



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am glad to report that I have been able to attend both Diocesan meetings, all Board meetings, and also all Archdeaconry meetings. One thousand women from all over the Diocese were present at the November meeting. I have also attended the Provincial meeting which was held in October in Portland, Maine. It was a fine meeting, and we are trying to give you echoes of it at this time. The women feel very keenly the responsibility of the stronger Dioceses for the splendid rural work which is being carried on in Maine and New Hampshire.

We voted to raise \$800 to be divided between the Mountain-Mission-by-Mail, the training of a rural worker, and Miss Grammer's car. In the latter instance, you will remember that the women of the Province gave the car over three years ago, and you can readily realize that a turn-in is called for in the near future. Miss Van Doorn is going to tell you of the unique work that she is doing in connection with the Mountain-Mission-by-Mail.

Part of the money which is Connecticut's share has been taken from the Treasury, but I am hoping you will want to help this work along yourselves, and later in the day you will be given the privilege of doing something for this fine work. Miss Sanford is also going to tell you how you can help some of our own Connecticut girls.

I believe the year 1935 has been a distinct advance. Now, as we face 1936, let it be with courage and the determination to make it a banner year along every line of work.

Fairfield Archdeaconry:

The Fairfield Archdeaconry has had both an active and interesting year. The emphasis has been on the Mission field, and the response of enthusiasm for all the lines of work especially relating to it has been remarkably encouraging. The value of the box work, the U. T. O. collection, and the Woman's Auxiliary Pledge show a substantial increase. The reorganization of three parish branches and the formation of two Junior branches are also evidence of an increased activity. No small part of this is

due to the work of the Educational Department under the leadership of Mrs. Richard M. Coit. Each year more parishes work under her direction with a definite, planned program, and the interest in the Mission Study work has spread.

Last January the Archdeaconry held an Educational Meeting on "Japan," at Grace Church Parish House, Norwalk, with Mrs. Alfred Madison Chapman, vice-president, in charge of Education, Diocese of New York, as leader. Many small groups of parishes followed her outline by holding meetings during Lent. Notably, I wish to speak of the Study Group at Christ Church, Westport, under the leadership of Mrs. Charlotte Collender, and one at New Canaan in which all the Protestant churches joined, led by St. Mark's.

In March a meeting was held at St. John's, Stamford, in the interests of Junior Branches. The program was under the direction of the Chairman of the Archdeaconry with four excellent speakers who presented the work and organization of Junior Branches. The two active Junior Branches that I have already reported are the result of this meeting, and many other parishes are considering the formation of a Junior Branch.

The Annual Meeting was held at St. Paul's, Fairfield, on April 30th. The preacher at the Communion Service was the Rev. Richard Townsend Henshaw, Rector of Christ Church, Rye, N. Y. As this was the Tercentennial year of Connecticut, Mr. Henshaw's sermon was most timely, as he recalled the historical facts concerning the parishes along the Sound from Greenwich through Stratford, which were ministered originally by one of his predecessors at Rye, a Missionary of the Propagation of the Gospel. The afternoon session was a Missionary Conference at which the speakers were our own Bishop Budlong, Mrs. F. S. Boas, Vice-President of The Mothers' Union, England, and Father William Chalmers, O. H. C.

During the fall we had three Section Meetings. The first was held at Christ Church, Bridgeport, for twenty-one parishes, at which Miss Lillian Tift from the Ft. Yukon Hospital, Alaska, spoke. The second was held at St. Saviour's Church, Old Greenwich, at which the Very Rev. Arthur B. Kinsolving, II, spoke on "Brazil." This was held for twelve parishes, and had the largest attendance of any Sectional Meeting ever held—about one hundred being present. The third meeting was held at St. Stephen's, Ridgefield, where Miss Eleanor Snyder from Panama spoke. A brief conference for officers was held at the opening of each meeting, and a delightful tea was served at the conclusion by the entertaining Auxiliary. I consider of the greatest value these Section Meetings and the two special teas given by Miss Mann

for White Envelope Treasurers and by Mrs. Forbes for the U. T. O. Treasurers. They do much to bring the Mission Field into closer contact with the parish branches and give the personal touch which is of so much value in vitalizing our work.

