In Memorium

Rt. Rev. Edward Campion Acheson, D.D.

Septuagesima Sunday, 1934

In the death of Bishop Acheson the Woman's Auxiliary has met with an irreparable loss. His eager enthusiasm and keen interest throughout the years of our association with him have always been inspiring.

We wish to record our deep appreciation of all that he has meant to us individually, as well as to our organization, and our very real sorrow in the loss of his leadership.

Our sincerest sympathy goes out to Mrs. Acheson, our beloved Honorary President.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As your President I have attended all Board meetings and Diocesan meetings, also all Archdeaconry meetings except one. I was also a delegate from the Province to the Synod, and as President I presided at the Provincial meeting. I have also visited a number of parishes.

The past year has presented many problems. We are trying out the experiment of two Diocesan meetings instead of one, the character of the two meetings to be quite different—one, the November meeting, to be purely inspirational with no business; the January meeting to be strictly a business meeting, though we hope always to have outside speakers on some phase of the work. This meeting is to be a delegated meeting. This does not mean unnecessary red tape. It is rather to insure there being at least two people at the meeting qualified to speak for their parish, and even more important, two people who, because they represent their parish, will feel the responsibility of carrying back a full report of the meeting.

We hope both types of meeting will be of real help in our work.

The period of depression through which we are passing has begun to affect our budget seriously. We failed this year to meet the budget by over two hundred dollars. By economy we have succeeded in paying all bills and meeting all obligations. We are reducing the budget still further the coming year. Further cuts in our expenses cannot be made without loss of efficiency. No cut has been made in our gifts thus far, and I hope none will be required. Our pledge to the Diocesan quota is needed as never before, and any reduction in the amount would be serious.

While realizing the difficulties, it would seem that we are losing contributors with no corresponding gains to offset the loss. The amounts given in the white envelopes are small. There are many more women who could give five cents a month; many who could give twenty-five cents; and, of course, this need not be the maximum. Systematic giving would help. A sum which given monthly would not be felt looks large at the end of three months, and larger still at the end of the year when multiplied by twelve.

Those who send back the envelopes the first quarter with their gift for the entire year may be giving all they can afford, but in many cases if they would take the extra trouble of putting an envelope in the offertory each month, they would find they

were able to increase the amount for the year. I am sure you will give this thought and decide conscientiously.

I want to remind you also that only a short time remains before our United Thank Offering will be taken to Atlantic City. Let us make it a great expression of thanksgiving for the many blessings we have received.

I want to tell you of a new venture tried out last June; namely, the conducting of a class on the Woman's Auxiliary at the Summer Conference in Pomfret. Miss Pardee, Miss Noble and I shared in teaching. We had a class of twenty-five young women and girls. As you know, for some years we have given scholarships to these Summer Conferences. This year we had twelve scholarship girls at Pomfret. It was a great privilege to meet and learn to know these girls. Mrs. Budlong spent a night at Pomfret, and the girls were invited to meet her. I doubt if the recipients of these scholarships have ever known before to whom they were indebted for them. They were most appreciative of the help of the Woman's Auxiliary. The girls this year were a fine group, and will carry back to their parishes enthusiasm, new ideas, and leadership.

The Poster Contest which Miss Matthies has started, for the Church Periodical Club, should produce excellent results. Owing to the very short time allowed, the number of posters received is small, and it seems best to extend the time. The contest is open to anyone in the Diocese, and we feel sure there is plenty of latent talent waiting to be discovered.

Perhaps I have seemed to dwell too much on our material needs. Money is neither our aim nor end, but we all know it is a fair gauge of the sincerity and depth of our spiritual development, not in the amount of the gift but in the self-sacrifice involved, though I rather question the use of the word self-sacrifice. It doesn't hurt when we give to those we love. It is a joy to do so. Therefore, it is more love we need, and all material things will be "added unto us."

In closing this report I want to send a New Year's greeting to every member of the Auxiliary through you, their representatives here, and to wish you a year of growth and of renewed consecration and thanksgiving for the privilege of working for Christ and His Church.

MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER ANNUAL MEETING, 1933

The fifty-third Annual Meeting (one of a purely inspirational nature), of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on Friday, November 3rd, 1933, at Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford.

