MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, 1920

The Fortieth Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on Wednesday, November 10, 1920, in St. John's Church, Bridgeport.

The opening service, that of the Holy Communion, was held at half past nine o'clock by Bishop Brewster, assisted by Bishop Acheson and the Reverend Stephen F. Sherman, rector of the parish. There were present at this service about fifty women.

The business meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. E. C. Acheson, at half past ten. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. As the Branch had been without a Corresponding Secretary for some months a report was made by the Recording Secretary. Then followed the reports of all departments and committees, including the Junior Department and the Little Helpers.

The "Budget," including the Pledge List and all the Auxiliary expenses for the year, amounting to \$7,255.00 was presented, explained and accepted.

The plans for the Auxiliary Jubilee and the Emery Fund were presented. It was voted that the pledges made at the morning session be given to the Emery Fund.

Noon-day prayers were said, and Miss Tillotson, of the Church Missions House, made an address on the "Nation Wide Campaign." Luncheon was served in the Parish House.

The afternoon session was opened by Bishop Brewster at two o'clock, and, after the singing of a hymn, the roll was called by parishes. Four hundred and ninety-one delegates and twenty-one rectors responded, representing eighty-three parishes; but it was estimated that about eight hundred women were present. The President of the Council, the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Gailor, D. D., made an address on the Lambeth Conference and the Nation Wide Campaign, and he was followed by the Rev. Harvey P. Walter of Porto Rico. The offering, amounting to \$268.06, was divided between the Rev. Mr. Walter for Porto Rico, and St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, 1921

The 41st annual meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. James' Church, New London, on the third of November, 1921. The last annual meeting held in this church was on the tenth of November, 1909.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at half past nine o'clock by Bishop Brewster, assisted by Bishop Acheson and the Reverend Philip Kerridge, Rector of the parish. There were about thirty present.

The business meeting was called to order by the President at ten thirty. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. The Treasurer's report was accepted as read. The reports of the Corresponding Secretary, Supply Secretary, Comfort Club Secretary, United Thank Offering Treasurer (who reported \$9,292.16 toward the \$15,000 goal), Church Periodical Club, Missionary Lending Library, Church Missions Publishing Company and the Committee on the Education of the Daughters of the Clergy were read and accepted. They will be printed in the annual report.

Reported that the Emery Fund, at this time amounts to \$61,000 and that Connecticut women have given \$3,447.57.

The gifts from the "Little Helpers" amount to \$315.22 for this year. It was voted to accept the three recommendations of the Finance Committee, already approved by the Board of Managers—(1) That the list of pledges be omitted until a later meeting and that the sum of \$4,000 for the Church's Mission be included in the budget. (2) That the Special Pledge, made at the morning session of the annual meeting, be given to Bishop Overs, for the work in Liberia in loving memory of our former treasurer and president, Mrs. Howard S. Clapp. Mrs. Acheson spoke on the subject, and pledges were made amounting to \$928.80 from sixty-six parishes. (3) That the Communion Alms from Auxiliary meetings during the past year be used to give an Altar Cross for the new Calvary Church in Bridgeport.

Noon-day prayers were said by Bishop Brewster, with special thanksgiving for the centennial of the Missionary Society and the semi-centennial of the Woman's Auxiliary; also for the Conference on the Limitation of Armaments now in session at Washington. He then introduced Miss Eva D. Corey, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of Massachusetts, who spoke on "The Place of Women in the Church," and gave a splendid, sane and comprehensive treatment of this interesting and important subject.

Luncheon was served in the parish house at one o'clock.

At two o'clock a missionary service was held in the church, at which 181 women and 16 clergymen responded to the roll call. Bishop Brewster gave a short address, reminding us of the centennial of the Missionary Society and the fiftieth anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary, which he hoped would be fittingly observed. He introduced the Reverend F. J. M. Cotter of Wuchang, China, who gave such a very vivid and touching account of St. Andrew's Mission, with its "congregation of 53" that all hearts were greatly moved.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Another year has passed and once again we are thinking over the work accomplished by the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese. It has been an encouraging year in many ways. More women have come forward to express their interest in the missionary undertakings, and from the reports in the Archdeaconry tables I think we may count it a satisfactory year.

We have been obliged to accept the resignations of some members of the Board (whose reasons for giving up the work seemed too personal to question) and this fact we regret more than words can tell. In their places have come other consecrated women, eager to carry on the good work, and we cannot but feel that we are indeed fortunate in having year after year the same real, sincere, devoted workers in our midst.

