MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, 1919

The thirty-ninth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Connecticut was held in the Parish House of Christ Church Cathedral on Thursday, November 6, 1919.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at half past nine by Bishop Brewster, assisted by Dean Colladay.

The business meeting was called to order by the President at half past ten o'clock. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. Then followed the usual reports, which were all accepted, viz., the reports of the Treasurer, the Corresponding Secretary, the Education Secretary, the Box Secretary, the Secretary and Treasurer of the Comfort Club, Chairman of the Junior Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, the Missionary Lending Library, and the Church Missions Publishing Company.

Reports were also read from the Committees on the Education of the daughters of the Clergy and United Prayer for Missions.

The Pledge List as recommended by the Board of Managers was read and accepted.

An appeal was made for money to carry on the Comfort Club and pledges were made amounting to \$567.

Mrs. Acheson gave an explanatory address on the Church Service League, and especially on the connection of the Woman's Auxiliary with the work of the League.

Noon Day prayers were offered and the Reverend Mr. Coburn of Danbury, gave the devotional address on "The Spirit of the Nation-Wide Campaign."

The roll was called at half past two o'clock, when thirty-six Rectors and three hundred and fifty-seven women, representing seventy-seven parishes, responded.

Bishop Brewster spoke with deep feeling of the resignation, on account of ill health, of Miss Sarah Davis from the charge and responsibility of the Comfort Club, a position she had held almost since its inception. A resolution of affection and appreciation of her untiring and loving service was passed.

The addresses at the Missionary Service were made by Bishop Huntington of Anking, and Bishop Roots of Hankow, China. The offering at this service amounted to \$345.16.

The service closed with the singing of the hymn, "God is working His purpose out." Bishop Brewster pronounced the benediction.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ever since the Triennial of 1919 the church, in all its branches has been in a state of reorganization, from the Presiding Bishop and Council, with all their tremendous responsibilities, down to the Little Helpers.

We of the Woman's Auxiliary have had our own readjusting to do, and it is with particular pleasure that I make my report to you.

During the last year we have enlarged our working committees to meet the new demands put upon us, and the results are most satisfactory. There is in the Annual Report a list of Archdeaconry Committees, which will be interesting to everyone. It means that instead of, perhaps fifteen women being responsible for the work, there are now at least thirty-three interested in the various departments of the Woman's Auxiliary. This does not include the officers and heads of departments.

The work of the Auxiliary is appealing to the younger women to-day as it did not seem to do in the past, and those of us who are in closest touch with it all feel that the new methods of work are responsible, very largely.

The times demand more thoroughness than other times needed, and the Auxiliary has been wise in putting into practice the lessons learned during the last six years. The Woman's Auxiliary has always stood for the Missionary, Spiritual and unselfish side of everything, and its very first promise is Prayer. Let us all remember this, for as we grow older we realize the importance of prayer so much more than we ever did before. Pray without ceasing, for it is our only way of talking with God.

Our Supply Department, which has been so well explained in the report of the Secretary, Mrs. J. L. Goodwin, is now in a position to do splendid work, for in every Archdeaconry there are those who are especially interested in furthering the work of this department. In New London Archdeaconry there has been awakened a very remarkable interest, and a committee of four young women have the matter in hand. All through the supply work the idea of Parish, Archdeaconry and Diocesan committees is being developed splendidly.

The department of Religious Education is taking on very encouraging proportions, and with the inspiration of being a real part of the policy of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education we think the future is full of promise. No one can, to-day, fail to be interested in the church's world work, and there is no more

fascinating way to learn about it all than the ways suggested to us by the Church Missions House.

We hope that the reports from the many parishes of the Lenten classes on "Alaska" will show a wonderful interest on the part of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese.

At the Annual Meeting in Bridgeport last November the "Budget" was very carefully explained and all the reasons for adopting it were gone over to the satisfaction, we sincerely hope, of every woman in the Diocese. At least, there were some 700 women and clergymen present, and it was voted, unanimously, to adopt the Budget.

May I say in passing that some one thought, from looking at the Budget, that it cost \$3,255 to raise our pledges of \$4,000. That is, of course, a mistake, as you can readily see from the summary at the end of the Annual Report. Our total in money and boxes (reported directly and indirectly, and including the Emery Fund of over \$2,500) is \$32,000.00, and this is only the material side that can be counted in dollars and cents.