The Communion Service, at 10:15 A. M., was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. E. C. Acheson, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Frederick G. Budlong, the Very Rev. Samuel R. Colladay, and Canon Plumb. Approximately 550 women and clergy received, the largest number, so far, present at this service. Bishop Budlong preached the sermon on the texts, "Because thou art lukewarm," and "If I may but touch His garment," pointing out the difficulties of lukewarmness, and showing how it is our duty to bring God back to His world, a world of faith, of peace, and of love. Communion Alms amounted to \$100.52.

At noon, the President, Miss Loomis, called the meeting to order. After a brief welcome, in order to comply with the Constitution, she asked for a motion to adjourn the business meeting until January 10th, 1934. Miss Nettleton made such a motion, Mrs. Newman seconded it, and it was carried. Further information in regard to this meeting was given by Miss Loomis, who urged a good attendance.

A letter was read from Bishop Perry expressing regret at his inability to accept Bishop Acheson's invitation to be present and to speak to the Auxiliary.

A cordial invitation to visit the quarters of the Missionary Lending Library was extended.

Miss Mary Louise Pardee, Chairman of New Haven Arch-deaconry, spoke on "Practical Ideals For An Auxiliary Branch." She first pictured the various types of parish groups, showing how they may be bettered. Then she gave practical helps toward that betterment, founded on education, organization and program.

Mrs. D. D. Taber of Charleston, South Carolina, Field Worker for the Atlantic Coast, enlarged upon a number of Miss Pardee's points, but stressed "Program Building." A program must be built to meet the requirements of groups of varying interests and backgrounds. It must cover all phases of Auxiliary work. The technique to be followed calls for a survey of the field and women as they are to-day; for preparation of a suggested program to be accepted by all groups in the church; and the certain carrying out of that program, after it has been received to suit the majority. In the speaker's opinion the great opportunity

for the Auxiliary to-day is that of bringing the Kingdom of God on earth.

Recess for the customary box lunches in the Parish House was taken at 1:00 o'clock, and promptly at 2:00 o'clock the Roll and Woman's Auxiliary Pledge for the Diocesan Quota for Missions were called. Though actual figures showed 731 responding to the Roll, made up of 680 women and 51 clergy, it is believed that a much larger number was present during the day. The Pledge was announced as \$1660.

It was voted to send a greeting to Mrs. Acheson, who, for the first time in many years, was unable to be present.

At the Missionary Service at 2:30 P. M., Bishop Acheson urged the support of all in the observance of the Quiet Day of Prayer on November 11th.

The missionary speaker, the Rev. Vincent Gowen of the Philippines, dealt with the present day attitude towards missions and religions other than our own; the place of Christianity among them, and its relation to them; and the methods used by the Christian missionary in his work among the native Igorots, as he endeavors to fit them to live in their own surroundings, through the mediums of religion, education, and medicine.

The offering at this service was \$137.82. The purpose for which it is to be used will be determined at the Annual Business Meeting.

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MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING, 1934

The adjourned fifty-third Annual Business Meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at Trinity Church Parish House, New Haven, on Wednesday, January 10th, 1934. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A. M. by the President, Miss Loomis, who presided. Prayers were offered by the Rev. Charles O. Scoville, rector of the hostess church. These were followed by the singing of two verses of Hymn 464.

Annual reports of the following Diocesan Officers were read: the President, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries, Treasurer, Supply, Comfort Club, and Educational Secretaries, and United Thank Offering Treasurer, as were those dealing with the

Prayer Partnership Plan and Education of Daughters of the Clergy. It was voted to accept these reports.

Reports submitted by cooperating organizations were those of the Missionary Lending Library, the Church Missions Publishing Company, and the Church Periodical Club. These reports were accepted by vote.

In the absence of Mrs. Henry Wolcott, Provincial Vice-President of the C. P. C., due to illness, Miss Matthies, Diocesan Secretary of the Club, gave particulars in regard to the Provincial Project of furnishing books to the rural parishes of northern New England.

A visit from Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, Vice-President and Treasurer of the National Council, with an urgent message that we ascertain God's purpose and do our best to carry it out, was a welcome surprise.

