FROM THE PRESIDENT

My dear Friends:—

With the Annual Meeting still fresh in our minds, I can think of no better way to begin my annual message than to thank every one of you, who came, for your part in making the meeting so great a demonstration of the spiritual power of the Church in the lives of the women of the Diocese. I was greatly worried when I realized how far many of you had to go, and in that terrible storm, to reach home. I do hope no one suffered from the experience.

You will, I am sure, be interested to know something of what our distinguished guests, the Bishop of Aberdeen and the Provost of the Cathedral of Aberdeen, thought of the Woman's Auxiliary of Connecticut. Well, first of all, they were surprised at the attendance, for knowing it to be the Annual Meeting they had expected to see perhaps four hundred women present, provided we had a fine day; but when they saw the Church filled with women from all parts of the Diocese, to attend a business meeting, and in such a terrible storm, their surprise took on the form of amazement. They thought our plan for lunch was unique and delightful, and spoke several times of the good-fellowship that unquestionably exists throughout the organization. They liked the informality and genuine friendliness combined with seriousness of purpose and dignity of organization. They both said it was an inspiration to attend the meeting, and that they would long carry the memory of it with them. It was indeed our privilege to have them with us.

As I think over the year's work, I feel more and more that it has been a good year for the Auxiliary, with promise of better work the coming year. I am hoping for even closer co-operation between the parishes and Diocesan Board, for it is the combination of the two that makes for strength.

I wish every woman in the Diocese would study the Archdeaconry Committee lists. Is there an unfilled office that you are capable of filling? Are you doing all the work you should be doing? If not, will you offer to help with this work? Litchfield Archdeaconry is in need of an Organizing Director. Deaconess Peet is looking for leaders in all parts of the Diocese, and Miss Nettleton warned us at the Annual Meeting that unless she could get one woman, at least, in each Archdeaconry to help her with the Church Periodical Club work, she would be obliged to give it up. Think it over carefully, and, if possible, do help.

Was it not a great satisfaction to be able to respond to the appeal of our Presiding Bishop, to help the Church people in the

Mississippi flood area? The five hundred dollars came from the Reserve Fund. This fund is made up of sums of money such as the balance on hand at the end of the year (which you always vote on at the Annual Meeting) from money which the members of the Board do not use for their expenses, etc. A most useful fund. Then, too, it is nice to feel that our Auxiliary is to have even a small part in the Cathedral in Aberdeen, the Seabury Memorial. The offering (\$471.00) at the Missionary Service of the Annual Meeting was given for this purpose. The Treasurer reports that we have given \$6,910 to Missions through the Diocesan quota. This fact brings comfort to at least three men in the Diocese—our Bishops and Dr. Plumb—and satisfaction to us.

The 1927 Morning Pledge is for the Corporate Gift of the Woman's Auxiliary. A report of this, just received, is printed elsewhere.

Before the next Annual Meeting, Miss Franklin will present our United Thank Offering at the General Convention in Washington, D. C. Oh, that it may be so big that some one will have to help her carry it! Do read Miss Franklin's report, and you will want to have a real part in the "U. T. O."

Bishop Brewster asks the Woman's Auxiliary to put its full strength for the next three years into meeting the Diocesan Budget for Missions and to make the United Thank Offering the one and only Special. What does this mean, and why did the Bishop ask us to do it? It means that we are asked not to give, either as parishes or individuals, to special appeals that come to us, but to put all we can give in the Woman's Auxiliary white envelopes and in the Missionary side of Parish envelopes. He asks us to do this because our Diocese has never yet given the amount asked, for the work of the General Church. This is her first obligation, and until it is met the Diocese goes on record as having "failed" in her responsibility, no matter how much money may have been given in other ways. I appeal to the women of the Diocese to do all they can to remove such a reflection from our beloved Diocese.

In a word, then, the Bishop asks us to give in two ways only for the next three years, (1) through the Woman's Auxiliary white envelopes and the Missionary side of the parish envelopes; (2) through the United Thank Offering, as the one great Special.

