MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, 1922

The Forty-second Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on Wednesday, November 8, in Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford.

A service of Holy Communion was celebrated at nine o'clock by Bishop Brewster, assisted by Dean Colladay, at which forty persons were present.

Bishop Brewster called the business meeting to order at ten o'clock in the Cathedral Parish House, opening with prayer. He expressed his regret, which the entire meeting felt, that on account of illness Mrs. Acheson was unable to be present. Bishop Acheson then took the chair.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which were approved. The Treasurer's report followed, showing a balance in the treasury of \$6,659.42. \$3,034.41, however, was yet to be collected in the white envelopes to meet the amount voted for the budget in 1921. The Finance Committee presented the recommendations, which included the Pledge List for 1922, amounting to \$3,250, and the Budget for 1923, for \$7,505.00.

Pledge slips for St. Michael's Church, Bridgeport, in recognition of Bishop Brewster's twenty-fifth anniversary were given out, to be made out and reported on later. Reports were then given by the Corresponding Secretary, and the following departments: Supply Department, Comfort Club, United Thank Offering, Church Periodical Club, Scholarships for the Daughters of the Clergy, Missionary Lending Library, and the Church Missions Publishing Company. Each of these was accepted as read.

Mrs. C. L. F. Robinson next spoke of the opportunity which would be given on November 12th to Connecticut to raise \$7,500 for a pew in the American Church of the Holy Trinity at Paris, as a memorial and thank offering to those Americans who served in the Great War.

The Bishop next called for the pledges for the Italian Mission and between sixty and seventy parishes responded with promise to help. After this noon-day prayers were said by Dean Colladay. Then followed the story of the Convention at Portland, Oregon, first by Mrs. Charles A. Pease, who spoke on the Church Service League; next by Miss Bessie L. Franklin, who explained the United Thank Offering; and then by Miss Jennie Loomis, who described the part taken by the Woman's Auxiliary. A motion was made by Miss Edith Beach that a vote of thanks be given to the delegates for their fine reports. This was seconded and carried. Miss Beach also made the motion that affectionate re-

membrances be sent to our president, with many regrets for her absence, and our hope for her speedy and complete recovery. And that we wish also to express our grateful appreciation for Bishop Acheson's help in her absence. This motion was carried by a rising vote.

At one o'clock a recess was taken for luncheon, and at two-fifteen Bishop Acheson called to order the afternoon session, which was held in the Cathedral. A resolution on the death of Mrs. J. B. Davenport was read by Bishop Acheson and accepted by all rising. The roll call of parishes was then taken, to which 390 delegates and 32 rectors, representing eight-eight parishes, responded. Addresses were then made by Dr. William C. Sturgis of New York, Educational Secretary, Department of Missions, and Rt. Rev. Gouverneur F. Mosher, Bishop of the Philippine Islands.

REPORT OF THE TRIENNIAL WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Portland, Oregon.

(Jennie Loomis, Delegate from Connecticut.)

The sessions of the Woman's Auxiliary were held in the big Auditorium, in which the sessions of both the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies were held, our room corresponding to the one in which the bishops assembled. The room was so long and narrow that it was very difficult to hear. One speaker came forward and spoke from a small platform on wheels which could be pushed part way down the aisle. The names of the dioceses were printed in large letters on cardboard and hung from wires stretched over our heads, and all delegates were requested to sit in the places assigned to them. Each day's session opened with prayer; and at noon we paused for noon-day prayers and a short devotional address given by Miss Lindley.

The first business session was opened by Bishop Sumner of Oregon, who gave as the slogan of the people of Portland: "What they want they shall have." He introduced Miss Lindley, who in turn introduced Mrs. Wilson Johnston, who was to be the presiding officer, having been chosen for that position by the presidents of the Auxiliary in the Province of the Pacific. Mrs. Johnston cordially welcomed us to Portland, and greetings were also extended by Mrs. Montegale of California, President of the Province of the Pacific, and by Mrs. de Pencier, wife of the Bishop of New Westminster, representing the women of Canada.

The response to the roll call showed ninety-seven dioceses represented, out of a possible one hundred and eight, and four hundred and thirteen delegates out of a possible five hundred and forty, a quite remarkable percentage. As the Executive Board dates only from the last triennial, an entirely new feature was the presentation of their report by their chairman, Miss Nannie Hite Winston. This was followed by Miss Lindley's report as Executive Secretary.

Miss Corey, of Massachusetts, acted as chairman of Despatch of Business, and proved a very energetic and efficient leader. She reported at the beginning of each session, outlining the order of business.

