MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COLORADO BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUX- ILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, HELD IN ST. JOHN'S CATHEDRAL, DENVER, TUESDAY, JUNE 5, 1917.

The Thirty-third Annual Meeting of the Colorado Branch of The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was held in St. John's Cathedral on Tuesday, June 5th, beginning with a corporate Communion at 9 o'clock.

The Rev. T. A. Schofield was the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Fred Ingley, of St. Mark's, Denver; Rev. L. W. Sprouse, of St. John's Cathedral, and Rev. C. A. Burritt, of Fort Morgan.

The hymns sung were: "Go, Labor On"; "Jesus, Lover of My Soul", and "Our Father's God to Thee."

There were 130 at this service, and the offertory was \$30.09.

Rev. Fred Ingley gave a short address, alluding to the date, June 5th, as being a most important one in this country—the day of registration—and went on to draw a parallel between the soldiers serving in the "Great War" and the army of the Church of Christ, the prime need of both armies being men and money. He urged the members of the Auxiliary to influence young men to enlist in the ministry, which, he pointed out, offered unequalled opportunities for service, and to give a place in thoughts and prayers to the men as well as money.

At 10 o'clock the business session was held in the Chapter House, the president, Mrs. Frank L. Bishop, in the chair. Hymn 252 was sung. The president gave her Address of Welcome. (See report.)

The following Committee on Resolutions was appointed by the Chair: Mrs. Henry Read, Mrs. Cornell, and Mrs. Shelby Wolfe.

Miss Lindley's Annual Letter was read by the Corresponding Secretary.

The Chair asked that a message of appreciation be sent Miss Lindley.

The report of the Committee on the Revision of the Constitution was given by the chairman, Mrs. Shelby Wolfe, who moved the "report be adopted as read, the same to go into effect at the close of this day's meeting;" this motion was seconded by Mrs. R. B. H. Bell, and was carried.

The report of the Nominating Committee was given by the chairman, Mrs. R. B. H. Bell, as follows: President, Mrs. Frank L. Bishop; First Vice-President, Mrs. Shelby Wolfe; Second Vice-President, Deaconess Jacobeit; Third Vice-President, Mrs. Rockafellow; Fourth Vice-President, Mrs. B. W. Bonell; Fifth Vice-President, Mrs. W. G. Rupp; Recording Secretary, Miss Edith Brent; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Carrie M. Clinton; Treasurer, Mrs. Irene B. Ridley; United Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Norman Read, who afterwards moved its adoption, which was duly seconded and carried.

The District reports were received, those from Trinidad and Canon City being read by the Corresponding Secretary. (See report.)

As the Colorado Springs District has been without a president since Mrs. Touret's resignation, there was no report, but Deaconess Jacobeit reported the work of the Juniors of St. Stephen's Church, and Mrs. Van Keuren spoke of the good work done by the Juniors of Christ Church, Canon City. (See report.)

Mrs. C. G. Mantz drew attention to the report of the Junior Auxiliary, and spoke of the Junior Conference to be held on Wednesday morning.

By request Deaconess Jacobeit gave a short account of work done among the students of Colorado College.

On motion of Mrs. Mantz, seconded by Miss Perrenoud, it was decided to continue the Alaskan Scholarship.

Roll call was responded to by 215, representing 32 Parishes and Missions, and including 5 visitors and 1 junior. A number of clergymen were also present; \$509.00 was pledged for Diocesan Missions; \$311.00 for General Missions; \$94.00 for ten Alaskan Scholarships, and \$79.00 from the Juniors for General Missions.

The Chair spoke of the appointment of Mrs. Sturgis as Educational Secretary, and of the missionary slides in charge of Rev. H. R. A. O'Malley.

At 12 o'clock the noon-day prayer was said.

Announcement was made that Mrs. Irving P. Johnson would be at home in the evening to out-of-town delegates.

Mrs. Skinner spoke of proposed new plans of the Church Periodical, and read a communication of work with army Chaplains.

The Junior Conference to meet at 9:30 Wednesday morning was announced.

Rev. H. R. A. O'Malley spoke of the Missionary Lantern Slides, six sets of which are suitable for Junior or Sunday School use. These slides may be had from him at a cost of expressage and a refund in case of breakage.