Noon-day prayers were offered by Bishop Budlong, who spoke a few words in appreciation of Dr. Franklin's great service to the Church. He also brought a greeting from Bishop Acheson, kept at home by illness. He acknowledged Auxiliary support of the Church Mission of Help.

Rev. Percy F. Rex, Editor of "The Connecticut Churchman," spoke in behalf of that paper.

Four recommendations of the Finance Committee, and the Budget for 1934 of \$7,910, submitted by the Treasurer, Mrs. Forsyth, were adopted by vote.

The amendment to the By-Laws giving the vote to all the officers of the six Archdeaconries was adopted.

Two verses of Hymn 477 were sung.

Roll Call showed 341 present, 25 clergy, 145 delegates, and 171 members.

Adjournment for lunch was taken at 12:55 P. M.

The meeting was called to order for the afternoon session at 2:00 P. M., and opened with the singing of two verses of Hymn 468. Comprehensive reports of Archdeaconry activities were given by the Chairmen of Fairfield, Hartford, Middlesex, and New Haven. The Chairmen of New London and Litchfield were unable to be present, and sent no reports.

The report of the National Executive Board was presented by Miss Marguerite Ogden of Maine, Provincial Representative. Miss Ogden's introduction was a gracious one of associations with Connecticut. She pictured a changing world and the stability of the Church, and urged that we put these things we have always known into a new technique. She discussed some of the things considered by the National Board during the year, such as program helps, the training of young women for missionary work,

the outcome of this year's test of the United Thank Offering, and religious education, with emphasis on the 1933-34 study theme of "Christ and the Modern World." The Quiet Day of Prayer on November 11th, was the outgrowth of a vote taken at Denver, and was observed in every Diocese of the United States, as well as in other countries around the world. Preparations for the Triennial meeting are under way, and will be as simple as possible.

Announcement was made of Miss Mary Louise Pardee's election as next Provincial Representative on the National Board.

Mrs. Harold Sperry of St. Paul's Church, New Haven, spoke on "How One Highly Organized Branch Functions." Her branch has a fourfold purpose of prayer, study, fellowship, and service, carried out by numerous committees, each reporting at every meeting. She told at length of special committee work.

Mrs. Starr told briefly "What a Rural Branch Can Do." Though the groups are exceedingly small, they are carrying out all phases of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, especially through the spirit of neighborliness. Round tables follow the program with opportunity for discussion. In the speaker's opinion, the most important point is to have a program.

Miss Katherine Grammer, Field Worker in the Colleges, introduced her talk with explanation of the name of her car, "Pecusa" (Protestant Episcopal Church-United States of America). She discussed questions regarding the college's detrimental influence upon a girl's religion, and the Auxiliary's opportunity to meet this problem. College weans the girl away from religion by giving her too many things to do, and fails to witness to the importance of religion. A remedy may be found by the concerted effort of church women toward making the college realize that religion must have a place, while further assistance may be given by helping the girl herself to establish a technique.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved.

After the singing of two verses of Hymn 533, adjournment was declared at 3:55 P. M.

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RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. That the "Morning Pledge" (1933) be given to the Diocesan Quota for Missions.
2. That the sum of \$75 from the offering at the November, 1933, meeting be given for the Special Project of the Province of New England.
3. That the Corporate Communion Alms be given to the Bishop of the Diocese, to be used for Altar furnishings within the Diocese.
4. That if, after meeting the expenses listed in the "Budget for 1933," there be a balance at the end of the current year, it be added to the Reserve Fund.

THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

You all know what a difficult year it has been to fill the allotments, and I hope you realize how hard a year it has been on the clergymen, and the missions, schools and hospitals to which your boxes have been sent, and how doubly they have been appreciated. The present year calls for just as great efforts on your part, as the need is more pressing than ever.