Before closing my report I cannot refrain from telling you something very nice that happened to me. At the Board meeting the day before the Annual Meeting I was presented with a very handsome brief case, a fountain pen and pencil, and a charming little gavel, made from wood from the old Sycamore tree in front of the Glebe House in Woodbury. They were given to me by the members of the Board in recognition of the ten years it has been my privilege to serve as Diocesan President. Imagine my sur-

prise, my delight and my, very humble, pride. I know only too well that I do not deserve it all, but I am thankful that my good friends do not, perhaps, realize it. I shall treasure the gift, and a poem written by one of the members, as long as I live.

It has been a great joy to see the work of the Auxiliary grow and develop, and become more and more worth while year by year. All credit to the parishes throughout the Diocese, for that is where the work is done that tells the story, and yet I know that a lot of credit belongs elsewhere, too, for nowhere in the whole Church can be found a more wonderful group of real, live, earnest, consecrated women than those who make up what I love to call "my board," and it is their wise leadership that makes the record of work well done possible. To know them is to love and admire them, and to work with them is my very great privilege, for which I thank God. Let us remember always "to pray fervently, labour diligently and give liberally to make Him known to all nations as their Saviour and their King." May the New Year bring to us all, greater opportunities for Service and much happiness in serving.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, 1927

On Thursday, November 3rd, 1927, the Forty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary took place at St. John's Church, Bridgeport. There was a service of Holy Communion at 9:15 A. M., which was celebrated by Bishop Brewster, assisted by Bishop Acheson and Dr. Sherman. About eighty were present, and the offering was \$37.

The business meeting, called to order by Mrs. Acheson, the president, at 10:15, was opened with a welcome from Bishop Brewster, who complimented the women for a splendid attendance on a very stormy day. A vote to omit the Minutes of the Annual Meeting of 1926, since they had already been accepted by the president and printed in the Annual Report, was followed by the treasurer's report, given by Mrs. Douglas. Mrs. Acheson then introduced to the gathering Deaconess Peet, the new Educational

Secretary, who, having come into the position so recently, gave no report. In the absence of Mrs. Goodwin, Mrs. Bryant gave the report of the Supply Department, together with that of the Comfort Club, and called the special attention of the parishes to care in reporting money spent for box furnishings. Mrs. Biddle reported on the Prayer Partnership, Miss Nettleton, for the first time, on the Church Periodical Club, and Miss Franklin on the United Thank Offering, which to date amounted to \$14,551.89, with approximately \$12,000 to raise to reach the goal for 1928. She asked all parish U. T. O. treasurers to rise, and thirty-four responded. All these reports were accepted.

Since there was no item of outstanding importance, and time was short, the reports of the Corresponding Secretary, Scholarships for Daughters of the Clergy, the Church Missions Publishing Company, and the Missionary Lending Library, were omitted.

In regard to the Church Periodical Club the president stated that Connecticut is one of the few Dioceses where the Auxiliary carries that branch of church work, and that in view of the problems encountered by Miss Nettleton, the Auxiliary would carry it one more year to give the Diocese a chance to waken to the importance of supporting such work, or to decide whether it shall be placed elsewhere.

Miss Loomis presented the report of the Finance Committee. She read the "Pledge List" as usual, but brought a recommendation from the Board that instead of giving the money according to the pledge list as in the past, the whole amount "For Missions" be given to the "Diocesan Quota for Missions" undesignated. The budget for 1928, amounting to \$9,300, showed an increase of \$500 over that of the previous year, making the amount to be raised in the white envelopes \$8,150. Other recommendations of the Finance Committee were read, and Miss Loomis moved the adoption of the entire report. Each section was acted on separately. It was unanimously voted that the money for missions from the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary be given to the Diocesan Quota for Missions undesignated; that the budget for 1927-28 be accepted as read; and that the recommendations be adopted as a whole.