Hartford Archdeaconry:

The Hartford Archdeaconry had its annual meeting at the Church of the Good Shepherd with Miss Marsden and Mr. Kinsolving as speakers.

In the fall a fine meeting of Parish officers was held in Tariffville to discuss plans for the year.

In December Miss Brown of the History Department of Smith College spoke on the church in Mexico.

More interest is manifested in better Parish organizations, and the outlook is encouraging.

Litchfield Archdeaconry:

The Chairman reports speaking in two places. Many branches report social service work in their communities.

Nine branches have had fine Educational programs. One branch has an excellent library of missionary information. This branch also reports ten new subscribers to the Spirit of Missions.

A fine meeting was held in Torrington in the spring, with a very full representation of the parishes of the Archdeaconry.

Middlesex Archdeaconry:

The Middlesex Archdeaconry, a distinctly rural one, with the exception of Middletown, has shown steady growth in interest and numbers. Of the eighteen parishes, twelve are active either with study groups or other phases of auxiliary work. Some of the women of the six remaining missions are reached at intervals by larger groups.

The Council continues planning the Archdeaconry activities. The first fall meeting of a business and social nature was held in Portland, and was a decided success. Following this meeting the largest delegation from the Archdeaconry ever known attended the Annual Diocesan Meeting in Hartford in November.

The co-operation of the Auxiliary with other of our own church organizations is encouraging. Work with other denominations and public welfare agencies has continued with renewed interest. The Auxiliary makes multiplied thousands of bandages and swabs for the Middlesex Hospital. Members comprise a majority on most of the boards of community organizations. Many younger women are joining.

Miss Grace Lindley, Executive Secretary of the National Council, was our guest speaker at the annual Archdeaconry meet-

ing. Seven girls were sent to the Pomfret conference in June. Five hundred envelopes were addressed for the Glebe House expansion program.

New Haven:

In presenting this report of Woman's Auxiliary work in the Archdeaconry of New Haven, it is given with a deep sense of gratitude that our efforts for the missionary work of the church have been so successful.

A realization of the meaning of Christian social service is beginning to dawn, and a willingness to contribute to the work is apparent in a few groups. The use of our Mission Study Book slowly increases, adding to our sympathetic knowledge of our mission and missionaries.

Under Mrs. Sargent's capable direction our Supply Work has been well done. Every sewing allotment was filled, and in these days that statement calls forth admiration. We long for the encouragement that really young women can bring to the work, and are grateful that they begin to form part of the increased attendance at meetings.

Mrs. Brewer's devoted work resulted in an increased U. T. O., as well as in the number of women using the Blue Box, and her fascinating U. T. O. Scrap Book contributes much to an understanding of the work.

Several neighborhood meetings have been held wherein groups shared a speaker. We trust this plan will be generally adopted.

Mrs. Bayard reports a completely corrected file for the Church Periodical Club. It has taken time and labor, and we trust parish secretaries for C. P. C. will report promptly any changes.

To our sorrow the White Envelope offering fell below our 1934 offering. It was not due to any lack of effort on the part of Mrs. Beers, our heroic treasurer. Early and late she spoke to us, urging us to meet our goal.

Our annual May meeting in 1935 was well attended, and we accepted an invitation from Seymour to meet there in May, 1936.

Many parishes observed the Quiet Day of Prayer, November 11th.

Miss Mabel Forbes of West Haven is appointed Secretary of Correspondence with our Prayer Partner, Lillian Tifft, who is at present home on furlough.

There is a great lack of vitality in our Rural Branches. They make little response to letters or to requests for reports, and fail to attend meetings from which they might derive much help and

inspiration. If there is any way in which we can better approach them, please suggest.

New London Archdeaconry:

The Chairman, Mrs. W. F. Williams, spoke in six parishes in the Archdeaconry during the past year and twice outside the Archdeaconry about the general Convention. She attended the annual meeting of the Archdeaconry held at Yantic on November 19th, and also two Diocesan meetings during the year. She visited a parish in Massachusetts and attended the Provincial Synod meeting in Portland and the Wellesley Conference.

