THE MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COLORADO BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, JUNE 4, 1918.

The Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Colorado Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. John's Chapter House, Denver, Tuesday, June 4th, beginning with a Corporate Communion in the Cathedral at 9 o'clock. Bishop Johnson was the celebrant, assisted by Archdeacon Schofield and the Rev. E. L. Tull. The hymns chosen for this service were: "Go Forward, Christian Soldier", and "Jesus, Lover of My Soul". Between fifty and sixty women were present. The offertory was \$18.10; owing to the illness of Dean Hart, the speaker of the day, there was no address.

The business session, which was held in the Chapter House, was opened by the President, Mrs. Frank Lee Bishop, with a message of welcome.

The annual letter of Miss Lindley, the General Secretary, was read by the Corresponding Secretary, who was instructed to send to Miss Lindley a message of appreciation, and promise of co-operation in her plans for the war work of the Auxiliary.

The Corresponding Secretary read reports of the First Vice-President, Mrs. Wolfe, who was ill; of the Second Vice-President, Deaconess Jacobeit, of Colorado Springs.

Bishop Johnson gave a stirring address emphasizing and commending the general plan of the Auxiliary war work, and the report of the Joint Committee on the House of Churchwomen, he asked that instead of making the usual pledge to Diocesan Missions, the Auxiliary pledge itself to some definite constructive work in the Diocese under his direction, the money this year to be devoted to a church building fund for Lamar; he also spoke of holding the Annual Council in February instead of June.

It was moved by Mrs. Wheaton that the Diocesan pledge be given up, and a new fund organized to be called the Church Building Fund.

A discussion followed. It was moved by Mrs. Wheaton that it be laid on the table until later in the session. Carried.

Mrs. H. F. Hoffman, in charge of the Diocesan Auxiliary War Work, gave an outline of her plan of work.

The report of the Special Committee on the House of Churchwomen, was read by Miss Campbell, who moved its adoption.

On motion of Mrs. F. A. Ellis, a recommendation that the "Brotherhood of St. Andrew be added to the list of organizations" was carried and the report with the amendment was adopted.

The Corresponding Secretary read the reports of the Third Vice-President, Mrs. B. F. Rockefeller; and of the Sisterhood of St. John the Evangelist. The President read a telegram of greeting to the Auxiliary from Mrs. Irving P. Johnson.

The Auditor, Mrs. Jesse Wheelock, reported the accounts had been audited and found correct.

The Fourth Vice-President, Mrs. B. W. Bonell, of Greeley, gave her report.

Announcements were made of a Missionary Meeting in the Cathedral that evening when a letter from Mr. Van Keuren, formerly Rector of Christ Church, Canon City, and now with the Red Cross, describing the evacuation of Amiens would be read; also an address by Archdeacon Schofield, who has just returned from Liberia; of the Summer School of Missions in Boulder; and of the Estes Park Conference.

The Noon-Day Prayer for Missions was said.

Further announcements were made of a reception at the Convalescent Home that afternoon and evening; and of the Bishop's Portrait Committee.

Mrs. Traphagen told of the organization of a new W. A. Branch in Golden.

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented by Miss Brent as follows:

On motion of Mrs. Norman Read, seconded by Miss Clinton, the report was accepted.

The afternoon session was opened with the singing of "Our Father's God to Thee"; prayers were read by the Rev. C. H.

Brady, and the offertory was taken during the singing of "Holy Offerings, Rich and Rare".

The report of the Little Helpers was read by Mrs. Trowbridge.

On motion of Deaconess Jacobeit the reports of the officers as given and printed were accepted.

On motion of Mrs. Wheaton, seconded by Mrs. Read, her motion of the morning regarding the Diocesan Pledge was withdrawn.

Moved by Mrs. Wheaton, seconded by Mrs. Traphagen, that our annual Diocesan Pledge be placed at the disposal of our Bishop, to be known as a Church Extension Fund.

Deaconess Jacobeit offered as an amendment that the words "of the Colorado Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary" should be added. The amendment was accepted, and the motion carried.

It was unanimously voted to continue the Alaskan scholarship.

Roll Call was responded to by 201, all the Denver Parishes and Missions being represented, as well as Boulder, Canon City, Colorado Springs, Castle Rock, Evergreen, Fort Collins, Fort Lupton, Fort Morgan, Golden, Greeley, Longmont, Loveland, Manitou, Rocky Ford, Sedalia, Sterling and Sugar City.