During 1933 personal boxes have been sent to twenty-one clergymen and Christmas gifts to fourteen women missionaries. The Chapel of Rest, or Patterson School, Legerwood, N. C., has received twenty-seven boxes valued at \$608; Calvary and Associate Missions, Charleston, S. C. (colored), twenty boxes worth \$811; and a colored school, Fort Valley, Ga., High and Industrial School, fifty-five boxes worth \$807. Thirty-eight of these were small boxes from the Girls' Friendly Society. The Indian work, Santee and Yankton Missions, Greenwood, S. D., had thirty-three boxes, valuation \$915; and we sent further afield seven boxes worth \$114 to St. Luke's Korean Mission in Honolulu, and thirteen boxes worth \$692 to St. Andrew's Mission in Porto Rico. The largest amount of all, \$1,003, went to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C., in twenty boxes; and small amounts were sent to Brent Hospital, at Zamboanga in the Philippines and Emerald-Hodgson Hospital, Sewanee, Tenn.

The Seaman's Church Institute received two boxes, and two missions on the new allotment—the Appalachian School, Penland, N. C., and the Church of the Redeemer, Pineville, S. C., have each had three small ones. The Supply Fund has furnished three Indian catechists' suits, as well as overalls and dispensary supplies and a few odds and ends for various missions.

The total value of the boxes this year was \$8,473.87—about \$300 less than the previous year. Let us try not to fall below this amount in 1934.

FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMFORT CLUB

Cash contributions of \$276.25 and boxes valued at \$128.87 were received from nineteen parishes during the year 1933. New clothing and household linens amounting to \$546.83 were sent for Diocesan Missions, and \$64.75 for Domestic Missions.

It is generally known that rectors' salaries, especially in some of the smaller parishes, are very much in arrears; and such assistance as some of these rectors have received has been greatly needed and warmly welcomed. One clergyman said that his box and small check arrived at a particularly "lean" time and that they seemed all the more helpful on that account. "It is a fine thing to see the Christmas spirit in so many hearts," he added. An acknowledgment from a college youth studying for the ministry contains the following: "I cannot thank you enough for what has been done for me. The nice things sent to me are the very things which I had hoped to have, but which I never could have had this year without the generous aid of the Comfort Club." His thanks, together with the gratitude of all others who have been reached through this organization are here passed on to the many devoted members of the Woman's Auxiliary, individually and collectively, who alone have made this assistance possible.

UNITED THANK OFFERING

Madame President and Members of the
Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Connecticut:

In presenting the annual report of the United Thank Offering of the Women of the Diocese, I feel that we have great cause for rejoicing because of the use we have made of the little blue boxes. In order to increase the amount of our offering each year, each one of us must realize the privilege we have in giving thanks for our many blessings, and place our mites in our boxes each day if possible, and also make use of the prayer that is printed upon the box—then we should study the printed matter which gives us such a fine understanding of the beginning of the little blue box, its growth and the wonderful help it is to our Church throughout the world. Then we should try to tell some friend the story, fill her with enthusiasm for the privilege of having and using one of these boxes, and so in the end attain the desired goal of every woman in our Church having one of them.

Because of this gift every three years to the Church, much work of the Church goes forward that otherwise could not be done. At the General Convention in Denver in 1931 it was voted to use the money for the following:

Ten per cent to be added to fund for Retired Missionaries.

\$75,000 for training more Women Workers.

\$201,000 for Buildings.

The remainder to be placed in the United Thank Offering at the Church Missions House.

By the above you see it trains women for the work in the Church, really equips them for it, then sends them out and maintains them both abroad and at home, provides for a retiring allowance when they are no longer able to serve actively, and permits the erecting of buildings not only at home but in widely scattered points, such as Alaska, Japan, Mexico, China, Porto Rico and Cuba.

We cannot all of us go out as missionaries, but we can lighten their burdens by our gifts.

We still have one more offering to be presented at the Convention in Atlantic City, and I do urge that we try to make that one as large as possible, so that our offering may not be more than one-third less than last Triennial. I wish we could make it only one-fourth less.

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THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

November 1933 to January 1, 1934

Owing to my not having taken the chairmanship of Religious Education for the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese until last November, there seems but little to report.

At the meeting in November, Miss Loomis asked me to tell

of the plan we had adopted and were using in New Haven Arch-deaconry, and I was then authorized to have sufficient book lists printed with suggested topics for study and leaders' helps for the whole Diocese. This has been done and put into the hands of many. The supply is now exhausted, but I am still having demands for more both in and out of the Diocese, which reveals that this little folder has filled a very definite need.