There was an attendance of seventy-three (73) at the annual Archdeaconry meeting held in Yantic on November 19th, and there were thirteen rectors present, only two rectors in the Archdeaconry being absent. The program was along the lines of the "Forward Movement" and the sermon at the morning session was preached by Archdeacon Williams and the address at the afternoon meeting was by our Diocesan President, Miss Loomis. Mrs. C. M. Sheafe, Jr., gave a vivid word picture of the work of the Church Periodical Club.

Mrs. W. F. Williams, Chairman of this Archdeaconry, having expressed a very definite wish to give up the office of Chairman, a new Chairman, Miss M. Josephine Dickinson, was elected; also, it will be noted that the office of Vice-Chairman has been added to the list of officers this year, as it was felt that it would be very desirable to have this additional office. The Vice-Chairman will have a seat at Board meetings, but no vote except in the absence of the Chairman.

The usual work of the Branches has been carried on throughout the year, and it is believed with ever-increasing interest, and it is hoped the coming year may show continued gains in interest and activity in all phases of Auxiliary work.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING, 1936

The fifty-fifth Annual Business Meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Church Parish House, New Haven, on Friday, January 10th, 1936.

Miss Loomis, the President, presided, and called the meeting to order at 10:05 A. M. Reverend Theodore H. Evans, rector of the hostess church, offered the opening prayers, which were followed by the singing of two verses of Hymn 94. The Vice-President, Miss Pardee, then took the chair while the President presented her brief annual report and those of the six Archdeaconry Chairmen. These were accepted with appreciation. Other reports of the year's work were given by the Recording Secretary, who noted hitherto unannounced money gifts made by the Board of Managers during 1935, the Corresponding Secretary, the Treasurer, who read two letters of thanks for gifts received, and the united Thank Offering Treasurer. Each report was accepted by vote. Departmental reports were presented by the Supply Secretary, who also read a letter of appreciation, the Comfort Club, Educational and Church Periodical Club Secretaries. It was voted to accept these reports in a group. Group acceptance was also voted of those of the Prayer Partnership, the Church Missions Publishing Company, and the Diocesan Lending Library, all read by the Secretary, and that of Education for Daughters of the Clergy.

The report of the Finance Committee was made by Mrs. Forsyth. This embodied the Budget for 1936 of \$8,010—\$100 more than that of the previous year because of the inclusion of that amount to cover the expenses of the Educational Secretary. It also included five recommendations. It was voted to accept the Budget as read and each recommendation in turn.

In order to allow Diocesan officers to serve a full three years' term before the Triennial Meeting a minor amendment to the By-Laws was presented by the Secretary. An unanimous vote signified acceptance of the change.

Mrs. Sperry of New Haven, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, reported as nominees for office during the coming two year term the names of the present incumbents. The President called for further nominations, but as none were heard, upon an unanimous vote the Secretary was instructed to cast one ballot for the slate and the officers were thus duly re-elected. Miss Loomis made a gracious acceptance for all.

Noon-day prayers were offered by the Reverend Mr. Evans, and were followed by three verses of Hymn 480.

Roll Call showed thirty Clergy, 150 Delegates, and 204 Auxiliary members present, a total of 384.

The first speaker to be introduced was Miss Amy Van Doorn, in charge of the Mountain Mission by Mail in New Hampshire, made known to her hearers last year by Mrs. Hill, the Provincial President. Miss Van Doorn gave a detailed account of the teaching methods, the lessons, and the results of study in this unique Church School, where special emphasis is laid on the child's prayer life. Definite accomplishments are renewed interest in church services, the baptism and confirmation of some of the adults reached, and the opening of their hearts to face life, in a way not done before. To help this work, the Diocesan Board had appropriated \$150, and an opportunity was given to the parishes to pledge from the floor further sums which amounted to \$101.50.

Bishop Budlong, next introduced by the President, acknowledged the gift of Communion Alms and the support of the Woman's Auxiliary, especially through the Pledge. He reminded the assembly of the importance of the Forward Movement and the effect of each individual participation in it. He warned against immediate problems diverting the primary work of the organization, and called attention to the critical financial condition in the church today.

Recess for lunch was declared at 1:00 o'clock.