The following pledges were received: For the Church Extension Fund of the Colorado Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, \$545. For General Missions, \$337. For the Alaskan Scholarship, \$90.

The election of officers took place, the report of the Nominating Committee being read by the President.

It was moved by Mrs. Norman Read, seconded by Mrs. Blodgett, that as there were no nominations from the floor, the report of the Nominating Committee be adopted; carried, and the President announced the following officers duly elected: President, Mrs. Ethelbert Ward; First Vice-President, Mrs. H. F. Hoffman; Second Vice-President, Mrs. Basil M. Marshall; Third Vice-President, Mrs. Sherman Fosdick; Fourth Vice-President, Mrs. B. W. Bonell; Fifth Vice-President, Mrs. W. G. Rupp; Recording Secretary, Mrs. R. B. H. Bell; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Thomas Waters; Treasurer, Mrs. Fannie G. Lyle.

An illustrated lecture on Jerusalem was given by the Rev. Denzil C. Lees, who had lived for some years in that city.

Announcements were made of the Government War Films to be shown at the Broadway, and of an exhibition of the value of illustrations in Sunday School teaching.

An invitation was extended to hold the next Institute in Colorado Springs. It was voted to send a telegram of greeting to Mrs. Irving P. Johnson.

The retiring President introduced the newly elected officers; Mrs. Ward said a few words of greeting to the Auxilliary and of appreciation of the work of the retiring officers.

Bishop Johnson spoke of his personal appreciation of Mrs. Ward's acceptance of the office of President.

Mrs. Ward made the following appointments:

United Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Norman Read; Secretary Junior Auxilliary, Mrs. Alfred Barnes Bell; Secretary Little Helpers, Miss Louise Mills; Educational Secretary, Mrs. Irving P. Johnson; Educational Secretary for Juniors, Mrs. Charles G. Mantz; Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Mrs. C. H. Blodgett; Secretary Altar Department, Mrs. E. C. Dewey; Secretary Spirit of Missions and Witness, Miss Scharff; Program Committee, Mrs. Frank L. Bishop, Mrs. Shelby Wolfe, Miss Brent; Printing Committee, Mrs. Thomas Waters, Mrs. R. B. H. Bell; Hospitality Committee, Mrs. Jesse Wheelock, Mrs. George Newton, Mrs. Peeree.

The offerings of the day amounted to \$48.44.

It was voted to send a message of sympathy to the Dean regretting his illness.

A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring officers.

The minutes of the meeting were read and approved.

Bishop Johnson closed the meeting with the benediction.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Members of the Woman's Auxilliary:

I hope this reunion today gives everyone of you as much happiness as it does me. We have more out-of-town delegates than at any previous annual meeting that I can remember, and this assures me that interest in the work has increased throughout the Diocese. I believe that the Institute held in Denver last January has helped greatly to bring this about, and I trust that it will be possible to hold another institute during the coming winter.

While we have made few new departures in the work this year, I feel that with the many demands made upon the hearts and minds of our churchwomen, that we may be satisfied that

we have been able to keep up our usual work—forming new branches, paying our pledges, doing box work, as well as much needed special work. Our United Offering has also greatly increased over former years.

After my many year's experience as President of the Auxiliary, I consider that the great United Thank Offering is the most important factor of our work. I consider it the most important because of its two-fold mission—that of carrying our spiritual as well as our financial support to nearly two hundred noble, self-sacrificing women, who in the heat of the tropics or in the cold of Alaska are giving all of themselves to the service of the Master. Only personal acquaintance with these women, who are spending their lives in the farthestmost parts of the Philippines, in China, in Japan, in Liberia, and in Alaska, can emphasize in our minds the tremendous sacrifice that they are making; women who, from year's end to year's end, often see no one except the natives among whom they are working, and who are still patient, cheerful, loving teachers, teaching the faith in the world's darkest places. Do let us make the United Offering more what it stands for; let us give it the personal contact by making it an offering of the individual woman in greater and greater numbers, so that the penny may always carry with it the prayer. It means so very much more when rightly accumulated and rightly presented. I believe the United Offering Parish Treasurer holds the most important office in the Auxiliary, because she has the opportunity of telling the story of the offering to every woman in the Church, not once, but over and over again, telling of its mission and of the little blue box, which ought to be in the possession of every one of them, for every Church woman should consider herself an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary. In addition to the individual offering which is the ideal, she can make a beautiful thing of the Corporate Offering by making it a spiritual connection between the different organizations in her Church, teaching them to give in a truly thankful spirit and not as an obligation.