In this folder there was a suggested study topic for every type of parish—eleven in all—and a list of suggested books for personal reading in addition to background reading for leaders. It was felt that many women not able to connect themselves with any kind of definite study work are very glad to know just what to read to be informed churchwomen.

Since the fall I have visited many parishes, where I have conducted meetings and spoken on program planning. I have also written numerous letters and cards and have tried to give help whenever asked.

I am glad to take this opportunity to thank you for the honor of being your representative at Wellesley Conference last year. The inspiration received there is, as you know, a great help to all who attend. It is my hope that many parishes will send delegates to Wellesley next summer.

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THE PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN

The Prayer Partnership consists of thirty missionaries and ninety-six Auxiliary branches. A large family; so large that it is exercising considerable influence. This because it is the united effort of Christian women to increase the efficiency of our missionaries. Loving appreciation makes them joyous workers. They are women like ourselves. We know that friendly sympathy strengthens us in well doing.

There are always two sides to every enterprise. On the one side are the originators and supporters. On the other side are those that they employ to do the proposed work. Both sides must be faithful. Giving the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to the world is the greatest of all enterprises. It also has two sides.

We know our missionaries are giving themselves body and soul to this great enterprise, because they have left home and friends to tell the good news. Then as a keen observer says, they are not asleep but wide awake to seize every opportunity and correct every mistake, so they send us touching letters gladly. The rule is they are very grateful that there are those who are praying for them and truly interested in their work. Of the thirty, only one ever hinted that we were asking too much of them. They gladly sit up nights and give up part of their vacations that we may know how worth while this missionary work is, and that they may receive our much prized letters.

On the other side of the enterprise, how about us, the home partners? Do we write to them and pray for them as we should? Yes, that is the rule, too. This is a busy world, with many demands on time and strength. Yet we churchwomen do pray regularly and an occasional letter takes little time. Even to do this simple work, a helpful plan has been worked out. The Partnership is arranged in groups. The missionary is the center with from two to four branches like a bodyguard around her. Any letter received from her is passed around in the group, so that it may be read at their meetings and otherwise used. They may arrange to take turns in writing to her so that she may never seem to be forgotten. There are several groups that use this plan. It saves the missionary much writing, as well the correspondents, who are most important factors in the plan.

Someone will ask, "How about the chairman?" She must be in communication with both the missionaries and the branches, ready to help in every way. It would be a great assistance if the branches would report to her at least once a year so that she may know that all is well. She is like the busy mother of many dear children, some of whom are far away but others still in the old home. The children help her by helping one another. They will think out many wonderful ways of making this blessed work a real ministry.

It is encouraging to know that our young people are thinking seriously about going into the mission field. This last year two have gone from our Diocese—Miss Julia Clement from the Cathedral, to China, and Miss Lillian Tiff from Trinity, Seymour, to Alaska. The latter is the prayer partner of the New Haven Archdeaconry. May the Lord bless them.

Yes, we of the Woman's Auxiliary are deeply interested in our missions and our missionaries. We want every woman in the world to know that our Heavenly Father loves His children. The task is so great that we cannot do it alone; neither can our missionaries, so we are holding out the loving hand of deep

sympathy and we want them to tell us what they are doing, so that we may pray intelligently for their success.

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EDUCATION OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE CLERGY

Our Connecticut women began this work in 1865 before the Woman's Auxiliary was organized. The reason for doing so was the urgent appeals from many of our clergy, especially those in far off mission fields. After food and shelter were provided, the next necessity was help in educating their children. One hundred and fifty girls have been aided in this way. The record is interesting. Bishops and priests have shown their hearty approval. One hundred dollars for years meant as much as \$200 or \$300 now and schools were not as expensive. Each case was carefully considered, always at the recommendation of her bishop and when adopted was quietly and sympathetically looked after. Most of them became influential women.

Other diocesan organizations have experimented with the fund with more or less success and have given it up; while we, with our quiet, tactful method of working, have for sixty-eight years made it invaluable. It has appealed to the hearts of the clergy. It is real missionary work and is still as efficient as ever. Grants have been made this year to seven girls. We hope they will be encouraged in their brave efforts to make themselves efficient women.