The afternoon session, called to order promptly at 2:03 P. M., opened with an account by Miss Florence Sanford, Executive Secretary of the Church Mission of Help, of her preventive work in this state among a sizeable group of girls 14 to 17 years of age. Since there is no provision made for them in Connecticut, girls are sent, as funds allow, to a school in Valhalla, New York, where they receive academic and occupational training and much needed recreation, in an effort to build up character and furnish spiritual help. Again an opportunity was provided to give, or pledge, toward all or part of a month's scholarship, which is \$10. Responses amounted to \$146.

Miss Mary Louise Pardee, Provincial Representative, brought word of the National Executive Board, made up of twenty women, who meet four times a year to work, play, and pray together. She gave her impressions of the group, noting the subjects discussed, and the questions upon which they were thinking. She suggested that the Auxiliary consider social questions, individual financial responsibility, its relationship with the young people of the Church, and each member her own personal religion.

The final speaker was Miss Eva D. Corey, President of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Massachusetts and a member of the National Council, whose subject was "The Challenge

of the Church to the Women of Today." Adventure and going forward were the keynotes of her talk. Comparison of the status of the Auxiliary sixty-four years ago with that of the present proved advancement. Miss Corey said that the Church expects its women to be intelligent, to serve the whole work of the whole Church fairly, and to follow our Lord's leadership. Since the Auxiliary was created by the National Council it is an organic part of the Church to help build the latter up. The Auxiliary should help infuse a sense of "mission" into various groups. A definite challenge exists today to bring life abundant to all, through a discipleship dependent upon our Master.

The minutes of this meeting were read and accepted.

After one verse of Hymn 490 was sung, adjournment was declared at 3:55 P. M.

The Board of Managers voted at its November 1935 meeting the following sums:

Twenty-five dollars to the Cathedral Chapter for part payment of the expenses of the choir at the Communion Service at the November Annual Meeting.

Twenty-five dollars toward the restoration of a school building damaged by tornado, maintained by a negro church in Forest City, Arkansas.

Fifty dollars to Rev. Clarence Wagner, of Groton, to purchase blue and white vestments for a girls' choir at the State Farm for Women in Niantic.

The total amount was taken from the Reserve Fund.

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THE NOVEMBER MEETING

On Friday, November 15th, 1935, the fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary opened at 10:15 A. M., with a service of Holy Communion. The Right Reverend Frederick G. Budlong, Bishop of the Diocese, was celebrant, assisted by the Right Reverend Chauncey B. Brewster, retired Bishop of Connecticut, the Very Reverend Samuel R. Colladay, Dean of the Cathedral, and the Cathedral clergy and choir.

Reverend Dr. John Plumb read the Epistle and Bishop Brewster the Gospel.

The sermon, preached by the Reverend Cornelius P. Trowbridge, rector of Grace Church, Salem, Massachusetts, was based on three verses similar in form, namely, from one of the Psalms, from the Gospel of St. John, and from St. Paul's Epistle to the Philippians. The first dealt with the prayer of a man to live the whole of his life in the presence of God, through the singling out of one supreme purpose, a purpose greater than self. The second was the reply of the blind man, "Whereas I was blind I now see," wherein Mr. Trowbridge spoke of first hand religion which he defined as "the things we know with inner certainty," the conviction that the things which matter are the things we believe. The third "One thing I do—I press on toward the mark" led to his consideration of the Forward Movement, the Church's present call to action, which must be met with courage, a spirit of adventure and an eagerness to go forward cutting loose from conservatism and fear. Each of us is asked by this movement to re-examine our discipleship, and to put all the power and effort we have into the life of the Church, within the Episcopal Church itself, the parishes, the Woman's Auxiliary branches. In referring to an emblem given to him by Bishop Hobson, who heads the Forward Movement, the speaker said he had questioned why the cross did not stand upright, but rested aslant, to receive the reply, "The cross moves forward." Mr. Trowbridge concluded his sermon with the thought that women are inheritors of a great tradition because they stood nearest the cross as our Lord gave up His life, and asked, "Will you go forward and show us the way?"

An innovation at this service was the presentation of parish United Thank Offerings by the respective Parish Treasurers, who, during the regular offertory, came in single file down the center aisle, placed their envelopes bearing parish and custodians' names on an alms basin held to receive them, and then returned to their places. It was most impressive, and the length of the line would indicate that a majority of the parishes were represented.

The Communion Alms amounted to \$148.98.