With the old year, our much loved Miss Ferguson was called to her great reward, and to many of us this means a very personal sorrow as well as another great loss to the Auxiliary. In 1892 Miss Ferguson came on the Board as a Manager. She was Corresponding Secretary for ten years, President of the Auxiliary from 1908 to 1915, and within three years acted again as Corresponding Secretary while Mrs. Graham was ill; so that we feel she has always been in very close touch and sympathy with the work, and she will be very much missed by every one who knew her.

Of Miss Julia Emery I will not try to write, except to say that in her death we share the sorrow of the women of the whole

church, for to mention the Woman's Auxiliary, especially to those of us who are older, was to think of Miss Emery. All the church papers will have much to say about her and her splendid work. I beg every woman in this Diocese to pay her respect and tribute by reading all that is written of her.

I thought I would be able to report at this time that Miss Nichols would resume her duties as Educational Secretary, after a few months of rest and change in Porto Rico, but just before she went away we talked the whole matter over and both decided that for her own health's sake she must have absolute freedom from responsibility during the next few months. So I think we must make up our minds that her resignation is final. I do know that if she is well enough when she comes home we can count on her help and advice in every way it lies in her power to give. I think the highest tribute of appreciation that can be given Miss Nichols, for her untiring devotion to the work, is to make up our minds that the work of Religious Education must go steadily forward in every parish, especially where so much personal work has been done by her, and that whoever our next Educational Secretary may be, she will have from us all the loyal support and earnest co-operation that Miss Nichols herself, will give her.

I know I voice the wish of every member of the Woman's Auxiliary in hoping for Miss Nichols all good things, above all, a speedy return to health.

During the next couple of months there will be sent out to every parish a leaflet—such a request has come from many sources—explaining as fully as possible some of the working methods of our organization. For this reason I am not going into detail of the work now, but I do ask this year for closer co-operation in the matter of using the Woman's Auxiliary envelopes and in sending all money—specials included—to the Parish Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary. She will forward it to the proper place and your parish will be given credit for it and the Diocesan Treasurer will know what the Diocese is doing for the Church's Mission.

Again I beg that you have faith in the organization and the people to whom you entrust it, and even if you cannot see the wisdom of all they do and their ways of doing it, be loyal, work according to the plan, and at the same time help to improve things by constructive criticism.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

There have been, during the year, a number of changes in the Board of Managers. Mrs. Garrett C. Pier of Greenwich, our Vice-President, was obliged to resign. Miss Edith Beach's resignation as Recording Secretary was reluctantly accepted. However, she stays on the Board, representing the Missionary Lending Library, and Miss Carolyn Taylor of Hartford has been appointed Secretary in her place. At the May meeting Miss Nichols sent in her resignation as Educational Secretary. As yet, no one has been found to take her place, but Mrs. Biddle has very kindly offered to act as Secretary until someone is appointed.

We are very sorry to lose Mrs. Ellis and Mrs. Bard from Fairfield Archdeaconry, for they have been most helpful and valued members. We are glad, however, to welcome Mrs. G. A. Cunningham of Stamford and Mrs. F. E. Hartwell of Danbury, who have been chosen to fill the vacancies. Mrs. S. Roger White of New Haven will take the place of Miss Bowers, who has been such a faithful worker in that Archdeaconry for over twenty years.

For the year 1921 there were 4713 packages of offering envelopes sent out. This year there is an increase of 1000 packages, which is most encouraging. There were, also, 1125 Annual Reports sent to the friends of the Auxiliary, and we hope that this year there will be a call for more.

MISSIONARY EDUCATION, 1921

There have been fifty-two Mission Study classes, two of which included men and women, with a membership of more than 1082. There were programme meetings in sixty parishes, and thirty-seven reading circles.

There are some very encouraging features in our work this year. Chiefly among these is that the study class members have tried as never before to extend the information gained in the class to other members of the parish. This is shown by the number of parishes in which there were programme meetings in addition to the study class. These programmes consisted of a series of meetings, including addresses, papers, discussions, stereopticon lectures, plays or pageants, all relating to given subjects. There were also groups reading the textbook with discussions based upon questions found in "Suggestions to Leaders." This is probably the only really profitable way for a group to read a textbook.

Here are a few illustrations:

In one parish there were two classes, one for adults and one in the G. F. S., followed by a stereopticon lecture to which the parish was invited.

In another there were three classes in as many organizations, with a programme meeting for others. This included addresses, a pageant and a stereopticon lecture.

In still another parish some of the class members passed the information to the Church School teachers, and through them to the pupils.

And again, one member had a class in another parish.

Thus we have proof of a better understanding of the real aim in all our work, viz., to know about the mission of the church that we may help others to know it.