The seventh recommendation of the Budget Committee reads "that hereafter all money given in the white envelopes be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary, instead of being divided between the Parish Apportionment and the Pledges." This decision has caused a little anxiety in some parishes. I therefore hasten to explain that a plan is being worked out whereby each parish will be given credit for its portion of the amount of money given to Missions through the Woman's Auxiliary. I think it will be about 45 per cent. of the total given in the white envelopes. All the money in the envelopes must be counted by the Woman's Auxiliary Parish Treasurer and the full amount sent to the Archdeaconry Treasurer regularly, so that we may attend to the Missionary part of our obligation properly.

I beg for the loyal co-operation of every woman in the Diocese in the new plan for our work. It is only when we are all working together unselfishly that great things can be accomplished. Let every woman use the white envelopes this year, whether she thinks it the best way or not, and I am sure the results will be most gratifying to every one of us.

In closing, may I express my deep regret that some of our oldest members have withdrawn from the Board, and if it is not presuming too much, may I thank them for all they have meant, and always will mean, to those of us who are still on duty. Their devotion and wisdom and unselfishness will always be our inspiration, and we hope they will remember how welcome they will be at all meetings of the Board.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

As there had been no Corresponding Secretary for more than half of the past year the President has asked for a report of the changes in the personnel of the Board of Managers, and of the methods of the Woman's Auxiliary as now working under the Presiding Bishop and Council. There have been, during the year, a number of changes in the Board of Managers. We have met with a most serious loss in the resignation of our Vice-President, Miss Sara B. Huntington, who held that office from 1908, and was a member of the Board since 1891, having been Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. For many years she was Chairman of the Committee on Education of the daughters of the Clergy, and frequently served on other committees. By her knowledge of the work and clear judgment she was always a most helpful and valued member of the Board. We are happy to be able to report the acceptance of the Vice-Presidency by Mrs. Garret C. Pier of Greenwich. At our May meeting we were reluctantly compelled to accept the resignation of Mrs. Richard R. Graham, who had served the Board as Manager for New London Archdeaconry from 1913 until she became Corresponding Secretary in 1916.

Mrs. Oliver Gildersleeve, Jr., of Portland, has been appointed Corresponding Secretary. Hartford Archdeaconry is happy in filling out its number of managers by the election of Mrs. I. Edmund Zacher of Hartford, and Litchfield Archdeaconry by that of Miss Marion F. Scovill of Watertown. New London Archdeaconry has taken on new life and is under the direction of two splendid committees. Middlesex Archdeaconry has a new and live committee also.

The changes in our methods of work, under the Church Service League, were introduced to our notice in the address of our President, and in the report of our Corresponding Secretary, printed in our last Annual Report—the thirty-ninth—and the Archdeaconry Committees later appointed will be found printed in this report. The working of these committees and of the other groups of church women comprising this League, were fully explained and discussed in the series of meetings held last spring by our President in each Archdeaconry. The plans for the work of the Archdeaconries have been developed further by the appointment of the aforementioned Archdeaconry Committees and the acceptance of a Budget at the last Annual Meeting for what is felt to be a more systematic and better method of carrying

on the work. The work of the managers as arranged for in the several Archdeaconries will also be found recorded in this report, and the parishes have likewise been notified of the changes.

In the report of the Connecticut Supply Secretary will be found the directions for the boxes which the Supply Secretary at the Missions House in New York has, under the Presiding Bishop and Council, assigned to the churchwomen of Connecticut, and which it expects them to carry out as its share in the mission work of the church. The general plain is that so successfully used under the Red Cross rules. As the great army of women accepted the responsibility and work during the Great War of filling the allotments assigned to them, it is hoped that each woman in every parish will so accept this work, for otherwise we shall fail as a Diocese, and some of our hard working missionaries and their families, the mission hospitals and schools will suffer in consequence. Let each do her part so that we may surely fill our quota. The needs of mankind are still calling us to service.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

There have been thirty-five study classes since our last report. Eight of these were inter-parochial; four were in the Girls' Friendly Society; and one was an inter-parochial class for men. Eleven parishes had a class for the first time. There were thirteen new leaders. There have been eleven program meetings, five of which were in parishes where there was also a study class. Seven reading circles were reported, and there was very general reading of the text-book and reference books on the subject of the foreign born.