Mrs. R. B. H. Bell said St. Thomas' Church would gladly lend the lantern belonging to it to any church using the missionary slides.

Mrs. Trowbridge spoke of the Estes Park Conference, and Mrs. Hoffman on Boulder Summer School of Missions. Also of her work as Educational Secretary, which she is giving up.

The amount of the Pledges was read.

The Chair announced the Committee on Resolutions would meet directly after luncheon, and asked that the officers' reports which had been distributed should be read during the luncheon hour.

Bishop Johnson pronounced the blessing, and the meeting adjourned for luncheon.

The afternoon session opened at 2 p. m. with the singing of two verses of hymn 249, and prayers said by Bishop Johnson.

Moved by Mrs. Henry Read, seconded by Mrs. Shelby Wolfe, that, owing to the fact that the words, "that the Secretary

be instructed to cast the ballot" were omitted this morning at the time of election of officers, I move that the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot now electing the ticket presented by the Nominating Committee.

The ballot was cast by the Secretary and the officers declared duly elected.

The report of the Auditing Committee presented by Mrs. Lyle was adopted.

The reports of officers were accepted as printed. (See report.)

It was suggested by Mrs. Van Keuren that the program prepared for the united meetings might be used by out-of-town Parishes as proposed in the Secretary's report.

Bishop Johnson gave an address outlining his plan of a House of Churchwomen to be organized along the lines of the organization of that name which has been so successfully conducted in California, and which would serve to bring about co-ordination and co-operation of the various units of woman's church activities.

The Bishop asked that a Committee of Five be appointed by the Chair, the President to be one, to confer with a committee from the Diocesan Council.

Moved, by Mrs. Van Keuren, and duly seconded, that a Committee of Five be appointed by the Chair, the President to be one, to confer with a Committee of Five from the Diocesan Council. Carried.

The Chair appointed Miss Campbell, Mrs. Wheelock, Deaconess Jacobeit, Mrs. F. L. Bishop, and Miss Edith Brent.

During the singing of Hymn 478 the offertory amounted to \$21.81 was taken.

Mrs. Henry J. Hersey gave a talk on "Christian Nurture in the Home," taking for her keynote the lines:

"The child is father to the man,
And I could wish my days to be
Bound each to each by natural piety."

In conclusion Mrs. Hersey advocated the use of Dean Hodge's delightful books for children.

A discussion followed, and on motion of Mrs. Atwater, a rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Hersey for her very interesting talk.

Notice was again given of the Junior Conference on Wednesday morning at 9:30.

The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. J. McLaughlin, and the meeting adjourned.

A reception was given by the Cathedral Ladies' Aid at half-past four o'clock.

Report of Committee on Resolutions.

The following was submitted:

The Committee on Resolutions begs to submit the following resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That the conferences of the 1917 Annual Meeting of the Colorado branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions have been of decided value to the Diocese at large.

2. *Resolved*, That it be the sense of this meeting that on accepting the new Constitution, every woman in the Diocese should carefully observe and carry out the organization and government set down therein.

3. *Resolved*, That all moneys shall pass through the hands of the Parish treasurers, and so have proper recognition and agree with the Diocesan Treasurer's accounts.

4. *Resolved*, That it is the sense of this meeting that it was a wise suggestion of the Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary to carry on the work of the Junior through the Sunday Schools in the Diocese, as has been shown by the remarkable results in so short a time—results that reflect great credit on the Junior leaders as well as on the young people under their leadership.

5. *Resolved*, That, considering the critical condition of affairs in the world at the present time, that each woman should feel it her duty and privilege to give all her energy to furthering not only the cause of missions in the foreign field, but also to the carrying of that message especially to the young men in our camps, and so help to guard them from the temptations that must surely assail them. PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Each year since it has been my privilege to make the Address of Welcome to the Auxiliary it has given me greater pleasure than the last, for with each successive year I have come into closer personal touch with all of you, and have come more and more to realize of what loyal women this organization is composed, and I extend to every one of you a loving greeting.

Today there are two vacant places in our midst, and because of it we are filled with sorrow. Two devoted, faithful members of the Auxiliary, who were always present at our Annual Meetings, have been taken from us. Will you not all rise for one silent moment of commemoration to Sister Hannah and Mrs. O. M. Carter?