Another very encouraging feature is that in at least fifty parishes plans for missionary educational work have become a natural part of their annual programme.

Some of our best reports this year are from Lime Rock, North Haven, All Saints and St. Andrews, Meriden, New Britain and Torrington. It is a sad fact, and much to be deplored, that many of our largest parishes are doing very little, or no, definite educational work. Almost all of our reports are from the smaller parishes.

Shall we not take for our slogan in 1922, "To Know that I May Make Known to Others"? Let us plan our work with this in view.

During the year two have expressed a desire to give themselves to help in some field of the church's work. One is already

in training. There are others who will respond when something of "the whole truth about the whole church" is made known to them. There may be such an one in **your** parish.

Let us work in 1922, then, with greater zeal, and, if God so wills, some word may be spoken by Him, through us, and this seed bear as its fruit the gift of self.

Mrs. Howard Clapp's Memorial

It has been our custom, for many years, to make a "Special" pledge at the morning session of the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. This year it was a Memorial pledge, in loving remembrance of Mrs. Howard Clapp, who was for so many years connected with the Diocesan Board, first as Treasurer and then as President. A notice of this intention was sent to every parish and at the Annual Meeting in New London sixty-eight parishes were reported as wishing to have a part in this tribute of affection. The money will be given to Bishop Overs for his work in Liberia. In all, seventy-seven parishes contributed and \$1,265.33 was pledged.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

The first year of the reorganized Supply Work has come to an end, and many people are anxious to know if it has been a success. A comparison of the Archdeaconry tables in this report and in last year's will partly answer the question. The total value of Supply Department boxes reported sent during 1921 is

\$12,028.20, as against \$9,289.19 in 1920. In addition to this a quantity of second-hand clothing was sent on which no value was placed. In counting the number of boxes, only the number of different appeals for which a parish worked is recorded, although they may have sent several boxes to each one. The number of boxes is 182, about 45 more than last year. The most striking fact, however, is that almost twice as many parishes reported having done supply work as were reported a year ago. Surely this indicates an increase in interest; and it also shows the results of the systematic work done by the Supply Managers.

As to the value of these boxes to the recipients, there can be no question. The missions and schools have had their wants supplied better than ever before. The outfits for the fifty-three Indian girls at St. Mary's School were all sent, and were greatly appreciated. The appeals for Epiphany Mission, Sherwood, Tenn., Cecil Memorial Mission, Stanardsville, Va., and the Bishop Payne Divinity School met with a generous response and a majority of their needs were supplied, while a moderate amount of things were sent to Epiphany Mission, Spartanburg, S. C. Five missionary clergymen received personal boxes early in the year, and all of the thirteen personal boxes in our new allotment have been wholly or partly filled. Four catechist's suits and two clerical suits have been paid for by the Supply Work Fund included in the budget.

A few parishes have sent in reports of boxes sent to places not in our allotment. These have been counted in this year, but hereafter no credit will be given for such boxes.

Does it not look as if the "new plan" were a success? Let us all join in making next year a still bigger one.

Cash receipts during the past year have been \$920.07, which with the balance of \$63.23 on hand January 1, 1921, makes a total of \$983.30.

Boxes have been received valued by the donors at \$4,493.37.

Value of boxes sent for Diocesan Missions \$2,209.50; for Domestic Missions \$75.00, making a total of \$2,284.50.

Grateful acknowledgment is made of the receipt of several unvalued boxes which have been greatly appreciated; among them, two boxes of Christmas gifts—one from St. Andrew's Church, Stamford, and one from the Church of the Holy Trinity, Middletown—which provided Christmas cheer for many of our families.

The Comfort Club has sustained a loss in the death of Miss Elizabeth D. Ferguson, of Stamford, for many years a faithful friend of the work, and a regular contributor.

The resignation of Mrs. C. F. L. Smith, Assistant Secretary, is announced with regret; her successor has not yet been appointed.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING TREASURER

1921

As shown in the itemized report of the United Thank Offering in the Diocese of Connecticut, the task of raising \$5,000 during the year has been more than fulfilled, for we close the year with a balance on hand of \$6,112.37, which, with the balance from last year, makes a total of \$10,941.87. We have, therefore, the sum of practically \$4,000 to raise before September 1, 1922, at which time the offering of 1922 will be presented.

In a recent notice received from headquarters the following announcement was made:

"We want to bring one or two facts to your remembrance. There is no need to remind you that we have begun on our last year before the next offering is made, but perhaps you have not remembered that the Convention will meet in September of next year instead of October, so that the U. T. O. service will probably be held on or about September 7th.