The first important business to come before us was the elections. These may be divided into two heads. First, the election of an Executive Secretary, who in turn appoints the As-

sistant Secretaries at the Church Missions House; and then the election of the Executive Board, which consists of representatives from each of the eight provinces, nominated by that province and eight members at large, nominated by the delegates to the triennial. There being but one nomination for Executive Secretary, Miss Corey was empowered to cast one ballot for Miss Grace Lindley to succeed herself. Miss Lindley, after a few words of thanks, nominated the following assistant secretaries, the nominations to be confirmed later by the Presiding Bishop and Council: Miss Emily Tillotson, Educational Secretary; Miss R. Wade, Supply Secretary; Miss Laura Boyer, Assistant Educational Secretary; and Miss Ellen Flanders, Office Secretary.

The nominations for the Executive Board from the eight provinces were as follows:

Province 1, Mrs. Herbert Payson, Portland, Maine; 2, Mrs. A. S. Phelps, Plainfield, N. J.; 3, Mrs. M. C. Adams, Pittsburgh, Pa.; 4, Miss Marjorie Weed, Jacksonville, Fla.; 5, Mrs. Herman Butler, Winnetka, Ill.; 6, Mrs. G. N. Prince, St. Paul, Minn.; 7, Mrs. Thomas Q. Dix, St. Louis, Mo.; 8, Miss Helen Magill, Pasadena, California.

There were twenty-seven nominations for the eight members at large, voting was by ballot, and as a majority vote was required to elect, it seemed as though we might have a day's balloting ahead of us. It shows how unanimous we were, that all the eight were elected on the first ballot. The members-at-large, elected in the order of the number of votes received, were as follows: Miss Nannie Hite Winston of Kentucky; Mrs. Louis S. Monteagle of California; Miss Eva D. Corey of Massachusetts; Mrs. Lorin Clark of Tennessee; Miss Elizabeth Matthews of Southern Ohio; Mrs. C. R. Pancoast of Pennsylvania; Mrs. Wilson Johnston of Oregon; and Mrs. Kingman Robbins of Western New York.

Mrs. Kingman Robbins, as chairman of the Committee on the Resolutions contained in the report of the Executive Secretary, reported, and the following resolutions were adopted:

The establishment at headquarters of a Rest Room for Missionaries, in memory of Miss Julia Emery.

Plans for the spiritual development of the women are to include the use of the Prayer Partnership and women messengers.

The appointment of three United Thank Offering workers for work of an evangelistic and educational nature.

The provision of \$1,000 for the traveling expenses of certain approved diocesan officers. This approval being in the hands of the Executive, Educational and Organizing Secretaries.

Two additional secretaries to be added, one to the staff for general field work, and one to act in an advisory capacity on

educational questions connected with the training of women missionaries.

Another class is to be added to the Expense Fund.

In accordance with Miss Emery's wish, the Emery Fund will not be closed; but may be added to from time to time. The Fund now stands at \$93,223.58.

It was voted that members of the Executive Board who are not diocesan officers should be, ex officio, members of their Diocesan Board.

Much of the business which came before us was in the form of resolutions. Miss Louisa T. Davies, president of the Virginia Branch was chairman of the Committee on Resolutions.

More than forty resolutions were passed, but I shall mention only a few of these.

It was voted to change the ending of the Auxiliary prayer to end with the name of our Lord.

Diocesan branches are asked to send the names of all missionaries to the Executive Secretary in order that a Missionary Service flag may be made.

The following, bewildering in its comprehensiveness, is typical of a certain class of resolutions which aim to express the sympathy of the Auxiliary with reform movements:

RESOLVED: That the Woman's Auxiliary pledge anew its efforts in prayer and service toward maintaining a high standard in our homes and society, and particularly in such practical directions as prison reform, adequate care for disabled veterans, proper laws for women and children, Christian inter-racial and international relations, limitation of armaments and Christian unity.

One may smile at this, but it is a fault common to most large gatherings to try to attempt the reform of the world by passing resolutions.

Let us turn now to a series of resolutions which bear directly on our own work. Three of these are so closely related that I shall give them all before attempting comment:

WHEREAS: The Woman's Auxiliary feels a real responsibility for the further training of missionaries on furlough, and for volunteers, and

WHEREAS: Those continuing their training need to receive it wherever opportunity is offered.