I do not wish to take up too much time, but I feel that I must speak of all the essential things which we are striving to accomplish. Today a new war work plan will be presented to us. Can we not go into this work with some animation?

One of the reasons given for doing this work is that "Christians believe that spiritual power is the greatest force in the world," and "that if the power of prayer can be put behind the struggle on the battle field, it may help to win the war." Is not that an incentive quite as appealing as any other war work can put forth?

Do let us stir ourselves out of the apathy that seems to pervade all the work of the Church and put our whole heart and soul into "Prayer", so that peace—the peace of God—may again rule over this world. This war work plan carries with it a tremendous personal responsibility. Will not you, Churchwomen, respond to it—this call of your Church, as you have responded to the call of your country? Will you not meet the leader's requests with real spiritual determination to help her and not with a reluctant consent to do what you can?

"I can do all things through Christ".

Surely the work for Christ and through Christ must count now as never before.

Another new plan is to bring all Church activities under one head. If this can be brought about, think of the unlimited help we may be to one another, and let us also accept this plan and endeavor to carry it to its fulfillment.

In speaking to you today for the last time as President of the Auxiliary, will the Clergy of the Diocese allow me to offer a suggestion to them—a suggestion which arises from my experience in this work: The Diocesan Auxiliary will never be what it should be in the work of the Church unless every clergyman, whether he serves in a Parish or in a Mission, becomes interested in the work, and putting his whole strength behind it, encourage the forming of local branches.

The Parish Woman's Auxiliary is the unit of the Diocesan Auxiliary, and it must be tenderly nourished and strengthened; it must have some one to teach it the first steps to keep a loving finger on its pulse, to be certain that its heart is throbbing steadily. Just like a little child, it must be helped to grow and then by bringing all these children together, the Diocesan Auxiliary can be made, as it should be, the one big missionary family of the Church.

In retiring from office I extend to the new and to the old officers my promise of never-failing interest in the work, and my loving regard for each and every one of them. May they have the support which I have always received from my fellow officers and from all the members of the Auxiliary; may their vision be limitless, and may their good works be known not only in the Diocese, but throughout the world.

REPORT OF FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT.

War conditions have interfered with the Woman's Auxiliary work this past year. The women of this day and generation are called upon to do things they never did before, and it all takes time. Program meetings must be cut down, and a very close account of time taken in all things.

But let us keep a firm hold upon the spiritual things of life during these strenuous days. The Parishes I have visited are doing their very best; paying their pledges and working hard to increase the United Offering.

A branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been formed in St. Peter's Parish with thirty or more active members enrolled, and they have more than doubled their pledge for General Missions.

St. Mark's Branch has gathered in the largest United Offering in one year in its history, and has trebled its pledge for General Missions. I found St. Thomas' Branch very active in the way of boxes, and they always pay their pledges promptly. I invariably find a room full of busy women at All Saints', St. Luke's, Montclair, St. Barnabas', St. Stephens', St. Peter's and Castle Rock. I urge every Parish and Mission in the Denver District to keep the right balance between church and country; never failing to give to God's work the supreme place it deserves and should have.

REPORT OF THE THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT.

Report of the Holy Trinity Church, Pueblo:

Two missionary boxes have been sent this year, one box valued at \$25.00 sent to St. Michael's Mission, Wind River, Wyoming, and one box valued at \$25.00 sent to the Convalescent Home, Denver, Colorado; \$2.00 in cash was sent toward payment on church debt of St. James' Mission, Mesilla Park, New Mexico.

No report was made from the Church of the Ascension at Pueblo, Colorado.

The Church at Florence, St. Alban's, is a Mission. During the past year the Working Guild has raised nearly \$500.00, which has paid for the expenses of the Church, light, heat, taxes, Church music, and has also paid on the Church debt. They have been unable to do any work outside their own Church as yet.

The Church at Salida has paid \$5.00 on its assessment, but has done nothing else but Red Cross work in the past year.

Grace Church at Buena Vista has a Guild of twenty-six members, who have been raising money by means of bazars, suppers, bakes, socials, besides their dues and special gifts, to help pay for certain improvements to the Church building and Rectory. They have devoted nearly all their time to Red Cross work during the past year.