Four of them are in college. They are at Vassar, Russell Sage, Columbia and Mount Holyoke. The others are in good schools. They are not alone, for great numbers of our young Churchwomen are pouring into our colleges and universities.

The outlook for the Church is most hopeful—we shall have thoroughly educated women to carry on its great mission.

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THE DIOCESAN LENDING LIBRARY

As in the past the Library has been most generously treated by the Cathedral. The Dean, by his interest in its object and work and by his wise forethought, gave it quarters in the strategic position which has been the chief factor in its growth. And hardly of less importance is allowing those in charge to tell of the work each month in "The Evangel." The editor of the paper and the full staff in the office, and we wish to add, the janitors as well, have been everything that could be wished for in their kindness and helpfulness. The Librarian finds it difficult to properly express her appreciation of all this, and of the help given to her, as well as to the Library, by the hearty co-operation of her assistants all through the year, especially during her four months' absence. Miss Randall is in charge during that time and all questions should be referred to her after January 1st, except in regard to the "Reading Club," of which Miss Elizabeth Howard is the Secretary. Her address is 123 Retreat Avenue. We trust that Miss Mabel Schumacher will continue her invaluable work of classifying and numbering the books. When the card catalogue was completed by Miss Randall in May she found that there were just one thousand books in the library; since then there have been added more than forty, which have been duly advertised in "The Evangel." For the books and cards pertaining to them and the full ordering of the work, the giving out and the receiving of books and replacing them in their proper order, aiding in every possible way any wishing to borrow books, the Librarian wishes here to acknowledge the most helpful co-operation of Mrs. Albert C. Jones, Miss Howard, Mrs. Smart, Mrs. Derby, Mrs. Hilton and Miss Kitty Wells, who week after week and month after month have taken their turn so that every Sunday and Wednesday has found one or more of them ready to help any one coming into the Library room. This is in the southeast porch of the Cathedral and is reached through the center doorway, which is open from 6:30 in the morning until 6:30 in the evening, every day of the

week. The card catalogues and the following of the few simple rules which are framed on the wall, will furnish all the information necessary to acquire any book in the Library. There is an additional room to the Library just above it where will be found rocking chairs and a table on which there are various publications and some American and English periodicals. And in one of the pews near the Nativity Chapel the Dean has had placed a special light, which anyone can use for devotional reading. The Church Missions Publishing Company, which works in close connection with the Library, gives it each year copies of all of its eight publications. Mail orders will be promptly attended to and stamps to the amount required to send the book should be placed just inside the book cover when returned, addressing it to the Library, 45 Church Street, Hartford, Connecticut.

That the Library has met a real want is, it seems, proved by the fact that anywhere from fifty books to a hundred (one week the number was one hundred and fourteen) have been out at one time, and since the books have been housed in this Cathedral vestibule more than one hundred and fifty people have been on our list of borrowers. Still we wish far more to enjoy and profit by our interesting and helpful books by borrowing them; and please ask Miss Howard about the Reading Club, and join it.

And last, but not least, we do want money to buy more books.

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THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

January 1, 1933 to January 1, 1934

The report of the Church Periodical Club this year is very encouraging, for the figures show a real increase all along the line. There are 737 magazines being sent regularly by 423 donors, a gain of seventy-nine magazines and fifty-three donors over last year. Part of this large increase is due to the fact that many more magazines than usual are being distributed regularly locally, the increase in magazines which are mailed being only about thirty. I am not going to make comparisons of other items, for that would be tiresome, but I am going to give the figures and let you look in last year's report to see the gain. Since January 1,

1933, 18,410 miscellaneous magazines, 10,956 Christmas and Easter cards, 12 Bibles, 942 books, 33 scrap books, 32 Victor records, and three packages of sheet music have been sent. In addition, 1,132 miscellaneous items, such as more scrap books, games, pictures, calendars, jig-saw puzzles, etc., have been reported to me. Thirty-nine institutions in the Diocese have been aided.