At the conclusion of the service at 12:30 P. M., a box luncheon was enjoyed in the parish house, where the ladies of the Cathedral as hostesses served tea and coffee.

Soon after one o'clock the meeting re-assembled in the Cathedral for Roll Call and the Woman's Auxiliary Pledge, when 809 women and 79 clergy, a total of 886, responded and a pledge, later announced as \$2,056.25, was taken.

During the Missionary Service Bishop Budlong gave highlights of his visit to Texas for the session of the House of Bishops,

and told of some of their proceedings. He, too, emphasized the Forward Movement, saying that the Bishops had accepted their responsibility to foster it, and to lead in spiritual endeavour. Our faith should make us share in this movement, especially through our money gifts, in view of shrinking budgets, and through an attempt to inspire others to also serve.

The visiting speaker, the Reverend Charles E. Whiston, went out to the mission field from Massachusetts to become chaplain to students at the University of Wuchang, Diocese of Hankow, China. Mr. Whiston pictured child life among the great Chinese population, where it is not respected, but is exploited in industrial and domestic life, especially among the girls. It is Christianity which has lifted women up and to which one looks for a change in the attitude of man toward woman. There were no schools for girls until the Christian missionaries entered the country. The speaker's own work dealt with about fifty Episcopalian students of whom ten were girls. He described the crowded, unhealthy conditions of their crude homes, for which the university endeavoured to substitute something with beauty, and to replace the low and superstitious native religion with Christianity in a cycle of worship, work, and worship, Holy Communion, classes, and Evening Prayer. Missionary hospital work in China helps to ease many of the prevalent ailments, though most cases cannot be cured. Here, too, is an opportunity to build up a new will to conquer the habit of opium-eating. An answer to the possible thought, "What can I do?" was that great things can be accomplished by a great host working together and combining individual little bits. We must think of these people as brothers and sisters in Christ. We cannot call ourselves Christians if we are not concerned with conditions as they are in China. Through daily communion with God we shall look up and catch the vision, and care for that for which He cares.

The offering of \$228.35 was given to Mr. Whiston for use in his work in Hankow.

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REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

I am happy to report that the value of boxes sent this last year through the Supply Department is larger than in any year since 1931. This is partly due to an unusually large amount sent to the Seamen's Church Institute; but even without that sum we did better than in 1934. I consider this most encouraging.

The total value was \$9,711.85. One-third of this amount went into personal boxes for twenty-one missionaries, Christmas boxes for seventeen women missionaries, and suits for four Indian Catechists. The other two-thirds went to the following mission schools, hospitals, and stations: Crow Creek Mission, Fort Thompson, S. D.; Epiphany Mission, Spartansburg, S. C.; Grace-House-on-the-Mountain, St. Paul, Va.; Holy Cross and Faith Memorial, Waverly Mills, S. C.; Prince of Peace Mission, Bemidji, Minn.; St. Anna's and St. John's Mission, Atmore, Ala.; St. Elizabeth's Mission, Honolulu, T. H.; St. Paul's (Ingham) Shenandoah, Va.; St. James Hospital, Anking, China, and St. Luke's-in-the-Desert, Tucson, Ariz., which made up our 1934-35 allotment. Also, to these four on our present allotment: Rosebud Indian Mission, Mission, S. D.; St. Mark's Mission, Dante, Va.; Christ School and Mission, Forrest City, Ark.; and Grace Hospital, Morgantown, S. C., and to the Seamen's Church Institute.

I will close this report by quoting from a letter recently received by one of the Auxiliaries which shows how our boxes are needed and appreciated, even though every recipient has not the ability to express herself so charmingly.

"It was wonderfully good of you to gather and send so much second-hand clothing. We do need it terribly. I think you must know how much less has been coming during the past two or three

years—and for good reason. But the need here is just as great, greater during the drought, which more than anything else, except the grasshoppers, laid this part of the country low. The summer things I shall put away for the present. The household things I think I shall give to the Indian W. A. here when they hold a little sale for their Convocation offering later this month . . . But the rest of the things, the good big dresses, the rugs, overcoats—all that belongs to this wintry weather—will be sold—for very little to be sure, but that little makes the people self-respecting, and at the same time brings in little amounts that go for chapel repairs, Church School materials, communion wine, etc.