Report from Christ Church, Canon City:

The Woman's Auxiliary has held five regular meetings. The first meeting in October was devoted to organizing and to hearing reports from the Council Meeting in June.

In November Mrs. Biller talked on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In December the talk was on "When and How Our Church Came to the United States".

In January the Rector talked on "Loyalty to the Church".

In March the talk was on "The Missions in California", with a report from the delegate to the Educational Institute.

In April the meeting was devoted to election of officers and reports for the year.

Tea is served at each meeting, and they are really enjoyable. On account of the Red Cross work no Missionary work has been done during the year and no boxes have been sent.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE COLORADO SPRINGS DISTRICT.

The Auxiliaries of St. Andrew's Church, Cripple Creek; St. Andrew's, Manitou; Grace Church, Colorado Springs, and St. Stephen's, have made a very creditable showing during the past year. All our Parishes have met their pledges to General and Diocesan Missions. Contributions to the Alaskan Scholarship were sent by Grace Church and St. Andrew's, Manitou, to the United Offering by Grace Church; St. Andrew's, Manitou, and St. Andrew's, Cripple Creek, to St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, by St. Andrew's, Cripple Creek, and St. Stephen's, Colorado Springs; also by the Girls' Friendly Society of Grace Church.

Box work was done in all the Parishes of the district, and Missionary Study Classes were held in Grace Church, Colorado Springs; St. Andrew's, Cripple Creek, and St. Andrew's, Manitou.

The Junior Auxiliary work has been carried on by the Sunday Schools in Cripple Creek, and St. Stephen's box work being supplemented by occasional missionary talks to the whole school. In my own Parish I was left without our able Junior leader, and all the older members of the Junior Society, on account of their absence through war conditions.

I believe it will be increasingly difficult to have strong Junior branches with meetings in the week, and I strongly advocate forming the older classes in our Sunday Schools into Executive Committees—both boys and girls—to direct the missionary work of the Sunday School, *as a whole*. They could plan for box work, and the systematic study of Missions might, perhaps, be taken up in the place of other Sunday lessons in these upper grades. Especial credit is due at this time to our children's efforts during Lent—the Mite Box offerings of \$14.00 from Manitou; \$55.00 from Grace Church, and \$65.00 from St. Stephen's, comparing very favorably, to my mind, with previous years, when no special demands were made upon our children on account of the war.

Last October the United Woman's Auxiliaries of Colorado Springs, Colorado City and Manitou greatly enjoyed a most interesting talk from Mrs. Biller; we very much wish that we could have the advantage of such excellent speakers more frequently.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON A HOUSE OF CHURCH WOMEN.

The Special Committee appointed by the Bishop at the Thirty-first Annual Council to consider the question of establishing a House of Church Women, after giving careful consideration to the matter entrusted to them, begs leave to present the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the following articles be adopted for the purpose of authorizing the holding of an annual conference of Church workers in the Diocese of Colorado.

ARTICLE I.

There shall be a conference of Church workers known as the Diocesan Institute.

ARTICLE II.

The Diocesan Institute shall be composed of representatives of the Women's Guilds and the Women's Auxiliary, the

Girls' Friendly Society, Daughters of the King, Church Clubs and Sunday Schools within the Diocese of Colorado.

ARTICLE III.

The purpose of the Institute shall be to assist the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese in the work of Christian education, missionary and benevolent activities and social service.

ARTICLE IV.

The Institute shall meet annually and shall have power:

- (1) To promote and to conduct missionary and educational conferences of a Diocesan or local character.
- (2) To promote fraternal solidarity within the Church.
- (3) To raise funds for such purposes through the various agencies represented and to appropriate them for the needs for which they may be raised.
- (4) To adopt rules for its organization and guidance, not inconsistent herewith.

ARTICLE V.

The officers of the Diocesan Institute shall consist of a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, Treasurer and an Executive Committee.

Resolved, That the President of the Council appoint a Special Committee with power to give effect to these resolutions.

ANNUAL REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31, 1918.

Six United Missionary Meetings have been held during the year with an average attendance of 67, the largest number present at any one meeting was 88, the smallest 49. The first meeting of the year was a gathering of the combined forces of the Auxiliary (including the Juniors), the Girls' Friendly Society, the Daughters of the King, and the Church Periodical Club, which took place at St. John's Cathedral on Tuesday, October 22, beginning with a Corporate Communion. A business session followed, when reports were presented, and Deaconess Hargreaves of Besao, Philippine Islands, gave an illustrated talk on her work.