BE IT RESOLVED: That a place be provided near headquarters at an initial expenditure not to exceed \$65,000, where missionaries on furlough and volunteers may continue their training, and

WHEREAS: The Woman's Auxiliary feels an equal responsibility for the training of colored women workers.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a sum of money not exceeding \$10,000 be provided for the establishment of the National School for the training of colored women workers, already authorized by the Department of Missions, at St. Augustine's, Raleigh, closely related for the present to, but not controlled by the school; and

WHEREAS: Both these buildings are to be used for the training of missionaries on furlough, volunteers, and women workers in the field, one for white and one for colored.

BE IT RESOLVED: That the raising and expenditure of funds for this purpose, together with the housing problems, be placed in the hands of a special National Committee, appointed or approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary with representatives in province, diocese and parish.

These resolutions calling for the raising of a large sum of money brought out vigorous debate. A word of explanation will make the plan somewhat clearer. What is contemplated is, not the establishment of a post graduate school for return missionaries or volunteers—such a school would manifestly require much more than \$65,000—but a home where students, who are availing themselves of the many educational advantages afforded by a city like New York, may live economically.

These students need a place where they may not only obtain board, at a moderate sum, but may have a home under church influence, together with the companionship of those preparing for similar work. It is also desirable that such a house should be near headquarters. Discussion brought out the fact that other religious bodies have felt a like need, and that some of them have started campaigns for a larger amount than we are asking.

It is hardly necessary to explain that the different amounts asked for the white and colored houses is due to the greater value of real estate in New York, and also to the fact that much of the work at Raleigh can be done by the students at St. Augustines as part of their training.

These resolutions were finally carried. The appointment of committees and the methods of raising the money being left to the Executive Board.

The next resolution which is of general interest reads as follows:

RESOLVED: That the head of the Missions Department of the Girls' Friendly Society be given a seat on the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This called out very hot debate, but was finally carried, the voting being done by dioceses. Connecticut voted in the negative—not, of course, because we would not welcome the closest co-operation between the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friend-

ly Society, but because we felt the admission of a representative of one society must eventually involve others, and also because we felt that the inter-relation of different societies was best provided for in the Church Service League, which was created to promote co-operation.

At the final session a further resolution was introduced, giving a seat on our Executive Board to a representative of every woman's society in the church doing missionary work. This was the logical outcome of the first resolution, and certainly a privilege extended to one society should be extended to all the others, if the work done is the same.

The voting was very close and resulted in a tie, and Mrs. Johnston, called upon to cast the deciding vote, voted in the negative, giving as her principal reason that she felt it was a mistake to introduce so important a resolution so late in the sessions, when many delegates had gone home. Connecticut again voted in the negative, both for the reason just given and because we felt that the Woman's Auxiliary was usurping the function of the Church Service League.

It seemed also a questionable policy to admit to our Executive Board members of organizations over which we have no control and yet giving them equal power with our own representatives.

Connecticut feels very strongly that there should be a time limit after which important resolutions may not be introduced, and in this connection presented the following resolution, which was formulated before we left for Portland:

RESOLVED: That resolutions affecting policy and finance to be considered at the triennial be submitted to the Executive Board, and by them sent to each diocese and missionary district at least six months previous.

It is quite possible that the time (six months) is too long; certainly it is longer than most organizations require; but as most organizations meet annually such a rule requiring that resolutions be sent out almost at the close of one session in order to be considered at the next would, of course, be a hardship. We, however, meet tri-ennially, and it would seem possible, by the middle of the third year, to begin to shape the important business to be considered.

The sending out of definite, carefully-worded resolutions in time to allow of their consideration by the diocesan boards would make it possible for delegates to vote intelligently and to carry out the will of the constituency which they represent.

It is a pleasure to turn from this seeming criticism to express my admiration for the splendid body of women which represented the Auxiliary in Portland. It was a surprise to see how many Eastern dioceses had sent their full five delegates the long journey

across the country. It seemed a pity that Connecticut had been unable to send its quota. We missed our president greatly, and wished often for her advice and counsel. Those of us who went will long remember the inspiration of those splendid meetings, and the privilege of having the great leaders of the church.

MISSIONARY EDUCATION

November and December, 1922

There is much that is encouraging so far in the work. The only really discouraging feature is the snow, which in some places makes the roads impassable; so a few engagements have had to be postponed. In every place where I have spoken classes have either been organized at the time, or planned for Lent. In places where there is no one able or willing to take the entire responsibility of leadership, and there are many such, it has been possible to get a number of people to consent to take one subject, and lead one meeting. Such classes often prove most interesting, and in this way leaders may be discovered or developed.