This has been such a strenuous period of reconstruction in our lives and in our minds that I can scarcely believe that a year has passed since our last annual meeting.

Great responsibilities have fallen upon us, and the women have loyally responded to their country's and their Church's calls. They have gone into the service of the Red Cross with all their hearts, but in our enthusiasm we must not neglect Christ's command: "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations."

Never has missionary zeal been more necessary than now. We must not allow material needs to eclipse the spiritual. In a recent sermon Bishop Johnson spoke of the right our soldiers have to our prayers. Are we all daily praying for their spiritual and moral as well as their physical welfare? Today, especially when your boy and mine and all the rest are enlisting to uphold our Star-Spangled Banner, let us pray that Our Father in heaven will look with favor upon them all, and that his loving protection will follow them wherever they may be called.

During the past year splendid things have been accomplished

by the Church at large, the greatest achievement of all, it seems to me, is the permanent establishment of the wonderful Clergy Pension Fund, which has now reached over \$7,000,000.00.

The Woman's Auxiliary has helped make this possible by its prayers, its interest and its gifts.

One of the ideals that we have ever before us, that of bringing all members of the Church into sympathy and co-operation with the Auxiliary, is as yet far from fulfillment. Can we not all strive more diligently to bring our fellow churchwomen out of the narrow rut of what many believe to be parochial loyalty into the larger field of Diocesan missionary activity?

Bishop Johnson comes to us with new ideas and new inspirations. Let us meet him with the warmest of welcomes. Let us accept his plans and endeavor to carry them out to the betterment of our own and other organizations, hoping that with new methods we may gain new workers.

On the retirement from office of our beloved Miss Emery, we felt deep regret, but her continued interest and influence still inspires us.

Her successor, Miss Lindley, is already established in our hearts.

In Miss Emery's last annual report were many new and good ideas which I am sure some of you have failed to read.

I wish there were time to read the whole report, but I will quote a portion of it: "The Auxiliary is not satisfied with itself nor content to feel that the women of the Church have compassed their capacity for helpfulness. We feel that Board and Bishops and parochial clergy may gain much more from this company of women who stand so ready to co-operate with the men of the Church under their leadership in the widest plans that may be made for the spread of Christ's kingdom throughout the world. * * * Can the Woman's Auxiliary be further used by the Church through its Board of Missions in helping to meet the peculiar calls for the present time? Is it possible for the Board of Missions to bring to the Councils of the Church a proposition to consider some fresh departure which shall gather in and conserve to the Church the force of the Church's womanhood, as yet so inadequately utilized? Cannot some call be sent to the Bishops in their Dioceses and to the Parish Clergy urging them to review the entire subject of woman's work for the extension of Christ's kingdom and asking them how they can best gain the co-operation of the women in carrying out the Church's plans for making Diocese and Parish the working missionary unit? * * * Women who love the Church and de-

vote themselves gladly to her works of love and mercy in their Parish lives and rejoice in the beauty of her holiness, would be won to the Auxiliary in increasing numbers were the limitless possibilities for the winning of this world for Christ set before them in a large and commanding and persuasive way. We would ask both the Board and the Auxiliary to consider whether a real gain might be made if we should emphasize the Auxiliary less as an organization, but, rather, as a reminder, a co-operator, and a vehicle by and through which the general missionary interests of the Church might be strengthened in any and every department of parish life."

I wonder, therefore, in conclusion, if it would not be well for us at this time to ask our Bishop and our Clergy, as did Miss Emery of the Board of Missions, "that if, in reviewing the Auxiliary's work it will not hold back its praise and instead give a judicial and constructive help; tell us what it sees not of strength only, but of weakness; not of success, but failure; and set before us some call which shall exercise the very best that not only the women of today's Auxiliary, but all the women of the Church, can give."

REPORT OF THE FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT.

The Church at Arvada has been closed for nearly a year, and several of the members have moved away, so I did not attempt to visit Arvada.

The greatest disappointment in the work this year was that I did not get to Hugo. No one is to blame for this. The circumstances could not be avoided. I received a very encouraging letter from the Rev. Mr. Ellis, and will go to Hugo sometime this summer.

Aside from these two Missions I have visited and made addresses in twenty-one Parishes and Missions.