The Educational Secretary met with seventeen Branch Secretaries of the Girls' Friendly Society in New Haven to discuss methods and material which could be used in that society. As almost every one asked for the outlines and literature for programme meetings it is believed that work was done by those Branches. Your Educational Secretary worked with the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee until January. Since that time she has led eight study classes, six of which were the first to be held in the parish.

The policy this year has been to lead as many classes as

possible in parishes where no definite work has been done, due to lack of leadership. The wisdom of this plan seems amply justified in that definite plans are now being made in seven of the nine parishes reached in these classes. One of the members was a delegate to the Conference for Church Workers at Wellesley, and will be the leader in the parish work this year. Another will assist, later, in directing the work in New Haven Archdeaconry. There were ten new leaders developed who are already planning this year's work.

Over six hundred have been in study classes during the year, and it is estimated that at least one thousand have had a real share in the work. Nearly all of these used the text-book "Neighbors." The Woman's Auxiliary provided seven scholarships to the Conference at Wellesley. Eight others attended through interest created by the scholarships. Some of these were sent by the parishes where the scholarships were being applied. This, without doubt, is one of the best investments for the church in the Diocese that we have made. The Rector of one of the parishes writes: "I want to say that the Wellesley Conference did for Miss _____ what the Nation-Wide Campaign was meant to do for everybody, namely, it has inspired her with a zeal and devotion to the work of the Kingdom of God which is most wonderful. I cannot help but feel that if more members of the church would go to Conferences like Wellesley that many of the problems that now confront the church would be solved. I was very much surprised and chagrined to learn of the small number of delegates that attended the Conference from Connecticut. We shall endeavour in this parish to send at least two, and perhaps more, to the Conference next year."

The increasing response and co-operation on the part of the Girls' Friendly Society is both inspiring and encouraging. It is not so difficult to find those who are willing to take leadership among the Branch Secretaries. In some parishes it is through this organization alone that any missionary educational work is done.

The outlook for this year is most encouraging. There are more appeals for help and direction than in any previous year. In a few parishes plans for educational work have become a recognized part of the year's program. A few realize that the object in this work is to reach every individual in the parish with some information about the work of the church, and are working toward this end. To illustrate: one parish had two study classes among women; a men's inter-parochial class; a series of programme meetings; a reading circle among young girls; and a class of children pasted four books of World Friendship Stamps. All was based on the text-book "Neighbors."

We are in very great need of leaders. It is a serious and deplorable delay in the progress of the work that more women are not willing to get the material from the Educational Department, bring it to the attention of other parish members, and help plan for the use of some of it during the year; or at least write the Educational Secretary about plans. To many who have had such a share in the extension of the Kingdom of God there has come such a joy as, perhaps, is felt in no other department of the church's work. One such worker in a parish can help to greatly sustain work that has been started but lacks growth for the need of leadership.

The Presiding Bishop and Council has asked the whole church to study the work of the whole church during the next two years, and has given us the survey as a basis for this study. To quote from the survey: "The necessity has arisen that the whole church should know the whole truth about her whole task." Our subject for the next two years, then, will be the church and her task. Dr. Sturgis, in his Manual on the Survey, says: "The whole object of the survey is to arouse interest by emphasizing our Lord's first missionary command, 'Lift up your eyes and look on the fields.' Since there is danger in merely looking and then forgetting, let us really study the picture that we be 'not disobedient unto the Heavenly Vision'."

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee has reconsidered the report presented to the Board at its May meeting and begs to submit the following recommendations.

First—That a budget, to include the Pledge list, Current and Convention Expenses, Educational Work, Diocesan Assessments, be printed and circulated and that hereafter there be issued but one kind of envelope to meet these requirements.

Second—That there be a Finance Committee, consisting of the President, Treasurer and Financial Manager of each Arch-deaconry.

Third—That the Missionary speakers at the Annual Meeting be given not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00 and their expenses.

Fourth—That the offerings at all Corporate Communions of the Woman's Auxiliary be used to form a fund to be disposed of at the end of the year.

Fifth—That the Finance Committee recommends to the Board for action the disposal of

- (a) The balance on hand at the end of the year.
- (b) The offerings at the Annual Meeting (in excess of the expenses of the speakers) and that it suggests objects for
- (c) The pledges made at the morning session (of the Annual Meeting.)
- (d) The fund formed from Corporate Communion Alms.