Bishop Brewster then mentioned the raising of the Diocesan Missionary quota, and hoped for the concentrated effort of the Woman's Auxiliary back of the quota of the Diocese for the next three years, and suggested that the United Thank Offering be the one great Special. He next introduced the Reverend Elmore McKee, Chaplain in Yale University, who told of the spiritual and intellectual advantages of the removal of the Berkeley Divinity School to New Haven. He spoke of the plan for a Mission Hostel, and the particular help to be gained from Yale's Missionary Libra-

ry, and stated that there would be a wonderful opportunity for recruiting among the Seniors, as approximately 20% of the students belong to our communion.

The Morning Pledge, called at this time, amounted to \$1,887, to go for "the Corporate Gift of the Woman's Auxiliary."

Noon-day prayers were offered by the rector, and at the close the Very Reverend Erskine H. Hill, M. A., Provost of the Cathedral of Aberdeen, Scotland, gave a beautiful and helpful interpretation of the latter part of the 7th chapter of Revelations, which has to do with the saints in their white robes, "washed in the blood of the Lamb"—it being the Octave of All Saints.

At 12:30 there was an opportunity for questions to be answered, and then all scattered into the various rooms for the luncheon period.

Roll call at 2:15 resulted in 597 responses, of which thirty-four were clergy and two bishops. Ninety-six parishes were represented.

The prayers of the Missionary Service, which began at 2:45, were offered by Bishop Acheson. The address was given by the Right Reverend F. L. Deane, D. D., the Bishop of Aberdeen. In the colorful red robes of his church, he was an interesting picture as he told of his mission in this country—the raising of funds for the restoration of the Cathedral at Aberdeen, as a memorial to Bishop Seabury. The offering, to go for that purpose, was given "In Loving Memory of Bishop Williams," and amounted to \$471.55.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

The number of reports, blanks, etc., sent out during the year is about the same as for several years past. There was a larger call for the Woman's Auxiliary envelopes, and we have this year more on hand to meet the increased demand, and hope for an increased contribution.

Deaconess Roberts was obliged, on account of ill health, to resign her position as Educational Secretary last spring, and in the fall, Deaconess Peet came to take her place.

We have lost from our committee of Middlesex Archdeaconry, Mrs. Melville K. Bailey of Saybrook, who died Tuesday, July 26th, 1927, ending a life of devotion and loving service.

The committee of Fairfield Archdeaconry re-organized in the spring, and Miss Johnson, formerly in charge of financial work, is now Organizing Secretary. Mrs. John A. Forsyth of Fairfield, takes the place of Financial Secretary, and Mrs. Magruder Dent of Greenwich, has become Secretary of the Archdeaconry.

Our Board of Managers met May 3rd in Trinity Parish House, New Haven, and on Wednesday, November 2nd, in the Parish House of St. John's Church, Bridgeport.

Of our missionaries from Connecticut working during the year in the Foreign Field, Miss Elizabeth Colladay and Miss Eleanor Grasso returned home in September.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

During the past year the former Educational Secretary, Deaconess Cora L. Roberts, was obliged because of failing health to resign her duties. Owing to that fact there is no detailed report of the work for 1927.

Her successor, Deaconess Margaret S. Peet, in the late autumn visited the various Archdeaconry meetings, and outlined the general plan for the year's Mission Study courses. With much appreciation she recalls the cordial welcome and co-operation then assured her in the extension of this work. Lists of subjects, with suggested preparatory and supplemental reading, helpful suggestions to further interest, and a personal letter, has been sent to every parish (either to Rector or to some listed Auxiliary officer) in the Diocese. By request, addresses have been made before twenty-five parishes, including a very live G. F. S. branch.

Through the courtesy of the Church Missions Publishing Co. (Christ Church Parish House) 45 Church St., Hartford, Conn., the Diocesan Supply center has been established at that address. All textbooks, plays, leaflets, etc., should be ordered there. There is also a fine Lending Library, always available at need.

The textbook for the year is "A Church Awake," written by Dr. W. A. Sturgis, at the request of the National Department of

Missions. The book—which deals with the subject matter that was the Bishop's Crusade's great theme—will prompt much discussion regarding the Church, its Mission, its Messengers, etc., both individually and in parish groups. It is a high call to service!

As the year closes, we have under way the formation of an Educational Committee for Missions, to include a chairman and representative members in each Archdeaconry with a representative from the G. F. S. and the Daughters of the King.