“I only wish you could see how lovely the new things look when they reach a faraway place like this. One would think you had been here to have made so good a selection of the things you bought to send. I’m afraid we cannot help being glad that you bought as much as you did. I know many Auxiliaries like to sew, but a number of Indian boys have gone about out here with neckbands gaping under dress-up neckties because all of our hand-made shirts last year had necks too small for the rest of the shirt. . . . The dainty little lace-edged baby dresses are always lovelier for being hand made. The cunning print rompers, huge overalls and shirts for huge Indian men, the linen, warm underwear, and the lovely red and white gingham! It would take me all night to speak of each item.

“You will want to know what we do with it all. The layettes are stretched as far as they can go, for the baby crop never fails. The top shelf in the supply room is lined with them, waiting for requests from any of our own mothers in good standing in the chapels. In the spring I shall make up bundles of clothing to give to the wives and children of our sixteen catechists and helpers all over the reservation. Into those will go a dress length of gingham, so that the older women can make up the voluminous skirts they like, and the younger ones our style of house dresses. Winter clothing will be packed away with moth balls through the summer, similar bundles made up in the fall. Some extra clothing will be sold, some used in cases of destitution. Sheets and pillow cases will be used for sick people. The paper napkins will go out with our workers in the vacation Church Schools. These are the regular uses, and there are always dozens of irregular ones, like all rules and their exceptions.”

Twenty-two parishes contributed \$256.00 in money, and boxes valued at \$107.89. New clothing and household linens amounting to about \$500.00 were sent for Diocesan Missions, and a large quantity of used clothing and some new garments went to six of the missions allotted to Connecticut for the year. A gift of candy from a devoted friend of long standing was a welcome addition to the outgoing Christmas boxes.

One who has for many years been the recipient of assistance has recently written: "I wish that I could adequately express to the Comfort Club my deep appreciation of their Christmas gift; it means more to me than I can tell." Another rector's wife acknowledging a recent box, the first which her family had received, said that although she had many times worked for the Comfort Club, she never before had realized just what it meant.

Such aid, though comparatively slight, is of inestimable value and is made possible through gifts from a few parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary and interested individuals throughout the Diocese, in addition to the sum allotted yearly in the Woman's Auxiliary budget. To these we express sincere thanks and a keen appreciation of their missionary zeal and unselfish generosity. We are relying on their continued support and co-operation during the coming year. Let us also hope that others may be inspired to follow their good example.

We are at the half-way mark between Triennials and we have more towards our offering than we had three years ago, and this amount can be very much increased if the Parish Treasurers will only get together with some of their friends and read, learn, mark, and inwardly digest the very helpful information and literature that we have on the subject of the United Thank Offering, and then after they have learned their subject, divide up the list of the women of the parish among them and each one go out and tell the story, taking with her boxes and literature. Your Archdeaconry Treasurers will supply you with everything you need.

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THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

In presenting the report of 1935 I feel a very deep sense of satisfaction, gratitude, and thanksgiving for what we have been able to accomplish together. The increasing number of Planned Programs, Study Classes, and Discussion Groups is evidence of more devoted Auxiliary members and the results of these must be made manifest in all departments of the church's work. I have spoken at many meetings in every Archdeaconry in the Diocese, and had the privilege of helping plan many programs.

In the early autumn three of our Archdeaconries had informal and helpful conferences on the Educational work, at which I had the opportunity of explaining the Folder for 1935-36. In this Folder I planned a subject with suggested helps, and Book List to correspond with the working months of the Auxiliary. One thousand copies of these folders were distributed, and a reprint of five hundred has recently been made. Again we have shared our Folder, and they have gone into almost every Diocese in the country, and a request recently came in from Canada for some. On the back of the Folder the Woman's Auxiliary Prayer and U. T. O. Prayer was made into a Litany, which I find many parishes using for meditation.

Our speakers' Bureau has been working overtime, and the planned itineraries for speakers has been most gratifying. This plan has the benefits of sharing a speaker from the field, and the expense to the various Auxiliaries.

Summing up, Parish reports show that the Educational Work is being done through Visiting Missionaries, Speakers, Slides, Moving Pictures, Study Classes, Reading Circles, and the discussion of Religious Current Events.