A Parish Branch has been formed at St. Thomas' Church, Park Hill.

I addressed the active members of the Woman's Auxiliary at the Church of the Ascension twice. At the home of Mrs. Arthur A. Fisher I met with her Sunday School class, a group of very interesting young girls, who were sewing for a missionary box. I told them about the Mission they were sewing for. It is hoped that this class will develop into the Junior Auxiliary of the Church of the Ascension.

Three times I met with the ladies of St. Peter's, giving instructions on the relation of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

As is generally the case, we find the faithful few workers in this Parish. They meet Thursday afternoon for work. They have decided to call the first Thursday in each month Woman's Auxiliary Day, and the offering will be devoted to Missions. This is done in several Parishes in the Denver District. The Woman's Auxiliary work is done through the Parish Guild. In small Parishes it is difficult to find officers for two separate societies.

During the past two years I have had some difficulty in making appointments, but with repeated efforts have finally succeeded. Always meeting with courtesy and kindness, for which I thank you all.

To my mind's eye the duty of a Vice-President first and foremost is to go into every Parish and Mission in the district assigned to her, and, my friends of the Denver District, as I have accepted this office for another year, with God's help I am going.

REPORT OF THE THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT.

Report of the Holy Trinity Church, Pueblo; Mrs. Cuthbertson, President:

In December to St. Mary's School for colored girls, Keeling, Tennessee, a box valued at \$16.00; also \$2.00 in cash; to the Whirlwind Mission (Indian), Fay, Oklahoma, a box of miscellaneous articles valued at \$20.00. They gave the dorsal, valued at \$4.90, to St. Matthew's Mission at Rocky Ford.

Church of the Ascension, Pueblo; Mrs. Casady, President:

Fifty dollars to the Peaceful Valley Mission, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Casady, and \$15.00 to the United Offering. They have a membership of 50, an average attendance of 35.

The Church at Florence—St. Alban's—is a Mission. Our Rector, the Rev. Mr. Van Keuren, holds service weekly, and they have a Working Guild of 15 members, pay the expenses of the Church, light, heat, water tax, sidewalk tax, Church music, and are trying to pay off the Church debt. Haven't been able to do anything outside their own Church.

The Church at Salida has no Woman's Auxiliary, but the Guild does a little missionary work. They gave \$5.00 to General Missions, and \$5.00 to the United Offering; \$25.00 on their monthly assessment.

Our own Woman's Auxiliary held seven regular meetings. At the first meeting, our delegate to the Triennial, Mrs. Savage, gave a most interesting account of the meeting. The other

meetings came under the following heads, at the suggestion of Mrs. Touret:

Our Church Among the Indians.

Our Church in Alaska.

Our Church in Hawaii and the Philippines.

Our Church Among the Colored people and the Mountain Whites.

Our Church in the Canal Zone.

We had a Mission Study class of eight meetings. The study, the "New World."

We sent a box to "St. John's in the wilderness," Alaska, valued at \$35.00.

At Christmas time a box to Westcliffe and Querida, valued at \$11.75; \$30.00 to our own Diocese, and \$2.00 to Mrs. Ridley for the Diocesan Auxiliary fund. Later we sent \$20.00 to our own Diocese, and \$5.00 to the Clergy Relief fund, but too late to go to our credit, as the books were closed, but I'm sure it will reach the desired destination.

The Woman's Guild of our Church gave \$25.00 to General Missions; \$10.00 to the Alaskan Scholarship fund.

I have thought often lately of the discouraging outlook for Foreign Missionary work, and one almost loses faith. We do grow heartsick with Christian effort when these Christian countries are fighting each other to the death and glory in it.

The study of Missions has been taken up in the Sunday Schools, part of the lesson period being devoted to it once a month.

Work is well started in the different places, which is sure to bring results during the coming year.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY,
MAY 31, 1916, TO MAY 31, 1917.

A Quiet Day for Women was held at Trinity Memorial Church, Denver, Sept. 21st. The service began with a corporate communion, Archdeacon Schofield being the celebrant. The sermon was preached by the Rev. H. R. A. O'Malley, of St. Stephen's, Denver; Archdeacon Denby, of Keeling, Tenn., made an earnest appeal for his work, and the Rev. Mr. Murray, of Indiana, also addressed the meeting.