Sixth—That in accordance with the vote passed at the Triennial of 1919 Connecticut be assessed \$20.00 "for the expenses of the National Executive Committee" and \$10.00 for the expenses of the Provincial Committee.

Seventh—That hereafter all money given in white envelopes be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary, instead of being divided between the Parish Apportionment and the pledges.

Eighth—That whereas it was voted at the Detroit Meeting that the Box Work be organized along Red Cross lines and

Whereas the Bishop of the Diocese has desired that the Woman's Auxiliary assume responsibility for the Comfort Club, the committee recommends that a Diocesan fund sufficient to supplement both Missionary and Comfort boxes be included in the Budget.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

The year 1920 has been marked by a reorganization of the Supply Department. Even the name has undergone a change, for the word "Supply" has superceded "Box." One of the managers in each Archdeaconry has become the Supply Manager, and these, with the Supply Secretary, now form a committee having charge of all supply work.

The most vital change has been in the method of assigning work. Instead of indefinite appeals from a dozen or more different missions, the Supply Secretary received early in the fall, a definite allotment of work which this Diocese must complete by next summer. This allotment consisted of fourteen personal boxes, three missions for which this Diocese is entirely responsible, the Indian girls school at Mission, S. D., with its fifty-three girls, a small allotment for another school, and two catechists' suits. These lists were divided among the supply managers, who have apportioned the work among their parishes, asking each one to do its full share of the allotted work. Twelve personal boxes were completed and sent before Christmas, and eight general boxes.

To go back to the work that was done previous to October, and the new allotment—about ninety boxes were sent to seven missionary families, fifteen Indian girls, and about twenty-five missions, schools and hospitals. The majority of these were for the southern mountaineers, although Alaska, Porto Rico and China

received a share, as did some of the western missions. Since the new plan went into effect a few boxes have been sent that were not of the allotment, by parishes that had planned their work early in the season, but for the most part the societies have been willing to do the work they were asked to do.

In all, 125 boxes, valued at over \$8,000.00 were sent during the year by 72 parishes.

A number of Christmas gifts attractively done up, were received for distribution, and gave an added pleasure to the recipients of the boxes.

The Comfort Club takes this opportunity of extending hearty thanks to the various branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, and other societies, as well as individuals, for their generous consideration of its needs, and earnestly asks the continued co-operation and support of all who are interested in the successful carrying on of the work.

No report of the Comfort Club seems complete without mention of Miss Sarah E. Davis, and her many friends will be glad to know that she is greatly improved in health. Her long experience and advice have been of inestimable value to the Club during the past year.

When boxes and parcels of clothing are sent, it is very important that a complete list of the articles be placed in the box, giving a **conservative** total value, and the name of the secretary or individual sending it. At the same time the Secretary of the Comfort Club should be notified by a letter addressed to her residence.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING TREASURER

The report of the United Thank Offering Treasurer for the year following the Triennial usually reads like an anti-climax. It is a big drop from \$8,496. 43, the total receipts for 1919, to \$4,374. 30, the total cash receipts in 1920.

Last year's amount came from 132 parishes and missions, and one individual, and this year's from 109 parishes and missions and one individual. Of these, 43 have gone ahead of last year's record and 61 have fallen behind. Christ Church, Greenwich, leads the record of growth, with an increase of \$141.69 over last year, when it contributed \$365.80.

We set our goal for the first year of the Triennium at \$5,000, so we are just \$371.94 short of reaching it. Not a cent of this came from surplus pledge funds, but from the purses of devoted churchwomen, to whom the United Thank Offering is a vital thing to be remembered every year and, probably, every day of every year. Your Treasurer is trying now to bring the United Thank Offering to the particular notice of other national churchwomen's societies, such as the Girls' Friendly Society and the Daughters of the King, and to impress on every woman communicant that it is the United Thank Offering of the "Women of the Church."

Two circular letters have been sent to all parish treasurers during the year; one was a letter of recommendations and suggestions for carrying on the work, and the other was a statement of finance.

For the first time in the history of the United Thank offering a statement as to the number of workers at home, abroad, retired or disabled and in training, together with the amount already paid out and the balance on hand from the offering of 1919, was issued to Diocesan treasurers in July.