The other meetings were as follows: November 27, St. Peters, when Bishop Johnson spoke of "Colorado's Need and the Church's Opportunity."

January 22, St. Thomas'—"The Call of Africa"—Mrs. Ingersoll; the first of a series of four studies on Africa.

February 26, St. Mark's—"Islam on the March"—Mrs. Henry Read.

April 23, All Saints'—"The Heart of Paganism and the Strongholds of Christianity"—Mrs. Harry English.

May 28, St. Stephen's, where the Rev. T. A. Schofield, who has just returned from Liberia, gave a talk of conditions in that country.

The December meeting was omitted as a mark of respect for the memory of the late Dr. Houghton, who was to have been the speaker of the day.

Since the date of the March meeting fell in Holy Week when many special services were arranged, it was thought wise to omit that also.

There were six meetings of the Executive Board during the year.

The Pilgrimage of Prayer was observed throughout the appointed week—July 22-29—a preparatory service being held at St. Mark's, July 16, and Corporate Communion in each Denver Parish on Sunday, with an Early Celebration each day of the week, and a service of intercession every evening in the Cathedral. On Wednesday afternoon a mass meeting took place in the Cathedral, when Miss Grace Lindley, the General Secretary of the Auxiliary, gave a most inspiring address. On the Sunday before Advent, Colorado joined with the members of the Auxiliary throughout the Church in a Corporate Communion, and in the Intercessions of the Pilgrimage of Prayer. The Offering on this occasion was devoted to St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan.

A very successful Woman's Auxiliary and Sunday School Institute was held in Denver, January 8-11. Miss Elizabeth Matthews, of Glendale, Ohio, conducted the Mission Study Classes and Auxiliary Conferences, and Miss Frances Withers, of the Church Mission House, the Sunday School and Junior work. The Diocese was well represented at this Institute. The out-of-town delegates were entertained by the Denver Branch. It has not been possible to obtain a complete record of branches, but at the last Annual Meeting delegates from thirty-two Parishes and Missions responded to roll call.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY FOR JUNIORS.

Once again, in making this report, the Secretary realizes that all that has been accomplished in the devotional and educational life of the Branches is due to the Master's blessing and efforts of his faithful and devoted servants, the Branch Leaders.

An inspiring and educational Sunday School and Missionary Institute was held in January, 1918, in the Chapter House under the capable leadership of Miss Frances Withers, our General Secretary for Juniors. This Sunday School Institute was attended by several Clergymen, a few Sunday School Superintendents, and by one or more delegates from the following Parishes:

Denver: St. John's Cathedral, St. Peter's, St. Mark's, St. Thomas', Emmanuel, St. Paul's, St. Barnabas', Trinity Memorial, Epiphany, St. Stephen's, St. Luke's, Montclair.

Sedalia, Evergreen, Pueblo (Church of the Ascension), Boulder, Ft. Lupton, Golden, Rocky Ford, Greeley, Canon City.

For some years a very few Church Schools in the Diocese had been working toward the ideals set forth in the "New Junior Plan," ably presented by Miss Withers in the Institute. During the past year a few others had made a beginning, introducing also the Christian Nurture Series of Lessons.

As a result of the Institute the following schools have begun to work out the "New Junior Plan," with its three-fold aim—Prayer for Missions, Study of Missions, Gifts to Missions, for Missionary activity. The list, including those previously organized, is as follows:

On Sunday afternoon, April 21st, at St. Mark's Church, was held a Diocesan Children's Rally. There were five hundred children present representing all of the Parishes in the city and some out-of-town Parishes, of which Ft. Lupton and Evergreen sent the largest delegations. Combined Junior choirs marched in procession, followed by the twelve members of the clergy and the Bishop. The Rev. Mr. Ingley read the service and the Bishop preached a fine sermon on "Habit." The Sunday School Mite Box Offering for General Missions amounted to more than \$1,500.00, and the banner was awarded to St. Barnabas' Sunday School for the largest offering per capita.

The Bishop announced that he would annually give a prize to the Sunday School sending the largest proportionate delegation to the Children's Mite Box Rally.

St. John's Cathedral was designated as the place of meeting in 1919. It is planned to hold this service annually for the presentation of the Junior Lenten offering for General Missions.