My report would not be complete without mentioning my gratitude for being your representative at the Wellesley Conference. This Conference gives me the opportunity to prepare myself for greater usefulness on your behalf. Since my taking the chairmanship of the Educational Work it has been my great desire and aim to deepen the devotional life of our members, feeling thereby that the waves would go out from ourselves into parishes, the diocese and the world. The evidence of our success in this line is the increased number of parishes asking for talks on The Devotional Life, Prayer, and The Church, with a splendid number of Quiet Days and Days of Prayer being held.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation for the work and co-operation of the various Archdeaconry Chairmen and Educational Secretaries. Every thinking person is well aware that the condition of the church today is a matter of deep concern to those who love her and have her welfare at heart. We also know that unusual conditions call for unusual action. Then let us see to it that we put greater sacrifice, time, and strength into the work which is definitely and specifically ours, so we may pass on a torch burning with zeal and a consecrated devotion for our Master.

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REPORT OF THE PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN, 1935

It would be most interesting if we could have a clear picture, not a map, of the whole mission field. There would be lights and shadows. We would see plainly what a wonderful work had been done, and also how much more must be done to make it enduring. The Prayer Partnership has representatives in China, Japan, Africa, the Philippines, Hawaii, Alaska, the Middle West, the South, the Islands of the Sea. "We have sowed beside all waters." God has put it in the hearts of gifted women to bless their less favored sisters with the light of the gospel of Christ. When one falls by the way others come forward to carry on the Master's work. This has been true even in the years of economic depression. Few complaints have been offered by our missionary partners the past year.

Only one, alone responsible for her mission, cut to the quick in her agony, wrote, "You all say you care for us, why do you leave me without the absolutely necessary equipment." That is the black shadow over the whole mission field. Four missionaries were sent home from Liberia, among them our own Miss Keller. At Anvik, a mission dear to the Woman's Auxiliary, the school that was doing fine work, has been closed; the children are being farmed out wherever homes can be found in Alaska. To have come to this must break Bishop Rowe's heroic heart.

On the other hand, we are rejoiced that our dear Marion Mitchell is back in her successful work at St. Mary's, Shanghai. She had had a hard experience en route for a serious operation. A sudden fire had burst upon her in a lonely Chinese inn. She lost all her earthly possessions, but was promptly at her post when the term opened. She writes: "1936 is my furlough year, but I shall not take it because I may not be allowed to come back to China." It is all too hard, and yet as a rule our missionaries are holding the field. Their hearts ache to see the work slipping, slipping, retrenchment everywhere. They need our sympathy and our faithful friendship. The Prayer Partnership is a wonderful opportunity for helping them—the cheering word and the earnest prayer, while they do not bring the golden dollars, cheer their hearts, arouse their courage, and increase their powers of endurance.

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THE DIOCESAN LENDING LIBRARY

It is with much pleasure that we can report that the Cathedral is still willing and even pleased (we think we may venture to say) to have the Library in that most convenient place, in the southeast porch, which it has occupied for the last five years. Under the same efficient cataloguers, Miss Randall's and Mrs. Schumacher's time and strength has been given to entering the new books—of which a goodly number have been given during the year.

The distribution of the books is most ably and untiringly carried on by the other helpers. Mrs. Smart is in the Library from ten to eleven A. M. each Wednesday morning, at which time the Librarian also endeavors to be present. This period is always followed by the Communion Service, in the Nativity Chapel, held by the Dean or a member of the Cathedral staff, and is immediately followed by the Healing Service.

On Sunday mornings Miss Randall or Miss Howard and Miss Seymour, with the Librarian, will be found in the Library before the morning service, and after it, Miss Kitty Wells and Miss Daisy Porter.

From seventy-five to one hundred books are constantly in circulation, but we are very anxious to have more readers for our many most valuable missionary books—and those on the Prayer Book and Bible—and also good light, but worth while reading, is available.

In addition to the Library space and janitor service (possibly last, but not least, as it is well and most cheerfully rendered) which the Cathedral gives us, all the space we ask for is allowed for this Library work, in "The Evangel," the monthly publication of the Cathedral, which can be obtained for the asking.