Eight United Missionary Meetings have been held during the year, when the following program, prepared by the Program Committee, was given:

October—St. John's Cathedral: "What the Church is Doing in North and South Carolina." Mrs. W. A. Ridley.

November—Epiphany: Reports from the General Convention Delegates.

December—Church of the Redeemer: Parochial Reports.

January—St. Barnabas: Address, by Bishop Johnson.

February—Emmanuel: "What the Church Is Doing for the Indians in North and South Dakota." Mrs. E. G. Fine, Boulder.

March—St. Paul's: "The Mountaineers." Mrs. Ethelbert Ward.

April—St. Mark's: "Missions in the Diocese." Mrs. Wright, Golden.

May—St. Luke's, Montclair: "General Missions," Mrs. Mantz.

A special meeting was held at the Chapter House on Tuesday, March 13, when Bishop Wise of Kansas gave a most comprehensive address picturing his vision of the Woman's Auxiliary of the future.

Other speakers have been Miss Helen Bulnois, who was in this country in the interests of the church army, and made an appeal for Recreation Huts, and Madam Luigi Angelini, of Forano, Italy, who spoke of the Waldensians and the noble work that mission is doing for the Italian soldiers.

The average attendance at the monthly meetings was 85.

The largest number present at any one meeting was 119 at St. Barnabas'.

The smallest number present at any one meeting, 55.

Twenty visitors were present during the year.

Three meetings of the Board of Directors have been held.

Three new branches have been organized, viz., at Ascension, Pueblo; St. Andrews, Manitou, and St. Thomas, Park Hill.

At the last annual meeting, 20 parishes and missions made pledges for Diocesan Missions; 17 for General Missions; 22 for the Alaskan Scholarship, and 17 for the Church Pension Fund, while 37 contributed to the United Offering presented in St. Louis, October, 1916.

The full number of appointed delegates, five, attended the Triennial Meeting of the Auxiliary held in St. Louis at the same time as the General Convention last October. Four alternates were also present.

It was with much regret that this Branch heard of the resignation of Miss Emery, the General Secretary, who for forty years had been connected with the Auxiliary and whose devoted and wise leadership has in a large measure given the missionary vision to the women of the church; an expression of regret and appreciation was sent her, and a letter to Bishop Lloyd pledging loyalty to her successor, Miss Lindley.

The resignation of our very efficient second Vice-President Mrs. F. H. Touret, who was in charge of the Colorado Springs district, was received with deep regret, and the best wishes of the Branch follow Mrs. Touret to her new home in Grand Junction.

We have had the pleasure of having Bishop Johnson with us at a number of our meetings, and his interest means an increased strength to the work.

We have to record the death during the past year of Sister Hannah, who labored in all good works so long and faithfully in this Diocese, and of Mrs. O. M. Carter, a devoted churchwoman.

In closing this report of the past, may I not take just a step into the future and suggest that the program arranged for the United Meetings should be used throughout the Diocese? Thus a common interest would be created which would do much towards bringing the various branches together.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 1, 1917.

The past year the Educational Committee has laid especial emphasis upon Junior work. The result has been most encouraging, as is shown in the report of the member in charge of Junior educational work.

The educational activities for the year among the women have been along various lines. A number of Bible classes have been conducted, including one for young women.

St. John's, Boulder, has had two Mission Study Classes, one in "The Conquest of the Continent," and one in "The New World." Christ Church, Canon City, and St. Thomas', Denver, report Mission Study Classes in "The New World." St. Barnabas', Denver, reports not only a Study Class using "The New World," but also a successful year of Program Meetings based upon the same book.

St. John's Cathedral has had the year's Program Meetings based upon "The New World," and in addition has given missionary teas with missionary and other speakers. St. Luke's Church, Ft. Collins, reports a Study Class in "The New World," and St. Stephen's, Denver, a Study Class in "South American Neighbors."

All Saints', St. Luke's and St. Peter's, Denver, report a series of missionary teas and special speakers. Epiphany, Denver, held Program Meetings, for which the Juniors furnished part of the program.

The educational work has a fascination all its own; it can be developed infinitely and repays a hundred-fold every honest

effort. Mission Study in its various forms not only creates and enlarges the missionary outlook, but it re-acts upon every phase of parish life, spiritual and otherwise.

