reign" was sung. The chair announced the delegates to the meeting of the Sixth Province as follows: Mrs. E. LeNeve Foster, others to be appointed later.

Announcement was made of tea served in the Crypt for the benefit of the Cathedral lawn.

The afternoon offering amounted to \$2.05. The minutes of the meeting were read and approved.

A "Junior Missionary March," when the children carried flags bearing the names of our Missionary districts, was given by the Emmanuel Juniors.

The meeting was closed with the Benediction. At 8 o'clock in the Chapter House a stereopticon lecture was given by Mrs. E. LeNeve Foster, who had with much trouble succeeded in securing the United Offering slides from the Church Missions House.

On Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock, there was a Missionary meeting at St. Mark's Church, the address was given by Bishop Griswold, of Salina; the meeting was preceded by a dinner in St. Mark's Parish House.

On Thursday evening a reception was given at Matthews' Hall.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Last year, when the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions met in this place, we were looking forward to the General Convention in October. That Convention has come and gone, and the members of the Auxiliary everywhere have, no doubt, been greatly inspired and encouraged by what happened there.

From small beginnings a generation ago, a united offering of eighty dollars was given by a band of faithful women for Missions. This was a thank offering, over and above what had been given for the work of the Auxiliary.

There was laid on the altar last year, in the presence of more than 2,000 women representatives from all parts of the Church—at the most impressive service held in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, in New York City, over \$306,000. This is a wonderful sign of our growth in ability and zeal. Our zeal has evidently kept pace with our growth.

What will be the result if we keep on as we have begun? We certainly ought to be encouraged. When we go to St. Louis two years hence, it is possible we will carry a half million united offerings. Why not?

The work of the Auxiliary in the Diocese may be said to be fairly satisfactory. In the past twelve years there has been given, through our Diocesan Treasurer, \$11,528; of that amount, \$9,889 to Diocesan Missions, and \$892 to General Missions; the rest to specials, etc. The value of boxes sent out was \$6,372. This, of course, does not include the work of the Junior Branch, the Little Helpers, United Offerings, and other departments of the Auxiliary.

With greater united effort and self-denial, how much more may we not accomplish in the years to come?

We ought, however, to be paying more attention to the Junior Branch and Little Helpers. The earlier we can arouse an interest in Missions among our children and people, the more we shall minister to the glory of our Lord and our people's happiness.

Missions may be made as interesting as the Crusades, and the beautiful fascination of the subject will take hold of the young, if it is properly presented to them. The children that become familiar with the Mission fields as they grow up, will seldom in after life, lose their love for them and delight in the success of the work.

May we not ask the Clergy to take especial interest in our work and endeavor to create and maintain in their children and young, an intelligent interest in the Church's Missionary work?

Since our last meeting, one of our beloved members has passed away. We miss her kindly presence and greatly mourn her loss.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION SECRETARY.

The outlook for the educational work in the Diocese is most encouraging. The Mission Study Class is demonstrating beyond a doubt its value in arousing and maintaining interest not alone in Missions, but also along all lines of Church activity. As this fact becomes better known to our Clergy and to the Parish and Auxiliary leaders, the number and effectiveness of the Study Class will increase amazingly.

In our educational campaign we sorely need what may be called an "advertising or promotion" department; that is, earnest Clergy and leaders who will take time and energy to create a demand for Mission Study Classes. We have enough capable teachers for many more Study Classes than we have had the past year, but a teacher does not make a class, that must come through the efforts of a promoter.

This year we have studied that splendid book "The Emergency in China," written by Dr. F. L. Hawks Pott, President of our own St. John's University in Shanghai. Next year we shall take up the social importance of Christian Missions in Dr. W. H. P. Faunce's book, "The Social Aspect of Foreign Missions."

One of the practical results of the Study Classes this year is that every class, impelled by a new vision of the need on the field, has made a special gift for Mission work in China.