At a notable gathering the Bishop of Aberdeen said to his audience: "If you remember only one thing that I have said, let it be these words: 'This Church of ours is a **Missionary Church**. It has been a Missionary Church from the beginning. It will always be a Missionary Church'."

If we would have a part in the work of our great Missionary Church, we must echo in our hearts the plea of the disciple to the great Head of the Church: "Lord, show us the way." As we know that way, may we be willing guides to those who too would serve.

REPORT OF THE PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN

It is difficult for busy women driven hither and thither by the demands of this interesting modern life, to stop long enough to realize fully the missionary woman and what influences led her to devote herself to the enlightenment of strange people. One would think the struggle to educate herself, the grilling examination to ascertain her fitness, the tearing of herself away from those who love her and whom she loves, the daring adventure of the new untried life, would make her shrink from the call and settle back in her home to enjoy its comforts and its delightful companionships. She is human with all the natural love of ease, pleasure and of wholesome ambitions; but when the Master's call to special service came clearly and forcibly, she answered, on her knees: "Here am I, dear Lord; send me." She truly found her mission. Never more could she think of herself first, but always

of her people and of the cause of Christ. Do we ever quite realize all this when we think of her? Yes! Sometimes the significance of the familiar story comes like a flash of lightning. It almost overwhelms us. We realize that we are closely linked up with her. She is doing what we ought to do. The call is for us as well as for her. She is our representative, our substitute on the firing line. We cannot go into the battle. Our place is here. She is our dear consecrated sister. We love her for her work's sake, and we must break down all barriers to tell her so, to encourage and strengthen her.

This summer these thoughts flashed into my mind with overwhelming force. At a great conference twenty missionary women were seated opposite me, where I could look into their faces and read the story of the years. Most of them were much worn. The nine from China had been through a great tragedy. Their hopeful work had been rudely stopped, they had fled for their lives, lost everything. They were very serious, but not discouraged. Like Dr. Williams, who was so brutally murdered, they felt they had done the best possible thing for the Chinese and for themselves, that eventually it would be recognized. They were more than ready to go back and brave even death at the earliest call. And the other missionaries were radiant when they told the story of their work. They were a heroic band. All honor to them! I shall never forget them and the scores of other missionary women laboring faithfully to bring all men to the knowledge of God, our Heavenly Father.

Why have I written thus! Because of a profound sense of our responsibility for this great work. We have agencies to provide for their daily living, for their churches, school buildings and hospitals; but something more is needed to make them strong to do efficient work. They need sympathy and the assurance that the home parishes have them in loving remembrance. That is why the Prayer Partnership Plan has been devised. It is bringing wonderful results in many places, those where there is faithfulness on both sides, of the home and of the missionary partners. The response is quick and inspiring. When understood, no parish branch will be without its missionary.

Seventeen missionaries have been assigned to our Auxiliary. They are located in many places—China, Japan, the South, Alaska and the West Indies. Twenty branches have adopted them as prayer partners. But instead of twenty there ought to be two hundred the number of our branches. We all know what a letter from a friend means. It makes life worth while. It broadens our horizon. It warms our hearts. It strengthens our purpose, especially if there is the assurance that prayer is being offered for us. I am sure such an offering of special service would vivify

every department of our missionary work, and so bring splendid results. Our United Thank Offering needs this very thing to supplement its beautiful work. Its two hundred missionaries would love it and grow more joyful and efficient. One missionary writes: "You cannot know how much your prayers and interest help me in the work. I come in tired and out of heart and find a sweet letter or card of remembrance, and at once everything becomes easier and the work a blessed service."