For the coming year it is recommended that a special communion service be held in each parish church on some week day during the first week in May. In cities, if so desired, arrangements could be made for a service at a central church and the contributions from each parish could be presented in an envelope plainly marked with the name of the parish, so that when the collection is transmitted to the Diocesan Treasurer, due credit can be given to the parishes contributing.

Then, during the first two weeks in October 1921, a similar ingathering should occur. In this way definite dates for a definite thing are fixed in peoples' minds.

Hereafter, the United Thank Offering envelopes will not be distributed in the packages for the Budget, but will be distributed by the parish United Thank Offering Treasurers to those who prefer making their contributions through them, rather than through the "Blue Box."

One can but repeat the urging for each woman who has the interest of the United Thank Offering at heart, that it should be conscientious as well as spasmodic giving. God blesses us with life and means to-day. To-morrow the opportunity may be gone, and those, our substitutes, the workers we support do their work every day, year in, year out, until God says, "Well done, good and faithful servant," or, "Come apart and rest awhile," or, to the young, "Come and follow Me!" Shall we say, "Next year?"

It is not "next year" with them—it is "Now."

THE EMERY FUND**1921**

On October 16, 1921, the Woman's Auxiliary will have completed fifty years of active service for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. At the Triennial in Detroit, it was decided to mark this fiftieth anniversary by the gift of at least \$50,000.00 as an expression of our gratitude for this half century of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. This Fund is to be given to the Presiding Bishop and Council, to be for all time a Trust Fund, the income to be used for the benefit and pleasure of Missionaries on furlough for study, health and recreation. It will be called the Emery Fund, in grateful recognition of the devoted labors of three sisters—Mrs. Twing, founder of the Auxiliary; Miss Julia C. Emery, General Secretary for forty years, and Miss M. T. Emery, head of the Box Work for many years. It is hoped that every member of the Auxiliary in this Diocese will contribute generously to the Fund. So far we have \$2,545.09, this includes one gift of \$1,000.00, the offerings at the Annual Meeting and two Archdeaconry meetings, and several pledges yet unpaid.

EDUCATION OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE CLERGY

In 1865 a society called "The Bureau of Relief," was formed in Hartford by the Rev. William Croswell Doane, Rector of St. John's Parish, and later Bishop of Albany. The work of the society was to supply clergymen and their families with clothing and household comforts. In the autumn of 1875 the same society began helping toward the education of the daughters of our Clergy.

In 1881 a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was formed in Connecticut, and the Bureau of Relief consolidated with and was merged into the Woman's Auxiliary, and the Auxiliary appointed a committee for the Daughters of the Clergy. Since then the sum of \$700 has been pledged yearly by the Auxiliary for scholarships, which has been divided among daughters of clergymen when the sum which we could offer would enable them to obtain such an education as they needed, and as

they could not have had without the help thus given. Since 1875 it has assisted in the education of about one hundred and fifty girls, the greatest number of them being daughters of clergymen within our own Diocese.

The Comfort Club has carried on the supply department of the Bureau of Relief.

Report of the Committee, 1920.

Your Committee begs leave to report that it held its annual meeting to award scholarships for the year—September to September.

It has been the custom of the Committee to give one hundred dollar scholarships; but taking into consideration the great advance in the cost of living and the higher rates charged by the schools it was thought best to raise the regular sum to one hundred and fifty dollars; but circumstances must again determine variations in this sum. This year the seven hundred dollars has been divided among four girls in our own Diocese, an extra amount to one girl who has been on our list for two years, and will, with this help afforded her this year, be able to complete her course at college.

In the spring two of the girls were taken from the list, one having other arrangements made for her, and the other owing to the state of her health, and only three scholars were carried through the year. This enabled your Committee to send the daughter of a clergyman to the Conference at Wellesley, where we believe that she made good use of her opportunities.

**REPORT OF THE CHURCH MISSIONS PUBLISHING
COMPANY**

This year the Church Missions Publishing Company has issued two new plays, and has brought out a number of new editions of old ones, for which there continues to be a steady, though never a very large sale, since a limited number of copies are sufficient for the instruction of a company of actors. A number of the old sketches from the mission field, for which there was a demand, have also been reproduced.