The following reports from our Junior Branches in the Diocese of Colorado of the year's work in "Prayer and Study" are most encouraging, showing capable and devoted leadership.

Boulder, St. John's—Leader, Mrs. Holbert.

Devotional—Junior collect and other prayers.

Study, "The Conquest of the Continent."

Stereopticon lecture on China, given by the Rector before a club composed of the young people of the parish, both resident and from the State University.

Byers—Leader, Miss Merten.

The Church School is the Junior Auxiliary. It includes a Little Helpers' section.

Devotional: Use missionary hymns and prayers.

Study: Missions taught fifteen minutes every Sunday, and for half the hour during Lent. Sometimes the children tell missionary stories, or give a brief account of some portion of the work before the School. The Easter service is strongly missionary. The Birthday Offerings are given to missions.

Cripple Creek—St. Andrew's. Leader, Mrs. Steele.

Devotional: Junior Service, Missionary Hymns.

Study: "Conquerors of the Continent," Mañana, and "How the Church Came to the Various States," taken from "The Spirit of Missions." Each girl chose the name of a missionary bishop, made a study of his field and read a paper upon the subject at a regular meeting. At the close of the year missionary instruction was begun in the Church School.

Canon City—Christ Church. Leader, Mrs. Chappell.

Devotional: Junior Service used by the Branch, also missionary hymns.

Study: Talks on the work in the various mission fields throughout the world.

Mañana studied. An address given by Miss Helen Brent.

In the Church School: Monthly missionary addresses, illustrated by the stereopticon, were given by the Rector, followed by questions on the subject. Many children, especially boys, attended the Sunday evening illustrated missionary services. At Easter the Junior Auxiliary presented "The Light that Lighteth the World." Duplex envelopes are used in the Church School. The older Juniors attended program meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Colorado Springs—St. Stephen's. Leader, Miss Torrance.

Devotional: Use of Junior prayers.

Study: The Junior Auxiliary, which directs the missionary activities of the Church School, has had short talks about once a month on the different branches of the work. Mrs. Eddy, of the Y. W. C. A., spoke on Child Life in China.

Mary Wo, a Chinese girl, student in Colorado College, spoke in costume on the subject of her native land.

All Church School offerings are devoted to missions. The Junior Leader has called several times during the year upon all church girls, students in Colorado College. Entertained all, together with the young men students belonging to the Church, at supper twice, besides giving three small suppers. She waits outside to greet them when they come to church.

Grace Church—Report from Mrs. Touret.

Devotional: Missionary service for Church School on the day appointed by the Board for it, with a missionary talk.

Study: Each teacher did some work with her class. During Lent special stress was laid on missionary instruction, missionary talks were given in the G. F. S. There is an active missionary spirit in Colorado College. Mrs. Touret has taught some of the missionary classes.

Denver, St. John's Cathedral. Leaders, Mrs. O'Donnell, Section 1, in Church School; Miss Barkalow, Section 2; Mrs. Mantz, Section 3, or the Bishop Ingle Circle.

Devotional: Little Helpers' Prayer, Junior service, missionary prayers and hymns.

Study, Section 1, Little Helpers' Chart begun.

Section 2, Course XI (missionary) of the Christian Nurture Series.

Section 3. The Emergency in China. Mañana read. In the Church School course of Christian Nurture Series. Senior No. 1, "The Work of the Holy Spirit in the Church."

In the Church School: Missionary hymns and prayers, twelve-minute talks, illustrated by the stereopticon, during the Epiphany season, on "How the Light Has Been Carried 'Round the World," and on the remaining Sundays; the various fields of the church's missions, this year including Latin America, interspersed with Bible scenes, suitable to the church year.

Miss Helen Brent spoke of work in the Philippines.

The duplex envelope has been introduced, one-half for Missions, Church School, Easter Service, with presentation of Lenten Mite Boxes.

St. Barnabas. Leader, Mrs. Ellis.

The Church School carries on the Junior missionary activities of the parish.

Devotional: Missionary services, hymns and prayers.

Sedalia—St. Philip's. Leader, Mrs. Manhart. Visited in April. Missionary organization and instruction begun in the Church School.