Why not take up the role of comforter and encourager? A few letters each year, a prayer every day require little time and effort; but what powerful agents lighting the heavy load of the faithful missionary! I hope our Auxiliary will form a solid cordon of prayer and interest around the missionaries assigned to us. When the purpose of the Prayer Partnership Plan is fully realized, it will be adopted, because it is so simple and so perfectly adapted to its purpose of bringing us into personal and effective touch with our missionaries.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

During the year 1927 the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese has sent two hundred boxes of clothing, household and hospital supplies and surgical dressings to twelve clergymen, four Indian catechists and fourteen institutions, besides \$5 Christmas gift boxes to fifteen women missionaries, amounting in total value to \$12,187.10. The Girls' Friendly Society sent \$691.24 of this amount, and \$144.14 came from the Supply Work Fund.

The institutions to which these boxes went are, St. James' Mission, Lydia, Va.; St. Andrew's Mission, Keokuk, Va.; St. Cyprian's Mission, Bern, N. C.; Rosebud Indian Mission, Mission, S. D.; St. Paul's Church, St. Croix, V. I.; St. Philip's Normal and Industrial School, San Antonio, Texas; St. John's Mission Hospital, Jackson, Wyoming; St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, N. C.; and the Seaman's Church Institute, New York; also the following places in the 1927-28 allotment: Corn Creek (Indian) Mission, Allen, S. D.; McIlhany Parish, Charlottesville, Va.; Fort Valley High and Industrial School, Fort Valley, Ga.; Cluett House, Honolulu; and St. Timothy's Hospital, Liberia.

It is encouraging to note that every Archdeaconry except one sent a larger amount this year than last, and that one sent an unusually large amount in 1926.

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF COMFORT CLUB

Numerous inquiries frequently received indicate that there are many who know little or nothing about the Comfort Club; and while it is not advisable to broadcast details too generally, owing to the confidential character of the work, this report offers an excellent opportunity for once again making a brief explanation in regard to it.

The Comfort Club is the department of the Woman's Auxiliary which supplements the salaries of some of the clergy of the Diocese with gifts of clothing and household linens contributed for the purpose by interested church organizations and individuals.

As a rule, the small stipend which a struggling parish is able to pay is by no means sufficient to meet the many demands upon it; and it is in such cases that the Comfort Club likes to lend a helping hand. Those who, during the past year—as in years previous—have made this possible by gifts of time, service, and money, can have a feeling of happy satisfaction in knowing that they have gained the heartfelt gratitude of many members of what may be called the Comfort Club “Family.”

During the year 1927, new articles with a total valuation of \$1,507.33 were received. In addition to these, the usual liberal donation of useful gifts and candy for Christmas distribution was greatly appreciated, and mention should be made of the large amount of used clothing received; much of it has been most helpful. Boxes to the value of \$1,582.70 have been sent for Diocesan missions; a goodly quantity of serviceable clothing has gone to two of the Mission Stations allotted to the Diocese, and two boxes were sent to the committee in charge of the Mississippi River Flood Relief Work.

As the demands of the work vary from time to time, societies contemplating sewing for the Comfort Club are requested to consult their Archdeaconry Supply Managers in regard to what is most needed, and are also asked to report promptly to them when boxes are sent, stating value of same.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING TREASURER

1927

The second year of the Triennium of 1925-1928 has passed, and shows a balance on hand toward the United Thank Offering of 1928 of \$18,383.97. Of this amount, \$8,912.68 came from the parishes and missions, \$411.57 is interest, and \$9,059.72 the balance from last year. Last year the total contribution from the Diocese was \$7,545.63, so that we can show a gain of \$1,367.05 over 1926. The amount given this year comes from 128 parishes and missions and one individual, a gain of twenty this year.

In the matter of supplies, the Diocesan Treasurer has sent out 1774 "Little Blue Boxes," and 812 "U. T. O." envelopes. Two "Letters of Reminder," one in May, and the other in October, have been sent to 171 parish treasurers, to urge upon them the necessity of keeping before the women of their parishes the purpose and the need of the United Thank Offering in the life of the Church.

It cannot be stressed too strongly that the parishes strive not only to keep the good records that they achieved last Triennium, but that they endeavor to go ahead on the same basis of increase

as that of the Diocese, and that those parishes who contribute to the United Thank Offering only in the Triennial year begin at once to make this contribution "bigger and better than ever before." One parish has, this last year, given ten dollars to the "U. T. O." after a period of thirty-three years of non-contributing, and the treasurer trusts that some who find themselves in a similar state will follow the good example set by this parish.