From time to time for several years small, undesignated money gifts have been made to the Church Periodical Club which I have kept to use for special appeals. This fall a Western clergyman who has been on our records for years asked for two religious books which he wanted. I ordered them sent to him and received a grateful acknowledgment. The books cost \$5.00, leaving a balance of \$7.95 in this special fund.

A gift of five dollars was used to purchase a Reference Bible for Miss Teague, rural worker in Maine, as a part of the Provincial project about which you will hear later in the day.

The contributions for the Library Fund have fallen off. Only \$29 was sent this year, as against \$72.70 last year. Very few secretaries filled in the financial report, but those who did spent \$364.32 during 1933. If all the secretaries would only send in their financial reports I am sure the total would be impressive.

We have had a special appeal for children's books from St. Mary's Church in Bluefield, Virginia. This Church School Library fills a great need as there is no community library. The appeal has met with a good response, as about two hundred books have been sent to the library.

Another appeal has been made by Miss Genevieve Cowles, who has charge of Parnassus on Wheels, a travelling library which makes the rounds of eight Connecticut county prisons about once in six weeks. There has been little response to this appeal, but I hope there will be a greater one, for the need is great since NRA forbids prison labor and so the prisoners have nothing to do. Books particularly needed at present are plays, histories and dictionaries, while the classics, biographies, travel books, technical books, law books, Bibles, etc., are always in demand. The only books not wanted are mystery and detective stories.

There have been four new branches of the Church Periodical Club formed, while two are temporarily inactive owing to the death of the secretaries. One long inactive branch has appointed a Secretary and is taking up the work again. There are still twenty-one branches with no secretaries. The total number of branches is still ninety-nine, for I assigned old and long unused numbers to the new branches.

I have been transferring my records of magazines and addresses from a note book to file cards as I feel that the latter is

a much simpler and more satisfactory way to keep the records. When there is a change of address or a discontinuance it is much easier (and neater) to write a new card or to remove one from the file than to cross out or write over on a note book page.

I have attended the May and November Diocesan Board Meetings, the Provincial Meeting in Providence, Rhode Island, and a meeting of the Provincial Project Committee in Concord, New Hampshire.

We have six Archdeaconry Secretaries to whose splendid co-operation this report is due.

More publicity for the Church Periodical Club being very desirous, it was decided at the Woman's Auxiliary Board Meeting in November to conduct a poster contest, and letters were sent out telling about the contest. The closing date was set as December 30th, but that proved to be too short a time, so the contest has been extended to March 15th. Please take that information back to your parishes and try to arouse interest in the contest in the various organizations of the parish. Think of the honor and the thrill of having your parish win a prize of ten or five dollars! Isn't that worth working for? I just hope I am going to be deluged with posters!

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THE CHURCH MISSIONS PUBLISHING COMPANY, 1933

To the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary:

The Church Missions Publishing Company would again thank the Woman's Auxiliary for their generous gift of \$100 toward our work, which has enabled us to publish one of our most important books, in addition to the regular serial numbers.

In the field of missionary activity our standard text book, **Indian Tribes and Missions**, has been fully brought up to the records in the latest U. S. Government reports, and developments of our own Mission as far as the end of 1932, and was recommended in the **Spirit of Missions** for use in the domestic course for the 1933 United Study. Much appreciation has been expressed at home, in the South, and in the Indian field for gift copies.

One of our missionaries, Mrs. Paul H. Barbour, now in the

Rosebud Mission District of South Dakota, has contributed **A Teacher of St. Mary's in the Famine District of China**, an account of relief work in the Province of Chi Li, under her maiden name of Margaret Hart Bailey. This was the Company's supplementary contribution to the year's chosen United Course on Missions in the Foreign Field.

The gift of the Auxiliary has made possible one of our most notable publications, a Spanish translation of the Instruction by the Rt. Rev. Frank E. Wilson, D. D., Bishop of Eau Claire, entitled, **What Every Churchman Ought to Know**. This translation by the Rev. Ronaldo Gonzalez, **Lo Que Todo Miembro de la Iglesia Episcopal Debe Saber**, is primarily for use in Cuba by its mover, Archdeacon John H. Townsend, Jr., but we hope that it will be extended to the Panama Canal Zone, Porto Rico, the Philippine Islands, and, if possible, Mexico.