The company is now ready to offer as an introductory study to Archdeacon Stuck's valuable textbook on the church's mission stations in Alaska, a pamphlet prepared under his personal inspiration by Mrs. Dudley N. Carpenter, one of the leaders of the missionary department of religious education in the Diocese of Maryland. This study offers, in practical shape to be used by a class, a condensed summary of the physical conditions of the country, its history and its commercial outlook, the characteristics of the three district races that make up its inhabitants, and the difficulties and the encouragements that are encountered by our missionaries in preaching the Gospel to them.

Again we are much indebted to the Woman's Auxiliary of Connecticut, from the first a constant friend and supporter of the Church Missions Publishing Campany, for its generous assistance, doubled this last year in consideration of the well-nigh ruinous increase in the cost of printing. In spite of reducing the publications issued during the last twelve months to the lowest possible amount—far below what the company should have printed—it is difficult to see how the expenses could have been met without the help of the two hundred dollars received from the Auxiliary.

ARCHDEACONY TABLES

The Archdeaconry Table has been made out a little differently this year. It shows the offerings each parish has given to Pledges and Current Expenses (under Budget) to Specials, that have been given through the Auxiliary Treasurer, to the United Thank Offering, to the Comfort Club, and the total cash offerings. It shows the value of boxes given to the Comfort Club, to the Supply Department and the total box values; also the Grand Totals.

The advantage of this plan is that the whole record of each parish can be seen at a glance, instead of having to look in three different reports to find it.

The amounts given to "Parish Apportionment" are not included this year because the record was very incomplete and, therefore, misleading. Not more than one-third of the parishes reported the amount given and time would not permit sending out a second request for it. Also, "Specials" indirectly reported are not included as none of the money passed through the Auxiliary treasurers' hands. These specials amount to about \$2,200.

The Committee feels sure that if all money given to Parish Apportionments had been reported the Grand Total for the year, including the Emery Fund, would have been very close to \$32,000.

The Committee promises a very thorough record next year, and hopes it may be a most satisfactory one to every woman in the Diocese.

Let every woman contribute through the white envelopes this year. Over 500 women, representing 83 parishes, voted at the Annual Meeting to adopt the Recommendations of the Committee, and if you read them carefully you will surely feel you must help to contribute toward the amount of the Budget \$7,255 through the white envelopes.

CHURCH SCHOOL SERVICE LEAGUE

The Board of Religious Education of the Diocese has authorized the officers of the former Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary to organize the Junior Department in co-operation with the Board of Religious Education to be called the Church School Service League. The plan is as follows:

Organization.

To suggest to the Rector of each parish that he form a branch of the Church School Service League by appointing a committee of three to be responsible for the mission work of the children of the parish, one member of the committee to be chosen from the Church Service League, the other two, if possible, from the officers of the Church School.

In small parishes or where it would not be practicable to have such a committee, one leader might be appointed to be responsible for the work. In all cases the members of the committee or the leader should be considered members of the Church School staff.

Money.

If possible, introduce the duplex envelopes into the Church School. The missionary side should be given to the work of the Church School Service League, a certain part being kept by each branch for the expenses of the work (materials for box work, freight, etc.) After meeting these expenses each Church School is asked to bear its share of the Church School Service League Pledge (formerly the Junior Pledge.)

The remainder of the money given for missions may be used for Specials, objects for which will be suggested by the officers of the League if desired.

All money, unless otherwise directed, shall be sent to the Junior Manager of the Archdeaconry and by her remitted to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Church School Service League.

The Treasury will keep a small percentage for central expenses (former Current Expense Fund.)

The Advent envelopes should be used as formerly solely for work in the Diocese and not sent to the Church School Service League Treasurer.

Box Work.

It is suggested that the Committee should try to get each Church School teacher to meet her class during the week for practical mission work. The Missionary Box-work would be

carried on as formerly, the Committee or Leader making application to the Junior Manager for the address for the box.

It is suggested that the year's work be divided into three parts—Parochial, Diocesan and Missionary—some practical work to be done for each.

The number of week-day meetings must be adapted to circumstances in each parish. The Rector and Committee should decide whether meetings should be held weekly throughout the year, monthly, or merely during Advent and Lent.

Junior Branches whose members for any reason are not connected with a Church School should go on working as formerly, introducing the duplex-envelopes if possible.