In one small place I met eight women who had braved one of our worst snow storms to get to the meeting. They wanted a class, and each of the eight women volunteered to lead a meeting. In one of our weak struggling missions only six came to the meeting. At first they were the least responsive group I have met, but they did decide to have a class, and each promised to try to bring one more. The Rector tells me they now have a class of thirteen, and, to quote his words, "They are very keen about it."

I would that in 1923 we might get a class started in every one of our 211 parishes and missions, for there's nothing like it, to get people interested in the work of the church. Won't you help by talking Mission Study Class till every woman you know wants to join one? If you have a class that will increase your membership; if you have no class, get a group together and organize one; if there's no other leader, start in yourself and lead the first meeting; perhaps you can get some one to lead the next meeting; if you can't, lead the second; by that time some one will probably be moved to lead the third. It is wonderful what a little effort on our part, with God's blessing, may accomplish. There is doubtless a limit to what we can do for God, but we cannot put a limit upon what God can do through us. Let

us hope for great things, pray for great things, and expect great things.

Recommendations of Finance Committee

Annual Meeting, 1922

Recommended: That the balance on hand at the end of the year be added to the reserve fund.

Recommended: That the offering at the annual meeting in excess of the expenses of the speakers be added to the reserve fund.

Recommended: That the morning pledge be given in recognition of Bishop Brewster's 25th Anniversary as Bishop of Connecticut.

Recommended: That the fund from Corporate Communions of the Auxiliary be given to the Altar Guild of the Diocese.

Recommended: That \$100 from the offering at the annual meeting be given to Mr. Sturgis for Liberia and \$100 to Bishop Mosher.

Recommended: That \$250 be added to the Budget for Educational work.

In Recognition of the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of

Bishop Brewster's Consecration.

The "Special" pledge was made at the morning session of the Annual Meeting. Bishop Brewster was asked to use the sum pledge for some work within the Diocese, and decided to apply it to the building of St. Michael's Mission, Bridgeport, where such splendid work is being done among the Italian people by the Rev. Mr. Pacioppi. The pledges amount to \$992.00, which the parishes agreed to pay by January 1, 1923.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

The work of the Supply Department has become well systemized during the last two years. The parishes now that respond to the appeals are generally willing to send what is asked for, and our year's quota was well, if not entirely filled. This quota was made up of boxes sent to Christ School, Arden, N. C.; The New World School, Manati, Porto Rico; St. Stephen's Mission, Nora, Va.; St. Thomas' Mission, Eastover, S. C.; Vai Interior Mission, Bendu, Liberia; and St. Luke's Hospital, Boise, Idaho. A wide variety is thus represented—two schools, three missions and a hospital—work for the Southern Mountaineers and the negroes, work in the West Indies and in a foreign country.

Five personal boxes were sent during the first half of the year. One of these was largely paid for out of the Supply Work Fund. That fund has also paid for materials for four parishes to work on, and has furnished three catechist's suits and some hospital supplies. Eleven personal, and half a dozen general boxes of the new allotment were sent shortly before Christmas.

That "comparisons are odious" is demonstrated when we compare the figures for 1922 with those for the previous year. The total value of the boxes is only about seventy per cent. of the total value for 1921. Again, only ninety-five parishes worked for this department, as against one hundred and seventeen the year before. While thirteen parishes sent boxes this year that did nothing the year previous, thirty-five parishes failed to keep up their standard.

May we all work together to make a better showing next year.

THIRTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMFORT CLUB

The Comfort Club of the Woman's Auxiliary is the medium for supplementing the salaries of some of the poorly paid clergy of the Diocese with gifts of clothing and household linens, contributed for that purpose by different parishes and individuals.

That the work is appreciated by those who are benefited is evidenced by their grateful letters of appreciation, one of which,

recently received, reads in part as follows: "Could the dear people who provided such fine gifts through the Comfort Club have seen the joy they brought to this country rectory, they might have realized some feeling of happy satisfaction."

Sincere appreciation and hearty thanks are herewith extended to all who have helped in furnishing this much needed assistance.

At Christmas time boxes of gifts were received from the Church of the Holy Trinity, Middletown, and from St. Andrew's Church, Stamford—the latter box being sent in loving memory of the late Mrs. James B. Davenport, who, for many years was deeply interested in the work of the Comfort Club and took great pleasure in collecting gifts for the Christmas boxes; and a devoted friend from St. Paul's, New Haven, gave a "Missionary Tea and Comfort Club Shower," which proved to be quite a success, and resulted in a generous contribution of useful and attractive articles.