For a field now much in the press we are setting forth **Children of the Dark**, a selection of sketches of the Church's ministry in Liberia, from a longer series by the Rev. Elwood Lindsay Haines.

The past year, as we know, has been marked by two commemorations, the election of Dr. Seabury to the Episcopate, and the Centenary of Keble's Assize Sermon.

Our colonial history was represented by **Christ Church, Stratford**, contributed by Raymond Baldwin, Esq., which fittingly introduced the Seabury literature, namely:

An historical drama with the title, **The Furthest West**, from a poem by Bishop Coxe, written by Miss Inez Temple. This was presented in St. Paul's Church, Woodbury, on the Feast of the Annunciation, 1933, Bishop Acheson taking the part of Bishop Seabury. Mr. Hiram Percy Maxim made a series of moving pictures of this, which, it is hoped, will be incorporated into the national series representing Church History.

This was followed by a group of historical writings of the Seabury cycle by the Rev. Dr. George T. Linsley:

His history of **The Old Glebe House at Woodbury** was reprinted, the previous edition having been exhausted, with supplements. Two others followed:

The Sesquicentennial Sermon, preached in St. Paul's Church, Woodbury, on the Feast of the Annunciation, 1933.

Bishop Seabury, an account of his life and episcopate. Bound in with this were two letters of great historical importance, one from Bishop Seabury to Bishop John Skinner in 1784, and a letter from Bishop Skinner to Bishop Petrie conveying Bishop Seabury's. These letters were found by the present Bishop of Aberdeen, and by him given to Bishop Acheson.

The **Episcopate of Samuel Seabury**, by Dr. Linsley, suitably rounds out his current works.

In harmony with these we have published **Seabury Centennial Letters from Scotland**, by the Rev. Samuel Hart, D. D., written to members of his family in the autumn of 1884.

Also, **Seabury Centennial Letters from Scotland**, written during the same period by the Rt. Rev. John Williams, D. D., to friends at home.

These two collections of Letters relate scenes and incidents of travel in Scotland by members of the Connecticut Delegation to the Centennial Commemoration at Aberdeen on November 4th, 1884, of the Consecration of Bishop Seabury by Bishops Kilgour, Petrie and Skinner.

The Centenary of the beginnings of **The Oxford Movement**, or Anglo-Catholic Revival, was marked by a sermon on that theme, preached by the Rev. Henry Erskine Kelly at the Annual Convention of the Diocese in 1933, and published at the request of the Bishop of Connecticut.

Our final publication for 1933 was a short Life of the Rt. Rev. William Croswell Doane, D. D., LL. D., D. C. L., first Bishop of Albany, by the Rev. George Lynde Richardson, D. D., sometime Dean of All Saints' Cathedral, Albany. It is a very richly condensed life of that great prelate, and illustrated by twelve plates, of the Bishop, of Church edifices, and of his St. Bernard dog, "Cluny."

In sequence to this we purpose issuing a booklet entitled, "An Easter Coronet," a selection of poems by Bishop George Washington Doane, Dr. William Croswell, Bishop Coxe, and Bishop William Croswell Doane, with portraits of the four authors, whose poems and lives and influence were so closely inter-related.

In singular harmony with both the Seabury and the Anglo-Catholic literature, we plan a re-issue of **Nashotah House**, with its Head, the Rt. Rev. William Walter Webb, D. D., a pupil of Dr. Hart and of Bishop Williams, with a sketch of the life of Bishop Webb by the Rev. Robert D. Vintner, and additional notes by Dean Nutter.

Suitable to the whole group we have in hand the story of **Jarvis House**, including a visit by Lafayette. The material was collected by Mr. Charles E. Jackson, and is contributed by Miss Selina Jackson.

And we are in correspondence with the Very Rev. Dr. Perry, Dean of Edinburgh, in the hope of securing a life of Bishop Skinner, an account of the history of the Non-Juring Bishops, and of the Prayer Books of the Church in Scotland.

In conclusion, may we again thank the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for their generous assistance, and express the hope that our publications will continue to be of help to their great service in the world-wide Mission of the Church.