The hopes of maintaining and of advancing the good works for which the United Thank Offering is responsible rest entirely on what the women of each Diocese and missionary district contribute through that offering. It is many years since the women of Connecticut went backward—the increase since 1916 has been most commendable—so let us all try for the coming year, to "pray more fervently, labor more diligently and give more liberally," that the United Thank Offering of 1928 may be an adequate expression of the love and the gratitude in our hearts.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR THE DAUGHTERS OF THE CLERGY

The Bureau of Relief was formed by Bishop Doane in 1865. In 1875 it began helping toward the education of the daughters of the clergy. That was six years before the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary. In 1881 the Woman's Auxiliary absorbed the Bureau of Relief. Up to that time it had forty-two scholars on its list from fifteen dioceses, beside two daughters of missionaries in China. Since then eighty have been helped. The grants have been made from one year to six years. A few have received a full college education. All have been in excellent schools, much to the relief of their parents.

This year six have received grants, five of \$150. The original grant was \$100; but living expenses have so greatly increased that a larger grant has been needed.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN DIRECTOR OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

Madam President and Members of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council:—

In making this, my first report as your Diocesan Director of the Church Periodical Club, I must confess to a feeling of disappointment that I have not been able to accomplish more in the past year. I feel that this work is one that should appeal to every woman in our Diocese, and every parish should have its Branch Secretary, and a live organization in carrying on this particular part of our Church work. The Church Periodical Club was founded, as we all know, or should know, nearly forty years ago, with the idea of being of real service to our men and women who were doing our Lord's work in far-off lands or right here at home, and yet were unable to have the magazines and papers and books that we have. We have all been taught that it is more blessed to give than to receive, and I feel very strongly that if each one of us goes home from this meeting with that in mind, and with the determination that in her parish this work is going to be actively carried on, my report next year will be much larger.

It has been my privilege to visit twenty-five parishes during the year, and I have tried by personal contact to pass on to them the purposes and ideals of the Church Periodical Club; and while the report does not show the gain I hoped it would in the number of active Branch Secretaries, still I feel that a beginning has been made.

It was my privilege last week to go to Massachusetts to the Provincial Meeting, and to have the opportunity of attending a conference of the women of the Dioceses of New England, representing the Church Periodical Club, and to hear what was being done by them.

In quoting from the autumn number of the Message: "Meanwhile here in the office are cards filled out with the names of people who have grown to depend on the C. P. C. for periodicals, and of others who have been commended to us for like service. Shall we not be willing to make some extra sacrifice to give them what they need? Must the C. P. C., after almost forty years, be it seems to me that the cost of postage has a great deal to do with the falling off, and I have been suggesting that where the postal rates exceed the cost of the magazine, the person subscribe for the magazine. Please don't forget to mark the date the subscription runs out, and renew that subscription enough in advance so that the recipient will not receive a notice that it is running out, or have any lapses in the numbers of magazines.

We have eighty-four branches, which shows an increase of two over last year; but alas, of these eighty-four only about thirty-five are really active. In response to the letters and enclosed annual report blanks sent out in the early fall, I have received reports from only thirty-three secretaries.

Since taking over the work last December, I have written 608 letters to the various secretaries, and Miss Thomas, and also sent out two circular letters to each secretary. I have received in return, 397 letters from these secretaries, and Miss Thomas. There have been many changes in the secretaries this year, twelve resigning, fifteen new ones, and there are four branches that are without secretaries at the present time. I am very glad to report that there are two entirely new branches, with secretaries.

I wish at this time to express my sincere appreciation and thanks to Mrs. Dryhurst of the Hartford Archdeaconry for her work. I wish every Archdeaconry would follow the example of the Hartford Archdeaconry, and appoint a secretary to carry on the work of the Church Periodical Club. I am glad to report at this time that New Haven has done so, and we have a very able young woman to carry on this work in Miss Katherine Matthies of New Haven. Fairfield has said that she would appoint one shortly, and I am hoping that before we begin our year's work I may be notified that such an appointment has been actually made. In closing, I wish to express also my thanks to the Parish Secretaries and to the donors themselves for the kind response to, and their co-operation with, their new Diocesan Director.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1927

OF THE

CHURCH MISSIONS PUBLISHING COMPANY

To the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Connecticut:—

The Church Missions Publishing Company beg to report under the three divisions submitted below.