All the above-mentioned helpers carry on the work of the Library during the Librarian's enforced absence for four months, so well that she finds it, on her return, not only kept up to the mark, but in better order than when she leaves it.

Although the Library has its headquarters at the Cathedral and the books largely used by members of that congregation it should be remembered that it was founded by and is for the use of the Auxiliary members or anyone in the Diocese. Mail orders sent to 45 Church Street will receive prompt attention.

We feel that this department should be more generally used. Any contribution for the purchasing of books will be most gratefully received.

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CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

January 1, 1935 to January 1, 1936

The year has been a busy one for the Church Periodical Club, with progress to report. I have attended all Diocesan and several Archdeaconry meetings, the Provincial Meeting in Portland, Maine, and have spoken in nine parishes. In the article I wrote for the February last number of the Connecticut Churchman I mentioned that my fund for special appeals was exhausted. A churchwoman in Waterbury read this and sent me \$25.00. This made it possible for me to send \$5.00 to Miss Margaret Teague of Maine for a much-desired book to be used in her rural work, a book by Bishop Slattery for a retired clergyman in Iowa, subscriptions to the American Boy and St. Nicholas for a mission in Tennessee, and a French Bible for a patient in a tubercular hospital in Norwich, Conn. A twenty years' file of National Geographics was offered by Mrs. Anna Biddle of Hartford and was sent to St. James' School, Wuhu, China. Two years of the American Bar Association Journals were assigned to a colored clergyman in North Carolina, who wrote a grateful letter, saying he had found

in such journals "human interest stuff of great value which outweighed profound philosophy."

A recent appeal is for Schermerhorn House in Milford, Conn., from Dr. Sunderland of the City Mission in New York, who hopes he can enlist the interest of Connecticut churchwomen in this rest and vacation house for women and children. So far I have been able to send only magazines, books, and Christmas cards. Games, toys, and sewing materials are needed.

Old Christmas cards have been sent me in vast quantity, which I have altered and sent in many directions. I sent about one thousand to the Rev. Mr. Wagner of Groton, Conn., which he gave to the women in the State Farm in Niantic, and to the children in the Seaside Sanitorium.

Two hundred school books were divided into six packages and sent to the Philippine Islands, to a mission in the mountains of Tennessee and to an Indian Reservation in South Dakota.

There have been five new branches organized and one moribund branch revived.

Here are the figures for the Diocese: 807 magazines are sent regularly by 423 persons; 11 Bibles and Testaments have been sent; 90 prayer books and hymnals; 1,035 books, both theological and secular; 244 Church School lessons; 31,000 odd magazines; 13,000 Christmas and Easter cards; also "3 cartons" of cards were reported by one branch. (I leave you to decide how many cards are in one carton); 301 pictures and calendars; 10 Victrola records; 963 games and jig saw puzzles; 47 institutions in the Diocese have been aided; \$36.50 given to the Library Fund.

Two officers have resigned after years of useful service—Mrs. Theodore Prah as Chairman of Hartford Archdeaconry, her place having been taken by Mrs. Edmund Armstrong of Hartford; and Mrs. William Williams of New London Archdeaconry, whose successor is Miss Eliza Dolbeare of Norwich.

We sent free copies of Dr. Burr's "History of the Episcopal Church in America" to about sixty bishops in various parts of the country.

During the past publication year we have issued in the Soldier and Servant Series:

No. 177, Nov. 1934—Jan. 1935: "The First Bishop of Connecticut," by the Rt. Rev. Chauncey B. Brewster, D.D., Fifth Bishop of Connecticut, of which it is scarcely necessary to say that it is written in the courteous and convincing style, and with the accurate scholarship which we should have expected of our beloved Bishop Emeritus.

No. 178, Feb.—April 1935: "Samuel Seabury, the Man and the Bishop," by the Rev. William A. Beardsley, D.D. An appreciation expressive of the personal qualities of Bishop Seabury, and the scope of his Episcopal service.

No. 179, May—July 1935: "Dr. William Croswell," by the Rev. S. F. Hotchkiss, D.D. A re-issue of the previously printed biographical sketch, prefaced for this edition by an extract from the Life of Dr. Croswell by the Rt. Rev. Dr. William Croswell

Doane, with a selection from Dr. Croswell's *Missionary Poems*.