During the past year there have entered into rest two staunch friends of the Comfort Club—Mrs. Francis Goodwin, of Hartford, and Mrs. Samuel Glover, of Fairfield, both of whom will be greatly missed.

Cash receipts during 1922 have been \$991.57, which with the balance of \$321.48 on hand at the beginning of the year, makes a total of \$1,313.05. Boxes valued by the donors at \$4,114.69 have been received. Value of boxes sent for Diocesan Missions \$2,040.00; for Domestic Missions \$92.10, making a total of \$2,132.10.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING TREASURER

1922

The prayers and the efforts of "The Women of the Church" in Connecticut have indeed been rewarded during the year 1922. We needed \$4,000 to reach by September 1, 1922, our goal of \$15,000; we received \$8,759.46, including interest and an anonymous sum of \$57.23 from the Church Missions House. Our total contribution to the United Thank Offering was \$18,755.30, against \$12,487.22 in 1919.

An interesting fact is that the gain in the amount of the offering comes virtually from sums contributed the first two years of the triennium; for in the year 1919 the Diocese gave \$8,417.10, and in 1922, \$8,759.46, so that the increase in the final year was less than \$350.00.

During the triennium four parishes reached the \$1,000.00 mark: Christ Church, Greenwich; St. Mark's Church, New Britain; Trinity Church, Hartford; and St. John's Church, Waterbury. The special offering at the Corporate Communion at Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford, on the morning of September 7th, when the United Thank Offering was presented at Portland, Ore., amounted to \$21.75. Three parishes contributed to the offering for the first time: Christ Church, Norwalk; Calvary Church, Bridgeport; Chapel of the Good Shepherd, Southford.

In the Diocese are two hundred and six organized parishes, parochial missions and chapels, and other missions and chapels. Of this number, one hundred and forty-nine have contributed to the United Thank Offering of 1922. If the day ever comes when all are 100 per cent. efficient, who can tell what the amount of the offering from the Diocese will be? We should have for our goal in 1925 at least \$20,630, in order to show our deepening interest. This means a sum of \$6,876 to be raised every year. We have already nearly \$1,000 on hand at the close of the year 1922, and if each parish will only endeavor to keep the good record it has established and reach more women with the "Little Blue Boxes," we are sure to succeed.

Approximately \$150 was sent to the Library Fund of St. Paul's College, Tokio, Japan. During the past year we have broadened out wonderfully in our public work. Hundreds of books and magazines have been given to sanatoriums, hospitals

and to many other well-known institutions throughout our own country, which of course includes Alaska, as well as to Japan and the West Indies. One hundred Bibles and Prayer Books were sent from St. Thomas' Church, New Haven, to State Camp 2, Callahan, Florida. In Connecticut, reading matter has been distributed generously and freely. While we are not neglecting outside work, we are trying to remember those at home who need and fairly crave good literature. I know you will be interested to learn that our men at Allingtown are being cared for by several parishes, one of which is St. John's, Bridgeport. In less than a year books and periodicals to the number of more than two thousand have been sent from that parish to Allingtown, where they have been greatly appreciated.

The work of our new Librarians is very encouraging. St. Mark's, New Britain, has made a fine record. I wish it were possible to mention many others—old and new—who are doing excellent work. Only three have reported a lack of interest in their parishes. Our new Librarians are Mrs. Brideaux, St. Mark's Church, New Britain; Miss Gertrude Peet, Trinity Church, Nichols; Mrs. J. Walkins, Stafford Springs; Mrs. Walcott Phelps, Warehouse Point; Miss Adah Band, Christ Church, New Haven; Miss Lord, St. John's Church, East Hartford.

The following resignations have been accepted with regret: Mrs. Jager, St. Thomas' Church, New Haven; Mrs. Arthur Clark, All Saints' Church, Meriden. Mrs. George J. Bassett has taken Mrs. Jager's place and Mrs. Clark has been succeeded by Mrs. Florence Graham.

It is with sincere regret that we report the deaths of Miss Lillian Benedict of Bethel and Mrs. Fleezer of Marblehead. Both were faithful and devoted librarians, and we will feel their loss very keenly. Mrs. Stone has been appointed librarian in Miss Benedict's place.

Our Church Periodical work in Connecticut is growing a little every year. We have been very ably assisted by Mrs. Edward Pettee, of Hartford, who had entire charge of the work during the winter. Our librarians have all rendered their usual loyal service.