In making this report we gratefully acknowledge the contribution of \$100 by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Connecticut. This is about equivalent to the cost of one of the Company's eight yearly publications. It is, therefore, of substantial help. But even more encouraging to us are the prestige given to the Company by the name of the Auxiliary and the personal interest of the Churchwomen who are leaders in the support of Missions by this Diocese. We gratefully thank you. Details of our work follow.

Publications of 1927**Soldier and Servant Series**

1. "The Mansfields and the Church." This is a collection of five monographs, the central one of which is of the Rev. Dr. Richard Mansfield, for seventy-two years missionary of the S. P. G. and rector of the church in Derby during colonial, revo-

lutionary, and national times. Prefixed are monographs on Mr. Richard Mansfield, the pioneer, and the old Mansfield House; following it, on the Rev. Dr. A. R. Mansfield, superintendent of the Seamen's Church Institute in New York, and the Hon. Burton Mansfield, D. C. L., Chancellor of the Diocese of Connecticut.

2. "Theodore, the Monk of Tarsus, and Seventh Archbishop of Canterbury." A monograph by the Rev. Melville K. Bailey, concerning the prelate of whom George Macaulay Trevelyan writes that he was "perhaps the greatest Prince of the Church in all English history"; including accounts of the Synod of Hertford and the Synod of Hatfield.

3. "Bishop White of Pennsylvania." A reprint of the history by Dean Colladay, written when he was professor in the Berkeley Divinity School, bringing out clearly Bishop White's personality and his influence in Church polity. Prefixed to this is a summary of early missionary work in Pennsylvania, from the History of Christ Church, Philadelphia, by its present Rector, the Rev. Louis C. Washburn, D. D.

4. "The Bishops Calendar for 1928." Subject: "Church Colleges in the United States of America." Brief sketches, with illustrations, of William and Mary, Hobart, Trinity, Kenyon, St. Stephen's, and the University of the South.

The Church in Story and Pageant

1. "He Liveth." An Easter mystery, by Miriam Denness Cooper. This had, perhaps, the widest distribution immediately following its publication of all dramas set out by the Company.

2. "The Wrestler at Jabbok." A dramatic interpretation of the spiritual development of the Patriarch Jacob. An earlier play by Miriam Denness Cooper.

3. "From Kashime to Church." A personal narrative in brief of the work of the Rev. Dr. John W. Chapman, priest and head of Christ Church Mission at Anvik in Alaska since its founding in 1887. By Mrs. Chapman.

4. "Hertford, England—Hartford, New England." A charming history and description of the Royal Borough, by Lady Inez Percy; with a similar treatment of Hartford; both copiously illustrated. (Note: This is chiefly the work of the Misses Beach, and received a laudatory review in the Hartford Times. The State is indebted to these ladies for an historical contribution of great value.—M. K. B.)

Prospectus for 1928. This includes a short life of the Rev. Dr. John Binney, for many years the eminent Professor of Hebrew in the Berkeley Divinity School, and sometime its Dean. From material furnished by Mrs. Binney and alumni of Berkeley.

"Anvik Illustrated," a collection of pictures of Dr. Chapman and of the mission buildings, groups of natives, and scenery.

"Followers of the Trail." Four stories of the four great trails in the West; followed by missionaries of the Church. By Sarah Lowrie. Four previous publications bound in one volume.

"Boston in England, Boston in New England"; "York in England, New York in America"; and other similar volumes, in the style of "Hertford and Hartford," to be written by Churchmen for Churchmen, linking together the Church in the old and the new English-speaking world.

One or more Church dramas or mystery plays are under consideration.

We trust the past year's work commends itself to the Auxiliary, and will have the interest of its members in the coming year.