"This means that we have one month less than usual for the growth of the offering, and that all collections must be made a full month earlier than usual. It is very important that this fact

should be widely known, so that there will be no lack because people did not understand. Will you please instruct your parish treasurer accordingly, and urge them to see that the women know this; and so will be ready to turn in all gifts a month earlier than usual?

"Then we should remember that according to the resolution a tenth of the next offering will be set aside as pensions, and, as we have used all the offering of 1919 in appointing the number of women missionaries now serving as U. T. O. workers we must have a very much larger amount than the last to send out new workers. We all realize that the best way to increase the offering is by interesting more persons in it. Our ideal is to have gifts from every woman in the church. You will, of course, urge upon all parish treasurers the duty of interesting the uninterested.

"There should be meetings on the U. T. O., the use of special programs, like that contained in 'Observation Trips to the Church's Outposts,' the use of leaflets, and, if he is willing to do so, the rector would help much if he will speak of, or preach on the offering. Then we suggest that probably the best way of enlisting the uninterested is by house to house visits, telling them of the offering and leaving literature on the subject."

To return to our own Diocese, perhaps the most encouraging thing is to look back to this time three years ago, when there was not quite \$4,300 in the treasury toward the U. T. O. of 1919, and contrast it with \$10,941.87 to-day. The gradually increasing use of the Blue Box explains much in the way of increase. The semi-yearly presentations at corporate communions have proved most helpful in the many parishes that have tried them.

Four parishes in the Diocese are striving for the \$1,000 goal, the sum that pays the salary of a U. T. O. worker for a year. Are there not other parishes who are anxious to feel that one woman on the church's "far-flung battle line" is theirs?

But more than this, is there any woman in the church who is not willing to have some part and lot in the United Thank Offering of 1922 through "prayer and gifts and joyful service"? Prayer to uphold the workers, gifts to support them and joyful service in both acts. This will be the Twelfth United Thank Offering, and we hope, the greatest the women of the church have ever given.

The Librarian of the Missionary Lending Library of the Woman's Auxiliary begs leave to report that since her appointment to the office by the Bishop, in June 1920, the library has been installed in the Cathedral House—the room to the right of the entrance door—31 Church Street, Hartford.

With the assistance of Miss Genevieve Beals a good beginning has been made on a card catalogue, and a new catalogue it is hoped can be printed very shortly. To encourage the reading of missionary literature and to make the library better known and used, a club for missionary reading was organized early in the year. This has not, so far, met with the success hoped for; but a beginning has been made with twelve readers and we trust that more will join another year, as much instructive and valuable information can be obtained in the two hours a week, which the club calls for. The number of books borrowed from the library was only twenty-two, but as a number were used by clubs, the actual readers were many more.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH MISSIONS PUBLISHING COMPANY

During the last twelve months the Church Missions Publishing Company has issued four publications, viz: "Alaska," by Mrs. Dudley N. Carpenter, from special notes furnished her by the late Archdeacon Stuck; "Three Slaves from Anglia," a Church History Play, by the Rev. Arthur Chase; "John Henry Hobart," and "Alexander Viets Griswold and the Eastern Diocese," prepared especially for our students by Miss Julia C. Emery. It has brought out a new edition of "A New Sir Lancelot" by the last writer, as well as new editions of two plays greatly in demand, "Good King Wenceslas," and "The Blue Cashmere Gown," besides the sixth edition, revised and much enlarged, of the popular study course, "Observation Trips to the Church's Outposts," and Mrs. C. H. Smith's "The Church Catechism Illustrated," for which there is always a widespread call from Church Schools.

It is gratifying that a large part of this work of bringing out new editions has been in answer to requests for the material, from the Educational Department of the Presiding Bishop and Council in New York. And it has been a special pleasure and satisfaction to the company to have had the privilege of offering to the church, and especially to this First Province, the very last labor of love of a long life of unswerving devotion to the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Miss Emery's gift to us of her narrative of "Alexander Viets Griswold and the Eastern Diocese"—valuable because

it recalls a too generally forgotten step in advance in the early history of our American Church—should be known and read by every churchman in this Diocese, where the man was born and educated, who gave to three of our hilltown parishes the ten first years of his ministry, and who was destined to spend his last thirty-two years in the administration of a Diocese that covered all New England, except his native state.

Again it is the company's privilege to thank the Connecticut Branch of the Auxiliary for the hundred dollars given towards the funds required to defray the present heavy expenses of printing. And, too, we would urge that every parish branch should put its address down among the \$1.00 subscribers for the publications of the coming year, not only in this way materially encouraging the company's effort to disseminate a knowledge of the church and its work of extending the Gospel; but that every one may be familiar with the printed information she has helped to send broadcast throughout the land.
